REPORT.

The seventy-second legislature passed the following law, chapter 155, Public Laws of 1905:

AN ACT to abolish the office of public printer, and to authorize contracts for State printing on the basis of competitive bids.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. The governor and council are hereby authorized to contract, in behalf of the State, on the basis of competitive bids, for the printing of the reports, catalogues, compilations, bulletins and circulars, authorized to be printed under sections twenty-four, twenty-five and twenty-six, of chapter three, of the Revised Statutes, and for all other miscellaneous printing, now or hereafter authorized by law, for each department of the State government, including the legislative printing, but excepting the printing of reports of decisions. They may, in their discretion, call for bids, and contract separately, for distinct portions of the State printing, but may reject any and all bids which they do not deem it in the interest of the State to accept, and may take such security as they deem necessary, if any, for the faithful performance of any contract hereunder. No such contract shall be for a longer time than two years.

Sect. 2. Sections twenty-seven, twenty-eight, twenty-nine and thirty of chapter three of the Revised Statutes, are hereby repealed.

Sect. 3. This act shall take effect January first, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and six.

Approved March 24, 1905.

Under your direction specifications and forms for bids were prepared, and on September 16, 1905, by public advertisement and mailed notices all the printers of the State were notified that sealed proposals for all or distinct portions of the State printing for two years beginning January 1, 1906, would be received until October 10, 1905. The result of this was the receipt of six bids for portions of the work, and one bid for all of the classes enumerated. The bidders were Burleigh & Flynt, Augusta; Sentinel Publishing Co., Waterville; A. C. Ladd Co.,

Fairfield; Co-operative Printing Co., Bangor; The Times Co., Bath; George W. Singer, Damariscotta; E. C. Bowler, Bethel. After due consideration of these proposals awards were made as follows: Class A, book printing, Burleigh & Flynt; class B, miscellaneous job printing, Sentinel Publishing Co.; class C, legislative printing, Burleigh & Flynt. In accord with these awards contracts were entered into January 1, 1906.

On November 15, 1906, a contract was closed with the Maine Farmer Publishing Co. for printing all the half tone inserts required by the State for a period of one year.

All of these contracts were made upon the basis of figures submitted by the several contractors in competitive bidding, and upon terms fully protecting the interests of the State. The prices on the whole are considered favorable to a large saving to the State; further than this we prefer results should be considered as time shall demonstrate.

Direct supervision of the State printing by the Auditor was established January 1, 1906, by the order copied below:

STATE OF MAINE.

In Council, January 1, 1906.

Ordered, That on and after January 1, 1906, all Departments of the State requiring State printing shall make requisition for the same to the Governor and Council through the Auditor of State Printing.

On January 8, 1906, the public printers were notified of the above action of the Council and instructed as follows:

"If any orders purporting to be State printing come to you from any other source than through this office you will please refer the same to me before making any beginning on the work or incurring any expense on behalf of the State.

Blank requisitions are furnished the departments and orders for printing handled only on request of the chief officer or

authorized clerk of each department or institution. A system of numbered orders has been adopted which preserves a copy in this office for ready reference and gives the printer complete written instructions as to each job, which original order becomes a voucher when signed on the back by the person to whom the completed job is delivered. The voucher and specimen of the job is returned to this office with fully itemized individual bill, and all filed for reference. A similar form of order is also given the State binder when a job requires the work of the bindery for completion. A complete list of such requisitions as have come to me, is presented to the honorable council monthly at its regular session.

It should be borne in mind that items shown here include the bills for printing, engraving, stock, etc., properly drawn from the State printing appropriation and not bills for bindery work, such as folding, binding, ruling, perforating, numbering, etc. While of necessity such work has been authorized through this office to complete many of the jobs enumerated, no accounting of the same comes to the auditor under the present provisions of the statutes. In the individual jobs, and so far as the total accredited to departments and institutions is concerned, it is desirable to show the cost of the completed work. At the time of making this report, however, the figures pertaining to the bindery part of the work in many items were not available.

