# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE MAINE INSANE AND EASTERN MAINE INSANE HOSPITALS.

To the Governor and Executive Council of the State of Maine:

The close of the fiscal year of the management of the two Insane Hospitals of the State of Maine require a formal report from the Trustees of these institutions. The Superintendent and heads of the several departments of both hospitals have placed in our hands complete and meritorious reports of the administration of matters committed to them, which we submit for your consideration and the attention of the State. We also respectfully present to your honorable body our annual report on the Maine and Eastern Maine Insane Hospitals, for the year ending November 30, 1907.

The complete exhibit of the year 1907 shows a wider and more extensive range of insane hospital work than has been recorded in any year of its previous history; and represents the use of a large appropriation of public money.

The Legislature of 1907 gave the demands, for the enlargement and betterment of the two hospitals, a careful consideration; and as a result, the extraordinary appropriation for 1907-8, which received the approval of the Executive Department of the State, amounted to \$366,577.00.

This amount, by the act of the Legislature, was placed in the hands of the Board of Trustees to be expended for the purposes named in the several resolves. The Trustees have endeavored to exercise care and economy in the discharge of the duty involved in this important trust; and feel confident that the finished and unfinished work, wherever undertaken, will justify the expression, "It is well done."

The several resolves planned by the last Legislature for the benefit of the Maine and Eastern Maine Insane Hospitals are thus itemized:

The full amount appropriated by the Legislature of 1906, for the Insane Hospitals of our State, and placed in the hands of the Board of Trustees was \$356,442.

The expenditure of so large amount of public money, in a proper manner during the past year, has given the Board of Trustees an increased responsibility and great anxiety. We cannot refrain from expressing our appreciation of the services

and aid that Superintendent Sanborn has rendered, notwithstanding his many other responsible duties which he has in no way neglected; and the constant attention and watchfulness for the best results that has followed the great aid which we have received from Mr. Manning S. Campbell, the efficient and capable treasurer of the Maine Insane Hospital.

### THE PROGRESS OF THE APPROPRIATIONS MADE FOR THE MAINE INSANE HOSPITAL.

The stone wing of the Maine Insane Hospital that is undergoing renovation and reconstruction is making satisfactory progress. The heating work is complete, and the walls are ready for plastering; and there seems to be no doubt but the contractor, Mr. Noyes, who has been diligent and efficient, will complete his entire work at the time specified in the contract.

The laundry is practically finished, giving much more and better working room than the old one, and several more new and much needed sleeping apartments.

The carpenter shop has been finished and occupied more than two months, and fully meets our expectation. The building affords also a fine storage loft and a room for the upholsterer.

#### THE CRIMINAL INSANE BUILDING.

Here has been more necessary delay in getting the plans, commencing the work, and continuing the same than under the other contracts. Natural causes have retarded matters. The work is behind, only the basement and one story being completed. The work is going on, but the prospect is that the cold season will soon stop farther progress. The Board of Trustees are strongly convinced of the necessity of the new building, and will continue to urge its early construction.

There have been several important changes in the several medical departments of the Maine Insane Hospital which are fully mentioned in the report of the Superintendent.

#### THE LIBRARY.

The Board of Trustees have given much attention, during the year, to the Library Department of the Maine Insane Hospital, and are able to report that the library has been entirely revised, the books recatalogued and one hundred and fifty new ones added.

There are many inmates of the Insane Hospital that are well educated, and brought up under the influence of the library, which is an important adjunct of our civilization.

The present collection of books was largely accumulated years ago, when the opportunity for choice was more limited. A careful collection should be made of the right books particularly adapted to the reading of the insane; for it is said on high authority, that books can be used as a remedial agent for the recovery of insane patients.

A special list of books has been selected by a learned committee for the use of insane hospitals in Iowa. We would urge renewed action on the part of our own State, and we appeal for aid from a generous public, to increase our library by an abundant contribution of the right kind of books and magazines. We trust that this request may receive an early response.

#### NEW HERD OF COWS.

The Board of Trustees have been duly careful under the State Board of Cattle Commissioners to have the entire herd of diseased cows slaughtered for the purpose of exterminating the tuberculosis which had so seriously affected it, and every precaution has been used to have the barns renovated and disinfected that they may be occupied without any fear of contaminating the new herd, which already number twenty-five well selected cows.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT AND PROTECTION.

The Trustees during the past year have given particular attention to creating a complete and well organized fire department, composed of the Superintendent and Treasurer and carefully selected employees in the hospital. It is intended that the members of the organization shall be trained by suitable prac-

tice to meet properly the various dangers which might attend a conflagration. We take pleasure in assuring the public that the increase of supply of water, the installing of new hydrants, and the addition of other necessary adjuncts for fire protection have gone far towards guaranteeing the safety of the property and security of the patients.

#### EASTERN MAINE INSANE HOSPITAL.

The Board of Trustees are happy to state that the administration of affairs of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital meets with our most hearty approval. We sincerely regret that Superintendent Philip H. S. Vaughan, M. D., was obliged on account of ill health to resign his position. He stood high in his profession, and carries with him the best wishes of the Board of Trustees.

The new Superintendent, Dr. H. W. Mitchell, has entered upon the discharge of his duties, bringing with him ample testimonials to his fitness both from personal ability and long experience for the responsible position which he occupies. He has already given evidence by his active work that every department of the hospital will receive the closest attention, supplemented by the best medical knowledge and practical skill in the

treatment of the insane. He has the aid of Dr. Mary P. Mitchell, an assistant physician, who has charge of the female patients. The success which has attended her practice during nine years in Danvers Hospital, Mass., assures us that the place is well filled. The changes which have been made in physicians during the year have been carefully noted in the report of Superintendent Mitchell.

