To His Excellency, William T. Cobb, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR:—I have the honor most respectfully to submit my report as Adjutant General, Quartermaster General, and Paymaster General for the year ending December 31, 1906.

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NATIONAL GUARD.

The National Guard of the State of Maine as at present constituted consists of two Regiments of Infantry of twelve companies each and a Ship's Company Naval Reserve.

The First Regiment under command of Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, headquarters at Biddeford, is composed of companies stationed as follows, viz: A, B, E, L, and Band, Portland; C, Auburn; D, Norway; F, Sanford; G, Biddeford; H, Rockland; I, Lewiston; K, Brunswick; M, Westbrook.

The Second Regiment under command of Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, headquarters at Eastport, is composed of companies stationed as follows, viz: A, Gardiner; B, D, and Band, Lewiston; C, Bath; E, Skowhegan; F, Dover; G, Bangor; H, Waterville; I, Eastport; K, Farmington; L, Houlton; M, Augusta.

The Ship's Company Naval Reserve, under command of Lieutenant Everett G. Scully, is stationed at Portland.

The total strength of the National Guard is as follows, viz: Staff of the Commander-in-Chief, 12.

First Infantry—Officers, 51; enlisted men, 647; total, 698.

Second Infantry-Officers, 51; enlisted men, 647; total, 698.

Naval Reserve-Officers, 5; enlisted men, 64; total, 69.

Grand total, 1477.

The Medical Corps, consisting of 7 officers and 26 enlisted men, is assigned to duty with the First and Second Infantry and the Naval Reserve and is included in the above estimate.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

Owing to lack of suitable ranges not so much attention has been given to rifle practice during the past year as would seem desirable. Notwithstanding this fact, however, the advance made by the members of the Guard is most satisfactory, indicating that under favorable conditions they will take high rank.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S REPORT.

In July a team from the State participated in the second annual tournament of the New England Military Rifle Association at Wakefield, Massachusetts, July 23d to 28th, inclusive. A State rifle competition was held at Brunswick, October 15th, 16th and 17th. The results attained at each of the above competitions were highly satisfactory and the able report of Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, gives full details in relation to the competitions and other matters pertaining to his department, showing that its affairs have been conducted with marked ability.

RIFLE RANGES.

A State rifle range for the use of the National Guard has long been needed. During the past year a suitable piece of land located in Hallowell on the Whitten road, about one mile from the camp ground, has been purchased and a State rifle range has been constructed thereon. Two stops, each one hundred feet in length and providing ample space for eight targets each, have been constructed. On the north range firing pcints at 200, 300, 350, 400, 500 and 600 yards have been provided and on the south range firing points at 200 and 300 yards are provided, all on land owned by the State. Eight hundred and 1000-yard firing points can be secured on adjacent land not owned by the State.

Company M will have the use of the range under proper regulations and the State competitions will hereafter be held in Augusta. A suitable target house has been provided on the range for the storage of targets and other property belonging to the State and for the use of rifle teams. The range was laid out by Civil Engineer W. B. Getchell, under the directions of Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, and it is hoped and believed that it will meet a long-felt want of the National Guard of the State. While the cost of construction has been considerable, it is believed that the results attained will prove satisfactory.

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SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION.

In accordance with the requirements of Section 84 of the Militia Law, a meeting for military instruction of the officers of the First Infantry was held at the armory in the city of Portland on Thursday, March 22, 1906, at 2.00 P. M., and on Tuesday, June 5, 1906, the officers of the Second Infantry assembled at Augusta for the same purpose. The Colonels of the respective regiments presided and conducted the meetings. Much valuable information was imparted by the reading of papers and the discussion of military matters.

THE ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The annual encampment was held at the State camp ground, Augusta, August 6th to 18th, inclusive. The camp was named Camp Cobb, in honor of the Commander-in-Chief.

Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry, was in command of the camp from August 6th to 11th, inclusive, and Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, from August 13th to 18th, inclusive.

The troops were mustered in tents as usual. A practice march of three days was made by each command as a part of the tour of duty.

The First Infantry, under command of Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, detrained at Harward's on Monday, August 6th, and proceeded by the river road to Iceboro, where camp was made on land owned by the American Ice Company; on Tuesday, August 7th, the line of march was taken up by the river road and camp was made one mile south of Gardiner on land owned by Robert H. Gardiner, Esq.; on Wednesday, August 8th, the line of march was taken up for Camp Cobb at Augusta. The men arrived in good condition with but few exceptions and remained in camp until their tour of duty was completed, on Saturday, August 11th.

The Second Infantry, under command of Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, was mobilized at Waterville on Monday, August 13th, where camp was made on the Central Maine Fair grounds; on Tuesday, August 14th, the line of march was taken up for Vassalboro via Winslow, where camp was made on land owned by Elmer W. Rollins, Esq., and on Wednesday march was completed to Camp Cobb, where the troops remained until the tour of duty was completed, on Saturday, August 18th.

The practice marches were made in heavy marching order and the distance marched by each command was about twentythree miles.

Captain Wilmot E. Ellis, Artillery Corps, U. S. A., who had been especially detailed as instructor and inspector, served with the troops during the entire tour of duty. Under his direction the troops maneuvered as if in an enemy's country with advance and rear guard and flankers; outposts were established at night and numerous military evolutions were performed which it is believed will prove of advantage to the Guard.

The Commissary Department was most admirably conducted by Colonel Edward J. Mayo, Commissary General, assisted by the regimental commissaries.

The regimental quartermasters proved most efficient in the discharge of their duties.

The practice march was a departure from the usual tour of duty at previous encampments and it is believed that the experience gained and the results attained will prove of advantage to the Guard.

On Thursday, August 9th, the First Infantry, Colonel Lucius H. Kendall commanding, was reviewed by the Commander-in-Chief with the usual forms and ceremonies.

It affords me pleasure to state that the conduct of the men during the practice marches and when in camp was such as to merit the commendation of the Commander-in-Chief.

INSPECTIONS.

The Inspector General made a very careful and complete inspection of the several companies at their armories, in accordance with the requirements of the Militia Law, commencing on Monday, January I, 1906, and closing on Tuesday, February 6th. The Naval Reserve was inspected on June 28, 1906, in accordance with the requirements of Section 14 of the Act entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the Militia and for other purposes." A thorough inspection of the several organizations of the National Guard was made by Captain James B. Mitchell, Artillery Corps, U. S. A., commencing on Monday, January 15, 1906, and closing on February 20th.

Much valuable information was imparted at each inspection and attention is especially called to the full and valuable report of the Inspector General.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

In order to conform more closely to the regulations established for the government of the United States Army, the medical officers of the National Guard were organized as a Medical Corps, as provided in General Orders No. 7, A. G. O., June 7, 1906.

This department is under the charge of the Surgeon General, Colonel James B. O'Neill; he has conducted the affairs of his office in a most satisfactory manner both on the practice marches and in camp.

The surgeons and assistant surgeons have served with the Guard for quite a number of years and are thoroughly familiar with every detail connected with their department. Assignments to duty were made as follows:

Surgeons with rank of Major.

Edwin M. Fuller, Bath, to Second Infantry, Bial F. Bradbury, Norway, to First Infantry.

Assistant Surgeons with rank of Captain. James F. Hill, Waterville, to Second Infantry, Charles L. Cragin, Portland, to First Infantry.

Assistant Surgeons with rank of First Lieutenant. Fred A. Chandler, Addison, to Second Infantry, Clarence F. Kendall, Biddeford, to First Infantry.

Assistant Surgeon with rank of Lieutenant (J. G.). George H. Turner, Jr., Portland, to Ship's Company Naval Reserve.

TENTAGE.

The tents used at the annual encampment are thoroughly aired, dried and stored in the State storehouses at Augusta after each encampment. This is undoubtedly of great advantage to the State, as the life of the tents is much longer than it would be if stored in the several armories. As a matter of fact there is not room enough for the storage of the tents in the armories even if it was deemed advisable to do so. Owing to this fact all tents, including shelters, ovens, mess kits, pans and numerous other articles are stored in the State storehouses at Augusta, as they can be much better cared for there than elsewhere.

NAVAL RESERVE.

Under date of June 28, 1906, the Ship's Company Naval Reserve was inspected by the Inspector General and attention is called to his report on the conditions of this organization, which is regarded as most satisfactory.

The annual cruise of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve took place September 1st to 8th, inclusive. Four officers and 53 enlisted men participated. On Saturday, September 1st, the U. S. S. Columbia left Portland at 6.00 P. M., with the Ship's Company Naval Reserve on board. On 'Tuesday, September 2d, transfer was made to the U. S. S. Tacoma and the remainder of the service was on board this ship. The officers and men of this organization undoubtedly derived great benefit from this cruise and take pleasure in referring to the atmosphere of friendly courtesy and kindly consideration which surrounded them as characteristic of the United States Navy.

Attention is called to the detailed report of the Lieutenant commanding Ship's Company.

PRESERVATION OF THE REGIMENTAL ROLLS.

The work of the preservation and protection of the regimental rolls has been carried on during the past year in accordance with the resolve providing for the preservation of the regimental rolls in the Adjutant General's Office.

This work is necessarily slow as it requires great care as many of the rolls are in very poor condition as the result of wear and tear incident to handling them for so many years. Material of fine quality has been furnished by Messrs. Loring, Short and Harmon of Portland and the work has been performed by Mr. W. H. Follette.

INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE, Augusta, December 15, 1906.

The Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith my report as Inspector General for the year ending December 15, 1906.

ARMORY INSPECTIONS.

In compliance with General Orders No. 20, State of Maine, A. G. O., dated November 11, 1905, I have made a critical inspection of each of the organizations of the National Guard at their home stations, covering a period from January 1st to February 6th, inclusive.

A detailed report of each organization was made at the time of inspection and mailed to your office.

STRENGTH.

The present organized strength of the National Guard of Maine, is two regiments of infantry consisting of headquarters, band, hospital corps detachment, and twelve companies each, a ship's company of naval reserve consisting of two divisions, commanded by a lieutenant with a staff of executive officer and adjutant, assistant surgeon, and two chief petty officers.

The minimum strength required by law is 107 officers and 1,360 enlisted men, an aggregate of 1,467. There is also a staff of the Commander-in-Chief, consisting of twelve officers. These

are not, strictly speaking, considered a part of the National Guard and are not included in the above figures.

The actual strength of the Guard at the time of inspection was 95 officers and 1,168 enlisted men, an aggregate of 1,263.

Since my inspection there has been organized, a hospital corps consisting of the seven medical officers already in the service and twenty-six enlisted men. These have been assigned to duty with the First and Second Regiments, three officers and thirteen enlisted men to each, and one officer to the Naval Reserve.

The following table shows the required strength as compared with the actual strength of each organization, at the time of inspection.

It will be noticed that the actual strength of the Guard at the time of inspection, was 204 less than the aggregate number required by law. It is undoubtedly true that, under the present regulations governing the examination of recruits, and company commanders not being allowed to recruit in excess of the minimum, it is practically impossible to keep a company up to the full strength at all times, but it would seem that, in some of the companies at least, a little extra effort in the matter of recruiting might result in keeping the number nearer up to the standard. Only five companies have the required 50 enlisted men, and of the nineteen companies below the standard, seven have less than 45, and six have less than 40 enlisted men.

There is a noticeable falling off in the percentage of attendance as compared with the inspection of 1905. This is, in my opinion, largely due to having the inspections so early in the year.

In some sections of the State a large number of the men are employed in the woods during the winter months. These men are good soldiers, almost invariably excellent marksmen, men who could and would respond to any call to duty, but who are • excused from drills and inspections, owing to the fact that attendance would involve quite a loss in both time and money, many of them being obliged to travel from twenty to fifty miles to reach the armories.

ARMORIES.

A detailed statement of the condition of armories will be found in the special report of each organization.

There has been no change in armories during the past year, except in Sanford, where the hall formerly used by Company F, First Infantry, as a drill room, has been converted by the owner into a billiard hall, leaving the company without any suitable place to drill.

The same general conditions pertaining to armories noted in former reports still prevail. Many of the drill rooms are too small for any practical work except the most simple movements in close order drill. In some places the city or town authorities allow the companies the use of a hall one evening each week, reserving the privilege of letting it for some other purpose whenever possible. This creates an uncertainty as to the night on which drills can be held and interferes greatly with the attendance.

Only a few companies are provided with really suitable facilities for the storage and proper care of military property. The present equipment has entirely outgrown its quarters.

ARMS, UNIFORM AND EQUIPMENT.

The National Guard of this State has never been so well uniformed and equipped as at the present time. As a whole I find the rifles in good, serviceable condition and well cared for, the few exceptions being noted in my detailed report of each organization. A number of companies have adopted the plan of keeping the rifles in a rack, which for many reasons is, in my opinion, a decided improvement over keeping them in the lockers. I wish the plan was in more general use.

In the care of equipment I notice a tendency to neglect the bayonet and scabbard. A great many were found dirty and rusty. The same may be said of the mess kit, meat can, knife, fork and spoon being in many instances evidently put away after use without being properly cleaned. In a number of instances also haversacks were found to contain broken hard bread and other remnants of food left from the last encampment.

The new olive drab service uniform, issued in 1905, is in good condition and makes a very serviceable and attractive

uniform. The khaki clothing, while considerably worn and shabby in appearance, is still serviceable and can be used to advantage for armory drills, practice marches, etc. The dress trousers are generally in very good condition. The dress coats, however, show wear and nearly all are badly soiled on the shoulder, from contact with the oil-stuffed gun sling that was first issued with the U. S. magazine rifle now in use. While these coats are nearly all serviceable, they present a very ragged and shabby appearance and detract greatly from the neatness and soldierly appearance of the troops. The dress caps also, while serviceable, are badly out of shape from being packed in chests for transportation to and from the encampment, etc. I hope before very long that the Guard may be equipped with the new regulation dress coat and dress cap.

SMALL ARMS PRACTICE.

I need touch but lightly upon this department, which is fully covered, in all its details, by the annual report of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice.

I find the same difficulty that has been experienced in former years still exists, that of procuring suitable sites for ranges where practice with the new rifle can be safely conducted. The ranges at Portland and Lewiston were practically out of use for the entire season, owing to the frequent protests against shooting made by citizens residing in the immediate vicinity. This has resulted in a slight falling off in the percentage of qualifications for this year.

Nearly every armory is now provided with either a 50- or 75-foot range for indoor practice, and under the system conducted by Major John J. Dooley, who is in immediate supervision of this department of the work, there cannot fail to result an increased efficiency.

ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

A slight variation from the usual system of conducting the annual encampment was introduced this year, by having each regiment mobilized at a point about twenty miles from Augusta, and marched to that city by easy stages.

The transportation was conducted much as in former years, special trains being run from Portland and Bangor, taking on

the several companies at their home stations. Quite a saving both in time and expense was made by transporting the Lewiston, Auburn and Farmington companies via Winthrop, using the electric road from Withrop to the camp ground.

Entraining and detraining was promptly done in both regiments, as all baggage, except the personal field equipment, was forwarded direct to Augusta. The time consumed in entraining and detraining was only that required for the men themselves to enter or leave the cars, which averaged about two minutes.

The time consumed in concentration was, for the First Regiment, five and one-half hours, for the Second Regiment, nine hours, counting in each case from the earliest time of departure of any individual company to the latest hour of arrival of any company.

In case of necessity, by using a special train over the Grand Trunk Railway from Norway to Yarmouth Junction, the First Regiment could be concentrated either at Augusta or Portland in at least two hours less time than that given above.

The First Regiment detrained at Harward's, twenty-three miles from Augusta, and the march was commenced at 11.30 A. M. on Monday, August 6th. A halt of about two hours was made at a farmhouse about one and one-half miles from Harward's for dinner. The regiment camped for the night at Iceboro, after a march of seven miles, arriving at about 4.00 o'clock P. M. The camp was pitched on land owned by the American Ice Company, in a large field sloping towards the river and well adapted for camping purposes. The weather was excessively hot and oppressive, in fact one of the hottest days of the summer, and many of the men suffered considerable discomfort on that account, but no serious sickness was reported.

The march was resumed at 7.30 A. M. on the 7th, and the regiment went into camp on the Gardiner estate, one mile below the city of Gardiner, where they arrived at about 11.30 A. M., having covered the eight-mile march in about four hours. The weather was much cooler than the day before and the men arrived in camp in good condition.

The camp was situated on high ground, overlooking the river, a most beautiful spot and an ideal camping ground in every respect.

On August 8th, the march was resumed at 7.00 A. M., reaching the State camp ground at Augusta at about 11.00 A. M., a distance of eight miles. The regiment arrived in the best of condition and ready to settle down to the regular routine of camp life.

The Second Regiment detrained at Waterville, twenty miles from Augusta, on Monday, August 13, at about 4.00 P. M., and marched to the Central Maine State Fair Grounds, one and one-half miles out of the city, where they camped for the night. On the morning of the 14th, the regiment was transported to Waterville, by electric cars, and at 6.00 A. M. the march to Augusta was commenced, proceeding by the river road. A halt was made at Vassalboro for dinner, and the regiment camped for the night near Riverside, a distance of ten miles from Waterville, arriving at about 4.00 P. M. Camp was pitched in a large field on the bank of the river, a very pleasant spot and well adapted for the purpose. The march was resumed on the morning of the 15th, breaking camp at 6.20 A. M. and arriving at the camp ground in Augusta at 11.20 A. M., a distance of nine miles. The weather during the march was cool and comfortable, the roads in fine condition, and the troops arrived at Augusta showing little effects of their nine-mile hike. There was no serious sickness reported during this march.

