

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith a detailed report of the performance of my duties as Inspector General for the year of 1908 as follows:

#### Armory Inspections.

In accordance with General Orders, No. 22, A. G. O. dated December 27, 1907, I visited the several organizations of the National Guard at their home stations, covering a period from March 2nd to April 10th, inclusive, making a critical inspection of each organization, including armories, books, records and all military property in the possession of each.

The Ship's Company Naval Reserve was inspected at Portland on Wednesday, June 24th.

The several detachments of the Hospital Corps were inspected at the armory and on the date set for the inspection of a Company in the city or town where they were located, except in case of the men recruited by Lieut. Chandler who were inspected by him in the town hall at Addison, March 16, in accordance with Special Orders, No. 13, A. G. O. dated February 27, 1908.

A detailed report of the inspection of each organization was made on the authorized blank form (No. 1) and forwarded to your office at the time of inspection.

Company H, First Infantry, Rockland, and Company D, Second Infantry, Lewiston, having fallen below the required standard of efficiency have both been disbanded reducing the total strength of the guard, by two companies; this with the decided advance both in interest and attendance shown by more than two thirds of the remaining companies will account for the very gratifying increase shown in the total percentage of attendance, over that of the preceding year.

Companies E and L, First Infantry, Company B, Second Infantry and the Ship's Company Naval Reserve lead in attendance, each with a percentage of 98+; Company A, First Infantry, second with 97—; Companies C, E and I, Second Infantry are tied for third place each with 93+; while Companies D, I and M, First and H Second Infantry all show a percentage of over 90.

Only three companies fall below the 66 2-3 per cent that is required by the war department standard, while nineteen are above 75 per cent, eighteen above 80 and twelve above 90 per cent. Fifteen companies show an increase over last year, Company I, First Infantry making the greatest advance, increasing the attendance from 51— per cent in 1907, to 91+ per cent in 1908.

#### CEREMONY OF INSPECTION.

All organizations were paraded for inspection in the olive drab service uniform, in heavy marching order and carrying the full field equipment. The general appearance of the companies was, as a whole, very good.

I still notice a tendency for the unsoldierly practice of decorating the uniform with souvenir badges, stick pins, etc.; while many of the officers are careless in the matter of a strict compliance with regulations governing equipment and dress, and do not in all cases, maintain the dignity and soldierly bearing that is required by the positions they occupy, and that is so essential in presenting a proper example to the men under their command.

Formations as a rule were promptly and correctly made. In one or two instances the captain failed to take his proper position when presenting his company for inspection, and in a number of companies the lieutenants did not show a full understanding of their part in the ceremony, some remaining at the "order" while being inspected, others facing about and coming to parade rest before being inspected, and still others returning saber and accompaying the inspecting officer. As a rule the men were steady in ranks and seemed to be fairly well instructed, but in nearly every company the ceremony was marred by the presence in the ranks, of a more or less number of recruits, who had received no previous instruction, even in the "school of the soldier."

I must repeat my previous suggestion, that these men should be either formed by themselves or placed in the line of file closers. It is not right that the good appearance of a well drilled organization should be spoiled by the presence of uninstructed recruits.

In the matter of EFFICIENCY IN DRILL, MILITARY COURTESY, DISCIPLINE and PERSONNEL I think I can see a steady improvement from year to year. However the same general remarks and criticisms on above subjects made in my report for 1907, to which your attention is respectfully invited, still apply. I would suggest that Company Commanders be strongly urged to strive for increased efficiency particularly in guard duty which is by far the weakest point in our national guard of today.

CONDITION OF CLOTHING, ARMS AND EQUIPMENT.

While nearly all the rifles are found reasonably clean, and in serviceable condition there still exists a tendency to neglect the equipment. In nearly every company bayonets and scabbards, meat cans, knives, forks and spoons, were found dirty and rusty, canteens partially filled with water and many haversacks containing remnants of the food issued at the last encampment.

During this year the entire guard has been equipped with the new regulation dress coats and caps, russet leather waist belts and cartridge boxes. This equipment being new was, of course, found in good condition. The olive drab service clothing however, while still serviceable, is commencing to show wear, and quite a large number of soiled, torn, and moth eaten garments were presented for condemnation. The old blue blouses and caps being of no further practical use, I would recommend that they be ordered in, as the property room and lockers in nearly every armory is still over-crowded.

#### Armories.

Little can be added to previous reports on this subject, general conditions remain about the same. Company F, First Infantry. Sanford, having been without suitable quarters for several years, has at last been assigned a place in the new town hall now in process of construction; if present plans are carried out this company will have finely arranged and attractive quarters and a fair sized drill floor. Company E, Second Infantry, Skowhegan, will also be quartered in the new town hall when completed, and while I have not seen the plans, it seems certain that it must be an improvement on the present poorly arranged and very unsuitable quarters occupied by this company.

I desire to again call your attention to the practice by many Town and City authorities of letting the hall on drill nights for amusements, etc. I hope some way may be devised to prevent this practice as it interferes greatly with the regular work of the companies. For reasons given in my last report, I would again strongly recommend keeping the rifles in gun racks rather than in the individual lockers of the men, as is now the practice in a majority of the companies.

A detailed description of Armories will be found in the special report of each organization.

#### BOOKS, PAPERS AND RECORDS.

No uniform system of paper work has yet been adopted, and while many of the companies keep a more or less comprehensive record, in some of them there is absolutely nothing to be found but poorly kept files of retained papers and there is a general lack of information on the subject of military correspondence. I would again recommend and strongly urge, that military correspondence, the proper making of reports, returns and in fact all paper work pertaining to military records, be made a special study at all meetings for theoretical instruction.

#### ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The annual encampment of 1908 was an entirely new departure from the old established national guard encampments, and was conducted under the direct supervision of Captain Samuel T. Ansell, U. S. Army, acting as military instructor for the State of Maine.

For the first time in many years both regiments were ordered on duty at the same time and a brigade camp established under command of the senior colonel, Everard E. Newcomb of the Second Infantry. The work performed consisted largely of field service, maneuvers, and tactical problems. Ceremonies and work in close order formation was noticeably absent.

While I was on duty during the entire encampment no inspections were ordered and as I was not invited to be present at any of the drills, practice marches or maneuvers outside the camp ground, I am unable to report in detail upon the work performed, I did however make a daily tour of the camp observing in a general way the condition of company quarters, kitchens, etc., and calling attention to any irregularities that came to my notice.

In point of cleanliness and sanitary arrangement this camp was a model and from what little I saw of the drill and duty, I should judge that the experience and knowledge gained by both officers and men was of the most practical kind, and best calculated to fit them for active service in the field.

#### REMARKS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

A new company, organized at Rumford Falls and assigned to the Second Infantry as Company B, was inspected December 7. 1908, under G. O. No. 86, dated November 5, 1908. This company is made up of an unusually bright and intelligent class of young men and bids fair to become one of our most efficient military organizations. Their greatest handicap is the lack of suitable quarters; the armory, (so called) is situated in the basement of a store and is accessible only during business hours and for one evening each week; It is not large enough to form a company for drill and not high enough for the manual of That this Company should, in so short a time, have arms. gained the efficiency shown by their appearance on this their first inspection, is really wonderful, and speaks well for the interest and enthusiasm of the individual members. I have not inspected the new company organized at Livermore Falls.

I was accompanied, on the first part of my tour of inspection by Captain Samuel T. Ansell, U. S. A., who gave each company a practical talk, on general military matters, and whose valuable suggestions can not fail to bring good results in upbuilding the general efficiency of the National Guard of this State.

Under the head of recommendations, I will again repeat some of those made in former reports.

1. That recruits be thoroughly instructed in the school of the soldier before being allowed to enter the ranks of the company, for any purpose whatever.

2. That more care be exercised in the selection of non-commissioned officers, that qualification should be considered rather than long service or good fellowship, and after appointment, that they should be held up to the faithful and efficient discharge of their duties, under penalty of immediate reduction.

3. That lieutenants and non-commissioned officers be given more opportunity for practical work in handling the company, giving commands, etc.

4. That a part of each drill be devoted to guard duty, that every enlisted man be compelled to memorize the "general orders" and be taught the duties of the sentinel, and that sergeants and corporals be instructed in their duties. All this can be taught in the armory, and if accomplished, will materially strengthen one of the weak places in our guard.

5. That a uniform system of company records, based upon the regular army, also a uniform system of property issue to the enlisted men, be established and insisted upon, in every organization.

6. That the clerical work of the company, including reports, returns, official blanks, and particularly military correspondence, be made a special study for all officers and non-commissioned officers.

# Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to herewith submit my annual report as commissary general for the year ending December 31, 1908.

In compliance with sections 2 and 3 of General Orders No. 17, I reported at Camp Cobb for duty on Friday, July 31st, and remained at camp during the entire encampment. I also reported immediately, in compliance with section 5, General Orders, No. 17, to the camp commander by letter for instructions, and in person as soon as headquarters were established at camp. As soon as General Orders, No. 17, was issued I prepared estimates of quantities of supplies required for the encampment, and advertised for bids for the same, in three of the state daily papers. Proposals were received, and contracts awarded for the necessary supplies.

The supplies were all carefully inspected when received at commissary headquarters, and were found to be first class in every respect. On Saturday morning, August 1, I made an issue of rations for the company quarter master sergeants and company cooks for the two following days. On Monday morning, August 3, I made an issue of rations to each of the several units in camp. Upon the suggestions of Capt. Ansell, U. S. A., rations were issued on Tuesday morning to the regimental commissaries, for the remaining period of the encampment and they issued to the several units in their regiments.

Inspections were made of the cook houses and the rations issued were found to be satisfactory in every respect.

At the close of the encampment I approved all bills of my department and forwarded the same to you for your approval and payment.

In the First Regiment the average cost per man for the 5 1-3 days was about \$2.30 and the average cost per man per day 43 1-8 cents. In the Second Regiment the average cost per man for the 5 1-3 days was about \$2.38 and the average cost per man per day 44 5-8 cents.

The following tables A-B-C will give you in detail the transactions of my department.

#### REPORT OF THE SURGEON GENERAL.

SURGEON GENERAL'S OFFICE.

Portland, Me., Dec. 15, 1908.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General of State of Maine.

Sir:-I have the honor to submit my annual report for the year ending Dec. 15th, 1908.

The personnel of the Medical Department remains the same as that of last year and each member of the Department executed the duties assigned him with ability and dispatch.

This year's annual tour of duty for the guard was held at the State Camp Ground at Augusta, Me., and as both regiments were camped together and under the instruction of Capt. S. T. Ansell of the War Department, as instructor, a brigade formation was made which to a certain extent changed the usual assignment of the medical officers and, in a way, interfered with regular morning sick and sanitary reports. Doubtless a longer tour of duty would have straightened out matters in that respect.

In accordance with the changes in the National Guard caused by the adoption of the provisions of the Dick Bill, a Medical Department was formed and went into effect July 1st, 1908. Much was done for the time at our disposal to conform with those conditions and a good start was made. Much more awaits to be done to put the Medical Department on a footing with what is required.

A part of the newly formed Hospital Corps showed a lack of drill and efficiency which will be readily overcome by proper instruction. The Hospital Corps of the First Regiment are all enlisted in one town and consequently all drill together; while that of the Second Regiment are enlisted in different towns and so are together only at annual encampment. I recommend that this be changed as early as possible and the whole corps be enlisted from one town and that all be under one surgeon.

During the past year fifteen contract surgeons were appointed in localities where companies of the guard were located but not within easy reach of a surgeon of the guard, to examine recruits to the number of ten or more, when a commissioned surgeon was sent to inspect the recruits. The system works well and I think is of advantage and convenience to the captains of companies so situated.

On entering camp this year the guard was delighted to find two conditions remedied which heretofore were of great detriment to its welfare and convenience; namely, a bountiful supply of good water and more land room. The water supply through the untiring energy and perseverance of the Adjutant General, Augustus B. Farnham, proving to be of the best quality and sufficient quantity for their need. It only requires completion by the establishing of bath tents or houses to make our water supply perfect. The matter of more land was overcome by buying a strip which gives ample room for stables and sinks at a proper distance from the kitchens and mess-houses.

Moving the stables to their present location has greatly increased the sanitary possibilities of our grounds by removing to a distance the great breeder of flies, horse dressing.

Our present arrangement for sinks is about as bad as it can be. There is no provision whatever for urinals, and the men are compelled to urinate over the same hole that is used for a seat, with the result that the seat is wet constantly with urine, and the men are forced to stand on the seat or soil their persons or clothing. The sinks are cleaned out but once a day and then not properly limed.

There was a general complaint among the cooks that the present stoves were not as large as they should be to provide for the increase in the size of the companies. I found a tendency to use the cook and mess houses as a store room for uniforms, equipment, guns and other articles. In a number of

cases these were the property of the company officers. Many of the cooks slept in the cook or mess house and gave as an excuse that no tent room was provided for them. The cook and mess houses were fairly clean and a few of them exceptionally so, but the cooks themselves with but few exceptions were distinctly dirty in their clothing. With the advent of the rain, the grounds between the cook and mess houses became filthy and quantities of mud was tracked into the mess houses.

The rations that were issued were all that could be desired both in quantity and character.

Bowel troubles were by far the most common complaint. This I believe is due to overindulgence in food, more especially fruits and other unauthorized dishes. The new bayonets caused five wounds which required dressing at the hospital. I would recommend that the guard drill without fixed bayonets as severe accidents are possible with the present bayonet.

The sick of both regiments were treated at the Post Hospital, no regimental hospital being used and the hospital was under the command of Major Fuller.

I would respectfully recommend that a night guard be placed near the mess houses and any person detected polluting the grounds be severely dealt with. That lanterns be hung at night near the urinals (street) also at the sinks. That horse manure be removed twice daily from the stables. That the sinks be cleaned out twice daily (9 A. M. and at night). That the sinks be screened from flies and a civilian be employed to keep the sinks clean and the dejector well limed, also that suitable urinals be provided. That water taps be placed at the wash stands of the men and that the stands be moved back from the road.

That a covering be placed between the cook and mess houses and that the present walk connecting them be extended the length of the cook house. That the cooks be compelled to dress neatly and that they be provided with tents and that no person be allowed to sleep in the cook or mess houses. That printed instructions be posted in both houses to the effect that no bedding, clothing, equipment or other unauthorized article is allowed.

That company commanders be instructed not to bring men into camp incapable of duty.

I would respectfully call your attention that under present conditions a newly appointed medical officer is examined for a commission by a board of field and staff officers. I would recommend that the board consist of retired medical officers who are capable of determining the candidate's fitness for the position. Likewise I would recommend a medical officer on all boards for commissioning newly elected officers or on promotion to higher rank. It is not only that the physical condition of the officer elect should be of the standard required, but that he should have a sufficient knowledge of sanitation and hygiene as well as a familiarity with first aid to sick and injured, as would enable him to give advice and instruction to those under his command.

As I have done heretofore, I would respectfully recommend that each mess house and kitchen receive every year just before the encampment a thorough coat of whitewash outside and in, that the tables and floors of mess house and kitchen be painted and that the drop windows of the kitchen and serving shelf be covered with zinc or a coat of enamel paint.

I would also recommend that all contract surgeons as well as regularly commissioned surgeons should be required to give several lectures each year at stated intervals to the military companies in their vicinity on the subjects of sanitation and hygiene as well as first aid to the injured or sick and in that way save them from the results of indiscretion due to ignorance of the simplest rules of living.

I also recommend that the Surgeon General or a commissioned surgeon assigned by him should accompany the Inspector General on his tour of duty and inspect from a surgeon's point of view, the personnel of the guard. In that way many men would never reach camp who, as the system is now, are no credit to the guard.

I would also recommend that the examination papers of the recruits who are examined by the contract surgeons should be left at the Armory or in charge of the captain until the regular surgeon reports for inspection.

I would also recommend that such men in the guard who are drawing pensions from the United States Government for service in the Spanish-American War or otherwise be discharged from the service. I wish to thank the medical officers of the National Guard of Maine for their uniform courtesy and obedience to all orders and requests that I made upon them. It has been remarked before that few if any states in the Union have the medical men in their National Guard of the professional standing and ability as in our State. Such a fact speaks well for their interest and patriotism.