METHODS OF HANDLING STATE PRINTING.

For the purpose of securing information regarding methods of handling state printing and binding in other states a circular of inquiry was mailed last October to the secretary of state of all other states in the union. Forty replies were received, from which I gathered a valuable tabulation of statistics and much material in the line of state printing laws, contract forms and specifications, prices, etc.

Two states, California and Kansas, own their public printing plant. In 1872 California passed an act to establish a state printing office and to create the office of superintendent of state printing. In 1874 an act was passed to provide for the fitting up and use of the Governor's Mansion as a state printing office and state armory. Since that time the plant has developed into a large printing establishment in which the state printing and binding is done, and a large line of text books issued for distribution to the pupils of the state at cost. This school text book department is made self sustaining, without direct appropriations, and the receipts and expenditures constitute the school-book revolving fund.

Perhaps more of interest and value to our people will be the recent experience of the state of Kansas as indicated in the communication herewith. I present this as interesting, enthusiastic and progressive, worthy of attention.

Dear Sir:

Your circular question blank, addressed to the secretary of state has been referred to me.

To this date I have answered like inquiries from several states, and take pleasure in copying from my letter book such statements as I have

mailed to different parties, and which, I trust, will answer your purpose even better than to fill the blanks in your circular.

Up to July 1, 1905, the state printing has been done by private owner-ship of the plant—the state printer being elected by the legislature—and all work done for the state was paid for under schedules set forth in the statutes.

The Kansas legislature of 1904-5 enacted a law assuming the printing for the state officials and institutions by the state, placing the state printer on a stated salary of \$2500 per annum, and empowering him to employ and discharge all laborers; created a board known as the state printing plant commission, consisting of three electors, who were authorized to purchase building site, to erect a building and to equip a printing plant. The legislature appropriated for these purposes, to wit:

Total	\$68,000
For equipment of building and plant	32,000

The pay for this commission is \$5 per day and actual expenses for each and every day employed, a further appropriation of \$1000 having been made to meet this expense.

The commission purchased a beautiful corner near the capitol, paying \$6000 for it, upon which they erected a handsome 3-story concrete reinforced building, 50x150 feet, at an expenditure of \$28,000 (contract price), a good picture of which is shown on this letter head. They purchased the plant from the former state printer at a cost of \$18,000, and have made many valuable additions to it, so that now we have a first-class up-to-date institution that does all the work, composition, binding and press-work, necessary for all the institutions. I have rented two Mergenthaler Linotypes, which the legislature this winter will, no doubt, buy out-right.

Besides the appropriations above there was appropriated the following additional sums:

For labor	
For incidentals	5,000
For printing and binding material	20,000

Total \$60,000

These appropriations were made for the first year, ending June 30, 1906, and slightly increased for the second year, ending June 30, 1907.

The first year was completed, during which the plant was moved from quarters that it had occupied for a quarter of a century to the new building, at extraordinary expense, and not one cent was expended over the appropriation. Heretofore it has been the custom for the legislature to pass deficiency bills to meet the expense of printing, but I am positively certain that there will be no such legislation under the appropriations as below set forth.

For the years 1903 and 1904, the expense of printing was \$191,647.55.

For the years 1905 and 1906, (ending June 30, 1907) the total appropriation for labor, incidentals and printing and binding material is \$130,000.00.

I keep a job ticket account of the cost of every job of printing done and the cost of same jobs under former system, and at the end of the first fiscal year, June 30, 1906, the following figures will give you a good idea of the saving to the state. Bear in mind that these figures do not reflect upon the integrity of the former state printers. They simply show the difference of the actual cost to the state now and what the state formerly paid within the law.

Showing an actual saving to the state for labor and material of \$22,010 66

I confidently expect that, if no untoward circumstances arise, the saving alone under state ownership and control will offset the cost of the land and building and equipment, within three years.

The office of state printer is now an elective one, the same as any other state officer.

The average number of employes in all departments per month is 61.