In both regiments, during the march, the following disposition was made: One battalion divided into two companies as advance guard, under command of a Major, one company as rear guard, and one company sent out in advance to act as a harassing column. At night three companies of the same battalion were sent out to establish an outpost, and the fourth company was to represent a hostile force, and attack the outpost at times confidentially communicated to the company commander by the U. S. Army officer who accomplished the troops as instructor.

Several times during the march, simulated attacks were made by the harassing column. When these attacks were made, the dispositions made and the phase developed, were umpired by the U. S. Army instructor, and criticisms made by him, with a view to securing the greatest amount of instruction for all concerned. The camp at Augusta was by regiment, lasting in each case from Wednesday until Saturday. The camp was designated "Camp Cobb" in honor of the Commander-in-Chief, and was commanded from August 8th to 11th by Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry, and from August 15th to 18th by Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry. The camp was prepared in advance by hired civilian labor, and was all ready for occupancy when the troops arrived, with the exception, in the case of the First Regiment, the tents of the enlisted men were not pitched, but all floors were laid and pins located, so there was very little work for the men to do. All tents were left standing for the Second Regiment.

In the matter of drill, much more time was given to the practice of movements in extended order than in former years, nearly all drills being in battalion or regimental formation, and included instruction in advance and rear guard and outpost duty as well as the battle formation. A part of each drill, however, was devoted to the close order movements.

Daily ceremonies consisted of guard mounting and parade. Guard was mounted in the morning, and the parade was held each day at retreat. The parades were well executed in both regiments, from the first, but there was very little improvement noticed in guard duty. This was due to the absence of previous instruction, and the fact that the non-commissioned officers, as a rule, were not well instructed in their duties. There seems to be no good reason why the men should not be taught their "general orders," and the "duties of a sentinel on post," and the non-commissioned officers drilled in "posting a relief" and other duties before going to camp.

Many companies suffered both in appearance and efficiency by the presence of a number of men recruited just before camp, and attending without any previous instruction, and absolutely without knowledge of even the most simple military duties. These uninstructed recruits should not be allowed to attend camp. The main object of the annual encampment is for practical instruction in the movements that cannot be drilled in the armories during the year, and it is not right to be forced to devote so much of the time to teaching recruits the first rudiments of military drill.

A daily inspection was made of the entire camp, including the sinks, stables, kitchens, mess houses, company quarters and the

guard, and attention was called to all faults or irregularities noticed. As a rule the camp was well policed and reasonaby clean, in fact I consider it one of the cleanest camps I have ever attended. A number of the company kitchens, however, were not up to the standard of neatness, and it seemed to me that, in some cases, there was an unnecessary slopping of water around the barrels.

On the closing day of each camp a regimental inspection was made. In this ceremony I was accompanied by Captain W. E. Ellis, U. S. A.

Both regiments were inspected in heavy marching order, with full field equipment. In every company many of the rifles were found dry and rusty, no provision having been made for keeping the rifles in condition during the tour of duty. No company should ever go into camp without a supply of material for cleaning and oiling the rifles.

It seems to be the practice for the men to mark their names on articles of equipment, and in many instances to decorate the campaign hat, by the aid of colored inks or indelible pencil. Company commanders should not allow this practice, and men who wilfully deface articles of military property should be punished. It was also noticeable that many of the collar ornaments were missing, either removed or lost.

His Excellency, Governor Cobb, with his Staff, was present officially on Thursday, August 9th, and reviewed the troops. The escort duty was well performed and the troops made a very fine appearance on the review.

The Adjutant General, Inspector General, Commissary General, Surgeon General and Inspector General of Rifle Practice were present during the entire encampment in the discharge of their official duties. The above named officers also accompanied each regiment on the practice marches.

Captain Wilmont E. Ellis, Artillery Corps, U. S. A., was detailed by the War Department as inspector and instructor. Captain Ellis' interest in the work, and unfailing courtesy and patience in imparting instruction, cannot fail to bring results in increased efficiency, particularly in field maneuvers, and the handling of troops on the march.

As a whole the annual encampment of 1906 was a very successful one. The practice march during the first two days of

each week served to steady the men so that upon arrival at Augusta they were ready to settle down to the real work and routine of camp life, with the appearance and precision of seasoned soldiers. The conduct of the men throughout was excellent, in camp or on the march, not a single case of drunkenness, rowdyism or disorderly conduct was noticed, the men were uniformly courteous and obedient, cheerful in the performance of any duty, and entering into the work with an earnestness and spirit that is worthy of the highest commendation.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.

The same general conditions relative to the instruction of recruits and efficiency of non-commissioned officers, as noted in my former reports, still exist to a greater or less degree. Men are not properly instructed as recruits, before being allowed to drill with the company. It seems to be the universal custom to give a recruit a rifle and a place in the ranks, on his very first appearance at the armory. This practice not only works a lasting injury to the efficiency of the man himself, but deprives the non-commissioned officers of the valuable experience and practice, gained by actual command of men, in the school of the soldier and squad.

Non-commissioned officers are not made to sufficiently realize the authority and responsibility that belongs to them as such. They are not required, either before or after receiving their warrants, to study and perfect themselves in the duties of their several positions, and the consequence is, when called upon to exercise command or authority, a large proportion of them, through lack of knowledge and practice, are found entirely unable to efficiently perform their duties and the credit of the organization for general efficiency suffers accordingly.

In the matter of military courtesy and discipline, I think I can see an advance over last year. While in some companies the improvement is very marked, there is still need for most earnest work in this direction. There is, in all companies, too much familiarity and friendly intercourse between the officers and enlisted men when on duty or in the armories. No matter what their relative positions may be in civil life, it is absolutely necessary, in order to maintain discipline, that the enlisted man should be taught, first of all, to observe strict military courtesy,

respect and obedience towards the officer or non-commissioned officer, due to his position and rank.

SOLDIERLY APPEARANCE.

The olive drab service uniform, being practically new and well fitting, added greatly to the general appearance of the Guard at inspection. There is still, in a few companies, a tendency towards irregularity in minor articles of dress, that detracted from the otherwise fine appearance of the command. Handkerchiefs, sweaters, or large ties that prevent the coat from being buttoned at the neck, should not be allowed. If the flannel shirt is not worn, and not being an article of State issue it, of course, cannot be insisted upon, all men should appear either with or without the white collar (as directed by the commanding officer), but all should be alike. Non-commissioned officers should see that every man in his squad or section has his coat buttoned, his equipment properly adjusted, and his shoes and clothing brushed. Attention to these details by the non-coms will insure a neat and soldierly appearing command on all occasions.

CARE OF PROPERTY.

There has been a great improvement since my last inspection, in the care and preservation of military property, particularly in the cleanliness and orderly arrangement of the individual lockers. As before stated, the present equipment has entirely outgrown its quarters, and only a few of the companies have really suitable facilities for the storage and care of the property issued to them. Lockers originally designed for one uniform are now called upon to accommodate three, together with overcoat and complete field equipment.

PAPERS AND RECORDS.

I desire to again call most earnest attention to this important part of military administration, and the one most neglected. There seems to be no regularly established system for keeping company records, and while in some companies there is a wellkept and comprehensive record, in others it is practically impossible to gain any information relative to the affairs of the organization. In many instances reports and returns are incorrectly made, no retained copies are on file, and in the matter of forwarding there is a great lack of promptness. I wish the officers could in some way be made to realize the great importance and value of this work.

PERSONNEL.

As a whole, the National Guard of this State is made up of men excellent in character, sober, industrious and intelligent, anxious to learn, and from the fact that they are willing to give so much of their time to the study of military matters, and in preparation for the defence of the State and Nation in time of need, they should be given every encouragement and possible facility for improvement.

In the armories, I find the men uniformly quiet and gentlemanly, courteous and obedient to officers and others in authority, and a reasonable attention is paid to the salute and military bearing, the few exceptions noticed being manifestly due to lack of instruction rather than any intentional disrespect.

COMMISSARY GENERAL'S OFFICE, FOXCROFT, MAINE, December 31, 1906.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to herewith submit my annual report as commissary general for the year ending December 31, 1906.

In compliance with sections 8 and 11 of General Orders No. 8, I reported to the Adjutant General Saturday morning, August 4, and remained at Camp Cobb during the entire period of the encampment.

As soon as General Orders No. 8 was issued I prepared estimates of quantities of supplies required for the encampment, and advertised for bids for the same in three of the State daily papers. Proposals were received and contract awarded for the necessary supplies. The supplies were all carefully inspected when delivered at commissary headquarters, and with one exception were found to be first-class in every respect.

On Monday morning, August 6, I made an issue of rations to Capt. George M. Kavanaugh, commissary First Regiment, and he issued the same to the troops en route from Harward's to Augusta.

On Monday morning, August 13, I made an issue of rations to Captain Blaine Owen, commissary Second Regiment, and he issued the same to the troops en route from Waterville to Augusta.

While the troops were in camp an issue of rations was made every morning at nine o'clock for the three meals following. Inspections were made of the cook houses in order to ascertain what supplies if any were left over from the previous issue, and thus avoid unnecessary issue and waste.

At the close of the encampment I approved all bills of my department and forwarded the same to you for your approval and payment.

The following tables A B C D E F will give you in detail the transactions of my department.

STATE OF MAINE.

SURGEON GENERAL'S OFFICE,

PORTLAND, ME., Dec. 15, 1906.

Major Gen. Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General of State of Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my annual report for the year ending December 15, 1906.

The only change in the personnel of this Department was that by the appointment of Captain Gilbert M. Elliott, First Assistant Surgeon, First Regiment, to the position of Adjutant of First Regiment, N. G. S. M., and the appointment of Dr. Clarence F. Kendall to the position of Second Assistant Surgeon, First Regiment, in place of Charles E. Cragin, advanced to First Assistant Surgeon with rank of Captain vacated by Captain Elliott.

During the spring of 1906, in accordance with an order of the Adjutant General, an Hospital Corps was formed. While it is not an ideal formation from a military medical point of view, it is an improvement on what had preceded it, the Ambulance Corps. The selection of medical officers and the warranting of the non-commissioned officers resting with the Colonels of the respective regiments, otherwise than that the system followed is that of the regular army and presents a fair working base for the development of an Hospital Corps.

The annual encampment of 1906 presented some unusual features, namely, that of a three days' march from a distant town to Augusta, followed by three days at the regular encamp-

ment instead of six as is usual by each regiment. The men stood the three days' march well and came into camp in excellent condition and maintained that condition until their return home. Very little sickness and that of a trivial nature developed during camp. Such as did manifest itself was due to indiscretion of eating and drinking.

I can see the improvement in the management and care of the men that the company commander year after year seems to exert. I believe it is largely due to the better understanding as to the laws of health and careful living that are now better understood and observed by the officers and consequently the men. As in the encampment of 1906 this year an earnest effort was made to make the camp as hygienic and healthful as circumstances would allow. With the advent of each regiment the camp and hospitals were turned over to the Major Surgeon commanding and he was held responsible for the conditions existing during his tour of duty.

I need scarcely say that under such medical officers as Major Bradbury of the First Regiment and Major Fuller of the Second Regiment, both men of the highest standing in their professions as well as up to date in all military hygienic procedures of the day, the best conditions under the circumstances prevailed.

A thorough inspection of camp in general was made twice a day, sinks, quarters, kitchen, mess houses, rations, water, stables, and camp policing, and a report made to the Colonel commanding and Surgeon General, and in this way many abuses of previous camps were eliminated, and their injurious effect obviated.

As in my report of 1905 I wish to recommend from a sanitary point of view a few matters which seem to me to be of importance to the welfare of the men who are to be encamped on the present camp ground of the N. G. S. M. at Augusta.

First and foremost, wash water should be more plentiful. It would seem that for a comparatively small expense a surface pipe line could be laid from the Augusta Water Works main at the foot of the hill so that a sufficient supply of water could be in readiness for bathing and ordinary purposes; at a comparatively small expense shower baths with canvas sides could be erected that would be of great convenience to men and officers and conducive to health and efficiency.

I would also recommend to your office that if more land cannot be obtained in the rear of the camp so as to move the stables and sinks at least fifty feet farther back from the present site of cook houses and mess houses, that the mess houses and cook houses should be moved at least fifty feet forward from where they are. There should be an absolute rule that no cook or cookee, helper or hanger-on should be allowed to sleep in either kitchen or mess house. This rule is broken year after year and a guard should be placed until at least the practice is broken.

I would recommend that each mess house and kitchen receive every year just before the encampment a thorough coat of whitewash outside and in; that the tables and floors of mess house and kitchen be painted and that the drop windows of the kitchen and serving shelf be covered with zinc or a coat of enamel paint.

I would respectfully recall to your attention the recommendtion made by me in my report of last year, as to the propriety and good of the service of having a medical officer on every examining board for the promotion or commission of an officer and for the reasons there given.

By permission of the Adjutant General, it was my duty and pleasure to attend the annual meeting of the Association of Military Surgeons of the United States held at Buffalo.

I beg leave to give a somewhat extended report of the meeting, as I think it is of the greatest importance that the State should be represented by at least its Majors of the different regiments, as well as the Surgeon General of the State.

To General Farnham, Adjutant General, my thanks are especially due for many kindnesses received during the past year. To my associate officers and to the enlisted men with whom I have been in contact, my thanks are due for many courtesies received.

Gen. A. B. Farnham, Adjutant General of Maine SIR:-

REPORT ON THE ASSOCIATION OF MILITARY SURGEONS OF THE UNITED STATES FOR 1906.

The Fifteenth Annual Meeting of the Association of Military Surgeons of the United States, held at Buffalo, on the 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th of October, was a superb manifestation of the value of such an organization to the military forces of our country, and, in particular, to the National Guard.

The medical department in most of the State forces is still in an unorganized condition, the old regimental relation usually persisting. But, while these forces in times of peace are independent bodies operating under the titles of National Guard or Militia along lines uncontrolled by the general government, in times of war they would be drawn into the national service and subjected to the rules and regulations of the War Department. Recognizing the necessity then for uniformity of conduct and qualifications as a preparation for war service, Surgeon General Nicholas Senn, then of Milwaukee, now of Chicago, with his accustomed sagacity, evolved the idea of organizing the surgeons of the State forces into an association for mutual improvement and growth, being-to quote his own words-"too modest at the beginning even to hope for a union of the National Guard surgeons with those of the Regular Army and Navy."

The instant recognition of the value of this procedure, not only by the medical officers of the National Guard, but by those of the Army, Navy and Public Health and Marine Hospital Service, was so marked that its scope was promptly extended to include all the public services.

The Association thus organized—the Association of Military Surgeons of the United States—is now in its seventeenth year of existence, and every year has demonstrated with increasing emphasis its value to the military services. Its meetings have been attended, with due appreciation of the honor, by several Presidents of the United States, by numerous Governors of commonwealths, and by Cabinet Members, Generals, Admirals, and other high military officials, all of whom united in their recognition of its merits.

In 1902 it was chartered by Special Act of Congress, which provided, among other things, that it became a part of the official duties of the Secretaries of War, the Navy and the Treasury to participate in its work.

From the beginning it has published its proceedings, for nine years in annual volumes, for one year as a quarterly magazine, and, during the rest of its existence, as a monthly. This magazine has been one of the most successful, as well as one of the most authoritative and influential professional periodicals ever issued. Its circulation covers the entire world, and its contents are of such a character that no National Guard medical officer can be efficient who does not systematically read and digest them.

Nearly every State sends official delegates to its meetings, the delegations varying in size from four to ten members, their expenses being fully paid, the benefits to the State to be derived from their attendance upon the meeting being justly regarded as worth many times the amount of the expense incurred. Foreign governments send representatives freely, a liberality which may be recognized when it is considered that the attendance of each delegate costs his government no less than \$1,000.00. That of the Chinese government is much more, and yet China has sent to each of the two last meetings three delegates, involving an expense to that supposedly barbarous nation of no less than \$5,000.00.

The work of the meeting at Buffalo in September, at which I had the honor to be present as a member of the Association, and by the authority of our State; was of a high character. The session was momentous on account of the incidence of the

prize essay for this year upon a subject of interest to the National Guard. The gold medal was awarded to Major James Evelyn Pilcher, the Secretary and mainspring of the Association, for an essay upon "The Training of the Medical Officer of the State Forces to Best Qualify Him for Local Service and for Mobilization with National Troops." Major Pilcher expressly emphasized the fact that,

"Military medicine and surgery is a specialty, not difficult of acquisition it is true, but nevertheless a specialty, proper familiarity with which is essential to the proper performance of the medical attendance upon a body of military men, be it a separate company, a battalion, a regiment, a division or a corps.

"To qualify in the specialty of military medicine and surgery, the newly appointed medical officer must become familiar in addition to the features of ordinary civilian practice—with,

- "I. The special professional knowledge included under-
 - 1. Military medicine.
 - 2. Military surgery.
 - 3. Military hygiene.
- "II. Medico-military administration including-
 - I. The selection of men.
 - 2. Definite organization of work.
 - 3. The command of men.
 - a. The Hospital Corps.
 - b. The sick.
 - 4. Camp location and organization.
 - 5. Field hospital construction and composition.
 - 6. The instruction and drill of the sanitary soldier.

"III. The evolution and maintenance of a medico-military esprit de corps.

- 1. National patriotism and State loyalty.
- 2. Contact with men and literature.

"It is evident then that the work of the military medical officer is of three kinds, medical, military and patriotic."