#### OFFICIAL CHANGES.

The Superintendent of the Maine Insane Hospitals, in his report, gives full mention of the changes in his department to which we respectfully refer. The several physicians that have left and those that remain are worthy of commendation.

The attendants generally have been of good character, and interested and faithful in the line of their duty. The several departments of the Maine Insane Hospital have been judiciously and well filled, and the long continuous work of the matron of the hospital, Miss Alice G. Twitchell, still shows its efficiency and influence in the prosperity of the institution.

#### BOARD.

As one of the results of the increasing cost of help and the high price of the commissary department, we have been obliged to raise the price of board from \$4.00, \$5.00 and \$8.00 to \$4.50, \$5.50 and \$9.00.

THE DISPENSARY FOR THE TUBERCULAR INSANE OF THE TWO INSANE HOSPITALS OF THE STATE.

The last Maine Legislature took a very wise course in appropriating \$30,000 to establish a building at Bangor for the care and cure of the tubercular insane patients of the two insane hospitals of the State. There has been recently a progressive and successful movement throughout the civilized world to wage war against tuberculosis, so long a cruel enemy of the human race; and the result amply proves that though the disease is contagious, it may be cured by early and proper treatment.

The building for the tubercular patients has been erected with all modern improvements. It is now completely closed

in. The brick wall is all done, and the roof finished, and we intend that the structure shall be ready for occupancy by the first of March.

The new wing to the main brick building, for which there was appropriated by the last Legislature \$75,000 to be expended in 1907 and \$75,000 in 1908, has had the careful and constant supervision of a committee of the Board of Trustees; and we are able to report that the brick work is nearly completed, and that the work will be faithfully pushed to meet the requirements of another year.

The barn is finished and occupied, and the foundation for an icehouse is being laid. We think that all the work completed this year from the appropriations made by the Legislature of 1907 will meet with the approval of the Executive Department of the State, and merits the confidence of the public.

### THE ADVANTAGES OFFERED BY THE STATE APPROPRIATIONS EXPENDED ON CHASE ISLAND.

The Legislature of last winter made the following appropriations for additional improvements, to be made under the direction of the Board of Trustees, on this beautiful island located in Penobscot Bay facing the broad Atlantic:

- (1) For the construction of an additional building;
- (2) " a bath and swimming pool;
- (3) " a gasoline launch;
- (4) "the salary of caretaker, transportation of patients, officers and employees;

The following statement represents the use made of the money by the Board of Trustees during the year ending November 30, 1907:

The Trustees find that the appropriation (\$7,500.00) made by the last Legislature has been expended during the fiscal year for the purposes named in the resolve, leaving a balance in his hands of \$500.00. For the detailed and specific information you are referred to the Report of the Steward and Treasurer.

The many individual cases of improvement and recovery which followed the vacation of the convalescent inmates of the two hospitals during the summer season of 1905 and 1906 at Chase Island were so satisfactory that the Board of Trustees thought it advisable this year to increase the period of occupancy of the building on the island one month over that of former years; and we are pleased to say that the report of the physician and attendants, as well as the uniform expressions of pleasure by the inmates, convinced us that the change was extremely beneficial.

The island was occupied during the four months by one hundred and twenty-four carefully selected patients of both sexes, and the new "bungalow" and other improvements attracted much attention, and caused great satisfaction among the occupants.

The visits of the Board of Trustees have proved that the expenditures made by the State have furnished a marked means for improving the physical health of convalescent patients; and has in many cases been of great aid in the line of recovery.

We trust that the work already done may be furthered by such assistance from the State as may be demanded for improving the condition of our unfortunate insane.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS BY THE STATE FOR THE BENEFIT

#### OF THE INSANE.

The future requirements of our two institutions and the insane inhabitants of Maine generally, would be better stated in the report to be made to the Executive Department next year, so as to meet the action of the Legislature, whose duty it will be to act upon such important questions. The Superintendent of the Maine Insane Hospital has even thus early brought forward the matter, to which we ask your consideration.

The following are statements from Treasurer Charles S. Pearl in regard to the financial condition of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital, November 30, 1907:



#### HON. SIDNEY BIRD.

The Board of Trustees desire to express their deep regret at the death of the late Hon. Sidney M. Bird, long a distinguished member of the Board. The following preamble and resolutions were passed immediately after his decease:

Memorial paper and Resolutions in consequence of the death of the late Hon. Sidney M. Bird, a former member of the Board of the Trustees of the Insane Hospitals of the State of Maine:

The business and social relations of the late Hon. Sidney M. Bird of Rockland, with the Board of Trustees of the Insane Hospitals of Maine, have been of such an intimate and important character, that his associates did not fail to realize that they had met with an irreparable loss, when he tendered his resignation, a few weeks ago, as a working member of this Board, which was in consequence of failing health. Early afterwards, our minds were filled with sorrow, but tempered with consolation, on receiving the information that our esteemed friend had passed away, to enjoy the greater blessings of a better life, which event occurred September 21, 1907.

The funeral services were impressive and attended by a large body of mourning relatives and friends, of which number the Board of Trustees and many citizens of the State of Maine were present, or well represented by the usual tokens of respect and affection.

He has left behind the record of a successful business and public life, and always sustained a Christian character illustrated by honesty, integrity and intelligence, which is a worthy example for everyone to imitate and follow; and we fully realize that he was a faithful and efficient member of the Board of Trustees of the Insane Hospitals of the State of Maine for seven years.

