



ENROLLMENT.

It appears from the biennial enrollment made in April, 1907, by the assessors of the several cities, towns and plantations of the State that the total number of male citizens of the State of the age of eighteen years and under the age of forty-five years, subject to military duty, is one hundred and three thousand and forty-three, which is one thousand, eight hundred and seventy-two less than in 1905.

DICK BILL.

The Act of Congress known as the Dick Bill, approved January 21, 1903, is published with this report for the information of all concerned.

An Act to promote the efficiency of the militia, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the militia shall consist of every able-bodied male citizen of the respective States, Territories, and the District of Columbia, and every able-bodied male of foreign birth who has declared his intention to become a citizen, who is more than eighteen and less than forty-five years of age, and shall be divided into two classes—the organized militia, to be known as the National Guard of the State, Territory, or District of Columbia, or by such other designations as may be given them by the laws of the respective States or Territories, and the remainder to be known as the Reserve Militia.

SEC. 2. That the Vice-President of the United States, the officers, judicial and executive, of the Government of the United States, the members and officers of each House of Congress, persons in the military or naval service of the United States,

all custom-house officers, with their clerks, postmasters and persons employed by the United States in the transmission of the mail, ferrymen employed at any ferry on a post road, artificers and workmen employed in the armories and arsenals of the United States, pilots, mariners actually employed in the sea service of any citizen or merchant within the United States, and all persons who are exempted by the laws of the respective States or Territories shall be exempted from militia duty, without regard to age: Provided, That nothing in this Act shall be construed to require or compel any member of any well-recognized religious sect or organization at present organized and existing whose creed forbids its members to participate in war in any form, and whose religious convictions are against war or participation therein, in accordance with the creed of said religious organization, to serve in the militia or any other armed or volunteer force under the jurisdiction and authority of the United States.

SEC. 3. That the regularly enlisted, organized, and uniformed active militia in the several States and Territories and the District of Columbia who have heretofore participated or shall hereafter participate in the apportionment of the annual appropriation provided by section sixteen hundred and sixtyone of the Revised Statutes of the United States, as amended, whether known and designated as National Guard, militia, or otherwise, shall constitute the organized militia. The organization, armament, and discipline of the organized militia in the several States and Territories and in the District of Columbia shall be the same as that which is now or may hereafter be prescribed for the Regular and Volunteer Armies of the United States, within five years from the date of the approval of this Act: Provided, That the President of the United States, in time of peace, may by order fix the minimum number of enlisted men in each company, troop, battery, signal corps, engineer corps, and hospital corps: And provided further, That any corps of artillery, cavalry and infantry existing in any of the States at the passage of the Act of May eighth, seventeen hundred and ninety-two, which, by the laws, customs or usages of the said States have been in continuous existence since the passage of said Act under its provisions and under the provisions of Section two hundred and thirty-two and Sections sixteen hundred and twenty-five to sixteen hundred and sixty, both inclusive, of Title sixteen of the Revised Statutes of the United States relating to the Militia, shall be allowed to retain their accustomed privileges, subject, nevertheless, to all other duties required by law in like manner as the other Militia.

- SEC. 4. That whenever the United States is invaded, or in danger of invasion from any foreign nation, or of rebellion against the authority of the Government of the United States, or the President is unable, with the other forces at his command, to execute the laws of the Union in any part thereof, it shall be lawful for the President to call forth, for a period not exceeding nine months, such number of the militia of the State or of the States or Territories or of the District of Columbia as he may deem necessary to repel such invasion, suppress such rebellion, or to enable him to execute such laws, and to issue his orders for that purpose to such officers of the militia as he may think proper.
- SEC. 5. That whenever the President calls forth the militia of any State or Territory or of the District of Columbia to be employed in the service of the United States, he may specify in his call the period for which such service is required, not exceeding nine month, and the militia so called shall continue to serve during the term so specified, unless sooner discharged by order of the President.
- SEC. 6. That when the militia of more than one State is called into the actual service of the United States by the President he may, in his discretion, apportion them among such States or Territories or to the District of Columbia according to representative population.
- Sec. 7. That every officer and enlisted man of the militia who shall be called forth in the manner hereinbefore prescribed and shall be found fit for military service shall be mustered or accepted into the United States service by a duly authorized mustering officer of the United States: *Provided, however,* That any officer or enlisted man of the militia who shall refuse or neglect to present himself to such mustering officer upon being called forth as herein prescribed shall be subject to trial by court-martial, and shall be punished as such court-martial may direct.

- SEC. 8. That courts-martial for the trial of officers or men of the militia, when in the service of the United States, shall be composed of militia officers only.
- SEC. 9. That the militia, when called into the actual service of the United States, shall be subject to the same Rules and Articles of War as the regular troops of the United States.
- SEC. 10. That the militia, when called into the actual service of the United States, shall, during their time of service, be entitled to the same pay and allowances as are or may be provided by law for the Regular Army.
- SEC. II. That when the militia is called into the actual service of the United States, or any portion of the militia is accepted under the provisions of this Act, their pay shall commence from the day of their appearing at the place of company rendezvous. But this provision shall not be construed to authorize any species of expenditure previous to arriving at such places of rendezvous which is not provided by existing laws to be paid after their arrival at such places of rendezvous.
- SEC. 12. That there shall be appointed in each State, Territory and District of Columbia, an Adjutant-General, who shall perform such duties as may be prescribed by the laws of such State, Territory, and District, respectively, and make returns to the Secretary of War, at such times and in such form as he shall from time to time prescribe, of the strength of the organized militia, and also make such reports as may from time to time be required by the Secretary of War. That the Secretary of War shall, with his annual report of each year, transmit to Congress an abstract of the returns and reports of the adjutantsgeneral of the States, Territories, and the District of Columbia, with such observations thereon as he may deem necessary for the information of Congress.
- SEC. 13. That the Secretary of War is hereby authorized to issue, on the requisitions of the governors of the several States and Territories, or of the commanding general of the militia of the District of Columbia, such number of the United States standard service magazine arms, with bayonets, bayonet scabbards, gun slings, belts, and such other necessary accounterments and equipments as are required for the Army of the United

States, for arming all of the organized militia in said States and Territories and District of Columbia, without charging the cost or value thereof, or any which have been issued since December first, nineteen hundred and one, or any expense connected therewith, against the allotment to said State, Territory, or District of Columbia, out of the annual appropriation provided by section sixteen hundred and sixty-one of the Revised Statutes, as amended, or requiring payment therefor, and to exchange, without receiving any money credit therefor, ammunition, or parts thereof, suitable to the new arms, round for round, for corresponding ammunition suitable to the old arms theretofore issued to said State, Territory, or District by the United States: Provided, That said rifles and carbines and other property shall be receipted for and shall remain the property of the United States and be annually accounted for by the governors of the States and Territories as now required by law, and that each State, Territory, and District shall, on receipt of the new arms, turn in to the Ordnance Department of the United States Army, without receiving any money credit therefor, and without expense for transportation, all United States rifles and carbines now in its possession.

To provide means to carry into effect the provisions of this section, the necessary money to cover the cost of exchanging or issuing the new arms, accounterments, equipments, and ammunition to be exchanged or issued hereunder is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

SEC. 14. That whenever it shall appear by the report of inspections, which it shall be the duty of the Secretary of War to cause to be made at least once in each year by officers detailed by him for that purpose, that the organized militia of a State or Territory or of the District of Columbia is sufficiently armed, uniformed, and equipped for active duty in the field, the Secretary of War is authorized, on the requisition of the governor of such State or Territory, to pay to the quartermaster-general thereof, or to such other officer of the militia of said State as the said governor may designate and appoint for the purpose, so much of its allotment out of the said annual appropriation under section sixteen hundred and sixty-one of the Revised

Statutes as amended as shall be necessary for the payment, subsistence, and transportation of such portion of said organized militia as shall engage in actual field or camp service for instruction, and the officers and enlisted men of such militia while so engaged shall be entitled to the same pay, subsistence, and transportation or travel allowances as officers and enlisted men of corresponding grades of the Regular Army are or may hereafter be entitled by law, and the officer so designated and appointed shall be regarded as a disbursing officer of the United States, and shall render his accounts through the War Department to the proper accounting officers of the Treasury for settlement, and he shall be required to give good and sufficient bonds to the United States, in such sums as the Secretary of War may direct, faithfully to account for the safe-keeping and payment of the public moneys so intrusted to him for disbursement.

That the Secretary of War is hereby authorized to provide for participation by any part of the organized militia of any State or Territory on the request of the governor thereof in the encampment, maneuvers, and field instruction of any part of the Regular Army at or near any military post or camp or lake or seacoast defenses of the United States. In such case the organized militia so participating shall receive the same pay, subsistence, and transportation as is provided by law for the officers and men of the Regular Army, to be paid out of the appropriation for the pay, subsistence, and transportation of the Army: Provided, That the command of such military post or camp and of the officers and troops of the United States there stationed shall remain with the regular commander of the post without regard to the rank of the commanding or other officers of the militia temporarily so encamped within its limits or in its vicinity.

SEC. 16. That whenever any officer of the organized militia shall, upon recommendation of the governor of any State, Territory, or general commanding the District of Columbia, and when authorized by the President, attend and pursue a regular course of study at any military school or college of the United States such officer shall receive from the annual appropriation for the support of the Army the same travel allowances, and quarters,

or commutation of quarters, to which an officer of the Regular Army would be entitled if attending such school or college under orders from proper military authority, and shall also receive commutation of subsistence at the rate of one dollar per day while in actual attendance upon the course of instruction.

SEC. 17. That the annual appropriation made by section sixteen hundred and sixty-one, Revised Statutes, as amended, shall be available for the purpose of providing for issue to the organized militia any stores and supplies or publications which are supplied to the Army by any department. Any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia may, with the approval of the Secretary of War, purchase for cash from the War Department, for the use of its militia, stores, supplies, material of war, or military publications, such as are furnished to the Army, in addition to those issued under the provisions of this Act, at the price at which they are listed for issue to the Army, with the cost of transportation added, and funds received from such sales shall be credited to the appropriations to which they belong and shall not be covered into the Treasury, but shall be available until expended to replace therewith the supplies sold to the States and Territories and to the District of Columbia in the manner herein provided.

Sec. 18. That each State or Territory furnished with material of war under the provisions of this or former Acts of Congress shall, during the year next preceding each annual allotment of funds, in accordance with section sixteen hundred and sixty-one of the Revised Statutes as amended, have required every company, troop, and battery in its organized militia not excused by the governor of such State or Territory to participate in practice marches or go into camp of instruction at least five consecutive days, and to assemble for drill and instruction at company, battalion, or regimental armories or rendezvous or for target practice not less than twenty-four times, and shall also have required during such year an inspection of each such company, troop, and battery to be made by an officer of such militia or an officer of the Regular Army.

SEC. 19. That upon the application of the governor of any State or Territory furnished with material of war under the provisions of this Act or former laws of Congress, the Secretary of War may detail one or more officers of the Army to attend any encampment of the organized militia, and to give such instruction and information to the officers and men assembled in such camp as may be requested by the governor. Such officer or officers shall immediately make a report of such encampment to the Secretary of War, who shall furnish a copy thereof to the governor of the State or Territory.

Sec. 20. That upon application of the governor of any State or Territory furnished with material of war under the provisions of this Act or former laws of Congress, the Secretary of War may, in his discretion, detail one or more officers of the Army to report to the governor of such State or Territory for duty in connection with the organized militia. All such assignments may be revoked at the request of the governor of such State or Territory or at the pleasure of the Secretary of War.

SEC. 21. That the troops of the militia encamped at any military post or camp of the United States may be furnished such amounts of ammunition for instruction in firing and target practice as may be prescribed by the Secretary of War, and such instruction in firing shall be carried on under the direction of an officer selected for that purpose by the proper military commander.

Sec. 22. That when any officer, noncommissioned officer, or private of the militia is disabled by reason of wounds or disabilities received or incurred in the service of the United States he shall be entitled to all the benefits of the pension laws existing at the time of his service, and in case such officer, noncommissioned officer, or private dies in the service of the United States or in returning to his place of residence after being mustered out of such service, or at any time, in consequence of wounds or disabilities received in such service, his widow and children, if any, shall be entitled to all the benefits of such pension laws.

SEC. 23. That for the purpose of securing a list of persons specially qualified to hold commissions in any volunteer force which may hereafter be called for and organized under the authority of Congress, other than a force composed of organized militia, the Secretary of War is authorized from time to time to convene boards of officers at suitable and convenient army

posts in different parts of the United States, who shall examine as to their qualifications for the command of troops or for the performance of staff duties all applicants who shall have served in the Regular Army of the United States, in any of the volunteer forces of the United States, or in the organized militia of any State or Territory or District of Columbia, or who, being a citizen of the United States, shall have attended or pursued a regular course of instruction in any military school or college of the United States Army, or shall have graduated from any educational institution to which an officer of the Army or Navy has been detailed as superintendent or professor pursuant to law after having creditably pursued the course of military instruction therein provided. Such examinations shall be under rules and regulations prescribed by the Secretary of War, and shall be especially directed to ascertain the practical capacity of the applicant. The record of previous service of the applicant shall be considered as a part of the examination. Upon the conclusion of each examination the board shall certify to the War Department its judgment as to the fitness of the applicant, stating the office, if any, which it deems him qualified to fill, and, upon approval by the President, the names of the persons certified to be qualified shall be inscribed in a register to be kept in the War Department for that purpose. The persons so certified and registered shall, subject to a physical examination at the time, constitute an eligible class for commissions pursuant to such certificates in any volunteer force hereafter called for and organized under the authority of Congress, other than a force composed of organized militia, and the President may authorize persons from this class, to attend and pursue a regular course of study at any military school or college of the United States other than the Military Academy at West Point and to receive from the annual appropriation for the support of the Army the same allowances and commutations as provided in this Act for officers of the organized militia: Provided, That no person shall be entitled to receive a commission as a second lieutenant after he shall have passed the age of thirty; as first lieutenant after he shall have passed the age of thirty-five; as captain after he shall have passed the age of forty; as major after he shall have passed the age of forty-five; as lieutenantcolonel after he shall have passed the age of fifty, or as colonel after he shall have passed the age of fifty-five: And provided further, That such appointments shall be distributed proportionately, as near as may be, among the various States contributing such volunteer force: And provided, That the appointments in this section provided for shall not be deemed to include appointments to any office in any company, troop, battery, battalion, or regiment of the organized militia which volunteers as a body or the officers of which are appointed by the governor of a State or Territory.

SEC. 24. That all the volunteer forces of the United States called for by authority of Congress shall, except as hereinbefore provided, be organized in the manner provided by the Act entitled "An Act to provide for temporarily increasing the military establishment of the United States in time of war, and for other purposes," approved April twenty-second, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight.

SEC. 25. That sections sixteen hundred and twenty-five to sixteen hundred and sixty, both included, of title sixteen of the Revised Statutes, and section two hundred and thirty-two thereof, relating to the militia, are hereby repealed.

SEC. 26. That this Act shall take effect upon the date of its approval.

Approved January 21, 1903.

As originally provided in this Act five years from the date thereof was allowed for the organized militia of the several states to comply with its provisions. States not complying with its provisions were to be debarred from all benefits to be derived from it. By a recent Act of Congress the time allowed the several states in which to comply has been extended two years or until January 21, 1910.

NATIONAL GUARD.

Under the present law the active militia is designated the National Guard of the State of Maine.

After consultation with the Honorable Secretary of War, Robert Shaw Oliver, General Orders No. 21, A. G. O., Augusta, Maine, December 12, 1907, placing the National Guard, so far as organization is concerned, under the provisions of the Dick

Bill was issued. It provides that on and after January 1, 1908, the National Guard shall be constituted as follows, viz:

"I. In order to comply with the requirements of section 3 of the Act of Congress approved January 21, 1903, entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the Militia and for other purposes," that the organizations of the organized militia of the several states and territories and in the District of Columbia shall be the same as that which is now or may hereafter be prescribed for the regular and volunteer armies of the United States within five years from the date of this act.

The organization of the organized militia of the State of Maine will be as prescribed in this order on and after January 1, 1908.

- II. (a) For the purpose of administration and convenience, the organized militia of the State of Maine will be divided into the staff of the Commander-in-Chief, the National Guard, the Naval Reserve and the Retired List. The Naval Reserve will consist of the ship's company and such other naval organizations as may be allowed by law. The National Guard will comprise all other organizations of the organized militia of Maine.
 - (b) The Staff of the Commander-in-Chief shall consist of:
- I Adjutant General with the rank of Major General, who shall, ex-officio, be Quartermaster General, Paymaster General and Chief of Staff;
 - I Inspector General with the rank of Brigadier General;
 - I Commissary General with the rank of Colonel;
 - I Judge Advocate General with the rank of Colonel;
 - I Military Secretary with the rank of Major;
 - 4 Aides-de-Camp with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.
 - (c) The National Guard shall consist of:

The Medical Department;

The Ordnance Department;

- 2 Regiments of Infantry.
- (d) The Naval Reserve shall consist of:

The Ship's Company.

- (e) The Medical Department shall consist of:
- I Surgeon General with the rank of Colonel;
- 2 Surgeons with the rank of Major;
- 2 Assistant Surgeons with the rank of Captain;

2 Assistant Surgeons with the rank of First Lieutenant and a Hospital Corps.

The medical officer of the Naval Reserve will be considered (ex-officio) as a member of the Medical Department and will obey such orders or instructions as he may receive from the chief of the Department.

Officers of the Medical Department will be detailed for duty with organizations as follows:

To each Regiment of Infantry,

- I Surgeon with rank of Major;
- 1 Assistant Surgeon with rank of Captain;
- I Assistant Surgeon with rank of First Lieutenant.

The Hospital Corps shall consist of:

- 2 Sergeants, first class;
- 6 Sergeants;
- 12 Privates, first class;
- 6 Privates.

Who will be detailed for duty with organizations as follows: To each Regiment of Infantry,

- I Sergeant, first class;
- 3 Sergeants;
- 6 Privates, first class;
- 3 Privates.
- (f) The Ordnance Department shall consist of:
- I Chief of Ordnance with rank of Colonel;
- I Assistant with rank of Major.

The Chief of Ordnance and Assistant shall perform all the duties required by law of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice and Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice.

To each company of Infantry there shall be:

- 1 Captain;
- I First Lieutenant;
- I Second Lieutenant;
- 1 First Sergeant;
- 1 Quartermaster Sergeant;
- 4 Sergeants;
- 6 Corporals;
- 2 Cooks;
- 2 Musicians;
- 42 Privates.

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To each Battalion of Infantry there shall be:

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III. Vacancies or changes in the Staff departments will be filled by appointment by the Commander-in-Chief. Appointees to be examined as required for all officers other than Staff of the Commander-in-Chief.

