#### TABLE A.

#### ENROLLMENT.

The enrollment made this year by the assessors of the several cities, towns and plantations of the State shows that the total number of male citizens of this State of the age of eighteen and under the age of forty-five years, subject to military duty, is one hundred and four thousand, nine hundred and fifteen, a gain of three thousand and forty-six over the year 1903.

The following table shows the number of men liable to military service in each city, town and plantation. The towns not making returns this year are marked\*, and the return of 1903 is used.

# INSPECTOR GENERAL'S REPORT.

Augusta, December 15, 1905.

To the Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith my report as inspector general for the year ending December 15, 1905.

In compliance with General Orders No. 10, issued from your office and dated May 15, 1905, I have made a critical inspection of each of the twenty-seven organizations composing the National Guard of this State at their home stations, covering a period from May 27 to July 31, 1905. A detailed report of each organization made upon the authorized blank form is attached hereto and made a part of this report.

#### STRENGTH.

The present organized strength of the National Guard of Maine is two regiments of infantry, consisting of field, staff, non-commissioned staff, band and twelve companies each, and a ship's company of naval reserve, consisting of two divisions, commanded by a lieutenant and having a staff consisting of an executive officer and adjutant, an assistant surgeon and two chief petty officers. The minimum strength required by law is 107 officers and 1358 enlisted men, an aggregate of 1465. There is also a staff of the commander-in-chief, consisting of twelve officers; these are not strictly speaking considered a part of the National Guard and are not included in the above figures.

The actual strength of the Guard at the time of the inspection aggregated 1259, as shown by the following table.

Since my inspection the organization known as the ambulance corps located at Lewiston has been disbanded in accordance with General Orders No. 13, State of Maine, A. G. O., dated July 6, 1905; this disbandment was in no way due to inefficiency on the part of the organization but was owing to the change in the Militia Law which provided for a hospital detachment with each regiment of infantry but did not authorize an ambulance corps as a separate organization.

The following table shows the minimum strength as compared with the actual strength of each organization, at the time of inspection:

It will be noticed from the above table that the actual strength is considerably below the minimum number required by law and while I do not favor carrying on the rolls the names of men who are of no practical use to the Guard, simply to keep the strength of the company (on paper) up to the minimum, still I do believe that every effort should be made by company commanders to recruit their companies and keep them up as near as is possible consistent with recruiting the right material.

#### ATTENDANCE.

As a whole I am very well satisfied with the attendance at inspections. The number reported as absent without leave is very small indeed. It is true that in a few of the companies, notably Company K, First Infantry and Company M, Second Infantry, it would seem that a better attendance could have been secured by a little extra effort on the part of the officers and non-commissioned officers.

## GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.

## INDIVIDUAL INSTRUCTION.

I was most impressed throughout the Guard by the evident lack of individual instruction of the men in the school of the soldier and the first rudiments of military knowledge. A man who is started wrong and only learns the several movements of military drill in a general way, without explanation or individual instruction, never makes an efficient soldier and if the time ever comes when he is called upon to wear the chevrons of a non-commissioned officer he will be found entirely unfit for the position because of his inability to impart to others knowledge which he does not himself possess.

#### Non-Commissioned Officers.

Another thing that is very noticeable is the fact that a large majority of the non-commissioned officers seem to have absolutely no appreciation of the importance of their several positions or what is expected of them as corporals and sergeants. This I believe is largely due to the failure of company commanders to insist upon the performance of certain duties supposed to belong to non-commissioned officers and to properly impress upon the men by precept and example the fact that a corporal or sergeant is as much an officer in his respective grade as is a lieutenant or captain and is entitled to the same respect and obedience from his inferiors in rank. There should be as sharp a distinction between the private and the non-commissioned officer as there is between the enlisted man and the commissioned officer. In this connection I believe the estab-

lishment of the squad system in each organization would be of great benefit to the non-commissioned officers; by the squad system I do not mean the squad for drill purposes only but that seven privates, preferably those that live in the same section of the city or town, be assigned to each corporal to look after and that the company commander hold him personally responsible for the attendance, instruction, discipline, soldierly appearance, neatness and military courtesy of these men. gives the non-commissioned officer something definite to do, endows him with a feeling of responsibility and authority and furnishes an incentive for study and example on his part that cannot fail to result in an improved efficiency. In the few companies where I have seen this system in force it has resulted in a friendly rivalry among the corporals to have the best squad and in some instances I have known of a small prize, such as cigars or a supper, being offered by the company commander to the squad having the best average in attendance, neatness, military bearing, discipline, drill, etc., for a given period.

### SOLDIERLY APPEARANCE.

Sufficient attention is not given to the matter of neatness and uniformity of dress, particularly at ceremonies. Men are permitted to appear in ranks with handkerchiefs around their necks in place of a collar, some with colored sweaters showing above the coat collar, some with black, some with russet shoes, some with, some without gloves, many with shoes not brushed and clothing dirty and wrinkled from being thrown upon the floor of lockers instead of hanging upon the hooks and evidently put on without being brushed or any attempt to make it presentable—this is inexcusable. I cannot understand why every man should not have the same personal pride in looking neat and clean in a military uniform that he would have if in civilian dress.

#### DISCIPLINE.

This is the most important part of a soldier's education and in fact it is the first duty of an enlisted man to learn to obey unhesitatingly and without question the orders of all officers or non-commissioned officers who are his superiors in rank and to strictly observe all rules and regulations for the government of the several organizations that may be published by proper authority. To maintain good discipline it is also necessary that

all officers should be endowed with dignity, strength of character and careful attention to the needs of the soldier, as well as absolute justice in all questions of authority. In military affairs, discipline is in no way humiliating; it is a simple acquiring of the habit of honest obedience and does not in any way involve the surrender of individual rights. It is admitted that perfect discipline is very difficult to attain in the National Guard organizations owing to the fact that both officers and enlisted men are employed in the business world and the time allowed for military purposes is necessarily limited, still I am of the opinion that a reasonable state of efficiency could be reached by a little more attention to the proper education of the recruit on this subject. As a rule the men in their armories seem quiet, gentlemanly and soldierly and a reasonable attention is paid to the salute and military bearing, still there is a noticeable lack of instruction. There is also a great tendency for familiarity between the officers and enlisted men. Enlisted men were frequently found loafing and smoking in the officers' quarters and it was very frequently the case that privates were allowed to enter the room without knocking and with some such familiar salutation as "hello cap." These may seem little things but a strict observance of military courtesy is absolutely necessary to insure proper discipline and one of the first lessons to be learned by the recruit is the fact that he must give the officer and non-commissioned officer the respect and obedience due his rank and military position, no matter if in civil life he may be that officers equal or even his superior.

#### ARMORIES.

Except that many of the rooms used for drill halls are much too small for practical work, the several organizations are fairly well provided with quarters by the cities and towns where located. A full description of all armories has been contained in the reports of my predecessor and need not be repeated, as no changes in armories have occurred during the past year. The armory of Company C, First Infantry at Auburn, is undergoing quite extensive interior improvements and when completed will be one of the most attractive assembly rooms in the State besides giving improved facilities for the storage and care of military property.

#### CARE OF PROPERTY.

There is room for much improvement in the matter of proper care and preservation of military property, particularly in the arrangement and care of the individual lockers of the enlisted men. While in some companies these lockers are models of neatness and order with a place for everything and everything in place, I regret to say that in many of the armories they were found in very bad order and far from being clean; in some instances military uniforms were found thrown on the floor in the bottom of the lockers while the hooks were occupied by baseball, football or basketball suits, while in others I found dirty socks, dirty towels, underclothing, sweaters, boots and shoes and a variety of other articles not strictly belonging to the military equipment. In one armory the dust and dirt in the lockers could have been scraped up by the handful, from all appearance they had never been brushed out since being built. A great many haversacks were found to contain broken up hardtack and other remnants of the rations issued to the men during the Manassas Maneuvers, this should not be allowed because being left in that condition they soon become rancid and unfit to again be used for carrying food.

Overcoats and capes, ponchos, woolen blankets and other articles not in constant use were in some cases found stuffed (I can think of no other word to express it) into chests or boxes and packed away without any attempt at smoothing out, folding or other orderly arrangement; in some instances where they were evidently packed away while damp or wet I found a number of overcoats mildewed and musty and really unfit for use. While I realize that in connection with the care of property much is expected of the company commander for very little compensation, still I cannot help feeling that this indifference or neglect of care is not a fair treatment to give the property issued to them for the use of their commands and for which they are held responsible.

I am happy to state that the above mentioned conditions are the exception not the rule and these general observations on the subject are made in the hope that accountable officers, where these conditions do exist, will take the hint and not subject themselves or their companies to a personal criticism when another inspection is made.

# Books, Papers, and Records.

Here is one of the weakest places in the efficiency of the National Guard of Maine. There seems to be a great lack of appreciation of the importance and value of paper work, there is not sufficient attention or study given to making out reports and returns and to correspondence, and in some cases there is a great lack or promptness in forwarding the same. As a rule no instructions in this work are given to officers or non-commissioned officers. In a number of cases company clerks, who are supposed to make a special study of the paper work, are clerks only in name, the company commanders doing the work themselves rather than to take the trouble to instruct another.

Most earnest attention is invited to this very important branch of the service. Promptness and accuracy in official communications are absolutely necessary for intelligent administration. I would suggest that the proper making of reports, returns and official correspondence be taken up in all schools of instruction for officers and non-commissioned officers and made a special study. Ignorance on the part of subalterns and non-coms. in the proper handling of paper work in case of service, should the captain for any reason become detached from his command, would result in confusion, delays and perhaps hardship upon the men by reason of inability to draw supplies and rations promptly, simply from lack of knowledge of the proper procedure.

#### SMALL ARMS PRACTICE.

The annual report of the inspector general of rifle practice, which should be read with a great deal of interest by every member of the Guard, embraces about all that can be said upon this important branch of the service. A great stride has been made in qualifications during the last season and in spite of the difficulty experienced in procuring suitable ranges where practice with the new rifle could be held with safety, the percentage of efficiency in rifle practice this year is higher than ever before attained in this State.

I find many of the armories are provided with some kind of gallery range for indoor practice. In the interest of economy as well as efficiency too much can not be said in favor of gallery practice; it is the best method known to instruct the beginner in

the use of the military rifle and in this connection proves a great saving in both time and ammunition when qualifying men during the out door practice season. I hope before another season to see every armory provided with a well equipped gallery range.

#### ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The camp ground, which is owned by the State, its situation, permanent buildings and camping facilities are too well known to require a detailed description at this time, sufficient to say that it is an ideal spot for a military camp and for one regiment is all that can be desired in point of room, advantages and facilities. The only drawback is the lack of water supply. All the water used has to be hauled to the grounds, which makes it not only expensive but at times very difficult to supply in sufficient quantities. It may be well to note here the changes and improvements that have been made since the grounds were last occupied by troops in 1902. A large storehouse 50x80 feet and two stories high has been built near the guard house on the north side of the parade ground; the kitchens, mess houses and sinks formerly used by the ambulance corps and the signal corps have been placed on the south end and in continuation of the line of company buildings; the general commissary building and headquarters mess house has been set back on a line with the hospital and headquarters buildings, which adds greatly to the appearance of the grounds; the headquarters sinks have been moved back to a greater distance from the main buildings and a suitable ladies' toilet room provided at headquarters.

Following is a detailed report of the encampment:

The camp, which was prepared in advance by hired labor and all ready for occupancy when the troops arrived, was occupied first by the second infantry from August 5th to 11th, inclusive, and by the first infantry from August 12th to 18th, inclusive. The camp was designated "Camp Cobb" in honor of the Commander-in-Chief and was commanded from August 5th to 11th by Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, and from August 12th to 18th by Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry. There was present during the entire time the adjutant general, inspector general, commissary general and surgeon

general of the staff of the commander-in-chief. Captain E. M. Johnson, 8th U. S. Infantry, was detailed by the War Department as inspector and instructor and he proved a very efficient officer, thoroughly interested in the work, courteous to all, patient and painstaking in answering and explaining the innumerable questions asked by both officers and men; he imparted much valuable instruction that cannot fail to increase the efficiency of the Guard. Captain Johnson will be long remembered as one of the best instructors ever sent to this State.

Transportation was conducted much as in former years, special trains being run from Portland and Bangor and picking up the companies at their several stations. Entraining and detraining was promptly done in both regiments, the average time being about four minutes. Except on the day of arrival and Sunday, each regiment had two drills per day of two hours each; these drills consisted of the battalion in close order, company battalion and regiment in extended order, advance guard and outpost duty by battalion.

The drills by battalion in close order were very well executed, a marked improvement being noticed each day as the officers gained in practice. The movements in extended order were at first very poor but by hard work, under the direction and instruction of Captain Johnson, quite an improvement was made so that by the end of the encampment both regiments had gained a good understanding of the work. On August 8th the second regiment made a practice march to Togus, camping there for the night and returning the next day by another route. This march was combined with a field exercise, one company, "H", being sent out in advance with instructions to select a position and attack the advancing column in such a manner as would best compel it to deploy for attack. The company sent out in advance succeeded in capturing the left flankers of both the advance party and support without being discovered and attacked the head of the main body. These movements were under the direction of Captain Johnson and resulted in much valuable experience in practical work, in the field and over varied ground. While the first infantry did not leave camp for a practice march, much time was devoted to field maneuvers, extended order, advance and rear guard, outpost duty, etc., and owing to the position of the camp and nature of the immediate

surrounding country it was possible to gain almost if not quite as much practical experience and knowledge of the work, as would have resulted from a practice march. Owing to rain one whole day's work was lost to the first infantry, this was fortunately the only stormy day during the entire encampment.

In the second infantry, guard was mounted each day in the afternoon, this ceremony was immediately followed by a regimental parade; retreat was sounded at sunset and observed simply by having the band at headquarters to play while the flag was being lowered. Parades at first were poorly executed but a marked improvement was noticeable each day. Improvement in the ceremony of guard mounting was not so marked owing to the fact that the non-commissioned officers were not sufficiently instructed in their duties and being differently composed each day there was no chance for improvement by practical experience. Guard duty was very well performed considering the lack of practice.

In the first infantry, guard was mounted each day in the morning and regimental parades were held at retreat, which in my opinion added to the impressiveness of the ceremony as well as furnishing an object lesson in patriotism and homage to the flag by having the regiment paraded and standing at attention while the flag was being lowered. In this regiment the parades were very well executed but the same criticism as to guard mount made above will also apply to this regiment; not enough instruction in this duty is given to non-commissioned officers and privates at their armories before coming to camp. Guard duty was fairly well performed, particularly in the matter of salutes, in both regiments. There was a noticeable difference in the knowledge displayed by sentinels coming from certain companies as compared with those belonging to the other companies who seemed to have received absolutely no previous instruction as to their duties. This brings out the fact that men can be and should be thoroughly instructed in the duties of a sentinel at their armories during the year so that when put to the practical test at the annual encampment they can by their efficiency bring credit upon themselves and to the organization to which they belong.

His Excellency, Governor Cobb, with his staff was present on August 10th and 17th and reviewed the troops on both

occasions. The escort duty and the review was exceedingly well performed by both regiments.

A daily inspection was made of the sinks, stables, kitchens, mess houses, company quarters and the guard and attention called to all faults or irregularities noticed; these were quickly rectified and as a whole I consider the camp was well policed, in fact I think it was the cleanest camp I have ever attended.

With a few exceptions the conduct of the men was good; they were attentive to duty, soldierly in appearance, courteous, well-behaved and appeared anxious to improve in military knowledge. As a whole the encampment was a very successful one, the time being almost wholly devoted to the practical study of extended order, advance and rear guard and outpost duty work which owing to the small size of many of the drill halls it is impossible to study, except in theory, at home stations. There is, however, no reason why the details of close order drill, the squad in extended order, posting of sentinels and duties of sentinels cannot be taught in the armories and men well instructed before going into camp, thus saving much valuable time for the battalion and regimental drill that is now used for instruction and explanation.

#### PERSONNEL.

As a rule the officers of the National Guard of Maine are gentlemen endowed with good understanding who, if not already so, could easily by application and study eminently fit themselves for the duties of their several positions. Nothwithstanding the criticisms of organizations found in this report there is much to be said for the enlisted men. Attention is particularly called to the fact that without compensation they are willing to give so much of their time for military purposes and in preparation for the defense of the State and nation. They are excellent men, intelligent, sober and industrious and come from that class of the population always called upon in domestic military emergencies. They should, therefore, be given every possible facility in gaining the military instructions they seem so much in earnest to obtain.