To the uniform courtesy and assistance of General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, I am indebted for many kindnesses in my endeavor to fill the office of Surgeon General.

To His Excellency, Governor William T. Cobb, I am under great obligations for his evident interest in my department.

In addition to the difficulties presented through failure to secure adequate range facilities, which has always been a drawback to small-arms practice in this State, the past season has been unusually hard on this department by reason of the reorganization of the Guard and the increase in the membership of the companies. Since the filing of my last report, three companies of the Guard have been disbanded and two new companies have been organized, leaving one vacancy to be filled. Changes of this sort make harder the work of every department, but in no branch of the military service does the influx of new and untrained men make itself so apparent in the record as in the tabulated figure of merit for the rifle practice of the entire Guard. Until developed by instruction and practice into a fairly good rifleman, every new member is an offset against the work of the experienced men of his company. The formation of two companies in localities which never have had organizations of the National Guard and compliance with the federal requirement that 61 officers and men shall constitute the minimum for infantry companies, have brought into the Guard during the past season an unprecedented number of new men, and until they acquire suitable proficiency in rifle practice the figure of merit must necessarily be low. The constant change

in the personnel of the Guard is apt to be discouraging to the company commander who takes pride in the drill of his command, but even in drill the newness is not so apparent as it is in the black and white of the figure of merit where efficiency is a matter of unchanging figures and the excellence of the front rank cannot be relied upon to cover the ragged work of the rear rank men.

A reorganization which transferred two companies of the Second Infantry to the First Infantry and one company of the First Infantry to the Second Infantry renders it impossible to tabulate this year's practice on a comparative basis as I have done each year since the adoption of Special Course "C." The transfer of Company D of the First to the Second gave the latter regiment a great advantage, for Company D has been far ahead of any other organization ever since the present system of qualification was instituted. It had a correspondingly weakening effect on the First, though that regiment was so fortunate as to obtain by transfer Companies B of Lewiston and C of Bath, which are good shooting companies and may be relied upon for even better results with added opportunities.

An examination of the appended tabulation of the figure of merit will show that the highest figure was attained by the Ordnance Department, but this is accounted for by the fact that it contains but two officers, both of whom regualified in the expert class. Company D of Norway, now of the Second but formerly of the First, once more leads the organizations of the line with the splendid figure of 135, which is relatively the best ever attained in the Guard, for while the same Company reached 143 in 1906, it was with a smaller strength. This year the Company has qualified every one of its 60 members, 18 of them as Experts, six as Sharpshooters and the remaining 36 as Marksmen. Companies F and M of the First deserve special mention for the figure which they attained, the former's standing at 71.83 and the latter at 90.83. The First Infantry Field and Staff reaches a high figure for a regimental headquarters, 75.22. The headquarters of the Naval Reserve exceeded this with a figure of 116.66, but it has a strength of but three against a strength of 23 for the Field and Staff of the First. The Second Division of the Reserve reached the satisfactory figure of 83.52, and the First Division, 76.92. Though Company H of

the First, in common with the other Lewiston and Auburn companies, had no regular range, Captain Arthur H. Field, the company commander, improvised a private range and succeeded in bringing his command up to a figure of 66.28. Company A of the Second again returns a high qualification, its figure being 86.25.

#### FIGURE OF MERIT.

A recapitulation of qualification, as shown in the report of this department to the Chief of the Division of Militia Affairs, War Department, Washington, with the figures for the Naval Reserve added is as follows:

#### THE RANGE SITUATION.

The difficulties of securing adequate range facilities for the widely scattered units of the National Guard of this State make it hard to secure desired results under a system of qualification which requires systematic practice at 200, 300 and 500 yards, if a satisfactory figure of merit is to be obtained. In former days, when firing was quite largely confined to 200-yard practice, ranges were more easily located, but in the day of high-power rifles the range problem is apt to be difficult of solution, especially in a State where it is necessary to have no less than 19 ranges in order to afford every organization an opportunity for qualification.

Some progress has been made from year to year, but even with the aid which the federal government has placed at the disposal of the State, range-building is slow work. With the means at our disposal the present season, it was deemed best to build where there seemed to be the greatest need and steps were accordingly taken to secure a suitable site in the vicinity of Lewiston and Auburn. Captain H. P. Carver, Quartermaster, First Infantry, rendered valuable aid in the matter, and long before the season for outdoor practice was begun,

acting under instructions from your office, I had inspected and approved a site in the suburbs of the city of Auburn. Through your office, negotiations were opened for the purchase of the property and preliminary arrangements were satisfactorily made. The papers were in due course of time forwarded to the Attorney-General of the United States for inspection, but his approval was not received till the outdoor season was drawing to a close and it was too late to attempt the building of the range this fall. The title to the property is now vested in the United States Government, the State acting as trustee under the provisions of the National militia law, and the State can proceed to the equipment of the range in time to make it available for the next season. The limits of the property which has been acquired will make it possible to construct a range furnishing ample targets for simultaneous firing at 200 and 500 yards and 300 and 600 yards, with excellent opportunity for skirmish practice, in addition to which a firing point at 800 yards can be secured, and it is probable that arrangements can be made for a 1000-yard firing point on adjoining property. This assures the three organizations of the First Infantry in Lewiston and Auburn a range which will permit qualification in the sharpshooter class and probably in the expert class. The range will be equipped with modern target carriers and telephone connections and a range keeper will be installed to see that the range is at all times used in a proper manner.

Company F of the Second Infantry at Dover is still without a range, though this department has made every endeavor to secure one. An officer of this department visited the town early in the season, approved a site and in company with the commanding officer of the company met the municipal officers and enlisted their assistance. Later, however, the parties owning the property in question declined to fulfill their verbal promise to sign the required leases and up to the present time no substitute site has been found. Lack of range facilities is particularly to be regretted in the case of this company, for it has always been an excellent shooting organization and among its members are some of the best marksmen and most enthusiastic riflemen in the Guard.

New ranges have been located at Rumford Falls and Livermore Falls during the season, the sites having been approved by an officer of this department and the leases have been drawn in accordance with instructions from your department. Both companies using these ranges are newly organized, but the interest which they have already shown in rifle practice is commendable and encourages the belief that in the coming season they will attain a figure of merit which will be of material advantage to their regiment and the Guard as a whole.

Assistance has been rendered to a number of the other organizations in the matter of range equipment and so far as means will permit every organization should be assisted in improving its range and equipment so as to make qualification practice easier.

Company G of the First Infantry at Biddeford is still without range facilities, and, though this department has urged the commanding officer of the company to exert every effort to find a suitable range site, none has been discovered.

In my opinion some assistance should be given organizations which have to travel by electric cars to reach their ranges. The Portland organizations are obliged to go to East Deering for practice and the Lewiston and Auburn companies will have to reach their new range via the Mechanic Falls electrics. For mid and long range firing the Bath company has to go to Brunswick and the Gardiner company to Augusta. Augusta, Waterville and Sanford may also be included within the companies which make use of the electrics in reaching their ranges. Though the matter may be of comparatively small importance, I believe the work of the company commander would be lightened if he were allowed carfare for each member of his command to visit the range once during the practice season, with an additional fare for each individual qualifying as a marksman, and a further fare for each increased grade of qualification.

Though the range used by the Portland organizations is confined to a limit of 600 yards with no opportunity for skirmish practice, the Naval Reserve has shown that its facilities, coupled with a slight amount of additional work on other ranges, make it possible for a company to secure a comparatively high figure of merit. As a matter of fact, any company which has a range permitting firing at 200, 300 and 500 can secure a figure of 100 by qualifying every officer and man in the marksman class,

and since the Portland range has ample opportunity for firing at these ranges, there is no reason why the Portland companies should not attain a higher standing than they have since the Ray street range was reopened in co-operation with the Myles Standish Rifle Club. The range is always available and, in the position of range-keeper, Amasa Cobb has rendered every possible aid to the marksmen of the National Guard, making it possible for them to secure their practice with the least possible expenditure of time and labor in making ready at the pits. Two of the Portland infantry companies have evinced an increased interest in range practice and Capt. Cummings of Company A and Lieut. Way of Company B have devoted a great deal of individual attention to gualification practice. It is the Naval Reserve, however, which has used the Portland range to the best advantage. Its headquarters secured a figure of 116.66 for its three members. The First Division, with 26 members, shows a figure of 76.92, and the Second Division with 27 members has the very satisfactory figure of 83.52. Their smaller membership, of course, gives the Naval Reserve divisions an advantage over the larger infantry companies, but the latter should not be so far behind.

#### THE NATIONAL MATCHES.

This year's State Team for the National Match was selected on a new basis. Its personnel of fifteen shooting members was made up of the twelve high men in the try-out and three selected by the Chief of Ordnance, and this plan works so well that I trust it will be followed in the selection of future teams. It gives assurance that over three-fourths of the team will be taken on the basis of the form which they show at the try-out, and yet it leaves the Chief of Ordnance free to name three others and so include within the team men that he knows will make good and who may have shot under some unavoidable handicap at the try-out. Could we be sure that every available candidate could have sufficient practice before the try-out, and had we range facilities to give a large number of men a three-days' try-out at all the stages prescribed for the National Match, with the further assurance that every good

man would be present at the try-out, I should favor taking the entire fifteen on their try-out scores. But since that is impractical in this State, at least, I believe the twelve and three arrangement insures the best team.

This year's try-out was the most grueling contest in the history of the National Guard of Maine and every man honestly won his place. The team was constituted in G. O. No. 20, State of Maine, A. G. O., under date of July 13th, the personnel being as follows:

Under orders from the Team Captain, the team members were assembled at Brunswick on the afternoon of Sunday, August 16th and Monday and Tuesday were devoted to team

practice on the range of Company K, First Infantry. Lack of facilities prevented skirmish practice as a team, but in groups of three a great deal of practice was secured, and though there was but one target available at the long ranges, the entire team received great benefit from the two-days' work and such practice should be made a regular feature in the training of future State teams. If the target facilities could be increased and the time lengthened, I believe that it would prove more beneficial than the same length of time spent in the fragmentary practice obtainable on the National Match range prior to the beginning of the team practice provided for in the conditions of the match.

The team left Brunswick, Wednesday, August 19, proceeding to Camp Perry, Ohio, where it arrived Thursday afternoon, August 20. Friday and Saturday were devoted to preliminary team practice, and on Monday, August 24, the National Match was begun. The twelve men making up the Maine team were: Captain Nash, Captain Field, Lieutenant Wentworth, Lieutenant Stiles, Lieutenant Daughraty, Lieutenant Gould, Ouartermaster Sergeant LeBel, First Sergeant Keating, First Sergeant Marston, Sergeant Bailey, Sergeant Christie and Sergeant Smtih. The 200-vard slow fire, 200-vard rapid-fire and 600-vard slow-fire stages were shot on Monday: the 800-vard slow-fire and skirmish stages on Tuesday, and the 1000-vard stage on Wednesday. Skirmish conditions on Tuesday were baffling, even to teams which had been in practice on the range for weeks, and while the Maine total was but 593, it was above that made by many teams which had reason to expect high scores. The rapid-fire work of the team was below that of 1007, but it must be borne in mind that this year's rapid-fire stage was shot on the bullseve instead of the figure target and that all scores were correspondingly lower. The total for the team was 2014, giving Maine 15th place in a field of 50 teams. Eliminating the five service teams, this is equivalent to saying that Maine was defeated by but ten teams in a field of 45 National Guard teams. Massachusetts was the only New England state to finish ahead of Maine, and among the states which finished behind Maine were New York, Ohio and others that have long been among the leaders. winners, standing seventh in a field of several hundred of the Nation's best marksmen.

The Team returned home at the conclusion of the National Individual Match. The conduct of this year's matches showed great improvement over last year and the subsistence arrangements were entirely satisfactory. With the addition of further latrines and added bathing facilities, the range at Camp Perry will be ideal for National Match purposes. Train arrangements still leave much to be desired, though there was an improvement over 1907. The position of executive officer of the National Matches was admirably filled by Lieutenant-Colonel R. K. Evans, General Staff.

#### THE NEW ENGLAND MATCHES.

Maine was not represented in the New England Interstate Match at the annual tournament of the New England Military Rifle Association in July, it being deemed inadvisable to enter a team in view of length of time required for the Camp Perry Several company teams and a number of individual trip. riflemen from the National Guard of this State were present, however, and figured largely among the prize winners. An attempt was made to secure a change in the order of events so that State Team men might not be obliged to spend the entire week at Wakefield in order to shoot in the Interstate Match, but this plan was defeated and the Interstate was shot the latter part of the week as in the past. A change to the first of the week would make it easier for Maine, at all events, to enter a team each year, which is a duty that I think the State owes to the New England Military Rifle Association.

#### VALUE OF NATIONAL MATCH EXPERIENCE.

In view of the fact that the question is sometimes raised, whether money spent in participation in the National Match is well expended, it may not be amiss to add a word along these lines.

The fact that the War Department strongly urges every State to be represented in the National Match shows how the matter is regarded by those with whom the militia is a national problem. To bring the question home to this state, an exami-

nation of the records will show that in the great majority of cases, when any organization has secured representation on the State Team there has been a quickening of interest in rifle practice in that organization. There can be no question that better results have been attained in the following organizations as the result of representation on the State Team: Company D. Second Infantry, Norway; Company F. First Infantry, Sanford; Company H, First Infantry, Lewiston; Company M, First Infantry, Westbrook; Company D, First Infantry, Bath; the Naval Reserve, Portland; Company L, Second Infantry, Houlton; Company F, Second Infantry, Dover; Company K, First Infantry, Brunswick; Company M, Second Infantry, Augusta. Ten days' practice and association with expert riflemen is as good for any officer or man as ten days' drill in any other line of military work, and the officer or man who has been on the State Team returns to his company with new ideas about rifle practice and a knowledge of methods in accomplishing results which he could not have secured in any other way. In most cases he rejoins his organization with a determination to see if he can't have a larger representation from his organization on next year's team, and straightway begins to develop material. He also begins to take new pride in the standing of his organization in the State competitions and the relative figure of merit.

Such results do not invariably follow, but the commanding officers of the companies which have been represented on State teams in the National Match will generally agree with the above statement.

#### STATE COMPETITIONS.

This year's State competitions were held under the provisions of G. O. No. 29, State of Maine, A. G. O., c. s. The First Infantry Team Match was shot at Brunswick, on the range of Company K, First Infantry, and the Second Infantry Team Match at Augusta, on the State range, the same day. These matches were open to teams of six officers and men, permission being granted each company and each regimental headquarters to enter an additional team, the purpose being to encourage the development of the largest possible number of good shots. The matches were shot at 200 and 500 yards, each man firing two sighting and seven record shots at each range. Cash prizes were offered as usual to the winning teams, and in addition thereto, for the first time, individual cash prizes were offered. The team prizes ranged from 50 to 10, and the individual from 10 to 2. The individual prizes offer an inducement to the individual rifleman which has been hitherto lacking, and I hope that funds may be available next season so that still further prizes may be offered. #### THE INTER-REGIMENTAL MATCH.

Under the provisions of the general orders just cited, the Inter-Regimental Match was shot at Augusta on Friday, October 16. It was open to a team of ten officers and men from each regiment of infantry, and each competitor fired two sighting and ten shots for record at 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards, slow-fire. The conditions were excellent for good shooting and the match was won by the Second Infantry team with a score which put all previous Maine records far to the rear. At 200 yards, the First made 427 and the Second 435. At 300 yards, the First made 426 and the Second 424. At the 500-vard stage, the First's total was 460 and the Second's 471. In the final stage at 600 yards, the First made 439 to 458 for the Second. This gave the First an aggregate of 1752 for the match, against 1788 for the Second. At 600 yards three members of the Second's team made 48 out of 50 and not a man went below 43. It will be noted that the score of the First's team was 152 and that of the Second's team 188 above centers, making the match the most brilliant in the history of military rifle shooting in the State. The members of the winning team received silver medals, the personnel being as follows:

The General Mitchell Medal was awarded to Lieutenant M. P. Stiles, Company D, Second Infantry.