IV. The provisions of the Militia Law and Regulations of the National Guard of the State of Maine, will, in all cases, be construed in the light of the new organization and will, as soon as possible after that organization is perfected, be rewritten with a view of providing a book of Regulations which will permit the National Guard to work in harmony with the requirements of United States Law.

V. The provisions of this order will not in any way affect the retired list or the laws and regulations in relation thereto.

INSPECTIONS.

Brigadier General Charles E. Davis, Inspector General, made a very careful inspection of the National Guard and his report shows the Guard to be in good condition, better equipped than ever before in its history and ready to respond to any call for duty that may be made. There is a marked increase in interest. attendance and efficiency. Officers and organizations are constantly changing and some organizations must of necessity be weaker than others. All officers will read carefully the report of the Inspector General and where the necessity demands it measures will be taken to correct existing irregularities. inspections commenced on January 7th and closed February 12th, 1907. A second inspection, as provided in General Orders No. 19, A. G. O., Augusta, Maine, December 4, 1906, was made by Captain James B. Mitchell, Artillery Corps, U. S. Army, in accordance with the requirements of section 14 of the Act entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the Militia and for other purposes," approved January 21, 1903. His report to. the War Department shows an improvement over previous years in drill and discipline and with a few trivial exceptions established the fact that the Guard is thoroughly equipped for active service.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

It is a well established fact that unless a man can shoot and shoot well he is of no value as a soldier. Every member of the National Guard is enjoined to read very carefully the able and interesting report of Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector General of Rifle Practice. It shows that most careful attention has been given to this branch of the service and that an advance has been made in the right direction.

The State Rifle Competition was held on the State Rifle Range, Augusta, Thursday and Friday, July 18th and 19th, 1907. The National Guard was represented by teams of seven men and one alternate from each company and regimental head-quarters, the result is fully given in the report of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice. A State of Maine team, consisting of eighteen officers and enlisted men represented the State in the Interstate Match shot at the Third Annual Meeting of the

New England Military Rifle Association at Wakefield, Massachusetts, July 22nd to 27th, 1907. The State was represented at the National Match shot at Camp Perry, Ohio, August 28th and 29th, 1907, under the direction of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice, the team consisting of nineteen officers and enlisted men. A detailed account of the result is given in the report of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice.

Attention is called to the fact that on and after January I, 1908, the title of the officer now known as Inspector General of Rifle Practice will be Chief of Ordnance with rank of Colonel; he is to perform all the duties required by law of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice.

RIFLE RANGES.

The State Rifle Range, located a short distance from the State Camp Ground in the city of Augusta, has been practically completed and was used by the State team for the first time July 18th and 19th of this year. Two stops or butts with target pits each one hundred feet in length and arranged for eight targets have been constructed. The long distance pit is constructed of concrete and earth thoroughly drained and is believed to be so solidly built that repairs upon it will only be normal. The firing points connected with this pit are 200, 300, 350, 400, 500 and 600 yards, each on land owned by the State and through the courtesy of parties owning land adjacent we are enabled to use firing points of 800 and 1,000 yards when necessary. The second pit built of cob work with earth and stone has also been constructed, arranged for eight targets with firing points at 200 and 300 yards.

Suitable buildings have been erected for use of the rifle team, including room for storage of targets and ammunition with mess room for use of the enlisted men.

Telephone connection is provided from the firing points to the target tenders in the pit.

Some slight improvements are still necessary which will be provided for this year. Such improvements in rifle ranges as are necessary and our funds will allow will be made in the several towns and cities during the coming year. It is hoped that we may be able by degrees to provide fairly good ranges for use of the National Guard in the near future. This must

be gradual, however, as our finances are such that it will take some little time to accomplish the results desired.

ARMORIES.

The militia law of Maine, section 78, is as follows:

"Municipal officers shall provide for each company of the National Guard located within the limits of their respective towns, subject to the approval of the commander-in-chief or such officer as he may designate, a suitable drill room and armory or place of deposit for the arms, equipments and other property furnished by the State. They shall also provide suitable rooms for the headquarters of each separate battalion, regiment or brigade established within their limits, and a reasonable compensation for the rent thereof, not exceeding one hundred dollars per annum, may be allowed to the town so furnishing, and paid by the State. * * * * "

No penalties are attached provided the requirements of this law and the law requiring the several towns and cities to provide rifle ranges are not complied with. In the state of Massachusetts a penalty of \$5,000.00 is attached in case towns and cities fail to comply with the law. I submit that the militia laws of Maine should be amended in conformity with the law of other states. Many of our armories are unsuitable for the purpose for which they are intended and do not correspond with armories provided by other states. The larger states construct all armories instead of calling upon the towns and cities to provide them, it is believed that this is the correct course to pursue. In many of the larger states armories are so constructed as not only to provide a suitable place for drill and for the safe keeping of the large amount of property issued by the United States and the states to company commanders but they are made so attractive that it serves as an inducement for the best young men in the several communities where located to enlist and serve in the National Guard. This matter should be presented to our law-makers at the next session of the legislature and a move made in the direction indicated. While there has been an improvement in this respect and our armories are as a whole better than ever before it is believed that the time has arrived when the State should be called upon to act and provide suitable military homes for its citizen soldiers.

CAMPS OF INSTRUCTION.

In compliance with an invitation from the War Department, March 14, 1907, the First and Second Regiments of Infantry and the Medical Corps attended camps of instruction in connection with Coast Defence in the Artillery District of Portland, Maine, from August 8th to 17th, inclusive. The Naval Reserve made its usual summer cruise, the details of which are fully given in the report of Lieutenant Everett G. Scully, Commanding Ship's Company Naval Reserve.

The regiments participating in the maneuvers in the Artillery District of Portland were brought into close contact with the regular force stationed there and beyond question received much valuable instruction from the officers connected with the regular establishment. It is the desire of the War Department that a part of our National Guard shall perform the duties pertaining to Coast Artillery and it is believed by the Department that their service could in this way be made much more valuable to the country. There is and should be no question as to the compliance with this request of the Department but as it will involve an entire re-organization of our National Guard and special legislation is necessary to enable us to properly comply with the request of the Department it has been deemed advisable to postpone action until the matter shall be presented to the legislature at its next session in 1909 and the necessary changes made in our laws. This would give ample time to fully consider the matter and enable the authorities to select such companies as from location or for other reasons would seem best qualified to perform the duties required.

CLOTHING.

The State of Maine was among the first of the states to procure and issue the olive drab uniform. Arrangements were made for its purchase by husbanding our appropriation so that we were able to issue it in 1905. The blue dress uniform, which is the uniform worn on all occasions of ceremony, has become somewhat worn and believing it to be for the best interests of the National Guard requisition will soon be forwarded to the War Department asking that the entire Guard may be provided

with the latest style of the new regulation full dress uniform, it is hoped that the change will prove attractive to the members of the National Guard and also serve as an inducement to new men to enlist in the service of the State. This will entail considerable expense upon the officers in the way of providing themselves with full dress uniforms. In many of the states an allowance of \$25.00 per annum is made to each commissioned officer to aid him in the purchase of necessary uniforms. At the next session of the legislature a requisition for an additional allowance for military purposes will be made in the nature of an allowance of \$50.00 to each commissioned officer in order to enable him to provide himself with the full dress uniform. Officers will not be required to provide themselves with full dress uniforms until 1909.

LEGISLATION.

In order to comply fully with the requirements of the Dick Bill and keep in touch with existing conditions it will be necessary to make extensive changes in our militia law at the next session of the legislature. It will also be necessary to almost wholly change the regulations for the National Guard. An allowance of \$50.00 to be paid each commissioned officer will be requested at the next session of the legislature, in order to enable him to provide himself with the full dress uniform.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith a detailed report of the performance of my duties as Inspector General for the year of 1907 as follows:

ARMORY INSPECTIONS.

In accordance with General Orders No. 18, A. G. O. dated December 1, 1906, I visited the several organizations of the National Guard at their home stations, covering a period from January 1st to February 12th, inclusive, making a critical inspection of each organization, including armories, books, records and all military property in the possession of each.

The Ship's Company Naval Reserve was inspected at Portland on Wednesday, April 3rd.

The several detachments of the Hospital Corps were inspected at the armory and on the date set for the inspection of a Company in the city or town where they were located.

A detailed report of the inspection of each organization was made on the authorized blank form (No. 1) and forwarded to your office at the time of inspection.

ATTENDANCE.

The following table gives the number present and absent at inspection, and also the aggregate strength and percentage present in each organization, as compared with the inspection of 1906.

While the total percentage present shows but a slight increase over that of 1906, more than half the companies show a decided increase both in interest and attendance. The very excessive falling off in the attendance of three companies, has served to bring the average down very near to that of the preceeding year.

The Ship's Company Naval Reserve leads in attendance, with a percentage of 96+, Company M First Infantry, second with 94+, Companies B and L, First Infantry are tied for third place each with 93+; Companies C and M, Second Infantry are the highest in that organization, each with a percentage of 89—.

Only six companies fall below the 66 2-3 per cent that is required by the war department standard, while sixteen are above 75 per cent, eleven above 80 and four above 90 per cent.

Fifteen companies show an increase over last year, Company B, First Infantry making the greatest advance, increasing the attendance from 59+ per cent in 1906, to 93+ per cent in 1907.

Two companies fall below 50 per cent. Companies H, First and D, Second Infantry, while Company I, First Infantry, barely escapes with a percentage of only 51. With the exception of these three companies, the attendance was very satisfactory, taking into consideration the time of year and the fact that a large number of the men are obliged to seek employment away from home during the winter months, many of them at such a distance that attendance would be impossible, without a considerable sacrifice both of time and money.

CEREMONY OF INSPECTION.

All organizations were paraded for inspection in the olive drab service uniform, in heavy marching order and carrying the full field equipment. In general appearance the companies as a whole were very good. The comparatively new and neatly fitting service uniform, with campaign hat, leggings, canteen, haversack and blanket roll, presents a very business like and soldierly appearance. In a few instances I noticed a tendency for wearing badges, stick pins, watch chains and other forms of decoration on the service uniform. This practice should be discouraged by company commanders, as it is both unsoldierly and contrary to regulations. I also noticed several officers wearing the coat of arms of some other state, in place of regulation collar ornament prescribed for the state of Maine, and one officer presented himself for inspection wearing the service cap while the company was paraded in campaign hats. As an example to the men, officers can not be too careful in the matter of dress and soldierly bearing.

Formations as a rule were promptly and correctly made. In one or two instances the captain failed to take his proper position when presenting his company for inspection, and in a number of companies the lieutenants did not seem to fully understand their proper position, some remaining at the "order" while being inspected, others facing about and coming to parade rest before being inspected, and still others returning saber and accompanying the inspecting officer. As a rule the men were steady in ranks and seemed to be fairly well instructed, but in nearly every company the ceremony was marred by the presence in the ranks, of a more or less number of recruits, who

had received no previous instruction, even in the "school of the soldier." I would suggest, that if these recruits were formed by themselves or placed in the line of file closers and dismissed as soon as inspected, it would add greatly to the appearance of the company both in the ceremony and in drill. Two or three uninstructed recruits in the ranks will make the several movements of an otherwise well instructed and finely drilled company, appear ragged and inefficient.

Companies A, B, E and L, comprising the 3rd Battalion, 1st Infantry, under command of Major Frank B. W. Welch, were assembled for inspection on Wednesday evening, February 6th. The First Regiment Band was in attendance and the battalion, after being inspected, tendered a complimentary review to the Adjutant General of Maine.

There were present on this occasion, as guests of the battalion, the Adjutant General, members of the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief, the Colonel commanding, Field and Staff officers of the First Infantry, the Colonel commanding and several officers of the Portland Artillery District, U. S. A., the Mayor of Portland and members of the City Government. The auditorium was well filled with spectators and guests, and the battalion presented a splendid appearance as they marched in review. After the review each company gave a short exhibition drill, covering the manual of arms, company movements in close order, and extended order movements by squads. The drill was exceedingly well executed by all the companies, especially in close order movements, while the efficiency shown in the extended order drill demonstrated the fact, that much time and study had been devoted to that branch of the work.

Major Bial F. Bradbury, Surgeon, with the detachment of the Hospital Corps assigned to the First Infantry, was inspected at Norway, on Thursday, January 10th, Major Edwin M. Fuller, Surgeon, assigned to the Second Infantry, reported to the inspecting officer at Bath, on Wednesday, January 16th, that all the men constituting the Hospital Corps detachment under his command as well as the military property issued for their use, were at Lewiston and as he had failed to notify me of that fact, or make any provisions for the men to report for inspection either at Lewiston or Bath, I was unable to inspect either men or property.

Captain James F. Hill, Assistant Surgeon, assigned to the Second Infantry, reported to me at Waterville, by telephone, that business would prevent this attendance. A sergeant however reported at the armory of Company H on Wednesday, January 23rd, and I was enabled to inspect the property of this detachment, which is kept packed in chests at this armory. I was unable to inspect the detachment at Addison on Saturday, January 26th, as ordered. Lieutenant Fred A. Chandler, Assistant Surgeon, in command of this detachment, was seen at Bangor, and reported that he had failed to read that part of G. O. No. 18, relative to the inspection of his command, and therefor had made no provisions for calling them together. As his men are scattered over quite a territory and there is no place provided for assembly, the men are obliged to keep the military property issued for their use, at their several homes.

What few enlisted men of the Hospital Corps I was enabled to see, impressed me as being a bright, intelligent class of young men, soldierly in appearance and well fitted for the special requirements of that branch of the service.

I do not consider the system of organization now in use as entirely satisfactory. It was originally designed to recruit men at the home stations of the several medical officers, where they could be under their immediate charge and instruction. If this plan was carried into effect, and the officers were sufficiently interested to assemble their men regularly for instruction and drill it might work out all right.

In the First Infantry, the entire detachment of thirteen men is recruited at Norway, and is under the command of Major Bradbury. This detachment holds regular weekly drills, and reported for inspection with 100 per cent present.

In the Second Infantry, four men are recruited at Lewiston. As before reported, owing to a misunderstanding I was unable to inspect this detachment, and so am unable to report as to its condition, efficiency in drill, or what provision is made for the care and preservation of the military property. These men are under the immediate charge of a sergeant, as there is no medical officer of the Guard located at Lewiston. It seems to me, that the only way for these men to receive proper instruction, would be to arrange for them to go to Bath, or detail some officer to go to Lewiston to instruct them.

Four men are recruited at Waterville, under command of Captain James F. Hill. Only one man reported for inspection here, but I found the property all on hand and well cared for.

Four men are recruited at or near Addison, under command of Lieutenant Fred A. Chandler. These men are scattered, and as there is no armory near or other place for assembly or care of property, each man is required to take care of his outfit, and I understand that it is kept at their several homes.

As far as I could ascertain, with the exception of the detachment at Norway, very little if any instruction is given, other than at the annual tour of duty at encampment or maneuvers.

Under existing conditions, I am of the opinion that much better results could be obtained by having the entire detachment recruited at some one place, and under the command of one of the medical officers, instead of being divided as at present; then if suitable rooms were provided for assembly and drill, as well as for care and preservation of property, the entire detachment could receive regular and systematic instruction, and the property would be kept in such condition that it could be found and easily inspected and verified when necessary.

Efficiency in Drill.

I have very little criticism to offer in the matter of drill, as a whole the Guard is more than reasonably efficient in close order movements and the manual of arms.

Considering the size of the drill rooms used by many of the companies, it is truly wonderful that such a high state of efficiency has been attained. Drill in extended order could not be even attempted in many of the armories, with more than a single squad, but the movements were invariably well executed, nearly all the men showing a good understanding of the general principles. The great improvement in this respect, over former years, indicates that much more time has been devoted to the study of extended order drill than ever before.

I find that very little if any attention is given to the study and practice of guard duty, except perhaps just before the annual encampment. I wish I could impress upon company commanders the importance of special study in this most important duty, not only in the armory drills during the entire

year, but also in the schools for theoretical instruction of officers and non-commissioned officers.

Guard duty is the weakest point in the efficiency of the National Guard when at encampments, maneuvers, or other duty, and is the one thing that fails to show any marked improvement, in a week or ten days' tour of duty, always calling for adverse criticism from regular army officers detailed as inspectors and instructors. This failure to improve is accounted for by the fact that an ordinary tour of duty is not long enough to allow more than one tour of guard duty to each officer and enlisted man, with the result, that each day a new guard is mounted, made up of men, the majority of whom have had absolutely no previous instruction.

There is no reason why every man should not know the general orders, and be taught the duties of a sentinel before going into camp, and if a part of each drill were devoted to guard duty all through the year, it would make a very noticeable difference in the efficiency of the guard when on duty.

MILITARY COURTESY AND DISCIPLINE.

I am pleased to report a very noticeable advancement throughout the guard in the matter of military courtesy and discipline. Almost without exception, the men in the armories were quiet, gentlemanly, and soldierly in deportment, and there was a reasonable attention paid to the salute, but there still exists in many of the companies, a tendency for too much familiarity between the officers and enlisted men, in the armories and when on duty.

I fully realize that a strict observance of military discipline is practically impossible in the organizations of the National Guard, constituted as they are, both officers and men being closely connected in the business and social life of the community in which they live, and the time given to the study of military matters being necessarily so limited. Still, the fact remains, that there is nothing that adds so much to the soldierly appearance of a command, at all times, or is a surer indication of a high state of efficiency, than a careful and strict observance of military courtesy and discipline.

I believe that if the commissioned officers would be more careful to maintain the dignity of their positions at all times,

and the enlisted men were more forcibly impressed with the fact that a proper observance of courtesy and discipline, is in no way humiliating or a surrender of personal rights or dignity, but a very necessary and important part of their military education, that every man, no matter what his social or business standing may be, would accept it in the proper spirit and a great improvement would surely result.

PERSONNEL.

I can see a steady improvement in the personnel of the Guard from year to year. There seems to be a greater interest manifested, and a more earnest desire on the part of both officers and men for improvement in military knowledge; when it is taken into consideration, what it means to be a member of the National Guard of today, and the amount of time and hard work that is now demanded of them, not only without material compensation, but at a considerable sacrifice of both time and money, it is evident, that the men who make up the rank and file of the guard, must be actuated by feelings of the purest loyalty and patriotism, and a sincere desire to prepare themselves for the defence of the State and Nation should occasion require.

As a rule, the officers are gentlemen of good character and understanding, and are well qualified to perform the duties of the several positions they occupy. The enlisted men impress me as being intelligent, sober and industrious, and all seem anxious to learn, faithful in the discharge of their duties, cheerful in their submission to the hardships of drill and discipline, and I believe, are ready for any duty.

Too much can not be said in praise of these men, who are willing to give so much of their time for the good of the service and in the attainment of military knowledge.