The officer is the important individual of the service. Given a responsibility and authority not always fully comprehended it should be his imperative duty to apply himself as much as possi-

ble to the study and knowledge of his position; it is to him that the soldier looks for instruction and protection and when the officer is incapable of imparting the one or giving the other the service of the enlisted man cannot be otherwise than inefficient. The enlisted man feels this incompetency on the part of the officer and mentally if not openly questions every order and duty; this soon brings on a state of insubordination and disorganization. Where there is not proper discipline, troops are without control and there is no surer way for an officer to inspire the confidence and loyalty of his men than through a good understanding of his duties. It is not to be understood by the critical remarks made in this report that the good work accomplished by the National Guard is not appreciated. Great credit is due for the really high state of efficiency attained under adverse and sometimes discouraging circumstances and too much cannot be said in praise of the lovalty and patriotism displayed by both officers and men who, without material compensation, give up so much of their time and money for the good of the service and for the attainment of military improvement.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

With few exceptions I believe the company commanders are doing their best to promote the standing and efficiency of their several commands so far as is possible under the circumstances and peculiar conditions that exist in the different parts of the State where military organizations are located.

If the amount of money appropriated by the State and apportioned by the United States was sufficient to warrant their adoption, there are a number of recommendations that I would like to make which would I believe greatly increase the standing and efficiency of the Guard, but I realize that under the present conditions their adoption would be practically impossible. I will only mention one or two things that could, I believe, be brought about without any material increase in expenditure.

1. That a uniform system of property accountability between company commanders and enlisted men be established and insisted upon in each organization.

- 2. That a sum of money not to exceed \$20.00 each year be appropriated and paid in advance to company commanders, to be expended by them for necessary postage and for the preservation and repair of uniforms and equipment; said expenditures to be accounted for by vouchers and unexpended balances to be deducted from the next year's allowance.
- 3. That company quartermaster sergeants be required to keep the armories in order and take care of all arms, equipments, clothing, equipage and other military property issued to each organization. That company commanders hold him responsible for the cleanliness and orderly arrangement of property rooms and lockers and for the care and preservation of all military property. That a sum not to exceed \$30 each year be paid to company quartermaster sergeants for the faithful performance of the above duties. That the amount to be paid shall be determined by the inspector general and shall be based upon the condition of property as found and the degree of proficiency displayed in the cleanliness and orderly arrangement of armories, property rooms and lockers.
- 4. That lieutenants and non-commissioned officers be given more frequent opportunity for practice in giving commands and handling men, thereby gaining confidence in themselves and inspiring the confidence of the men.
- 5. That a squad system such as is outlined in my remarks on "Non-Commissioned Officers" in this report be established in each company for the education of non-commissioned officers in their duties and responsibilities and increasing the efficiency of privates and recruits.
- 6. That the paper work, including all reports, returns and military correspondence, be made a special study at all schools of instruction of officers and non-commissioned officers.
- 7. That the regulations be rigidly enforced against officers and men who absent themselves from duty without authority. Nothing is so infectious as this carelessness and the sooner such men are removed from the service the better. It is a very simple matter to apply for leave or excuse from attendance when a proper reason exists and it is a duty that every officer and enlisted man owes to himself and to his company.

#### REMARKS.

Under the provisions and requirements of the act of Congress approved January 21, 1903, and known as the "Dick Bill," the National Guard of Maine is constantly approaching nearer to the regular service in general efficiency and methods of drill, clothing, equipment, target practice, etc., and all orders and blanks in so far as is practicable are based upon the U. S. forms.

Although several companies have fallen below a fair standard there is in every instance a good reason and a fair prospect of great improvement in the near future and as a whole the National Guard of Maine is more than reasonably efficient, well equipped and ready for any duty. It is made up of an intelligent body of officers and men and its affairs are managed in a manner looking to the general advancement and interest of the military service of the State.

In closing I wish to express through this report my thanks for the uniform kindness and attention shown me by the military officers of the State and my appreciation of their prompt and courteous assistance in all matters relating to the work of the inspection of the troops.

## REPORT OF COMMISSARY GENERAL.

FOXCROFT, MAINE, December 30, 1905.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to herewith submit my annual report as commissary general for the year ending December 30, 1905.

In compliance with section 7, of general orders No. 12, I prepared estimates of quantities of supplies required for the encampment, and advertised for bids for the same in the Daily Kennebec Journal. Proposals were received and contracts awarded for the necessary supplies. The supplies were all carefully inspected when delivered at headquarters, and with two exceptions were found to be first-class in every respect.

An issue of provisions was made every morning at nine o'clock for the three meals following. Previous to this time an inspection was made of the cook-houses in order to ascertain what supplies if any were left over from the previous issue, and thus avoid unnecessary issue and waste of supplies.

I arrived at Camp Cobb the day before the regiment arrived and remained during the entire period of encampment. At the close of the encampment I approved all bills of my department and forwarded the same to you for your approval and payment.

At the staff headquarters rations were issued for  $14\frac{1}{3}$  days. 1,116 meals were served at a total of \$299.35 making an average per meal per man of 26 82-100 cents.

### SURGEON GENERAL'S REPORT.

PORTLAND, ME., January 23, 1906.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General:

SIR:—In accordance with the law governing the National Guard of Maine, I have the honor to present my report as Surgeon General for the year 1905.

The changes in the personnel of the medical department of the service were those of the First Regiment and were consequent to my appointment as Surgeon General. First Lieut. G. M. Elliott being promoted to First Assistant with rank of Captain, and former Hospital Steward Chas. L. Cragin commissioned Second Assistant with rank of First Lieutenant.

On assuming the position of Surgeon General, I endeavored and succeeded as far as practicable to determine the amount and quality of hospital stores owned by the State. I found the quantity ample and in some respects excessive of actual needs of the department. The quality of others had deteriorated to such an extent as to be worthless. We were able with supply on hand to provide the Regiments and post hospital for the two weeks' tour of duty at the Annual Encampment with the exception of a few expendable articles which had to be purchased. At the beginning of the Annual Encampment I had a complete inventory made of all supplies both expendable and non-expendable belonging to the Medical Department.

On opening the post and Regiment hospital such supplies as were required were invoiced to the Major Surgeon in charge and receipted for by him, at the close of his tour of duty a return was made by him and his receipt taken up. In this way we not only know positively what supplies we had on hand but we know who was responsible for the loss or damage of non-expendable property if any. At the close of the Annual Encampment a

post hospital return of all supplies both expendable and non-expendable is made to the Adjutant General's office.

At this encampment of the National Guard of 1905, an earnest effort was made by the Medical Department to make the camp and surroundings as sanitary, hygienic and healthful as possible under the conditions existing. To the prompt and faithful work of the members of the Medical Department of each Regiment my thanks and acknowledgments are due for maintaining the cleanest, most healthful, and most military camp that I have seen since my connection with the Guard, or even in the Volunteer Service of the U. S. Government in 1898.

On entering camp a bulletin was issued from Surgeon General's office to each medical officer of the Regiment, calling his attention to certain principles of camp sanitation and hygiene and as to the best way to accomplish desired results. A series of inspections were ordered and reports made daily on conditions of camp, mess tents, quarters, rations, water, kitchens, sinks, stables, general policing, etc., inspections were made morning and afternoon and a report made to the Colonel of Regiment and Surgeon General daily. In this way abuses that have crept into previous camps were corrected or eliminated and notwithstanding that the men did very severe duty we had a most healthful camp.

The disbanding of the Ambulance Corps and the lack of a regular Hospital Corps embarrassed the surgeons of the Regiments in some respects. It is to be hoped that during the coming year a proper Hospital Corps will be established as outlined in the law for the National Guard and that they receive proper instruction in their duties from the medical officers who should be detailed to attend to it.

With the permission of the Adjutant General I attended the annual meeting of the American Association of Army and Navy Surgeons at Detroit, Michigan. This organization is now recognized by all foreign nations as one of the most helpful and instructive medical bodies in the world and nearly every country in Europe and Asia, sends a delegate, also Canada, Mexico and the South American Republics. Some countries send two, one from the army and one from the navy, while nearly all the States of the Union are represented by their Surgeon Generals or some officer designated by them to attend. The subjects discussed are so varied and practical and with the free inter-

change of opinions by those present including the foreign representatives, that much good cannot fail to be derived from the meeting to those attending and consequently their States.

At the meeting in Detroit, Japan was represented by Gen. Sazuke, Admiral Togo's fleet surgeon, who was with that commander through all his battles. His description of the management and care of the wounded and sick was both instructive and interesting. He showed how the Japanese surgeons having authority could keep the Army well and in fighting condition. Other instructive papers were read by the English, French, Canadian and representatives of other countries. The meeting as a whole was a great success and Maine Medical Department should be represented at each annual meeting as well as Texas, Colorado, Idaho, Florida and other distant states.

I would respectfully call to your attention that under present conditions a newly appointed medical officer is examined for a commission by a board of field and staff officers. I would recommend that the board should consist of retired medical officers who are capable of determining the candidate's fitness for the position. Likewise I would recommend a medical officer on all boards for commissioning of newly elected officers or on promotion to higher rank. It is not only that the physical condition of the officer elect should be of the standard required, but that he should have a sufficient knowledge of sanitation and hygiene as well as a familiarity with first aid to the sick or injured, as would enable him to give advise and instruction to those under his command, and so save them from many of the results of indiscretion due to ignorance of the simplest rules of healthful living.

If a permanent annual camp is to be maintained at the present site at Augusta, it is to be regretted that more land cannot be obtained so that the stables and sinks could be moved back at least fifty feet beyond where they now are and that distance further from the kitchens and mess houses. This is a matter very much needed and I would respectfully recommend it to your attention.

Another subject of great importance, if the camp site at Augusta is to be maintained, is the absence of water supply and consequently limited bathing facilities. Water is now hauled by teams a long distance, but of course a very limited supply can be provided and which as far as it goes, is of a very good

quality, but limited. I believe that with a moderate outlay a pipe-line could be laid from the Augusta water-works to the camp ground and at a very moderate cost one or two shower bath sheds or tents could be established which would be of very great comfort and benefit to the men who come in from drill or march covered with sweat and dust and who for lack of facilities have to lay all night in their soiled and sweaty clothing.

I wish to thank the medical officers of the National Guard of Maine for their uniform courtesy and obedience to all orders and requests that I made upon them. It has been remarked before that few if any states in the Union have the medical men in their National Guard of the professional standing and ability as in our State. Such a fact speaks well for their interest and patriotism.

To the uniform courtesy and assistance of Gen. Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, I am indebted for many kindnesses in my endeavor to fill the office of Surgeon General.

To His Excellency, Gov. Wm. T. Cobb, I am under great obligations for his evident interest in my department and his commendatory remarks regarding our tour of duty for 1905.

# REPORT OF THE JUDGE-ADVOCATE GENERAL.

LEWISTON, ME., January 1, 1906.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit below, my report as judge advocate general for the year ending December 31, 1905.

I rendered such assistance as was required in preparing the several amendments to the militia law of the State, which were submitted to the legislature of 1905, and which appear as chapter 64, of the Public Laws of that year.

I had the honor to serve as recording officer of the Court of Inquiry which convened at Portland on December 14, 1905, for the purpose of an investigation in the conditions obtaining in connection with Company E, First Infantry. The doings of the Court are fully set forth in its report thereof, already on file.

But one explicit ruling on militia law has been required of me during the year. The question submitted was, whether an officer of the National Guard who has been dishonorably discharged from the service, could afterward have the same changed to an "honorable discharge." I ruled that this could not be done, on the ground that, the sentence having already been executed, the petitioner was not now a member of the Guard and could not be discharged from a body to which he no longer belonged. Neither could a pardon be granted him, for the same reason, that is, that the sentence was executed.

There have been no courts martial during the year, and nothing of an extraordinary nature to require the attention of this department.

# REPORT OF INSPECTOR GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

PORTLAND, November 20, 1905.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of small arms practice in the National Guard of the State of Maine, for the season ending November 1, 1905:

The season of 1905 has brought small arms practice in the National Guard of the State of Maine to the highest point of efficiency in its history.

There are today 468 officers and men who have fired at 200, 300 and 500 yards. Of this number 102 have fired at 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards, slow-fire; 200 yards, timed-fire; and made skirmish runs from 600 to 200 yards. Of these 102, 58 have fired at 800 and 1000 yards.

Recognizing the fact that under service conditions off-hand firing at point-blank ranges needs no particular training, Special Course "C" was designed to rate the efficiency of troops on their proficiency in the use of the rifle at mid- and long-ranges. Hence, in order to secure a creditable figure of merit, troops must be advanced beyond the 200-yard stage. This fact was emphasized when the course was adopted at the beginning of the season of 1904 and those organizations which failed to heed the warning suffered accordingly in figure of merit for the season. During the season of 1905 stress has been again laid on the necessity of systematic work at 200, 300 and 500 yards in qualifying Second-classmen, First-classmen and Marksmen. As a result, it will be found that the number qualifying in these classes has been materially increased the past season. The tabulated figures show:

It will thus be seen that there has been a gain for the season of 19 Second-classmen, 64 First-classmen and 153 Marksmen. There has been a decrease of 238 in the Fourth-classmen, which includes all those who have not fired.

Particular mention is made of these grades because it is apparent that only in exceptional cases will a large per cent of a company qualify in the higher classes of Sharpshooter and Expert. The former calls for slow-fire scores at 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards, timed-fire at 200 yards and a skirmish run; and the latter calls for Sharpshooter qualification with slow-fire scores at 800 and 1000 yards in addition. The difficulty in securing adequate range facilities will always be a handicap to qualification in these classes, hence it is to consistent effort to qualify Second-classmen, First-classmen and Marksmen that the Guard must look for a creditable figure of merit.

Systematic work in seeing that men fire at least two full scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards, always under competent instructors, will find very few men left in the Third and Fourth classes at the end of the practice season.

It is to this work that company commanders should bend their energies, for the men who are sufficiently ambitious to desire the higher qualifications will require little urging.

#### FIGURE OF MERIT.

The figure of merit for the several organizations shows a remarkable advance over 1904. The individual figure of merit for the entire Guard has been advanced from 20.3 to 44.53. The figure of merit for the First Infantry has been advanced from 19.5 to 42.71; that of the Second Infantry, from 22.0 to 49.07; that of the Naval Reserve, from 16.4 to 20.80; and that of the staff of the Commander-in-Chief, from 20.0 to 29.16. The following table shows the total classification:

#### THE STATE OF MAINE RIFLE TEAM.

Pursuant to instructions from your office, a rifle team was organized to represent the National Guard of the State of Maine at the meeting of the New England Military Rifle Association at Wakefield, Mass., August 15-18, and at the National Matches held under the direction of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice at Sea Girt, N. J., August 24-September 1.

The team was selected after a two-days' competition at Brunswick, August 7th and 8th. This competition included work in slow fire at 200, 500 and 600 yards, together with timed-fire at 200 yards and rapid-fire at 200 and 500 yards. The names of the fifteen men thus selected are as follows:

In S. O. No. 60, from your office, the above named officers and men were constituted the State of Maine Rifle Team, the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice being named as the team captain, Major John J. Dooley of Portland, Assistant Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, as assistant, and Captain Gilbert M. Elliott of Brunswick, Assistant Surgeon, First Infantry, as surgeon and quartermaster.

It was impossible to arrange for team practice prior to departure from the State and the men did not shoot together as a team till they entered the New England Interstate Trophy Match at Wakefield, August 17th. The twelve men selected as the Maine

team for this event were as follows: Sergt. Wentworth, Capt. Carver, Corp. Tubbs, Sergt. Stiles, Corp. Snell, Sergt. C. A. Marston, Sergt. W. P. Marston, B. M. Heseltine, Sergt. Daughraty, Lieut. Field, Capt. Nash and Priv. Trafton.

Five of the six New England states were represented in the match and Maine finished in third place, but four points behind Rhode Island, which took second money, and far in the lead of New Hampshire, which was fourth. Massachusetts won the match by a comfortable margin and Connecticut finished in last place. The scores of the five competing terms were as follows:

A study of the above figures will show that Maine led Rhode Island a very close race for second honors. This was especially gratifying since Rhode Island, in the national match of 1904, beat Massachusetts and was thoroughly acquainted with longrange, rapid and skirmish firing, all of which were new to members of the Maine team.

The highest aggregate score made by any competitor in the match was that of Sergt. D. W. Wentworth of the Maine team. The detailed score of the Maine team follows:

In the other events at the Wakefield meeting the Maine riflemen won honors. The Cadet Trophy match, open to teams of five from any company, troop or battery unit in New England, was won by the team representing Co. D, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., Norway. This match was shot at 200 and 500 yards, two sighting shots and seven counting shots at each range. In the Bancroft Match at 300 and 600 yards, open to teams of six from any regimental or battalion unit in New England, the team representing the First Infantry, N. G. S. M., stood fourth. Sergt. M. P. Stiles of Co. D, First Infantry, Norway, won the Hale Trophy for the best score in two sighting and seven counting shots at 1000 yards. Several other individual prizes were won by members of the team.