The detailed scores of the matches will be found in the appendices of this report.

### NAVAL RESERVE COMPETITION.

The annual competition of the Naval Reserve was held at the Ray street range in Portland, October 17. The Inter-Divisional Team Match, open to a team of six officers and men from each division, was shot at 200 and 500 yards, two sighting and seven shots for record being fired by each competitor at each range. The match was won by the Second Division. The silver medal offered by the State for the high individual was won by Seaman M. B. Durgin, Second Division. The second prize of 200 rounds of rifle ammunition was won by B. M. First Class H. H. Doble, First Division. The detailed report of the competition, made by the executive officer, Lieut. L. S. Heseltine, commanding the Ship's Company, will be found in the appendices.

#### THE ORDNANCE DEPARTMENT.

Under the provisions of G. O. No. 21, State of Maine, A. G. O., series of 1907, the work in small arms has been conducted for the calendar year of 1908 under the direction of the Ordnance Department therein created. The department, however, still lacks the foundation of statute law and I trust that the necessary legislation may be enacted at the coming legislative session.

In my opinion the detail of the chief officer of the Ordnance Department to staff duty when the Guard is in brigade formation is incorrect. When manoeuvers are conducted with brigade formation and it is necessary to detail an ordnance officer for duty therewith, the officer so detailed should be a subordinate officer of the Ordnance Department, leaving the chief officer of the department on duty at the department headquarters to be in readiness to issue such ordnance and ordnance stores as the brigade ordnance officer may find necessary for execution of the problems ordered by the brigade commander.

If legislation is enacted authoritatively creating the Ordnance Department, all requisitions for ammunition and rifle range and gallery equipment should be made through that department and be filled in accordance with the suggestions of the chief officer of said department. To facilitate the issue of ordnance stores, other than those herein mentioned, it may be well for the present to make no change in existing conditions; but there is certainly every reason why requisitions for ordnance and ordnance stores directly used in small-arms qualifications should be vised by the department responsible for the results attained.

I beg to submit herewith the following tentative draft of regulations for the government of the Ordnance Department if its status be fixed by statute:

## REGULATIONS FOR THE ORDNANCE DEPARTMENT.

1. The Ordnance Department is charged with the proper armament and equipment of the National Guard with ordnance and ordnance stores, and shall have general oversight of smallarms practice, furnishing to the Adjutant General from time to time necessary data to keep the rules and regulations governing such practice in harmony with the regulations prescribed by the War Department for the organized Militia.

2. It shall be the duty of the senior officer of the Ordnance Department to see that the National Guard is at all times armed and equipped with the ordnance and ordnance stores required by the regulations for the organized militia, and he shall notify the Commander-in-Chief when ordnance and ordnance stores are required so that requisition may be made therefor. He will be notified of the receipt of ordnance and ordnance stores at the State storehouse and no ordnance or ordnance stores will be issued except on requisition by him approved.

3. The senior officer of the Ordnance Department may issue circulars of an informative nature explanatory of general orders and regulations and for the encouragement of smallarms practice, but shall have no authority to issue orders. 4. The senior officer of the Ordnance Department shall prescribe the conditions for all State competitions; provided, however, that in the case of regimental matches, regimental commanders shall be consulted as to the dates and general plans; such conditions to be forwarded to the Adjutant General for issue in orders, if approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

5. The senior officer of the Ordance Department shall prepare all necessary forms for returns of small-arms practice; forwarding the same to the Adjutant General for printing and issue, if approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

6. An officer of the Ordnance Department shall inspect all sites designed for use as rifle ranges by the several organizations of the National Guard, and shall prescribe the manner of their equipment; provided, however, that no expenditure of state or federal funds shall be considered authorized until the approval of the senior member of the Ordnance Department has been given in writing. He may at any time require a report on the condition of any range and may make request for such report from the senior commanding officer of the troops using such range; provided further, that if he deems the situation urgent, such request and its reply may be made without regard to intervening headquarters.

7. All expenditures from the special federal allotment for the promotion of rifle practice shall be made by the disbursing officer on the recommendation of the senior officer of the Ordnance Department.

8. The department shall be allowed such sums for clerical work, making annual returns, etc., as the Commander-in-Chief may designate, and shall be allowed necessary postage, such accounts to be rendered semi-annually; but no officer of the department shall be entitled to per diem or travelling expenses except with the approval of the Adjutant-General.

9. Officers of the Ordnance Department shall make such inspection of ranges and shooting galleries and such visits of instruction as the Commander-in-Chief may order.

While it is my opinion that the immediate directon of smallarms practice in the regimental units of the Guard should be in the hands of officers of the Ordnance Department detailed for duty with the regiments, I am of the opinion that better results may be obtained under existing circumstances if the commanding officer of each regiment be allowed to name a regimental inspector of small-arms practice.

The last revision of the federal militia law permits the appointment of regimental inspectors of small-arms practice with rank of captain and provides that officers so appointed shall be an integral part of the regimental staff in peace and war, thereby giving them a status in active service which regimental inspectors have not hitherto enjoyed.

While it is probable that better results might be obtained in the long run by the detail of ordnance officers who would not be subject to change whenever there is a change in the colonelcy of the regiments, the immediate results will doubtless be more satisfactory if the commanding officers of the regiments are allowed to select their own officers.

If such officers are authorized, regimental commanders should be cautioned to make appointments with extreme care, endeavoring to secure inspectors who are not only conversant with the rules and regulations governing small-arms qualification, but acquainted with the practical details of range construction and the clerical detail of required reports.

Under all the circumstances, therefore, I respectfully recommend that there be added to the staff of each regiment an inspector of small-arms practice with rank of captain and that such officers be, ex-officio, ordnance officers and required to work in harmony with the Ordnance Department.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

In summarized form, my recommendations are as follows:

1. That regimental commanders be authorized to appoint inspectors of small-arms practice.

2. That the creation of the Ordnance Department under general orders be legalized by statute.

3. That companies which have to travel by electric cars to reach their ranges be allowed carfare for all who qualify.

4. That conditions for the Inter-Regimental Match be

changed so as to include 200 yards slow-fire, 200 yards rapidfire, 600 yards slow-fire, and one skirmish run; team captains to be appointed well in advance of the competition.

5. That State pay be authorized for competitors in State competitions.

6. That the State be represented by a State team in the National Match and the New England Inter-State Match.

# REPORT OF U. S. INSPECTING OFFICER.

(Extracts from reports of inspection of the organized militia of Maine, giving remarks of Captain Samuel T. Ansell, 8th Inf., U. S. A. Inspecting Officer, with regard to condition of the several organizations of the State forces.)

General Headquarters.—Of the officers constituting the Governor's Staff, two were absent. I am impressed with the fact that the office of aid is purely political, and the usual incumbent fails entirely to conceive that the office has any connection with the military establishment other than wearing a uniform in a manner which while doubtless pleasing to the wearer, is often ludicrous to the national guardsman and to civilians as well. They should, if possible, be chosen from the Guard. These officers, constituting General Headquarters, are not bona fide officers of the organized militia. They are fully equipped. The records at General Headquarters are well kept and the office is well conducted, but the correspondence between the headquarters and the various organizations is rather slow. Promptness in all correspondence should be insisted on and unfailingly practised.

State Storehouses.—It was impracticable to verify the property stored, and an inventory was furnished me by the Quartermaster General, which in my opinion shows less than is actually on hand. The property is neatly and systematically kept and well cared for by a good storekeeper; but the storehouses are too small. The tentage, camp equipage, field equipment, kitchen utensils, and medical supplies are kept stored in the houses, packed up, marked with the letter of the organization, and ready for issue when needed. In order to fully arm and equip the prescribed minimum, the State, it seems, would require the quantities shown in column 3, below:

First aid packets and pouches, and uniform shirts, and gloves for entire guard.

Medical Department and Hospital Corps.—Physical appearance, character of men, and zeal, excellent; efficiency, very good; several of the enlisted men are physicians and surgeons, and all are men of great intelligence; it would require but a short time for them to learn efficiently their military duties. The entire command would accompany the regiments if called into active service. The Department and corps (excepting the Surgeon General) accompanied the two regiments last August to the seacoast exercises in Portland Harbor, and while there received much valuable instruction. Drills are held weekly and are well attended; the character of the instruction is good.

### FIRST INFANTRY.

General Remarks.—Physical appearance, character of men, zeal, and efficiency, very good, and 85% could be depended on in case of emergency. These officers and enlisted men reside in different parts of the State. This State has few large cities, and in only two instances is more than one company to be found in one place—Portland having a battalion of four companies and Lewiston two companies of different regiments. As a rule, the companies in the small country towns are the better, composed as they are of a sturdy and permanent personnel; whereas, in the larger manufacturing towns the Companies are apt to have a number of members who are millhands, the permanency of whose abodes depends upon business conditions. The enlisted men throughout the regiment are well armed and equipped, and the arms are as a rule well cared for, but in several companies not by the individual men but by the guartermaster sergeant or men hired for the purpose. Unless this is remedied that necessary military lesson of individual responsibility cannot be learned. There is upon the part of the officers a failure to appreciate that fact; the company commander undertakes to do everything himself; as a consequence, he fails to develop men, noncommissioned officers and lieutenants. With a few exceptions the company commanders, considering the disadvantage under which they labor, do creditably; but there are several in the Guard who, while good men and citizens, have not the slightest gualifications for their positions, other than having received the votes of the men therefor; these are fast disappearing. The rifles found in poor condition were invariably rusty in the bore; there seems to be the general impression that a rifle will pass inspection when the chamber only is clean. The officers are in most cases equipped fully, except as to full dress uniform (which it is hoped they will soon have) and except in a few cases field' glasses and revolvers. Field officers have little or no opportunity to inspect their commands and there seems to be prevalent a misconception that when an officer is elected to field grade, he is to take no more interest in company matters. Majors should interest themselves in the local organization, whether it belongs to their battalion or not. With a few exceptions officers are very enthusiastic, but they have little opportunity to learn as there is no school system worthy the name. and not much field instruction. The enlisted personnel is, in most companies, excellent and the men are willing to perform a soldier's duty so far as they have been taught it. The armory conditions in this State are so unsatisfactory that unless a new and efficient armory system be soon adopted, the Guard can never become efficient; it is hoped that the next Legislature may remedy this. The State has adopted as to physical examinations the requirements of Circular, February 8, 1904, and the examinations are well conducted. The Guard with the personnel it has can be made one of the most efficient in the country if satisfactory system with regard to the following be adopted by the Legislature, and I believe they will be, viz.:

I. State armories, built gradually, still retaining control over the present system.

2. Some pay for enlisted men, thus giving company commanders greater disciplinary control.

3. Systematic instruction: I believe this could be accomplished through correspondence.

4. System of inspection by the regimental commanders and majors.

*Headquarters.*—Physical appearance, character, and zeal of the men, excellent; efficiency, very good; and all of them would accompany the command if turned out in case of emergency. These noncommissioned staff officers are men of superior intelligence.

Band.—Physical appearance, good; character of men, zeal, efficiency, and reliability, undetermined, since they are so little under military control. Members of the band furnish their uniforms and instruments. When in camp with the regiment, overcoats, blankets, and mess outfits furnished by the State. I understand that it is now the intention of the State authorities to provide this organization with uniforms. I am of the opinion that bandsmen would not enter the service of the United States if called on, and new bands would have to be enlisted. That is, the band would not enter as an organization.

Company A.-Physical appearance very good-several of the men appeared rather young and undersized; character, excellent; zeal, excellent-I learned that several of the men came from a distance of 25 to 30 miles at their own expense in order to be present at this inspection. This company had evidently made marked improvement within the last year under the present company commander, and it is very well drilled and instructed. Its efficiency is very good. Ninety per cent of the command could be relied upon to turn out in emergency. The company records show a scheduled weekly drill which is frequently interfered with by the city government letting or using the drill hall for other purposes. Although much of this is unavoidable owing to the fact that the armory now has to be used as a city hall, yet it is often let on drill nights for purposes of revenue only. The average attendance at drill is very creditable, it being about 75% of the strength of the command. Last August this company participated in the seacoast maneuvers and acted as artillery reserves at Fort McKinlev: officers and men appreciate the value of their training there. This company occupies an armory with three other companies of the same regiment-a good, modern, brick structure, with company administration rooms and large drill hall. Each company has an assembly room, a recreation room, and a company office, both of which are well furnished at the company's expense and a combined locker and storeroom, which, though too small, is well utilized by this company through a neat and orderly arrangement of all property. Other rooms well suited to the purpose. This company has, with the three other companies, a 600-yard range nearby at Deering; men firing beyond that have to use the excellent range at Brunswick. Figure of merit last season 22.63. Now that the company has a range, it is hoped that the interest in target practice will revive. Gallery in basement of armory.

Company B.-Physical appearance, character, and zeal of the men, are good; efficiency, only fair-the men are poorly instructed, which condition results principally from the fact that the armory and drill-hall are not devoted exclusively, nor even primarily, to the uses of the National Guard. Reliability of the command is fair, and 70% could be depended on in case of emergency. The company records show a bi-weekly drill with an average attendance of about 65% of the strength of the command. These drills are scheduled to, but because of the other uses to which the hall is placed, actually do not occur on stated nights. Last August this company acted as infantry supports at Fort McKinley; men and officers are very appreciative of the training they got there. Locker and store room of this company not neatly kept. But little interest, I think is taken in target practice. (For comment on armory and rifle range, see report on Co. A.)

Company C.—Physical appearance, fair; there were three men in the ranks under size and I believe under age; the men were young and very boyish looking. Character, very good. Zeal, fair. I was informed by both captain and the quartermaster sergeant that it is impossible to get each man to take care of his own equipment. Quartermaster sergeant in this and most other companies of the Guard takes care of all the equipment, leaving untaught the lesson of personal responsibility. Efficiency, good; the men appeared to be fairly well instructed in the simpler things; but not more than 65% of this company could be depended on to turn out in case of emergency, as many of the members are factory hands without permanent abodes. The records show a weekly drill with a fair average attendance of about 22. These drills amount to little in the winter months-the men sitting around stoves and making something of a school out of the drill hour. The building is poorly heated with stoves. Last August the company participated in the Portland Harbor maneuvers at Fort Leavitt. This company has a separate building for an armory, with adequate facilities. There are excellent storerooms but the property when I saw it was not neatly and systematically arranged. The men have a very attractive club room, but the floor of this and of the entire armory was very dirty. This company has no range, but fired last year on the good range at Brunswick. Steps are now being taken to build a range near the city. Company has a good 75 foot gallery, systematically used; aiming and position drills precede the practice.

Company D.-The physical appearance and character of the men are excellent. They were very steady in ranks and impressed me as possessing many of the substantial elements of discipline. The instruction is, of course, far from perfect and it may be that some general instruction has been sacrificed to target practice-a sacrifice which is not, however, very regrettable. The general efficiency of this company is very good, and unquestionably 90% could be depended upon in case of emergency. The zeal and enthusiasm of the command are excellent; and I was informed that several members of the company present had traveled, to appear at this inspection, from three to eighteen miles over a rough country in cold and inclement weather. The requirements of the circular prescribing physical qualifications for enlistment in the Army have been adopted, and I believe that the examinations here are exceptionally thorough, due to the fact that the examining surgeon (Major Bradbury) an officer who is thorough and conscientious in the performance of his duties, lives right here in town. 'Armory conditions here, as in most other places, are unsatisfactory; the drill hall is much too small and is not exclusively devoted to the uses of the company; but when the men cannot drill, they shoot. The storerooms are too small, and it is due to the untiring energy of all the company officers (especially 1st Lieutenant Stiles) that the property is kept in such excellent shape. This company stands at the head of the State Guard in target practice. The enthusiasm is commendable. The range is fair (1000 yards), about one mile from town. The company has a 50-foot gallery which is in almost continuous use. The people of this town and section appear much interested in the welfare of the company and it is worthy of such interest. It is hoped that the town will build a better armory, and I understand there is a project on foot to do so. This company has weekly drills and participated in the Portland maneuvers last year at Fort Leavitt.