Therefore,

Resolved, That we, his associates, desire to bear testimony to the faithful and personal devotion of the late Hon. Sidney M. Bird, deceased, to the best interest of the Insane Hospitals of the State of Maine, so well exemplified by his work, as

Chairman of the Building Committee, in the early construction and finishing of the hospital buildings at Bangor; and also we appreciate his great interest in the general administration of the important affairs of both of the hospitals of our State, which interest continued until the close of his eventful life.

For these considerations covering a period of many years, desire to record a lasting tribute of personal gratitude.

Resolved, That we extend to the widow and members of the family of our deceased associate our warmest sympathy, in this sad hour of their deep affliction.

Resolved, That these resolutions be spread on the records of the Board of Trustees and a copy be forwarded to the family of the deceased.

Let the State of Maine continue its efforts for the comfort and care of its unfortunate citizens, and it will receive great rewards.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RECREATION AND AMUSEMENT OF PATIENTS.

To the Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospital:

Your committee who are entrusted with that important feature of the treatment of our patients which relates to their diversion and recreation respectfully submits its annual report.

It requires much reflection and studious thought to determine just what methods should be pursued to meet the individual wants of the patients in arranging and laying out the lines to be prosecuted in order to offer a maximum amount of moral and mental treatment. If such treatment required only temporary procedures it would be but a trivial matter; but when it is remembered that it is a constant and unremitting care it becomes a more serious consideration.

If we are to accomplish the most that can be done for a patient suffering from insanity we must bring into activity other lines of treatment in addition to what is prescribed by material agencies. We should endeavor to search out and possess an intelligent idea of the individual wants of the patients.

Introspection constitutes a prominent feature of the insane. The feelings are subjective, and the objective and perceptive powers of the mind are overwhelmed by the introversive and illusory condition of the individual. The subjective conditions control the objective and so long as this state exists the person cannot derive any benefit from his exterior surroundings. Hence where in the realm of remedial measures can we look for rational therapy except in devising mental, moral and intellectual agencies in endeavoring to bring about an equilibrium of the subjective and objective psychical conditions. We know that other means are to be used pari passu, but the above meth-

ods are not to be left undone in order to place within the grasp of the individual the highest advantage for improvement or recovery. Diversion is par excellence one of the most potent factors to be pursued in the treatment of the insane.

We would not wish it to be understood that such agencies have not been brought into requisition, because the fact exists that during the past two years there has been placed at our command very material facilities to assist in further advancement in care, in the accession of our seashore home and the acquisition of the Arsenal property which offers an opportunity of constructing a recreation park for our patients.

While as much has been accomplished thus far as we could expect in strengthening the resources of our summer home, yet it will doubtelessly be determined that other appliances in the near future can be seized upon to still further increase its usefulness. We feel assured that no mistake has been made in accepting the property at the island from the general government, and it may be that we do not fully grasp in this early stage of its development what further measures may be instituted to still add to the comfort and well-being of our patients there; but which if persistently pursued, which we have no doubt is the fixed purpose of your board, we can reasonably expect will result in an additional per cent of recoveries. The bungolaw so constructed as to extend the opportunity to our patients of occupying single rooms has fully demonstrated its usefulness in adding contentment and comfort to the occupants. The eighty patients about equally divided among the two sexes who occupied the island during the past season returned much refreshed in physical and mental vigor. We cannot speak too highly of the efforts made in providing increased provisions and we are fully convinced of the advantage and the potent influence which this valuable auxiliary will confer to our patients during the coming years.

We are fortunate as an institution in having at our command bequests amounting to more than fifty-six thousand dollars, the interest of which is designed to be expended for the mental and physical wants of our patients, and we trust that every effort may be made in the future to continue to study practical methods for which this interest may be expended year by year in a judicious and businesslike manner for the benefit of our patients to which they are rightfully entitled.

We cannot refrain from calling the attention of your board again to the absolute necessity of taking steps to arrange for the comfort of our female patients in providing a suitable park for their accommodation upon a portion of the Arsenal ground, thereby relieving them from the exposure incident in taking their morning exercise upon the public highway. It is an objectionable procedure, is an annoyance both to the public and the patients, and should not be allowed longer than is consumed in taking immediate steps to provide a suitable reception in the above-mentioned locality.

A building with an artistic covered veranda, ample in proportions and supplied with water and all necessary appliances, should be constructed. A playground with opportunities for open air games should be furnished where during the long days of summer the patients could spend much of their time there. We hope that definite steps may be taken during the early spring to arrange for this desirable change in order that we may not be under the necessity of obliging our patients to take their morning exercise upon the highways through another season. We suggest that there is no more rational and practical method to prosecute at the present time than in expending from the interest of our bequests a sufficient amount of means to provide for our patients this urgent and necessary convenience.

We regret exceedingly that we could not charter a steamer for our usual trip to the Isle of Springs at the seashore. Our people were much disappointed, as they always look forward with pleasant expectations to this yearly outing. A steamer is being built for the route between this city and the Islands which will be sufficiently able to accommodate three hundred people and which is expected to go into commission during the month of May next year. We have assurance that it can be placed at our use and we trust that such arrangements can be made that two or more excursions can be had during the summer months. Our patients heretofore have derived much comfort in anticipating these excursions months before they take place and we trust they may not be disappointed in the future.

The hydrotherapeutic department which was constructed last year has become a very valuable accessory to treatment and thus far has been of valuable service. We were handicapped through four months of the warmer season in being deprived of our full corps of medical officers and in consequence of this could not take full advantage of the benefits of hydrothepy; yet notwithstanding our limited corps of officers more or less was accomplished. Now we are strengthened in this department and we are doing a large amount of work in this direction and are observing beneficial results.