The meeting of the New England Military Rifle Association closed Friday, August 19th, but the members of the Maine team remained on the Wakefield range till the following Tuesday, during which time they practiced faithfully at long range, rapid-fire and skirmish running—the points in which they were certain to be handicapped when shooting against experienced riflemen.

The team members, with the exception of Capt. H. P. Carver of Co. C, First Infantry, Auburn, left Boston for Sea Girt via the Fall River line Tuesday night. Capt. Carver was at this time ill at the home of relatives in Melrose and did not recover in time to rejoin the team, much to the regret of every member thereof.

The team arrived at Sea Girt at noon, Wednesday, August 23d, devoting the afternoon to extremely limited practice at 800 and 1000 yards. The day following, the National Individual Match was begun and every member of the Maine team was entered in order to secure all possible practice on the range upon which the National Trophy Match was to be shot. The National Individual Match included slow-fire scores at 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards; rapid-fire scores at 200 and 500 yards and two skirmish runs, though the latter condition was so modified as to permit no one to make the second run who did not stand a chance to win one of the prizes by making a perfect score in the second run.

Sergt. M. P. Stiles of Co. D, First Infantry, Norway, had the honor to finish in seventh place in the match, which was a signal achievement, considering the fact that there were over 600 contestants, including the most expert riflemen in the country. Sergt. Stiles's score was as follows: Slow fire—200 yards, 42; 300 yards, 46; 500 yards, 45; 600 yards, 42. Rapid fire—200

yards, 42; 500 yards, 42. Skirmish—first run, 55; second run, 91. Grand aggregate, 405.

The National Trophy Match was to have been commenced Saturday, August 26th, but the unexpectedly large field of entries in the individual match made this impossible and the match was not commenced till Tuesday, August 29th.

The twelve officers and men selected as the State of Maine team for this event were as follows: Capt. Nash, Sergt. Wentworth, Sergt. W. P. Marston, B. M. Heseltine, Priv. Trafton, Lieut. Perry, Maj. Bradbury, Lieut. Field, Sergt. C. A. Marston, Corp. Snell, Corp. Tubbs and Sergt. Stiles.

At the end of the 200-yard stage the Maine team was in second place with New York but two points ahead. The team continued to hold up well in the slow firing at 600, 800 and 1000 yards, being beaten by but two teams at the latter stage. In rapid fire the team's work was much better than was to be expected from men who had had but very little rapid-fire practice. It was the two skirmish runs which put the team entirely out of the running, for a hundred points are easily lost in two runs with a possible total of 2400. The Maine men held consistently to their Wakefield mark, making slightly better than 600 on each run.

The final placing of Maine was in seventeenth place in a field of 37 teams. Eliminating the skirmish and rapid-fire work to which the team was unaccustomed, would have placed Maine in fifth place.

Sergt. D. W. Wentworth was taken ill during the match and his place was filled by Sergt. L. H. Daughraty of Co. D, First Infantry, Norway, who shot in the two skirmish runs and the 1000-yard stage, doing exceedingly creditable work.

The members of the team left Sea Girt on the return trip, Saturday, September 2d, reaching their home stations, Sunday, September 3d.

The team was coached in practice by Sergt. M. P. Stiles and to his untiring energy and thorough study of the rifle should be ascribed a large measure of the success which attended the efforts of the team.

The team quartermaster, Capt. Elliott, performed the many duties of his office with the utmost fidelity and the thoroughness of his methods left the team free to devote their entire attention to range work.

Every team member and alternate gave the team his best endeavor and the State has reason to feel proud of the men who shot to uphold its honor in the National Trophy Match. Maine may—and, I trust, will—have a team at some future day which will excel the scores made this year, but there will never be a team which will work more faithfully for the honor of the Pine Tree State.

#### COMPETITIONS.

No State range being available for the regimental and State competitions this season, the program of competitions outlined in my last report was of necessity somewhat curtailed. Regimental competitions were held, however, and the score showed a gratifying advance over the year preceding.

The competition of the First Infantry was held at Sanford, July 27th, on the range of Company F, First Infantry, and the

competition of the Second Infantry, August 4th, on the range of Company K, First Infantry, at Brunswick.

At both competitions the teams were required to fire at 200 and 500 yards, in accordance with the suggestions made in my last report. In all previous competitions the work of company teams has been confined to 200 yards, with the result that in practice for the competitions riflemen have neglected the midranges. The addition of the 500-yard stage is in line with the purposes of Special Course "C" and will as time goes on, increase the number and efficiency of our mid-range marksmen.

The match conditions for both regimental competitions were identical. Teams of seven men, one team from each company and from regimental headquarters, were required to fire two sighting shots and seven counting shots at 200 and 500 yards. In the First Infantry competition eleven teams competed. Company A of Portland failed to send a team and Company E of Portland was ruled out through the ineligibility of one of the seven men who reported at the range to represent the company. In the Second Infantry competition twelve teams competed, regimental headquarters being unrepresented. Though shooting on different days and on different ranges, conditions were nearly equal, and each regiment had reason to feel gratified at the work of its riflemen. At the First Infantry competition, Company D of Norway made the best score in the history of military rifle shooting in Maine and at the Second Infantry competition, though the winning score was below that of Company D of the First, the average per team was materially higher.

In justice to the competitors it should be noted that in several instances teams were sent from companies which had no opportunities for range practice. While the presence of such teams lowers the regimental average per team, the spirit which prompts a company to send a team to certain defeat is commendable and the knowledge which such team members gain at a competition is of value to them when they are afforded suitable range facilities at home.

#### RETURNS.

The monthly return blank for small arms practice was modified for this season's work by substituting a postal for the folded blank of the preceding season. The substitution has proven its merit in greatly increased promptness. It materially lightens the work of company clerks and company commanders and serves all the purposes of the 1904 blank, keeping this office fully in touch with the work which is being done in each company. Some company commanders have neglected to make their returns on time, even after having their attention called to their delinquency several times, but in most cases the companies which are doing faithful work on the range are prompt in making returns.

In order to assist company commanders in making their returns correctly at the close of the season, and to bring to their minds the necessity for utilizing to the best advantage the closing weeks of the season, the following circular letter was issued under date of September 13th.

#### "STATE OF MAINE.

TO COMMANDING OFFICERS OF THE NATIONAL GUARD:

The season for Small Arms Qualification Practice will end October 31st, 1905, and no scores made after that date will be accepted for qualification.

Company and division commanders will at once ascertain the number of men in their commands who have not reported at the range for practice during the present season, and make every effort to see that each officer and man is at the range at least once before the season ends.

A single score at 200 yards, regardless of the total made, takes a man out of the FOURTH CLASS into the THIRD CLASS, thereby materially raising the figure of merit.

In so far as they can, company and division commanders will see that each man fires at least two full scores at 200 yards (off-hand); two full scores at 300 yards (kneeling or sitting); and two full scores at 500 yards (prone). If the aggregate for his best scores at these three ranges equals 67, he will be returned as a SECOND-CLASS Man; if it equals 83, he will be returned as a FIRST-CLASS Man; if it equals 98, he will be returned as a MARKSMAN.

In the case of men who have not made scores of 20 or better at 200 yards, the firing at 300 and 500 yards will be conducted with special care, an experienced man being present to see that sights are properly adjusted and that the man firing takes the proper positions. Intelligent coaching with beginners will result in much higher qualification and will prove far more instructive to the novice, since it will show him wherein he errs and teach him to correct his faults.

No one will be returned as a SHARPSHOOTER who has not made an aggregate of at least 120 in the Marksman's Course at 200, 300 and 500 yards, made at least 40 out of 50 at 600 yards, fired two scores totaling at least 25 in timed fire at 200 yards, and made one skirmish run with a total sufficient to bring the grand total up to 235.

No one will be returned as an EXPERT who has not qualified as a sharpshooter and in addition made at least 40 out of 50 at 800 yards and at least 35 out of 50 at 1000 yards.

Officers and non-commissioned officers conducting skirmish practice will allow sufficient time at each halt for the skirmishers command "Commence Firing."

to fix their sights, after the command "Halt" and before the Blank forms for the return of Small Arms Qualification Practice will be sent to each company and division before the end of the qualification season and commanding officers will be prompt in making returns. But one return is required and that is to be mailed to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, direct. In filling out the returns, the men qualifying in the highest classes will be placed first and after the Third-Class Men the

names of ALL Fourth-Class Men will be entered—i. e., the names of all who have not fired, together with such explanatory remarks as may be deemed necessary.

Officers and enlisted men armed with the revolver are urged to attempt qualification. Two scores of 24 at 30 yards and two scores of 23 at 50 yards entitle return in the Revolver Marksmen Class; these scores with two scores of 22 at 75 yards entitle return in the Revolver Expert Class; and two scores of 29 at 30 yards, two scores of 28 at 50 yards, and two scores of 27 at 75 yards entitle return in the Distinguished Revolver Marksman Class.

As a result of the foregoing circular letter a number of companies made special efforts to increase their qualification and the figure of merit has been materially raised by well-directed work in the closing weeks of the season.

There has been a pronounced improvement in making the annual returns to this office. The blanks, which were new last season and altogether different from any hitherto used, proved puzzling to some officers last year but as Special Course "C" becomes more thoroughly understood the errors in returns show a proportionate decrease.

#### INSIGNIA.

A design for the Expert Rifleman's medal having been adopted, all insignia may be promptly secured from the office of the Adjutant-General, but company and division commanders should bear in mind that requisition must be made for such insignia through regular channels. Insignia is issued for qualification in the following classes only:

RIFLE—Expert, Sharpshooter and Marksman.

REVOLVER—Distinguished Revolver Marksman, Expert Revolver Marksman and Revolver Marksman.

Qualification in any one class for three years (not necessarily consecutive) entitles the officer or man so qualifying to a requalification bar, for which requisition must be made.

Requisitions for insignia should be made immediately after the close of the practice season, so they may be promptly filled by the Adjutant-General on receipt of the annual report from this department.

#### RANGES.

Land has been purchased in the city of Hallowell, within a mile of the State campground, for use as a State rifle range. Under instructions from your office, I examined and approved the site prior to its purchase. At a later date, I visited the ground in company with a civil engineer and gave general directions for placing the pits, etc. The range will permit practice up to and including 600 yards, which will be sufficient for all team competitions for many years to come. If permission can be secured from owners of adjoining property, firing points at 800 and 1000 yards can easily be established, making the range available for long-range practice in individual matches, qualification practice and team training for interstate and national competitions.

The range in the city of Lewiston has been completed and is adequate for the needs of the several companies stationed there.

The range in the city of Portland has been out of commission the latter part of the season, and since skirmish firing has been added to the sharpshooter's course, under Special Course "C," it is a question whether a new site may not have to be provided within a few years. When the range was established the Springfield rifle was in use and skirmish fire was not included in the system of qualification. The change from a lead bullet to a mantled bullet increased the danger of ricochet shots, even in slow fire, and the addition of skirmish fire has further increased this danger. The Portland organizations have thus been handicapped by having no range facilities during the latter part of the season, and range practice suffered during the early part of the season when a military carnival occupied the almost undivided attention of all the organizations for a term of from four to six weeks.

The Brunswick range was improved this season by an extension which permits practice at 800 and 1000 yards. The entire range has been fenced and danger signs have been posted at frequent intervals. A telephone system has been installed and the range is now the best equipped in the State. Capt. William C. Goodwin, commanding the local company at Brunswick, has

been very courteous in allowing visiting riflemen the privileges of the range and a number of ambitious sharpshooters have availed themselves of the opportunity to qualify as experts.

Firing points at 800 and 1000 yards have been added to the range at Dover during the season.

Repairs were made during the season on the range at Rockland and men may now be qualified in the Marksman class.

During the latter part of the season work at 800 and 1000 yards on the range at Norway was restricted and an attempt will be made to secure new firing points for another season.

Extensive improvements were made early in the season on the range at Sanford and it is now equipped for all required practice.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

I have the honor to make the following recommendations:

- (1). That a general competition be held at the State range prior to the encampment of the troops, each company of Infantry, each regimental headquarters and each division of the Naval Reserve to be represented by a team of seven men and one substitute; that the distances be 200 and 500 yards, each competitor to fire two sighting and seven counting shots at each range; and that this competition be followed by an inter-regimental match of twelve-men teams, to be shot at 200, 500 and 600 yards.
- (2). That the State range be open for qualification practice during the encampment at such hours as will not interfere with drills or ceremonies, such hours to be fixed by the regimental commanders and strictly adhered to by the range officers.
- (3). That a team be sent to represent Maine in the Interstate Match at the meeting of the New England Military Rifle Association, and in the National Trophy Match to be shot at such time and place as the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice may select.
- (4). That proficiency in the Firing Regulations for Small Arms be a requisite for both warrant and commission.

Report on Encampment of the Maine National Guard at Camp Cobb, Augusta, Maine, from August 5th to 18th inclusive.

1. A return of troops attending the camp, and names of commanding officers.

Returns enclosed herewith marked "A" and "B" respectively. From August 5th to 11th, Colonel E. E. Newcomb, Second Maine Infantry, and from August 12th to 18th Colonel L. H. Kendall, First Maine Infantry. In addition, there were present at the camp during the encampment to supervise and assist:

Major General A. B. Farnham, Adjutant General.

Brigadier General C. E. Davis, Inspector General.

Colonel E. J. Mayo, Commissary General.

Colonel James B. O'Neill, Surgeon General.

The Commander-in-Chief, Governor William T. Cobb, was present on August 10th and 17th, and reviewed the troops on those dates.

### 2. Transportation.

By rail and trolley systems. Movement was under control of the General Staff. Organizations were sent direct from home stations; in the majority of cases they were picked up at their stations by the same train. In a few instances the trolley systems were used to connect with train or camp. Entraining and detraining were promptly done, the average time for the former being about four minutes, the latter about three minutes.

The time consumed by movement was:

Second Infantry: Going: About eight and a half hours; returning, about ten hours.

First Infantry: Going: About six hours; returning, about eight hours.

## 3. The Encampment.

The encampment was by regiment; the Second Infantry from August 5th to 11th, the First Infantry from August 12th to 18th. Was located on ground owned by the State, at Augusta, Maine. The main line of the Maine Central Railroad is about one mile distant, and an inter-urban trolley system passes the grounds. The area is about 65 acres. Permanent buildings erected on the ground are: two large storehouses, two stables, a hospital, quarters for the commander-in-chief and his staff, a commissary building, mess hall for officers, a guard-house for the confinement of prisoners, mess halls, kitchens, and latrines sufficient for a regiment. All of these buildings are frame, inexpensive, and admirably adapted to their various uses.

The camp is too small for maneuvers or drills other than close order. It could easily be made suitable by the purchase of additional ground. If for camp only, a brigade could easily be accommodated, but for instruction purposes a regiment is the largest body that should be encamped on the grounds, and for proper instruction in extended order and field work, the grounds are not suitable for a body larger than a battalion. If additional ground could be purchased, or authority obtained to use the adjoining lands, it would be an ideal camp and maneuver ground. The surface is rolling, the soil sandy and gravelly, with excellent natural drainage.

The camp was made and broken by hired labor. Each regiment should be required to make and break its own camp, in

order that officers and men should have some experience in this class of work.

No regular troops participated.

## 4. Sewerage System.

There was no sewerage system. Water was hauled by contract from a spring. The quality appeared to be excellent; the quantity, except for drinking and cooking purposes, insufficient. The arrangements for washing were poor, and there were none for bathing. Men came from drill hot, tired and dirty, unable to properly clean or refresh themselves. This defect could be easily remedied by piping water from the city system. It is the one thing needed to make the camp absolutely sanitary, and in the long run would be economical.

Garbage was placed in galvanized iron cans, and hauled away each day by contractor. There was no sewer system. Sinks were permanent wooden buildings with troughs; the troughs were cleaned daily by contract. These sinks were about fifty feet in rear of the company kitchens. Sinks and garbage receptacles were disinfected with slaked lime. Boiled water was not used for drinking. Except for insufficient water supply as above mentioned, all sanitary arrangements were excellent. The camp was thoroughly policed and clean, and its condition reflected credit on the commands.

## 5. Clothing and Equipment.

Each man had the following articles of clothing, which were issued to him by the State: dress uniform and cap, olive drab uniform, campaign hat and leggings, blue overcoat, blanket. The following equipment was carried: Shelter half, poles and pins, haversack, canteen, and mess outfit complete. In addition, the men had underclothing and usually a flannel shirt, which they provided themselves. All had a serviceable pair of shoes, black or tan. The appearance of the command would have been much improved did the State issue a uniform flannel shirt. Some men wore the blue, some the olive drab, others a white or colored negligee, and during the drills, when, on account of the heat, the blouse was not worn, the effect was bad and unmilitary. In point of dress and equipment other than this, the Guard is in excellent condition. I have seen none better.