I regret that it is impossible to quote the whole of this forcible presentation of a subject of so much moment to our own forces. The essay is to be published in full and copies are to be furnished to every Regimental, Brigade and Division Commander in the State forces, while, through the Journal of the Association, it will be widely distributed among medical officers. No Regimental Commander should fail to read it with the greatest care, and the adoption of its recommendations should be made an immediate part of his work. I may, however, while not presenting the whole essay at this time, include with advantage to us the conclusions at which the distinguished essayist arrived in closing his essay.

"I. There is need of special study upon the part of the medical officers of the National Guard and State troops to fit themseles for work in their own forces, not only in local service, but in connection with the national services in time of war and in peaceful mobilization.

"2. The most essential feature in the effort to secure harmonious action with the other State troops and with the national forces is uniformity of training particularly along the lines of medico-military administration.

"3. The most important element of the medical officer's training is confessedly the highest grade of efficiency in military hygiene, medicine and surgery. But of great importance and overlapping these to a considerable degree, is a familiarity with medico-military administration, without which indeed the proper practice of military medicine, surgery and hygiene will be impossible. The medical officer must become deeply acquainted with the proper methods of selecting recruits. He must be able to control his men, commanding the respect, not only of the Hospital Corps, but of the sick under his direction; he must be an authority beyond dispute upon camp location and organization; he must understand the principles and practice of field hospital construction and composition; he must have experience in the instruction and drill of the sanitary soldiers; and he must be prepared to protect his service and assist his comrades by a thorough acquaintance with the records of his department.

"4. To crown all these and to add to his efficiency in every respect there must have developed in him an enthusiasm based upon loyalty to the nation and interest in his profession, which shall impel him at all times to labor unceasingly and incessantly for the good of the service which has honored him with its commission. "By pursuing then the lines of work and of thought, which have been altogether too inadequately suggested, the medical officer of the National Guard of the United States will find his department *semper paratus* for all the emergencies of peace within the limits of the commonwealth which he is serving, and ever ready, in case the dark clouds of national or international conflict should overshadow the horizon of the nation's glory, to at once unite and coalesce with the forces which the mother country has maintained as a nucleus about which all military operations should center."

In addition to this leading paper of the occasion, there were over sixty other papers contributed to the work of the meeting by men of the highest reputation in the military and naval services, among which were contributions from the Surgeon General of the Japanese Navy, the Chief Surgeon of the Russian Army in Manchuria, a Surgeon General of the German Army, the Chief Surgeon of the city of Paris, a professor in the Military Medical School of Mexico, the Chief Surgeon of the Army of Pacification in Cuba, and the head of the Medical Department of the Army of the Philippines.

To give the details of the individual contributions would be hardly practicable, but it is worth while to mention that the meetings of the Association were divided into seven parts devoted respectively to—

1. Administration work and the prize essay.

2. Military surgery.

3. Contact with the local authorities in a public meeting, at which addresses were made by the Mayor and other high officials, and at which the foreign delegates were decorated with the insignia of the Association in a manner so effective as to strongly impress them and the public with the power of the Association.

- 4. Military medicine.
- 5. Military hygiene.
- 6. Military medical history and description.
- 7. Military medical administration.

In addition to the seven business sessions of the Association referred to, there were afforded many opportunities for personal acquaintance with the representatives of other States, other countries, and our own national services. Luncheons, dinners and receptions galore were tendered to the members of the Association. The United States government placed at its disposal a revenue cutter for an excursion down Lake Erie, and other courtesies upon the part of the local authorities and individuals were without number.

At the election of officers, the Association chose for its President the President of the Army Medical School, an Assistant Surgeon General of the Army, who regards his election as the highest honor he has received in a long and eventful military career. The First Vice President is an Admiral of the Navy, the Second Vice President an Assistant Surgeon General of the Public Health and Marine Hospital Service, and the Third Vice President the Surgeon General of the Keystone State, which has for many years been one of the most active supporters of the Association, never failing to send to its meetings a large delegation with expenses fully paid.

The next convention was appointed to meet at Jamestown, Va., during the continuance of the Jamestown Ter-Centennial Exposition, where the navies of the world will be mobilized in one magnificent fleet, and the military forces of our States will be accumulated in large numbers, and where the gathering of military surgeons will be certainly not the least, if we may not say the most important event.

In conclusion let me quote the words of the late President of the Association in his annual address at Buffalo, when he remarked that,

"In this great world wherever a soldier is camped, or out on the ocean, where the great navies of every nation float, regardless of what flag flies over them, the beneficent work of this Association is now felt, and soon in thousands of homes, humble or grand, from which a soldier or sailor may come, glad hearts welcoming home the dear one, saved from a needless death, will give thanks to the men whose care and skill have made this possible. Our work has only begun. There is very much to do in the years to come. In the next great war, the eyes of all nations will look to the Medical Staff for such action as will prevent needless sacrifice of human life, and woe to those in authority, who by carelessness or ignorance, allow preventable diseases to decimate our camps, or wounded men to suffer and die for want of protection and supplies.

"There is much to stimulate us in our work; the field is broad; the harvest great, and it will continue until the end."

I had the pleasure of representing the State of Maine at a number of these meetings, and have not failed to derive the very highest advantage from each one of them. I believe that the State should send a large representation to future meetings and thus come into accord with the other States of our nation, for Maine, which is the leader in so many respects, cannot afford to fall to the rear in this, the greatest and most effective movement of modern times.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

STATE OF MAINE.

Office of Inspector General of Rifle Practice, Portland, December 12, 1906.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of small arms practice in the National Guard of the State of Maine, for the season ending November 1, 1906:

Thanks to a hard winter's work on the indoor ranges, in which practice in the prone position was made a feature, the riflemen of the Guard entered upon the outdoor range season May 1st, better prepared than ever before to achieve good results.

That the season has not shown the gain in qualification which should have resulted, is due to the ever-present problem of ranges. Companies A, B, E and L of the First Infantry and the Naval Reserve were practically without opportunity for practice. Very little practice was accomplished on the City of Portland range, for the erection of additional dwellings near the range has rendered more frequent the protests against shooting which are almost always to be heard when practice is conducted near thickly settled sections. Some of the organizations mentioned succeeded in doing a little work but it was desultory in character and adds little to the figure of merit. Practice on the City of Lewiston range was somewhat hampered by complaints of stray bullets, though during the latter part of the season when there was considerable shooting no complaints were recorded. Company M of the Second Infantry was without range facilities for the greater part of the season but the completion of the State range remedies this.

The Portland organizations feel keenly the lack of range facilities and if an adequate range site can be found and equipped within reasonable distance of the city the figure of merit for the Guard will show an immediate and substantial increase. Extensive and quite thickly settled suburbs make it difficult to secure a sufficient amount of land for a range with the five or even ten-cent limit of the electric cars and to go beyond such limits would render a range inaccessible. Diligent inquiry and no little investigation of surrounding territory have failed to disclose a suitable range site for the Portland organizations but it is hoped that one will yet be discovered.

Numerous changes in the roster of the Guard are responsible for decreased qualification in some instances. Changes in the list of company commanders nearly always affect small arms practice. During the interregnum between the resignation of a captain and the qualification of his successor there is usually a cessation of the sustained effort which alone produces the desired result in figure of merit. Under Special Course "C," where firing must be conducted at least three ranges if the company is to secure standing worthy of mention, nothing short of a regular program strictly adhered to will secure a high standing. And such a program can neither be intelligently planned nor effectively carried out if a company is to be handicapped by frequent changes in its commissioned strength.

The adoption of my recommendation that proficiency in small arms practice be made a requisite to commission and warrant has borne excellent fruit in so far as it has been applied to examinations for commission. The returns from the several companies this year show a much clearer understanding of the regulations than was apparent last year. A majority of the annual returns were received promptly and in proper form, but a small percentage of delinquents has delayed not only this report but the State's annual return to the War Department under the provisions of Special Course "C."

Two things are required to place the State's figure of merit where it should be: Adequate ranges and sustained effort on the part of company commanders in conducting qualification practice. This department will do all that it can to supply the first requisite but commanding officers themselves must furnish the latter.

FIGURE OF MERIT.

The recapitulation of qualification, as shown in the report of this department to the Military Secretary under date of December 10, 1906, is as follows:

Compared with the recapitulation of 1905, the above figures show a decrease of seven in the number of Expert Riflemen; an increase of four in the number of Sharpshooters; a decrease of 36 in the number of Marksmen; a decrease of 28 in the number of First-Classmen; a decrease of one in the number of Second-Classmen; a decrease of 95 in the number of Third-Classmen; an increase of 182 in the number of Fourth-Classmen; and a decrease of 6.84 in the individual figure of merit for the State.

COMPARATIVE FIGURE OF MERIT.

Company D, First Infantry, Norway, for the third time has the honor of leading the State in figure of merit, increasing its splendid figure of 138.23 for 1905 to 143 for 1906. Sixteen of the company qualified as Expert Riflemen, eleven as Sharpshooters, and the remaining twenty-three as Marksmen. Company L, Second Infantry, Houlton, is in second place for the first time, its figure being 115.28, as against 76.82 last year. Company M, First Infantry, Westbrook, takes third honors with a figure of 82.75, as against 60.88 last year. Company B, Second Infantry, Lewiston, is fourth with a figure of 74.18, as against 57.44 last year. Company F, First Infantry, Sanford, is fifth with a figure of 70 as against 61.30 last year. The comparative figure of merit for the three years under Special Course "C" is as follows:

INDOOR PRACTICE.

Under the immediate supervision of Major John J. Dooley, Assistant Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, indoor rifle practice was taken up in earnest during the winter of 1905-6. Practically all the different organizations secured some practice and in many armories the work was conducted with such system that every officer and man in the command was thoroughly

instructed in this most important preliminary to outdoor range practice.

In Cumberland County and in Lewiston and Auburn, leagues were organized and prizes provided for the competing teams, the tournaments lasting throughout the winter months. The teams were made up of ten men each, thus making it certain that during the winter nearly all the men in the companies forming the leagues would have some match experience. An extremely successful indoor competitior was held at the Portland armory Fast Day, participated in by men from widely scattered parts of the State.

While the indoor work of 1905-6 produced excellent results, the time consumed in the construction of ranges prevented the early adoption of a system of qualification. This defect will be remedied during the present winter and next year's report will give full details in regard to indoor qualification.

The entire system of indoor work is under the direction of Major Dooley and the success which has always attended his efforts in other directions is ample assurance that the Guard of this State will take high rank on the gallery ranges.

THE STATE OF MAINE RIFLE TEAM.

Pursuant to instructions from your office, a rifle team was selected to represent the National Guard of the State of Maine at the second annual tournament of the New England Military Rifle Association at Wakefield, Mass., July 23-28, 1906.

The team was selected after a competition at Brunswick in which special attention was given to the points in which the team of the previous year showed weakness. The names of the fifteen men thus selected were as follows:

Captain John W. Nash, Co. D, First Infantry. Captain Arthur H. Field, Co. B, Second Infantry. First Lieutenant Daniel W. Wentworth, Co. F, First Infantry. First Lieutenant Ernest F. Kinmond, Co. M, First Infantry. Second Lieutenant Moses P. Stiles, Co. D, First Infantry. First Sergeant Charles A. Marston, Co. D, First Infantry. Chief B. M. Louis S. Heseltine, First Division, Naval Reserve. Sergeant William P. Marston, Co. D, 1st Infantry. Sergeant William Smith, Co. F, First Infantry. Sergeant Fred L. Snell, Co. C, First Infantry. Sergeant Walter C. Leavitt, Co. D, First Infantry. Corporal George T. Tubbs, Co. D, First Infantry. Corporal Sanger S. Maxim, Co. D, First Infantry. Private Ulric J. Labrecque, Co. M, First Infantry.

In general orders from your office, the above-named officers and men were constituted the State of Maine Rifle Team, the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice being named as the team captain and Captain Gilbert M. Elliott, Adjutant, First Infantry, as team Adjutant and Quartermaster.

It being impossible to arrange for team practice prior to departure from the State, I had Lieutenant Moses P. Stiles, the team coach, visit each member of the team at least once before leaving for Wakefield, giving all team members the benefit of individual coaching on their home ranges.

Four of the six New England States were represented in the New England Interstate Match, which was shot July 26th and 27th, Maine having the honor to finish in second place, 198 points ahead of Rhode Island which wrested second place from Maine the year previous by the narrow margin of four points. The match was won for the second time by Massachusetts, the Bay State Team displaying the splendid form which afterward won it second position in the National Match at Sea Girt, N. J. The summarized scores of the four competing teams in the Interstate follow:

The Maine totals furnish both gratification and disappointment. The work of the 1905 team convinced me that slow-fire work at 600 yards was one of Maine's weaknesses and this year's team members were urged to give it special attention. The desired increase was not secured, however, and the team's total at this range was one point under the 1905 total. This disappointment was more than offset, I am pleased to report, in the team's work on the skirmish field where it was particularly weak in 1905. The skirmish total in 1905 was 630. This year it was 759, but 16 points below the Massachusetts team total. This was an average of 61 7-12 per man, an average which was exceeded but by few National Guard teams in the National Match of 1906. The detailed score of the Maine Team follows:

SUMMARY.

In the other matches of the New England meet, the Maine Riflemen acquitted themselves with honor. Company D, First Infantry, Norway, for the second time won the Cadet trophy match for company teams at 200 and 500 yards. A second team from this company and also a team representing Company F, First Infantry, Sanford, made excellent showings in the Second Company Team Match for a trophy presented by Company D of Norway. A team representing the First Infantry finished well in the Bancroft Match at 300 and 600 yards, open to teams of six from regimental or battalion organizations. The Maine team was made up wholly of Company D men, hence was a company team shooting against regimental teams, yet it had the good fortune to win third place, giving each member of the team a handsome medal. In the individual matches Maine took its full share of prizes; Lieutenant Moses P. Stiles, Company D, First Infantry, won the New England aggregate and Lieutenant Daniel W. Wentworth, Company F, First Infantry, won the Schuman re-entry match at 500 yards. A number of minor prizes were won by various members of the Maine contingent.

Lieutenant Stiles is entitled to the full credit for the advance which Maine showed in the New England Interstate Match this year. His careful coaching prior to the departure of the team for Massachusetts and his excellent judgment in coaching the team during the match—to the limited extent which coaching is possible under present rules—were the largest factors in Maine's success. Barring the illness of Captain Arthur H. Field, Second Infantry, who was stricken with rheumatism during the meet, the trip was very enjoyable. The officers of the New England Military Rifle Association exerted themselves to make visitors at home, and the painstaking efficiency of Captain Gilbert M. Elliott, the team Adjutant and Quartermaster, was again noticeable throughout the tour of duty.

COMPANY D AT SEA GIRT.

Though Maine was not represented by a State team in the National Match at Sea Girt, N. J., this year, a team of six men from Company D, First Infantry, attended the meet and shot in several of the matches of the National Rifle Association of America. The credit for organizing the team belongs to Captain John W. Nash of Company D, who overcame many difficulties which would have been insurmountable to an officer of less enthusiasm. Though made up entirely from one company, the team was authorized in special orders from regimental headquarters to represent the First Infantry in the National Regimental Match. The team was composed of the following officers and men:

> Captain John W. Nash. Second Lieutenant Moses P. Stiles. Sergeant William P. Marston. Sergeant Walter C. Leavitt. Sergeant Ferdinand F. Swan. Corporal Sanger S. Maxim.

Captain Nash, Lieutenant Stiles and Sergeants Marston, Leavitt and Swan shot as a team of five in the Company Team Match, open to the entire military forces of the country, and succeeded in winning third place, with a total but five points behind Company H of the Sixth Massachusetts which won the match. The match called for two sighting and seven counting shots at each range and the individual scores of the Maine men were as follows:

Shooting as a regimental team, the Norway men had the honor to finish third in a large field entered for the National Regimental Team Match. That a team drawn from a single company should be able to successfully compete with teams selected from full regiments speaks volumes for the pluck and skill of the Norway men and entitles them to warm commendation from their regiment. The match conditions called for two sighting and ten counting shots at 200, 600 and 1,000 yards, the individual scores of the Maine men being as follows:

A team of three was entered in the Tyro match, but did not win a place. In the Dupont Tyro match at 800 yards, Sergeant Marston won second place with a score of 34 out of a possible 35; Sergeant Swan seventh place with a score of 29; and Sergeant Leavitt eighth place with a score of 28. In the Leech Cup match at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards, Lieutenant Stiles made 32, 30 and 31 out of possible 35's at the respective ranges, but in company with a number of other excellent riflemen found himself just outside the prizes.

All in all, the work of the Norway men reflected great credit upon the National Guard of this State and it is a pleasure to this department to place their scores on record with this brief word of appreciation.

THE STATE RIFLE COMPETITION.

The State Rifle Competition was delayed till the latter part of the season, hoping that it would be possible to complete the State range at Hallowell in time for this year's competition. When it became evident that this would be impossible, the competition was ordered for October 15, 16 and 17, on the range of Company K, First Infantry, Brunswick.

Though late in the season we were favored with ideal weather for shooting and the winning team in each regimental competition bettered the previous regimental record for company teams.