The average age of the officers of the line is about 30 years, of the enlisted men, about 21 years; the average occupation of the enlisted men seem to be mechanics, although there are a number of farmers, merchants, clerks, bookkeepers, students; in fact, almost every known trade or profession is represented in the ranks of our National Guard.

CONDITION OF CLOTHING, ARMS AND EQUIPMENT.

In no department of the work is there so marked an improvement, as in the care and preservation of military property, particularly in the cleanliness and orderly arrangement of the lockers of the enlisted men. Where two years ago, the above was an exception, now it is the reverse and in only very few instances did I find lockers that were open to adverse criticism; property rooms also were found much more orderly in arrangement, and property not issued to the men, had the appearance of being carefully folded and packed away, instead of being carelessly thrown into a pile or stuffed into a chest as was formerly the condition found in many of the armories.

Rifles, as a whole were found in good serviceable condition, only a few small parts broken or missing, and generally clean. I find rifles in much better condition in companies where they are kept in racks, instead of in the lockers of the men. While nearly all the rifles are found reasonably clean, there is a great tendency to neglect the equipment. In nearly every company bayonets and scabbards were found rusty and dirty, a number of meat cans, knives, forks and spoons, were found dirty and rusty, evidently having been put away after use without being properly cleaned, several canteens were found partially filled with water and many haversacks contained broken hardbread and other remnants of food issued at the last encampment.

As previously reported, the blue blouses and caps, besides being old style and obsolete, are badly worn and very ragged in appearance, particularly the blouses, which were practically ruined at the Manassas maneuvers in 1904, from contact with the oil stuffed gun slings in use at that time.

The olive drab service uniforms, are comparatively new, and in good serviceable condition throughout, but the khaki clothing, is practically all unserviceable and of no further use. I would recommend that it should be ordered in for condemnation; this would relieve in a measure, the over crowded condition of many of the armories.

ARMORIES.

A detailed description of the company quarters will be found in the special report of each organization.

Company F, First Infantry, Sanford, is still without a suitable place to drill, although very good company quarters are provided.

Several of the places furnished by the cities or towns as armories are entirely unsuited and unfit for military purposes, notably at Biddeford, Lewiston, Skowhegan, Norway and Houlton.

Since my last report, Company A, Second Infantry, has been furnished with new quarters, a three story building, formerly used as a machine shop, having been purchased by the City of Gardiner and turned over to the exclusive use of the company. On the lower floor will be an officers' room, an assembly room in which will be the lockers, and a property room, all of good size, a drill room about 50x70 feet will be on the second floor and the third floor will be used for storage purposes, and a gallery range. This building contains plenty of room but will require extensive repairs and alterations, before it can be made suitable for an armory.

The armory of Company H, Second Infantry, Waterville, after having been used temporarily for school purposes, is now undergoing repairs which when completed, will add greatly to the facilities for care and preservation of property, and will make the building much better adapted for an armory than ever before.

In many of the places, it is reported that the drill halls used by the companies are controlled by the city or town authorities, who let them for amusements, etc., whenever possible, frequently on regular drill nights, thus interfering greatly with the regular work of the company. This practice causes an uncertainty as to when drills can be held, and results in a falling off in interest and attendance, as it frequently happens, that a company will assemble on a regular stated drill night, only to find the hall in use for some other purpose. This is indeed discouraging, particularly where men have to walk four or five miles through the country, on a cold or stormy winter night, as is frequently the case.

In Portland, the use of the auditorium is allowed the companies on the first and third weeks of each month. As there are five organizations to use this hall, it is plain to see that if one company is deprived of a drill, it is impossible to make it up, for the hall is in use every other evening of the week, by one of the other companies. Under both the State and the United States law, a company in order to come up to the required standard, must have not less than twenty-four meetings for drill each year; this means at least two drills each month, and under present arrangements it is practically impossible for the companies located in Portland to comply with the law, and it places them at a decided disadvantage as compared with the companies in some of the other cities and towns, where they are given exclusive use of the armories, and can drill every week and every night in the week, if they desire.

In only a very few armories are there really suitable facilities for the convenient handling, storage and issue of the large amount of military property, that the existing laws and regulations, and the requirements of the War Department, make it necessary for each company to keep always in the armory, and ready for immediate issue.

The difference in the size and arrangement of the individual lockers is limited only by the number of organizations. All are much too small to accommodate the number of articles required to be kept in them, having been built, in a majority of cases, when one uniform, an overcoat, with rifle and equipment, constituted the entire outfit issued to the enlisted man of the Guard. To the above has now been added two more uniforms. making three in all, which with overcoat, blanket, poncho, shelter half, poles and pins, canteen, haversack, mess kit, and rifle and equipment, constitutes an outfit that, in many of the armories, requires the utmost nicety of calculation to get inside the locker, and it is practically impossible to take out one or more articles for use, without upsetting the entire arrangement. In one company, that has the good fortune to have the necessary room, which I regret to say is the exception not the rule, there has been arranged a system of keeping each man's entire outfit, except service uniform, rifle and equipment, in the property room, in boxes, or pigeonholes built in tiers, and numbered to correspond with the lockers. This is, I think, an excellent

arrangement, as it relieves the crowded condition of the lockers, and at the same time keeps each man's complete outfit by itself and ready for immediate issue when required.

The practice of keeping the rifles in racks, that has been adopted by a number of the companies, is in my estimation a great improvement over keeping them in the individual lockers. In the racks they are under the observation of the commanding officer at all times, a missing rifle, lack of proper care, or a broken part can be instantly detected, while in the lockers, it is impossible to keep in touch with the general condition, or discover a loss, except through the tedious operation of opening each locker and handling each rifle; besides, the rifle is often subjected to injury by being shut in with damp or wet clothing, and in many instances where men are not regular in attendance, being allowed to remain for months with absolutely no care or attention.

Books, Papers and Records.

In every command, some attempt is made to keep a more or less comprehensive record, but with the exception of the regular reports and returns which are made on printed forms, there seems to be no uniform system employed, in fact each company record is kept according to the undivided ideas of the company commander.

I would suggest that some uniform system of company records, made as near like that employed in the regular service as is practicable, be established by orders, and insisted upon in all companies.

I would also suggest, that official correspondence, reports, returns, etc., be made a special study at all meetings for theoretical instruction.

This is a very necessary part of the knowledge required to successfully conduct the affairs of a military organization, and one that is sadly neglected in the National Guard of this State.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

This department of the work, is fully covered by the annual report of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice.

It is my duty to inspect and report upon the general condition, location, accessibility and available distances, of each

range, and this will be found in the separate report of the inspection of each organization.

It is gratifying to note, that in this year the Guard has attained the highest point of efficiency in its history, and it is safe to predict, that under the able direction of Colonel Dill and his assistant, Major Dooley, the State of Maine will very soon rank among the first in point of efficiency in rifle shooting.

ARMY MANEUVERS.

In compliance with an invitation from the War Department, both the first and Second Regiments of Infantry and the Medical Corps, attended camps of instruction, in connection with coast defence in the Artillery District of Portland, for ten days, August 8th to 17th, inclusive. As I was not ordered on duty, and saw nothing of the maneuvers, I am unable to report upon the duty performed, general efficiency, etc., as is required of me in ccase of the annual encampment.

In company with the Adjutant General I made an unofficial visit to Fort McKinley, Fort Preble and Fort Williams. The National Guard organizations stationed at these posts seemed to be pleasantly located and were apparently enjoying their experience of army life, as well as gaining most valuable instruction through contact with the regulars.

REMARKS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

Every year the organized militia of the several States is being brought nearer to the regular army standard in general efficiency, drill, uniform and equipment, and every year more and more is required of the National Guardsman, in order to keep up to the high standard demanded and insisted upon by the War Department. While I have not hesitated in this report, to call attention to every little irregularity noticed, it is done, not in a spirit of mere fault finding, but in the sincere hope that where such irregularities do exist, they may be discontinued with the result of an increased efficiency all along the line.

It must be understood from the criticism made that the really efficient work and great improvement, is not known and appreciated. The National Guard of Maine is more than ever efficient, finely equipped, well drilled and disciplined, and will, I believe, compare favorably with the Guard of any other State. It is a matter to be proud of, that under existing conditions, with the very small amount appropriated for military purposes in this State as compared with what is being done for the National Guard of other States, and in many localities, with armories that are entirely unsuitable and unattractive, that the Guard of Maine could have attained its present state of efficiency, speaks volumes for the loyalty and love for the service, that inspires its officers and men to the extra effort of maintaining the interest and efficiency, under adverse and often discouraging conditions.

Great credit is due these men, who are giving so much of their time and energy to the advancement of the service, and in the attainment of knowledge and improvement in military matters, and I hope in the near future, as the general government seems disposed to do more for the Militia of the several States, and in the necessary revision of the laws and regulations governing the National Guard of the State, that many needed changes and improvements in the system, may be acted favorably upon by the next Legislature, to the end that conditions may be much improved and the problem of maintaining an efficient Guard be simplified and made easier for us all.

Under the head of recommendations, I will simply repeat some of those made in former reports.

- 1. That recruits be thoroughly instructed in the school of the soldier before being allowed to enter the ranks of the company, for any purpose whatever.
- 2. That more care be exercised in the selection of non-commissioned officers, that qualification should be considered rather than long service or good fellowship, and after appointment, that they should be held up to the faithful and efficient discharge of their duties, under penalty of immediate reduction.
- 3. That lieutenants and non-commissioned officers be given more opportunity for practical work in handling the company, giving commands, etc.
- 4. That a part of each drill be devoted to guard duty, that every enlisted man be compelled to memorize the "general orders" and be taught the duties of the sentinel, and that sergeants and corporals be instructed in their duties. All this

can be taught in the armory, and if accomplished, will materially strengthen one of the weak places in our guard.

- 5. That a uniform system of company records, based upon the regular army, also a uniform system of property issue to the enlisted men, be established and insisted upon, in every organization.
- 6. That the clerical work of the company, including reports, returns, official blanks, and particularly military correspondence, be made a special study for all officers and non-commissioned officers.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

PORTLAND, December 8, 1907.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of small arms practice in the National Guard of the State of Maine, for the season ending November 1, 1907:

A tabulation of the returns from the several organizations required to qualify under Special Course "C" shows that the Guard has attained the highest point of efficiency in its history. The ground lost last year through inadequate range facilities has been recovered and in addition the State figure of merit has been increased to a point well above any previous record.

With few exceptions, the companies which have a low figure of merit have been under some handicap and the commanding officers state that with the early opening of the season on Patriots' Day next spring they will be able to make a more satisfactory showing in the season of 1908. The enthusiasm with which the Guard has entered upon the present indoor season indicates increasing interest and warrants a belief that next year will show a still greater advance. Every effort is being made to furnish each organization with a suitable range and when this is accomplished failure to maintain a high figure of merit will be chargeable wholly to the companies themselves. The spirit which was in evidence at the recent joint school of instruction in Augusta convinces me that the Guard has reached a more stable footing than it has known since the Spanish war

and that unanimity of purpose which now actuates it will aid this department greatly in securing the sustained interest which is necessary for success.

The figures for the past season show the largest number of men ever qualified beyond the Third Class and the smallest number of men in the Fourth Class (not firing). To go above the Third Class, men must have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards. This year 500 members of the Guard have done so and of this number 116 have fired at 600 yards, done timed-fire at 200 yards and made at least one skirmish run, 54 of them having added to this two or more full scores at 800 and 1000 yards.

Sustained effort in seeing that every man in the company qualifies above the grade of Third Class is what makes for a high figure of merit under Special Course "C" and it is to this that attention should be directed throughout the coming season.

FIGURE OF MERIT.

The recapitulation of qualification, as shown in the report of this department to the Adjutant General of the Army at Washington, under date of December 1, 1907, is as follows:

These scores gave the team an aggregate of 506, which was twelve points ahead of the Sixth Massachusetts which took second money. The Maine marksmen won their match at the 600-yard stage, pulling up from third to first place by remarkably fine shooting.

In the company team matches for five-men teams at 200 and 500 yards, slow fire, the Maine marksmen did well, though they did not carry off either trophy. In the second company team match for a trophy presented by the Governors and Staffs' Association of Maine, known as the State of Maine Match, the team representing Company D, First Infantry, was second with a total of 308, which was but one point behind Company G, Fifth Massachusetts, which won the trophy, and the team representing Company F, First Infantry, took third money with a total of 303. The team representing Company B, Second Infantry, also made a creditable showing.

Sergeant Daniel I. Gould of Company K, First Infantry, won the Hayden trophy at 200 yards with a score of 34 out of a possible 35. He also won the Hale trophy at 1000 yards with a score of 31 out of a possible 35, and stood fourth in the McLane match at 500 yards with a possible score of 50—standing fourth in the shoot-off.

Lieutenant Daniel W. Wentworth of Company F, First Infantry, was third in the First Brigade (New Hampshire) match at 600 yards, with 67 out of a possible 70, and was seventh in the Governor Floyd match at 300 yards (prone) with 137 out of a possible 150.

THE INTERSTATE MATCH.

Four teams were entered in the New England Interstate match shot on Thursday and Friday of the tournament. Massachusetts proved an easy winner. Maine was second, Connecticut took third place and New Hampshire was fourth. The conditions for the match were identical with the National Match conditions for the current year and included a skirmish run, rapid-fire at 200 yards and slow-fire at 200, 600, 800 and 1000 yards.

The Maine team, constituted under General Orders No. 12, State of Maine, A. G. O. c. s., included: Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, Team Captain; Major John J. Dooley, Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice, Range Officer; Captain Gilbert M. Elliott, Adjutant, First Infantry, Team Adjutant and Quartermaster; Captain John W. Nash, Company D, First Infantry; Captain Arthur H. Field, Company B, Second Infantry; First Lieutenant Daniel W. Wentworth, Company F, First Infantry: First Lieutenant Moses P. Stiles, Company D, First Infantry; Second Lieutenant John J. Coughlin, Company B. Second Infantry: Second Lieutenant Lyman H. Daughraty, Company D, First Infantry; Ouartermaster Sergeant Joseph F. THE NATIONAL MATCHES.

Maine was represented at the National Matches held under the direction of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice at Camp Perry, Ohio, August 28th and 29th, 1907, the team being the same as for the New England Tournament with the addition of Sergeant Dan F. Christie of Company F, Second Infantry.

The long tour of duty in the artillery district of Portland intervening between the New England and National meets

prevented anything like regular practice for team members and the Maine team reached Camp Perry two days before the opening of the National Match, badly handicapped by lack of team practice. A majority of the State teams against which Maine shot had been on the Ohio range for a week or more, participating in the matches of the National Rifle Association. This match practice gave them an acquaintance with range conditions which the Maine team men could not acquire in the limited time at their disposal. The preliminary week's work would have materially assisted the team but it would have incurred an expense too heavy for a state with such limited military funds as Maine.

The skirmish run of the team was discouragingly low, the team's total being far below the practice work of the men on ranges with which they were acquainted, but as teams of experienced skirmishers were likewise baffled by conditions to a greater or less extent. Maine's poor showing at this stage is not so surprising. Lacking team practice in rapid-fire, the score at this stage was also low; but when the slow-fire stages began Maine forged slowly up the list and ended the match in twenty-sixth place in a field of forty-eight teams. Two years ago at Sea Girt the Maine team was weak at 600 yards but this season's work at Wakefield and Camp Perry showed great improvement. At the 800-yard stage of the National Match the Maine team stood second in a field of forty-eight, being but three points behind the Naval Academy team which was first. Both team totals were above anything hitherto recorded for twelve-man teams at 800 yards and the Maine men and the naval cadets were warmly congratulated upon their excellent work. At 1000 yards the conditions were very trying, especially to the newer men of the Maine team, mirage, wind and light presenting a combination which took many an experienced man off the target several times during his string.

The mess provided at Camp Perry was extremely poor and the mess service equally bad, two things which tended to make the tour of duty far from agreeable. On the morning of the opening of the match, in particular, though the Maine team was at the mess tent promptly at the opening hour of six, the men who shot on the team were forced to leave for the firing point with little or no breakfast. As a result of mess conditions,

none of the team returned to Maine in as good shape physically as they left and several were quite seriously ill. The Ohio authorities say that another year messing arrangements will be improved and every officer and man who attended the 1907 meeting hopes that this will prove true for men must have proper food if they are to do their best as riflemen.

In the National Individual Match which followed the National Match nearly all the Maine team men entered and,

aided by the experience gained in the latter, made still better scores. The improvement was noticeable in the skirmish work, the aggregate for twelve individual members being over 800, as against 582 in the match.

Practice as a team is essential to high scores in skirmish runs and I trust that such practice may be arranged for the Maine team next year before it enters the New England or National matches.

STATE COMPETITION.

The State competition was held on the State range at Augusta, July 18th and 19th, the company team match being shot on the former and the inter-regimental match on the latter.

The company team match was shot at 200 and 500 yards, being open to teams of seven men, each man firing two sighting and seven counting shots at each range. The order of merit was as follows:

FIRST INFANTRY.

First Prize—Company D of Norway. Score, 384. Second Prize—Headquarters. Score, 375. Third Prize—Company F of Sanford. Score, 375. Fourth Prize—Company M of Westbrook. Score, 357.

SECOND INFANTRY.

First Prize—Company F of Dover. Score, 398. Second Prize—Company B of Lewiston. Score, 395. Third Prize—Company C of Bath. Score, 381. Fourth Prize—Company L of Houlton. Score, 343.

Company F of Dover won the Colonel Newcomb and Major Presson trophies, the former offered for the high aggregate in the regiment and the latter for the high aggregate in the third battalion.

COMPANY INSPECTORS.

The special prizes offered for company inspectors were won as follows:

First Infantry—First prize, Sergeant Daniel I. Gould, Company K, with score of 58; second prize, Sergeant Guy F. Stevens, Company D, with score of 56.

Second Infantry—First prize, First Sergeant Ernest F. Keating, Company L, with score of 62; second prize, First Sergeant Cornelius J. Kelleher, Company B, with score of 61.

THE INTER-REGIMENTAL.

The Inter-Regimental match was open to a team of ten from each regiment, two sighting and ten counting shots being fired by each man at 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards. The First Infantry team proved an easy winner, rolling up a total of 1659 against 1588 for the Second Infantry team.

NAVAL RESERVE COMPETITION.

The annual inter-divisional competition of the Naval Reserve was held on the Portland range, Saturday, October 5th. The competition was open to teams of six, each man firing two sighting and five counting shots at 200, 300 and 500 yards. The Second Division won the match, its aggregate being 309 against 287 for the First Division. The prize for the high individual aggregate was won by Boatswain's Mate 1st Cl. Harold H. Doble with a score of 64. Ensign Louis S. Heseltine won the second prize with a score of 60. In addition to the inter-divisional, there was continuous shooting for the lapel buttons and the medal offered by the National Rifle Association of America.

GALLERY PRACTICE.