### 6. How Subsisted.

The troops subsisted by company messes. The ration used was practically the army ration, augmented by milk, butter, eggs, and greater variety of fresh vegetables. The cost per capita was about forty cents. The supplies were furnished at the camp by contract, and issued daily to the companies by the commissary general. Prepared by enlisted cooks.

# 7. Drills and Ceremonies—Second Infantry.

Except on the day of arrival and Sunday, whilst in camp, there were two drills per day of two hours each. These drills consisted of the battalion in close order, company and battalion in extended order, advance guard and outpost duty, by battalion.

The drills by battalion in close order were fairly well executed, the officers showing lack of practice rather than knowledge, the result of having the companies of this regiment at different stations.

In the company and battalion extended order the drills were at first poor, and the principles evidently not understood by the majority of officers and men; hard and constant work at these drills made a great improvement, and at the end of the encampment the battalions made a fair showing. In outpost and advance guard work at the beginning of the encampment, the regiment was not instructed; at the close, the battalions could take the advance guard formation, and the regiment had been instructed in outpost duty and established one outpost. On August 8th the regiment made a practice march, using one battalion as advance guard to a brigade, to Togus, seven miles distant, and encamping there at the National Soldiers' Home during the night, and returned in the same formation by another route the next day. This march was combined with a field exercise, one company, "H," having been sent on in advance with instructions to select a position and attack the advancing column in such a manner as would best compel it to deploy for attack, and if possible to capture some of the flankers or patrols. The march was at first slow; distances were badly kept and patrolling not properly done. Nothing could have better shown the practical value of this class of work to officers and men than the mistakes which were made and the difficulty in keeping the formations during the early part of the movement. Close attention to the instruction given and an earnest desire on the part

of all to profit thereby made improvement rapid, and the regiment returned to its camp with a correct appreciation of the work and its value. During the march to Togus the company sent out in advance captured the left flankers of the advance party and support without being discovered, and attacked from an advantageous position the head of the main body. There is no doubt but in doing this it would have been cut off and destroyed in actual combat, for it allowed too large a body to pass before attacking, but it taught by its capture the necessity for careful patrolling and scouting.

At Togus the regiment pitched camp with shelter tents in column of companies. Coffee was made by the companies, but cooked rations for the command was brought on wagons for supper and breakfast. The movement commenced at 7:30 A. M. and ended about 1:30 P. M., the 7th of August, and at 7:00 A. M. the 8th, ending about 12 M. The men wore the olive drab uniform with flannel shirts, those who had no shirts wearing blouses, and carried a shelter half, haversack, canteen, mess kit, and a cold lunch. There was no falling out, looting, or disorderly conduct, the behavior of the command being excellent.

There was a daily parade and guard mount, and on August 11th the regiment escorted the Governor to the camp and was reviewed there by him.

The parades were at first badly executed, but as time went on, and errors were pointed out, they improved, and at the end of the encampment they were fairly well done. The same may be said of guard mount, although in this ceremony the improvement was not so marked, owing to a lack of understanding on part of non-commissioned officers of their duties. Escort duty and review of the regiment were well performed.

Throughout the entire encampment, formations by this regiment, for all duties, were slow, and it should be the endeavor of the officers in future encampments to correct this unnecessary and serious fault. The work done by this regiment was practical, just what is needed by the National Guard.

First Infantry.

Except on the day of arrival and Sunday, there were two drills per day, of two hours each. These drills consisted of the battalion in close order, company, battalion, and regiment in extended order, and battalion as outpost.

The drills by battalion in close order were good. The principles of attack in extended order were not understood, but a great deal of time was devoted to this class of work, and before the encampment was over the regiment was able to go through the attack formation for infantry combat. There were no advance guard drills. Under instruction, outposts were properly established. One entire day was lost, owing to the rain, and on this day it was the intention to have had advance guard drill. There were no field exercises.

The ceremonies consisted of a daily parade and guard mount. On August 17th the regiment escorted the Governor to the camp where he reviewed the troops.

The parades were good. Guard mount was fair; the non-commissioned officers were not sufficiently well instructed in their duties. Escort duty was well performed and the review was very good.

Like the Second Infantry, this regiment devoted its time to the most practical class of work, i. e., extended order and outposts. In both regiments it was evident that enough attention to the details of close order, and the squad in extended order, had not been given in armories during the winter. Realizing the fact that the Guard is seriously hampered by lack of drill grounds, it is nevertheless true that there is no reason why a company should not come to camp well drilled in close order, knowing how to deploy in line of squads and skirmishes, how to form a point and flankers, and establish a Cossack post. Were this done, much of the time now used in instruction in details might be used for more advanced work, and the Guard placed on a higher plane.

# 8. Personnel and Discipline.

With the exception of one company "E" of the First Infantry, the conduct of the men was excellent; they were sober, attentive to duty, and well behaved. I regret to state that the conduct of "E" Company, First Infantry, on two or three occasions, reflected discredit on an otherwise excellent body of men. The observance of military courtesy was good. In this connection it may be stated that whilst permissible to remove the blouse for drill, the custom of allowing men to go to town with-

out blouses, as was done, particularly in the First Infantry, and of allowing them to wear suspenders when without blouses, is not soldierly, and detracted from their otherwise generally neat appearance.

The men appeared to be a little younger and lighter than those of the Regular Army, but were a sturdy, healthy-looking lot of men, apparently well able to take the field.

## 9. Guard Duty.

Guard duty was well performed, and officers and non-commissioned officers appeared to understand their duties. Instruction of sentinels seemed to depend upon the instruction given in companies. In several instances the men of certain companies were invariably well instructed, in others it was a rare thing to find a man who understood his duties, except as to salutes, which were invariably well rendered. I should say that about one-half were instructed, and about one-half uninstructed, many of the men having joined the Guard within the two months preceding the encampment. An officer, preferably a field officer, should be detailed at each camp as instructor in guard duty. He should have an assistant, and all the time of these officers should be devoted to the instruction of sentinels.

Neither organization was instructed in outpost duty, although in each regiment there were a few officers who were familiar with the duties and principles.

## 10. Target Practice.

No target practice held at camp, nor do I think there should be, for the time as it is is too limited for the work required. The system in the State conforms to that of the United States. It was stated to me that all the companies had been exercised in position and aiming drills and that the majority had had target practice at their armories at the 200 and 300 yard ranges, a few in addition at the 500 and 600 yards. The State has just purchased a tract of ground about half a mile from the camp ground for a target range, which is 800 yards in length and 100 in width, with a high hill at one end, which affords an excellent back stop. On this a range of 600 yards can be had, and I am informed that arrangements will be made with adjacent land owners so that a range up to 1,000 yards can be used. With this addition the tract is well adapted for its purpose. As before

stated, this practice should be in addition to, not coincident with, the regular camping season.

# 11. Record Keeping.

The only record books in camp were morning reports, which appeared to be fairly well kept. It was stated to me that the companies had at their home stations a complete set of company books. What knowledge officers and men had as to the methods of keeping them I had no means of determining.

12. What instruction, practical and theoretical, was given by the instructor during the encampment?

Second Infantry.

Practical Instruction.—In turn drilled the battalions in extended order, advance guard and outpost. Instructed constantly during practice march. Mounted one guard. At request of commanding officer, pointed out errors after each formation, and generally answered any questions put to me by officers or men.

Theoretical Instruction.—Lectured to officers on Infantry Attack, Advance Guard, and Outpost. Illustrated to them on field lines to be used in intrenching. Lectured to the non-commissioned officers on duties of non-commissioned officers.

First Infantry.

Practical Instruction.—Illustrated by means of a company to the regiment the new drill regulations in close order.

Drilled in extended order each battalion and the regiment. Established an outpost for the regiment. At request of the commanding officer, pointed out errors and generally imparted any information requested.

Theoretical Instruction.—Lectured on Infantry Attack, Formation, and Outposts to officers. Lectured to first sergeants on their duties. Lectured to non-commissioned officers on their duties.

- 13. Any further remarks that may be deemed advisable on any subject not above enumerated.
- a. A very beautiful and impressive ceremony was observed by each regiment. On breaking camp it was marched to the capitol and into the rotunda, where the battle-flags of the Maine regiments which participated in the Civil and Spanish-American Wars were kept. The chaplain read a poem entitled "The

Returned Maine Battle Flags," after which the band played "The Star Spangled Banner." There were present the Governor and his Staff, and many prominent people, who witnessed, as the order stated, the "fitting homage rendered by the young soldiers of today to the old and worn, but sacred flags carried by their fathers in the war for the preservation of the Union." The ceremony was concluded by "taps" and the commands were marched to the train.

- b. The Guard is excellently armed, equipped and clad, ready for immediate field duty.
- c. The success of the encampment is due in great measure to the efforts and active support of the commanding officers by the adjutant general of the State, and other general staff officers present during the encampment.
- d. I received the most courteous treatment from officers and men of the Guard. Close and intelligent attention was paid to my instruction, and officers and men were anxious to learn, as was shown by the innumerable questions, as well as the rapid progress made.

For many courtesies received, my thanks are due to His Excellency the Governor, the adjutant general of the State, and other members of the staff, and the officers of the First and Second Regiments of Infantry.

### REPORT OF ALEX SHARP.

U. S. S. Chattanooga, 3rd rate, At Sea, Lat. 30° 46′ N., Long. 73° 28′ W., November 20, 1905.

SIR:—I have to make the following report regarding the annual cruise of the Naval Militia of the State of Maine, during the month of August, 1905:

In obedience to orders from the Squadron Commander, this ship proceeded to Portland, Maine, arriving there August 8th and at 10:00 A. M., August 9th, embarked the Naval Militia of the State of Maine, consisting of three officers and forty-nine men, for their annual practice cruise.

Immediately after they were received on board the ship got under way and proceeded to Provincetown, Massachusetts, arriving there August 10th. On August 11th the ship got under way from Provincetown and proceeded to Marblehead, Massachusetts, arriving there the same day. On August 12th got underway and proceeded to Gloucester, Massachusetts, where the ship remained until the 14th of August and then to sea and held target practice for the gun pointers of the organization. After the target practice was completed the ship proceeded to Rockport, Massachusetts, and remained there until the morning of August 16th and then got under way for Portland, arriving at Portland at about 1:00 P. M., and the Militia was immediately disembarked.

During the above cruise the men of the Militia were freely exercised at the wheel, conn, heaving the lead, sounding machine, morris tube, dotter, loading machine, loading 6-pounder guns, loading 5-inch, boats under oars and sail, signalling, searchlight exercise, general quarters, infantry drill,

ordnance instructions, and instructions in such duties as would be required of them aboard a man-of-war.

Each gun pointer in the organization was permitted to fire six shots from the 6-pounder guns and some of them did fair shooting.

This organization has no vessel and it is doubtful if they desire one, as the majority of the men did not seem to be very enthusiastic.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the

annual cruise of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M. In compliance with Special Orders No. 54, A. G. O., dated July 27, 1905, the Ship's Company Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., boarded the U. S. S. Chattanooga, Commander Alex Sharp, at noon August 9, 1905, and said ship proceeded at once to sea. The men were stationed in various parts of the ship and assigned to regular divisions, although for convenience they were organized into three messes of their own. The officers were also assigned regular stations and duties and during the entire cruise performed the routine duties of line officers the same as the regularly attached officers of the ship. The men were all given

ized into three messes of their own. The officers were also assigned regular stations and duties and during the entire cruise performed the routine duties of line officers the same as the regularly attached officers of the ship. The men were all given instruction in seamanship during the two following days that the ship remained at sea as well as instruction in signalling and in sub-calibre practice. The ship put in at Provincetown, Gloucester, Marblehead and Rockport at various times during the week's tour of duty but spent the greater part of the time at sea. On Friday the Maine men were given an opportunity to show what they could do with target firing, using the main battery of the ship. Several hits were recorded and the officers of the Chattanooga pronounced the record made as exceedingly creditable, the amount of time devoted by the Ship's Company to small arms practice during the year both in the armory, in gallery practice and on the out-of-door range showing good results in firing the heavy guns.

Instruction was also given in boat work which proved to be very unsatisfactory from the standpoint of the officers of the ship's company as the command had not given the attention to this work that it should and the command for the first time since its organization displayed a woeful lack of experience.

On the whole the cruise was beneficial, the men being taught many things that they could not be instructed in on shore and the officers of the Chattanooga displayed much interest and worked hard to make the tour of duty satisfactory in all particulars.

Captain Sharp gave some of the work his personal attention and seemed to be much interested in the progress made as well as in the personnel of the command.

Too much liberty was granted the men on this cruise, it being the policy of the commanding officer of the Chattanooga to allow his men to go ashore every time port was reached. Under the circumstances it was impossible for the commanding officer of the Maine ship's company to refuse his men permission to take advantage of the liberty afforded and a consequent interruption of the work on board ship followed. While this frequent liberty contributed greatly to the enjoyment of the men it did not assist in the instruction of them in those things required to make the tour of duty as a whole a success.

The commanding officer was further handicapped on this cruise by not having all of his officers with him and the work that was thrown upon him and Lieutenant Stevens in consequence was so great that proper attention could not be given to details. However the petty officers of the command had an excellent chance to display their knowledge and ability and it is with pleasure that the commanding officer is able to record their excellent behavior under all conditions and their zealous and enthusiastic work.

IV. The persons elected or appointed to offices as above are hereby notified to present themselves to the board of examination at the time and place specified for the meeting of the board. Officers elected or appointed who are members of the National Guard will appear in dress uniform without side arms. Transportation and subsistence will be provided but no per diem will be allowed.

#### STATE OF MAINE.

General Orders, No. 5.

I. The following regulations will govern the small arms practice of the National Guard of this State on indoor ranges for the gallery season ending April 30, 1905.

#### OBJECT OF INDOOR WORK.

The object of gallery practice is the development of the rifleman by giving him an acquaintance with the handling of the rifle and use of its sights so that when he goes onto the field range he will understand the fundamentals of good shooting.

The importance of sighting, position and aiming drills cannot be overestimated, and it is essential that before the soldier be allowed to fire he must attain suitable proficiency in aiming, holding and position. This must be taught in the armory and not on the range, as range practice with service ammunition is both dangerous and expensive save by properly instructed men.

In the indoor course new men will be first thoroughly instructed in sighting, position and aiming drill as provided in the Small Arms Firing Regulations. He will then be given permission to practice on the indoor range when armory conditions permit such practice.

#### INDOOR FIRING.

Shots will be fired in scores of five, the number of scores which any man may fire being determined by the officer in charge.

The allowance of ammunition will be 40 rounds per man, but additional ammunition may be purchased and used in qualification.

The course will include at least one score of five shots in each of the three positions—standing, kneeling and prone.

The best score in each position will count for record.

Company commanders will see that each officer and man fires at least one score in each position, and care will be taken to see that the positions are properly taken.

In rating the several organizations at the end of the gallery season, April 30th, two classes will be recognized—Gallery Marksman and Gallery Sharpshooter, but no insignia will be issued for such qualification. The class in which any officer or man belongs will be determined as follows:

Gallery Marksman—One score of 18 out of a possible 25 in each of the three positions.

Gallery Sharpshooter—One score of 22 out of a possible 25 in each of the three positions.

#### AMMUNITION.

Ammunition and targets will be issued by the Quartermaster-General, Augusta, upon requisition of the company commanders.

The ammunition issued is the reduced load for gallery practice. The bullet weighs 87 grains, has two grooves, is .313 inches in caliber, and is composed of one part tin to ten parts lead. The powder is Unique and the charge is 3 1-5 grains. The primer is 9½ U. M. C. Non-Mercuric. The bullet has a penetration of one inch in oak, two and one-half inches in spruce, and four inches in pine. The load requires an elevation of 350 to 375 yards, and one-half point left windage for accurate shooting at 25 yards.

Little difficulty will be experienced in fitting up a safe and convenient range in any armory. The size of the backstop will depend upon the length of the range and the number of targets to be used. A stop 10 feet in height at a distance of 50 feet is equivalent to a backstop of 60 feet at a distance of 100 yards. Six feet in width will safely accommodate one target, and 12 feet in width will give ample room for three targets.

The backstop may be built against the wall or may be on trucks so as to be pushed out of the way when not in use.

If four-inch spruce planking is used and the space directly back of the target be backed with half-inch steel plate, the range will be permanent in its character. As the wood is shot away it may be replaced or recovered from time to time. The half-inch plate will stand long service, but quarter-inch plate will give way in the course of time if the range is in frequent use.

Further details in regard to indoor range-building will be supplied upon request by Lieut. John J. Dooley, I. R. P., 1st Inf., Portland, and all company commanders are authorized to communicate with him direct in seeking such information.

The several company commanders are urged to take up at once the matter of indoor practice and they will find that the rivalry thus engendered will result in larger attendance at drills and more interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the Guard.

It will also give each company a large number of men, trained and ready to take up work on the field range when the season opens on May 1st.