It has been mentioned so many times in this report in former years it is perhaps unnecessary to speak further of the importance of our instrumental music, and I will simply add that the orchestra is still supplying the necessary melody for our weekly and semi-weekly entertainments which offer to our patients so much pleasure and contentment. We have succeeded in providing about the usual number of entertainments through parties outside of the institution. The high school children of the city who place upon our stage an annual entertainment are always welcome and afford our patients a delightful pastime. A party from town under the auspices of the Armitage Club have recently presented upon our stage a most pleasing and delightful entertainment and which was enjoyed by all. Mrs. Helen Stuart Riching entertained our patients with character reading and songs. It was pleasing and well received. Ouite a number of other parties which it is not necessary to particularize have been secured throughout the year, which we can mention in commendable terms and which seemed to meet the mental requirements of our patients.

We append an itemized account of what has been expended throughout the year from the interest of the Coburn bequest.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT MAINE INSANE HOSPITAL.

To the Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospital:

The rapid succession of the seasons has marked another milestone in the history of the hospital when it becomes the duty of the resident executive officer to present for the consideration of your Board what has transpired in its management during the last twelve months, and I respectfully submit the Superintendent's sixty-seventh annual report. While additional methods are devised from year to year to meet the increasing demands of the institution, yet after all a large part of that which has been accomplished is a repetition so far as the daily routine of labors are concerned and must necessarily remain so; yet there are seasons when various exigencies arise requiring material changes calling for the exercise of new lines of thought and necessitating the pursuance of new methods.

A larger appropriation from the Legislature was obtained than any preceding year in the history of the hospital and in consequence of this unusual aid from that body, intended to be distributed for so many specific objects, it has necessarily increased the burdens and activities of your building committee and the resident officers of the institution in endeavoring to arrange suitable and practical plans to be executed and in advising such methods in building operations as when completed shall best suit the purposes for which the outlays were designed to be expended.

Unquestionably the past year has been the busiest the resident officers of the hospital have ever experienced. The increased demand for labor and higher wages during almost the entire year has made it very difficult to maintain the necessary force in the various departments of the hospital and it required

much of my time in correspondence and advertisements to obtain suitable and necessary employees. Within a month however the industrial conditions have been such as have made applications for employment much more frequent and help is now easily obtainable.

We are pleased to state that accidents among the patients and employees of the institution have been infrequent and we are able to note that but one occurrence has arisen to mar the comfort of our patients, which resulted in the death of one of the inmates by setting fire to her clothing. It was extinguished promptly but the patient had already received so severe a shock to the nervous system that death resulted.

The movement of the population has been as follows: At the commencement of the year there were remaining a total of 806 patients, 446 men and 360 women. There have been admitted since 248, 131 men and 117 women. The number under treatment has been 1,054, 577 men and 477 women. The discharges and deaths have been as follows: Total recoveries, 48, 19 men and 29 women; much improved, 18, 11 men and 7 women; improved, 17, 10 men and 7 women; unimproved, 40, 23 men and 17 women; died, 104, 59 men and 45 women; leaving at the end of the hospital year, November 30, 1907, a total of 827 patients, 455 men and 372 women. The daily average number of patients for the entire year has been 822, the largest number in the institution was 844 August 23d, and the least number was 803, which occurred December 20th of last year. The percentage of deaths to the whole number under treatment has been 9.8 per cent. The percentage of recoveries to the whole number under treatment has been 4.5 per cent and the percentage of recoveries to admissions has been 19.3 per cent.

The death rate has been a trifle higher than that of last year. So long as the disposition remains to commit persons to the hospital so far advanced in years, the mortuary record must necessarily remain larger. I have taken occasion heretofore through my annual reports to your Board and in advising relatives and municipal officers, to disparage the practice of committing this class to a hospital if it can possibly be avoided, because of the fact that when insanity occurs in persons more than seventy years of age the prognosis is exceedingly unfavor-

able and usually the disease runs a rapid course to dissolution. Our observation has demonstrated the fact that the home life of such individuals cannot be broken with impunity and usually death soon ensues from such a radical change as is necessitated in an entire relief from home environments. The medical statistics show that we are quite frequently admitting patients from sixty-five to eighty-five years of age.

#### SUPPORT OF PATIENTS.

The patients are being supported in the following manner, viz: 54 by their own means, 87 entirely by the State, 686 receiving State aid of \$1.50 per week, the towns and individuals paying the balance.

#### RECONSTRUCTIONS. ..

The reconstruction of the laundry, which has been under contract with R. J. Noyes of this city by day labor, has been entirely completed and occupied for several months with the exception of the old carpenter shop which is designed for a sorting room and which could not be renovated until after our new carpenter shop was completed and occupied. I am pleased to strae, however, that since the completion and occupation of the latter the renovation of the one now occupied is nearly ready for its use as an adjunct to the laundry department. The building and occupation of the carpenter shop was executed promptly and it affords an exceedingly convenient and ample workshop in its practical and systematized arrangement, which must necessarily facilitate the labors of that department.

In the reconstruction of the first male wing, the contract for the renovation of which was awarded to R. J. Noyes of this city for the sum of \$37,974, the work has progressed as fast as we could expect. The building is now closed in and the masons at this period are plastering. The probabilities are that it will become sufficiently dried out so that the finish may be commenced during the midwinter and carried to completion in the early spring. It is hoped that we may not be disappointed in our predictions from the fact that we are so crowded on the male side of the hospital that an early occupation is exceedingly desirable.

The criminal insane building, placed under contract to C. E. Hoxie for the sum of \$31,755, for various causes has been delayed and the construction has not progressed so rapidly as has been desirable. As soon as the weather becomes suitable for construction in the early spring it should be pushed to completion as fast as possible, inasmuch as the management of the State Prison find themselves under the necessity of caring for a maximum number of convicts and are in urgent need of accommodations. They desire to occupy the department for the criminal insane for its legitimate purposes at the earliest date possible.