Last winter's gallery practice under the direction of Major John J. Dooley, Assistant Inspector General of Rifle Practice, aroused great interest and the qualification average was high. The Portland firm of Eastman Brothers & Bancroft offered a handsome silk banner to the company securing the highest figure of merit, Company D, First Infantry, Norway, being the winner. The system of indoor qualification will be continued the present winter and arrangements will be made so that every organization in the Guard will have an opportunity for practice.

RANGES.

During the past season the Portland organizations have been provided with a range which permits firing up to 600 yards. Another season it is hoped that skirmish firing points may be added so that qualification in the Sharpshooter class will be possible. The range is the old city of Portland range on Ray street in the East Deering district. Through the co-operation of the Myles Standish Rifle Club, the State and the city, the range was re-leased and put in thorough repair, being equipped with the most approved bullet shields to minimize the danger from wild shooting. The complaint against stray bullets has been materially reduced and slight additional work on the stops will, it is believed, make the range absolutely safe, even for men shooting outdoors for the first time. A range keeper has been present every day since the range was open to prevent the use of the range by unauthorized persons and to see that those authorized fired from the proper points in the rear of the shields. In this post Mr. Amasa H. Cobb has given faithful service and perfect satisfaction. The range was not opened until July 4th but in that portion of the season remaining the Portland organizations secured practice which helped bring up the figure of merit for the State. With a full season and the advantage of early season work, the commanding officers of the Portland organizations assure me a marked increase in 1908.

The organizations in Lewiston and Auburn are without range facilities and that most of them show comparatively good figures of merit is due to their loyalty in volunteering to go to Brunswick for qualification if the State furnished transportation.

Company G, First Infantry, Biddeford, is without range facilities and the men of the command volunteered to go to Sanford, the State providing the transportation.

Company C, Second Infantry, Bath, has been greatly handicapped for range work, going to Brunswick for much of its qualification.

Company F, Second Infantry, Dover, needs a new range and has a site in view which will permit practice up to 1000 yards.

Certain sums have been set aside by the State for range improvements another year and it is probable that suitable range sites can be found for the companies now without target facilities.

The State range at Augusta was used for the State team tryout and for the State competition, meeting every demand satisfactorily. The installation of a permanent telephone system connecting all the pits and firing points, the erection of wind flag poles at proper intervals and further ditching and improvement of the roadway from the range house to the pits will make the range one of the best of its size in New England. Although 600 yards is the limit of the range, through the courtesy of the Tayntor Granite Company, which owns the land on the hill across the Whitten road from the State property, firing points at 800 and 1000 yards were established during the State team tryout.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I renew my recommendations in regard to representation at the New England and National meets, not only by State teams but by company and regimental teams. The expense of sending a company team to Wakefield for the company team matches is slight and the experience which the men receive greatly aids their organization on its home range.

I recommend that the range season for 1908 open on Patriots' Day. By opening the season on a holiday, every company can make it a field day at the range and commence the qualification of a large per cent of its men. With such a start, it will not be so difficult to get every man to the range during the season, and to see that he fires at least two full scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards. Unless men are advanced beyond the 200-yard stage, the company figure of merit must necessarily be disappointingly small.

As a further incentive to early qualification, I recommend that qualification insignia be issued from month to month throughout the range season. As fast as their men qualify in the higher classes company commanders can forward on a special form, through this office for verification of classification,

a statement of the work accomplished with a request that the prescribed insignia be issued at once. To prevent the issuance of more than one medal to any man during a season, the requisition will state that no insignia for higher qualification will be issued during that season until the insignia then being requisitioned for has been returned to the office of the adjutant general. I believe that this plan will greatly assist company commanders in the attainment of a high figure of merit. The man who qualifies as an Expert in May knows that he will receive his medal in June and have the honor of wearing it for the remainder of the season. Others, seeing his medal, will wish one like it and will be willing to find time to go to the range and earn it. Officers to whom the suggestion has been explained are unanimous in saying that its adoption will greatly increase the State figure of merit.

I renew the recommendation that proficiency in small arms practice be made a requisite for the warrant of non-commissioned officers. Its addition to the qualifications required for commission has resulted in a marked improvement in general knowledge of small arms practice.

The Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta:

SIR:—Referring to the memoranda submitted by Captain James B. Mitchell, Artillery Corps, U. S. A., in connection with the inspection of the organized militia of the State of Maine, which was made recently by him under the provisions of General Orders, No. 71, War Department, series of 1903, I am directed by the Secretary of War to invite your attention to the fact that in the organizations named below more than twenty-five per cent of the organized strength was absent from the said inspection:

FIRST REGIMENT OF INFANTRY.

Company D: Absentees, 13; aggregate, 50; per cent absent, 26.00.

Company I: Absentees, 21; aggregate, 48; per cent absent, 43.75.

Company G: Absentees, 15; aggregate, 53; per cent absent, 28.30.

Company H: Absentees, 12; aggregate, 38; per cent absent, 31.58.

SECOND REGIMENT OF INFANTRY.

Band: Absentees, 12; aggregate, 26; per cent absent, 46.15. Company D: Absentees, 19; aggregate, 42; per cent absent, 45.24.

Company G: Absentees, 18; aggregate, 46; per cent absent, 39.13.

Company F: Absentees, 13; aggregate, 49; per cent absent, 26.53.

Company E: Absentees, 17; aggregate, 38; per cent absent, 44.74.

In order that the War Department may be enabled to determine what assistance the State is entitled to for its militia, the Secretary of War desires that you make such inquiry as may seem desirable, and advise the Department with regard to the cause or causes of the large number of absentees from the 1907 inspection of the organizations mentioned above, and as to the measures that will be taken in order to secure a larger attendance at future inspections.

In connection with this matter, your attention is invited to the fact that Companies D, I, G, First Infantry, and Companies G, E, Second Infantry, with percentages of absentees from the 1906 inspection of 9.43; 20.41; 20.75; 31.43, and 21.17, respectively, had percentages of absentees from this year's inspection of 26.00; 43.75; 28.30; 39.13, and 44.74, respectively.

MEMORANDUM.

EXTRACTS FROM MEMORANDA OF INSPECTION, GIVING REMARKS OF THE INSPECTING OFFICER CONCERNING THE ORGANIZATIONS OF THE MILITIA OF MAINE AT THE RECENT INSPECTION.

General Headquarters. Records well kept and office well conducted, but correspondence with organizations of the Guard not done in manner now in vogue in regular establishment.

FIRST INFANTRY.

Headquarters. Enlisted men: Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, very good; 95% could be relied upon. Physical Examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

These officers and enlisted men reside in different towns in State. Three battalion quartermaster and commissaries are to be commissioned soon.

Enlisted men throughout the regiment are well armed, uniformed, and equipped. Officers are, as a rule, very enthusiastic.

It is believed that the extreme cold weather was accountable for some of the absentees from inspection.

Band. Physical appearance, good; character, zeal, efficiency, and reliability, not known.

No physical examinations made of bandsmen. Members of the band furnish their own uniforms and instruments. When in camp, chevrons, overcoats, blankets, and mess outfits, furnished by State. It is doubtful if bandsmen would enter the United States service if called upon to do so. New bands would probably have to be enlisted. This statement is from the Adjutant General of the State.

Company A. Physical appearance, and character, very good; zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% of the command could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies an armory with three other companies. A very good building of modern type, with administration building and drill hall. The city authorities control the drill hall, and frequently let it for amusements on drill nights, which seriously interferes with drills. Each company has an officers' room, an assembly room, a recreation room for men, and a combined locker and store room, which is too small. Other rooms well suited to the purpose.

Target Practice: This company's outdoor range not suited to Course C, and new one should be provided. State authorities now trying to secure new land for a range for the four companies in Portland. This company had a figure of merit of 7.09 with 27 fourth-class men. A suitable indoor range in basement now being used.

This company has been in existence since June 6, 1803.

Company B. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904, but several men looked undersized.

Armory: This company occupies an armory with three other companies. A very good building of modern type, with administration building and drill hall. The city authorities control the drill hall, and frequently let it for amusements on drill nights which seriously interferes with drills. Each company has an assembly room, recreation room for men, and a com-

bined locker room and store room which is too small. Other rooms well suited to the purpose.

Target Practice: This company had no target practice last season on account of outdoor range not being suitable for Course C. State authorities now looking for a new site for a range; indoor season about to commence; good range in basement. Figure of merit o.o with 49 fourth-class men.

Company C. Physical appearance, good; character, zeal, and efficiency, very good; a few undersized men in ranks; 95% of the command could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has a separate building for an armory, with a drill hall. This company has an excellent store room with property well arranged, and attractive assembly room for the men, open at all times.

Target Practice: Company completed Course C, last season; figure of merit 33.85, 37 men in class four. A very good gallery in basement of armory; indoor season about to commence, awaiting arrival of two .22 caliber rifles with ammunition.

This company uses the same range as the companies in Lewiston, which is not satisfactory on account of its being too wet. Steps are being taken to secure new range.

Company quite steady in ranks.

Company D. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, very good; 95% of command could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has an armory in same building with city government; drill room; one room for officers; one for non-commissioned officers, and a locker room for privates in basement. There is no suitable room for the entertainment of the men.

Target Practice: This company holds the State record. No men below marksman. This company has a figure of merit of 143.0, with no fourth-class men; outdoor range suitable for Course C; indoor season just commencing, with excellent results.

This company's interest in target practice is very great.

Company E. Physical appearance, very good; character, zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% of command could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies an armory with three other companies. A very good building of modern type with administration building, and drill hall. The city authorities control the drill hall and frequently let it for amusements on drill nights, which seriously interferes with drills. Each company has an officers' room, an assembly room, a recreation room for the men, and a combined locker room and store room, which is too small. Other rooms well suited to the purpose.

Target Practice: Part of this company had Course C last season with a figure of merit of 18.83 and with 34 fourth-class men; outdoor range not suitable for Course C. State authorities looking for new site for range; indoor range in basement and indoor season just starting.

Company F. Physical appearance, character, and zeal, very good; efficiency, good; reliability, 95%.

Under section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, this company has only had 19 drills in year 1906, on account of not having a drill hall.

Physical examinations now made under Circular, February 8, 1904,—a few small men.

Armory: This company has no drill hall; has a room for officers; a recreation room, and a combined locker and store room for the men in a business block; locker room not suitable for the storage of extra property. When new town hall is built, suitable quarters for this company will be included.

Target Practice: This company completed Course C last season with a figure of merit of 70.0 with 11 fourth-class men; a good outdoor range suitable for Course C; no indoor range available so no indoor practice is held.

Company G. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, very good; 95% of the command could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

This company has an armory in a business block with drill hall; small room for officers, and a locker room for men, which is also the store room. It is not well suited for the purpose, as it is not large enough and has only one window.

Target Practice: This company did not complete Course C as the range was not suitable; figure of merit of 3.2, with 36 fourth-class men. A suitable outdoor range should be secured; indoor range in armory, and season just commencing.

On night of inspection all roads were heavily drifted with snow and five men could not reach armory, one man drove six miles and shoveled his way through snow drifts and upset his sleigh twice

Company H. Physical appearance, character, and efficiency, good; zeal, fair; 95% could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has an armory in a business block with drill hall; one room for officers, a locker room and a store room, locker room not clean and no place made attractive for men. All rooms with exception of drill hall not clean.

Target Practice: Range only suited to fire at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and cannot be skirmished over. Figure of merit, 15.11, with 22 fourth-class men; indoor range in drill hall, and indoor work about to commence.

This company has shown a marked improvement in attendance over last inspection. There is still room for improvement, not only in attendance, but also in appearance.

Company I. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, good; three undersized men in ranks; 95% of the command could be relied upon. Section 18, of Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies an armory with two other companies. Each company has one room for the officers; one room for the men; one store room; lockers too small, and no

gun racks; quarters not attractive for men. Men not steady in ranks.

Target Practice: Company completed Course C last season; figure of merit, 18.42; 24 men in class four; gallery range in drill hall, and indoor season about to commence, awaiting the arrival of two .22 caliber rifles and ammunition.

Outdoor range not satisfactory, too wet at certain seasons of the year. Steps are being taken to secure new range.

This company did not make as good an appearance as at last inspection.

Company K. Physical appearance, very good; character, zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been lived up to.

Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has an armory in an old church with drill hall. The officers have a room, there is a good store room, and a locker room for the men; armory is fairly clean, but is not made attractive for the men, there being no recreation room for them.

Target Practice: This company completed Course C last season, with a figure of merit of 45.71, with 14 fourth-class men. This company has a good range used for all the State matches; indoor range in drill hall, and season just commencing.

Company L. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% of the command could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been carried out.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies an armory with three other companies. A very good building of modern type, with administration building and drill hall. The city authorities control the drill hall and frequently let it for amusements on drill nights which seriously interferes with drills. Each company has an officers' room; an assembly room; a recreation room for men, and a combined locker and store room, which is too small. Other rooms well suited to the purpose.

Target Practice: This company could only partially carry out Course C on account of poor range facilities. Had a figure

of merit of 2.85, with 30 fourth-class men; indoor season just beginning with good range in basement of armory. State authorities looking for a new site for range.

Company M. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, very good; 95% of the command could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies two floors of a brick building with drill hall; room for officers, and an assembly room for men, open at all times; locker and store room in one, guns kept in racks; armory clean and neat.

Target Practice: This company completed Course C last season with a figure of merit of 82.75, and with 7 fourth-class men. Outdoor range suitable for Course C; indoor season just commencing; indoor range in drill hall.

This company still maintains its high standard of excellence of former inspection.

Hospital Corps. Physical appearance, character, and zeal, very good; efficiency, good; 95% could be relied upon. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has not been complied with.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

The thirteen members of this detachment reside in towns near where the three surgeons live. The surgeons are responsible for their instruction. These men should be equipped as called for in General Orders No. 23, War Department, 1906, with the latest equipment. Medical pouches should be kept filled for immediate use.

SECOND INFANTRY.

Headquarters. Enlisted men: Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, very good; 95% could be relied upon.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

These officers and men reside in different towns of the State. Enlisted men throughout the regiment all well armed, uniformed and equipped. Officers as a rule are very enthusiastic.

It is believed that the extreme cold weather was responsible for some of the absentees from inspection. Band. Physical appearance, good; character, zeal, efficiency, and reliability, not known.

Bandsmen not examined physically. Members of the band furnish their own uniforms and instruments. When in camp chevrons, overcoats, blankets, and mess outfits furnished by the State.

It is doubtful if bandsmen would enter the United States service if called upon to do so. New bands would probably have to be enlisted. This statement is from the Adjutant General of the State.

Company A. Physical appearance, and efficiency, very good; character, and zeal, good; 95% of the command could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with. Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has recently moved into a building formerly used as a machine shop. This building has room for one company, but requires extensive repairs to make it suitable for an armory.

Target Practice: This company had Course C last season, with a figure of merit of 51.62, with no fourth-class men. The company has a range only up to 500 yards and cannot skirmish on it, has to use other ranges; indoor season about to commence, gallery range being constructed in attic of armory.

This company shows improvement over last inspection.

Company B. Physical appearance, and character, very good; zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% of command could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with. Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies the building with two other companies. Each company has one room for the officers; one locker room for the men, and one store room; lockers too small, and no gun racks; quarters not attractive for men.

Target Practice: Completed Course C last season, figure of merit, 74.18, 6 men in class four. Galley range in drill hall, and indoor season just begun; two .22 caliber rifles used; out-

door range not satisfactory, too wet at certain times. Steps being taken to secure new range.

Company C. Physical appearance, character, and zeal, very good; efficiency, very good; 95% of the command could be depended upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with. Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has an armory in a business block with a drill hall; one room for officers, and a recreation room for the men; lockers and store room in gallery, guns stored in racks. All the armory clean and lockers roomy and well cared for.

Target Practice: This company completed Course C last season with a figure of merit of 25.3, with 24 fourth-class men; outdoor range only suitable for 200 yards, all other firings take place on the range at Brunswick, which is reached by trolley; indoor season about to commence; a good gallery range in armory.

This company shows a decided improvement over last year's inspection. No man absent from inspection, two men coming from Massachusetts to be present.

Company D. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% of command could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with. Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies an armory with two other companies. Each company has one room for the officers; one locker room for enlisted men; and one small store room, and drill hall; lockers too small and no gun racks; quarters not attractive for men.

Men not steady in ranks, did not stand at attention.

Target Practice: Company completed Course C last season; figure of merit, 12.38, 23 fourth-class men. Gallery range in drill hall, and indoor season about to commence; two .22 caliber rifles, and ammunition ordered supplied; outdoor range not satisfactory, too wet at certain times. Steps being taken to secure new range.

This company shows an improvement over last year, but there is still room for improvement.

Captain, an officer of experience, but has recently been away from duty on account of illness.

Company E. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% of the command could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been carried out. Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has an armory in a business building with drill hall. Hall available on two nights of the week, other nights used as a skating rink; small room for officers; two locker rooms for men, one used as store room also. Armory not made attractive for men, has no assembly room.

Target Practice: This company held Course C last season with figure of merit of 37.93, with 10 fourth-class men. Outdoor range suitable for Course C, up to include 500 yards; indoor season not properly under way as owner of the building objects to shooting in drill hall.

On night of inspection, thermometer registered 30 degrees below, which probably had some effect on poor attendance. One man came five miles on snow shoes to inspection.

Company F. Physical appearance, and character, very good; zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% of the men could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been carried out.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has an armory in a business block with drill hall; one room for officers, and an attractive assembly room for the men; guns kept in a rack. No wall lockers for clothing; clothing kept in box lockers on drill room floor. Store room not large enough. Building well heated.

Target Practice. This company completed Course C last season with a figure of merit of 39.35, with 23 fourth-class men. Indoor season just commenced; gallery range in armory in drill hall; outdoor range suitable for Course C.

Company G. Physical appearance, and character, very good; zeal, and efficiency, good; 95% could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with.

Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has the exclusive use of a building for an armory, and has a drill hall; one room for the officers and one each for the noncommissioned officers and privates containing lockers; store room not large enough; no recreation room for men.

Target Practice: This company completed Course C last season with figure of merit of 39.56, with 24 fourth-class men. Outdoor range suitable for Course C; indoor season about to commence; gallery range in armory.

Company H. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, very good; 95% of the men could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with. Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies a building formerly used as a city hall, and for some months past it has been jointly used as a school, but the company now has its exclusive use; has drill hall; one room for officers, and one each for the non-commissioned officers and men; a very good store room in basement with property well arranged. The building, at present time being renovated, will make a good armory when finished.

Target Practice: This company had Course C last season with a figure of merit of 64.55, with 7 fourth-class men. This company has a good range; indoor season about to commence; a suitable indoor range in basement.

This company maintains its high standards of past inspections but should be recruited up to the minimum strength of 50 enlisted men.