IV. Particular attention must be given to attendance at these inspections. The following extract from a letter received from the War Department, calling attention to the large percentage absent from several organizations of the National Guard of Maine at the last inspection, is hereby published:

"One of the objects of this inspection is to ascertain what organizations are sufficiently armed, uniformed and equipped for active duty in the field, and it is obviously very difficult to arrive at a correct conclusion upon this matter when so large a part of the nominal strength of the organizations is absent. Another object of the inspection is to enable the Secretary of War to determine what assistance, under the Act approved January 21, 1903, the organized militia of the several states and territories is entitled to from the United States."

It is endeavored to so time these inspections as to secure the largest possible attendance, and it is expected that the commanding officers will make a special effort to have every man present. It is upon the attendance and efficiency of organizations as shown by this inspection that the strength of our National Guard is rated at the War Department, and upon the report of the inspecting officer is based the proportionate amount of assistance due our State from the United States, in accordance with the provisions of the Act approved January 21, 1903.

#### STATE OF MAINE.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, AUGUSTA, March 25, 1905.

General Orders, No. 7.

The following acts of the Legislature are hereby published for the information and government of all concerned:

AN ACT to amend chapter two hundred and sixty-six of the Public Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three, as amended by chapters one hundred and twenty-eight of the Public Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, one hundred and fifty-nine and one hundred and sixty-seven of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and one, and seventy-three and two hundred and twelve of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and three, relating to the Militia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section I. Section nine of said act is hereby amended by adding thereto the following words: 'And whenever the United States is invaded, or in danger of invasion from any foreign nation, or of rebellion against the authority of the Government of the United States, or the President is unable, with the other forces at his command, to execute the laws of the Union in any part thereof, the President may call out such number of the enrolled militia, or such portion of the National Guard, as he may deem necessary to repel such invasion, suppress such rebellion, or to enable him to execute such laws, for a period not exceeding nine months, in any part of the United States. He may specify in his call the period for which such service is required, not exceeding nine months, and the militia so called shall continue to serve during the term so specified, unless sooner discharged by order of the President,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 9. The enrolled militia shall be subject to active duty, only, in case of war, or to prevent or repel invasion, or to suppress insurrection or riot, or to aid civil officers in the execution of the law. And whenever the United States is invaded, or in danger of invasion from any foreign nation, or of rebellion against the authority of the Government of the United States, or the President is unable, with the other forces at his command, to execute the laws of the Union in any part thereof, the President may call out such number of the enrolled militia, or such portion of the National Guard, as he may deem necessary to repel such invasion, suppress such rebellion, or to enable, him to execute such laws, for a period not exceeding nine months, in any part of the United States. He may specify in his call the period for which such service is required, not exceeding nine months, and the militia so called shall continue to serve during the term as specified, unless sooner discharged by order of the President.'

Section 2. Section seventeen of said act is hereby amended by striking out all after the word "annually" in the seventeenth line thereof and

inserting the following: 'He shall make returns to the secretary of war at such times and in such form as he shall from time to time prescribe, of the strength of the organized militia and also make such report as may from time to time be required by the secretary of war.' So that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 17. The adjutant general shall distribute all orders from the commander-in-chief, attend all public reviews when the commander-inchief shall review the troops or any part thereof, obey all orders from him relative to carrying into execution and perfecting the system of military discipline established by the laws of the State and of the United States, prepare and furnish blank forms for the different returns and rolls that may be required and explain how such returns and rolls should be made, distribute all books required to be furnished at the public expense, receive from the several officers in the military force the reports they are required to make, and from such reports he shall make proper abstracts and lay the same, together with a full report of the business of his department, and a statement of the strength, condition and efficiency of the military forces of the State, before the commander-in-chief on or before the thirty-first day of December annually. He shall make returns to the secretary of war at such times and in such form as he shall from time to time prescribe, of the strength of the organized militia and also make such report as may from time to time be required by the secretary of war.'

Section 3. Section twenty-six of said act is hereby amended by striking out the words "an ambulance corps, and," and adding the words 'and a naval reserve,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 26. The active militia shall be known and designated as the National Guard of the State of Maine, and on a peace footing shall consist of not more than twenty-four companies of infantry, one battery of light artillery, two troops of cavalry, a signal corps and a naval reserve.'

Section 4. Section thirty-one of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "miles" in the fifth line thereof, the words 'provided, however, that any member of the National Guard, who is otherwise eligible, may be permitted to re-enlist within thirty days after the expiration of the term of his previous enlistment, provided he is less than sixty years of age,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 31. No enlistment shall be allowed in the National Guard of other than able bodied citizens of this State, between the ages of sixteen and forty years, residing in the town where the armory of the organization in which they enlist is situated, or within a radius of seven miles; provided, however, that any member of the National Guard, who is otherwise eligible, may be permitted to re-enlist within thirty days after the expiration of the term of his previous enlistment, provided he is less than sixty years of age. In time of peace, no minor shall be enlisted in the National Guard without the written consent of his parent or guardian, which shall appear on the enlistment paper.'

Section 5. Sections thirty-five to forty-five inclusive are hereby amended by striking out the entire sections and substituting others so that said sections, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 35. The organizations of the National Guard may be arranged by the commander-in-chief into squadrons, battalions, regiments and brigades, and he may change the arrangement thereof at his pleasure.

'Section 36. Each organization shall be assigned to its respective squadron, battalion or regiment and be numbered or lettered at its formation

'Section 37. The several organizations of the National Guard shall be constituted the same as is now or may be hereafter prescribed for the regular or volunteer armies of the United States, provided that in time of peace, or until changed by order of the commander-in-chief, the organizations of the National Guard shall be constituted as follows:

'Section 38. A company of infantry shall consist of one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quarter-master sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals, one cook, two musicians and not less than thirty-five privates.

'Section 39. A battalion of infantry shall consist of one major, one battalion adjutant (first lieutenant), one battalion sergeant major and four companies.

'Section 40. A regiment of infantry shall consist of one colonel, one lieutenant colonel, one adjutant, one quartermaster, and one commissary, each with the rank of captain, one surgeon (major), one assistant surgeon (captain), one assistant surgeon (first lieutenant), one chaplain, one sergeant major, one quartermaster sergeant, one commissary sergeant, two color sergeants, a band to consist of one chief musician, one principal musician, one drum major, four sergeants, eight corporals, one cook and ten privates; a hospital corps to consist of one sergeant (first class), three sergeants, six privates (first class), and three privates; and three battalions.

'Section 41. A troop of cavalry shall consist of one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quartermaster sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals, one cook, one farrier, one saddler, one wagoner, two trumpeters and not less than thirty-three privates.

'Section 42. A battery of field artillery shall consist of one captain, two first lieutenants, one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quartermaster sergeant, one stable sergeant, six sergeants, twelve corporals, one cook, one artificer, two musicians and not less than twenty-eight privates.

'Section 43. A signal company shall consist of one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, two first class sergeants, four sergeants, five corporals, not less than eleven first class privates and eight privates.

'Section 44. Each colonel of a regiment may enlist and muster a band of musicians, not to exceed twenty-six, to be constituted as provided in section forty of this act; provided, that the members of such band shall furnish their own uniforms and instruments. They may be recommended for discharge by the colonel at his pleasure.

'Section 45. A brigade shall consist of one brigadier general with a staff to be constituted the same as now or may be hereafter provided for the regular or volunteer army of the United States, and not less than two regiments of infantry. At camps of instruction, maneuvers or field exercises, or when called into active service for the State in case of riot, insurrection, tumult or invasion, actual or impending, the commander-inchief may attach to a brigade such troops of cavalry, batteries of artillery and organizations of special troops, as may appear to him advisable.'

Section 6. Section sixty of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "service" in the tenth line thereof the following:

'Provided, that an officer having successfully passed an examination before said board and being commissioned in the rank of major shall be exempt from further examination in case of election or appointment to a higher rank;' by striking out the word "enlarge" in the eighteenth line and substituting therefor the word 'extend;' by adding thereto the following: 'Whenever in the opinion of the commander-in-chief the necessity exists, any commissioned officer may be ordered before the board of examination who may inquire into his moral character, general knowledge of military affairs, and fitness for the service. Said board to report its findings to the commander-in-chief for such further action as he may deem advisable.' So that said section as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 60. The commander-in-chief shall appoint a military board of three officers to inquire into the qualifications of all persons elected or appointed to any office below the grade of brigadier general and claiming a commission under this act, except upon the staff of the commander-inchief, and no commission shall issue until the person so elected or appointed shall have passed a satisfactory examination before such board, as to his moral character, his general knowledge of military affairs proportionate to the office to be held, and his fitness for the service, provided, that an officer having successfully passed an examination before said board and being commissioned in the rank of major shall be exempt from further examination in case of election or appointment to a higher rank. If he fails to appear before the board when notified or is adjudged unqualified, a new election shall be ordered or appointment made; and no person who has failed to pass such examination shall be eligible to election or appointment to an office of equal or higher grade in the National Guard, for the period of one year thereafter. Such examination shall be made within thirty days after the election or appointment, unless the commander-in-chief shall for good cause extend the time. At least two members of said board shall be of a grade equal or superior to that of the office to be filled. In case said office shall be of the medical staff or naval reserve, then, for the former, there shall be added to and become a member of the board, the surgeon general, and for the latter, an officer of the naval reserve, other than the person to be so examined. In case of the absence of any member of the board, or of disability to sit by reason of rank, or if for other cause the board is not of the required number, the commander-in-chief may detail an officer for the time being. Whenever in the opinion of the commander-in-chief the necessity exists, any commissioned officer may be ordered before the board of examination who may inquire into his moral character, general knowledge of military affairs, and fitness for the service. Said board to report its findings to the commander-in-chief for such further action as he may deem advisable.'

Section 7. Section one hundred and twelve of said act is hereby amended by inserting between the words "witnesses" and "and" in the fourth line thereof, the words 'or to forfeiture of pay and allowance due for military service, or both,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 112. Courts martial may, when no other punishment is fixed by law, sentence an officer or enlisted man convicted by them, to pay a fine of not exceeding two hundred dollars and costs of witnesses, or to forfeiture of pay and allowances due for military services, or both; and all fines and costs imposed by them may be recovered by the adjutant general in an action of debt in the name of the State. They may in addition to the foregoing or any other punishment fixed by law, sentence an officer convicted by them to be cashiered, dishonorably discharged, discharged without honor, discharged, or reprimanded in orders, and if sentenced to be cashiered or dishonorably discharged the court shall adjudge him disqualified for life or for any term of years according to the aggravation of the offence, for holding any military office. And they may also in addition to the foregoing, or any other punishment fixed by law, sentence any enlisted man convicted by them to be dishonorably discharged, discharged without honor, or discharged, or may adjudge him disqualified for life or for any term of years according to the aggravation of the offence for re-enlistment or for holding any military office.'

Section 8. Section one hundred and fourteen of said act is hereby amended by striking out the word "and" in the sixth line, and inserting in place thereof the word 'or' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 114. The commander-in-chief may, from time to time, appoint military boards of inquiry to consist of one or more officers, not exceeding five, and a recording officer to reduce the proceedings and evidence in writing, whose duty it shall be to examine into any military transaction, or into the qualification, efficiency or propriety of conduct of any officer or soldier who may be ordered before them for such examination; or for the purpose of settling any military question, or for establishing good order and discipline; the members thereof and witnesses examined by them shall be sworn, the board shall report to the commander-in-chief, who may take such action by order or otherwise as he may deem advisable, but if the report is adverse to any officer or soldier, and is approved by the commander-in-chief, he may in his discretion dishonorably discharge, discharge without honor or vacate the commission of such officer, or dishonorably discharge, discharge without honor or discharge such soldier, but the commander-in-chief shall have power to remit or reduce after conviction, all forfeitures and penalties and to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, or order a re-hearing or new trial in any case tried or heard under the provisons of this act.'

Section 9. Section one hundred and fifteen of said act is hereby amended by inserting between the words "officers" and "reported" in the first line, the words 'and enlisted men,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 115. Officers and enlisted men reported under the preceding section shall be notified, permitted to cross examine witnesses, and introduce evidence.'

Section 10. Section one hundred and twenty-one of said act is hereby amended by adding thereto the following: "The system of discipline and exercises of the National Guard shall conform generally to that of the army of the United States as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by Congress, and to all provisions of the laws of the United States, except as otherwise provided, or may be hereafter provided, by the laws of this State,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Section 121. The commander-in-chief shall cause to be prepared regulations for the enrollment, government and instruction of the military forces of the State, and to carry into full force and effect the provisions of this act. Such regulations when approved by the commander-in-chief shall be published with the military law of the State together with extracts from the constitution relating thereto and distributed to the commissioned officers of the National Guard and be by them held as the property of the State to be accounted for.

The commander-in-chief is authorized to make changes in and additions to such regulations from time to time as the service may in his judgment require, but all such regulations, changes and additions shall be in conformity with the laws of this State and of the United States, and when so approved and promulgated shall have the same force and effect as the provisions of this law. Any rules, orders and regulations now in force shall remain in force until such new regulations are approved and promulgated.

The system of discipline and exercises of the National Guard shall conform generally to that of the army of the United States as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by Congress, and to all provisions of the laws of the United States, except as otherwise provided, or may be hereafter provided, by the laws of this State.'

General Orders, No. 10.

- I. The regulations for the National Guard of the State of Maine are hereby amended by striking out Section 107, which reads as follows: "A suitable prize will be awarded to the company or corps receiving the highest score at the annual inspection in armories. This prize will be presented at parade during the annual encampment and will be the property of the organization winning it. In addition a tabulation of the reports of the Inspector General on each organization will be published in the annual report of the Adjutant-General. The relative standing of companies and corps as shown by said tabulation will be published in orders at parade during the annual encampment, immediately previous to the presentation of the prize to the winning organization."
- II. In accordance with the provisions of the Militia Law and the Regulations for the National Guard, the Inspector-General will proceed forthwith to inspect the several organizations of the National Guard, giving at least ten days' notice of such inspection to the commanding officer of each organization, which notice will be promptly acknowledged to the Inspector-General.
- III. So far as practicable, the Inspector-General will so fix the dates of the inspections as to make them correspond with those of the regular drills of the several organizations. He will advise regimental commanders of the inspections in their respective regiments, by sending them notices in each case, which may be duplicates of those sent to the company commanders.
- IV. The Surgeon-General will accompany the Inspector-General when the Hospital Corps is inspected and will make a special report.
- V. All organizations will parade in dress uniform, without leggins, armed, and equipped. Each company commander will have collected in the armory, and conveniently arranged for inspection all military property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession, and all books and papers pertaining to his organization.
- VI. The attention of company commanders will be called to the care and preservation of all property entrusted to their care, and special instruction will be given to the proper method of making and forwarding the necessary returns.
- VII. Officers desiring condemnation of unserviceable property, will prepare Inventories (Form No. 4), and present the same with the property to the Inspector General for his action. Attention is called to Article XXXVI of the Regulations for the National Guard, the provisions of which govern all inspections.
- VIII. The Inspector-General will report the condition of each rifle by number, calling attention to all imperfections or lack of care. All unserviceable pieces will be reported. It will also be ascertained whether

the required supply of ammunition is constantly kept on hand and if each company is properly prepared for an emergency call for active service.

- IX. The Quartermaster-Sergeant of each command is hereby detailed to act as assistant to the Inspector-General in the inspection and verification of all military property and will perform such other duty as may be required.
- X. The Honorable Secretary of the Navy will be requested to detail a naval officer to inspect the naval force of Maine.
- XI. All officers accountable for military property will see that each article in their possession is plainly marked in such a manner that it can be easily identified in case of loss, and all articles, wherever found, will be counted to the credit of and returned to the company whose mark it bears.

General Orders, No. 11.

- I. The annual encampment of the land forces of the National Guard of the State of Maine will be held during the second and third weeks of August, 1905.
- II. In compliance with what appears to be a general desire on the part of the officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, the tour of duty of each organization will be seven days, with pay for five days. Arrangements will be made for concentration at the State Camp Ground, Augusta, as follows:
- III. The Second Infantry will proceed to the place of concentration on Saturday, August 5. It will break camp and its several companies will return to their home stations on Friday, August 11.
- IV. The First Infantry will proceed to the place of concentration on Saturday, August 12. It will break camp and its several companies will return to their home stations on Friday, August 18.
- V. No new enlistment will be made in any organization of the National Guard, except the Naval Reserve, between July 10 and August 20. Company and corps commanders will, upon completion of enlistment, but not later than July 10, forward to this office, through military channels, lists of recruits awaiting examination and muster. No more than one medical examination for each company and corps will be ordered between July 10 and August 20, but men who re-enlist subsequent to the medical examination may be examined and mustered in at the encampment.