The Inter-Regimental match, shot on Wednesday, the 17th, was without question the finest exhibition of military rifle shooting that the State has ever seen. Each regiment was represented by a team of ten men, each man firing two sighting and ten counting shots at 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards. Each team at every stage of the match averaged better than "centers" and the shooting was remarkably even throughout, arousing the keenest rivalry and bringing out the best there was in every man. At 200 yards the First made 404, the Second, 403. At 300 yards the Second made 411 and the First, 414. At 500 yards the Second passed the First with a team total of 437, against 430 for the First. This brought the teams to the final stage of the match with a difference of three points, the Second's total being 1251 and the First's 1248. At 600 yards each team made 402 and the match ended with the Second three points to the good. The gold medal, presented by General Farnham to the high individual, was won by Lieutenant Moses P. Stiles, Company D, First Infantry. Corporal George T. Tubbs of the same company, with the same aggregate as Lieutenant Stiles, was awarded the silver medal presented by General Farnham. Sergeant William P. Marston of the same company received the third prize.

In the Naval Reserve Competition between teams of five men from each division, the First Division team won with an aggregate of 224 as against 221 for the Second Division. Chief B. M. Louis S. Heseltine of the First Division was awarded the silver medal for the highest individual aggregate. Chief G. M. Harold S. Davis of the Second Division was awarded the second individual prize. The First Infantry was represented by but five teams in the Regimental Competition, though six out of seven members of the headquarters team reported at the range. The companies unrepresented were: A, B, C, E, F, I, and L. The winners and the score totals follow:

> First Prize—Company D, \$50.00—Score, 428. Second Prize—Company M, \$25.00—Score, 401. Third Prize—Company K, \$15.00—Score, 350. Fourth Prize—Company G, \$10.00—Score, 300.

The Second Infantry was represented by eleven company teams and a team from headquarters. The only company unrepresented was Company I of Eastport. The winners and score totals follow:

> First Prize—Company B, \$50.00—Score, 404. Second Prize—Company F, \$25.00—Score, 375. Third Prize—Company C, \$15.00—Score, 359. Fourth Prize—Company G, \$10.00—Score, 359.

To Company B, the Colonel Newcomb Trophy; to Company F, the Major Presson Trophy; to Company H, the Captain Hill Trophy; to Private Albert E. McCarty, Company M, the Byron Boyd Trophy.

During the competition, I had the assistance of a number of the officers of the Guard as range and statistical officers, and their efficiency had much to do with the smooth conduct of the several matches.

With the completion of the new State range it will be possible to plan with certainty for the State competition of another year and the vexatious delays of the present season will be done away with.

THE STATE RANGE.

It is believed that the completion of the State range in the city of Hallowell, within easy access from the State camp ground at Augusta, will add materially to the upbuilding of small arms practice. If the plan meets the approval of the commanding officers of the two regiments, I should like to see the State range open during encampment at such hours as will not interfere with the regular drills and ceremonies. Such a plan would enable company commanders to insure the practice of those men who find it next to impossible to visit their home ranges during the season. There is always a certain percentage of men who will not report for target practice at home and if they can be sent to the State range during encampment, the companies will get the benefit in figure of merit. The range should be under the supervision of this department at such a time and the scores made would be reported to the company commanders, the ammunition used in such qualification to be charged against the next year's allotment of the companies.

The new range permits practice sufficient to qualify men in the sharpshooter class and encampment practice would enable some men to secure sharpshooter rating who are now prevented by inadequacy of home ranges.

The range has been carefully constructed and its limited use during October indicates entire satisfaction in its future use. Future practice will be carefully watched and if defects are discovered they will be immediately remedied. The permanency of its construction should make the item of repairs inconsequential and the range as it stands is a valuable asset to the military department of Maine.

In an earlier part of this report I have alluded to the range situation in Portland and mentioned certain complaints at Lewiston. I trust that both situations may be satisfactorily met this coming Spring in time to give all the organizations concerned early practice. With Portland and Lewiston supplied with ranges which will leave company commanders no grounds for just complaint, the State will be very well equipped for ranges and will be able to add from year to year to the equipment of the smaller ranges.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The commanding officers of both regiments and the Naval Reserve unite in saying that the Guard is showing direct advancement in rifle practice as a result of the visit of State of Maine teams to the New England and National competitions. I therefore recommend that the National Guard of the State of Maine be represented next year by a State team in the New England Interstate Match at Wakefield, Mass., and in the National Trophy Match at such place as the National Board for the promotion of Rifle Practice may select.

I would also urge upon the attention of the several organizations the importance of being represented in the company and regimental competitions at such meets—more especially the New England meet, since the expense attendant upon a trip to Wakefield for a team of five or six men is not beyond the resources of any company.

I renew my recommendations of the past two years that proficiency in the knowledge of small arms practice be a requisite to the warranting of non-commissioned officers, believing that with non-commissioned officers thoroughly acquainted with the present system of qualification the State's figure of merit may be materially increased.

REPORT OF CAPTAIN W. E. ELLIS.

FORT WILLIAMS, MAINE,

August 23, 1906.

The Military Secretary, War Department, Washington, D. C. (Through Headquarters Department of the East, Governor's Island, New York):

SIR:—In accordance with instructions from your office, I have the honor to submit herewith my report of my tour of duty with the National Guard of the State of Maine, during the period of August 4th to August 18th inclusive, (S. O. 150 H. D. E. June 29, 1906).

TRANSPORTATION.

Each regiment mobilized at a point about twenty miles from Augusta, and marched to that city by easy stages. The concentration was made by rail.

(a) The first Regiment detrained at Harwards, twenty-two miles by rail below Augusta on the river. The march was begun about 11.30 A. M., August 6th. The troops camped at Iceboro after a march of seven miles, the weather being excessively hot, and many of the men suffering considerable discomfort. The march was taken up at 7.30 A. M. on the 7th, and the regiment camped on the Gardiner Estate, the camp being an ideal one in every respect. At 7.00 A. M. on the 6th, the regiment marched from Gardiner to the State Camp Ground at Augusta, a distance of eight miles, the command arriving in very good condition.

(b) The Second Regiment mobilized at Waterville by rail, August 13th, marching from the station to the Fair Grounds at 4.00 P. M., and camping for the night at the Fair Grounds, a distance of a mile and a half from the city. On the morning of the 14th, at 6.00 A. M., the regiment marched by the river road, a distance of nine miles and encamped at a farmhouse between Vassalboro and Riverside, the troops being transported from the Fair Grounds at Waterville by electric cars. The regiment marched from Vassalboro to the State Camp Ground on the morning of the 15th, breaking camp at 6.20 A. M., and arriving at Augusta at the State Camp Ground at 11.20 A. M. The weather for this march was all that could be desired, the road was in good condition, and the troops were in excellent spirits. There were no hardships of any kind, nor any serious sickness on the march.

(c) The movements of the troops were under the control of the Adjutant General's Office, but the details of transportation and subsistence for each regiment were turned over by the chiefs of departments to the regimental staff officers concerned.

(d) The troops carried no baggage with them to the respective places of mobilization, except their field kits—so practically the time consumed in entraining and detraining was only that required for the men themselves to enter or leave the cars. This time averaged about two minutes.

(e) The time consumed in concentration for the First Regiment was five and one-half hours; for the Second Regiment nine hours; counting in each case from the earliest time of departure of any individual company to the latest hour of arrival of any company.

ENCAMPMENT.

The encampment was by regiments, lasting in each case from Wednesday to Saturday noon.

The camp is located on high ground, on a plateau about one mile from the State House, and the same distance from the railroad station, which is on the main line of the Maine Central Railroad. There is no rail connection between the Maine Central and the encampment. The electric railway from Augusta to Winthrop passes at a distance of about 300 yards from headquarters. The area of the camp ground is 71 acres.

(a) There are three permanent one-story frame buildings on the south side of the encampment—the headquarters build-

ing, the mess and commissary building, and the hospital. The headquarters building has sleeping accommodations for eight officers, and a reception room. The second building consists of the headquarters mess room with kitchen in the same building, and another portion of the building is used as the issue room for subsistence supplies for the troops. The hospital has a dispensary and office, and rooms for accommodating sixteen patients.

(b) There are two large two-story store rooms on the north side of the grounds, used for storing tentage, camp equipage, and ordnance material.

(c) There are two rows of single-story frame buildings on the west side of the grounds near the flanks of company streets. The nearer row is used for mess rooms and kitchens, and the other for sinks. These buildings are so allotted that each company (for a two-regiment camp) has its own mess room, kitchen and sink. All buildings are frame, rough finished.

The camp ground will accommodate two regiments, each of about 500 men. There is ample space for drill ground in close order, but the space is rather restricted for extended order formation. About 1,000 troops can be accommodated in the camp without crowding.

All tents are floored. For the First Regiment, tents were pitched and prepared for the reception of troops by civilians employed by the Quartermaster General, except tents for the enlisted men. For these tents the floors were down, and the tent pins were located, so that there was very little work for the men to do. All tents were left standing for the reception of the Second Regiment. No regular troops participated in the encampment.

SEWAGE SYSTEM.

(a) There is no water system installed at the Camp Ground. Water is hauled by a contractor, who keeps the barrel filled for the use of each company. This barrel is used for drinking and cooking purposes, and the overflow received into a barrel for washing purposes. The water is supplied from Glenwood Spring near the State House, a spring which has been used for years as a source of drinking water by a great portion of the city people. There is no surface drainage nor sewage to contaminate the spring.

(b) There is no sewer system. The sinks are earth closets, and all are emptied by a scavenger early each morning. The line of sinks is about 50 feet from the cook houses. After fæces are removed, sinks are sprinkled with sawdust, and twice during the day the fæces are habitually covered with slaked lime.

(c) Drinking water was not boiled.

CLOTHING AND EQUIPAGE.

The dress uniform, blue overcoats, and service uniform were shipped by rail direct to the encampment. On the march the command wore khaki, and carried clothing rolls and mess kits, each man being provided with one blanket and a poncho.

HOW SUBSISTED.

(a) On the march.

The ration of beans, bacon, hard bread, coffee and sugar was issued but in slightly larger quantities than prescribed for the army ration. Individual cooking was contemplated and in most cases this was followed. Coffee for each company was generally made in a camp kettle.

(b) In camp.

Each company had its own mess and food was prepared in the usual method employed in garrison. Each cook had a helper, sometimes a soldier, and sometimes a civilian. Nearly all cooks had had previous experience. Kitchens were not as a rule kept any too clean.

The army ration supplemented by milk, butter and eggs was used. Quantities were not issued by strict regulations. Experience was the guide in making the first issue on the basis of 50 men per company. Thereafter the commissary inspected each company kitchen daily, noting what was on hand, and subsequent issues were made accordingly.

DRILLS AND CEREMONIES.

The daily ceremonies during the encampment, were guard mounting and dress parade, both held in dress uniform. Both regiments showed the necessity for further instruction in the duties connected with guard mounting. At parades, the troops presented a creditable appearance. There was a marked improvement in both ceremonies towards the close of the encampment. No field exercises were held during the encampment at Augusta, but were practiced on the march (See par. 12). The troops were drilled in formations for attack, and both regiments showed marked improvement in this respect in the short time that was available for these exercises. Instruction was given in advance guard and outpost duty in connection with the march into camp (See par. 12). Practically all of the drills conducted in this camp were battalion drills, except the latter part of the last drill, which was devoted to the battle formation of the regiment in three lines. Special attention was devoted to such close order formations as would be required in the ceremonies of guard mounting and of parade. Drilling in extended order was given great prominence, with the idea of leading up to the battle formation of the regiment. Considering the limited time available for drilling purposes, the progress in all practical exercises was very marked.

I would rate relative progress and efficiency in the following order (the best being first):

- 1st. Extended order, battalion and regiment.
- 2nd. Dress parade.
- 3rd. Close order, battalion.
- 4th. Guard mounting.

PERSONNEL AND DISCIPLINE.

Staff officers were almost without exception well fitted by natural aptitude for their specific duties. In my opinion officers connected with matters of supply sometimes permitted their zeal to carry them too far, in that they performed manual and clerical labor that could and should have been performed by details of enlisted men.

Field officers and older company officers were usually well informed. Quite a proportion of the company officers had been recently commissioned and further service will be necessary to develop their capabilities. Most of the officers showed commendable zeal in the performance of their duties, and generally speaking, a healthy regimental spirit was manifest. It was evident that many of the company commanders had not, previous to the encampment, conducted systematic instruction with a view to fitting the men for their camp duties. Noncommissioned officers were usually not well instructed in their duties as guides.

The manual of arms was very good in most of the companies and excellent in some. Some of the companies had been brought up to full strength by the addition of recruits just before going to camp, and consequently suffered in appearance and drill. More or less laxity was noted in the following respects:

I. Hat ornaments were frequently missing, particularly the company letters.

2. Many rifles were dry and rusty at the final inspection. In some cases, corrosion had gone so far as manifestly to injure the pieces.

3. Articles of equipment were not unfrequently marked with the name or initials of some possessor, present or past.

4. The men did not appear to have been cautioned as to care in foot gear. Many shoes were unfitted for marching purposes and some of the men wore patent leather shoes on the march.

5. Considerable ignorance was manifested on the march in the matter of constructing latrines and in trenching camp fires for cooking purposes.

6. Sanitary regulations were not as a rule properly enforced. On the march, the men appeared to fill their canteens wherever they pleased. On two different occasions I observed men filling their canteens from a well a few yards from a sink and a stable and on a lower level than these buildings.

The latrines of the permanent camp were not kept in a very cleanly condition, as a rule. This trouble might have been obviated in part, by reserving positions of each latrine for specific purposes, and I so suggested. Miscellaneous garbage was thrown into the sinks, although repeatedly noted and forbidden.

The conduct of the enlisted men in camp and on the march is worthy of high commendation. Not one case of drunkenness or disorder came to my notice.

The men appeared to be uniformly courteous to their officers as well as to myself. The very few cases of failure to salute

were obviously due to a misunderstanding of the regulations, or to inexperience.

As regards age, the men were generally fitted for military service and the physical qualifications were mostly up to the usual standard. It was noted, however, that the physique of the men from some sections of the State was better than that of the men from others.

GUARD DUTY.

Guard duty was performed with a serious intention of making it as thorough and as effective as circumstances would permit. There was very little, if any, annoying of sentinels-as camp commanders firmly discountenanced the practice. Officers and noncommissioned officers were not as well instructed as they should have been, and much of the ignorance displayed was manifestly due to a lack of careful study of the Manual of Guard Duty. This lack of instruction was particularly in evidence at the post of No. 1.

All of the sentinels that I inspected appeared to be earnest in the performance of their duties, but generally lacking previous instruction. In the majority of cases they did not carry themselves in a military manner. Outpost duty seemed to be entirely new work for most of the men who came under my observation, but they seemed to take to the work naturally and showed marked improvement as a result of the instruction given to them.

TARGET PRACTICE.

No target practice was held in camp.

A new rifle range about one mile from camp is now practically completed. The land owned by the State comprises an area of fifteen acres-there are two pits, each 100 feet long and 8 feet high on the inside. For one pit concrete and earth is used, and for the other, crib-work is used. The ranges available for one pit are 200 and 300 yards, and for the other 200, 300, 350, 400, 500, 600 and (by utilizing land not belonging to the State, and with the permission of the owner), 800 and 1,000 yards.

RECORD KEEPING.

Sick report books and roll call books were generally brought to camp. Practice as regards other books varied.

Company details were usually made from blank memoranda, or from a copy of the muster roll. Morning reports were submitted on loose sheets and retained copies were not always kept. Officers whom I questioned at random appeared to have a fair idea of the methods employed in military correspondence and in record keeping.

INSTRUCTION GIVEN DURING THE ENCAMPMENT.

(a) On the march.

Practical instruction in advance guard and outpost duty was given by me whenever opportunity permitted. The exercises that I planned were usually preceded by a talk to the officers, in which I outlined the plan to be followed and the conditions to be assumed with regard to the position of the hypothetical enemy.

For outpost work, the Cossack post was the style adopted in all cases. The disposition made by outpost commanders and commanders of the advance guard were criticised with a view to securing the greatest amount of instruction for all concerned.

All of the exercises in field work contemplated (by simulating attacks) a test of the dispositions made. When these attacks were made the phases developed were umpired by myself and other officers who kindly assisted me on my request.

After some little experiment I found the following the best disposition for purposes of instruction:

(a) On the march.

One battalion divided into two companies as advance guard commanded by its major, one company as rear guard, and the fourth company sent out in advance of the main body for the purpose of acting as a harassing column.

(b) In camp.

Three companies of the same battalion sent out to establish a typical outpost using the Cossack post formation and dispensing with a reserve. The fourth company in this case was sent out to represent a hostile force with instructions to keep itself concealed, and to attack the outpost at times confidentially communicated to company commander.

(c) In permanent camp.

A lecture was given to the officers of each regiment, pointing out the defects noted in close order formation, the best means to remedy them, and what movements should be especially practiced with a view to improving the marching of troops in columns of companies.

In the same lecture, I explained in detail the typical formation of the regiment for attack in these lines, explaining how distances could be proportionally reduced, to accommodate the formation to the limited area of the camp ground.

On the drill ground, I carefully supervised battalion drills and paid especial attention to the battle formation of the regiment.

I visited the guard and sentinels of each regiment with the inspector general, instructing officers and men when instruction was needed.

I also made it the practice to give an informal talk to all the members of the new guard at the guard tent, before the first relief was posted, elucidating points that I thought would prevent difficulty, dwelling especially upon the rules for challenging.

On the whole I was much pleased with the progress shown in all military duties, and felt that had the tour of duty been longer, still better results would have been obtained.

MISCELLANEOUS REMARKS.