Company I. Physical appearance, and character, very good, zeal, very good; efficiency, good; 95% of the men could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been carried out.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company occupies an entire building with drill hall; drill hall fitted up as a gymnasium; lockers in drill hall, and of good size; room for officers, and a good size store room. Armory open at all times for men's use.

Target Practice: This company fired under Course C last season, with a figure of merit of 4.31, with 29 fourth-class men. Outdoor range not suitable for Course C; indoor season just commencing; indoor range in drill hall. Company owns a sub-target machine not in working order.

This company's target record is not good in some measure, due to poor outdoor range.

Company K. Physical appearance, and zeal, excellent; character, and efficiency, very good; 95% could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with. Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has its armory in a building over several stores; has a drill hall; one small room for officers; one recreation room for men, and a kitchen. Lockers and store room for property in gallery overlooking drill hall which is not entirely satisfactory; guns kept in racks; not sufficient lockers for entire company.

Target Practice: Company completed Course C last season, with a figure of merit of 15.88, 28 men in class four; range not in good condition until middle of last season. Gallery range in drill hall, and season about to begin; two .22 caliber rifles just received.

This company very steady in ranks, and again made a most excellent showing at inspection. Both officers and men very enthusiastic.

Company L. Physical appearance, character, and zeal, very good; efficiency, good; 95% of the men could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with. Physical examinations are made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has the second floor of a building for an armory, with drill hall; one room for officers, and a store room. Lockers in drill hall; store room not suited to the purpose, and armory not made attractive for the men.

Target practice: This company completed Course C with a figure of merit of 115.58, and had no fourth-class men. Outdoor range suitable for Course C; indoor range in drill hall. Company owns a sub-target machine; indoor season not com-

menced, awaiting the arrival of .22 caliber gallery rifles and ammunition.

Company M. Physical appearance, character, zeal, and efficiency, very good; 95% could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with. Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

Armory: This company has its armory in the city hall, and drills in the assembly hall. The officers have one room, and there is a locker room for the men which is also the store room; large lockers well kept, the only thing lacking is a recreation room for the men.

Target Practice: This company completed Course C last season with figure of merit of 28.17. There were 32 fourth-class men; the range was not available until near the end of the season; range is now in good condition; no indoor range in armory, and consequently no indoor practice held.

This company is in good condition, but its efficiency is lessened by the low standard of target practice; an indoor range should be provided at once.

Hospital Corps. Physical appearance, character, and zeal, very good; efficiency, good; 95% could be relied upon.

Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has not been complied with.

Physical examinations made under Circular, February 8, 1904.

The thirteen members of this detachment reside in towns near where the three surgeons live, with the exception of the three men in Lewiston. The surgeons are responsible for their instruction. No surgeon near Lewiston to instruct three men there.

These men should be equipped as called for in G. O. 23, W. D., 1906, with the latest equipment. Medical pouches should be kept filled for immediate service.

- SIR:—I. I have to submit the following report on the cruise of the Naval Militia of the State of Maine.
- 2. The battalion, consisting of three officers and forty-six enlisted men embarked at Portland, Maine, in the forenoon of August 20, 1907. The itinerary was as follows: Underway 10.16 A. M., August 20, 1907. Anchored in Hampton Roads, Va., 7.55 A. M., August 22, 1907. Underway 5.45 A. M., August 26, 1907. Anchored in Portland Harbor, 5.25 A. M., August 28, 1907.
 - 3. The battalion was exercised as follows:

August 20—General ship instruction by squads. Fire and collision quarters and abandon ship.

August 21—Morris tube and loading drills; heaving the lead; signals.

August 22—Morris tube; loading drill; signals. One squad visited a battleship for observation and instruction.

August 23—Morris tube; loading drill and signals. At 1.00 P. M. battalion landed at Jamestown Exposition.

Augusta 24—Battalion returned from Jamestown Exposition at noon. In afternoon, selected 6 pdr. gun crews and drilled them for team work. Boat drill.

August 25—The captain inspected the battalion with the ship's company at Sunday inspection. A squad visited a battle-ship for observation and instruction.

August 26—Had 6 pdr. target practice in forenoon and signals and heaving the lead in afternoon.

August 27—Heaving lead, knotting, splicing, signals and general ship instruction by squads. Bag and hammock inspection.

August 28—Disembarked battalion.

- 4. In addition to the above drills, the men of the battalion were assigned to general duties, to regular duty as messmen, stood lookout and anchor watches, scrubbed decks, cleaned bright work, had setting up drills, and performed generally as far as practicable all the duties of the enlisted force of the ship. The battalion quartermasters kept watch with ours.
- 5. The two line officers—one lieutenant, commanding, and one ensign voluntarily kept watch and watch, standing with our ship's officers, and both were instructed in the use of the sextant.
- 6. Target practice was held at ranges varying from 1000 yards to 1300 yards. The target was a flag stepped on a raft. The ship's officers spotted. The battalion made a greater percentage of hits than any other battalion under instruction so far, but the time was only fair. Only a few cases of "gunshyness" were noted, and on the whole the target practice was good. More drill and instruction for officers and men is needed.
- 7. For the purposes of drill and instruction, the battalion was divided into two deck divisions, each in charge of one of their line officers.

- 8. The inspection of bags and hammocks showed that the bedding and clothing outfits were in excellent condition, and the bags and hammocks themselves were very clean and in excellent condition. The mess gear was ample in quantity, and was well taken care of by the messmen. The mess outfits were inspected daily.
- 9. The discipline of the battalion, with the exception of the fact that two men overstayed liberty a few hours, was excellent. These men were promptly and properly disciplined by their commanding officer. The men of the battalion created a most favorable impression with our officers and crew by their attention to duty, neat appearance and good conduct. All the men seemed anxious to get all possible benefits of a short cruise. The officers were zealous and wished to improve themselves professionally.
- In I renew my recommendations made in my report on the Massachusetts Naval Brigade in regard to the use of black bags and of tarpaulins for the protection of hammcoks and also that a suitable professional library be obtained for the use of the officers and men. I also renew my recommendation that the cruise be made two weeks in length instead of one. The more I see of the several militia organizations the more am I in favor of a longer cruise.
- II. It is to be regretted that a coast State cannot muster a larger battalion than does Maine. The men of the battalion are either clerks or mechanics, as the seafaring men of the coast have been found unreliable in attendance for drills during the year. It is thought that a large and competent engineer force could be recruited in the vicinity of Bath, and that additional deck divisions could be formed at Eastport and at Rockland. The naval militia has \$2,000 to \$2,500 available out of a total sum of \$36,000 annually appropriated for sea and land forces. This fact and because there is generally a lack of encouragement and appreciation of the naval militia by the people of the State make matters hard for the battalion officers. I commend them for their good work under these circumstances.

SIR:—Referring to the department's letter No. 1010-261 of June 3, 1907, prescribing itinerary of cruises of Naval Militia, I have the honor to submit the following reports concerning the Naval Reserves of the State of Maine:

There were no members of the Artificer branch connected with the organization.

2. I desire to invite the attention of the Bureau to the fact that the Naval Militia of the State of Maine come, almost exclusively, from Portland and the immediate vicinity, there being a State law limiting the residence of members of militia organizations to points within six miles of their headquarters. It is believed that a most efficient battalion particularly as regards the Artificer branches might be organized at Bath, Maine, were it not for the additional expense to the State.

- 3. The present appropriation for military purposes is thirty-six thousand dollars, of which only about thirty-three hundred dollars are devoted to the Naval Militia.
- 4. For the same reason the only means in the possession of the Portland battalion for exercises afloat is a naval cutter, it being understood that the maintenance of a larger vessel would make too heavy a demand on the State appropriation.
- 5. I am further informed that the coastwise sailors and fishermen as a rule are not regarded as satisfactory recruits for the Naval Militia since they can seldom be relied upon to be regular at drills or to appear at all at any selected time. A large proportion of this class of men are said to be foreigners: Portugese, Scandanavians and Nova Scotians. Neither in training nor habits of living are they regarded as desirable recruits.
- 6. The Portland battalion is drawn from American citizens; clerks, mechanics, etc. The discipline appeared excellent comparing favorably with that of other states. The men worked willingly and hard. Their clothing, bags and hammocks were exceptionally clean and well ordered.
- 7. The commanding officer, Lieutenant E. G. Scully, on account of the shortage of officers performed the duties of a watch officer voluntarily.

Headquarters Ship's Co., N. R., N. G. S. M., Portland, Me., October 1, 1907.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the annual cruise of this command for 1907:

In accordance with Special Orders No. 55, issued from the Adjutant General's Office, July 29, 1907, the Ship's Company Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., boarded the U. S. S. Prairie in Portland harbor at 9.40 A. M., Tuesday, August 20, 1907, with

a strength of three officers and fifty-six men. The embarkation was accomplished before the time established in the orders (10.00 A. M.) to comply with a special request forwarded by wireless Monday noon by the commanding officer of the Prairie.

The ship proceeded to sea immediately, and stood out from Portland harbor at 10.16 on various courses. When Cape Elizabeth light-ship was abeam at 11.20, 1-8th mile distant, course was set S. 15° W.—ship steaming 13.5 knots. The men were billeted and assigned to watches. Had setting-up, fire, collision, and abandon ship drills at afternoon quarters.

At 6.55 P. M., the Marconi Towers (Wellfleet) Cape Cod, were abeam, 5.6 miles distant, and the course was changed to S. 18° E. Sighted the U. S. S. Mayflower, flying the President's flag, standing to the southward and convoyed by two torpedo destroyers. Changed course to S. 15° W. at 10.12, and at 11.44 to S. 51° W. Nantucket shoals light-ship was abeam, 3.4 miles distant, at 1.28 A. M., and course was set S. 65° W.

Setting-up drill at quarters Wednesday was followed by loading drill and Morris-tube practice with 6-pound semi-automatic guns, also practice at heaving the lead. Changed course of ship at 5.15 P. M. Wednesday to S. 70° W.

Cape Charles light-ship was sighted at 5.05 A. M. Thursday, and course was changed to S. 51° W. The light-ship was abeam and close aboard at 5.28, and the course was changed to S. 58° W., and thence on various courses standing into Hampton Roads. Anchored at 7.55 A. M.

The officers and men of this command were exercised continually during Thursday (August 22) at loading-drill and Moris-tube practice, also knotting and splicing, and the same work was continued Friday morning. At 1.00 P. M., shore liberty until 11.00 A. M. Saturday was granted to the naval militiamen, and all were landed at the Jamestown Exposition. Two men failed to return on time, but reported later and were subjected to punishment. The 1st and 2nd divisions were drilled in the ship's cutter under oars Saturday afternoon.

The Ship's Company Naval Reserve was mustered for inspection at 9.15 Sunday morning, and the men and their uniforms were scrutinized by the commanding officer of the Prairie. Mess gear, and the condition of quarters below, were also inspected, and commended.

Were under way at 5.45 Monday morning (August 26) and steamed various courses standing out of Hampton Roads. At 7.09, Horseshoe light-ship was abeam, 1-4 mile distant, and course was set S. 59° E., changed to N. 59° E. at 7.31—steaming 13.5 knots.

Dropped target over side at 9.00, and engaged in practice with naval militiamen firing semi-automatic 6-pounders. Actual firing from 9.33 to 9.57. Number of shots fired, 60. Number of men firing, 10. Shots per minute, 3.9. Hits per minute, 2.6. Percentage of hits, .60. This is the highest percentage of hits made by any naval militia body taken out on the Prairie during the summer. Two men, Boatswain's Mate 1st Class Harold H. Doble and Seaman Leroy E. Christensen, achieved clean scores of six hits each. The firing was comparatively slow, but in my opinion, the men displayed good judgment in preferring accuracy to rapidity and consequent perforation of the sea only.

The target was picked up, and the ship went ahead at full speed at 10.14 A. M. The naval militiamen were instructed in signaling—semaphore and navy hoist—during the remainder of the morning and in the afternoon

Had knotting and splicing drill Tuesday morning. The ship's course was changed at 9.00 A. M. to N. 69° E., and at 11.38 to N. 30° E., held until sighted Nantucket shoals light-ship at 12.40 P. M. Approached the light-ship steering various courses. When off port beam, at 1.33—1-4 mile distant, set course N. 45° E., changed at 3.12 to N. 9° E. Lieut. F. L. Chadwick, executive officer of the ship, closely inspected hammocks, clothes bags and personal gear of the naval militiamen during the afternoon watch, and expressed a very complimentary opinion.

At 4.45 the course was changed to N. 22° W., at 7.23 to N. 9° W., and at 8.00 to N. 22° W. again. Cape Cod light was abeam at 9.42 P. M., distant 4.2 miles, and course was set N. 9° E.

Cape Elizabeth light-ship was sighted at 3.15 A. M., Wednesday, and was abeam at 4.34. Steamed various courses standing into Portland Harbor, and anchored at 5.25. The Ship's Company Naval Reserve disembarked at 8.45 A. M., Wednesday, August 28, 1907.

The cruise was highly successful from every point of view, and was especially characterized by an entire absence of sickness of any description. In addition to the drills mentioned, the men performed regular ship's duty—standing watches on the bridge, aloft, etc., and participated with fine spirit in the daily routine of scrubbing decks, cleaning brasswork, painting ship, and similar labor. The petty officers were mated with men of corresponding rates in the ship's crew, and worked faithfully without exception. Indeed, so far as the duties of the gunner's mates were concerned, the work was performed entirely by the petty officers of the same rating in the 1st and 2d divisions of this command, who lost their identity as naval militiamen.

Two officers stood watch and watch with the ship officers. I take the opportunity to express appreciation of the services of Lieut. George H. Turner, Jr., Assistant Surgeon Ship's Co., N. R., and of the earnest work of Ensign Louis S. Heseltine, Comdg. 1st Div. Ship's Co. N. R. Lieut. Franklin Q. Twitchell, Executive Officer Ship's Co. N. R., and Ensign Fred S Twitchell, Comdg. 2d Div. Ship's Co. N. R., were unable to make the cruise. The commanding officer of the Ship's Co. took command of the 2d Division on shipboard.

The attitude of the officers and men of the Prairie was courteous and considerate to a marked degree. Commander Albert A. Ackerman is an enthusiastic believer in the naval militia, and did everything in his power to make the cruise a pleasant one.

It is regrettable that the Prairie was short of officers. The routine duties of the ship officers kept them very busy, and any time devoted to the instruction of this command was clearly an additional burden. I believe a ship assigned to cruising with naval militia should be provided with extra officers selected for a peculiar fitness to serve as instructors, and I reiterate my opinion that the Navy Department should establish a definite course of instruction to match the years of service of the individual militiaman—this to be distinct from the instruction in gun practice given to all.

It is also a matter of regret that the Prairie was not supplied with a sufficient number of navigational instruments, hence

when the time arrived for the taking of sights, etc., no instruments were at the disposal of the naval militia officers.

I respectfully recommend that white mustering suits be issued to this command at once. My men were "out of uniform" on the Sunday at Hampton Roads, and were thus compelled to remain aboard ship instead of visiting the various warships—in number 22—then at anchor, as planned.

The cruise was unquestionably of vast benefit to this organization, and on the authority of the commanding officer and executive officer of the Prairie, expressed in terms too emphatic for a report, I have reason to assert positively that the work of the command was in every way creditable to the State it represented.

In accordance with the recommendations of the Assistant Secretary of War, company and corps commanders will cause the enclosed General Orders No. 3 to be read to their several commands at the first meeting held after the receipt of this order and will address a communication to this office stating that the instructions have been complied with.

General Orders, No. 4.

I. Under the provisions of an Act passed by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled and approved March 15, 1905, it was provided as follows in Section 37 of said Act:

"The several organizations of the National Guard shall be constituted the same as is now or may be hereafter prescribed for the regular or volunteer armies of the United States, provided that in time of peace, or until changed by order of the Commander-in-Chief, the organizations of the National Guard shall be constituted as follows:"

Section 39 of said Act provides as follows:

"A battalion of infantry shall consist of one major, one battalion adjutant (first lieutenant), one battalion sergeant major and four companies."

In order to conform more closely to the regimental organizations as prescribed for the Regular Army Section 39, herein mentioned, is amended as follows: In the second line after the words "first lieutenant" add the words 'one battalion quartermaster and commissary (second lieutenant)' so that Section 39 as amended shall read as follows, viz:

'A battalion of infantry shall consist of one major, one battalion adjutant (first lieutenant), one battalion quartermaster and commissary (second lieutenant), one battalion sergeant major and four companies.'

Battalion quartermasters and commissaries will be appointed by the regimental commander upon the recommendations of the battalion commanders.

II. Commencing with April 1, 1907, an allowance of not exceeding \$20.00 per annum will be made to the quartermaster sergeant of each company who shall aid in the care and responsibility of property. Under the law two divisions of the Naval Reserve are considered the equivalent of one company of infantry. An allowance not exceeding \$10.00 per annum will be made to the chief petty officer who shall aid the commanding officer of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve in the care and responsibility of property and not exceeding \$10.00 per annum will be allowed to each division to be paid to the yoeman 3d class, who shall aid in the care and responsibility of property. Such allowances shall be made when approved by the Inspector General who shall certify that he has personal knowledge that the duty has been properly performed.

III. General Orders No. 3, War Department, Washington, January 7, 1907, provides as follows:

"By direction of the President the minimum enlisted strength for each organization of the organized militia is fixed as follows:

For a company of infantry, total enlisted 58. This is based on appointment to grades as follows, viz: One first sergeant, one quartermaster sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals, two cooks, two musicians and forty-two privates."

There will be kept on hand at these headquarters a sufficient supply of arms, clothing, etc., to completely equip for the field the minimum number of men prescribed by the President for each organization so that on being called into the service any organization may be completely equipped from the stores on hand in the State without calling on the War Department for assistance. Any organization which is below the minimum and which is obliged to recruit to its proper standard is thus enabled to immediately uniform, arm and equip the recruits before proceeding to the place of concentration where they will eventually be mustered into the service of the United States. Owing to lack of sufficient appropriations to enable this department to comply fully with the provisions contemplated in General Orders No. 3, no change will be made in our present organization but each company will remain the same as is now constituted, viz., fifty enlisted men and three officers. The change will be made as soon as our appropriations will allow.

IV. The medical officers of the National Guard of the State of Maine in the examination of men for enlistment and re-enlistment will follow closely the instructions contained in Circular issued by the War Department under date of February 8, 1904. All examinations will be made to conform strictly to the regulations as now provided for the enlistment or re-enlistment of men in the Regular Army.

General Orders, No. 5.

I. In accordance with Paragraph VIII General Orders No. 201, War Department series of 1906. Paragraph 477, 588, and 604, Infantry Drill Regulations, are amended to read as follows:

477. At the assembly, the companies are formed and inspected.

At adjutant's call, each battalion is formed in line; the battalion adjutant having taken his post in front of the center, before presenting the battalion to the major, receives the reports of the captains as prescribed in battalion parade.