VI. No man will be paid for duty at the encampment whose enlistment papers are not on file in the office of the Adjutant-General, and no non-commissioned officer will be paid as such unless notice of his appointment has been received at this office. The attention of regimental and corps commanders is called to the provisions of Section 67, Militia Law of Maine. The necessary warrants must be provided for all non-commissioned officers prior to the encampment in order that their names may appear on the pay-rolls as provided by law.

VII. Attention is called to Section 38, General Orders No. 7, A. G. O., c. s., which increases the number of enlisted men in each company from forty-six to fifty. Commanding officers will at once make requisition for all articles of ordnance and ordnance stores, clothing and equipment necessary to fill the allowance of their several organizations, including the service uniforms.

VIII. The attention of officers and enlisted men is called to Sec. 72, Militia Law of Maire, and a strict compliance with its provisions will be required. Section 72 reads as follows: "All property furnished by the State shall remain and continue to be the property of the State to be used for military purposes only, and when not so in use shall be kept in the armories or designated places of deposit."

IX. The troops having had sufficient opportunity, in their armories, for instruction in the school of the soldier, squad and company, manual of arms, target practice, etc., therefore, the time allotted to this encampment will not be taken up with these exercises, but all officers will devote their time and attention to battalion and regimental drills and such exercises, maneuvers, and ceremonies as may be necessary for troops in camp or in actual campaigning in time of war.

I. The camp of the National Guard of Maine during the annual encampment at Augusta, August 5 to 18, inclusive, will be designated "Camp Cobb."

II. Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, will be in command of the camp from August 5 to 11, inclusive, and Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry, will be in command from August 12 to 18, inclusive. Each camp commander will prepare and present to this office for approval, orders embracing the routine of each day during his tour of duty, the hours of calls, duties and ceremonies, and such rules and

regulations as he may deem necessary for maintaining order and discipline and promoting the efficiency of his command.

- III. The Colonels of the Second and First Regiments, with their Adjutants and Commissary Sergeants, will assume their duties in camp on the mornings of Saturday, August 5, and Saturday, August 12, respectively. The Quartermasters and Quartermaster Sergeants of each regiment will assume their duties on the mornings of Friday, August 4, and Friday, August 11, respectively.
- IV. Captain George M. Kavanaugh, Commissary, First Infantry, will report to the Commissary-General on Friday, August 4, for duty, reporting back to his regiment on Friday, August 11.
- V. Captain Atwood W. Spaulding, Commissary, Second Infantry, will report to the Commissary-General, on Friday, August 11, after his regiment has broken camp on that day. He will return to his home station on Friday, August 18.
- VI. Company cooks will be ordered to Augusta in advance of their companies so that those of the Second Infantry may arrive in camp on Friday, August 4, and those of the First Infantry on Friday, August 11.
- VII. The Inspector-General, Commissary-General and Surgeon-General will attend the encampment and discharge the duties devolving upon them under the militia law. The Inspector-General of Rifle Practice will attend August 5 to 11, inclusive, and the Assistant Inspector-General of Rifle Practice will attend August 12 to 18, inclusive.
- VIII. Transportation will be furnished officers and enlisted men from their home stations to Augusta, and return. No additional transportation will be furnished or allowed during the encampment.
- IX. Muster and pay-rolls in triplicate of the field and staff, non-commissioned staff and band, companies and corps, will be prepared before going to camp by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with date of rank of officers and date of musterin of the enlisted men. Any stoppage, under provisions of Section 73, Militia Law, to be deducted from the pay of any commissioned officer or enlisted man will be entered against his name in the column for remarks. The columns for the pay account will be left blank to be filled in by the Paymaster-General. Ununiformed enlisted men will not be brought to camp and no substitutes will be permitted or paid. Attention is called to the assignment of pay upon the pay-rolls. Each officer or enlisted man must indicate upon the pay-rolls to whom his pay is to be assigned, by writing in the proper columns upon the pay-roll the name of his assignee. But one assignee will be named for each organization.
- X. The commanding officer of Camp Cobb will cause the several organizations of his command to be mustered for pay during the encampment, August 7 to 11 and 14 to 18, inclusive, on the proper forms, which at the close of the encampment will be forwarded to the Adjutant-General. Mustering officers will report no officer or enlisted man present who does not answer to his name at the muster, and they will muster no substitute.

XI. The commanding officer of Camp Cobb will render to this office a consolidated morning report on the morning of each day of the encampment. He is authorized to grant leaves of absence and furloughs in cases of necessity, upon application approved by intermediate authority. In cases of sickness, the certificate of a regimental surgeon must accompany the application. Officers and men absenting themselves without such leave of absence or furlough will be reported by name.

XII. By virtue of the power conferred by Section 87 of the Militia Law, the authority of the officer in command of the camp is hereby extended to a distance of one-half mile around the State Camp Ground, and upon the external space within such distance from the camp, with the exception of any road or roads within said distance, no person or persons save those specially authorized by law shall be allowed to enter except under such rules as may be established by the officer commanding the camp and approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

XIII. Organizations of the National Guard will be inspected under the supervision of the Inspector-General during the annual encampment, August 5 to 18, inclusive, as follows:

The Second Regiment Infantry will be paraded for inspection on Friday, August 11, at such time as may be designated by the Camp Commander.

The First Regiment Infantry will be paraded for inspection on Friday, August 18, at such time as may be designated by the Camp Commander. All organizations will parade in service uniform and campaign hat. Heavy marching order, canteen and haversack, will be worn; blanket, poncho and shelter half will be worn in roll.

XIV. The Inspector-General will make a careful inspection each day at such time as he may designate to see that the provisions of Par. XII., this order, are strictly complied with. No person or persons not members of the National Guard will be allowed to remain in camp after taps unless given express authority in writing by the commanding officer of the camp.

The Inspector-General is authorized to make requisition on the commanding officer of the camp for such force as is necessary to enforce compliance with this order.

XV. The commanding officers of the Second and First Infantry upon breaking camp on August 11, and 18, respectively, will arrange to leave the camp ground in season to proceed to the State House with their commands.

On arrival at the State House the troops will be massed in the rotunda. Arms will be presented. The chaplain will read the poem entitled "The Returned Maine Battle Flags," the band will play "The Star Spangled Banner" and taps will be sounded, that thus fitting homage may be rendered by the young soldiers of today to the old and worn but sacred flags carried by their fathers in the war for the preservation of the Union.

XVI. The commanding officers of Camp Cobb will provide in orders for a review by the Commander-in-Chief on the afternoons of Thursday,

August 10 and 17 respectively. A suitable escort will be ordered to report to the State House at 1.15 o'clock P. M. to escort the Commander-in-Chief to the camp. A detail of one sergeant, mounted, will be ordered to report to the Adjutant-General at the State House at 1 o'clock P. M. to act as orderly to the Commander-in-Chief. The camp commander will also provide for firing the Governor's salute and hoisting the flag.

XVII. The following section of the Militia Law of the State is published for the information of all concerned:

"Section 108. No officer or enlisted man shall contract or presume to authorize the contracting of any indebtedness on behalf of the State, without the express authority therefor from the Commander-in-Chief, and any officer or enlisted man who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be dishonorably discharged from the service of the State."

It is upon the attendance and efficiency of organizations as shown by this inspection that the strength of our National Guard is rated at the War Department, and upon the report of the inspecting officer is based the proportionate amount of assistance due our State from the United States, in accordance with the provisions of the Act approved January 21, 1903.

- II. All organizations will parade in olive drab service uniforms, armed and equipped in heavy marching order. Canteen and haversack will be worn, mess kit in haversack, tin cup attached to rear strap of canteen. Woolen blanket, poncho and shelter half will be rolled in accordance with paragraph 486, Infantry Drill Regulations. Dress uniforms, service uniforms (khaki), overcoats, ammunition and all other military property and all books and papers pertaining to the organization must be in the armory and conveniently arranged for inspection.
- III. Company commanders will at once recruit their commands to the minimum strength required by law, i. e., 50 enlisted men. They will also make requisition for all needed articles of uniform and equipment to thoroughly equip their commands for service in the field. All articles found unfit for service should be at once replaced by new and laid aside for action of the Inspector General. Inventory and Inspection Reports (form No. 4) will be furnished and should be prepared in advance, by entering thereon a list of the articles considered unserviceable and presented, with the property, to the Inspector General, for his action. See paragraphs 444 to 450, Regulations for the National Guard.
- IV. The Inspector General will report the condition of each rifle by number, calling attention to all imperfections or lack of care. All unserviceable pieces will be so reported with recommendations.
- V. Company commanders will detail an enlisted man, preferably the company quartermaster sergeant, who will report to the Inspector General at such time and place as he may designate, to assist in the inspection and verification of military property and perform such other duties as may be required of him.
- VI. All officers accountable for military property will see that each article is plainly marked in such manner that it can be easily identified in case of loss and all articles wherever found will be counted to the credit of and returned to the company whose mark it bears.

Before a Court of Inquiry convened at Portland, Maine, December 14, 1905, under Special Orders No. 83, issued by order of the Commander-in-Chief from the office of the Adjutant General, November 24, 1905, consisting of Brigadier General Charles E. Davis, Inspector General, Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry, Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, Lieutenant Colonel Charles Collins, First Infantry, Lieutenant Colonel Frank M. Hume, Second Infantry and Colonel Wil-

liam B. Skelton, Judge Advocate General as recording officer, to inquire into and investigate as to the efficiency, conduct and military standing of Company E, First Infantry, National Guard of the State of Maine.

### FINDINGS OF THE COURT.

That the commissioned officers of Company E, First Infantry, during the past year, have consisted of Captain McDonald, First Lieutenant Kaler and Second Lieutenant Maloney; that Captain McDonald has been away from his Company during much the greater part of the time during said year; that First Lieutenant Kaler resigned about April, 1905, that Second Lieutenant Maloney was absent during the spring of 1905, until about May 1, 1905; that he then took active personal command of the Company; that he found the attendance at drills very small and the Company in a seriously disorganized condition; that under his personal direction the attendance at drills increased very materially, and the condition of the Company made considerable improvement; that Captain McDonald took personal command of the Company at the State Encampment in August, 1905; that many of the non-commissioned officers and privates then insisted that Captain McDonald should either promise to give his personal attention to the affairs of the Company in the future, or resign as captain; that he then agreed to resign at the close of the encampment; that he has since submitted his resignation, which is now pending; that Second Lieutenant Maloney left the State about the middle of September, 1905, without leave and remained away until about the first of November; that on October 9, 1905, Major Frank B. W. Welch was placed in charge of the Company and its property, pending further action; that with the exception of the attention of Major Welch, the Company had no commissioned officer personally in charge during said Maloney's absence, except for very infrequent visits from Captain McDonald; that Captain McDonald has given the Company no attention since October 9, 1905, except to assist in gathering in the property; that on Second Lieutenant Maloney's return about November 1, 1905, he again took personal charge of the Company drills.

The Court finds in connection with the conduct of this Company at the State Encampment in August, 1905, that Privates Joyce and Harris were intoxicated while en route to Augusta, and on their arrival there; that Corporal Wm. P. McGrath was intoxicated at Augusta on the day of the arrival there; that Sergeant O'Brion was intoxicated while doing guard duty at Augusta on Governor's Day, August 17, 1905, and relieved from duty for that reason; that while in camp many members of the Company expressed an intention to refuse to turn out under Captain McDonald; that they were dissuaded from carrying out this intention on the promise of Captain McDonald to resign as above stated, and through the influence of Second Lieutenant Maloney, First Sergeant Flaherty and efforts made by one or more officers outside the Company.

The Court finds that Second Lieutenant Maloney has been indiscreet in his conduct connected with the command of the Company; that he has on some occasions permitted himself to be influenced in his conduct by feelings of anger and disappointment; that he has been absent from the State for a long period of time without leave, as stated above, and that he has not always shown the respect due his superior officers. The Court finds on the other hand that Second Lieutenant Maloney has done much excellent work for the Company under discouraging circumstances and while greatly handicapped by the absence of his superior officer without leave, and by the general disorganized condition of the Company, for which he was not materially responsible.

The Court finds in conclusion that the Company was, in the spring of 1905, very seriously disorganized; that that condition has since been materially improved, but still exists to a degree detrimental to the good of the service; that this condition is due mainly to the lack of personal presence of an efficient executive officer at its head; that the Company generally, is capable of good work under such a head.

### RECOMMENDATIONS.

Wherefore, the Court respectfully recommends that the resignation of Captain McDonald be accepted at the earliest moment consistent with a proper adjustment of his accounts; that an election of commissioned officers be ordered forthwith; that Corporal McGrath and Sergeant O'Brion be reduced to the ranks and discharged without honor from the military service of the State; that Privates Joyce and Harris be discharged without honor from the military service of the State.

II. The Judge Advocate General having declared the proceedings in case of Company E. First Infantry, to be regular and in accordance with the Statutes of Maine, and the same having been submitted to the Commander-in-Chief his orders are as follows:

Circular No. 1.

The attention of commanding officers is called to the following, which must be strictly adhered to:

### "WAR DEPARTMENT.

Office of Chief of Ordnance, Washington, March 28, 1905.

I. Referring to Paragraph 3, Section 1661, Revised Statutes, as amended, with reference to the issue of arms and equipments to the Militia which directs the Secretary of War to make such regulations as he may deem necessary to protect the interests of the United States, attention is invited to the provisions of Paragraphs 283, 284 and 285, Army Regulations of 1904, which pertain to the care of arms and equipments and which should be enforced by the Governors of the different states

and territories and by the Commanding General of the Militia of the District of Columbia as being necessary for preserving the material in condition for use upon necessity, which is the object of their supply by the general government.

- 2. It will be noted that these paragraphs prohibit:
- (a) The taking apart of arms by enlisted men except by permission of a commissioned officer, and then only under proper supervision and in the manner prescribed in the descriptive pamphlet of the arm, issued by the Ordnance Department.
- (b) The polishing of blued or browned parts, the reblueing or rebrowning of such parts, or the putting of any portion of an arm in fire.
  - (c) The removing of a barrel from a receiver.
- (d) The mutilation of any part by filing or otherwise, and beautifying or changing the finish.
- (e) The use of any dressing or polishing material on leather accourrements, equipments, harness, etc., except the preparations supplied or approved by the Ordnance Department.
- (f) All changes in equipments except the adjustments provided for in their construction for fitting them to soldiers.
- 3. It should be noted that Paragraph 283, A. R., 1904, makes obligatory a strict compliance with the rules for dismounting and assembling the arm by soldiers, for cleaning and care of the arm, and for repairing arms in the hands of troops, contained in the descriptive pamphlet issued by the Ordnance Department.
- 4. As the arms and equipments in the possession of the Militia form a large part of the entire supply of the United States and as only a strict observance of the provisions of the above mentioned paragraphs can ensure such material being in a serviceable condition in case of emergency, the necessity for their enforcement is apparent.
- 5. Should defects be discovered in arms, accourtements or equipments, a report describing in detail the nature and extent thereof should be submitted to the Chief of Ordnance, U. S. Army, and only those remedial measures taken that shall be authorized or prescribed by that officer. Broken parts or arms, etc., should not be turned into this Department for any purpose by officers of the Militia direct, but, under proper authority, by the Governor or Adjutant General of the state or territory to which the arms, etc., are issued. When broken bolts or other parts of U. S. arms are turned into this Department, because of unusual breakage, as full information of the circumstances of the breakage as possible should be forwarded. Care should be taken in such cases to preserve the broken surfaces from rust.
- 6. Attention is invited to the laws which provide for the issue of material for arming and equipping the Militia in the several states, territories and District of Columbia. No part of the arms and equipments so issued should be turned over by the authorities of any state, or territory, or the District of Columbia to private individuals, educational insti-

tutions, independent military organizations, societies, corporations, or other organizations not a part of the organized Militia,

# ALTERATIONS, MEASUREMENTS, ETC.

11. No alteration will be made in any article of the uniform that will result in a change from the cut prescribed for it in these regulations. Company commanders will exercise personal supervision over the fitting of the uniforms of the men of their companies, in order to insure the selection of the proper garment from the stock sizes, which will preclude the necessity for alterations in any but rare cases. The new-pattern uniforms are made in sizes corresponding to the measurements given in the above tables, the measurements being taken in the manner customary among tailors.

General Orders, No. 5.

- I. Commencing not earlier than June 1, 1905, the Governor of each State or Territory within the borders of the United States is invited to appoint as a cadet to the Dixon Military Institute whenever vacancies exist from their respective States or Territories, any able-bodied young man of good character, between the ages of sixteen and twenty-three years, who is a member or an honorably discharged member of the National Guard of the State from which he is appointed, or who has served honorably and faithfully one year in any reputable military school.
- II. The appointee shall be entitled to tuition for any complete course offered by the Institute. The appointee shall meet all other expenses, including the uniform outfit.
- 111. The appointment of cadets may be made by competitive examination or by other procedure, according as directed by the appointing authority.
- IV. The Governors of the States and Territories of the United States shall be furnished with a copy of this order and with descriptive matter pertaining thereto.
- V. The annual expenses of the cadet will be about \$160 exclusive of uniforms, stationery, etc.
- VI. The uniform is ample to clothe the cadet for a period of three or four years. No civilian clothes are to be worn.
- VII. Applicants should apply to Captain Grant Allyn Capron, General Recruiting Service, D. M. I., for application blanks and any further information.