The extra fire service consisting of a cast-iron ten-inch pipe taken from the water mains near the Kennebec bridge has been laid and is practically completed with the exception of connecting up the fire pump designed for the purpose of affording ample fire pressure. This entire service will be completed in the near future and made available in case of conflagration.

The further grading and macadamizing of the Arsenal road was necessarily delayed from the fact that the work could not be undertaken until after the installation of the ten-inch water pipe which runs underneath the roadbed its entire length and which main could not be completed until too late in the season to macadamize. We are getting the material in place and the macadamizing will be done as soon as the weather is suitable early another season.

#### REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

The covering in of the piazza at the Burleigh Pavilion has extended to the patients the benefit of a sun-bath and as it becomes a part of the day-room affords further ventilation and adds greatly to the comfort of the occupants. When all of these various changes contemplated are completed the condition of the institution will become very much strengthened in many ways.

In the process of building and reconstructing it has necessitated very many important changes in our sewerage, waterlines and steampipe equipments of the institution, so that in order to accomplish all of the necessary changes in the above appliances it has required a large additional force of mechanics and day

laborers. From the main of the ten-inch water pipe it has been necessary to construct a water system to supply the new building at the Arsenal and also that of the criminal insane wing. In addition a main has been laid from our steam system at the Arsenal building to supply the necessary wants of the new criminal building and a return pipe of four inches so that this wing will be heated through the same pipe that supplies the former structure.

Sewerage, water and steam supplies have been laid and are in operation for the new carpenter shop.

Since the occupation of the old chapel building we have labored under many inconveniences because of the lack of sufficient incline to allow the condensed steam to run to the engine house. In laying the water pipe across our lawn in front of the hospital to perfect our water supplies for fire purposes, we seized upon the advantage in taking back a two and one-half inch pipe in the same trench from the chapel building to the engine house, which offers ample incline for the escape of the condensed steam. We have also installed an extra amount of radiators for the building, which heretofore have been insufficient. This offers very much more comfort for our patients and adds very materially in the ventilation of the building.

#### FIRE APPARATUS.

The steps taken not only in obtaining an appropriation for an additional water supply to be able to combat a conflagration should fire occur, was not only a timely but a judicious consideration. In this change we have not only constructed four additional steamer hydrants but in the completion of the system two or three additional ones will be installed. This water system connects in several places with our old supply and the hospital reservoir as well.

The reorganization of the fire department, which has for a long time been placed under the direction of the Steward and Treasurer, will be the means of adding much protection in case necessity requires such service. A hose cart, hook and ladder, truck, and five hundred feet of two and one-half inch rubberlined hose has already been added to this necessary department, and upon the completion of the building to be erected for the purpose of protecting the above appliances and other needed

equipments which have been directed to be installed at the hydrants it would seem that the institution will be well prepared to protect its inmates should a fire occur.

#### FUTURE NEEDS.

A little subsequent to the Legislature's enactment whereby all of the insane in the State who are now largely supported by the municipalities are to become chargeable and their support paid from the State treasury, I took occasion to send out a circular directed to all of the municipalities and unincorporated towns of the State and have just received the last of the replies to my interrogations. I had supposed that there were at least four hundred insane being cared for at their homes or in almshouses but have been happily surprised in finding that the returns show but two hundred and eight living and cared for under the above environments. From information obtained through the United States census extending through the last three decades we had reason to believe that insanity has decreased somewhat in the State, and our recent investigations evidently bear us out in this conclusion.

Notwithstanding the smaller number cared for outside of the institution than we had anticipated, yet it is well to bear in mind that as soon as the law comes into effect the municipal officers who have these wards of the State in their charge will be clamoring for their admission to the two hospitals.

I apprehend under the circumstances it is not too early to take into consideration the necessity of additional constructions for this class. It will be necessary at least to receive an appropriation amply sufficient to equip two additional wings as capacious or even larger than are now connected with either hospital. The two extreme wings of this institution accommodate the largest number of patients of this plant, but the legitimate limits do not exceed sixty persons each aside from the necessary rooms for their supervision, and when you take into consideration that the original capacity of the wings at Bangor were only intended for one hundred patients each it will become apparent that there must be constructed for the future wants of the insane either two exceedingly large wings or four small ones. Inasmuch as the officials of the various towns are already con-

templating the prospective change, we do not regard it as premature to present this matter to your Board for your careful consideration.

In previous reports I have advocated the importance of your considering the financial advantages which might be derived in constructing a building in close proximity to the institution for the purpose of providing an industrial department for the employment of our patients. A far more important advantage to be derived than a mere financial expediency would be observed in the increased physical and mental welfare of our people. I will thus leave the consideration of these, as they appear to me, pertinent suggestions, to be passed upon at your discretion.

#### FARM AND GARDEN.

We shall be obliged to leave the details of these two departments to the statistics which will be placed before you in the report of the Steward and Treasurer, which has not yet been completed. It may be stated, however, that it is expected that such detailed accounts will show that both the farm and garden will exhibit the usual yield of products and in some instances exceed that of former years. The hay crop particularly was exceedingly bountiful. We have suffered financially from the loss of our herd of cows, which the Cattle Commission gave directions early last spring to have slaughtered. The appropriation of five thousand dollars from the Legislature for the purpose of supplying a new herd was not to be expended before the first of October, thus offering ample time for the renovation and disinifection of the two cow stables. Consequently they have been left unoccupied through the entire season and have been thoroughly disinfected. Twenty-six cows have already been purchased and four heifers, and we shall continue purchasing as promptly as possible to the limit of the appropriation. With constant and unremitting attention in supplying cows and weeding out when necessary it will be several years before the institution will be likely to have in its possession so fine a herd as the former one before tuberculosis made its appearance.