Company E.—Physical appearance, character, and zeal of men, good; efficiency, good; the men are fairly well, though not accurately, instructed. At drill, after the ceremony of inspection, the company gave a snappy close-order drill. Reliability, very good, and I believe 75% could be depended on to turn out in case of emergency. The company records show a weekly drill schedule, but the company does not drill every week, because the city government frequently uses the drill hall for other purposes. Last August this company participated in the seacoast maneuvers at Fort McKinley as artillery reserves. The property is neatly and systematically stored and is kept in excellent condition. (For comment on armory and rifle range, see report on Co. A.)

Company F.—The physical appearance of the men was very good, but owing to lack of armory facilities they have had little or no drill for the past year; therefore, they are not well set up and they do not appear military. They do appear zealous in the performance of their duties so far as they have had the opportunity to learn them; they are limited to squad drill at present because of having no drill hall. The zeal of the men is excellent, especially so when consideration is given to the many discouraging circumstances (chief of which is having no place to drill) under which they labor. The efficiency is very good. The command is a very reliable one, and 80%could be depended upon in case of emergency; it is composed of the most respectable young men of the town. The records show a weekly drill with fair attendance; but the drill is entirely by squad. The instruction, due to lack of armory facilities, has been of little value since the company returned last August from Fort McKinley where it participated in the sea-coast maneuvers. Armory conditions throughout the State are despicable, precluding in some places all hope of efficiency. This company has been one of the worst sufferers. The armory consists of two storage rooms, and a company officers' room; squad drill is held in these rooms. There are no gallery facilities. The range is an excellent 1000-yard one, the gift of a generous citizen; all take commendable interest in target practice. The new town building will be completed in June; it is being built purposely to provide an armory which, when completed, will be the best in the State.

Company G.-Physical appearance, character, zeal, and reliability of the command, excellent; efficiency, very good; and I believe 90% could be relied upon to turn out in case of emergency. The instruction of this company appears to have been very good, despite the fact that the armory is too small for any purpose, and the drill hall is so small that a section could not properly be drilled in it. The company's records show a weekly drill with an average attendance of 80%. Last year this company acted as infantry supports in the seacoast maneuvers at Fort McKinley and the officers and men are very enthusiastic about the work they did there. At the drill following the ceremony of inspection, I observed that the commands were very correctly given and the men executed the movements with snap and precision. The armory is on the third floor of a business block, and consists of a small officers' room, and combined locker and store room which is altogether inadequate, and drill hall so small as not to be worthy the name. The rooms were neat and clean, and the property very neatly and systematically arranged. This company has nothing but an indoor gallery range in the so-called drill hall and a 200-yard outdoor range. Target practice is at a low ebb because of this fact, but steps are being taken either to procure a range near town or take the company to Sanford's range. It is unfortunate that an organization with so many elements of efficiency as this has should not have better target facilities.

Company H.—The men are of good physical appearance and well behaved. In my opinion they are not at all zealous in the

performance of their duties, and they are characterized by a general lack of interest. That military spirit which brings efficiency is not to be found in this company. The attendance generally small and irregular. A fair percentage of the men live in the city only in the summer—men of no fixed abode, as I understand it. If these men were discharged the interest of the town people is such that nobody could be found to take their places, so the captain informs me. I am of the opinion that not more than 50% of the command could be depended upon, in case of domestic emergency, to turn out and perform efficient service. (Since my inspection, this company has been disbanded, and another organized elsewhere.)

Company I.-Physical appearance, fair; men were not military in bearing and need more physical training; character, good; zeal, fair-the men are not enthusiastic; efficiency, fair -the men are not well instructed, and become very easily "rattled"; they knew but little about inspection, blanket rolls, mess kits, etc., and several knew absolutely nothing at drill. Seventy-five per cent. could be depended on in case of emergency. Examinations conducted under Circular, February 8, 1904, and seem to be fairly thorough. Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, has been complied with; this company has weekly drills with an average attendance of 80%; the drills are not systematic, and do not cover a prescribed course. Last August the company acted as artillery reserve in camp at Fort McKinley. This company occupies the upper floor of a large frame structure with another company-Company B of the Second Infantry. The drill hall is a large room about  $45 \times 90$ feet, used by both companies; each company has an officers' room fairly well furnished; one locker room for the men which is much too small. Lockers were neatly arranged. There is no gun rack, and the rifles are kept in the lockers with the men's soiled and damp clothing. The floors of the entire armory are dirty, the walls bare and not clean. The armory generally is very unattractive. The range, which was formerly used by both companies, has been condemned; and unless a range can be purchased and prepared very soon these companies will be compelled to go to Brunswick, 20 miles away. The company has a good gallery which is systematically used two nights a week during the indoor season.

Company K.-Physical appearance and moral character of the men, good; the military character, zeal and efficiency, poor. The reliability and certainly the value of this command whose military efficiency is unquestionably poor could not with certainty be depended upon. The requirements of Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, have been fulfilled, though it would be difficult to ascertain this from the poorly kept records. The company has a weekly drill, a part of which is devoted to gallery practice, but the attendance is poor. In looking over the records of drill I seldom found more than 18 men present. This company participated last year in the seacoast maneuvers at Portland. The State has adopted the physical standard prescribed by the Department, and from questioning the 2d lieutenant who is an excellent doctor. I found that the examinations are well conducted and thorough. The armory, consisting of a fair-sized drill hall, store room and locker room (both of which are entirely too small), and a company office, is the upper floor of a large building rented by the town for the purpose. The drill hall was clean but the other rooms were dirty and not kept in an orderly manner. The lockers were not kept neatly and systematically, and each man is permitted to visit his locker and remove property therefrom at his pleasure. The range is one of the best in the State, 1000 yards, leased by the State for the purpose. Apparently a commendable interest is taken in target practice. The company has a fair 50-foot gallery in the drill hall. The town stands ready to help the company in every reasonable manner.

Company L.—Physical appearance, good, though several of the men looked boyish; character, good; efficiency only fair the instruction has not been systematic and thorough and the men are not grounded in the first principles. The drills are scheduled weekly, but the city government letting or using the hall for other, and often unnecessary purposes, the drills are frequently suspended; this operates against the company's efficiency. Eighty per cent. could, I think, be depended on to turn out in case of emergency. The company records show scheduled a weekly drill, which in several instances was interfered with by the city government, with an average attendance of 65% of the command. Last year the company acted as infantry supports in the seacoast exercises at Fort McKinley. The company has a company officers' room well furnished (at company's expense), and an assembly room, a recreation room (furnished also at company's expense), and combined locker and store room, which is much too small but is neatly kept. (For comments on armory and rifle range, see report on Co. A.)

Company M .-- The men are of excellent physical appearance, lithe, active, and well behaved. During my presence at the armory in the afternoon there was no unseemly boisterousness and I was impressed with the quiet demeanor of the men who are zealous in the performance of their duties so far as they know them, and they know them better than the average militia. Eighty per cent. could be depended upon in case of emergency. Company records show weekly drills, and the company is fairly efficient in both close and extended order work. Very good extended order drill given at inspection. Participated in the maneuvers, August 8-17, last, as artillery reserve at Fort McKinley. This company has a good nearby 1000yard range, and the men are much interested in target practice. Company has good 50-foot gallery, systematically used. The armory is better than the usual Maine armory; consists of two floors, with drill hall, officers' room, assembly room, locker and store room. It is kept very neat and clean; property well cared for; rifles are kept in racks and all are in excellent condition; and there was everywhere evidence of military system and discipline. The efficiency of this company shows what can be accomplished under adverse circumstances, when the company commander is a thoroughly energetic and intelligent man. The townspeople appear much interested in the company's welfare.

#### SECOND INFANTRY.

General Remarks.—Same general remarks as for First Infantry.

*Headquarters.*—Physical appearance, character and zeal of the men, excellent; efficiency, very good; and all of them would accompany the commands if turned out in case of emergency. These noncommissioned officers are men of superior intelligence and are absolutely reliable. Act of January 21, 1903, complied with. These men reside in different parts of the state, and are attached to the nearest command for target practice.

Band.—Physical appearance, good; character of man, zeal, efficiency, and reliability, undetermined, since they are so little under military control. Members of the band furnish their uniforms and instruments. When in camp with the regiment, overcoats, blankets, and mess outfits, furnished by the State. I understand that it is now the intention of the State authoriies to provide this organization with uniforms. I am of the opinion that the band would not enter the service of the United States, if called on, as an organization; and probably new bands would have to be enlisted.

Company A.—The physical appearance of the men was good, but they showed the lack of vigorous drill, especially in the setting-up exercises and the school of the soldier. The efficiency is only fair, and although the company records show a weekly drill, the instruction, in my opinion, must be poor. The drills, as is too frequently the case in the national guard, consist of movements without previous explanation. I do not believe that more than 50% of the command could be depended upon at any time in case of emergency, though the captain is sure he could get 75%; the attendance at this inspection would indicate that he is in error. The company is comprised in large part of mill and factory hands; the officers differed as to why more were not present; one saving that business depression has driven them to seek employment elsewhere, another that they were in town but that their employers would not let them off. At any rate such small attendance is proof positive of the general inefficiency of this company as a military organization. The company has a 500-yard range nearby. It has a fair system of gallery practice. The armory is now a good one, due to the untiring efforts of the captain and the interest of a few of the townsmen, which interest is not general. The property is exceedingly well cared for in the organization, except as to the ordnance. The company commander very improperly permits each man to use any rifle he pleases, instead of issuing them to the men and holding each man responsible; he has also the pernicious practice of making noncommissioned officers only once a year-just before going into camp.

Company B.—Physical appearance, good, though several of the men were very slouchy; character of men, good; zeal, fair —there is little, considering the unattractive armory and the little that the State does for its soldiery, that appeals to anybody but a man inordinately fond of the military; men are not enthusiastic. Efficiency, remarkably good, considering the numerous disadvantages. Ninety per cent. could be depended on in case of emergency. This company has bi-weekly drills with an average attendance of about 75%; the drills are not systematic, and do not cover, a prescribed course. Last August the company acted as infantry supports at Fort Preble, Portland Harbor. The range which was formerly used by both companies, has now been condemned and unless a range can be purchased and prepared very soon these companies will be compelled to go to Brunswick, 20 miles away. The company has a good 50-foot gallery which is systematically used during indoor season two nights a week.

Company C .--- Physical appearance, character of men, zeal, and efficiency, excellent; 95% could be relied upon in case of emergency, either Federal or domestic. I was impressed with the very neat and soldierly appearance of both men and officers: with their steadiness in ranks: their attention to the courtesies and minor details; and with their zeal, earnestness, and enthusiasm. This company is very efficient, and at inspection put up a most creditable drill. The company records show a weekly drill with a very good average attendance. This company last year participated in the Army seacoast maneuvers at Portland where it was assigned to duty as artillery reserve with 12-inch mortar battery. I understand that it performed its duty there very satisfactory. This was to be expected, as many of the members of the company are mechanics employed in the Bath shipyards. This company has its armory in a business block, with drill hall; officers' room handsomely furnished; good recreation room for the men; lockers and storerooms in the gallery and are very much too small. The drill hall is about 45 x 50 feet and is so small that the company can never become efficiently drilled. The armory is exceedingly well kept-neat, clean, and attractive. The lockers and all the property are systematically arranged and kept, and well cared for. The company itself, I understand, pays for several of the rooms and for the maintenance of them, the appropriation from the city being insufficient. The company has only a 200-yard range which is situated near the town; all other firing has to be done at Brunswick, about nine miles away and is reached by trolley; this method will probably be pursued this year. There is a good gallery in the armory which is systematically used. The townspeople are much interested in the welfare of this organization.

Company E.-Physical appearance, character, and zeal of the men, very good; efficiency, fair, though it could be much improved with a little accurate and systematic instruction. At the drill 6 or 8 men appeared to be absolutely uninstructed, not knowing how to execute inspection arms, fix and unfix bayonets, nor the simplest close-order movements. I observed a tendency in this company (and I have observed it more or less throughout the Guard) for the men to do things in a slovenly and inaccurate manner, substituting their own ideas for the fixed regulation methods. If the officers know better they do not seem to observe these defects. At drill the captain's commands were well given, however, and the movements were fairly well explained before executing them; but the captain seemed to make no use of his lieutenants. The records show two drills a month with an average attendance of 60%; this company participated last year in the maneuvers at Fort Williams. I consider the command perfectly reliable to the extent of its efficiency, and 80% could be turned out at once in case of emergency. The armory is the upper floor of a large frame structure, hired by the town for the purpose, consisting of a large drill hall 50x112 feet, a company officers' room, a storeroom, a gallery, and a toilet. It is a fair armory, well heated but poorly lighted, the storerooms are clean and well kept, the individual lockers are very neatly and systematically arranged, but the drill hall, which is used for many other than military purposes, is dirty. The town is erecting for the exclusive use of the company an armory in the new town hall now building, and I understand that the townspeople are interested in the organization. The range, which is one mile from town, is only 600 yards and if men fired at 800 or 1000 yards arrangements would have to be made elsewhere for that purpose. The gallery is only 30 feet, but the instruction seems to be good and systematic. The range is not good, but under the circumstances no better can be obtained. This company is improving rapidly under the energetic guidance of the present company commander.

Company F.--Physical appearance, character and zeal of the men are excellent; men are large, tall, and fairly well set up; they appear to be exceptionally intelligent; efficiency, fair, the instruction not having been systematic and thorough; men absoutely reliable, and could be depended upon in case of emergency to do their full duty so far as they know it; not more than 75% could be reasonably depended on to turn out. Records show weekly drills with attendance ranging from 18 men to full strength, with a fair average considering the severe winter climate and the distance at which some of the men live from From June to October, inclusive, is the only period town. when really valuable instruction can be given. The instruction is not systematic, nor can it be when the same thing has to be repeated night after night in order to reach all the men. The armory is rented for the company by the town, and occupies the upper floor of a large brick building which has steam heat and modern toilet facilities. It consists of a single storeroom which is inadequate for the storage and protection of the property so that other rooms have to be used for this purpose; an assembly or club room for the men, with billiard and pool tables and facilities for games; an officers' room and company office; a very small drill hall 45 x 55 feet, made smaller by the men's box lockers being stored around the wall; and a modern toilet room. Armory is well kept, though the drill hall was not clean; the property and equipment in the men's lockers were not neatly and systematically arranged. The 600-yard range is close to town, but the few men who fire at 800 and 1000 yards have to go some distance to get that range. Buildings are being erected too close to the range for safety, but this will be remedied. Too much effort is devoted to making a few good shots to the neglect of the general standard. There is a 50-foot gallery under the post office where the practice should be more general than it is now. Aiming and position drills are neglected.

Company G.—Physical appearance, very good—large, welldeveloped men; zeal, only fair; efficiency, fair; and I believe the men could be depended upon absolutely to do their duty in case of emergency, but not more than 60% could be depended upon to turn out. The men were fairly steady in ranks, and

what they could do at all they did very smartly. The command is poorly instructed, but being intelligent men they would improve rapidly under proper instruction and with a place to drill. The officers are very zealous, but like the men, they have had no systematic instruction of any kind. This company has a 600-yard range in poor condition. The company records show a weekly drill with fair attendance, but the instruction is not systematic and the subjects do not come in logical order according to prearranged program. There are no aiming and position drills preparatory to target practice, gallery practice being the only preparation. This company participated last August in the maneuvers at Fort Williams and did well there. The armory is a two story frame structure which was formerly the city hall, the upper part of which is used exclusively as an armory. It is heated by stove and when I visited it was thoroughly uncomfortable because of the cold. Winter weather must render it altogether uninhabitable, and I cannot see how men can attend to perform their company duties because of this fact. The lower part is open and freely admits the cold winds. It consists of a drill hall about 48 x 68 feet, two locker and store rooms, another very small store room, and an officers' room. It is too small in every respect and does not afford the proper facilities for the protection of military property. The individual lockers are altogether too small, but the company commander could utilize his space to better advantage than he is doing. Lockers are not well kept, the equipment and uniforms are not neatly and systematically arranged, and the lockers contained much dirt and dust. The floors need scraping, and that is going to be done; they are, however, inexcusably dirty. Stored property was not neatly packed, though otherwise well cared for. There is a 50-foot gallery, well used but without system.