PORTLAND, April 25, 1905.

Circular, No. 1.

The following rules and regulations, governing team competitions and individual matches, having been adopted by the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice, the same are issued for the information and guidance of the National Guard of the State of Maine, so far as the same are practicable:

- I. Officers of the Competitions.—The executive officer will have control of the range for the conduct of the matches, and his decision shall be final.
- 2. The post adjutant, post quartermaster, and range officers will report to the executive officer, at his headquarters, each morning of the meeting at 8 o'clock, when the range officers will be assigned to their several stations and given their badge of office. A range officer desiring to be relieved from his post of duty will report to the executive officer, so that a substitute may be detailed. The post adjutant and post quartermaster, or their deputies, will be on duty continuously at headquarters.
- 3. The range officers will supervise the marking and scoring; they will see that the competitors do not evade any of the regulations; they will test the trigger pull of and examine at any time the rifles used by competitors and inspect the ammunition before the beginning of all matches, and will certify on the score cards to the scores made, after verifying same with the blackboard.
- 4. In individual matches the range officer will certify to the date, hour, and style of arm on the entry tickets of competitors about to begin their score, and when the score is finished he will certify to the same on both

original ticket and coupon; the latter he will tear off and deposit in scorer's box, returning the original to the competitor.

- 5. In team matches the range officer will, at the completion of the score at each range, verify the scores on the score card with the blackboard, and see that they agree; when the match is finished he will add up the totals, certify to the correctness of same and return the card or cards to the statistical office.
- 6. The statistical officers will assign the competitors to targets and to order of firing, their determinations being generally made by lot. They will verify the additions of the scores as reported by the score-keepers, grade them in order of excellence, and prepare the results for official announcement.
- 7. During the shooting of all team competitions, a range officer shall be detailed to the pit at each distance who shall remain in the pit until the firing at that distance is finished. One representative from each team shall be selected by the team captain at each distance (before the drawing of the targets at that distance) who shall receive from the executive officer a card directing him to remain in the target pit during the firing at the distance about to be begun. The representatives from the various teams in the target pit will call to the attention of the range officer in the pit any irregularity of marking or other matter deemed by them necessary, and the decision of the range officer on the spot as to the matter complained of will be final and binding.
- 8. During the progress of a match or competition, no one except the officers on duty at the range, the competitors and scorekeepers, will be permitted within the ropes without special permission of the officer in charge.
- 9. The squads of competitors will be stationed five yards in rear of firing point, where each competitor must remain until called by the scorekeeper or range officer to take his position at the firing point and until he has completed his score.
- 10. All expression on the part of the competitor of approbation or disappointment, with reference to any scores made by himself or others, must not be uttered loud enough to be heard at the firing point.
- 11. Protests.—Protests and objections must not be directly submitted to the officer in charge, but to one of the range officers. In case a competitor considers the decision of the latter unwarranted by the facts as presented, he may appeal to the executive officer. Final appeals from decisions of the executive officer must be made in writing and forwarded through that officer to the executive committee of the National Rifle Association or the association under whose auspices the meeting is being held. In national contests an appeal may be taken from the executive committee of the National Rifle Association to the national board authorized by act of Congress, etc., whose decision shall be final.
- 12. Scoring and Marking.—Hits in the different divisions of the targets and ricochets will be signaled and recorded as prescribed in the Small Arms Firing Regulations. Ricochets count as hits.

- 13. The exact location of all bullet holes will be marked by a spotter, which will be shown on the target.
- 14. All shots fired by the competitor after he has taken his place at the firing point, and it is his turn to fire—the target being ready—will be considered in his score, even if his piece is not directed toward the target, or is accidentally discharged.
- 15. Shots fired at the wrong target will be entered upon the score of the man firing as a miss.
- 16. In slow fire, if two shots strike a target at the same, or nearly the same time, both will be signaled, and if a shot was just fired from the firing point assigned to that target, the hit having the higher of the two values signaled will be entered in the competitor's score, and no record made of the other hit.
- 17. The scorekeepers will be seated close to and in the rear of the firing-point stakes, and will, as each shot is signaled, announce in an audible tone the name of the competitor, the value of the shot, and number on score card, marking same on the blackboard and competitor's card. At the conclusion of the score of each competitor the scorekeeper will repeat his name and total score, and request the range officer on duty at that target to verify the blackboard and score card (no scores will be allowed unless recorded on a blackboard by the scorer as shot).
- 18. Competitors must pay attention to the score as announced and recorded, so that any error may be promptly investigated. The recorded value of any shot will not be changed after the following shot has been fired, unless some special message with reference to it is received from one of the range officers in the target pit.
- 19. Any alteration of a scoring card must be witnessed by the officer in charge of the firing point and indorsed with his initials.
- 20. At all the meetings where a number of men engage in the same matches or competitive firing, the labor of the statistical officers will be greatly lightened, and the prompt announcement of the score facilitated by giving to each competitor a number by which he is known throughout the firing, if practicable.
- 21. In individual matches, each competitor should be given a score card stating his target and order of firing, and containing a blank space for the record of shots fired, and for the signatures of the scorer and a range officer. These score cards should be printed on cardboard, using different colors for different ranges if practicable; but for all kinds of firing employing the same color for the same distance, as, for instance: All score cards for 200 yards, yellow; for 300 yards, red; for 500 yards, blue; for 600 yards, white, etc. This rule will prevent such a mistake as a competitor shooting on a 300-yard score card, with its particular assignment of target, at 200 yards, as the scorekeeper quickly becomes familiar with the color corresponding to each distance. As scores are completed, a range officer detailed for that purpose should, without waiting for all the firing to cease, collect the records of the scores and transmit them to the statistical officers, who will enter them into the permanent record and their totals upon the bulletin sheets prepared for that purpose.

- 22. In skirmish fire, after the run is completed and the signal "Cease firing" has been sounded and repeated twice, the markers will examine the targets, the range officer will record the total hits on each, and the results will be communicated by means of prepared score cards to the statistical officers. In this fire the precautions with regard to the use of a red pencil in marking shot holes will be observed.
- 23. Arms.—Team matches.—In all military matches the following arms only will be used, unless otherwise provided for in special conditions:

The United States Army magazine rifle and carbine, .30 caliber.

- 24. Individual matches (not exclusively military).—The rifles and carbines allowed in competitions are as follows:
  - (a) Any military rifle.
  - (b) Any rifle.

They must comply with the following conditions:

Any military: Any military rifle that has been viewed and stamped by the National Rifle Association in accordance with the resolution heretofore adopted for this purpose by the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice. (See page 5, of this order.)

Any rifle: No restriction as to weight, caliber, sights, or trigger pull, except that rifles with less than 2 pounds trigger pull must be provided with safety lock.

25. Sights (Military Rifles).—The aiming notch, or the aperture of the slide, may be slightly widened or opened to accommodate individual peculiarities of eyesight, but no other alteration or filing of the regular service sights, or the use of spirit levels, will be permitted. The front or rear sights may, however, be blackened according to the judgment of the competitor. The use of permanently affixed micrometers, orthoptic eyepieces, telescope sights, spirit levels, temporary shades, or any other device will not be allowed, unless specially provided for in the conditions of the match.

Competitors in team or individual matches may use field glasses or small telescopes, such as might reasonably be carried in the field as a part of a soldier's equipment.

- 26. TRIGGER PULL.—The trigger pull must always be at least 3 pounds, and will be tested (holding the barrel vertically) by a range officer, before firing, each day and at each range.
- 27. Competitors will submit their arms for further inspection whenever required.
- 28. Ammunition.—Unless the use of other ammunition is distinctly authorized, the ammunition used will be the service cartridge for the arm, as manufactured and issued by the Ordnance Department. Any competitor having any ammunition in his belt or about his person when he takes his place at the firing stand, other than that authorized, will be immediately disbarred, and his score will not count for record.
- 29. Firing, Order of, etc.—Military competitors will wear the service uniform, with or without blouse and with the belt. Sheds or shelter for the firer will not be permitted at the firing point at any range. Com-

petitors must be present at the firing points punctually at the time, or in order stated on their score cards; no application on the part of a competitor for any alteration in his assignment will be entertained, except that team captains may change the order of firing of the members of their teams, if they so desire.

- 30. In competitions or matches embracing more than one distance, the firing will be commenced at the shortest distance, and be followed in order by each of the longer distances, the firing at the longest range being held last.
- 31. In competitions, slow fire in any one day will be completed for all ranges before being followed by rapid fire.
- 32. In individual matches that are squadded, the squadding of the competitors will be done before the beginning of the match.
- 33. In slow fire, the competitors will place themselves at the firing point by twos and will fire alternately, the odd number of each pair being on the right and firing first.
- 34. In slow fire, if, just as the shot is fired, the target is withdrawn from the firing position, the scorer at that firing point will at once report the fact to one of the range officers, who, if upon investigation is satisfied that the case is as represented, will direct that the shot fired be not considered and that the competitor fire another shot.
- 35. In slow fire, competitors will not be hurried in their firing, but such slight delay permitted after each shot as they may desire; provided the time of firing the total score with rifle and carbine does not exceed an average of one minute per shot for ranges of 600 yards and less, and of two minutes per shot for ranges above 600 yards, no time credit being allowed.

If an accident to a target, or any other cause over which the competitor has no control, prevents him from completing his score within a reasonable interval, he will be permitted such additional time as a range officer may decide. The executive officer shall have power to extend the time in his discretion.

36. RAPID FIRE.—Target.—F at both ranges.

Procedure.—The magazine is filled, one cartridge loaded therefrom, and the piece then held at position "ready." At a signal given at the firing point (trumpet or telephone) the target appears, remains in sight twenty seconds at 200 yards and thirty seconds at 500 yards, then disappears. No sighting shots will be permitted. The competitor attempts to fire five shots, emptying the magazine and firing at will, without command, from the instant any portion of the target appears until it has completely disappeared. Each unfired cartridge counts as a miss. In case of a defective cartridge or disabled piece the practice is repeated.

Time is regulated at the target, the signal at the firing point being given as a warning to the noncommissioned officer, or person in the pit in charge of the target that all is ready at the firing point for the target to appear.

Marking, rapid fire.—In rapid fire, with rifle or carbine, at the disappearing target, the noncommissioned officer, or person, in charge of the

target, at the signal from the firing point, commands "Ready." As soon as all is in readiness to run up the target, he commands "Up." Exactly twenty seconds after the target is in position he commands "Down," having preceded this command two or three seconds by the warning command "Ready." The target must be exposed and withdrawn as quickly as possible.

The number and value of the hits are signaled with the usual disks in the usual manner after the score has been fired, the number of misses being carefully indicated by the flag as a check on the accuracy of the number of hits signaled.

When the single rolling, or Cushing, target is used the method of marking will be varied to meet the conditions.

In rapid fire with the pistol at the disappearing target the manipulation of the target is as in rapid fire with the rifle or carbine, except that the target remains exposed ten, or eight, seconds instead of twenty.

- 37. Targets in fixed-distance team firing will be drawn at each range by team captains at the executive officer's headquarters.
- 38. Targets for skirmish firing, where teams run together, will be drawn by competitors immediately preceding the commencement of the runs. In skirmish competitions by teams, targets will be assigned by a range officer.
- 39. No two competitors shall shoot in any competition with the same rifle; nor shall a competitor change his rifle during any competition, unless his first rifle has become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified by a range officer. Wilful or intentional violation of this regulation will warrant the officer in charge, in his discretion, excluding the offender from further competition.
- 40. CLEANING.—Pieces can only be cleaned upon the completion of a score. In competitions at more than one distance cleaning will be permitted between distances. While, with these restrictions, cleaning will be permitted, it will not be required. Cleaning will be allowed between shots when it is so specified in the conditions of the match.
- 41. Revolver and pistol.—In match shooting, competitors may clean their arms between scores or between series of shots, providing such cleaning does not delay the firing beyond the limit provided for in the conditions of the match.
- 42. Coaching.—No coaching or communication of any kind with men at the firing point will be permitted except by the team captain, and then only for the sole purpose of preventing infractions of the conditions of the match.

When competing for the Dryden Trophy, or in other special team matches, coaching is authorized.

43. In team matches, at least three yards in rear of each firing point, there will be permitted one team captain, one coach, and one spotter, who may observe the firings of the members of their team and check the value of each shot as called by the scorer. The captain, coach, and spotter shall not be permitted to shield a competitor from the wind, throw a shade upon his sight, or aid him in any other way.

- 44. In skirmish competitions by teams, the teams will run under the command of the team captain, who may coach his men on the run. One or more range officers will accompany each team to see that the conditions of the match are not violated.
- 45. Sighting Shots.—In all matches pool targets shall be abolished, and two sighting shots at each range, slow fire, provided for, which must be taken. Whenever, because of storm, or for any other reason, the executive officer shall postpone an unfinished match, two sighting shots will be allowed on the unfinished score of each man when the match is resumed.
  - 46. Ties.—Ties will be decided as follows:
    - (a) In individual shooting, at known distances—
      - (1) When the firing takes place at more than one distance, by the total score made at the longest distance, and if still a tie, and there be three or more distances in the competition, by the total score at the second distance, and so on for each of the successive distances.
      - (2) By the fewest misses in the entire score.
      - (3) By the fewest outers in the entire score.
      - (4) By the fewest inners in the entire score.
      - (5) If still a tie, by inverse order of shots, counting singly from the last to the first.
      - (6) By firing single shots at the longest distance.
      - (7) In case a tie is of the highest possible score, extra shots will be fired by those tieing until the tie is broken.
    - (b) In team shooting at known distances—
      - (1) By the aggregate of the total scores made at the different distances in inverse order.
      - (2) By the fewest misses in the entire score.
      - (3) By the fewest outers in the entire score.
      - (4) By the fewest inners in the entire score.
      - (5) By the totals, for the team, of the final shot of each competitor.
      - (6) By the totals, for the team, of these successive closing shots in inverse order.

When the ties are to be divided, it must be so stated in the conditions of the match; but the winners may by mutual consent divide the prizes.

- 47. Ties, when rapid fire is included in the match, will be decided as follows:
  - (a) In slow and rapid fire-
    - (1) By the highest total score made in rapid fire; if still a tie, by the highest score made in rapid fire at 500 yards; if still a tie, by the highest score in rapid fire at 300 yards; if still a tie, by the highest score in rapid fire at 200 yards. In the same manner the decision will be regulated by the highest total scores in succession made at 600, 500, 300, and 200 yards, slow fire.

- (2) By the fewest misses in rapid fire.
- (3) By the greatest number of hits on figure in rapid fire.
- (4) By the fewest misses in slow fire.
- (5) By the fewest outers in slow fire.
- (6) By the fewest inners in slow fire.
- (7) If still a tie, by firing single shots at the longest range, slow fire.

#### 48. In skirmish fire-

- (1) By the greatest number of penalties imposed.
- (2) By the greatest number of hits.
- (3) By the fewest hits in kneeling figures.
- (4) If still a tie, a special run in skirmish fire.
- 49. Ties, when rapid and skirmish fires are included in the aggregate score, will be decided by giving precedence to the competitor having the best total score in the skirmish fire. If the scores in the skirmish fire are also of the same total, the order of merit for that fire (and therefore the final order of merit) will be determined in accordance with paragraph 47.
- 50. Penalties.—No two competitors shall in any match or competition use the same rifle, unless it is a special condition of the match, nor shall a competitor change his rifle during any competition, unless it has become unserviceable, which fact must be verified by a range officer. Wilful violation of this regulation will warrant the executive officer (in his discretion) in excluding the competitor from further competition.
- 51. Any person, whether a competitor or not, interfering with any of the firing squads, or annoying them in any way, will be warned to desist, and if he repeats the offense he will be at once ordered off the range grounds.
  - 52. Any competitor-
- (a) Who shall fire in a name other than that under which he entered, or who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so;
- (b) Who shall be guilty of any conduct considered by the executive committee to be discreditable.
- (c) Who shall be guilty of falsifying his score or being accessory thereto:
- (d) Who shall offer a bribe of any kind to any employee or other person.
- (e) Who shall be detected in an evasion of the conditions prescribed for the conducting of any match;
- (f) Who shall refuse to obey any instructions of the executive officer or a range officer:
- (g) Who shall be guilty of disorderly conduct or being intoxicated, shall, upon the offense being proved to the satisfaction of the executive committee, forfeit all his entrance fees, be forever disqualified from competing at any time in the meetings of the Association, and shall not be entitled to have any prize won by him at the time of meeting awarded to him.