I. I urgently recommend that sufficient land be purchased adjoining the western boundary of the camp to permit the line of sinks to be moved to triple their distance at least from the company kitchens.

2. I also recommend that connections should be made with the city water mains (which pass quite close to the camp on the east) so that the camp can have its own water supply. The advantages of this change are so obvious as not to require further comment.

3. No transportation accompanied the column on the march except the ambulance. It would have been a great convenience if at least one escort wagon could have accompanied the regiment on the march. The method of transportation employed was to ship supplies by rail to the station nearest to each camp and then haul the supplies from the station to the camp.

4. The Governor of the State, his Staff, and the regimental officers were very courteous to me, and I deeply appreciate the kindness extended and support given me in all my work, especially by the Adjutant General, General Augustus B. Farnham.

REPORT OF J. W. BOWYER.

U. S. S. COLUMBIA, COLON, REPUBLIC OF PANAMA, September 16, 1906.

SIR:—Complying with the instructions contained in Department's letter No. 4968-12 3713, dated August 7, 1906, I proceeded with the vessel under my command to Portland, Maine, arriving at 8 A. M. the 1st instant, and at 4 P. M., the same date, embarked on board the "Ship's Company Naval Militia of the State of Maine" for a practice cruise, and immediately proceeded to sea under easy steam, bound for Tompkinsville, Staten Island, N. Y., telegraphic instructions having been received at Portland to transfer the Ship's Company Naval Militia to the U. S. S. Tacoma at that point on the afternoon of the 4th instant. The Ship's Company, as embarked, consisted of four officers and fifty-three enlisted men, a list of whom is forwarded herewith marked "A."

2. The two divisions, into which this ship's company is divided, were assigned berthing and messing quarters on the starboard side of the main deck and were stationed at quarters with the 1st and 4th divisions of this vessel and the station billets were duplicates of those held by our own men in these divisions.

3. The outfit of the organization was very good and the men had a neat and clean appearance. The arrangement and the supply of mess outfit was particularly good, each mess bringing its own mess chest with contents complete.

4. I proceeded to sea, watches were set and special details

of the Naval Militia were required to perform duties of the corresponding rates on board ship.

5. The next day being Sunday, I inspected the ship and crew and the Naval Militia at quarters; the remainder of the day was devoted to routine work at sea and to familiarizing the Naval Militia with the ship, using the regular crew as instructors. Morris tube practice was carried on during the afternoon by the Militia gun pointers.

6. It was intended to hold target practice on the following day—the 3d—but the weather proved unfavorable and divisional drills in ordnance and seamanship were substituted.

7. The Columbia arrived at Tompkinsville, S. I., during the afternoon of the 3d and liberty was granted to the Naval Militia until the following morning. Six members of this organization overstayed liberty and four were still absent at I P. M. when the transfer was made to the Tacoma.

8. While on board this ship, the Naval Militia were required to do regular ship's work coupled with instruction in regular routine duties at sea.

9. The officers were almost entirely unfamiliar with naval matters and appeared to exercise very little control over their men.

10. The interest and zeal of both officers and men were considerably diminished, no doubt, by the great amount of seasickness, which would probably have disappeared had the cruise been longer.

11. The attention of the Department is invited to the incompleteness of this organization in the Medical, Pay, and Engineering Departments.

Reports of the officers of this vessel who acted as instructors of this Battalion are enclosed herewith marked "B," "C," and "D."

SIR:-I have the honor to submit the following report in regard to cruise of the Naval Militia of the State of Maine on this vessel.

The cruise was originally planned to last for eight days, but owing to the ship being required for other duty the Militia were transferred to the U.S.S. Tacoma within three days of coming on board.

The organization consists of five officers and 52 men divided into two divisions. One Ensign did not make the cruise. A list of the officers and men who were on board accompanies this report.

The divisions embarked at Portland, Maine, the afternoon of September 4th, and were assigned berthing and messing quarters on the starboard side of the main deck, stationed at quarters with the First and Fourth Divisions of this ship, and station billets given them corresponding with those held by our own men in those divisions.

The outfit of the organization was very good and the men had a neat and clean appearance. The arrangement and supply of mess outfit was particularly good, each mess bringing its own mess chest with contents complete.

Immediately after embarking the ship got under way and went to sea under easy steam. Watches were set and the special details of the Naval Militia detailed to correspond with our own organization.

The next day being Sunday the Commanding Officer inspected the ship and crew and Naval Militia at quarters. The remainder of the day was devoted to routine work at sea, and in familiarizing the Naval Militia with the ship, using the regular crew as instructors.

Morris tube practice was carried on during the afternoon by the Militia gun pointers.

It was intended to hold target practice on the following day, but the weather proving unfavorable, divisional drills in ordnance and seamanship were substituted and the ship put in to Tompkinsville, S. I., where she arrived during the afternoon.

Liberty was granted until the following morning, from which six of the Militia failed to return. The organization was then transferred to the U. S. S. Tacoma, on which vessel they were to complete their cruise.

While on this ship they were put to doing regular ship's work coupled with instruction in routine duties at sea.

The officers were almost entirely unfamiliar with naval matters and appeared to exercise very little control over their men. The interest and zeal of both officers and men was considerably diminished no doubt by the great amount of seasickness, which would probably have disappeared had the cruise been longer.

REPORT OF JAMES T. SMITH.

U. S. S. TACOMA,

NAVY YARD, NORFOLK, VA., September 10, 1906.

Sir:---

1. I have the honor to submit the following report on the cruise of this vessel with the Maine Naval Militia.

2. In obedience to Department's telegraphic orders of September 4th, the Maine Naval Militia, consisting of 4 officers and 53 men, were received on board, from the Columbia, at 2.30 P. M., September 4, 1906, at Tompkinsville. At 11.00 A. M., September 5, the Tacoma got under way and stood out to sea, bound for Long Island Sound.

3. As soon as the Naval Militia were received on board, the men were watched, quartered and stationed, according to their ratings, with the ship's divisions, and the officers were assigned duties with the ship's division officers. Fire quarters, collision and abandon ship drills were carried on, and the men were exercised at these stations.

At 1.50 A. M., September 6th, came to anchor in Vineyard Sound. At 6.30 A. M., got under way and stood up through Vineyard Sound. At 2.37 P. M., stopped and put triangle target over the side, and target practice was held, each gun pointer of the Militia firing 6 shots. At 3.55 P. M., finished target practice, went ahead on course, and at 5.50 P. M., came to anchor off Rockport, Mass.

At 11.10 A. M., September 7th, got under way for Portland, Me., coming to anchor in that harbor at 4.50 P. M. At 8.15 A. M., September 8th, the Maine Naval Militia left the ship.

4. The exercises during this cruise consisted of great gun drills, Morris tube practice, loading machine drill, sub-calibre practice, firing efficiency drills, signaling, and also the regular routine drills. The men were given every opportunity to assist in the handling of the anchors and chains, and the officers practiced in the use of the sextant, working out sights, and dead reckoning. Boat drill was also carried on.

5. The officers and men of the Maine Naval Militia showed zeal and aptitude for the service; and the conduct of the men while on board ship was excellent.

REPORT OF LIEUTENANT EVERETT G. SCULLY.

HEADQUARTERS SHIP'S COMPANY NAVAL RESERVES, NATIONAL GUARD OF THE STATE OF MAINE, PORTLAND, October 18, 1906.

SIR:—I have the honor to respectfully submit the following report of the cruise of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., September 1-8, 1906:

In accordance with Special Orders No. 92, four officers and fifty-three men reported aboard the U. S. S. Columbia, anchored in Portland Harbor, at 4 P. M., Saturday, September 1. I had received a wireless communication at 7 A. M. from the commanding officer of the Columbia, Commander John M. Bowyer, while the ship was well off Cape Elizabeth, requesting an earlier embarkation, but had replied immediately that I should prefer to adhere to the hour specified in the original order.

The Columbia got under way at 6 P. M., and after clearing the harbor entrance, cruised at standard speed on course S. 2° W. until later Sunday night, when course was changed to make the Nantucket Shoals Lightship. The men had been billeted and assigned to stations when they came aboard, and both officers and men took up regular sea routine as soon as the ship gathered motion. Each officer (with the exception of the Assistant Surgeon) stood in turn regular watches on the bridge with the ship officer then standing, and the men performed their share of duty on deck and aloft, handled the steering wheel, etc. Sunday afternoon the naval militiamen were given extended Morris tube practice, with the forward six-pounders, and acquitted themselves with scores above the average. From Nantucket Shoals Lightship the Columbia was set on course N. 84° W. to make the Fire Island Lightship, and speed was increased to overcome strong head winds which developed Sunday night and Monday morning. The sea grew rougher as the day advanced and practice contemplated with the heavy guns was abandoned. Later in the day the wind and sea moderated as the ship proceeded. The New York ship channel was entered about 4 P. M., and the Columbia dropped anchor off Tompkinsville, Staten Island, at 5 P. M. The naval militiamen were given shore liberty until 8 A. M. Tuesday. Five men overstayed leave.

The commanding officer of the Columbia held orders to proceed to Colon, Panama, to meet Mr. Root (Secretary of State) and party, and at 2 P. M., Tuesday, my command was transferred to the U. S. S. Tacoma, which ship arrived from Oyster Bay for the purpose. The five absentees reported aboard the Tacoma at 3.30 P. M. The men were again billeted and stationed with the regular crew of the new ship and took up their duties with the advantage of experience gained on the Columbia.

Wednesday morning the usual setting-up drill at morning quarters was followed by fire quarters and collision quarters. At the conclusion of drill the men guilty of overstaying leave were brought to the mast and sentenced to one or more day's duty in the fire-room, according to the circumstances which accompanied the individual breach of discipline. These sentences were duly carried out in each instance on the homeward trip.

The Tacoma got under way from the Tompkinsville anchorage at 11 A. M., and stood out through the ship channel steering various courses. Departure was taken from whistling midchannel buoy and course set E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. Ran on this course until 3.40, then changed to E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. The naval militiamen were worked steadily at the guns during the larger part of the afternoon, and had regular setting-up drill at afternoon quarters. At 9.07, Montauk Light being abeam, the course was changed to N. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., held until 12.34, when it was again changed to E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., and at 1.05 to E. S. E., then various courses to anchorage. Dropped anchor in Menemsha Bight, Martha's Vineyard, at 1.25 A. M.

The ship was again under way at 6.30 Thursday morning and stood up through Vineyard Sound and on various courses over the Nantucket Shoals (Inner). Chatham whistling buoy was abeam at 10.50 and course was set N. E. 1/2 E., changed at 11.50 to N. 1/2 W. The crew were mustered to general quarters at 9.15, and gunnery drill for the naval militia continued for the remainder of the morning. In the afternoon the naval militiamen were again called to quarters. A target was put over the side and the speed of the ship reduced. Target practice with the starboard six-pounders began at 2.50, the ship circling around the target at ranges varying from 1,000 to 1,000 vards. Eight men selected from my command were permitted to point and fire the guns, using blind shell. Their work was exceptionally good. Every shot was in line and close aboard and several hits were scored. Commander James T. Smith, the commanding officer of the Tacoma, had closely watched the shooting from the quarterdeck and came forward to offer his personal compliments to me. He appeared to be well pleased with the accurate work of the men. Target practice was completed at 3.35, and the ship went ahead at standard speed on course N. W. 1/4 N, changed to N. N. W. at 4.55, followed by various courses into the harbor of Rockport, Massachusetts, where the port anchor was dropped at 5.50.

Friday morning at 9 o'clock the boats of the ship were lowered and the naval militia, divided into three crews, were exercised at boat drill about Rockport Harbor until II o'clock. All the crews worked together in splendid form and, in my opinion, the drill was an exhibition of competent handling of small boats by officers and men.

At 11.10 the Tacoma got under way and stood out on course N. E., changed at 1.50 to N. 43° E. The naval militiamen were exercised at heaving the lead during this period and exhibited a working familiarity with this method of taking soundings—the result of summer drill with the lead-line at the home station. The course was changed to N. 38° E. at 3.30 to head for the Cape Elizabeth Lightship, changed from that mark to N. N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., followed by various courses standing into Portland Harbor where the port anchor was let go at 4.50 P. M. The Ship's Company Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., disembarked at 8 A. M. Saturday, September 8, 1906.

I am pleased to be able to report that the mess arrangements on both ships were very complete, and the food was invariably well-cooked and palatable. It so happened that the Columbia and the Tacoma were both short-handed and there was plenty of room on the gun-decks for the men of my command to swing without discomfort. This lack of men was also a factor in causing the assistance of the naval militiamen in the performance of the daily work about ship to be especially welcome and much appreciated. I am well satisfied with the way every member of this organization took hold of things, and was gratified to hear many kind words said of them with particular reference to their discipline, their readiness to do more than a fair share of the work, and their knowledge of drill fundamentals.

I feel it is not too much to say that the officers and men of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., acquired more valuable and practical information during this cruise than during any similar event in the history of the organization.

It is my opinion that ships of the Tacoma class are ideal for the use of naval militia on a week of sea service and I respectfully recommend that a vessel of the same type be obtained, if possible, for the next annual cruise of this command.

I was favorably impressed with the value of loading machines as demonstrated aboard the Tacoma and beg to suggest that one or more be drawn from the naval militia appropriation and installed in the armory of this Company.

Permit me to state, in conclusion, that the officers of this organization throughout the cruise found themselves in that atmosphere of friendly courtesy and kindly consideration which several periods of temporary service have enabled us to recognize as characteristic of the United States Navy.

SPECIAL REPORT OF CAPTAIN GEORGE A. BUKER.

BATH, MAINE, November 20, 1906.

Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—About 12.30 A. M. November 15th I received a telephone communication at my home from you of Special Orders No. 106, as follows:

> Augusta, Thursday, 12.15 A. M., November 15, 1906.

Special Orders, No. 106.

I. George A. Buker, Captain commanding Company C. Second Infantry, N. G. S. M., will at once parade his command under arms for the purpose of assisting in the enforcement of the laws of the State of Maine and aiding in the apprehension of Minot St. Clair Francs, a desperado who has escaped from the State Prison.

II. He will report to Bernes O. Norton, Warden of the Maine State Prison, and the constituted civil officers for instruction.

III. At the close of his tour of duty he will make a full and detailed report to this office of the service rendered.

By order of the Commander-in-Chief:

AUGUSTUS B. FARNHAM, Adjutant General.

I immediately called Warden Norton by telephone and received instructions which were to the effect that a man answering the description of Francis was seen on the afternoon of November 14th on the Wiscasset road about three miles from Woolwich, heading towards the Kennebec river, which, in the Warden's opinion, he would attempt to cross before daylight on the evening of the 15th. It was his desire for my men to patrol the west bank of the river and endeavor to capture him if he made the attempt.

I then communicated with Corporal Willis of my command, at 12.55, he being Assistant Chief Engineer of the Bath Fire Department, and ordered the Militia call of 888 sounded on the fire alarm, which is the call for mobilizing my Company. I next arranged by telephone for five rowboats, three at the north end and two at the south end of the city, for use in covering islands. I then left home for the Armory, where I arrived in fifteen minutes and found Sergeant Farrin and fourteen men. They immediately uniformed and armed themselves and in thirty-five minutes from the sounding of the alarm, or at 1.30 A. M., I had twenty-six men on the way to their positions, three miles above and two miles below Towesic, which is opposite the Armory on the Woolwich shore.

I had in the meantime conferred with City Marshal McFadden and he agreed to have his officers cover the water front of the city proper. I ordered Lieutenant Pratt with eight men to the south end of the city with instructions to cover the water front as far south as Fiddler's Reach.

Taking Sergeant Farrin and sixteen men I proceeded to the north end of the city and established first outpost of observation at the wharf of Mr. Bacon's property. This was at I.45 o'clock and the position was about one mile from the Armory. The next post was established at the Edgecomb Landing, about onefourth mile further up the river. The next and last post on the main land was at the fish-house of James Kennerson, where I had telephone communication with the Armory which was in charge of First Sergeant Erskine, who had instructions to hold the men who had been constantly arriving for further orders. This last post, on the Kennerson wharf, was directly opposite Woolwich, where three miles from the Kennebec river, the man supposed to be Francis was seen the night before.

I next took three rowboats, manned them, and proceeded to establish posts at Telegraph Point, Thorn's Island, and the north end of Lines' Island. This last post was in position at 3.30 A. M., this being the extreme left of my line, thus forming a complete line of observation from Fiddler's Reach to Chops' Point, a distance of five miles.

The men were all instructed to challenge everybody attempting to cross the river and upon their refusal to answer, or stop, to shoot to stop them. I especially cautioned the men to be sure and make no mistake, so as to avoid the possibility of injuring some innocent person. I believe that it would have been impossible for the man Francis to have crossed the river at any point between Fiddler's Reach and Chops' Point after my men were in position.

At 6.30 A. M. I called Warden Norton and told him the situation and he requested me to hold my positions until he notified me further. I ordered Sergeant Roberts to arrange for food and coffee for the men, which was carried to them in a launch.

About 9.30 A. M. I received orders from you to call in the outposts as the Warden had information that the man seen was not Francis.

I had on duty during the morning forty-one men, the only ones available as eight of my Company were out of the State on furlough.

I wish to commend the men of my command for the promptness in which they responded to every order, and their efficiency in carrying them out. The Company was dismissed in the Armory at 12.00 noon.

I also wish to express my thanks to the citizens of Bath who assisted the Company in every way in their power, providing boats, food, telephone service, etc.