Company H.—Physical appearance, character, and zeal of the men, excellent. They are efficient as far as they know how, and they appear to be much better instructed than the usual national guard organization; especially the officers and noncommissioned officers. The men would be absolutely reliable in case of emergency and I believe 95% could be depended upon in case of emergency. The old municipal building is used as an armory and with the improvements made with the last year answers the purpose well. It is a frame structure, well heated, lighted, and ventilated, and cleanly kept. The armory consists of a drill hall about 45 x75 feet; adequate storerooms for ordnance and quartermaster supplies; a locker room for the individual lockers of the men, and likewise one for the noncommissioned officers, and another for the officers; a company office well furnished; and toilets. I was impressed with the excellent system which prevailed in caring for the property, both that which was in the hands of the men and that which was stored. This is attributed to the ideas and energy of the company commander who so manages the company and its affairs as to elicit the enthusiasm of the townspeople, and develop a first-class military organization. The company has a good 50-foot gallery, intelligently used, and a 1000-yard range. The men (and the townspeople too) are interested in target practice.

Company I.—The physical appearance of the men was good, but they looked to be very young and of light weight. Inquiry and examination failed to show that such was true. The character of the men was excellent; but in the drill hall, which is used also as a company gymnasium, I observed in the afternoon a tendency to boisterousness during my inspection of the property, which, however, ceased at once and was superseded by an attitude of greatest respect and deference when the attention of the men was called to it. The men are very zealous, and all that they lack (this observation applies generally to the Guard) is instruction. Tell them what to do, and they make a splendid effort to do it. The officers are very intelligent men, and are leaders in the community; I found them like the men, enthusiastic but not thoroughly instructed. The efficiency of this organization is good and it would be thoroughly reliable in case of emergency, to the extent of its proficiency. Eightyfive per cent. could be depended on. The company has biweekly drills with a very good attendance and last year it participated in the maneuvers at Fort Williams, Portland Harbor. The armory, while a fair one, is much too small, and does not afford the proper facilities for the preservation of State and Federal property. It has a drill hall 40 x 60 feet, which is also used as a gymnasium and is fitted up with some apparatus; an assembly room for the men, and an officers' room; these latter two also serve the purpose of storerooms; the officers' room is

fairly well furnished as a company office. The range (600 yards) is poor, and a better one should be provided by either re-marking the present one or by purchasing a new one. The company has a 50-foot gallery but I am of the opinion that no great degree of interest is taken in target practice. Through the energy of an enthusiastic Inspector of Rifle Practice, the State is making a commendable effort to improve the ranges everywhere, and prizes are given to the various successful competitors in the numerous matches. There is need of a general campaign of education in military matters throughout the State and especially here at Eastport.

Company K.-Physical appearance, character, and zeal of the men, excellent; judging from the ceremony of and drill at inspection, and from the general appearance of the men, I would say that this company is unusually efficient for a National Guard organization. The command would prove absolutely reliable in case of emergency, and 85% could be turned out. The records of the company are fairly well kept, and show a weekly drill (there have actually been 47 for the past year) with an average attendance of 30 men. Last August, this company participated in the seacoast maneuvers at Fort Preble, as artillery reserve, and was assigned to the mortar battery. The armory occupies a frame building hired by the town for the exclusive use of the company; it is well lighted, heated, ventilated, and furnished, but it has the usual fault of being altogether too small. It consists of a drill hall 45 x 70 feet; an assembly and amusement room for the men; a company officers' room and office well furnished: a locker room for the men and a storeroom, both of which are entirely too small. The town government has just made arrangements to extend the storage facilities by adding another storeroom. The entire armory is clean and well kept; it could not be otherwise, for the men are a clean and respectable set, the best in the town and vicinity. The company has a 50-foot gallery, well used but not systematically. Aiming and position drills precede the actual target practice, and there is a fair interest shown in the matter. The range is just outside of the town and is a fair 1000-yard range. The people here are thoroughly interested in the welfare of the company; the officers are men of rare intelligence; the people and officers make this one of the best organizations in the State.

Company L.-Physical appearance, good; the men are naturally of strong physique, but lack military training; character, excellent; zeal, very good,-many of the men came a great distance through the worst storm of the season to attend inspection. They were very steady in ranks and with the exception of the poor execution of the manual, put up the best close order drill I have yet seen in this State. Considering the numerous disadvantages under which this organization labors (chief of which is an abominable so-called armory), the instruction is very good; and the men are efficient so far as they know how to be. In case of emergency, the captain is sure he could turn out 100%; I am sure of 80% only. The men would be thoroughly reliable and could be depended on to obey all orders unhesitatingly. This company's records show a weekly drill with fair attendance. The drills are devoted to gallery practice (there is a 50-foot gallery) aiming and position drills, and close order drills. This company last year acted as artillery reserves at Fort Williams, and I personally know that it performed its duty most commendably. The preliminary instruction for target practice is not thorough nor can it ever be in such an armory. The range is 600 yards and about 11 miles from town, not easily accessible. It is no good, and a new range should be acquired at the earliest opportunity. Towers. I understand, have to be built for the firing points. The men are of good physique, and I believe the physical examinations are thorough. The armory here consists of one drill hall much too small; a very small officers' room, and a very small storage room. There are no facilities for properly caring for State or Federal property. The armory occupies the upper floor of a building, the lower part of which is a stable with all the stable stenches. It is too small, unsanitary, and in a word, utterly unfit. The records of this company were not very well kept, and there is, I think, but little system of property accountability.

Company M.—The physical appearance of the men was very good, though two were very young in appearance and, I think under size. The men appear zealous and efficient, and gave a very good close order drill at which the commands were given exceptionally well. The men were very steady in ranks and the absence of evidence of inattention and lack of discipline

(such as raising the hands, gazing around, etc., points usually neglected by the guard) was very marked. The men would be reliable in case of emergency, and 75% could be turned out. Company has a good range (1000 yards) about two miles from the city by electric; the gallery range is but 30 feet, and there is no system in conducting the practice. This company has no aiming and position drills prior to actual work on range. The requirements of Section 18, Act of January 21, 1903, have been complied with so far as possible, but the company has virtually no armory in which to drill. There is a schedule of 24 drills a year, but, owing to lack of armory facilities, the men do not drill. The armory (so-called) is in a large, commodious city hall, and two damp storerooms in the basement and a large assembly room above are supposed to be set aside for the use of the company-the storerooms all the time and the hall twice a month. The truth is, the city does not pretend to consider the company's claim, and the hall has been used only twice since January 1st by the company. I accompanied the Inspector General of the State on his tour of inspection, and while we were inspecting the organization, the aldermen, occupying the room below, sent an order to the company commander to "make no noise with the rifles and do no marching." The company commander informs me that the mayor was in doubt as to whether the hall could be used tonight for the United States inspection, but finally decided it might. All this is due, in my opinion, to the armory system obtaining in this State.

# HEADQUARTERS SHIP'S COMPANY NAVAL RESERVE NATIONAL GUARD OF THE STATE OF MAINE.

PORTLAND, September 10, 1908. To the Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to respectfully submit my report on the cruise of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., August 7 to 16, inclusive.

In accordance with Special Orders No. 62, A. G. O., July 30, 1908, the officers and men of the Ship's Company reported at the armory on Friday, August 7, 1908, at 5.30 P. M., and proceeded to the E. S. S. Co. steamer which sailed for Boston, Mass., at 7 P. M., where it arrived at 6 A. M., Saturday morning. I had made arrangements for breakfast in Boston, and a special car on the 6.35 A. M. train to Newport, R. I. via the N. Y., N. H. & H. Ry., but owing to a heavy fog Friday night the steamer was late arriving at Boston and I had the car put on the 8.50 A. M. train which arrived at Newport at 12.30 noon, August 8, and we embarked at once in the boats of the U. S. S. Yankee.

The Massachusetts and Rhode Island organizations were embarking at the same time as Maine, which caused a general confusion which did not get straightened out for several days.

The ship got under way shortly after our embarking and proceeded to Gardiner's Bay, Long Island, anchoring off Plum Island light at 7 P. M. The Naval Militia officers having been assigned to watch and division duties, took up their work at once.

Sunday was devoted to the shaking down of the large complement of men and only necessary work being carried on.

Monday, August 10, the twentieth fleet got under way at 9

A. M. and after steaming to the open water of Long Island Sound, held fleet maneuvers and evolutions, the fleet returning to the anchorage at noon. The afternoon was devoted to subcalibre practice on the 3'' 50 cal. guns, and several boat crews were out for practice. Searchlight drill in the evening, the whole fleet participating.

Tuesday, August 11, the Yankee got under way at 6 A. M., and steamed out to the target grounds. A few preliminary runs were made to standardize the speed, and then commenced the record target practice for the year with the starboard battery of 3" 50 cal. guns. Each state was allowed one crew for every fifty men of the enlisted strength on July I of this year. Τ was allowed one crew against Massachusetts' twelve and Rhode Island's five while New York, on the U.S.S. Prairie, had fourteen. With hard and persistent practice all day on the Morris Tube and loading machine, the one crew representing Maine, made a record of 6.38 hits per minutue, which was beaten by New York alone, which state has a chance to carry on practice of this kind on the several ships loaned them by the Navy Department. The Maine crew was made up as follows: Boatswain's Mate Doble, Seaman L. E. Christensen, Seaman L. E. Fickett, Seaman Campbell, Seaman Hargadon, and Coxswain Wagner, all of whom deserve the highest praise for their work. The ship returned to anchorage at 7 P. M. and signal instructions were given to the quartermasters with the Ardois system, until hammocks sounded.

Wednesday was given over to Massachusetts for their Inter-Divisional boat race, while other men scrubbed clothes and carried out the routine work.

Thursday, August 13, the Inter-State race, with rowing boats, was pulled off. Here again, Maine was handicapped, having the smallest complement of men to pick the crew from. Six states participated in this race which was won by New York, with Rhode Island second and Maine third.

Friday, August 12, a sailing race was to be held, but owing to lack of wind, the race was called off. An entertainment arranged by the various organizations was thoroughly enjoyed by all during the evening.

Saturday, August 13, got under way at 4.30 A. M. and proceeded to Newport, where the various organizations were dis-----

embarked. The Maine organization left the ship at I P. M., and took the 3.05 train to Boston, and after a hasty supper, boarded the E. S. S. Co. steamer Gov. Dingley, for Portland, where we arrived in good season Sunday, and after taking care of baggage, the command was dismissed.

It seems as if the scheme of the Navy Department was to get the public interested with the hope of securing a larger appropriation from Congress for the Naval Militia. As the larger newspapers of the country had representatives on board all the week, it would seem that the Department must have gained their point. But, owing to the crowding of the ships, both officers and men being crowded for sleeping and messing quarters, the Naval Militia officers have a serious work on hand to overcome the dissatisfaction caused among the enlisted men. The food served on the U. S. S. Yankee, was in my opinion, far below the standard set by the Department with the Massachusetts and Rhode Island officers. We complained day after day about the food served the enlisted men and after each complaint we would see a small improvement for one meal, but it would go back immediately. This has had a bad effect on our organization and one that will be hard to overcome.

Captain Marsh and his officers did all possible to make the cruise a success but were handicapped by an insufficient number of officers for instructors.

# INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE CRUISE.

U. S. S. YANKEE,

HAMPTON ROADS, VA., July 18, 1908.

SIR:---I. The following memorandum is issued concerning the naval militia exercises in Gardiner's Bay, August 8, 1908.

2. The rendezvous is at Gardiner's Bay, August 8, 1908, the Yankee will be at Newport not later than August 7th, to embark the Massachusetts, Maine & Rhode Island organizations, when they will be ready to embark not later than 7 P. M. on that date.

3. The Prairie will be at 93rd Street North River to coal and embark the New York organization.

4. Officers should bring service dress, blue and white, if they have them also field glasses or binoculars if they have them, also linen and towels.

5. Men should bring white working suits as many as they have, one blue dress uniform, white hats and blue caps.

6. No equipment will be taken, neither small arms, leggings, nor any field gear. Men should bring hammocks and mattresses and blankets.

7. No food will be taken, nor any mess gear. Cooks for the galleys, one for every fifty men, and mess attendants for every three officers should be detailed, and mess men for the men's messes should be detailed for the Yankee and the Prairie, by the organizations embarked on these vessels.

8. The cost of messing Commissioned Officers will be \$1.00 per day, and for the Chief Petty Officers \$ .50 a day, the bills to be paid to the ship's Paymaster. Officers' mess bills will be paid to the mess which they are messing.

9. The vessels call letters and distinguishing pennants have been assigned as per order issued with the Fleet Regulations. General Signal Books will be issued for the exercises.

10. Gun crews and gunpointers should be selected so they can be put at once to the 3d battery, preparatory to the target practice. Morris tube apparatus is installed on the Yankee and the Prairie, which the trained crews can take up at the gun from which they are to fire.

11. It is important that the Commanding Officers of the

Yankee and the Prairie be furnished, as soon as possible with a list of the officers and men attending the exercises on these ships, these lists to give the rank of the officers and the ratings of the men, so that the station billets can be made out. The address of these ships will be Fortress Monroe, Va., until July 28th, after that the Yankee, Newport, R. I., the Prairie, care of the Postmaster, New York.

12. The program of the character of the exercises has been issued in the order referred to, but it is not practicable to give a day to day, or hour to hour program as the exercises will be made to suit the weather conditions.

I. The following rules and regulations, prepared by Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Chief of Ordnance, are hereby approved and will govern smallarms qualification practice in the National Guard of the State during the present calendar year.

Rules and Regulations Governing Small-Arms Qualification in the National Guard of the State of Maine for the Year 1908.

I. Course.—Special Course "C" will be followed. (See paragraphs 160-173, pages 99-103, Small-Arms Firing Regulations, 1906.)

2. Allowance of Ammunition .- The season issue of ammunition will be as follows: To each company of infantry, 5000 rounds of service rifle ammunition with an additional issue of 800 rounds to be made on requisition not earlier than September 1st, provided that for the preceding three months the strength of the company shall not have fallen below 50 enlisted men; to each division of the Naval Reserve, 3000 rounds of service rifle ammunition; to each officer or enlisted man required to qualify and unattached to any company or division, 100 rounds of service rifle ammunition with a contingent issue in addition of 100 rounds for further qualification upon certificate that the individual has qualified in the grade of Marksman; to each officer, and to each enlisted man to whom the revolver is issued, upon requisition, 200 rounds of service revolver ammunition. Commanding officers in making requisition for ammunition will note the amount on hand and require for quantities sufficient to bring their total up to the above allowance.

3. *Practice Season.*—The practice season will commence Monday, April 20, and end October 31.

4. Who Will Fire.—All officers and enlisted men of the National Guard will be required to qualify with the rifle, with the exception of officers of the Medical Department, the Medical Officer of the Naval Reserve, members of the Hospital Corps and members of regimental bands; provided, however, that officers of the Medical Department and the Medical Officer of the Naval Reserve may qualify with rifle or revolver, or both, and may draw ammunition therefor upon requisition.

5. Arm.—The United States Magazine Rifle, model of 1903, chambered for model of 1906 ammunition, will be used in qualification practice; provided, however, that in case of delay in issue all scores made with the Krag-Jorgensen rifle may be counted for qualification. In slow-fire the rifle will invariably be used as a single-loader. 6. *Ranges.*—Before permitting any practice, each commanding officer will make certain that the range to be used by his command is in proper condition, so that danger on this score may be eliminated. Constant care will be exercised throughout the season to see that the safety of markers is not endangered and that ricochet shots do not endanger persons or property on adjacent land. Special attention will be given in the spring and after heavy storms to see that markers' shelters have not been weakened and that rocks which might cause ricochets are not uncovered. Untrained men will never be permitted to practice unless under the immediate supervision of experienced instructors.