#### OFFICIAL CHANGES.

During quite a portion of the season we have been handicapped on the medical staff of the institution in consequence of resignations and my inability until late in the season to secure officers for these places made vacant. Dr. J. L. Davis, the interne, after a year's service resigned to go into private practice and my best wishes are extended to him in his new field of labor. Dr. J. B. Macdonald, my third assistant, accepted an invitation to become connected with a neighboring institution and severed his connection from the staff the first of August. He had rendered most valuable service and I regret that it became his duty to accept a more lucrative position. He possesses a strong intellect and was well adapted for institutional work. I bespeak for him much success in his new duties. In consequence of Dr. Macdonald's withdrawal we were obliged to place Dr. Horsman at the Island to care for the patients there, which left the institution with simply two physicians and one interne. I had been endeavoring to procure further assistance from early spring but was unsuccessful until I engaged Dr. Harris C. Barrows as interne, who came to his duties the first of August. I had already engaged Dr. Karl B. Sturgis, but the management of the Maine General Hospital could not spare him until they had secured some one to take his place. He however came to the institution a short time subsequently as interne.

In concluding this report I wish to bear evidence to the kindly interest taken in the institution throughout the year by the committee of Governor's Council and the lady visitor. I wish to express my grateful acknowledgments for the care that has been manifest in the daily routine duties of the institution by the various supervisors and many attendants. The services of my associates in office have been valuable, and during the trying ordeal that through dividen providence I was called to pass in the demise of my only daughter who to me was more precious than life itself, they offered that aid, comfort and sympathy which calls for my profound gratitude and sincere acknowledgments. I am also under deep obligations to every member of your Board for the same kindly services spontaneously imparted in this bereavement. I assure you also, gentlemen, I am not unmindful of your support and kindly consideration in many ways and chiefly in the advice and wise . counsel which you have seen fit at all times to extend.

#### REPORT OF THE VISITING COMMITEE.

LEWISTON, MAINE, Jan. 13, 1908.

To His Excellency the Governor and Executive Council of the State of Maine:

Chapter 144, Section 30 of the Revised Statutes reads: A committee of the Council, consisting of two, with whom shall be associated a woman, shall be appointed by the Governor annually, who shall visit both hospitals at their discretion to ascertain that the inmates thereof are humanely treated and they shall promptly report every instance of abuse or ill treatment to the trustees and superintendent of the hospital, who shall take notice thereof and cause the offender to be punished as required by section twelve.

This section, in a general sense, and subsequent sections more particularly, defines the duty of the visiting committee to the Insane Hospitals. Your committee has done its duty as it understands it.

Frequent and irregular visits have been made to both hospitals. No intimation has been given to the hospital management of any intended visit of the Committee.

The wards have been promptly inspected on reaching the hospital. At no time has your committee observed anything in the way of treatment of the inmates or conditions existing for which the management could be criticized. Lack of sleeping accommodations in a portion of the male wards necessitated some crowding at the Maine Insane Hospital. Liberal appropriation by the last Legislature to provide additional room will, when buildings now under construction and reconstruction are completed, afford the needed room.

Your committee are gratified to be able to report that they are well satisfied that the inmates of both hospitals are kindly

treated, that the management take a deep personal interest in them and that the attendants exercise a large measure of patience toward and kindly consideration for those who have been placed in their keeping.

Your committee is thoroughly satisfied that the summer outing which is afforded many of the patients at Chase's Island is productive of the most beneficial results.

Our visits have been welcomed by the officials of both hospitals and we wish to express our obligation for the courtesy extended to us by them at all times.

Male patients admitted into the institution, should come provided with at least three good cotton shirts; coat, vest and pants, of strong woolen cloth; two pairs woolen stockings, one hat or cap, pocket handkerchiefs, brush and comb, and one pair of boots or shoes.

Females should have, at least, a change of underclothes, shoes and stockings, brush and comb, decent bonnet, and two substantial dresses; the woolens should be of dark color. It is quite desirable, also, that a Bible or Testament should not be forgotten in the outfit.

#### INSTRUCTIONS TO MUNICIPAL OFFICERS IN COMMIT-MENTS TO EITHER INSANE HOSPITAL.

To the Municipal Officers of the Towns in the State of Maine:

Gentlemen:—The present Legislature has just made an important amendment of the law, R. S. chap. 143, sections 13 and 34, relating to the commitment of insane persons to the insane hospitals. The amendment has been approved by the Governor and is now the law. The law is now as follows:

"Sect. 13. Insane persons, not thus sent to any hospital, shall be subject to examination as hereinafter provided. The municipal officers of towns shall constitute a board of examiners, and on complaint in writing of any blood-relative, husband or wife of said alleged insane person, or of any justice of the peace, they shall immediately inquire into the condition of any person in said town alleged to be insane; shall appoint a time and place for a hearing by them of the allegations of said complaint, and shall cause to be given in hand to the person so alleged to be insane. at least twenty-four hours prior to the time of said hearing, a true copy of said complaint, together with a notice of the time and place of said hearing and that he has the right and will be given opportunity then and there to be heard in the matter; shall call before them all testimony necessary for a full understanding of the case; and if they think such person insane, and that his comfort and safety, or that of others interested, will thereby be promoted, they shall forthwith send him either to the Maine Insane Hospital or to the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital with a certificate stating the fact of his insanity, and the town in which he resided or was found at the time of examination, and directing the superintendent to receive and detain him until he is restored or discharged by law, or by the superintendent or trustees. They shall keep a record of their doings, and furnish a copy to any interested person requesting and paying for it."