I. The following announcement relative to the manner of conducting examining boards for promotion, commission or re-commission in the National Guard of this State, is hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

II. The candidate, if not a member of the National Guard, shall furnish the certificate of a reputable physician or surgeon that he is physically qualified for military service. The certificate of a medical officer of the Guard will be furnished when practicable. III. The candidate shall be required to state on honor, his citizenship, whether he has ever been conivcted of an infamous crime, whether he has ever failed to pass a previous board and if so, when and for what position he was a candidate, whether he has ever been dishonorably discharged or dismissed from the service of the United States or from the National Guard or Militia of this or any other State, whether he knows of any business or other reason that will prevent his regular attendance and faithful performance of the duties of the office for which he is a candidate. Evidence as to moral character, as to the subjects mentioned above or as to the candidate's previous record in the service may be called for by the board. Such evidence shall be under oath when practicable.

Boards are authorized to ask any questions deemed necessary during the progress of the oral, written or practical examination.

IV. All examining boards will, upon assembling for an examination, draw by lot from fifty numbers for the various grades as follows:

- For a Second Lieutenant, 8 numbers,
- For a First Lieutenant, 10 numbers,
- For a Captain, 12 numbers,
- For a Major, 15 numbers,
- For a Lieutenant Colonel, 18 numbers,
- For a Colonel, 20 numbers.

Five lists of questions, each list comprising fifty questions numbered I to 50 inclusive, are published herewith. The numbers drawn shall represent the questions in each list that the candidates shall be required to answer in writing. If more than one candidate is to be examined, a separate drawing shall be made for each. Additional copies of this order may be obtained upon application to the Adjutant General.

I. Colonel James B. O'Neill, Surgeon General, is hereby authorized to provide for the organization of a Hospital Corps to consist of two detachments, to serve with the First and Second Regiments of Infantry, N. G. S. M., respectively, in accordance with the requirements of Section 40, Chapter 64 of the Public Laws of 1905, relating to the Militia, as promulgated in General Orders No. 7, State of Maine, A. G. O., Augusta, March 25, 1905.

II. Each detachment shall consist of one sergeant (first class), three sergeants, six privates (first class), and three privates.

III. Recruiting for this service will be conducted as far as practicable at the home stations of medical officers now serving in the National Guard, so that each surgeon and assistant surgeon may have charge of at least one sergeant, two privates (first class), and one private.

IV. The Surgeon General will prepare such rules and regulations governing the enlistment, assignment, equipment, instruction, and examination and appointment of non-commissioned officers of the Hospital Corps, as he may deem advisable, not inconsistent with the Laws of the State, and submit the same to this office for approval.

V. Sergeants (first class) will be appointed and warranted by the Surgeon General, provided, however, that the men now serving as Hospital Stewards of the First and Second Regiments of Infantry, respectively, will be transferred to and shall serve as sergeants (first class) of the Hospital Corps during the remainder of their present period of enlistment.

VI. Uniforms and equipment for the Hospital Corps will be issued by the Quartermaster General, upon requisition of the several medical officers who will be held responsible for the propr care and preservation of the same.

General Orders, No. 7.

I. The Medical Officers of the National Guard of the State of Maine are hereby organized as a Medical Corps, consisting of one Surgeon General with the rank of Colonel upon the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief, two Surgeons with the rank of Major, two Assistant Surgeons with the rank of Captain, two Assistant Surgeons with the rank of First Lieutenant, one Assistant Surgeon with the rank of Lieutenant (J. G.), and such other medical officers as future changes in the formation of the Guard may require.

Assigned as Follows:

One Surgeon with rank of Major, one Assistant Surgeon with rank of Captain, and one Assistant Surgeon with rank of First Lieutenant to each Regiment of Infantry; one Assistant Surgeon with rank of Lieutenant (J. G.) to the Ship's Company Naval Reserve.

In case of vacancy the Colonel of the Regiment in which the vacancy shall occur shall nominate one Surgeon with rank of Major, one Assistant Surgeon with rank of Captain or one Assistant Surgeon with rank of First Lieutenant as may be required, an Assistant Surgeon with rank of Lieutenant (J. G.) shall be nominated by the commanding officer of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve.

All medical officers hereafter nominated shall be required to pass a strict medical and surgical examination before being commissioned.

All commissions in the Medical Corps shall be subject to the same provisions as govern other commissions in the National Guard of the State of Maine.

Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons shall serve with the Regiment by whose Colonel they were nominated, unless recommended to other duty by the Surgeon General and assigned by the Commander-in-Chief.

The medical supplies and hospital equipments shall be in charge of the senior medical officer present who will be required to receipt to the Surgeon General for their proper care and safe keeping.

II. The Hopsital Corps is hereby organized and will consist of,

Two First Class Sergeants,

Six Sergeants,

Twelve Privates, First Class,

Six Privates,

and such other enlisted men as future changes in the formation of the Guard may require.

Assigned as Follows:

One First Class Sergeant, three Sergeants, six First Class Privates and three Privates to each Regiment of Infantry. First Class Sergeants shall be warranted by the Colonel upon the recommendation of the Surgeon General and other non-commissioned officers shall be appointed and warranted by the Colonel upon recommendation of the Surgeon or Assistant Surgeon serving with his command, subject to the approval of the Surgeon General. Before being warranted all non-commissioned officers shall be required to pass a thorough examination.

Privates must be found qualified for this service before being enlisted, after which as vacancies occur they may be advanced to Privates First Class if they show special ability and aptitude.

III. Recruiting for this service will be conducted as far as practicable at the home stations of the medical officers so that each Surgeon and Assistant Surgeon may have charge of at least one Sergeant, two Privates First Class and one Private.

IV. Uniforms and equipment for the Hospital Corps will be issued by the Quartermaster General, upon requisition of the several medical officers who will be held responsible for the proper care and preservation of the same.

V. Under the provisions of this order the following assignment of medical officers is hereby promulgated:

To the First Regiment of Infantry, Major Bial F. Bradbury, Captain Charles L. Cragin.

To the Second Regiment of Infantry, Major Edwin M. Fuller, Captain James F. Hill, First Lieutenant Fred A. Chandler.

To the Ship's Company Naval Reserve, Lieutenant (J. G.) George H. Turner, Jr.

They will be obeyed and respected accordingly.

General Orders, No. 8.

I. The annual encampment of the land forces of the National Guard of the State of Maine will be held at the State camp ground, Augusta, August 6 to 18, inclusive. The camp will be designated "Camp Cobb," in honor of the Commander-in-Chief.

II. Colonel Lucius H .Kendall, First Infantry, will be in command of the camp from August 6 to 11, inclusive, and Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, will be in command from August 13 to 18, inclusive.

III. Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry, will mobilize his command at Harward's on Monday, August 6, and following the river road will take up the line of march to "Camp Cobb." Augusta, via Richmond, Gardiner and Hallowell. The command will camp at Iceboro, on Monday, August 6, on land owned by the American Ice Company; on Tuesday, August 7, the command will camp one mile south of Gardiner, on land owned by Robert H. Gardiner; on Wednesday, August 8, the march will be completed to Camp Cobb, Augusta, where the conical tents will be pitched and permanent camp established. The command will break camp and the several companies will return to their home stations on Saturday, August 11.

IV. Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, will mobilize his command at Waterville on Monday, August 13. The command will camp at the Central Maine Fair grounds on Monday, August 13, and on Tuesday will take up the line of march for Camp Cobb, Augusta, via Winslow and Vassalboro. The command will camp at Vassalboro on Tuesday, August 14, on land owned by Elmer W. Rollins, and on Wednesday, August 15, the march will be completed to Camp Cobb, Augusta, where permanent camp will be established. The command will break camp, strike tents and the several companies return to their home stations on Saturday, August 18.

V. Regimental Commanders will prepare and present to this office for approval, orders embracing the routine of each day during their tour of duty, including the practice march and the duties pertaining to the encampment at Camp Cobb, the hours of calls, duties and ceremonies, and such rules and regulations as may be deemed necessary for maintaining order and discipline and promoting the efficiency of their command, will be clearly stated.

VI. The practice marches will be conducted strictly in accordance with regulations. Special attention will be given to advance and rear guards and flankers during the march, at night outposts will be established and thorough instruction given in guard duty when in camp. These marches are made for the purpose of instructing the officers and men in the movement of troops; the column will be accompanied by an officer of the regular army especially detailed to inspect and instruct the command. The citizens of the State residing near the route of the contemplated practice marches have manifested a most friendly disposition towards the Guard, as evinced by allowing the Guard to occupy camping grounds free of expense to the State and by offers of assistance in many other ways. The feeling manifested is highly appreciated by the officers in charge and it is believed that every officer and enlisted man of the Guard will show by his conduct during the maneuvers that he fully appreciates the courtesies extended by the people of the State. The rights of property must be respected. The State will not assume payment for depredations committed. Officers and men must understand that in case depredations requiring the payment of money are committed, such payments will be deducted from the amount due the troops for services and a pro rata deduction will be made from the pay of every officer and enlisted man of the command.

VII. The practice march will be in heavy marching order. Khaki uniform will be worn, blanket, poncho and shelter half in roll, canteen and haversack, tin cup should be attached to rear hook of canteen opening or top of cup next to body. Meat can, knife, fork, spoon and rations only, should be carried in haversack. Extra underclothing, socks, soap, towels and other necessary articles should be carried inside the roll.

Service uniforms, dress uniforms and overcoats will be properly packed and sent direct to Camp Cobb with the company baggage, in charge of the Quartermaster Sergeants and Cooks of the several companies.

VIII. Colonel Edward J. Mayo, Commissary General, Captain Frank B. Harris, Quartermaster, Çaptain George M. Kavanaugh, Commissary, First Infantry, Captain Blaine Owen, Commissary, Second Infantry, Quartermaster Sergeant Albert J. Stearns, Commissary Sergeant Everett R. Harris, First Infantry, will report to the Adjutant-General at Augusta for duty on the morning of Saturday, August 4. Captain George M. Kavanaugh, Commissary, First Infantry, will report for duty to the Commissary General on Saturday, August 11, after his regiment has broken camp on that day. He will return to his home station on Saturday, August 18.

IX. Captain Fred W. Drake, Quartermaster, Quartermaster Sergeant Frank W. Lawry, Commissary Sergeant Joseph P. Grenier, Second Infantry, will report to the Adjutant General at Augusta for duty on the morning of Saturday, August 11.

X. Company Quartermaster Sergeants and Company Cooks will be ordered into camp in advance of their companies so that those of the First Infantry will arrive on Monday, August 6, and those of the Second Infantry on Monday, August 13. Quartermaster Sergeants assisted by the Cooks will assume charge of all company property, see that it is transported from the train to the campground at Augusta and properly housed and cared for until the arrival of the troops in camp. Regimental Commanders will detail a commissioned officer to take charge of the camp until arrival of troops, and all Company Quartermaster Sergeants and Cooks will report to him for duty immediately on their arrival in camp.

XI. The Inspector General, Commissary General and Surgeon General will attend the encampment and discharge the duties devolving upon them under the militia law. The Inspector General of Rifle Practice will attend August 6 to 11, inclusive, and the Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice will attend August 13 to 18, inclusive.

XII. Transportation will be furnished to officers and enlisted men of the First Infantry from their home stations to Harward's and from Augusta to their home stations. For the Second Infantry from their home stations to Waterville and from Augusta to their home stations. Officers and men ordered to report at Camp Cobb in advance of their commands, will be allowed necessary transportation to enable them to comply with instructions. No additional transportation will be allowed during the encampment.

XIII. Rations will be issued for the use of the members of the National Guard only. Camp followers will not be supplied with rations, allowed to remain in camp or to follow the column during the practice

march. Regimental commanders will take such measures as may be necessary to enforce the provisions of this order.

XIV. The commanding officer of Camp Cobb will cause the several organizations of his command to be mustered for pay each day during the encampment, August 6 to 11 and 13 to 18, inclusive, on the proper forms, which at the close of the encampment will be forwarded to the Adjutant General. Mustering officers will report no officer or enlisted man present who does not answer to his name at the muster, and they will muster no substitute.

XV. Five copies of pay-roll (Form No. 3, Militia) of field and staff, non-commissioned staff and band, hospital detachment and companies, will be prepared before going to camp by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with date of rank of officers and date of muster in of the enlisted men. Particular attention is called to "note" at bottom of first page and "instructions" on the last page, a careful study of which is enjoined. Attention is also called to the assignment of pay which will be entered upon three of the rolls only; but one assignee will be named for each organization. The columns for the pay-account will be left blank, to be filled in by the Paymaster General. Ununiformed enlisted men will not be brought to camp and no substitutes will be permitted or paid.

XVI. No man will be paid for duty at the encampment whose enlistment papers are not on file in the office of the Adjutant General, and no non-commissioned officer will be paid as such, unless notice of his appointment has been received at this office. The attention of Regimental commanders is called to the provisions of Section 67, Militia Law of Maine. The necessary warrants must be provided for all noncommissioned officers prior to the encampment in order that their names may appear on the pay-rolls as provided by law.

XVII. The commanding officer of Camp Cobb will render to this office a consolidated morning report on the morning of each day of the encampment. He is authorized to grant leaves of absence and furloughs in cases of necessity, upon application approved by intermediate authority. In cases of sickness, the certificate of a regimental surgeon must accompany the application. Officers and men absenting themselves without such leave of absence or furlough will be reported by name.

XVIII. As soon as possible companies will be recruited to the minimum strength required by law, i. e., fifty enlisted men, and company commanders will, upon the completion of enlistment, request the services of a medical officer, without regard to the number of recruits to be examined; but one medical examination will be ordered to each organization between July I and August 18, inclusive, but men who re-enlist subsequent to the examination, may be examined and mustered in at the encampment.

Company Commanders will at once make requisition for all articles of ordnance, ordnance stores, clothing and equipage necessary to equip their command, including the khaki uniforms. They will also make requisition for light blue hat cords and trumpet cords sufficient to equip their entire command, retaining the white ones for action of the Inspector General at the next annual inspection.

XIX. Organizations of the National Guard will be inspected under the supervision of the Inspector General during the encampment, August 6 to 18, inclusive, as follows: First Regiment, Infantry, will be paraded for inspection on Saturday, August 11, at 9.00 o'clock A. M. The Second Regiment, Infantry, on Saturday, August 18, at 8.00 o'clock A. M. All organizations will parade in service uniform and campaign hat, heavy marching order, full field equipment will be worn. No men will be excused from these inspections except those on special duty or the sick.

XX. The commanding officer of the First Infantry will provide in orders for a review by the Commander-in-Chief on the afternoon of Thursday, August 9. A suitable escort will be ordered to report at the State House at 1.15 o'clock P. M. to escort the Commander-in-Chief to the camp. A detail of one Sergeant, mounted, will be ordered to report to the Adjutant General at the State House at 1.00 P. M. to act as orderly to the Commander-in-Chief. The Camp Commander will also provide for firing the Governor's salute.

XXI. The troops having had sufficient opportunity, in their armories, for instruction in the school of the soldier, squad and company, manual of arms, target practice, etc., therefore, the time allotted to this encampment will not be taken up with these exercises, but all officers will devote their time and attention to battalion and regimental drills and such exercises, maneuvers, and ceremonies as may be necessary for troops in camp or in actual campaigning in time of war.

XXII. The attention of officers and enlisted men is called to Sec. 72, Militia Law of Maine, and a strict compliance with its provisions will be required. Section 72 reads as follows: "All property furnished by the State shall remain and continue to be the property of the State to be used for military purposes only, and when not so in use shall be kept in the armories or designated places of deposit."

XXIII. By virtue of the power conferred by Section 87 of the Militia Law, the authority of the officer in command of the camp is hereby extended to a distance of one-half mile around the State Camp Ground, and upon the external space within such distance from the camp, with the exception of any road or roads within said distance, no person or persons save those specially authorized by law shall be allowed to enter except under such rules as may be established by the officer commanding the camp and approved by the Commander-in-Chief. No person or persons not members of the National Guard will be allowed to remain in camp after taps unless given express authority in writing by the commanding officer of the camp.

XXIV. The following section of the Militia Law of the State is published for the information of all concerned:

"Section 108. No officer or enlisted man shall contract or presume to authorize the contracting of any indebtedness on behalf of the State, without the express authority therefor from the Commander-in-Chief, and any officer or enlisted man who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be dishonorably discharged from the service of the State." I. Regimental, company and corps commanders are hereby notified that the two annual inspections required by existing regulations will soon be made, first by the Inspector General and next by an officer detailed for that purpose by the War Department.

II. As soon as possible companies will be recruited to the minimum strength required by law, i. e. fifty enlisted men. Not more than the minimum number of men will be carried upon the rolls, for when this is done the percentage of attendance may be less and as only fifty men can be armed, uniformed and equipped under existing regulations, men in excess of that number are reported to the War Department as without uniforms, arms or equipments. In order to obviate these difficulties, company commanders will see that not more than fifty men are carried upon the rolls.

III. Company commanders will at once make requisition for all articles of ordnance, ordnance stores, clothing and equipage necessary to thoroughly equip their commands.

IV. In order that property accountability may be reduced to the actual serviceable equipment, company commanders will make a careful examination of all military property in their possession, laying aside all articles that appear to be unserviceable or obsolete, including books and records. All unserviceable articles will be entered upon the proper blanks (which will be provided) in accordance with the provisions of paragraphs 444 to 450 inclusive, of the Regulations for the National Guard. This will enable the Inspector General to inspect with the least possible delay all unserviceable property.