I do not hesitate to enthusiastically commend the Kansas system for the state's public printing.

We are strictly forbidden to do any kind of work in the lines of the institution for private parties. Not a breath of discontent among the vast number of officials for whom printing is done has been heard, as they get as good work and material and as much as before, or all that is requisite.

Each head of the department or institution makes a requisition upon the state printer for the kind and amount of printing wanted as they want it.

I believe that I have given you all and perhaps much more information than you wanted, if, however, there is anything further do me the favor of asking for it. It will be my pleasure to answer any questions that may give you more light.

The question of superintendence of state printing was taken up. Of the 38 states outside California and Kansas giving reply, nineteen place their printing in the control of a board or commission, eleven states place it in the hands of the secretary of state or some other state officer. In the above cases there is usually

a printing expert clerk. Three other states report a superintendent or supervisor, and two report no superintendence, each department looking after its own printing. The remaining three states, Iowa, Oregon and Washington, have a state printer without the system of competitive bids, similar to the system in Maine prior to 1906.

To the question, "Is your state printing open to competitive bids?" 34 states answer "Yes", one "Partly" and three "No."

Regarding the length of terms of contracts different states report as follows: one 6 years, two 5 years, one 4 years, nineteen 2 years, four 1 and 2 years, others occasional or as required.

With regard to annual cost of printing the returns were not in satisfactory form for tabulation, though instructive in individual cases. Often the sum named included cost of printing and binding.

The same questions were asked in relation to state binding as were in relation to state printing. The replies indicated in almost every instance that the printing and binding were handled together and let by same contract or in similar manner. Thirty-four states which let state binding by contract do so under the system of competitive bids, one partly so, one reports no competition, the same being true in regard to its printing, and one state owns its bindery while its printing is contracted on the basis of competitive bids.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The present arrangement of issuing the several department reports results in a considerable congestion of work in the printing office about January of each year, and this is especially the case and more noticeable on the legislative year when several biennial reports come in, and the demands of the legislature for miscellaneous printing are unusually imperative. The result is confusion, delays on some of the reports that are annoying to the departments and detract from their usefulness and value, and in some cases added expense for overtime work.

It may be possible under future contracts to obviate a part of this difficulty by a further distribution of the work in such a manner as to call into service a larger number of workmen and increased mechanical facilities at the particularly congested period. Yet a complete remedy calls for action in the direction of removing the causes. It is possible some of the biennial reports may be issued on the alternate year instead of on the legislative year. It is possible that some of the annual reports may be issued at a different season of the year, which might involve a change in the law in relation to the close of their financial or statistical year. The situation strongly suggests the advantages of some form of supervision that may be able to arrange a practical and harmonious schedule for the issue of all State reports at the time that will best serve all interests. Each department should have the right of way for its report, with the printers, for a limited period, then make way for the next in order.

It has been suggested by officials connected with the insane hospitals that their report might be issued biennially instead of annually, with some advantages and considerable saving in cost and labor. The present limit on the edition results in an insufficient supply for all the demands. With a biennial edition slightly

increased in quantity, the field could be more thoroughly covered at less expense, and perhaps all requirements of the interests in the State as fully met.

In order for you to understand the condition of congestion on report printing I present the following brief statement of the principal work in the hands of the printer at the date of making this report. It should be further understood that typesetting may have begun on some that are reported as "none printed." On others partly printed the typesetting may be nearly finished. On some that have been in the office longest it may be the departments have not required an earlier completion. I have the statement of the foreman in charge that no delay has been occasioned from lack of copy furnished by the departments.

The reports that have been completed since September, 1906, are—Board of Health, Forest Commissioner, Railroad Commissioners, Directory of Insurance Companies, six Experiment Station Bulletins, Agricultural Department Bulletins for September and December, University of Maine Catalogue and Annual Report, and several small pamphlets.

I recommend that the deficiency of \$7,410.71 in bills due January 1, 1907, be met by a special appropriation.