When the battalions are formed the adjutant's call is again sounded and the regiment is then formed in line, each major opening ranks in his battalion as soon as it is formed on the line, regulating on the base battalion; each battalion adjutant takes post on the right of the staff of his major.

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The adjutant, after indicating the point of rest, takes post facing to the left, six paces to the right of the post of the lieutenant colonel, and draws saber; when the line is formed, he informs the first major: Sir, the line is formed. The majors, in succession, bring their battalions to parade rest.

The adjutant then turns to his left, commands: SOUND OFF, and takes post, facing to the front, six paces to the right of the post of the lieutenant colonel.

The band, playing in quick time, passes in front of the adjutant and field officers to the left of the regiment and back to its post on the right, when it ceases playing.

When the parade is at retreat, the adjutant turns to the left as the last note of retreat is sounding, and, when it is finished, commands: I. Battalions, 2. ATTENTION, and resumes his front; the band plays "The Star Spangled Banner."

The adjutant then moves at a trot parallel to and three paces in front of the line of field officers to the center of the regiment, turns to the right and halts at a point midway between the colonel and the front rank, faces the regiment and comands: I. Present, 2. ARMS:. or if the battalion be not at attention: I. Battalions, 2 ATTENTION, 3. Present, 4 ARMS, faces the colonel, salutes, and reports: Sir, the parade is formed.

The colonel returns the salute and directs the adjutant: Take your post, Sir. The adjutant takes his post on the right of the staff, passing by the colonel's right.

The colonel draws saber, commands: 1. Order, 2. ARMS, and adds such exercises in the manual of arms as he may desire, concluding with order arms.

The colonel then directs the adjutant to receive the reports:

The adjutant advances by the right of the colonel toward the line, halts midway between the colonel and the line of majors, and commands: 1. Adjutants, 2. Front and center, 3. MARCH; or, 3. Trot, 4. MARCH.

At the command march, the battalion adjutants move three paces in front of the line of majors, close to the center and face to the front. The adjutant then commands: Report, when the battalion adjutants, commencing on the right salute and report: First (or other) battalion, present or accounted for; or, First (or other) battalion, (so many) officers and enlisted men are absent. The adjutant returns the salutes of the battalion adjutants. The reports having been made the adjutant commands: I. Adjutants, 2. Posts, 3. MARCH; or 3. Trot, 4. MARCH. Each battalion adjutant returns to his post on the right of the staff of his major. The adjutant then faces the colonel, salutes and reports: Sir, all are present or accounted for; or, Sir, (so many) officers and enlisted men are absent, including in the absentees those from the band and field music reported to him by the drum major prior to the parade.

The colonel returns the salute and directs: Publish the orders, Sir. The adjutant faces the regiment, and, after publishing the orders, com-

mands: I. Officers, 2. CENTER, 3. MARCH, and takes post as before on the right of the staff, passing by the colonel's right.

At the command *center*, the company officers carry saber and face toward the center; each battalion staff forms line on the left of its major.

At the command *march*, the company officers close to the center and face to the front.

The field officers and their staffs move by the flank to the left and right on their own line; the lieutenant colonel, major, and staff of the first battalion form in line six paces to the right of the line of company officers; the major and staff of the second battalion, and the major and staff of the third battalion, form in line six paces to the left of the company officers.

The company officers having closed and faced to the front, the senior captain commands: 1, Forward, 2. Guide center, 3. MARCH.

The company officers advance, the band playing; the left officer of the right wing of the second battalion, or the left officer, first battalion, if there be but two battalions, is the guide and marches on the colonel.

When the company officers have advanced to the line of field officers, the field officers and their staffs advance in line with the company officers. The line is halted at six paces from the colonel by the senior officer who commands: I. Officers, 2. HALT. The ceremony continues as in battalion parade.

When the colonel commands: 1. Officers, 2. POSTS, 3. Guide center, 4. MARCH, the lieutenant colonel takes post on the right of the staff; each major moves individually to the front, turns outward, and followed by his staff takes his post by the most direct line; the company officers rejoin their commands as in battalion parade. The regiment is then marched in review and the ceremony is concluded when the last company has passed.

588. Whenever "The Star Spangled Banner" is played by the band on a formal occasion at a military station, or at any place where persons belonging to the military service are present in their official capacity, all officers and enlisted men present stand at attention, and if not in ranks render the prescribed salute, the position of the salute being retained until the last note of "The Star Spangled Banner." The same respect is observed toward the national air of any other country when it is played as a compliment to official representatives of such country. Whenever "The Star Spangled Banner" is played as contemplated by this paragraph, the air is played through once without the repetition of any part, except such repetition as is called for by the musical score.

604. Assembly.—The signal for companies or details to fall in.

Adjutant's call.—The signal for companies to form battalion and for battalions to form regiment; also for the guard details to form for guard mounting on the camp or garrison parade ground; it follows the

assembly at such interval as may be prescribed by the commanding officer.

To the color.—Is sounded when the color salutes.

General Orders, No. 6.

- I. The season for small arms qualification practice will commence May 1, 1907, and end October 31, 1907. The season's work will be conducted in accordance with the following instructions from Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, which are hereby approved.
- II. All officers and enlisted men will be required to qualify with the service rifle under Special Course "C" with the exception of officers of the Medical Corps, enlisted men of the Hospital Corps, drum-majors and the enlisted members of regimental bands. Officers of the Medical Corps may qualify with rifle or revolver, or both, and may draw ammunition therefor upon requisition.
- III. All commissioned officers and non-commissioned staff officers, and others to whom the service revolver is issued as a part of their equipment, may qualify with the service revolver, but such qualification is not obligatory and is not taken into account in computing the figure of merit.
- IV. The season issue of ammunition will be as follows: To each company of infantry, 5000 rounds of service rifle ammunition; to each division of the Naval Reserve, 3000 rounds; to each officer or non-commissioned officer required to qualify and unattached to any company or division, 100 rounds with a contingent issue in addition of 100 rounds for further qualification upon certificate that the individual has qualified in the grade of Marksman; to each officer or non-commissioned staff officer, or any other to whom the service revolver is issued as a part of his equipment, upon requisition, 200 rounds of service revolver ammunition. Commanding officers in making requisition for ammunition will note the amount on hand and require for quantities sufficient to bring their total up to the above allowance.
- V. Before permitting any practice, each commanding officer will make certain that the range to be used by his command is in proper condition, so that danger on this score will be eliminated. Commanding officers are further instructed to guard at all times against the possibility of untrained men visiting the range for practice unless accompanied by experienced instructors.
- VI. Attention is invited to the following summary of qualification requisites:

A single score at 200 yards, regardless of the total made, takes a man out of the FOURTH CLASS into the THIRD CLASS, thereby raising the figure of merit. Insofar as they can, commanding officers will see that each officer and man fires at least two full scores at 200 yards (offhand); two full scores at 300 yards (kneeling or sitting); and two full scores at 500 yards (prone). If the aggregate for his best scores at these ranges equals 67, he will be returned as a SECOND-CLASS-MAN; if it equals 83, he will be returned as a FIRST-CLASSMAN; if it equals 98, he will be returned as a MARKSMAN. No one will be returned as a SHARPSHOOTER who has not made an aggregate of at least 120 in the Marksman's Course at 200, 300 and 500 yards, made at least 40 out of 50 at 600 yards, fired two scores totaling at least 25 in timed fire at 200 yards, and made one skirmish run with a total sufficient to bring the grand total up to 235. No one will be returned as an EXPERT who has not qualified as a Sharpshooter and in addition made at least 40 out of 50 at 800 yards and at least 35 out of 50 at 1000 yards.

With the revolver, two scores of 24 at 30 yards and two scores of 23 at 50 yards entitle return in the Revolver Marksman Class; these scores with two scores of 22 at 75 yards entitle return in the Revolver Expert Class; and two scores of 29 at 30 yards, two scores of 28 at 50 yards and two scores of 27 at 75 yards entitle return in the Distinguished Revolver Marksman class.

VII. Commanding officers of companies and divisions will see that monthly postal returns of small arms practice are promptly forwarded on the first of each month.

VIII. The following rules and regulations prepared by the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice will govern competitions in the National Guard of this State so far as practicable:

I. Officers of the Competitions.

The officers of all competitions shall consist of-

- (a) An executive officer.
- (b) An assistant executive officer.
- (c) A post adjutant.
- (d) A post quartermaster.
- (c) A statistical officer, with as many assistants as may be necessary.
- (f) As many range officers as may be necessary or as may be detailed for that purpose.
- (g) A post surgeon.

2. Officers' Duties.

The duties of the officers shall be as follows:

Executive officer.—The executive officer will have control of the range for the conduct of the matches, and his decision shall be final.

The executive officer may, in his discretion, upon the certificate of the post surgeon, permit the substitution of an alternate member of the same team in place of one who may be taken ill during the shooting.

Assistant executive officer.—The assistant executive officer shall report to and receive instructions from the executive officer and assist him in the management of the competitions.

Post adjutant.—The post adjutant shall discharge the duties of adjutant to the executive officer, issue by direction of the executive officer the necessary orders, and perform such other duties as may be assigned to him.

Post quartermaster.—The post quartermaster shall have charge of the issue of stores and supplies to the competitors, and discharge such other duties as may be assigned to him by the executive officer.

Statistical officer and assistants.—The statistical officer and his assistants will assign the competitors to targets and to order of firing, their determinations being generally by lot. They will verify the additions of the scores as reported by the scorekeepers, grade them in order of excellence, and prepare the results for official announcement.

In all meetings where a number of men engage in the same matches or competitive firing, the labor of the statistical officers will be greatly lightened, and the prompt announcement of the score facilitated, by giving to each competitor a number by which he will be known throughout the firing, if practicable.

Range officers.—The range officers will supervise the marking and scoring; they will see that the competitors do not evade any of the regulations; they will test the trigger pull of and examine at any time the rifles used by competitors; they will inspect the ammunition before the beginning of all matches; and they will certify on the score cards to the scores made, after verifying same with the blackboard.

In individual matches the range officers will certify to the date, hour, and style of arm in the entry ticket of competitors about to begin their score, and when the score is finished they will certify to the same on both original ticket and coupon. The latter they will tear off and deposit in the scorers' box, returning the original to the competitor.

In team matches, the range officers will, at the completion of the score at each range, verify the scores on the score card with the black-board and see that they agree. When the matches are finished they will add up the totals, certify to the correctness of same, and return the card or cards to the statistical office.

During the shooting of all competitions a range officer shall be detailed to the pit at each distance, who shall remain in the pit until the firing at that distance is finished.

The range officer in charge of the firing point must witness any alteration of a score card and must indorse the alteration with his initials.

A range officer desiring to be relieved from his post of duty will report to the executive officer, so that a substitute may be detailed.

Range officers will be chosen, so far as it is practicable, from distinguished marksmen, expert riflemen, sharpshooters, and officers experienced in range work. Post surgeon.—The post surgeon shall have charge of the health and sanitary condition of the camp and rifle range, and shall perform such other duties as pertain to his profession.

Officers must report.—All officers of the competition will report to the executive officer at his headquarters each morning at 8 o'clock, or such hour as he may designate, when they will be assigned to their several stations and given their badges.

The post adjutant, post quartermaster, and post surgeon will be on duty continuously at headquarters.

3. Rules for Pits.

In team matches one representative from each team must be selected by the team captain at each distance (before the drawing of the targets at that distance), who shall receive from the executive officer a card directing him to remain in the target pit during the firing at the distance about to be begun. The representatives from the various teams in the target pit will call the attention of the range officer on duty in the pit to any irregularity of marking or other matter deemed by them necessary, and the decision of the range officer in the pit as to the matter complained of will be final and binding. This provision is mandatory and must be observed.

Rapid fire.—In rapid fire, time is regulated at the target, the signal at the firing point being given as a warning to the range officer in charge of the pit that all is ready at the firing point for the target to appear.

Procedure.—In rapid fire, with rifle or carbine, at the disappearing target, the range officer in charge of the target, at the signal from the firing point, commands "Ready." As soon as all is in readiness to run up the target he commands "Up." At exactly the proper number of seconds after the target is in position he commands "Down," having preceded this command two or three seconds by the warning command "Ready." The target must be exposed and withdrawn as quickly as possible. The number and value of the hits are signaled with the usual disks in the usual manner after the score has been fired, the number of misses being carefully indicated by the flag as a check on the accuracy of the number of hits signaled.

When the single rolling, or Cushing, target is used, the method of marking will be varied to meet the conditions.

Pistol.—In rapid fire with the pistol at the disappearing target the manipulation of the target is as in rapid fire with the rifle or carbine, except that the target remains exposed the number of seconds called for in the match.

4. Rules for Firing Points.

Slow fire.—During the progress of a match or competition, no one except the officers on duty at the range, the competitors, and score-keepers will be permitted within the ropes without special permission of the officer in charge.

Five yards in rear.—The squads of competitors will be stationed 5 yards in rear of firing point, where each competitor must remain until

called by the scorekeeper or range officer to take his position at the firing point and until he has completed his score.

All expression on the part of the competitor of approbation or disappointment, with reference to any scores made by himself or others, must not be uttered loud enough to be heard at the firing point.

Competitors present punctually.—Competitors must be present at the firing points punctually at the time or in the order stated on their score cards. No application on the part of a competitor for an alteration of his assignment will be entertained, except that team captains may change the order of firing of the members of their teams if they so desire.

Order of distances.—In competitions or matches embracing more than one distance, the slow fire will be commenced at the shortest distance and be followed in order by each of the longer distances, the firing at the longest range being held last.

Squadding.—In individual matches that are squadded, the squadding of the competitors will be done before the beginning of the match.

Fire alternately.—In team competitions the competitors will place themselves at the firing point by twos and fire alternately, the odd number of each pair being on the right and firing first.

Target withdrawn while firing.—In slow fire, if, just as the shot is fired the target is withdrawn from the firing position, the scorer at that firing point will at once report the fact to one of the range officers, who, if satisfied, upon investigation, that the case is as represented, will direct that the shot fired be not considered and that the competitor fire another shot.

Time limit.—In slow fire, competitors will not be hurried in their firing, but such slight delay permitted after each shot as they may desire; provided the time of firing the total score with rifle and carbine does not exceed in average of one minute per shot for ranges of 600 yards and less, and of one and one-half minutes per shot for ranges above 600 yards, no time credit being allowed.

If an acident to a target, or any other cause over which the competitor has no control, prevents him from completing his score within a reasonable interval, he will be permitted such additional time as a range officer may decide.

Drawing targets.—Targets in fixed-distance team firing will be drawn at each range by team captains at the executive officer's headquarters.

Coaching.—In team matches no coaching or communication of any kind with men at the firing point will be permitted except by the team captain, and then only for the sole purpose of preventing infractions of the conditions of the match, except that the competitors actually firing may communicate with each other.

When competing for the Dryden Trophy, or in other special team matches, coaching is authorized.

Position of captains, etc.—In team matches, at least 3 yards in rear of each firing point, there will be permitted one team captain, one coach, and one spotter, who may observe the firings of the members of their team and check the value of each shot as called by the scorer. The

captain, coach, and spotter shall not be permitted to shield a competitor from the wind, throw a shade upon his sight, or aid him in any other way.

Positions.—The following positions only will be permitted in competitive firing: At 200 yards, the standing position, the body and arm being free from any artificial support; at 300 yards, sitting or kneeling; at 500, 600, 800, 900, and 1,000 yards, prone, with head toward target.

Strap.—The use of the strap as a sling will be permitted at all ranges, provided it is attached to its proper swivels and is used only in connection with the arm of the competitor as a brace.

Loading arms.—No arms shall be loaded except at the firing point, the muzzle of the rifle, carbine, or revolver being kept in the direction of the target until the arm is either discharged or unloaded.

Rapid fire.—Target: F.

Procedure.—The magazine is filled, one cartridge loaded therefrom, and the piece then held at position "Ready." At a signal given at the firing point (trumpet or telephone) the target appears, remains in sight twenty seconds at 200 yards, then disappears. No sighting shots will be permitted. The competitor attempts to fire five shots, emptying the magazine and firing at will, without command, from the instant any portion of the target appears until it has completely disappeared. Each unfired cartridge counts as a miss. In case of a defective cartridge or disabled piece the practice is repeated.

Challenges.—If a competitor desires to challenge his shot just fired because of failure of any record from the pit, such challenge will be sustained and the record from the pit given without cost. If a competitor in the national match, or other team matches, desires to challenge his shot just fired for alleged incorrect marking, he must pay \$1. If the competitor's challenge is sustained and it is shown that the marking was incorrect, the money will be returned to him. All money paid in fines as prescribed in this paragraph will be turned over to the treasurer of the organization conducting the match.

Protests.

Protests and objections must not be directly submitted to the executive officer, but to one of the range officers. In case a competitor considers the decision of the latter unwarranted by the facts as presented, he may appeal to the executive officer. Final appeals from decisions of the executive officer must be made in writing and forwarded through that officer to the executive committee of the National Rifle Association or the association under whose auspices the meeting is being held. In national contests an appeal may be taken to the national board authorized by act of Congress, etc., whose decision shall be final.

6. Scoring and Marking.

Hits in the different divisions of the targets and ricochets will be signaled and recorded as prescribed in the Small-Arms Firing Regulations. Ricochets count as hits.

Spotter.—The exact location of all bullet holes will be marked by a spotter, which will be shown on the target.

All shots fired count.—All shots fired by the competitor after he has taken his place at the firing point, and it is his turn to fire—the target being ready—will be considered in his score, even if his piece is not directed toward the target, or is accidentally discharged.

Shots upon wrong target.—Shots fired upon the wrong target will be entered upon the score of the man firing as misses.

Two hits on target.—In slow fire, if two shots strike a target at the same or nearly the same time, both will be signaled, and if a shot was just fired from the firing point assigned to that target, the hit having the higher of the two values signaled will be entered in the competitor's score, and no record made of the other hit.

Value of shot, change of record.—Competitors must pay attention to the score as announced and recorded, so that any error may be promptly investigated. The record value of any shot will not be changed after the following shot has been fired, unless some special message with reference to it is received from one of the range officers in the target pit.

Sighting shots.—In all matches two sighting shots at each range, slow fire, must be taken. Whenever, because of a storm or for any other reason, the executive officer shall postpone an unfinished match, two sighting shots will be allowed on the unfinished score of each man when the match is resumed.

7. Duties of Scorers.

The scorekeepers will be seated close to and in the rear of the firing-point stakes, and will, as each shot is signaled, announce in an audible tone the name of the competitor, the value of the shot, and number on score card, marking same on the blackboard and competitor's card. At the conclusion of the score of each competitor the scorekeeper will repeat his name and total score, and request the range officer on duty at that target to verify the blackboard and score card (no scores will be allowed unless recorded on a blackboard by the scorer as shot). All scorers will be supplied with field glasses. The executive officer will prescribe the manner and form for all telephonic communication between firing points and pit.