The following Rules and Regulations governing Indoor Small Arms Practice for the season of 1907, having been formulated by Major John J. Dooley, Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice, and approved by Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, are herewith promulgated for the information and guidance of all concerned:

STATE OF MAINE.

OFFICE OF ASSISTANT INSPECTOR GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

PORTLAND, November 28, 1906.

I. The season for Indoor Small Arms Practice will commence January 1, 1907, and close April 30, 1907. Every officer and enlisted man in the National Guard will be required to participate in the practice. Two U. S. Magazine rifles fitted with .22 cal. barrel for gallery use, will be issued each company.

II. A handsome trophy has been provided by the Eastman Bros. & Bancroft Dry Goods Company of Portland, to be presented to the company having the highest average figure of merit for the four months from January I to May I, 1907.

III. Monthly returns will be made to Major John J. Dooley, Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice, Portland, Maine. These returns must be forwarded not later than the 10th of each month, and will in all cases be accompanied by the targets used during the month. The method of classification and computing the figures of merit is described below.

IV. Company Commanders will immediately take steps to secure and prepare a suitable gallery range and will make requisition through proper channels for the necessary targets and ammunition and be prepared to begin a systematic course of firing on the date above designated.

V. The matter of position, sighting and aiming drills must not be neglected, and company commanders must see that each man is properly instructed in these drills, using the methods prescribed in the firing regulations, before permitting him to do any firing with ammunition.

VI. The issue of gallery ammunition will be five thousand (5000) rounds to each company. Two sizes of targets will be issued, known as No. I and No. 2. Target No. I commonly known as the 75 foot gallery target. Targets No. 2 commonly known as the 50 foot gallery target. Targets should be drawn with reference to the gallery range. Six hundred (600) targets will be issued to each company.

VII. All officers and men will be required to qualify on the gallery range before firing on the outdoor range.

VIII. All classifications will be based on the best full scores of ten shots (targets not necessarily consecutive) fired during the month, in the prescribed positions, standing, kneeling or sitting, and prone, as follows:

Fourth Class: All who have not fired.

Third Class: All who have fired less than the required full score of ten shots in each of the three positions, or having fired the required course, have failed to make a total of seventy-five out of a possible one hundred and fifty. (Less than 75 out of 150.)

Second Class All who have fired one or more full scores of ten shots in each position, and from the best one in each position have made a total of seventy-five out of a possible one hundred and fifty. (75 out of 150.)

First Class: All who have fired one or more full scores as above, and from the best one in each position have made a total of ninetysix out of a possible one hundred and fifty. (96 out of 150.)

Marksman: All who have fired one or more full scores as above, and from the best one in each position have made a total of one hundred nnd ten out of a possible one hundred and fifty. (110 out of 150.)

Sharpshooter: All who have fired one or more full scores as above, and from the best one in each position have made a total of one hundred and twenty-five out of a possible one hundred and fifty. (125 out of 150.)

Expert: All who have fired one or more full scores as above, and from the best one in each position have made a total of one hundred and thirty-five out of a posible one hundred and fifty. (135 out of 150.)

Figure of Merit.

IX. The company figure of merit will be computed by multiplying the number of Experts by 200; of Sharpshooters by 150; of Marksmen by 100; of First-class men by 75; of Second-class men by 50; of Third-class men by 10; and of Fourth-class men by 0; and dividing the total of the products thus obtained by the aggregate strength of the company as shown by the monthly returns for the current month, carrying the division to two decimal places.

Dividing 2815 by 51, gives 55.19, which is the Figure of Merit.

X. The attention of company commanders is particularly directed to the fact that to secure a high figure of merit, the attendance must be kept up to the maximum and all must participate in the practice. Absence or failure to practice puts a man in the Fourth-class where he counts for naught and is simply an additional burden to be carried by those who do attend and practice.

III. Company Commanders will at once make a careful examination of all military property in their possession laying aside for inspection all articles that appear to be unserviceable, worn out or obsolete. Inventory and Inspection Reports (form No. 4) will be furnished and must be prepared in advance, by entering thereon a list of the articles laid aside for condemnation and presented, with the property, to the Inspector General for his action. See paragraphs 444 to 450, Regulations for the National Guard.

IV. The Inspector General will report the condition of each rifle by number, calling attention to all imperfections or lack of care. All unserviceable pieces will be so reported with recommendations.

V. Company commanders will detail an enlisted man, preferably the company quartermaster sergeant, who will report to the Inspector General at such time and place as he may designate, to assist in the inspection and verification of military property and perform such other duties as may be required of him.

VI. All officers accountable for military property will see that each article is plainly marked in such manner that it can be easily identified in case of loss, and all articles wherever found will be counted to the credit of and returned to the company whose mark it bears.

IV. Particular attention must be given to attendance at these inspections. The following extract from a letter received from the War Department, calling attention to the large percentage absent from several organizations of the National Guard of Maine at the last inspection, is hereby published:

"Under the Militia Law of January 21, 1903, these inspections are conducted with a view of ascertaining what organizations are sufficiently armed, uniformed, and equipped for active duty in the field, and to determine what assistance the organized militia of the several states and territories is entitled to from the United States; and where so large a proportion of the nominal strength of organizations is absent, it is obviously very difficult to arrive at a correct conclusion in the matter."

Companies will at once be recruited to the minimum strength required by law, i. e., fifty enlisted men. Not more than the minimum number of men will be carried upon the rolls, for when this is done it reduces the percentage of attendance at inspection and as only fifty men can be armed, uniformed and equipped under existing regulations, men in excess of that number are reported to the War Department as without uniforms, arms or equipments.

It is expected that commanding officers will make a special effort to have every man present. It is upon the attendance and efficiency of organizations as shown by these inspections that the strength of our National Guard is rated at the War Department, and upon the report of the inspecting officer is based the proportionate amount of assistance due our State from the United States, in accordance with the provisions of the Act approved January 21, 1903.

The following rules and regulations, governing team competitions and individual matches, having been adopted by the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice, under the provisions of General Orders No. 56, War Department, Washington, March 19, 1906, are hereby issued for the information and guidance of the National Guard of the State of Maine, so far as the same are applicable:

STATE OF MAINE.

Office of Inspector General of Rifle Practice, Portland, May 8, 1906.

Circulor No. 1.

I. OFFICERS OF THE COMPETITIONS.—The officers of all competitions shall consist of—

- (a) An executive officer.
- (b) An assistant executive officer.
- (c) A post adjutant.
- (d) A post quartermaster.
- (c) A statistical officer, with as many assistants as may be necessary.
- (f) As many range officers as may be necessary or as may be **de**tailed for that purpose.

(g) A post surgeon.

2. OFFICERS' DUTIES.—The duties of the officers shall be as follows: *Executive officer*.—The executive officer will have control of the range for the conduct of the matches, and his decision shall be final.

The executive officer may, in his discretion, upon the certificate of the post surgeon, permit the substitution of an alternate member of the same team in place of one who may be taken ill during the shooting.

Assistant executive officer.—The assistant executive officer shall report to and receive instructions from the executive officer and assist him in the management of the competitions.

Post Adjutant.—The post adjutant shall discharge the duties of adjutant to the executive officer, issue by direction of the executive officer the necessary orders, and perform such other duties as may be assigned to him.

Post Quartermaster.—The post quartermaster shall have charge of the issue of stores and supplies to the competitors, and discharge such other duties as may be assigned to him by the executive officer.

Statistical officer and assistants.—The statistical officer and his assistants will assign the competitors to targets and to order of firing, their determinations being generally by lot. They will verify the additions of the scores as reported by the scorekeepers, grade them in order of excellence, and prepare the results for official announcement. In all meetings where a number of men engage in the same matches or competitive firing, the labor of the statistical officers will be greatly lightened, and the prompt announcement of the score facilitated, by giving to each competitor a number by which he will be known throughout the firing, if practicable.

Range officers.—The range officers will supervise the marking and scoring; they will see that the competitors do not evade any of the regulations; they will test the trigger pull of and examine at any time the rifles used by competitors; they will inspect the ammunition before the beginning of all matches; and they will certify on the score cards to the scores made, after verifying same with the blackboard.

In individual matches the range officers will certify to the date, hour, and style of arm in the entry ticket of competitors about to begin their score, and when the score is finished they will certify to the same on both original ticket and coupon. The latter they will tear off and deposit in the scorer's box, returning the original to the competitor.

In team matches the range officers will, at the completion of the score at each range, verify the scores on the score card with the blackboard and see that they agree. When the matches are finished they will add up the totals, certify to the correctness of same, and return the card or cards to the statistical office.

During the shooting of all team competitions a range officer shall be detatiled to the pit at each distance, who shall remain in the pit until the firing at that distance is finished.

The range officer in charge of the firing point must witness any alteration of a score card and must indorse the alteration with his initials.

A range officer desiring to be relieved from his post of duty will report to the executive officer, so that a substitute may be detailed.

Post Surgeon.—The post surgeon shall have charge of the health and sanitary condition of the camp and rifle range, and shall perform such other duties as pertain to his profession.

Officers must report.—All officers of the competition will report to the executive officer at his headquarters each morning at 8 o'clock, when they will be assigned to their several stations and given their badges.

The post adjutant, post quartermaster, and post surgeon will be on duty continuously at headquarters.

3. RULES FOR PITS.—In team matches one representative from each team shall be selected by the team captain at each distance (before the drawing of the targets at that distance), who shall receive from the executive officer a card directing him to remain in the target pit during the firing at the distance about to be begun. The representatives from the various teams in the target pit will call the attention of the range officer on duty in the pit to any irregularity of marking or other matter deemed by them necessary, and the decision of the range officer in the pit as to the matter complained of will be final and binding.

Rapid fire.—In rapid fire, time is regulated at the target, the signal at the firing point being given as a warning to the range officer in charge of the pit that all is ready at the firing point for the target to appear.

Procedure.—In rapid fire, with rifle or carbine, at the disappearing target, the range officer in charge of the target, at the signal from the firing point, commands "Ready." As soon as all is in readiness to run up the target he commands "Up." At exactly the proper number of seconds after the target is in position he commands "Down," having preceded his command two or three seconds by the warning command "Ready." The target must be exposed and withdrawn as quickly as possible. The number and value of the hits are signaled with the usual disks in the usual manner after the score has been fired, the number of misses being carefully indicated by the flag as a check on the accuracy of the number of hits signaled.

When the single rolling, or Cushing, target is used, the method of marking will be varied to meet the conditions.

Pistol.—In rapid fire with the pistol at the disappearing target the manipulation of the target is as in rapid fire with the rifle or carbine, except that the target remains exposed the number of seconds called for in the match.

4. RULES FOR FIRING POINTS.—*Slow fire.*—During the progress of a match or competition, no one except the officers on duty at the range, the competitors, and scorekeepers will be permitted within the ropes without special permission of the officer in charge.

Five yards in rear.—The squads of competitors will be stationed 5 yards in rear of firing point, where each competitor must remain until called by the scorekeeper or range officer to take his position at the firing point and until he has completed his score.

All expression on the part of the competitor of approbation or disappointment, with reference to any scores made by himself or others, must not be uttered loud enough to be heard at the firing point.

Competitors present punctually.—Competitors must be present at the firing points punctually at the time or in the order stated on their score cards. No application on the part of a competitor for an alteration of his assignment will be entertained, except that team captains may change the order of firing of the members of their teams if they so desire.

Order of distances.—In competitions or matches embracing more than one distance, the firing will be commenced at the shortest distance and be followed in order by each of the longer distances, the firing at the longest range being held last.

Slow fire first.—In competitions, slow fire in any one day will be completed for all ranges before being followed by rapid fire.

Squadding.—In individual matches that are squadded, the squadding of the competitors will be done before the beginning of the match.

Fire alternately.—In team competitions the competitors will place themselves at the firing point by twos and fire alternately, the odd number of each pair being on the right and firing first.

Target withdrawn while firing.—In slow fire, if, just as the shot is fired the target is withdrawn from the firing position, the scorer at that firing point will at once report the fact to one of the range officers, who, if upon investigation is satisfied that the case is as represented, will direct that the shot fired be not considered and that the competitor fire another shot.

Time limit.—In slow fire, competitors will not be hurried in their firing, but such slight delay permitted after each shot as they may desire; provided the time of firing the total score with rifle and carbine does not exceed an average of one minute per shot for ranges of 600 yards and less, and of one and one-half minutes per shot for ranges above 600 yards, no time credit being allowed.

If an accident to a target, or any other cause over which the competitor has no control, prevents him from completing his score within a reasonable interval, he will be permitted such additional time as a range officer may decide.

Drawing targets.—Targets in fixed-distance team firing will be drawn at each range by team captains at the executive officer's headquarters.

Coaching.—In team matches no coaching or communication of any kind with men at the firing point will be permitted except by the team captain, and then only for the sole purpose of preventing infractions of the conditions of the match, except that the competitors actually firing may communicate with each other.

When competing for the Dryden Trophy, or in other special team matches, coaching is authorized.

Position of captain, etc.—In team matches, at least 3 yards in rear of each firing point, there will be permitted one team captain, one coach, and one spotter, who may observe the firings of the members of their team and check the value of each shot as called by the scorer. The captain, coach, and spotter shall not be permitted to shield a competitor from the wind, throw a shade upon his sight, or aid him in any other way.

Positions.—The following positions only will be permitted in competitive firing: At 200 yards, the standing position, the body and arm being free from any artificial support; at 300 yards, sitting or kneeling; at 500, 600, 800, 900, and 1,000 yards, prone, with head toward target.

Strap.—The use of the strap as a sling will be permitted at all ranges, provided it is attached to its proper swivels and is used only in connection with the arm of the competitor as a brace.

Loading arms.—No arms shall be loaded except at the firing point, the muzzle of the rifle, carbine, or revolver being kept in the direction of the target until the arm is either discharged or unloaded.

Rapid fire.-Target: F at both ranges.

Procedure.—The magazine is filled, one cartridge loaded therefrom, and the piece then held at position "Ready." At a signal given at the firing point (trumpet or telephone) the target appears, remains in sight twenty seconds at 200 yards and thirty seconds at 500 yards, then disappears. No sighting shots will be permitted. The competitor attempts to fire five shots, emptying the magazine and firing at will, without command, from the instant any portion of the target appears until it has completely disappeared. Each unfired cartridge counts as a miss. In case of a defective cartridge or disabled piece the practice is repeated.

Challenges.—If a competitor desires to challenge his shot just fired because of failure of any record from the pit, such challenge will be sustained and the record from the pit given without cost. If a competitor in the national match, or other team matches, desires to challenge his shot just fired for alleged incorrect marking, he must pay \$1. If the competitor's challenge is sustained and it is shown that the marking was incorrect, the money will be returned to him. All money paid in fines as prescribed in this paragraph will be turned over to the treasurer of the organization conducting the match.

5. PROTESTS.—Protests and objections must not be directly submitted to the executive officer, but to one of the range officers. In case a competitor considers the decision of the latter unwarranted by the facts as presented, he may appeal to the executive officer. Final appeals from decisions of the executive officer must be made in writing and forwarded through that officer to the executive committee of the National Rifle Association or the association under whose auspices the meeting is being held. In national contests an appeal may be taken to the national board authorized by act of Congress, etc., whose decision shall be final.

6. SCORING AND MARKING.—Hits in the different divisions of the targets and ricochets will be signaled and recorded as prescribed in the Small-Arms Firing Regulations. Ricochets count as hits.

Spotter.—The exact location of all bullet holes will be marked by a spotter, which will be shown on the target.

All shots fired count.—All shots fired by the competitor after he has taken his place at the firing point, and it is his turn to fire—the target being ready—will be considered in his score, even if his piece is not directed toward the target, or is accidentally discharged.

Shots upon wrong target.—Shots fired upon the wrong target will be entered upon the score of the man firing as misses.

Two hits on target.—In slow fire, if two shots strike a target at the same or nearly the same time, both will be signaled, and if a shot was just fired from the firing point assigned to that target, the hit having the higher of the two values signaled will be entered in the competitor's score, and no record made of the other hit.

Value of shot, change of record.—Competitors must pay attention to the score as announced and recorded, so that any error may be promptly investigated. The record value of any shot will not be changed after the following shot has been fired, unless some special message with reference to it is received from one of the range officers in the target pit.

Sighting shots.—In all matches two sighting shots at each range, slow fire, must be taken. Whenever, because of a storm or for any other reason, the executive officer shall postpone an unfinished match, two sighting shots will be allowed on the unfinished score of each man when the match is resumed.

7. DUTIES OF SCORERS.—The scorekeepers will be seated close to and in the rear of the firing-point stakes, and will, as each shot is signaled, announce in an audible tone the name of the competitor, the value of the shot, and number on score card, marking same on the blackboard and competitor's card. At the conclusion of the score of each competitor the scorekeeper will repeat his name and total score, and request the range officer on duty at that target to verify the blackboard and score card (no scores will be allowed unless recorded on a blackboard by the scorer as shot).

8. SKIRMISH FIRE.—In skirmish fire, after the run is completed and the signal "Cease firing" has been sounded and repeated twice, the markers will examine the targets, the range officer will record the total hits on each, and the results will be communicated by means of prepared score cards to the statistical officers. In this fire the precautions with regard to the use of a red pencil in marking shot holes will be observed.

In skirmish competitions by team, targets will be assigned by a range officer. In all other skirmish competitions targets will be drawn by competitors immediately preceding the commencement of the runs.

The aggregate value of all shots in all the figures of the groups will be the team's total for the run.