"Sect. 34. In all cases of preliminary proceedings for the commitment of any person to the hospital, to establish the fact of the insanity of the person to whom insanity is imputed there shall be required the evidence of at least two reputable physicians given by them under oath before the board of examiners, together with a certificate signed by such physicians and filed with said board, that in their opinion such person is insane, such evidence and certificate to be based upon due inquiry and personal examination of the person to whom insanity is imputed; and a certified copy of the physicians' certificate shall accompany the papers of commitment of the insane person to the hospital."

By careful reading of the law as it now is you will observe that it is necessary to give to the person alleged to be insane at least twenty-four hours prior notice of hearing and that he has the right and will be given opportunity to be heard in the matter.

You will also perceive that the amended statute more distinctly sets out the necessity that the physician shall testify under oath before the Municipal Officers as to the alleged insanity of the person.

Proper blank forms have been prepared for use hereafter in proceedings for the commitment of insane persons to our hospitals; and a set of such forms is forwarded you herewith and others will be forwarded you on your request therefor.

- 1. The complaint to be signed by the person making the complaint; to which is attached the order for the hearing and notice, to be signed by the Municipal Officers. Form 1 is to remain on the town files.
- 2. Copy of such complaint and order, attested by the Town Clerk; to be delivered in hand to the person alleged to be insane, by the town constable.
- 3. The commitment paper to be signed by the Municipal Officers and sent forward to the hospital with the patient.
- 4. Record of the doings of the Municipal Officers to be signed by them and attested by the Town Clerk and filed with the town records.
- 5. (a) Physicians' certificate to be filed with the Municipal Officers. (b) Attested copy of such certificate to be sent to the hospital with the commitment paper.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital:

In compliance with the Statutes, I herewith present for your consideration the Superintendent's seventh annual report, for the Hospital year ending Nov. 30, 1907.

The daily average number of patients was 261.9 in 1905, 254.1 in 1906, as compared with 234.4 in 1907, this low average resulting from a transfer of 43 patients to the Maine Insane Hospital, late in 1906, to relieve over-crowded wards. On Dec. 1, 1906, there were 220 patients. During the past year there have been 126 admissions, 70 men and 56 women. There have been 26 deaths and 57 patients have been discharged, leaving, on Nov. 30, 1907, a hospital population of 263 persons, which shows an increase of 43 for the current year, and results in an undesirable over-crowding of present quarters. This condition will be relieved on the women's wards when the wing, now being erected, is ready for the reception of patients. A similar addition for male patients is urgently needed. Accommodations for acute cases can now only be furnished by transfer or discharge of patients, who properly should be cared for in this Hospital, near to their homes and friends. In order to provide for the normal increase of patients from this section of the state, in addition to the number who will be brought here from the town farms when the state care act becomes operative, a new wing for male patients must be erected.

#### DISCHARGES.

Of the patients who have been discharged during the year, 24 have been considered recovered. Hospital statistics from various sources show wide variations in the percentage of recover-

ies, and the differences are so pronounced that any comparison, based upon recoveries, must be misleading. There are no exact criteria that can be applied by all with unvarying results to determine if recovery is complete in a given case. The use of the term "recovered" depends largely upon the conception of the physician in charge of the patient, and the optimistic or critical tendency exhibited by the former.

Complete recovery with no impairment of intellect or change in character or disposition, in the class of patients committed to public insane hospitals, occurs in a small percentage of admissions. We have limited the use of the term to such cases as seemed, at the time of their discharge, to meet these exacting requirements, and included under the term "capable of self-support" a number of patients who, although able to work and return to their families, still show more or less residual mental defect as a result of their psychosis.

There have been 26 deaths during the year, of this number 7 were between 50 and 60 years of age, 3 between 60 and 70, and 2 over 80 years old. Several of the oldest people had been in the Hospital but a short time. As often happens in the mental breakdown of old age, the symptoms that necessitate commitment are those that indicate rapidly approaching dissolution. The propriety of such commitments is sometimes questioned, and the care and treatment of these feeble and demented old people tax the resources of the Hospital seriously. From the humanitarian stand-point, however, I believe the state can do no better charity than to provide reasonable comforts and kindly care for those hopeless cases of senile dementia, who cannot be cared for properly in the average household, and who will not be accepted as patients by other hospitals.

As shown in table No. 12, 90% of the total deaths occurred among those suffering from non-recoverable psychoses. We are fortunate in being able to report freedom from any epidemic diseases during the year. One unusual death occurred. In the early spring, a male patient, 38 years old, who had shown considerable mental improvement during his five weeks' hospital residence, was taking out-door exercise in company with attendants and other patients. He suddenly broke from the crowd and out-running the attendants, who immediately gave

pursuit, headed for the river just above the dam. The ice broke and the patient was drowned.

There have been no serious accidents or injuries. One woman patient tripped and fell into a temporary opening in the basement fracturing her ankle. Complete union was secured.

Five male patients escaped during the year. Three were immediately returned to the Hospital, one was brought back after an absence of several weeks and the remaining patient, who had recovered from the effects of alcoholism, returned to his people, where he was allowed to remain. Such escapes need but a word of explanation. It would be comparatively easy to adopt rigorous measures which would render escape practically impossible. Such a course would result in increased privation and hardship for all patients. It is far better for them to be given all the liberty their condition warrants. Many can safely be granted limited parole privileges, thereby adding greatly to their comfort and well-being. In following such a policy there necessarily will be occasional violations of trust, which must be expected, but which should not discourage our efforts to make life for patients in the Hospital as agreeable and free as possible

#### CHASE ISLAND.

During the months of July, August and September, 45 patients of the quiet and better class, 25 women and 20 men, were able to alternately enjoy the freedom and advantages of this delightful summer home. The physical improvement resulting from several weeks of outdoor life was very marked. Nothing that can be done for our appreciative patients gives them more pleasure and benefit than the break in routine hospital life thus afforded.