7. Insignia.—The prescribed insignia will be issued by the Quartermaster-General, upon requisition approved by the Chief of Ordnance, to those qualifying with rifle or revolver, or both. If desired, such requisition may be made on the first day of each month of the practice season for all who have qualified during the preceding month. Such requisition will be made on the authorized form and will be forwarded to the Quartermaster-General through the office of the Chief of Ordnance who will verify the classification.

8. *Reports.*—Commanding officers of companies and divisions will see that monthly postal returns of small-arms practice are promptly forwarded on the first of each month. They will make their annual return on or before the tenth day of November following the expiration of the practice season. Regimental commanders and the commanding officer of the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, will see that the annual return of those attached to their headquarters is likewise forwarded. Monthly postal returns and annual returns are sent direct to the Chief of Ordnance, but one copy of each being required. Correspondence relating solely to small-arms practice and not affecting intermediate headquarters may be sent direct to the Chief of Ordnance.

9. In General.—In all qualification practice firing will be conducted in accordance with the Small-Arm Firing Regulations, 1906, except as herein modified.

10. Competitions.—The rules and regulations for small-arms competitions, prepared by the National Board for the promotion of Rifle Practice, and promulgated in G. O. No. 26, War Department, Washington, Feb. 29, 1908, will govern competitions in the National Guard of this State, so far as practicable.

General Orders, No. 12.

I. The following regulations for the organization and government of the Medical Department of the National Guard of the State of Maine, are hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

II. All former regulations, orders or parts of orders pertaining to the Medical Department if inconsistent with the provisions of the following regulations are hereby repealed.

I.

## THE MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

I. The Medical Department of the National Guard of this State shall consist of a Surgeon General with the rank of Colonel, who shall also be an officer of that rank upon the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief; two Surgeons with the rank of Major; two Assistant Surgeons with the rank of Captain; two Assistant Surgeons with the rank of First Lieutenant; such other medical officers as future changes in the organization of the Guard may require; and the Hospital Corps. Contract Surgeons, not constituting a part of the National Guard and not uniformed and equipped as such, may be appointed in the manner hereinafter set forth.

2. Hereafter officers of the Medical Department, other than the Surgeon General, shall be selected by the Commander-in-Chief upon the recommendation of the Surgeon General. Each person so selected must pass a satisfactory professional examination before a board of three officers of the Medical Department, before whom he must produce evidence showing that he is at the time of examination a legally qualified and actual practitioner of medicine and surgery in this State. Upon a satisfactory report from the board to the effect that the candidate is found professionally, morally, and otherwise fitted to perform the duties of the office, he will then be commissioned. The commissions of all officers in the Medical Department shall be subject to the same provisions as govern other commissions in the National Guard of this State.

3. Members of the Hospital Corps will be enlisted for and permanently attached to the Medical Department.

4. All non-commissioned officers of the Hospital Corps will be selected by the Surgeon Ceneral and warranted by him after they shall have passed a thorough examination before a commissioned officer of the Medical Department in such subjects and in such manner as may be hereafter prescribed by the Surgeon General. The report of the examination will be sent direct to the Surgeon General, who will, if the examination was satisfactory, furnish the appointee with a warrant and notify the Adjutant Ceneral of that fact. Vacancies in the various non-commissioned grades of the Hospital Corps will be filled, if practicable, by promoting members of the Corps who may be recommended as competent and qualified by the medical officer commanding the detachment in which the vacancy occurs.

5. Non-commissioned officers and privates first class may be re-enlisted in their respective grades and their warrants and appointments continued in force, provided the re-enlistment takes place on the day following the discharge: and each re-enlistment and continuance will be noted on the warrant or appointment by the enlisting officer. Enlistments and re-enlistments will, when practicable, be made by a medical officer: otherwise, by any commissioned officer, upon the authority of the Surgeon General.

6. Members of the Hospital Corps will not be required to perform any military duties other than those pertaining to their Corps; but they will be instructed by medical officers in such drills as are necessary for their efficiency, and in the duties of litter bearers, in the methods of rendering first aid to the sick and wounded, and in the various matters pertaining to the sanitary soldier. They will not be required to attend ceremonies except when directed by proper authority.

7. Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons and members of the Hospital Corps will continue to serve with the regiments to which they are at present assigned; but hereafter the assignments to service with the different regiments, or to other duty, will be made upon the recommendation of the Surgeon General.

### II.

### PROPERTY ACCOUNTABILITY THEREIN.

8. The Surgeon General, under the direction of the Commander-in-Chief, has supervision of all matters pertaining to the Medical Department and Hospital Corps, and as such is responsible, within the scope of his authority, for their equipment, discipline, efficiency, and instruction. He shall immediately be furnished an inventory of the medical supplies and equipment on hand in the State store-houses at Augusta, and true copies of the next semi-annual return of such property in the hands of the Hospital Corps. And he shall, at the time of making his semi-annual return, inform the Adjutant General by letter of the medical supplies and equipment needed for the use of the entire Guard. He shall be accountable for all medical supplies, equipment, and other military property purchased by him, or issued or invoiced on his requisition or with his approval to any member of the Medical Department or Hospital Corps, and shall receipt for the same; and on the 31st day of May and the 30th day of November of each year, and at such other times as may be prescribed, he shall make annual returns of all property so purchased or receipted for, to the office of the Adjutant General.

9. All commissioned officers of the Medical Department shall make timely requisitions of the Surgeon General for all necessary medical supplies, equipment, and military property required by them, or by the detachments or enlisted men of the Hospital Corps commanded by them; and the Surgeon General shall mark opposite each item of the requisition "approved" or "disapproved," in the latter case giving his reasons therefor, and forward the same to the Adjutant General for issue or final disposition.

10. The Adjutant General shall, upon filling any requisition, forward the supplies, equipment, and property, direct to the officer requiring the same, together with memorandum receipts to be signed by the receiving officer in triplicate, one of which will be retained by him and the other two returned to the Adjutant General, who, upon receipt thereof, will prepare and forward to the Surgeon General duplicate invoices and receipts accompanied by one of the memorandum receipts. The invoices (which will be used as vouchers to the semi-annual return) and the memorandum receipt will be retained by the Surgeon Ceneral, who will return the receipts signed in duplicate to the Adjutant General. Receiving officers will in all cases be responsible for the proper care and protection of the supplies, equipment, and property; and upon losing, destroying, or otherwise disposing of the same they will be charged with or relieved from the responsibility, and the Surgeon General will be authorized to drop the articles so lost, destroyed, or disposed of, from his return. In case any medical supplies, equipment, or property, be transferred under property authority from one officer to another of the Medical Department, or to another not of the Medical Department, the

Surgeon General shall be furnished in the former case with a copy of the authority for the transfer, and in the latter case with receipts signed in duplicate as vouchers to his return.

II. In all cases arising in and concerning the Medical Department of the National Guard not covered by State laws, regulations, or orders, the laws, written and unwritten, regulations and manual for the Medical Department, of the United States Army, will govern so far as they may be applicable.

## III.

### FHYSICAL EXAMINATION OF APPLICANT FOR ENLISTMENT.

12. In view of the fact that the adoption of the standard of physical examination for enlistment and re-enlistment of the organized militia, prescribed by the Secretary of War, renders the National Guard of this State "fit for military service" within the meaning of Section 7, of the United States Militia Act of 1903, and exempts it from physical examination before being mustered into the United States service, all medical officers and contract surgeons will conduct the physical examination of applicants for enlistment with great care and in strict accordance with the following requirements and instructions which have already been prescribed by the Secretary of War, and such others as may be hereafter prescribed by the same authority:

I. Less height than five feet four inches should reject. (Height taken in stocking feet.)

2. A chest measurement less than thirty-two inches at the termination of normal expiration should reject. (Chest measurement taken in undershirt.)

3. A difference between expiration and inspiration of less than two inches should reject.

4. Weight less than 125 pounds and greater than 190 pounds, infantry and artillery, and greater than 165, cavalry and light artillery, should reject.

It is not expected that a literal construction will be made of the requirements regulating the weight of recruits. An applicant who is muscular and vigorous, and in whom adiposity is not a noticeable feature, may be a suitable recruit if he be of little less weight than 125 pounds. On the other hand, an applicant who may comply fully with the requirements in this respect is illy fitted for service if general adiposis be a physical characteristic. A recruit of greater weight than 190 pounds may be in every way qualified for the service, and whether he be or be not thus qualified will depend much more on his height, chest, and abdominal circumference as compared with his weight than on the mere fact of weight alone. It is proper to say, however, that even under these circumstances a definite rational limit must be established for the guidance and support of those medical officers who by reason of inexperience and from importunity may recommend for the service those who are obviously unfitted for it.

5. All able-bodied male citizens of the United States and able-bodied males of foreign birth who have declared their intention to become citizens, who are more than 18 and less than 45 years of age, and who are residents of this State, shall, subject to the examination prescribed in these regulations, be eligible for enlistment in the National Guard of this State.

6. The loss of the sight of an eye should reject. Permanent defects of one or both eyes which impair the vision for proper marksmanship, sentry duty, etc., should reject. Not only this, but also severe trachoma, entropion, extensive corneal opacities, cataract, inordinate strabismus and anystagmus, should reject, if unrelieved at the time of final examination. However, any defect in vision that can be corrected need not reject. For duty in the Signal Corps, colorblindness should always reject.

7. A degree of deafness that may prevent the proper reception of the countersign should reject.

In making the examination for this degree of deafness it is well to remember that transient and remedial causes, such as closure of the eustachian tube, cerumenous collections, polypi, etc., may temporarily seriously impair the hearing of the recruit. However, the previous history, together with a critical physical examination, will soon disclose the true nature of the trouble.

8. Defective articulation, that may prevent giving proper alarm and the countersign, should reject.

This condition may be caused by congenital and acquired deformities of the soft and hard parts that are necessary for proper speech. Hare-lip, fissure, and perforation of the hard palate, mutilation, and diseases of the tongue, etc., are among the most pronounced of the illustrations of these defects. However, they need not reject when their bad effects on the speech have been remedied by reliable mechanical or surgical expedients.

9. Chronic rheumatism should reject.

Any history or evidence of this disease should cause final rejection, and the medical officer's attention is especially directed to ascertaining if the applicant has suffered at any time from this affliction.

10. Repeated attacks of acute articular rheumatism should reject.

The best interests of the applicant demand his rejection if he has ever had an attack of this disease, especially if an hereditary influence be present, or if the attack has followed the exposure recognized as causing rheumatism.

11. Repeated attacks of sciatica.

This affliction should reject if it be associated with a suspicion of rheumatic or grouty diathesis, or has been due to exposure. If from other causes, amenable to medical treatment, and not protracted nor of recent occurrence, it need not cause immediate rejection.

12. Chronic bronchitis.

General chronic bronchitis should reject. Chronic bronchitis, complicated with asthma or emphysema, should reject. Chronic bronchitis, attended with feeble respiratory murmur; with a markedly increased expectoration after exposure to cold; with a severe cough after unusual exercise, or with cough and profuse expectoration on arising, should reject. Chronic bronchitis, with evidence of lung consolidation, should reject.

13. Repeated attacks of pleurisy should reject.

Repeated attacks of this disease, of whatever form should cause rejection, especially if the chest has become deformed or crippled in its movements, or if severe pain located there follows continued active effort. Hydrothorax and empyema, past or present, should reject.

14. Emphysema.

If complicated with asthma, with chronic bronchitis, or with well-marked chest deformities, it should reject. Asthma due to inordinate use of the lungs only, need not reject, except it be attended with unusual shortness of breath with moderate exercise.

15. Asthma.

Asthma should cause rejection when complicated with chronic bronchitis, with emphysema, or with suspected heart disease. Asthma due to individual susceptibility to various things, as feathers, ipecac, etc., etc., need not reject.

16. Chronic laryngitis.

Persistent chronic laryngitis should reject, especially when attended with a severe hoarseness or aphonia. The presence of laryngeal symptoms without other assignable causes, should suggest the possibility of aneurism, tuberculosis, or syphilis.

17. Tuberculosis.

Any evidence of this disease in the lungs, joints, or other important portions of the body, should reject. Moderately enlarged lymphatic glands need not reject except they be increasing in number and size. All abnormal increase in temperature, with suspected tuberculous disease of any tissue of the body should reject.

18. Disease of bone.

Caries, necrosis, and other diseases of the bone causing pain, or attended with conditions requiring special attention to cleanliness, should reject.

19. Bright's disease should reject.

It is proper to say, however, that the fact of the presence of albumen and casts in the urine, as shown by a single examination, should not be deemed conclusive. If, however, albumen and casts be found after repeated examinations, the applicant should be rejected.

20. Aneurism.

That this disease of the large vessels should reject, is selfevident. The attention of the examiner should be carefully directed to the large vessels of the chest and abdomen of each recruit, to avoid the enlistment of one thus afflicted. Aneurismalvarix, varicose-aneurism, large and exposed aneurism by anastomosis, also prominent or increasing cirsoid aneurism, should reject. Small and nonprogressive cirsoid, and a similar aneurism by anastomosis, need not reject.

21. Valvular disease of the heart.

This should cause rejection if either hypertrophy or dilatation be present. It should reject if the efforts incident to the requirements of a soldier cause unusual shortness of breath, or unusual heart action, or if heretofore, the applicaut has suffered at times from undue shortness of breath, after exercise. If the assignable cause for the lesion refer back to a remote period, and no secondary consequent evidence of disease be present, this condition need not reject.

22. Persistently painful and prolapsed hemorrhoids should reject.

No applicant should be accepted who suffers from this form of affliction. Nor should one be accepted who has chronic prolapse of any portion of the rectal structure, or acute prolapse of the same after active exercise, or with diarrhœa or other intestinal derangement.

23. Fistular-in-ano should reject.

24. Hernia, of whatever variety and where located, should reject.

25. Hydrocele.

A large hydrocele of any variety should cause temporary rejection. If amenable to palliative treatment, it need not finally reject.

26. Gastralgia with indigestion and emaciation should reject.

These manifestations of disease should reject, as they are quite surely dependent on organic disease, and at the best are inconsistent with the physical status of a soldier.

27. Hemoptysis.

This should reject if it be associated with symptoms of lung or heart disease or aneurism. Repeated attacks should reject, even though they be due to no directly assignable cause. The history of a recent attack should cause the suspension of judgment to a later period.

28. Hematemesis.

This symptom should reject, when associated with others indicative of disease of the stomach, liver, heart, or other important organs of the abdominal or thoracic cavities. If the attacks have been recent and the cause obscure, a second application should be advised at a somewhat remote period. It will not be amiss to inquire if blood has been swallowed from any cause prior to the act of blood vomiting.

29. Hematuria.

This symptom of disease should reject, especially if of recent date and of repeated occurrence. It should not be confounded, however, with loss of blood from injury of the urethra. An affirmative reply to a careful interrogation as to previous bladder and kidney manifestations of disease will almost certainly justify the rejection of the applicant.

30. Cystitis should reject.

This disease, of whatever form, ought always to reject. It is due the applicant, however, to be told that he may again present himself, whenever a cure shall have been accomplished; this course may save him much subsequent suffering.

31. Persistent jaundice.

While it is true that marked and prolonged jaundice is sometimes associated with gastro-duodenitis and certain other conditions amenable to treatment, still no applicant who is suffering from this symptom should be recruited, except after the fullest assurance that its existence does not depend on permanent structural changes.

32. Hydroperitoneum should reject.

This condition should reject in all cases. If a doubt exist regarding its presence, the attention of the examining officer should be carefully directed to the condition of the liver, heart, kidneys, and lymphatic glands, with a view of determining whether or not it may not be present as a complication in disease of these organs.

33. Varicose veins.

Varicose veins and other ulcers of the extremities which are amenable to palliative treatment should cause the suspension of judgment to a later period.

34. Epilepsy should reject.

An applicant with a history of convulsions or "fits" of any kind should be rejected. 35. Mental aberration.