53. Positions.—Rifle and carbine.—The following positions only will be permitted in competitive firing: At 200 yards, the standing position, the body and arm being free from any artificial support; at 300 yards, sitting or kneeling; at 500, 600, 800, 900, and 1,000 yards, prone, with head toward target.

The use of the strap as a sling permitted at all ranges, provided it is attached to its proper swivels, and is used only in connection with the arm of the competitor as a brace.

- 54. Entries.—Competitors who make entries for any match will be ruled out and will forfeit their entrance fees if not on the range at the hour designated for the match.
- 55. Entry tickets must be marked with the purchaser's name at the time of the purchase; they may be transferred to another name with the consent of the executive officer; any erasure or substitution of a purchaser's name on a ticket, not made by the statistical officer, will forfeit the ticket.
- 56. All entries made in individual matches after the opening of the meeting will be post entries.
- 57. No entry fee will be refunded unless the competitor is prevented by sickness from appearing on the range, and then only on order of the executive officer.
- 58. Team captains can expedite matters by securing from the statistical officer blank forms of entry in advance, and having them filled out with the names of the team, which should be written plainly and in full, with military rank, if any.
- 59. Entry tickets for individual matches will not be exchanged under any circumstances.
- 60. All entries not otherwise provided for in the program must be made not later than thirty minutes before the hour for calling the match.
- 61. All civilians, as well as members of the organized militia, Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, are eligible to compete in all the individual matches that are open to everybody, provided they shoot with the arm called for in the conditions of the match.
- 62. Handicap.—In all team and individual matches the carbine will be allowed a handicap of 4 per cent. at 600 yards; 6 per cent. at 800, 900, and 1,000 yards.
- 63. No handicap will be allowed unless noted on score card by a range officer. Competitors must see that this is done.
- 64. Challenges.—If a competitor desires to challenge his shot just fired, either for alleged incorrect marking or from failure of any record from the pit of such shot, he must pay 50 cents. If competitor's challenge is sustained, the money will be returned to him. If a competitor in the national match desires to challenge his shot just fired for alleged incorrect marking, he must pay \$1. If the competitor's challenge is sustained, the money will be returned to him.
- 65. Hours of Firing.—Assembly will be sounded and firing begun at 8 o'clock a. m. and "Cease firing" will be sounded at 6 p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the executive officer.

- 66. The range will be closed for an hour in the middle of the day for lunch.
- 67. Skirmish Firing.—In skirmish fire, twenty cartridges will be issued before each run to each competitor and the latter will not be permitted to have any other cartridges about his person. If any cartridge fails to explode it will be replaced by the scorer with a new one. If a gun becomes disabled, the incomplete score will not be considered, but the competitor will repeat the run. Hits, direct or ricochet, will be scored.
- 68. In individual skirmish competitions no two competitors from the same team shall be allowed to skirmish on adjoining targets.
- 69. SKIRMISH FIRING.—In skirmish competitions the group target "G" will be used, one group for each skirmisher. Targets in line, with intervals of not less than 5 yards between centers of groups. The value of shots; hit, direct or ricochet, on lying figure, 5; kneeling, 4; miss, o. Hits on or within the steel frame only count.
- 70. In skirmish competitions, each competitor will fire twenty shots, 700 to 200 yards. Six halts at the following distances: 600, 500, 400, 350, 300, and 200 yards. At all distances with the exception of the 200 yards, the time limit will be thirty seconds, and at the 200 yards twenty seconds. Any authorized position for firing will be permitted.
- 71. SKIRMISH FIRE.—*Target*.—Group target G. One group for each skirmisher. Targets in line, with intervals of not less than 5 yards between centers of groups.

Procedure.—A squad of convenient number is formed in line opposite the targets at a distance exceeding 600 yards; twenty rounds of ammunition per man are issued; magazines are filled and cut off, and, in accordance with Infantry Drill Regulations, the line is advanced in quick time to the 600-yard firing line. Here the line is halted and each skirmisher, without further command, takes one of the authorized positions and at the preparatory command for firing loads his piece from the belt.

The commands for firing are: I. Fire two rounds, 2. At 600 yards, 3. At the targets, 4. Commence Firing. After the command of execution the firing opens at will and each skirmisher fires two rounds within the time limit of thirty seconds, the piece being used as a single-loader. At the expiration of the time limit the command "Cease firing" will have been given.

The firing having ceased, the advance is resumed and continued to the 500-yard firing line, where two rounds are fired in the same manner as at 600 yards; the advance then continues to the 400 and 350 yard firing lines, at each of which three rounds are similarly fired, and then to 300 and 200 yards, at each of which five rounds are fired from the magazine. The time limit at 200 yards, it should be noted, is twenty instead of thirty seconds, as at the other halts. Commands, in all cases, conform to the Infantry Drill Regulations.

The advance between 600 and 200 yards will be, between any two successive halts, the first half at quick and the second at double time; and it is enjoined upon the range officer to see that the double time is main-

tained as nearly as possible according to Infantry Drill Regulations, i. e., length of step 36 inches, and cadence 180 steps per minute. The firing is completed at 200 yards.

Pieces will not be loaded during the advance, but only at the preparatory command for firing after a halt.

The time limit extends from the last note of "commence firing" to the last note of "cease firing." The range officer will see that the signals are properly sounded, not permitting the last note of "cease firing" to be unduly prolonged. For each shot fired by the competitor before the commencement or after the close of the time limit, or for each shot fired in excess of the number ordered for the halt, five points will be deducted from his score. Five points will also be deducted for a failure to fire the number prescribed for a halt. A defective cartridge may be replaced by a file closer, but must be turned in before the advance is resumed. The substituted cartridge must be fired, if at all, at the halt where the misfire occurred and before "cease firing" shall have been sounded. A piece disabled through no fault of the firer entitles the latter to another run.

Competitors will not be permitted to advance nearer than 200 yards from the targets.

When more than twenty hits are found in a group target, the score will not be counted, and the competitor will make another run.

In this class of fire the muzzle of the rifle must be pointed toward the targets when marching or at the halts.

- 72. In skirmish competitions, where teams run as teams, the team captain will direct the firing of the team under the supervision of a range officer. The aggregate value of all shots in all the figures of the groups will be the team's total for the run.
- 73. In skirmish competitions, where teams run together, the firing will be directed by a range officer detailed for that purpose. Each competitor will be assigned to a group target. No two competitors from the same team will be allowed to skirmish on adjoining groups.
- 74. General.—In case any member of a team becomes ill during the shooting, the executive officer may, in his discretion, upon certificate of the post surgeon, permit the substitution of an alternate member of the same team in place of the one taken ill.
- 75. Prizes not claimed within thirty days after having been won shall be forfeited to the Association.
- 76. No arms shall be loaded except at the firing point, the muzzle of the rifle, pistol, or revolver being kept in the direction of the target till the arm is either discharged or unloaded.
- 77. These regulations and such special rules or directions as the executive officer may give must be rigidly complied with by competitors and all other persons upon the range grounds.
- 78. Competitors and all others connected with the competitions must make themselves acquainted with the foregoing regulations as well as

with the conditions of competitive firing in which they may be participating, as the plea of ignorance of either of them will not be entertained.

Company commanders will bear in mind that there is no change in the system of small arms qualification, as set forth in G. O. No. 7, State of Maine, A. G. O., series of 1904.

To facilitate the monthly return of small arms practice, postal return cards have been prepared, with similar cards to be retained by company commanders in order to keep a ready check upon their companies' practice. The postal returns will be mailed promptly at the beginning of each month, showing the work of the month just ended.

Every company commander is directed to make the most careful examination of the range to be used by his company before permitting the men of his command to begin practice, and will permit no practice whatever till assured that the range is perfectly safe. He will from time to time throughout the season, particularly after heavy storms, see that the butt and shelter have not been so weakened as to endanger the safety of markers at the pit or persons who may be on adjoining property.

The following recommendation from last year's order is repeated to call fresh attention to the necessity of caution: "No officer or enlisted man will be permitted to fire on the range unless he has been PROPERLY INSTRUCTED in the manipulation and use of the arm with which he is to attempt qualification."

Company commanders will be held to strict account in the observance of the above precaution.

Later circulars will give information in regard to competitions. It is assured that regimental competitions will be held for competitions be-

tween company teams, and that regimental teams will compete at a general competition, at which the individual championship of the Guard will be settled. It is also expected that a team will be sent to Sea Girt, N. J., to represent Maine in the national match.

In making return of Small Arms Qualification Practice for the season ending Oct. 31, 1905, the following officers and men will be returned as "UNCLASSIFIED:"

All officers and men who have been discharged during the practice season, from May 1, 1905, to October 31, 1905.

All officers who have been commissioned and qualified and all enlisted men who have been mustered later than Oct. 17, 1905, and who have not qualified in the Third Class or better during the remaining fourteen days of the season.

In the case of officers or men discharged during the practice season their scores, if any, will be entered in the proper columns.

In the case of all unclassified men the reason will be briefly stated in the column of "Remarks" thus, "Discharged, June 11, 1905," or, "Mustered, Oct. 30, 1905."

In making up the returns the "UNCLASSIFIED" will be entered after the "FOURTH-CLASS MEN."

Attention is called to "Model I" in Appendix B, Firing Regulations for Small Arms, 1904, for guidance in making up the return.

I have the honor to request an interpretation of the Firing Regulations for Small Arms in regard to the definition of the word "Score." On page 19 a Score is thus defined:

"Groups of five consecutive shots (exclusive of sighting shots) fired in individual practice."

Does this permit what is known to riflemen as a "broken string"? That is, could a rifleman call the bracketed shots in the following firing at 600 yards a "Score?"

Sighting Shots

Shots to Count.

3 4

4 3 3 (4 5 5 5 5) 3 2

The five shots bracketed constitute a "group of five consecutive shots (exclusive of sighting shots)" but can they be counted as a qualifying score under Special Course "C"?

The point involves the question of ammunition very largely, for you will readily see that men can be qualified with a far less expenditure if any five consecutives may be counted.

At the close of the season of 1905, it is not too early to begin plans for the season of 1906 and in this communication the Inspector General of Rifle Practice wishes to make certain suggestions to the riflemen of the Guard.

While the figure of merit for 1905 will show a remarkable increase over 1904, and while the record which the State Rifle Team made in the New England and National Matches for 1905 was gratifying, it is the belief of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice that both may be excelled another season if the riflemen will put in faithful work during the coming winter and spring.

The importance of gallery practice cannot be overestimated for winter training, provided the entire time is not given to off-hand practice. Off-hand firing in the modern military match is extremely limited and the few points which may be gained by the experts at this stage may be many times offset by inexperienced work in skirmish and rapid fire.

Therefore, it behooves the man who would do creditable work in qualification practice or on the State Team to accustom himself most thoroughly to the prone position. Regular practice in this position will so train the muscles that the riflemen will assume it involuntarily and will

be able to hold it for long periods without experiencing the strain and tremor noticeable at first. If the riflemen can get a reasonable amount of practice with gallery ammunition, so much the better, but simple holding and snapping in the prone position will work wonders in a winter's training.

Holding and snapping may be advantageously varied by simulating the skirmish run. This may be done by reproducing from the Firing Regulations for Small Arms the illustration of "Skirmish Group 'G.'" With this miniature target in position, the rifleman may, under command, advance to the firing point, drop into position, and hold and snap twice. Rising at command, he may run once around the armory, then repeat the firing exercise, and so on for each successive halt, firing the required number of shots within the stipulated firing intervals as laid down in the Firing Regulations for Small Arms. Simple as this may seem, it will prove most excellent training for actual skirmish running for it will accustom the rifleman to take position readily and teach him to take full advantage of the firing intervals. In the course of time he will learn that thirty seconds is ample time in which to take deliberate aim and fire two shots, and that even in the twenty seconds allowed at 200 yards five shots may be fired with certainty of aim if the rifleman is regular in his motions.

If the range will permit an occasional trial with gallery ball cartridges, the rifleman will find that he is making steady improvement and will thereby be encouraged to continue practice with the empty piece.

In the same way, holding and snapping may be varied by rapid-fire exercises, both with the empty piece and with gallery ammunition, care being taken to see that the firing interval in the off-hand position is twenty seconds and in the prone position, thirty seconds.

Commanding officers should ascertain what possible material they have for the State Team, and then do all in their power to see that possible candidates spend the winter profitably. Holding and snapping exercises are irksome at best, but if commanding officers will encourage their best riflemen to persist in such practice, the coming season's results will be greatly improved.

Riflemen who hope to make the State Team should take time to thoroughly learn the rifle with which they are armed. They should learn to remedy the roughness in the action and trigger-pull, and should be able to test their rifles for smoothness and calibration of bore. These little things may make little difference in ordinary shooting; but to the expert they are of vast importance, for a rifle of excessive caliber will send shots high and wild at 1000 yards, no matter how carefully the rifleman may hold. The rifleman who lacks this knowledge is handicapped in any competition with experienced riflemen.

When another season opens, the rifleman should make his 20's at 200, 300 and 500 yards, and then expend his surplus ammunition and spare time at 600 yards. Any man who can shoot at 600 yards can shoot at 500 yards and work at 600 yards will do more for a man than work at any other range. In the same way, a rifleman's time is put to better

advantage for long-range training by work at 1000 yards rather than 800 yards.

And the final suggestion is this: Don't pick the good days. They are excellent for qualification purposes but they do not train for all round marksmanship.

The work immediately before the Guard is that of indoor practice and for the indoor season of 1905-6 all inquiries should be addressed to Major John J. Dooley, Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice, 598 Congress Street, Portland. Major Dooley will have entire supervision of the indoor practice and his decisions will be final.

Companies which have gallery ranges should see that they are in condition for the winter's work, and companies which have no such ranges should take steps to remedy the deficiency. All necessary information regarding the construction of ranges will be furnished by the Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice on request.

Information regarding the amount of gallery ammunition which will be allowed for the winter's practice will be announced later from the office of the Adjutant General.

The following rules for small arms practice on indoor ranges have been prepared by Major John J. Dooley, Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice, and will govern work in the National Guard of the State of Maine for the season commencing January 1st, 1906.

## OBJECT OF INSTRUCTION.

The object of instruction on the in-door range is the development of proficiency in handling the rifle and the use of its sights by officers and enlisted men, so as to make easier and more effective their practice on the outdoor range, thereby increasing the service efficiency of the several commands.

# COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

First—Nomenclature of the rifle; care and preservation of the rifle. Second—Position and aiming drills.

Third—Practice work on the range in the standing, kneeling or sitting and prone positions. Special attention should be paid to the prone position for its use is called for at four of the six ranges used in qualification on the outdoor range. At least two-thirds of the gallery work should be done in this position.

#### AMMUNITION.

The gallery ammunition for seventy-five feet is loaded with 3.1-5 grains by weight of Unique powder. The bullet weighs 87 grains and is composed of one part tin and ten parts lead. The primer is No. 9½, U. M. C. non-mercuric. The bullet has a penetration of one inch in oak, two and one-half inches in spruce and four inches in pine. The load requires an elevation of 325 to 375 yards and one point left windage. The neck of the shell has been expanded to .313 inches and crimped.

The gallery ammunition for fifty feet is loaded with two grains by weight of Bullseye powder. The bullet weighs 77 grains and is composed of one part tin and ten of lead. The primer is No. 9½, U. M. C., non-mercuric. The bullet has nearly the same penetration as the other load.

## ALLOWANCE OF AMMUNITION.

The allowance of ammunition will be as follows:

To each company, 2000 rounds and 500 targets.

To each member of the field, staff and non-commissioned staff of the First and Second Infantry, and Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, 100 rounds and 25 targets.

#### TARGETS.

The target to be used is the 200-yard Creedmore reduced for fifty and seventy-five feet. In gallery firing it has been found practically impossible to hold with ease on one inch of black at seventy-five feet or two-thirds of an inch of black at fifty feet. This difficulty has been overcome on these targets by adding extra black in the four ring which, while not adding to the value of a shot outside the five ring, does materially assist both the novice and the expert to hold with satisfaction.

#### METHOD OF FIRING.

All firing will be under the direction of an officer or non-commissioned officer in charge of the firing point who will see that the instruction and scoring of the men is in accordance with the rules. An instructed man will be detailed to coach each recruit. At the command (Commence Firing) the recruits under the supervision of the detailed coaches, fire slowly until two scores of five shots each have been fired. The coach, standing by the recruit, will correct his fault of position or trigger-pulling, pointing out the position of each shot and in each case explaining the reason for a miss.

Company inspectors of rifle practice should be detailed and all scores made a matter of record. Company commanders should try and hold, as many matches in the gallery as possible. If matches cannot be arranged with other companies they should be held between teams in the company.

Attention is called to Circular No. 4, issued from this office under date of November 10th.

Requisition should at once be made for ammunition and targets, specifying which target is desired; the large target being used for seventy-five feet and the small target for fifty feet.