#### NEW CONSTRUCTION.

As provided by acts of last Legislature, important additions have been inaugurated. During the coming year the new wing for women will be completed, practically doubling the provisions now existing for women. The building provided for the care of the tuberculous insane patients, both from the Augusta and Bangor hospitals is nearly ready for plastering. It is to be hoped that funds for furnishing this building can be pro-

vided before the next Legislature meets, in order that patients may have the advantages offered by this building during the It will be impossible in this climate to give summer months. all insane, tuberculous patients the same open air regimen that would be given the sane during the winter. We hope to have the full benefit of the summer months by an early opening of the building next spring. With the advantages to be derived from this addition, we shall be able to do everything possible for the treatment of early tuberculosis occurring in cases of recoverable insanity. Perhaps the greatest good that will result will be the removal of unfavorable cases of tuberculosis from the crowded wards where they must now be kept in closest contact with others. Tuberculosis is of frequent occurrence in chronic and demented patients, and with them it is impossible to follow the modern hygienic treatment of consumptives. Their removal to this building, so wisely provided, is a prophylactic measure of the greatest importance in conserving the health of other patients not afflicted with the malady.

A new barn has been erected which gives us greatly needed facilities for handling farm products. The old barn in use on the farm when purchased by the State was entirely inadequate and not worth repairing.

An ice house, capable of holding over 600 tons will be finished in time for use during the coming winter.

Iron fire-escapes have been placed on the outside walls of wings and administration building. A water hydrant has been installed on the city main as it enters the building. In event of a serious fire, an engine from the city fire department could obtain adequate water supply from this source. As the Hospital grows, the water main should be extended so that other hydrants may be placed advantageously. Fire drills among the employees are to be instituted in order to assure the best possible protection from the dangers of a hospital fire.

#### REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

In addition to ordinary repairs necessary to keep plant in a good state of preservation, considerable has been done in repairing the mason work on both wings and office building and much work of this character remains to be completed next season.

The building of macadamized roads and grading necessitated by the new buildings are well under way.

Extensive alterations in the heating and ventilating system have been begun in an effort to carry out the ideas of the engineer who designed the original plans. Greatly improved ventilation will assuredly result from the completion of this work, a considerable portion of which has been done by our own engineering department at a minimum of expense.

Meters and scales have been purchased so that accurate reports can be made by the engineer upon the daily operations of his department. By this method we hope to form intelligent conclusions concerning the efficiency of our present plant.

#### FARM AND GARDEN.

The products of this department have been satisfactory during the past season and have contributed greatly to the support of our population as will be seen by a detailed statement in the steward's report. During the past season able bodied male patients have been encouraged, in greater numbers than formerly, to aid in the farm work much to their own advantage, as well as to that of the Hospital. For the general well-being of those who are able to work, nothing is better than a moderate amount of exercise in the open air. Not only is their physical condition improved, but normal, useful employment in chronic patients tends to retard or prevent the deep dementia so frequently seen in the wards of all insane hospitals.

#### TRAINING SCHOOL.

Four women nurses were graduated last spring from the training school for nurses. The work of instruction will be continued by recitations and demonstrations under supervision of the Superintendent of Nurses, and lectures by the Medical Staff. The course of study will be based upon a recent report of a committee from the American Medico-Psychological Association upon the subject of "Training Schools for Nurses." The increased efficiency and interest in duties displayed by graduate and pupil nurses will always be ample reward for the extra work involved in conducting the school.

#### CHANGES IN MEDICAL STAFF.

Since the last report was presented, there has been an almost complete change in the list of medical officers.

After an extended illness, Dr. P. H. S. Vaughan resigned as Superintendent.

Dr. Burt F. Howard, Assistant Superintendent, resigned to accept a position at Tewksbury, Mass.

Dr. Leroy A. Luce, Interne, left at the end of his term of appointment to assume duties at a private hospital in Amityville, N. Y.

Dr. Forrest C. Tyson was promoted to the position of Assistant Superintendent. During the several weeks following the resignations mentioned, Dr. Tyson had the sole care of the medical interests of the Hospital and deserves commendation for the successful performance of these duties.

Dr. Mary P. Mitchell, who has had three years' experience in Boston Hospitals and nine years in the Danvers Insane Hospital, Mass., was appointed Assistant Physician and has charge of the women patients.

Dr. Louis W: Parady, a recent graduate, was given a year's appointment as interne.

To the judgment and good work of those preceding us, the present staff is under obligations for leaving a basis upon which to continue and develop the work of the Hospital.

#### ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

The Hospital is indebted to Mr. H. M. Pullen for contributing the use of his orchestra to furnish an evening's pleasure for the patients and to members of the High School for giving a musical entertainment. Grateful acknowledgment is made to the following persons for donations of money, candy, books and periodicals: Mr. R. A. Jordan, Miss Engel, Mr. Thomas White, Mr. C. A. Robbins, Mrs. Engel, Mrs. Harry Lewis, and to the members of the Taratine Club.

The successful operation of an institution of this character demands efficiency and attention to duties in every department, and I am under increasing obligations to all who continue to render such service.

In conclusion, I wish to express to you my grateful appreciation of the encouragement and support so generously given.