Any manifestations suggesting the belief of present or prospective disease of the mind should reject.

36. Dislocations, spontaneous.

A recent dislocation of this kind should reject, except it be of a joint, the modification of the functions of which will not incapacitate the soldier for duty.

37. Previous injuries, results of.

These should reject when of such a nature and so located as to impair the fitness of the applicant for the requirements of a soldier.

38. Appendicitis.

Repeated attacks of this disease should reject. If but a single attack has occurred and there be any evidence of disease remaining on physical examination, or occasional pains be experienced suggestive of latent trouble, the applicant. should be rejected.

39. Œdema of extremities.

The presence of ædema of the extremities, if of long standing, should reject. If recent and due to organic disease or irremediable obstruction of vessels it should reject. If it has occurred or be present without assignable cause the applicant should be rejected.

40. Headache.

Severe headache, persistent or recurring, when caused by exposure to the contingencies incident to the requirements of a soldier, or due to rheumatism, gout, or venereal disease, should reject.

41. Constipation.

Constipation need not reject, except it be attended with a history of intestinal obstruction.

42. Flat-foot.

Flat-foot should be cause of rejection when of marked degree.

43. Hallux valgus.

This deformity of the great toe, when extreme, or when complicated with painful bunion, should reject.

44. Joint function.

The permanent impairment, from whatever cause, of the functions of a joint or joints essential to the proper performance of the requirements of a soldier, should reject. A limp with walking should reject. Movable bodies in important joints should reject.

45. Loss of Digits.

The loss of the thumb or any two fingers of a hand should reject. A mutilation of the digits or carpus that seriously impairs them for the required purposes of a soldier, should reject. The loss of a great toe should reject. 46. Glycosuria.

The continued presence of sugar in the urine should reject. However, it may be present from time to time in varying amounts as the result of remedial causes, therefore the examiner should exercise a wise discretion in the rejection of applicants for this cause.

47. Chronic diarrhœa and chronic dysentery should reject.

The applicant with a history of having had either of these diseases should be rejected.

48. Dypsomania.

Drunkenness, slovenliness, and depravity. Each of these should reject.

49. Vertigo.

Severe vertigo at regular intervals, and transient irremediable attacks of vertigo should reject.

50. Modification of motion and sensation.

Any interruption or continuous modification of the function of motion or sensation which may unfit one for the requirements of a soldier should reject.

These modifications refer to general and local deviation from the normal of the muscular and nervous systems, including especially chorea, and various paralysis of motion and sensation.

51. Cicatrices.

An irritable cicatrix, or a large and adherent one, should reject, especially when liable to pressure and to blows by reason of its exposed position.

52. Dyspnœa.

Unusual shortness of breath with moderate exercise should suggest the possibility of organic disease. In a degree this may be the result of sedentary habits, and of unusual fleshiness: such causes are remediable with proper training. Dyspnœa should cause rejection when due to organic disease and other irremediable causes.

53. Contagious disease.

No applicant should be accepted, nor soldier allowed to associate with comrades, who is suffering from any disease that may be communicated to another by means of agents, requirements, or associations common to those who are engaged in military service.

54. Modifications of urination.

No applicant should be accepted who experiences difficulty in voiding or holding the urine, or who has frequent calls of micturition. The examiner can judge somewhat of the prominence of this infirmity by the odor and discoloration of the clothes. 55. Deformity of lower limbs.

Extreme knock-knee and bowlegs should reject. Both are objectionable for obvious reasons; the former principally from the fact that inordinate chafing is of common occurrence in such cases.

56. Disfigurements, deformities, etc.

Any disfigurement or deformity constituting a wellmarked blemish of soldierly appearance, or local disease or deep or superficial character requiring constant attention to cleanliness should reject.

57. There are numerous conditions and discases not mentioned in the foregoing, which should reject at once; medical officers will act on the line of inquiry designated in a discrete and intelligent manner.

III. It will happen not infrequently that a man with a physical defect who has done excellent service will desire to re-enlist. If it should appear that the defect alone be the only disqualifying element and it be of such a nature as to offer no serious obstacle to the fulfillment of the requirements of a soldier he may be re-enlisted, provided that "in all such cases the defects, and the fact that they have existed prior to re-enlistment, will be noted on the soldier's medical examination paper."

IV. Men enlisting as musicians may be passed by medical officers, although they may not in height, chest measure, and weight come up to the standard, provided that such deviation be but slight and it is apparent that it will be diminished in a reasonably short time; and provided, further, that the men are in all other respects up to the standard and perfectly sound.

13. On and after the 1st day of July, 1908, the physical examination of applicants for enlistment into the organizations located at those places where, in the opinion of the Adjutant General, it is impracticable to obtain the services of a commissioned officer of the Medical Department will be conducted at each of such places by a professionally qualified resident physician who, upon the recommendation of the Surgeon General and upon agreement by the said physician honestly and faithfully to make such professional examination at the rate of pay for each applicant as now provided, and in the manner above described, may be given an appointment by the Commander-in-Chief, revocable at his pleasure, as Contract Surgeon of the National Guard of the State of Maine.

14. At the earliest convenience after notification by the recruiting officer, the resident Contract Surgeon or commissioned medical officer, will proceed to examine, thoroughly and in accordance with the above regulations and instructions and such others as may be hereafter prescribed, the applicants for enlistment reporting to him.

15. When ten enlistments shall have been made in any one organization, the physical examinations for which were conducted by a Contract Surgeon, the Adjutant General will order the commissioned medical officer whose services are most easily available to proceed to the place where such organization is located, and at the most convenient time make such inspection of the men so enlisted and investigation of the methods of conducting the examinations as will satisfy him that the examination in each case has or has not been thoroughly made and in strict conformity with these instructions and regulations. This information will be obtained from consultation with the examination of the men so enlisted, and by reference to the physical examination papers, which will be furnished him by the Adjutant General.

16. The commissioned medical officer making the inspection will, immediately upon the completion thereof, report through the Surgeon General to the Adjutant General the result of the inspection, as having found the examination in each case to have been thorough, or otherwise; and if the latter, he will specify wherein the examination was deficient and recommend what disposition should be made of the man enlisted upon such defective examination.

## AUGUSTA, June 3, 1908.

I. Subject to the approval of the Secretary of War, a camp of instruction will be held at the State Camp Ground in Augusta, from June 25th to July 3rd, inclusive, in which all company officers and those hereinafter ordered will participate. They will report without further orders to Captain S. T. Ansell, U. S. Army, at ten o'clock on the morning of the 25th instant, for such duty and instruction as he may prescribe.

II. Under the provision of Section 14, act of January 21, 1903, such officers and enlisted men of the organized militia as shall engage in actual camp service for instruction shall, while actually so engaged, be entitled to the same pay, subsistence and transportation or travel allowances as officers and enlisted men of corresponding grades of the Regular Army. The officers hereby ordered will furnish their own transportation and will receive seven cents per mile for the travel necessarily involved in going to and returning from the camp of instruction over the usual travelled route, and regular army pay for the number of days actually engaged in camp. Vouchers therefor will be submitted to, and in accordancee with instructions from, the Paymaster

General of the State. Officers are not entitled to subsistence; mess arrangements will be provided for as hereinafter set out.

III. The following is the programme of duties and instruction: *June 25:* Pitching tents and settling camp. One wall tent will be supplied to each field officer and captain and one for every two lieutenants. Captains and lieutenants will be required to pitch their own tents; for this purpose they will be organized and formed, at 10.30 A. M. on the 25th instant, into a company, divided into squads, and they will proceed to pitch the tents of all officers.

July 3rd. Camp struck at ten o'clock, A. M., and the officers will proceed to their homes.

VI. The school hours will be devoted exclusively to oral recitations by individual officers. Owing to the little time available in camp for the purpose, officers should begin at once carefully to prepare themselves upon the subjects mentioned above. Recitations will be marked upon a scale of 3.0, and a written report made, of the proficiency and thoroughness of preparation exhibited by each officer, to this office and to the regimental commanders.

VII. Each regimental commander will, after consultation with the Military Instructor, recommend to this office a major to attend this camp of instruction.

VIII. Captain Blaine Owen, Commissary, 2nd Infantry, is hereby ordered to participate in the camp of instruction; he will, in addition to his other duties, act as camp commissary and mess officer, and will make the necessary preparations therefor. All officers will be required to subsist at the officers mess, and each will, on the morning of the 25th instant, deposit with the camp commissary the sum of seven dollars.

IX. The Surgeon General will at once recommend to this office a surgeon or assistant surgeon, who will be ordered to attend the camp and perform the usual duties.

X. The musicians of Companies A, H, and M, 2nd Infantry, will be sent, in heavy marching order and field equipment, by their respective company commanders and ordered to report to Captain Blaine Owen, Commissary, at ten o'clock A. M., on the 25th instant. Transportation will be furnished from this office, and the camp commissary will arrange for their subsistence.

XI. The uniform for all duty will be: campaign hats, flannel shirts, service breeches, and leggins.

XII. Each officer will bring with him:

- 1 pair leggins,
- I flannel shirt
- 2 pair shoes, underclothing,

socks,

toilet articles,

Arms (excepting surgeons)-

Equipment— I cartridge belt with pocket and suspender, I canteen, I haversack, I meat can, I tin cup, I knife, I fork, I spoon, I shelter half, poles and pins, Bedding— I quilt, I blanket, I pillow, bed linen.

XIII. During the four hours drill each day the officers will be in ranks equipped with a rifle, belt, and bayonet. Beginning with the third day of instruction, the captains will be selected as instructors, and they will take turns in drilling the command. The object is to give each officer an opportunity to learn with thoroughness the rudiments of his duties, so that he may become a competent and accurate instructor of his men.

XIV. The Military Instructor has observed a tendency among the officers to substitute their own ideas for the prescribed regulations. Whether this proceeds from lack of familiarity with the regulations or from a desire to improve upon them, it must cease: and all officers will be required to conform strictly in all respects to the prescribed methods.

XV. Any officer herein ordered finding it impracticable to attend, will submit to this office as soon as the fact becomes apparent, through the usual channels, an application for permission to remain absent, giving the reasons which interfere with his attendance.

IV. Competitors may withdraw at the conclusion of any stage of the match and will be excused by the Executive Officer, but no competitor will be ruled out unless the maximum of his remaining scores would be insufficient to give him a place among the first twelve competitors.

V. The twelve competitors making the highest aggregate scores for the two days of the try-out, together with three officers or men to be named by the Chief of Ordnance, will constitute the State Rifle Team for 1908 and from these fifteen the twelve to fire in the National Team Match for 1908 will be selected by the Chief of Ordnance after preliminary practice at Camp Perry, Ohio.

VI. Special rifles will be issued to the team for practice and for use in the National Team Match, such rifles to be returned to the State storehouse by the Chief of Ordnanc at the conclusion of the Ohio tour of duty. Ammunition for practice will be issued direct to team members and practice will be conducted in accordance with the suggestions of the Chief of Ordnance.

VII. The Chief of Ordnance will seasonably inform this office in regard to detail of range officers and statistical officers, employment of civilian laborers and other matters necessary to the proper conduct of the try-out.

I. The following communication from the Chief of Militia Affairs is published for the information of all concerned:

# "WAR DEPARTMENT,

Division of Militia Affairs.

WASHINGTON, September 15, 1908.

The Adjutant General,

State of Maine,

Augusta.

Sir:—It having been brought to the attention of the Department, through reports of Army officers, that many of the enlisted men of the Organized Militia who have been in attendance at recent field maneuvers and exercises were without adequate preliminary instruction in the "School of the Soldier" and other elementary parts of the instruction of the recruit, and that, in some instances, enlisted men were carried on company rolls who had never appeared in military formation before reaching camp, I am directed by the Assistant Secretary of War to call general attention to this matter and to express the view of the Department, that it is considered profitless and an unnecessary expense to the State and to the United States to have men participate in coast defense exercises or other field maneuvers or exercises who have not received some previous instruction in the home armories in the "School of the Soldier," "Small-Arms Firing Regulations" and "Manual of Guard Duty."

So important is this regarded that the Department will not hereafter approve the muster and payment of enlisted men of the Organized Militia from United States funds who have not been *bona fide* members of the organizations for at least six months prior to the date of the commencement of the joint field maneuvers or exercises, or have not had equivalent service in the Army, Marine Corps or organized militia of the United States, and who have not been reasonably well instructed in the "School of the Soldier," "Small-Arms Firing Regulations" and "Manual of Guard Duty."

It is considered that no recruit is fitted to appear in the formation of any company, troop or battery, or is available for active duty in the field under Section 14 of the Act of January 21, 1903, who has not received instruction to include at least the following:---

Drill Regulations, United States Army, edition of 1904,-

Paragraphs 30 to 37, inclusive;

Paragraphs 39 to 79, inclusive; Paragraphs 94 to 157, inclusive. Small-Arms Firing Regulations,-

Paragraphs 1 to 56, inclusive;

Manual of Guard Duty,-

Paragraphs 194 to 369, inclusive;

Paragraphs 282 to 368, inclusive;

Paragraphs 372 to 376, inclusive.

In accordance with the foregoing, the following amendment to paragraph 185, Regulations of the War Department Governing the Organized Militia, is announced for the information and guidance of all concerned:

185. Hereafter when any portion of the organized militia of any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia participates in the encampment, maneuvers, and field instruction of any part of the Regular Army, under the provisions of section 15 of the act of January 21, 1903, they may, after being duly mustered by an officer of the Regular Army, be paid at any time after such muster for the period from the date of leaving the home rendezvous to date of return thereof as determined in advance, both dates inclusive, and such payments, if otherwise correct, shall pass to the credit of the paymaster making the same.

### Amendment.

The officer of the Regular Army who makes the muster prescribed herein will, in connection therewith, make a careful inspection of the personnel and report specifically as to whether the troops are, by training, discipline, armament, uniform and equipment, prepared for active duty in the field, and, if not, in what respects they are deficient. The muster rolls will have entered opposite the name of each enlisted man the date of his enlistment, and no enlisted man will be mustered for pay who has not been a *bona fide* member of the organization for at least six months prior to the date of the encampment, maneuvers or exercises, or has not had equivalent service in the Army, Marine Corps or organized militia of the United States, and who has not received the elementary instruction of recruits prescribed as requisite by the War Department.

The muster and inspection prescribed herein will be made as near as practicable at the close of the joint encampment, maneuvers or exercises and at a time that will interfere as little as possible with the execution of the program of instruction.

This will be published at an early date as a Division Circular.

Distances and Order of Fire.—200 and 500 yards, slow-fire; two sighting and seven shots for record at each range.

Prizes.—To the team making the highest aggregate, the regimental team championship and \$50; to the second team, \$25; to the third team, \$15; to the fourth team, \$10; to the individual making the highest aggregate, \$10; to the individual making the second highest aggregate, \$8; to the next, \$5: to the next two, \$4 each; to the next three, \$3 each; and to the next five, \$2 each.

#### SECOND INFANTRY TEAM MATCH.

To be shot Thursday, October 15, on the State range at Augusta, commencing at 10.00 A. M.

Conditions, prizes, etc., same as for First Infantry Team Match, with the following additional prizes: To the team making the highest aggregate, the Colonel Newcomb trophy; to the first battalion team making the highest aggregate, the Major Presson trophy; these trophies to become the property of the company or headquarters winning either of them three times, not necessarily in succession.

## INTER-REGIMENTAL MATCH.

To be shot Friday, October 16, on the State range at Augusta, commencing at 8.30 A. M.

Open to a team of ten officers and men from each regiment of infantry, such teams to be selected immediately after the conclusion of the Regimental Team matches on October 15th, by team captains designated by the regimental commanders. The captain of the First Infantry team will make requisition for block transportation (Brunswick to Augusta) for himself and ten principals and one alternate (twelve in all) and will proceed to Augusta with his team at the conclusion of the First Infantry Team Match.

Distances and Order of Fire.—Two sighting and ten shots for record at 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards, slow-ire; each team to have three targets at each range.