Team captain may coach.—In skirmish competitions by teams the teams will run under the command of the team captain, who may coach his men on the run. One or more range officers will accompany each team to see that the conditions of the match are not violated.

Twenty cartridges.—In skirmish fire twenty cartridges will be issued before each run to each competitor, and the latter will not be permitted to have any other cartridge about his person. If any cartridge fails to explode it will be replaced by the scorer with a new one.

Disabled gun.—If a gun becomes disabled the incompleted score will not be considered, but the competitor will repeat the run. Hits, direct or ricochet, will be scored.

Individual.—In individual skirmish competitions no two competitors from the same team shall be allowed to skirmish on adjoining targets.

Target and value of shots.—In skirmish competitions the group target "G" will be used, one group for each skirmisher. Targets placed in line, with intervals of not less than 5 yards between centers of groups. The value of shots: Hit, direct or ricochet, on lying figure, 5; kneeling, 4; miss, o. Hits on the black silhouette only will count.

Procedure.—In skirmish competitions each competitor will fire twenty shots, 600 to 200 yards. Six halts at the following distances: 600, 500, 400, 350, 300, and 200 yards. At all distances, with the exception of the 200 yards, the time limit will be thirty seconds, and at the 200 yards twenty seconds. Any authorized position for firing will be permitted.

A squad of convenient number is formed in line opposite the targets at a distance exceeding 600 yards; twenty rounds of ammunition per man are issued; magazines are filled and cut off, and, in accordance with Infantry Drill Regulations, the line is advanced in quick time to the 600yard firing line. Here the line is halted and each skirmisher, without further command, takes one of the authorized positions and at the preparatory command for firing loads his piece from the belt.

The commands for firing are: I. Fire two rounds, 2. At 600 yards, 3. At the targets, 4. COMMENCE FIRING. After the command of execution the firing opens at will and each skirmisher fires two rounds within the time limit of thirty seconds, the piece being used as a single-loader. At the expiration of time limit the command "Cease firing" will have been given.

The firing having ceased, the advance is resumed and continued to the 500-yard firing line, where two rounds are fired in the same manner as at 600 yards; the advance then continues to the 400 and 350-yard firnig lines, at each of which three rounds are similarly fired, and then to 300 and 200 yards, at each of which five rounds are fired from the magazine. The time limit at 200 yards, it should be noted, is twenty instead of thirty seconds, as at the other halts. Commands, in all cases, conform to the Infantry Drill Regulations.

Quick and double time.—The advance between 600 and 200 yards will be, between any two successive halts, the first half at quick and the second at double time; and it is enjoined upon the range officer to see that the double time is maintained as nearly as possible according to Infantry Drill Regulations, i. e., length of step 36 inches and cadence 180 steps . per minute. The firing is completed at 200 yards.

Rifles loaded at halt only.—Pieces will not be loaded during the advance but only at the preparatory command for firing after a halt.

Time limit.—The time limit extends from the last note of "Commence firing" to the last note of "Cease firing." The range officer will see that the signals are properly sounded, not permitting the last note of "Cease firing" to be unduly prolonged.

Penaltics.—For each shot fired by the competitor before the commencement or after the close of the time limit, or for each shot fired in excess of the number ordered for the halt, five points will be deducted from his score. Five points will also be deducted for a failure to fire the number prescribed for a halt.

Defective cartridges.—A defective cartridge may be replaced by a file closer, but must be turned in before the advance is resumed. The substituted cartridge must be fired, if at all, at the halt where the misfire occurred and before "Cease firing" shall have been sounded. A piece disabled through no fault of the firer entitles the latter to another run.

Competitors will not be permitted to advance nearer than 200 yards from the targets.

More than twenty hits.--When more than twenty hits are found in a group target, the score will not be counted and the competitor will make another run.

Muzzle toward targets.—In this class of fire the muzzle of the rifle must be pointed toward the targets when marching or at the halts.

9. ARMS.—*Team matches.*—In all military matches the following arms only will be used, unless otherwise provided for in special conditions:

The United States Army magazine rifle and carbine, .30 caliber.

Individual matches (not exclusively military).—The rifles and carbines allowed in competitions are as follows:

- (a) Any military rifle.
- (b) Any rifle.

They must comply with the following conditions:

Any military: Any military rifle that has been viewed and stamped by the National Rifle Association in accordance with the resolution heretofore adopted for this purpose by the National Board for Promotion of Rifle Practice, as follows:

Resolved, That rifles of private makers, conforming in all respects to the following:

- (a) The piece must be capable of using the standard Government cartridge;
- (b) It must be the same length and weight;
- (c) It must be fitted with a sight similar in design to one of the

standard military sights as adopted by the War Department; when viewed and stamped by the National Rifle Association, shall be permitted to be used by clubs duly affiliated with the National Rifle Association for qualification as national marksmen and in matches where the rules permit any military rifle.

Any rifle: No restriction as to weight, caliber, sights, or trigger pull, except that rifles with less than 2 pounds trigger pull must be provided with safety lock.

Sights (military rifles).—The aiming notch, or the aperture of the slide, may be slightly widened or opened to accommodate individual peculiarities of eyesight, but no other alteration or filing of the regular service sights, or the use of spirit levels, will be permitted. The front or rear sights may, however, be blackened according to the judgment of the competitor. The use of permanently affixed micrometers, orthoptic eyepieces, telescopic sights, spirit levels, temporary shades, or any other device will not be allowed, unless specially provided for in the conditions of the match.

Competitors in team or individual matches may use field glasses or small telescopes, such as might reasonably be carried to the field as a part of a soldier's equipment.

Trigger pull.—The trigger pull must always be at least 3 pounds, and will be tested (holding the barrel vertically) by a range officer, before firing, each day and at each range.

Competitors will submit their arms for further inspection whenever required.

Changing rifles during matches.—No two competitors shall shoot in any competition with the same rifle, nor shall a competitor change his rifle during any competition unless his first rifle has become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified by a range officer.

Cleaning.—Pieces can only be cleaned upon the completion of a score. In competitions at more than one distance cleaning will be permitted between distances. While, with these restrictions, cleaning will be permitted, it will not be required. Cleaning will be allowed between shots when it is so specified in the conditions of the match.

Handicap.—In all team and individual matches the carbine will be allowed a handicap of 4 per cent at 600 yards, 6 per cent at 800, 900, and 1,000 yards.

No handicap will be allowed unless noted on score card by a range officer. Competitors must see that this is done.

10. AMMUNITION.—Unless the use of other ammunition is distinctly authorized, the ammunition used will be the service cartridge for the arm, as manufactured and issued by the Ordnance Department.

II. UNIFORM.—Military competitors will wear the service uniform, with or without blouse and with the belt.

12. PENALTIES.—No two competitors shall in any match or competition use the same rifle, unless it is a special condition of the match, nor shall a competitor change his rifle during any competition, unless it has become unserviceable, which fact must be verified by a range officer. Wilful violation of this regulation will warrant the executive officer (in his discretion) in excluding the competitor from further competition.

Any person, whether a competitor or not, interfering with any of the firing squads, or annoying them in any way, will be warned to desist, and if he repeats the offense he will be at once ordered off the range grounds.

Any competitor :---

(a) Who shall fire in a name other than that under which he entered, or who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so; or

(b) Who shall be guilty of any conduct considered by the executive committee to be discreditable; or

(c) Who shall be guilty of falsifying his score or being accessory thereto; or

(d) Who shall offer a bribe of any kind to any employee or other person; or

(e) Who shall be detected in an evasion of the conditions prescribed for the conducting of any match; or

(f) Who shall refuse to obey any instructions of the executive officer or a range officer; or

(g) Who shall be guilty of disorderly conduct or being intoxicated, shall, upon the offense being proved to the satisfaction of the executive committee, forfeit all his entrance fees, be forever disqualified from competing at any time in the meetings of the Association, and shall not be entitled to have any prize won by him at the time of meeting awarded to him.

Unauthorized ammunition.—Any competitor having any ammunition in his belt or about his person when he takes his place at the firing stand, other than that authorized, will be immediately disbarred, and his score will not count for record.

13. ENTRIES.—Competitors who make entries for any match will be ruled out and will forfeit their entrance fees if not on the range at the hour designated for the match.

Entry tickets must be marked with the purchaser's name at the time of the purchase; they may be transferred to another name with the consent of the executive officer; any erasure or substitution of a purchaser's name on a ticket, not made by the statistical officer, will forfeit the ticket. Post cntrics.—All entries made in individual matches after the opening of the meeting will be post entries.

No entry fee will be refunded unless the competitor is prevented by sickness from appearing on the range, and then only on order of the executive officer.

Team captains can expedite matters by securing from the statistical officer blank forms of entry in advance, and having them filled out with the names of the team, which should be written plainly and in full, with military rank, if any.

Entry tickets for individual matches will not be exchanged under any circumstances.

All entries not otherwise provided for in the program must be made not later than thirty minutes before the hour for calling the match.

All civilians, as well as members of the organized militia, Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Cadets United States Military Academy, and Midshipmen United States Naval Academy, are eligible to compete in all the individual matches that are open to everybody, provided they shoot with the arm called for in the conditions of the match.

14. TIES .- Ties will be decided as follows:

- (a) In individual shooting, at known distances—
 - When the firing takes place at more than one distance, by the total score made at the longest distance, and if still at tie, and there be three or more distances in the competition, by the total score at the second distance, and so on for each of the successive distances.
 - (2) By the fewest misses in the entire score.
 - (3) By the fewest outers in the entire score.
 - (4) By the fewest inners in the entire score.
 - (5) If still a tie, by inverse order of shots, counting singly from the last to the first.
 - (6) By firing single shots at the longest distance.
 - (7) In case a tie is of the highest possible score, extra shots will be fired by those tying until the tie is broken.

(b) In team shooting at known distances-

- (1) By the aggregate of the total scores made at the different distances in inverse order.
- (2) By the fewest misses in the entire score.
- (3) By the fewest outers in the entire score.
- (4) By the fewest inners in the entire score.
- (5) By the totals, for the team, of the final shot, of each competitor.
- (6) By the totals, for the team, of these successive closing shots in inverse order.

When the ties are to be divided, it must be so stated in the conditions of the match; but the winners may by mutual consent divide the prizes.

Ties, when rapid fire is included in the match, will be decided as follows:

(a) In slow and rapid fire-

- By the highest total score made in rapid fire; if still a tie, by the highest score made in rapid fire at 500 yards; if still a tie, by the highest score in rapid fire at 300 yards; if still a tie, by the highest score in rapid fire at 200 yards. In the same manner the decision will be regulated by the highest total scores in succession made at 600, 500, 300, and 200 yards, slow fire.
- (2) By the fewest misses in rapid fire.
- (3) By the greatest number of hits on figure in rapid fire.
- (4) By the fewest misses in slow fire.
- (5) By the fewest outers in slow fire.
- (6) By the fewest inners in slow fire.
- (7) If still a tie, by firing single shots at the longest range, slow fire.
- (b) In skirmish fire-
 - (I) By the greatest number of penalties imposed.
 - (2) By the greatest number of hits.
 - (3) By the fewest hits in kneeling figures.
 - (4) If still a tie, a special run in skirmish fire.

Ties, when rapid and skirmish fires are included in the aggregate score, will be decided by giving precedence to the competitor having the best total score in the skirmish fire. If the scores in the skirmish fire are also of the same total, the order of merit for that fire (and therefore the final order of merit) will be determined in accordance with paragraph "Ties, when rapid fire is included in the match," etc.

In pistol competition (in the aggregate score).—Upon the completion of a pistol competition, ties found in the aggregate scores of two or more competitors will be decided as follows:

(1) By the highest aggregate score made in rapid fire; if still a tie, by the highest total score made at 25 yards, rapid fire. The tie continuing, it will then be regulated, in succession, by the fewest misses and by the greatest number of hits on the figure, both in rapid fire.

(2) If necessary, the comparison will then extend to timed fire, and will be decided in the following order:

(a) By the greatest number of penalties imposed.

(b) By the highest total aggregate score.

(c) By the highest total score made at fifty yards.

- (d) By the fewest misses at both ranges together.
- (e) By the fewest outers at both ranges together.

(f) By the fewest inners at both ranges together.

(3) The tie still continuing, the comparison will then extend to slow fire and will be decided in the following order:

(a) By the highest total score made at 75 yards.

(b) By the fewest misses at both ranges together.

(c) By the fewest outers at both ranges together.

(d) By the fewest inners at both ranges together.

(4) If there be still a tie, it will be decided by firing single shots at 75 yards slow fire.

15. HOURS OF FIRING.—Assembly will be sounded and firing begun at 8 o'clock A. M. and "Cease firing" will be sounded at 6 P. M., unless otherwise ordered by the executive officer.

The range will be closed for an hour in the middle of the day for lunch.

16. GENERAL.—Prizes not claimed within thirty days after having been won shall be forfeited to the Association.

These regulations and such special rules or directions as the executive officer may give must be rigidly complied with by competitors and all other persons upon the range grounds.

Competitors and all others connected with the competitions must make themselves acquainted with the foregoing regulations as well as with the conditions of competitive firing in which they may be participating, as the plea of ignorance of either of them will not be entertained.

The following circular, containing rules and regulations for the government of the Medical department of the National Guard of the State of Maine, is hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

STATE OF MAINE.

SURGEON GENERAL'S OFFICE, July 3, 1906.

Circular No. 1.

I. In accordance with the requirements of General Orders No. 7, A. G. O. c. s. Medical officers assigned to the several regiments will at once recruit, as far as is practicable at their home stations, men for service in the Hospital corps. Enlistment papers will be made in triplicate, one copy to be forwarded direct to the Adjutant General, one copy to the Surgeon General and one copy to the regimental Adjutant. Care should be taken to select only such men as are adapted to this service. All enlistments should be as privates and as the men develop and show ability, faithfulness, and capacity for instruction they may be recommended for First class privates or Sergeants.

II. All candidates for advancement to the grade of First class privates or Seregants must be given a thorough examination by the medical officer under whose command they may be and the result of said examination, together with recommendations, shall be forwarded to the Surgeon General for his approval and by him transmitted to the Colonel commanding the regiment for issue of warrant.

III. Medical officers will as soon as possible after completing enlistment make requisition through the Surgean General for uniforms and complete equipment for the men under their command. The several medical officers will be held responsible for the preservation and safe keeping of the military property issued for the use of the enlisted men under their command and will be required to make a semi-annual return of military property on the last day of May and November of each year in accordance with the provision of paragraph 371, Regulations for the National Guard.

IV. Medical officers should at once commence a thorough course of instruction. It is deemed advisable that prior to the Annual Encampment drills should be held at least two evenings each week, the first half of each drill devoted to instruction in first aid, and a review of the preceding evening's work, the last half devoted to litter drill.

V. Monthly returns will be made as required for all organizations of the National Guard, one copy sent to the regimental Adjutant and one copy to the Adjutant General through the office of the Surgeon General.

When on active duty all medical reports will be made direct to the Surgeon General and by him forwarded to the Adjutant General with such remarks and recommendations as he may deem advisable or for the best interest of the service.

A special report showing the number of drills held, the character of instruction and general efficiency of the men will be forwarded direct to the Surgeon General on the first day of January and July of each year.

The following circular from the office of the Inspector General is hereby promulgated for the information and guidance of all concerned:

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S REPORT.

STATE OF MAINE.

Office of Inspector General, Augusta, December 19, 1906.

Circular No. 1.

Blank forms No. 4 for use at the inspections under General Orders No. 18, A. G. O., c. s., will be forwarded to company commanders direct from the Adjutant General's office. These blanks must be prepared in advance and presented with all property to be inspected for condemnation, in accordance with the provisions of paragraphs 444 to 450 inclusive, of the Regulations for the National Guard.

In the preparation of above blanks the first page is filled in and signed by the company commander and the second page left blank to be filled in by the Inspector General; under the head "how rendered unserviceable" will be entered, not the extent of damage, but how the damage was sustained, such as "in service," "by accident," "by fire," etc.

All unserviceable articles to be inspected must be taken out of the regular equipment and be replaced by new in advance of the visit of the Inspector General. It is of the first importance that companies be supplied at all times with a full and serviceable equipment for 50 enlisted men.

Inspection of quarters, military property, books and records will be made during the day set for the inspection of each command, and company commanders will see that the quartermaster sergeant, or other enlisted man detailed to assist, reports promptly to the Inspector General at such time and place as he may designate.

It is important that the inspecting officer should see every article of military property in the possession of company commanders or for which they are accountable, including all books and papers pertaining to the organization.

A special effort will be made to have all property in the armory. Do not allow men to take a uniform home for the purpose of wearing it in on the evening of inspection; ample opportunity will be given for changing at the armory.

Do not have the blanket rolls made up until after the property has been inspected, then, if properly rolled, they need not be opened at the evening ceremony.

Have each man's complete outfit either in his locker or in some way conveniently arranged for inspection and verification.

The evening inspection will begin at such hour as company commanders' may designate, allowing ample time to have everything in readiness.

See that men are propertly uniformed and equipped, shoes and clothing brushed, coats buttoned and belts sufficiently tight to prevent sagging.

The following is the proper method of wearing equipment by the enlisted men: Blanket roll over left shoulder. Haversack slung from right shoulder to left hip, straps outside of waist belt. Canteen from left shoulder to right hip, rear strap underneath waist belt. Straps of haversack underneath canteen straps. Tin cup on rear strap of canteen, the mouth of cup toward the body. Non-commissioned officers should be held responsible for the personal appearance of the men in their respective squads and sections.