8. Skirmish Fire.

In skirmish fire, after the run is completed and the signal "Cease firing" has been sounded and repeated twice, the markers will examine the targets, the range officer will record the total hits on each, and the results will be communicated by means of prepared score cards to the statistical officers. In this fire the precautions with regard to the use of a red pencil in marking shot holes will be observed.

In skirmish competitions by team, targets will be drawn by team captains. In all other skirmish competitions targets will be drawn by competitors immediately preceding the commencement of the runs. No communication will be held between skirmish pit and the firing line, and no scores will be brought out of the pit or published until all runs are completed.

The aggregate value of all shots in all the figures of the groups will be the team's total for the run.

Team captain may coach.—In skirmish competitions by teams the teams will run under the command of a range officer, but a team captain may coach his men on the run. One or more range officers will accompany each team to see that the conditions of the match are not violated.

Twenty cartridges.—In skirmish fire twenty cartridges will be issued before each run to each competitor, and the latter will not be permitted to have any other cartridges about his person. If any cartridge fails to explode it will be replaced by the scorer with a new one.

Disabled gun.—If a gun becomes disabled from any cause, the incomplete score will be counted and a competitor will not be allowed to repeat the run. This applies to all matches. Hits, direct or ricochet, will be scored.

Individual.—In individual skirmish competitions no two competitors from the same team shall be allowed to skirmish on adjoining targets.

Target and value of shots.—In skirmish competitions the group target "G" will be used, one group for each skirmisher. Targets placed in line, with intervals of not less than 5 yards between centers of groups. Targets to be so placed that the bottom of the iron frames shall be I foot above the ground. The value of shots: Hit, direct or ricochet, on lying figure, 5; kneeling, 4; miss. o. Hits on the black silhouette only will count.

Procedure.—In skirmish competitions each competitor will fire twenty shots, 600 to 200 yards. Six halts at the following distances: 600, 500, 400, 350, 300, and 200 yards. At all distances, with the exception of the 200 yards, the time limit will be thirty seconds, and at the 200 yards twenty seconds. Any authorized position for firing will be permitted.

A squad of convenient number is formed in line opposite the targets at a distance exceeding 600 yards: twenty rounds of ammunition per man are issued: magazines are filled and cut off, and, in accordance with Infantry Drill Regulations, the line is advanced in quick time to the 600-yard firing line. Here the line is halted and each skirmisher, without further command, takes one of the authorized positions and at the preparatory command for firing loads his piece from the belt.

The commands for firing are: 1. Fire two rounds, 2. At 600 yards, 3. At the targets, 4. Commence Firing. After the command of execution the firing opens at will and each skirmisher fires two rounds within the time limit of thirty seconds, the piece being used as a single-loader. At the expiration of time limit the command "Cease firing" will have been given. At each range except 200 yards there shall be an

interval of at least 20 seconds between "Halt," and "Commence firing;" and at 200 yards at least 50 seconds between same commands. In national matches the trumpet will sound "Halt," "Commence firing," and "Cease firing."

The firing having ceased, the advance is resumed and continued to the 500-yard firing line, where two rounds are fired in the same manner as at 600 yards; the advance then continues to the 400 and 350 yard firing lines, at each of which three rounds are similarly fired, and then to 300 and 200 yards, at each of which five rounds are fired from the magazine. The time limit at 200 yards, it should be noted, is twenty seconds, instead of thirty seconds as at the other halts. Commands, in all cases, conform to the Infantry Drill Regulations.

Quick and double time.—The advance between 600 and 200 yards will be, between any two successive halts, the first half at quick and the second at double time; and it is enjoined upon the range officer to see that the double time is maintained as nearly as possible according to Infantry Drill Regulations, i. e., length of step 36 inches and cadence 180 steps per minute. The firing is completed at 200 yards.

Rifles loaded at halt only.—Pieces will not be loaded during the advance, but only at the preparatory command for firing after a halt.

Time limit.—The time limit extends from the last note of "Commence firing" to the last note of "Cease firing." The range officer will see that the signals are properly sounded, not permitting the last note of "Cease firing" to be unduly prolonged.

Penaities.—For each shot fired by the conpetitor before the commencement or after the close of the time limit, or for each shot fired in excess of the number ordered for the halt, five points will be deducted from his score. Five points will also be deducted for a failure to fire the number prescribed for a halt.

Defective cartridges.—A defective cartridge may be replaced by a file closer, but must be turned in before the advance is resumed. The substituted cartridge must be fired, if at all, at the halt where the misfire occurred and before "Cease firing" shall have been sounded.

Competitors will not be permitted to advance nearer than 200 yards from the targets.

More than twenty hits.—In individual competitions, when more than twenty hits are found in a group target, the score will not be counted and the competitor will make another run.

Muzzle toward targets.—In this class of fire the muzzle of the rifle must be pointed toward the targets when marching or at the halts.

9. Arms.

Team matches.—In all military matches the following arms only will be used, unless otherwise provided for in special conditions:

The United States Army magazine rifle and carbine. 30 caliber.

Individual matches (not exclusively military).—The rifles and carbines allowed in competitions are as follows:

- (a) Any military rifle.
- (b) Any rifle.

They must comply with the following conditions:

Any military: Any military rifle that has been viewed and stamped by the National Rifle Association in accordance with the resolution heretofore adopted for this purpose by the National Board for Promotion of Rifle Practice, as follows:

Resolved: That rifles of private makers, conforming in all respects to the following:

- (a) The piece must be capable of using the standard Government cartridge;
- (b) It must be the same length and weight;
- (c) It must be fitted with a sight similar in design to one of the standard military sights as adopted by the War Department; when viewed and stamped by the National Rifle Association, shall be permitted to be used by clubs duly affiliated with the National Rifle Association for qualification as national marksmen and in matches where the rules permit any military rifle.

Any rifle: No restriction as to weight, caliber, sights, or trigger pull, except that rifles with less than 2 pounds trigger pull must be provided with safety lock.

Sights (military rifles).—The aiming notch, or the aperture of the slide, may be slightly widened or opened to accommodate individual peculiarities of eyesight, but no other alteration or filing of the regular service sights, or the use of spirit levels, will be permitted. The front or rear sights may, however, be blackened according to the judgment of the competitor. The use of permanently affixed micrometers, orthoptic eyepieces, telescopic sights, spirit levels, temporary shades, or any other device will not be allowed, unless specially provided for in the conditions of the match.

Competitors in the national match and in the national individual match may use field glasses or small telescopes, such as might reasonably be carried to the field as a part of a soldier's equipment. They may also use a micrometer and small individual score book. They will not be permitted any other aid or device at the firing point.

Trigger pull.—The trigger pull must always be at least 3 pounds, and will be tested (holding the barrel vertically) by a range officer, before firing, each day and at each range.

Competitors will submit their arms for further inspection whenever required.

Changing rifles during matches.—No two competitors shall shoot in any competition with the same rifle, nor shall a competitor change his rifle during any competition unless his first rifle has become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified by a range officer.

Cleaning.—Pieces can only be cleaned upon the completion of a score. In competitions at more than one distance cleaning will be permitted between distances. While, with these restrictions, cleaning will be permitted, it will not be required. Cleaning will be allowed between shots when it is so specified in the conditions of the match.

Fouling.—No firing, except at the targets or in a fouling or warning pit, will be permitted under any circumstances. Any violation of this rule will disqualify the competitor from further participation in the meet.

Handicap.—In all team and individual matches the carbine will be allowed a handicap of 4 per cent at 600 yards, 6 per cent at 800, 900, and 1,000 yards.

No handicap will be allowed unless noted on score card by a range officer. Competitors must see that this is done.

10. Ammunition.

Unless the use of other ammunition is distinctly authorized, the ammunition used will be the service cartridge for the arm, as manufactured and issued by the Ordnance Department.

II. UNIFORM.

Military competitors will wear the service uniform, with or without blouse, and with the belt.

12. PENALTIES.

No two competitors shall in any match or competition use the same rifle, unless it is a special condition of the match, nor shall a competitor change his rifle during any competition, unless it has become unserviceable, which fact must be verified by a range officer. Wilful violation of this regulation will warrant the executive officer (in his discretion) in excluding the competitor from further competition.

Any person, whether a competitor or not, interfering with any of the firing squads, or annoying them in any way, will be warned to desist, and if he repeats the offense he will be at once ordered off the range grounds.

Any competitor-

- (a) Who shall fire in a name other than that under which he entered or who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so; or
- (b) Who shall be guilty of any conduct considered by the executive committee to be discreditable; or
- (c) Who shall be guilty of falsifying his score or being accessory thereto; or
- (d) Who shall offer a bribe of any kind to any employee or other person; or
- (e) Who shall be detected in an evasion of the conditions prescribed for the conducting of any match; or
- (f) Who shall refuse to obey any instructions of the executive officer or a range officer; or
- (g) Who shall be guilty of disorderly conduct or being intoxicated shall, upon the offense being proved to the satisfaction of the executive committee, forfeit all his entrance fees, be forever disqualified from

competing at any time in the meetings of the Association, and shall not be entitled to have any prize won by him at the time of meeting awarded to him.

Unauthorized ammunition.—Any competitor having any ammunition in his belt or about his person when he takes his place at the firing stand, other than that authorized, will be immediately disbarred, and his score will not count for record.

13. ENTRIES.

Competitors who make entries for any match will be ruled out and will forfeit their entrance fees if not on the range at the hour designated for the match.

Entry tickets must be marked with the purchaser's name at the time of the purchase; they may be transferred to another name with the consent of the executive officer; any erasure or substitution of a purchaser's name on a ticket, not made by the statistical officer, will forfeit the ticket.

Post entries.—All entries made in individual matches after the opening of the meeting will be post entries.

No entry fee will be refunded unless the competitor is prevented by sickness from appearing on the range, and then only on order of the executive officer.

Team captains can expedite matters by securing from the statistical officer blank forms of entry in advance, and having them filled out with the names of the team, which should be written plainly and in full, with military rank, if any.

Entry tickets for individual matches will not be exchanged for entry tickets in other matches.

All entries not otherwise provided for in the program must be made not later than thirty minutes before the hour for calling the match.

All civilians, as well as members of the organized militia, Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Cadets United States Military Academy, and Midshipmen United States Naval Academy, are eligible to compete in all the individual matches that are open to everybody, provided they shoot with the arm called for in the conditions of the match.

IA. TIES

Ties will be decided as follows:

- (a) In individual shooting, at known distances—
 - (1) When the firing takes place at more than one distance, by the total score made at the longest distance, and if still a tie, and there be three or more distances in the competition, by the total score at the second distance, and so on for each of the successive distances.
 - (2) By the fewest misses in the entire score.
 - (3) By the fewest outers in the entire score.
 - (4) By the fewest inners in the entire score.

- (5) If still a tie, by inverse order of shots, counting singly from the last to the first.
- (6) By firing single shots at the longest distance.
- (7) In case a tie is of the highest possible score, those tying will shoot the tie off at the close of the meet, or they may divide the prize or prizes instead.
- (8) In case the winner of the match is to be decided by the total of two or more tickets and there is a tie in totals, the contestant having the single ticket of the highest value shall rank first.
- (b) In team shooting at known distances—
 - (1) By the aggregate of the total scores made at the different distances in inverse order.
 - (2) By the fewest misses in the entire score.
 - (3) By the fewest outers in the entire score.
 - (4) By the fewest inners in the entire score.
 - (5) By the totals, for the team, of the final shot of each competitor.
 - (6) By the totals, for the team, of these successive closing shots in inverse order.

When the ties are to be divided, it must be so stated in the conditions of the match; but the winners may by mutual consent divide the prizes.

Ties, when rapid fire is included in the match, will be decided as follows:

- (a) In slow and rapid fire-
 - (1) By the highest total score made in rapid fire; if still a tie, by the highest score made in rapid fire at 500 yards; if still a tie, by the highest score in rapid fire at 300 yards; if still a tie, by the highest score in rapid fire at 200 yards. In the same manner the decision will be regulated by the highest total scores in succession made at 600, 500, 300, and 200 yards, slow fire.
 - (2) By the fewest misses in rapid fire.
 - (3) By the greatest number of hits on figure in rapid fire.
 - (4) By the fewest misses in slow fire.
 - (5) By the fewest outers in slow fire.
 - (6) By the fewest inners in slow fire.
 - (7) If still a tie, by firing single shots at the longest range, slow fire.
- (b) In skirmish fire—
 - (1) By the greatest number of penalties imposed.
 - (2) By the greatest number of hits.
 - (3) By the fewest hits in kneeling figures.
 - (4) If still a tie, a special run in skirmish fire.

Ties, when rapid and skirmish fires are included in the aggregate score, will be decided by giving precedence to the competitor having the best total score in the skirmish fire. If the scores in the skirmish fire are also of the same total, the order of merit for that fire (and therefore the final order of merit) will be determined in accordance with paragraph "Ties, when rapid fire is included in the match," etc.

In pistol competition (in the aggregate score).—Upon the completion of a pistol competition, ties found in the aggregate scores of two or more competitors will be decided as follows:

- (1) By the highest aggregate score made in rapid fire; if still a tie, by the highest total score made at 25 yards, rapid fire. The tie continuing, it will then be regulated, in succession, by the fewest misses and by the greatest number of hits on the figure, both in rapid fire.
- (2) If necessary, the comparison will then extend to timed fire, and will be decided in the following order:
 - (a) By the greatest number of penalties imposed.
 - (b) By the highest total aggregate score.
 - (c) By the highest total score made at 50 yards.
 - (d) By the fewest misses at both ranges together.
 - (e) By the fewest outers at both ranges together.
 - (f) By the fewest inners at both ranges together.
- (3) The tie still continuing, the comparison will then extend to slow fire and will be decided in the following order:
 - (a) By the highest total score made at 75 yards.
 - (b) By the fewest misses at both ranges together.
 - (c) By the fewest outers at both ranges together.
 - (d) By the fewest inners at both ranges together.
- (4) If there be still a tie, it will be decided by firing single shots at 75 yards, slow fire.

15. Hours of Firing.

Assembly will be sounded and firing begun at 8 o'clock A. M. and "Cease firing" will be sounded at 6 P. M. unless otherwise ordered by the executive officer.

The range will be closed for an hour in the middle of the day for lunch.

GENERAL.

Prizes not claimed within thirty days after having been won shall be forfeited to the Association.

These regulations and such special rules or directions as the executive officer may give must be rigidly complied with by competitors and all other persons upon the range grounds.

Competitors and all others connected with competitions must make themselves acquainted with the foregoing regulations, as well as with the conditions of competitive firing in which they may be participating, as the plea of ignorance of either of them will not be entertained.

The following act of the legislature is hereby published for the information and government of all concerned:

CHAPTER 131.

An Act to provide for the pay and care of the members of the National Guard for disability while in the service.

Section 1. A member of the national guard or naval militia who shall, when on duty or assembled therefor, in case of riot, tumult, breach of the peace, insurrection or invasion, or whenever in attendance at the annual encampment under order of the commander-inchief, or when called in aid of the civil authorities, receive any injury, or incur or contract any disability or disease, by reason of such duty or assembly therefor, which shall temporarily incapacitate him from pursuing his usual business or occupation, shall, during the period of such incapacity, receive the same pay which he would be entitled to if on duty and actual necessary expenses for care and medical attendance, provided, however, that he shall show that such disease or disability is due to no fault or neglect of his own, and if contracted while on duty during the annual encampment, that it is due entirely to the unsanitary condition of the camp or the negligence of the officials having the same in charge. No claim shall be allowed under this section unless the claimant within thirty days after the close of the annual encampment or after receiving the injury or contracting the disease or disability upon which the claim is made, notifies in writing the adjutant general of his intention to make such claim. Under this section no disability shall be considered temporary which continues more than ninety days from the date of receiving the injury or of incurring or contracting the disease or disability, and pay and expenses for care and medical attendance for more than the said ninety days shall not be allowed. Where a claim is made under this section the claimant shall, within thirty days after receiving the injury or contracting the disease or disability upon which the claim is made, or such further time as the adjutant general shall grant, submit to the adjutant general his proof by affidavits or otherwise as the adjutant general may direct. examination thereof the adjutant general may allow or disallow the whole or any part of said claim. He may at his discretion cause examinations of the claimant to be made from time to time by a medical officer or officers designated for the purpose, and he may direct the removal of a claimant to, and his treatment in, a hospital designated by the adjutant general, and if the claimant refuses to permit any such examination or if he refuses to go to such hospital or to follow the advice given or treatment prescribed for him therein, he shall thereby forfeit and be barred from all right to any claim or allowance under this section, or he may refer the same to a board of inquiry who shall have the same power to take evidence, administer oaths, issue subpænas and compel witnesses to attend and testify and produce books and papers and punish their failures to do so, as is possessed by a general courtmartial. If the claim is so referred to a board of inquiry its findings shall be subject to the approval of the adjutant general. He may approve either the whole or any part thereof, or he may return the proceedings of the board for revision and for taking further testimony. The amount which shall be found due such member by the adjutant general, either on his own investigation, the report of a medical examiner, or to the extent that the findings of a board of inquiry are approved by him, shall be a claim against the state of Maine and the adjutant general shall so certify to the governor and council who will cause their warrant to be drawn for the amount so certified and the treasurer of the State of Maine shall pay said amount to the claimant from any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Section 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Elliott, adjutant, Captain Frank B. Harris, quartermaster, and Captain George M. Kavanaugh, commissary, together with the regimental sergeant major, quartermaster sergeant and commissary sergeant, to be associated with the corresponding officers of the Regular Garrison. Two surgeons, Major Bial F. Bradbury and First Lieutenant Clarence F. Kendall, with one first class sergeant, one sergeant and four men of the Hospital Corps. Two hospital tents will be provided and the sick from Fort Lyon will be cared for at Fort McKinley. The Chaplain, Charles S. Cummings, the color sergeants, and the Regimental Band. Companies A, E, I and M will act as artillery reserves. Companies B, F and L as artillery supports.

Troops of the First Infantry will be stationed at Fort Lyon as follows, viz:

Major John Bird with his adjutant, First Lieutenant Willard C. Pooler, quartermaster and commissary, and sergeant major to command the artillery supports. One sergeant and two men of the Hospital Corps. Companies G and H will act as artillery supports.

Troops of the First Infantry will be stationed at Fort Levett as follows, viz:

Major William O. Peterson with his adjutant, First Lieutenant Hal R. Eaton, quartermaster and commissary, and sergeant major, to command the artillery supports. Captain Charles L. Cragin, assistant surgeon, with one sergeant and three men of the Hospital Corps. One hospital tent will be provided for this post. Company K will act as artillery reserve and Companies D and C as artillery supports.

Troops of the Second Infantry will be assigned to duty as follows, viz: Fort Williams.

Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, commanding the Second Infantry, associated with the district and battle commander. Lieutenant Colonel Frank M. Hume to command the artillery supports. Major George McL. Presson with his adjutant, First Lieutenant Olin M. Smith, quartermaster and commissary, and sergeant major, to be associated with the fire commander. Captain Frank E. Drake, adjutant, Captain Fred W. Drake, quartermaster, and Captain Blaine Owen, commissary, with the regimental sergeant major, quartermaster sergeant and commissary sergeant, to be associated with the corresponding officers of the Regular Garrison. The quartermaster and commissary of the second battalion, two surgeons, Major Edwin M. Fuller and First Lieutenant Fred A. Chandler, one first class sergeant, two sergeants and six men of the Hospital Corps. Two hospital tents will be provided. The Chaplain, James E. Cochrane, and color sergeants. Companies H

and L will act as artillery reserves and Companies A, E, F, G, I and M as artillery supports.

Troops of the Second Infantry will be stationed at Fort Preble as follows, viz:

Major Frank B. Cummings with his adjutant, First Lieutenant Frank H. Greenan, quartermaster and commissary, and sergeant major, to be associated with the fire commander. Major Fen B. Thompson with his adjutant, First Lieutenant Thomas M. J. Enright and sergeant major, to command the artillery supports. Captain James F. Hill, Assistant Surgeon, with one sergeant and three men of the Hospital Corps. One hospital tent will be provided for this post. The Second Regiment band. Companies C and K will act as artillery reserves and Companies B and D as artillery supports.

III. The First Regiment band, the non-commissioned staff, non-commissioned officers and enlisted men of the Hospital Corps stationed at Fort McKinley and Fort Lyon will constitute one mess. Arrangements will be made by the battalion quartermaster and commissary stationed at Fort Levett for the battalion sergeant major, one non-commissioned officer and three enlisted men of the Hospital Corps to mess with the companies.

The regimental non-commissioned staff, one first class sergeant, two sergeants and six enlisted men of the Hospital Corps stationed at Fort Williams will constitute one mess. The regimental commissary is authorized to procure a civilian cook for this mess. An allowance of \$1.50 per day will be made for that purpose.

The non-commissioned staff, the non-commissioned officers and enlisted men of the Hospital Corps and the Second Regiment band stationed at Fort Preble will constitute one mess.

Subsistence will be provided for all non-commissioned officers and enlisted men. Camp followers will under no circumstances be provided with subsistence as rations are issued only for the use of the enlisted men. Commissioned officers will provide such mess arrangements as they may deem advisable, separate and distinct from the enlisted men.

IV. Officers and men will report in the olive drab service uniform with campaign hats, heavy marching order. Canteens and haversacks will be worn. Meat can, knife, fork and spoon will be carried in haversack. Tin cup attached to rear strap of canteen. Woolen blanket, poncho and shelter half will be carried in roll. Overcoats will be packed and taken as baggage. Toilet articles and change of underclothing will be carried in roll. Companies assigned to duty as artillery reserves will be provided with brown canvas working suits which should be packed with the overcoats. Company baggage will be restricted to overcoats and brown canvas suits. Officers will be provided with transportation not to exceed 150 pounds.

V. Commanding officers of each organization will report to Colonel Charles Morris, Artillery Corps, United States Army, District and Battle Commander at Fort Williams, for instructions immediately upon arrival at their several stations. Transportation will be furnished by

the Quartermaster's Department, United States Army, and details relative to hours of departure and return to home stations will be announced in General Orders later.

VI. Officers and enlisted men will be allowed by the United States the same pay, transportation and subsistence as is allowed to officers and men of the same grade in the Regular Army. There will also be paid by the State an amount equal to the difference between the amounts allowed by the United States and that provided by sections 97 and 99 of the Militia Laws of Maine.

Five United States muster and pay rolls will be prepared before leaving home stations by entering thereon the names in full of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with rank of officers and date of muster in of the enlisted men. Substitutes will not be permitted or paid. No man will be paid whose enlistment papers are not on file in the office of the Adjutant General and no non-commissioned officer will be paid as such unless notice of his appointment has been received at this office. Blank pay rolls will be forwarded from this office.

VII. No new enlistment will be allowed in any organization of the National Guard between July 1st and August 17th. No more than one medical examination will be ordered for each organization between July 1st and August 17th, but men who re-enlist subsequent to such examination may be examined and mustered in on the first day of the encampment.

VIII. Each company will be provided with the necessary tentage, camp equipage, and full field outfit, including range, necessary cooking utensils, camp cots and camp tools. Six conical tents will be provided for each company and an extra wall tent will be allowed to each battalion quartermaster and commissary for the storage of rations. Latrines will be provided by the United States for use of the troops. Each company will be provided with not more than two paulins for use in protecting property and to cover kitchens and latrines, these and rough scantling for forms to support paulins over kitchens and latrines will be supplied by the United States Quartermaster's Department. Regimental Commanders will issue strict orders in regard to camp sanitation. The Medical Department and all officers in charge of the camp will pay most careful attention to everything connected with camp sanitation and any officer observing irregularities will report to the officer whose duty it is to correct such irregularities.

IX. Regimental quartermasters and commissaries and battalion quartermasters and commissaries will report for duty at the office of the Adjutant General on Monday, August 5th, to superintend the shipment of supplies. Officers in charge of the shipment of freight, including company commanders, will see that each package is plainly marked, giving the letter of the company, the regiment, the destination, specifying the fort for which it is intended and also giving the weight. All freight for use of troops stationed at Fort McKinley, Fort Lyon, Fort Levett and Fort Preble will be landed as near the head of the Portland Pier as possible and be taken to its destination by water transportation

provided by the United States. Freight for Fort Williams will be sent direct to the Boston and Maine Freight Depot and transported to its destination by teams provided by the United States.

X. Regimental and company commanders will familiarize themselves with General Orders No. 99, War Department, Washington, May 1, 1907, as it contains information that will prove of great advantage to all who are to participate in the contemplated tour of duty from August 8th to 17th.

XI. The following section of the Militia Law of the State is published for the information of all concerned.

"Section 108. No officer or enlisted man shall contract or presume to authorize the contracting of any indebtedness on behalf of the State, without the express authority therefor from the Commander-in-Chief, and any officer or enlisted man who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be dishonorably discharged from the service of the State."

II. It is understood that a muster of each organization by an officer of the regular army will be made on the day of arrival at the place of

encampment or the next day and rolls immediately forwarded to the chief paymaster, in order that payment can be made before leaving for home stations. To accomplish this, however, it will be necessary to have pay rolls fully made out and signed by all the men before leaving home stations; it is very important that this should be attended to. It must be done in order to secure payment.

Read instructions for preparation of rolls carefully.

III. In order that the provisions of an Act passed by the last legislature to provide for the pay and care of the members of the National Guard for disability incurred while in the service may be properly carried out and that justice may be done to the State as well as the individual members of the National Guard, the following regulations will be observed.

The surgeons, under the direction of the commanding officers, will supervise the hygiene of the camp and recommend such measures as may be deemed necessary to prevent or diminish disease. They will frequently examine the sanitary conditions of all buildings and tents, the drainage and disposal of refuse, amount and quantity of water supply, the clothing and habits of the men and character and cooking of the food and immediately after such examinations will report thereon in writing to the commanding officers with such recommendations as may be deemed proper.

A correct record of all cases of sickness will be kept by the surgeons in the regimental books provided for that purpose, giving the names, companies and regiments of the men treated, the nature of the disease or injury and the method of treatment. Care will be taken to ascertain if the sickness or injury resulted from service in camp in the line of duty or was the result of indiscretion on the part of the men treated, either before the tour of duty commenced or when in camp. Company commanders will at sick call see that the enlisted men of their several commands who require medical attention are conducted to the hospital by a non-commissioned officer who will give to the attending surgeon the company sick report book containing the names of the sick and a complete history of each case, so far as it has come under the observance of the company commander or any of his subordinates. surgeon after examination will indicate in the company sick report book, as well as in the regimental sick book, opposite their names the men who are to be admitted to hospital, sent to their homes and those to be returned to quarters, indicating what duty the latter can perform. A complete history of each case will be kept so far as possible by the several surgeons in charge of the sick, as well as by the company commanders, as in no other way can justice be done to those who may be taken sick or be injured during their tour of duty.

These instructions will be carefully followed.

IV. Regimental commanders will make a detailed report of the tour of duty to this office.

In order to comply with the requirements of Section 3 of the Act of Congress approved January 21, 1903, entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the Militia and for other purposes," that the organizations of the organized Militia of the several States and Territories and in the District of Columbia shall be the same as that which is now or may hereafter be prescribed for the Regular and Volunteer Armies of the United States within five years from the date of this Act.

The organization of the organized Militia of the State of Maine will be as prescribed in this order on and after January 1, 1908.

- II. (a) For the purpose of administration and convenience, the organized Militia of the State of Maine will be divided into the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief, the National Guard, the Naval Reserve and the Retired List. The Naval Reserve will consist of the Ship's Company and such other naval organizations as may be allowed by law. The National Guard will comprise all other organizations of the organized Militia of Maine.
 - (b) The Staff of the Commander-in-Chief shall consist of:
- I Adjutant General with the rank of Major General, who shall ex-officio, be Quartermaster General, Paymaster General and Chief of Staff.
 - I Inspector General with the rank of Brigadier General;
 - I Commissary General with the rank of Colonel;
 - I Judge Advocate General with the rank of Colonel;
 - 1 Military Secretary with the rank of Major.
 - 4 Aides-de-Camp with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.
 - (c) The National Guard shall consist of:

The Medical Department;

The Ordnance Department;

- 2 Regiments of Infantry.
- (d) The Naval Reserve shall consist of:
 The Ship's Company.
- (e) The Medical Department shall consist of:
 - I Surgeon General with the rank of Colonel;
 - 2 Surgeons with the rank of Major;
 - 2 Assistant Surgeons with the rank of Captain;
 - 2 Assistant Surgeons with the rank of First Lieutenant, and a Hospital Corps.

The medical officer of the Naval Reserve will be considered (exofficio) as a member of the Medical Department and will obey such orders or instructions as he may receive from the chief of the Department.

II. All organizations will parade for inspection in service uniform (olive drab) with campaign hat, armed and equipped in heavy marching order. Canteen and haversack will be worn, mess kit in haversack, tin cup attached to rear strap of canteen. Blanket, poncho and shelter half will be rolled in accordance with paragraph 486, Infantry Drill Regulations. Dress uniforms, overcoats, ammunition and all other military property, including all books and papers pertaining to the organization must be in the armory and conveniently arranged for inspection.

III. Armories, books and records, including company treasurer's accounts, and all military property will be inspected during the day of the date set for the inspection of each command. Companies will be

assembled for inspection in the evening at such hour as may be designated by company commanders, allowing ample time to have everything in readiness.

- IV. Company quartermaster sergeants will report to the Inspector General at the armory at such time as he may designate, to assist in the inspection and verification of military property and perform such other duties as may be required of him. It is important that the quartermaster sergeant should report for this duty as it is the report of the Inspector General, as to his efficiency, and the evidences of the faithful performance of his duties as shown by the general condition, cleanliness and orderly arrangement of the military property under his charge, that will determine his eligibility to the allowance under the provisions of General Orders, No. 4, A. - V. General Orders, No. 24.

- I. General Orders No. 2, State of Maine, A. G. O., series of 1906, pertaining to the manner of conducting examining boards for promotion, commission or recommission in the National Guard of this State are hereby revoked.
- II. Paragraphs 40 to 54, inclusive, of the Regulations for the National Guard of the State of Maine are hereby repealed and the following regulations substituted therefor:
- 40. Examining boards shall meet when and where directed by the Commander-in-Chief. The senior officer will act as president, and the junior officer as recorder.
- 41. All orders for candidates to appear for examination will be issued from the Adjutant General's Office. Copies of such orders will be forwarded to the president of the examining board, for the information of the members, and will be filed with the records of the board.
- 42. The recorder shall swear the other members of the board faithfully and impartially to examine and report upon the candidate about to be examined. The president of the board shall then swear the recorder to the faithful performance of his duties as such, in addition to the above.
- 43. Every candidate for promotion, commission or recommission, whether exempt from further examination or not, shall be required to state on honor, his citizenship, whether he has ever been convicted of an infamous crime, whether he has ever failed to pass a previous board and if so, when and for what position he was a candidate, whether he has ever been dishonorably discharged or dismissed from the service of the United States or from the National Guard or Militia of this or any other State, whether he knows of any business or other reason that will prevent his regular attendance and faithful performance of the duties of the office for which he is a candidate.

Evidence as to moral character, as to the subjects mentioned above or as to the candidate's previous record in the service may be called for by the board. Such evidence shall be under oath when practicable.

He shall also furnish the certificate of a medical officer of the National Guard that he is physically qualified for military service.

- 44. When the board finds the candidate incapacitated for causes mentioned in paragraph 43, it shall conclude the examination by finding and reporting the cause which, in its judgment, has produced the disability.
- 45. Whenever the board finds a candidate disquailfied from any cause, the record will contain a full statement of the case with recommendations.
- 46. When the board finds a candidate qualified, it will be stated in the following form: "The board is of the opinion that......

- has the physical, moral, and professional qualifications to perform efficiently all the duties of the grade to which he has been elected (or appointed), and recommends his commission therein."
- 47. If any member dissents from the opinion of the board, it will be so stated. All conclusions reached and recommendations made by the board will be regarded as confidential.
- 48. During oral and practical examinations all the members will be present but written examinations may be conducted in the presence of one member of the board. When the examination is completed the board will reassemble to consider its findings. Members of the board are authorized to ask any questions deemed necessary during the progress of the oral, written or practical examination.
- 49. Lists of questions covering the subjects upon which candidates are to be examined, each list comprising 50 questions numbered 1 to 50 inclusive, will be prepared and published in General Orders. Said questions will be selected from the standard publications now in use or which may be hereafter prescribed for the instruction of the U. S. Army, Navy, or the National Guard of this State.
- 50. Upon assembling for examination each candidate will be required to draw by lot from 50 numbers, the numbers drawn to represent the questions in each list that the candidate shall answer in writing. The scope of examination will be as follows:

For Second Lieutenant, 8 numbers.

For First Lieutenant, 10 numbers.

For Captain, 12 numbers.

For Major, 15 numbers.

For Lieutenant Colonel, 18 numbers.

For Colonel, 20 numbers.

NAVAL RESERVE.

For Ensign, 8 numbers.

For Lieutenant (J. G.), 10 numbers.

For Lieutenant, 12 numbers.

Regimental and Battalion Adjutants and Executive Officer and Adjutant, Naval Reserve, will take the same examination as is prescribed for line officers of equal rank and in addition will be examined in the special duties of the position sought.

Regimental and Battalion Quartermasters and Commissaries will be examined in Militia Law and Regulations, also in the special duties of the position sought.

A candidate for Chaplain must prove, to the satisfaction of the board, that he is a duly ordained minister of the gospel.

Staff officers, except Chaplain, if appointed from civil life and without previous military service will be examined in knowledge of the English language and their ability to read and write it correctly, in geography of the United States and Canada, in arithmetic and in the history of the United States; they will not be examined on purely military subjects.

- 51. In addition to the subjects mentioned in paragraph 50, all candidates will be examined in writing from dictation, military correspondence and official papers.
- 52. Ability to read and write the English language correctly, as shown by the papers submitted, will be considered in determining the general qualifications of all candidates.
- 53. On the completion of its duties the board will at once transmit a record of its proceedings signed by all the members, together with all accompanying papers, etc., to the Adjutant General.
- 54. Should a candidate fail to appear before the board when ordered, the Adjutant General will be at once informed of the fact with reasons if known.
- III. Until further orders the following questions will be used in the examination of candidates for promotion, commission or recommission under the provisions of paragraphs 40 to 54 inclusive of the Regulations for the National Guard as amended by this order.

- III. The following opinion of the Judge Advocate General of the Army, which is concurred in by the Honorable Secretary of War, is hereby published for the information of all concerned:

"Under section 4 of the Act of August 18, 1894, (28 Stats. L. 406), arms, equipments, ordnance stores, and tents, issued by the several staff departments of the army to the organized militia of the states and territories in pursuance of section 1661, Revised Statutes, as amended, are

accounted for to the Secretary of War by the officers of the militia responsible for their preservation and safe keeping. In case said property becomes unserviceable or unsuitable, it should be examined by a board of officers of the militia, whose report should be forwarded by the Governor to the Secretary of War direct, and the latter will direct the disposition, by sale or otherwise, to be made of it, and if sold, the proceeds of such sale should be covered into the United States Treasury. In the event such articles are lost or destroyed in the military service, the Secretary of War has the power, if the evidence shows the same to have been incurred from unavoidable causes, to allow the responsible officer to take credit therefor in his accounts, but he has no power to grant relief where the loss appears to be not due to unavoidable causes, such relief amounting to a disposition of said property, which can be done only by Congress, and for which no authority now exists."

HEADQUARTERS SHIP'S COMPANY NAVAL RESERVE, N. G. S. M. PORTLAND, MAINE, December 18, 1906.

Respectfully returned to the Adjutant General of the State of Maine. The statement in the report of the executive officer (Lieut. Cypher) to the effect that the officers of this command were not familiar with naval matters is doubtless true enough.

From the very nature of our other and larger existence as plain citizens earning our bread in shore occupations, it should be clear that the limited sea education we pick up in the leisure moments devoted to a study of the subject must, at best, be inconsiderable indeed in comparison with the comprehensive naval knowledge in the possession of the average Annapolis graduate.

It has been my pleasant experience heretofore, however, to find our regular navy friends disinclined to adopt the extreme view, but rather disposed to take very much into consideration those conditions which may be reckoned upon as certain to limit the usefulness of a militia officer in any of the services.

The further statement in the report of Lieutenant Cypher that the officers of this command "exercise very little control over their men" is so contrary to the actual facts as apparent to anyone familiar with this company, and exhibits such an absence of very ordinary perceptive ability that to my mind the whole report—which is, of course, the basis of the Commanding Officer's report—is thereby rendered worthless.

Nothing whatever happened aboard the Columbia to justify such a statement except the unfortunate fact that five (not six) naval militiamen overstayed shore leave—contrary to positive orders from me. So far as these men are concerned—and I investigated the matter thoroughly—the whole thing simmered down to nothing more serious for a cause than unfamiliarity with the distances and the so-called rapid transit facilities of the metropolis.

Now, if I had much faith in the value of the tu quoque style of argument I should be disposed to point out that fourteen men of the regular ship's company deserted on the same night, hence it might appear—to a superficial observer, at least—that the alleged lack of control was not limited to the naval militia officers.