Prizes.—To the team making the highest aggregate score, the Inter-Regimental championship and a silver medal to each member of the team, to the commissioned officer making the highest aggregate, the General Mitchell medal, presented by Brigadier-General Henry L. Mitchell (retired), such medal to be held for one year.

II. National Rifle Association of America Medals.—At the conclusion of the Regimental Team matches at Brunswick and Augusta the 300yard ranges will be opened and those desiring may compete for the medals presented by the National Rifle Association of America. Two sighting and five counting shots will be fired and these five counting shots taken with the first five counting shots at 200 and 500 yards in the matches will make the aggregate for deciding the winner.

III. The Chief of Ordnance will be the Executive Officer for the competitions herein ordered, with authority to detail the Assistant Chief of Ordnance as Executive Officer for one of the Regimental Team Matches. Colonel Charles Collins, Commanding First Infantry, will be honorary range officer for the First Infantry Team Match. Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, commanding Second Infantry, will be honorary range officer for the Second Infantry Team Match. The Executive Officer will report to this office at the earliest practicable moment the names of such officers and men as he may deem necessary for the conduct of the matches.

IV. Subsistence will be furnished at the ranges. Second Infantry teams which cannot leave their home stations on the day of the match in time to reach the range at the designated hour, will proceed to Augusta the day preceding where quarters and subsistence will be furnished at the range.

I. The following conditions must be fulfilled to enable a State or Territory to avail itself of the allotment of the annual appropriation made by Section 1661, Revised Statutes, as amended by Act of May 27, 1908:

"Unless excused by the governor of the State or Territory, each company, troop, and battery of the organized militia must have had in the year next preceding the annual allotment, practice marches for five consecutive days, or a camp of instruction for five consecutive days, or a combination of these two for five consecutive days. Each company, troop, and battery must have assembled, during the year next preceding the annual allotment, for drill and instruction at company, battalion, or regimental armories or rendezvous or for target practice, not less than twenty-four times. Each company, troop, and battery must have been inspected during such preceding year by an officer of the Regular Army or of the organized militia."

II. Realizing that members of the National Guard receive but slight compensation for the service rendered and desiring to add to the efficiency of the several military organizations in the State by an increased attendance at all drills and regularly ordered inspection, on and after January 1, 1909, compensation will be allowed to all members of the National Guard for attending two drills per month or twenty-four drills per annum and all regularly ordered inspections, provided that at least two-thirds of the strength of the organization shall be paraded at each assembly for any class of exercises. The following compensation will be allowed, viz:

Captain	\$1.00 per drill
First Lieutenant	.80 per drill
Second Lieutenant	.60 per drill
First Sergeant	.50 per drill
Sergeant	.45 per drill
Corporal	.35 per drill
Private	.25 per drill

III. Pay rolls will be prepared semi-annually on the 30th day of June and the 31st day of December, in accordance with instructions and forms to be prepared and issued from this office.

I. The death on this date at Biddeford, Maine, of Brigadier General Lucius H. Kendall, retired, is hereby announced to the National Guard.

II. General Kendall was born in Biddeford in 1853. He entered the service of the State on April 26, 1876, by enlisting in Company G, First regiment of Infantry, commissioned Second Lieutenant of that organization August 28, 1876, promoted to First Lieutenant May 27, 1880, and to Captain December 31st of the same year. He resigned the command of Company G on February 20, 1884, to accept the appointment of Major and Commissary on the Staff of General Chamberlain then in command of the First Division Maine Militia. He was again commissioned Captain of Company G, First Infantry, August 17, 1885, and was promoted to Colonel, First Infantry, August 5, 1889, and remained in that position until his retirement with rank of Brigadier General in 1907.

During the Spanish War he commanded the First Regiment Infantry Maine Volunteers and for a time was in command of the Third Brigade, Second Division, Third Corps at Camp George H. Thomas, Chicamauga Park, Georgia. Serving continuously for thirty-one years, in the National Guard he was one of the best known and most respected military men in the State. His sterling qualities and uniform kindness and courtesy endeared him to officers and men alike; to his untiring energy and devotion to the service is largely due the high state of efficiency attained by the First Regiment and his influence is felt throughout the entire Guard.

III. In recognition of the long and faithful service rendered by General Kendall it is hereby ordered that the flags on all armories be displayed at half mast on the day designated for his funeral; the regimental colors will be draped and the prescribed badge of mourning will be worn by all officers of the National Guard for thirty days.

Before a Court of Inquiry as provided by Section 114, Militia Laws of Maine, which convened at the armory in the city of Portland, State of Maine, on Tuesday, September 22, 1908, pursuant to Special Orders No. 67, A. G. O., August 17, 1908, and Special Orders No. 69, A. G. O., August 25, 1908, and of which Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, National Guard of the State of Maine, was president and Colonel William B. Skelton, Judge Advocate General, recording officer, for the purpose of inquiring into and investigating as to the efficiency, conduct and military standing of Company E, First Infantry, National Guard of the State of Maine, with instructions to report the result of the investigation with recommendations.

Most careful and thorough investigation was made as directed by Special Orders enumerated above.

#### "FINDINGS.

After mature consideration of all the evidence in the case the Court of Inquiry by a majority vote made the following findings and recommendations and thereupon summoned the Recorder before them and announced the same for record and report, to wit:

I. This Court of Inquiry finds that a considerable portion of Company E, First Infantry, National Guard of the State of Maine, at Camp Cobb, Augusta, Maine, on the 3rd and 4th days of August, 1908, was guilty of a gross breach of discipline.

II. That the officers of said company did not or could not control said company at that time.

III. That the officers of said company have made no serious attempt to locate or identify the guilty persons.

IV. That all of the officers and men of said company who have been before this Court have undertaken to shield the guilty persons and to mislead this Court by their testimony as to what actually occurred at said Camp Cobb on said days.

V. That the conduct of said organization as disclosed by the evidence recorded by this Court and by the attitude and disposition of its officers and men before this Court is prejudicial to the good order and discipline of the National Guard of the State of Maine.

### RECOMMENDATIONS.

Wherefore this Court of Inquiry recommend that Company E, First Infantry, National Guard of the State of Maine, be disbanded.

Colonel Charles Collins, First Infantry, and Major Frank B. W. Welch, First Infantry, dissented from said findings and recommendations and asked that their dissent be made a matter of record."

The record of the Court, embracing the evidence, findings and recommendations having been forwarded for the action of the Commanderin-Chief the following are his orders thereon:

In the foregoing case of Company E, First Infantry, National Guard of the State of Maine, the recommendations of the majority of the Court of Inquiry are confirmed and the Adjutant General will issue such orders as may be necessary to carry out the recommendations of the Court of Inquiry.

First Lieutenant John J. Maloney, Second Lieutenant Bartley A. Flaherty, and the enlisted men of the company are hereby honorably discharged from the service of the State. The Commanding Officer of Company E will at once fill out discharge papers for each enlisted man under his command and forward them to this office.

II. Captain James D. Regan will at once transfer and forward by freight to the Quartermaster General at Augusta, Maine, all military property in his possession, making duplicate invoices for the same.

I. The attention of commanding officers is called to the requirements of General Orders No. 28, A. G. O., September 24, 1908.

The annual inspections by United States and State officers are soon to be made and it is regarded of the utmost importance that strenuous efforts should at once be made to recruit all military organizations of the National Guard to the required standard. Officers of the Regular Army who may be designated to make the muster prescribed by law have been instructed to make a careful inspection of the personnel and report specifically as to whether the troops are by training, discipline, armament, uniform and equipment prepared for active duty in the field and if not in what respect they are deficient.

II. No enlisted man will be mustered for pay who has not been a bona fide member of the organization for at least six months prior to the date of the encampment, maneuvers or exercises or has not had equivalent service in the Army, Marine Corps or Organized Militia of the United States and who has not received the elementary instruction of recruits prescribed as requisite by the War Department.

Unless the instructions contained in this order are carried out promptly it will seriously interfere with the ability of the National Guard of the State to participate in such encampments, maneuvers or exercises as may be ordered.

III. Regimental commanders will see that the provisions of this order are complied with.

Dear Sir :---

I have the honor to report on the following question submitted to me: "Is an officer of the National Guard of the State of Maine above the rank of Captain who has been paid in accordance with United States regulations for attendance at the State encampment, entitled in addition thereto to the allowance for his mount provided by Section 99 of the Militia laws of Maine?"

To be specific, the laws of the United States allow a Colonel \$11.11 per day and require him to furnish his own mount. Section 97 of the laws of this State allow him \$5 per day, and Section 99 provides for an additional allowance of \$3 per day when he is required to be mounted. Under present regulations the officers of the National Guard are paid for the above described services in accordance with United States regulations. The question now is, then, can they legally be paid in addition thereto the State allowance for a mount? It is apparent that both the United States and the State provide compensation and allowance for the man and the mount. Under United States regulations it is provided in one item and under State regulations in two items, viz: Sections 97 and 99, which must be read together. Under United States law a Colonel receives \$11.11 per day for himself and mount; under the State law he receives \$8 for himself and mount. It therefore seems to me impossible to escape the conclusion that there would be no more authority for paying the United States pay for man, and mount and in addition thereto, the State pay for mount, than to pay the United States pay and State pay for both man and mount.

To state the proposition in another way, if payment under United States regulations could legally be supplemented by payment under State statute for the whole or a part of the same service for which United States pay was received, I do not see why it would not be equally allowable to pay a private both United States and State per diem.

My conclusion therefore, is that in the absence of express State legislation authorizing the allowance to officials in addition to the compensation received under United States regulations, you would not be justified legally in making the allowance for mount provided by Section 99 of our Militia law to those officers who had received, or were entitled to receive, per diem and allowance for mount, or per diem including mount, which they are required by regulations established under that per diem to provide, from the funds received from the United States for the use of the Militia Department of the State.

I appreciate the fact that the difference between United States regulations and those of the State respecting the furnishing of mounts by officers of different grades, works a substantial change in the respective amounts of pay allowed the officers of the several grades entirely inconsistent with the apparent purpose of both the State and the United States regulations. I also appreciate the fact that the officers of the National Guard, who are required to make extensive preparations for very few days services for which actual per diem is received, are enjoying much smaller proportionate returns for their work than the officers of the regular army of the same grade, whose compensation runs through the year. Both the apparent inconsistency of the first condition of affairs and the hardship of the second must, however, be remedied by legislation, if at all.

You were formally authorized by law to pay these officers the several amounts prescribed by Sections 97 and 99 read together. You are now authorized to pay them in lieu thereof, the several amounts provided by the United States laws as made available from United States funds. I do not think you are authorized to pay both amounts, or the whole of one amount and any part of the other which is provided by law as pay or allowance for the same thing required to be furnished in return for the pay received from the other source.

I return herewith correspondence between yourself and the Division of Militia Affairs of the United States War Department, handed to me by you.

In view of the present and prospective vacancies in the grade of 2d Lieutenant in the Army over and above those required by law for the graduates of the United States Military Academy and the enlisted men of the Regular Army, I am authorized by the President to inform you that he will be pleased to name for competition in July next a candidate to be named by you from among members of the organized militia of Maine.

This candidate will be authorized to compete with other civilian candidates for a limited number of vacancies under regulations prescribed by the War Department in General Orders inclosed herewith. This order gives in detail the requirements of the examination and all information needed by candidates in advance to enable them to prepare themselves. The following fundamental rules of eligibility are laid down by the Department in conformity with existing regulations, and in order to secure uniformity among candidates who shall be named by the various governors in response to this invitation.

The candidate must be unmarried; must not be less than 2I years of age or more than 27; must be a citizen of the United States; must be physically qualified to discharge all the duties of an officer in active

service; must be free from mental or bodily deformity and of good moral character and habits; must have been a member of the organized militia of your State continuously for not less than two years prior to being named by you, and must have the favorable recommendation of the commanding officer of his immediate organization and of the regimental and brigade commanders when the same exist and are his direct superiors. The candidate, whether officer or enlisted man, may be of any grade.

Early action is urged to the end that the candidate named may have as much time as possible for preparation.

# PORTLAND, January 18, 1908.

The new Springfield rifle and service ammunition having been prescribed for the National Match of 1908 and arrangements being under way for the re-armament of the Guard with the new rifle, .22 caliber Springfields will be issued for indoor use this winter.

The classes and order of fire for the National Match are as follows: I. 200 yards, slow-fire. 2. 200 yards, rapid-fire. 3. 600 yards, slow-fire. 4. 800 yards, slow-fire. 5. One skirmish run. 6. 1000 yards, slow-fire. The same classes and order will prevail at the New England tournament.

Those who have been recommended as candidates for the State team should give their attention to rapid-fire and skirmish work indoors, as well as perfecting themselves in prone shooting and muscular training to enable them to hold in the off-hand position.

Company commanders who have not made their recommendations for the State team should do so at once, and company commanders who have sent in lists will notify this office promptly of any changes in the lists previously forwarded.

In skirmishing with the new rifle, the Firing Regulations for 1906 will be closely followed, attention being given to the fact that the magazine is refilled during the firing interval at 400 yards. (Par. 141.)

The try-out for the State team will probably be held early in June and will include rapid-fire and skirmish work, together with 600 yards slow-fire, and possibly 200 yards slow-fire. Long-range firing will not be a factor in selecting the team, owing to the lack of suitable range facilities for such try-out.

The twelve high men in the try-out competition together with three to be picked by the Chief of Ordnance will form the team.

In order to be eligible for competition in the try-out, candidates must conform to the rule which requires seventy-five per cent. of military duty in the year preceding the National Match.

Any request for information in regard to the try-out or the competitions may be sent direct to this office.

Sir:—I deem it of the highest importance that all officers of the Guard should diligently pursue between now and the time for the annual State camp a course of theoretical study preparatory and leading up to the practical field exercises of camp, in order that the latter may be performed intelligently and instructively.

Many of the professional benefits of the camp will be lost unless the officers are given beforchand some definite idea of what is to be expected of them; and, in this connection, I would declare it as my opinion that the camp should be very largely (excepting, of course, the necessary ceremonies) devoted to field exercises. A camp is not an outdoor armory. While realizing the absolute necessity for close order drills and their disciplinary value, yet it must be conceded that the armory is primarily the place for that kind of instruction.

I, therefore, have the honor to recommend that the following paragraphs of the Infantry Drill Regulations (1904) be studied carefully for a period sufficient to insure thorough familiarity with them (which, it is hoped, will not exceed six weeks from the date hereof), at the end of which time other subjects will be recommended:

### SUGGESTIONS FOR THE NEW SPRINGFIELD RIFLE.

In using the new rifle (Model 1903, chambered for 1906 ammunition) it will be well to bear in mind that it requires increased elevation. The following tabulation will give the approximate elevations for the average rifle and will enable the rifleman to get onto the target at each range, after which he can make his necessary corrections:

RANGE.	SET SIGHT AT.
200 yards	300 to 350 yards
300 yards	400 to 450 yards
500 yards	600 to 625 yards
600 yards	675 to  725 yards
800 yards	825 to 850 yards
1000 yards	1000 to 1050 yards

One point correction on the windgauge moves the bullet four inches to the right or left for every 100 yards of distance, as per the following table:

A change of 25 yards in elevation raises or lowers the bullet as follows:

At 200 yards I 3-5 inches At 300 yards 2 3-4 inches At 300 yards 2 3-4 inches At 300 yards 6 1-4 inches At 600 yards 8 1-2 inches At 800 yards 15 1-2 inches At 1000 yards 25 inches

The drift is corrected on the rear sight up to 600 yards.

The English vernier may be used on the Springfield as on the Krag and it will be found that the corrections are approximately the same i. e., one inch per minute for each 100 yards of distance.

## RAPID-FIRE TARGET.

Candidates for the State team will remember that this year's New England and National match conditions will call for rapid-fire shooting at 200 yards on the bullseye target instead of the "F" target.

The try-out for the team will not be held before the middle of June, in order to give every candidate an opportunity to become accustomed to the new rifle.

#### CLEANING.

The rifleman who wishes to keep the new rifle at its shooting best will see that it is thoroughly cleaned after each day's work at the range.

### KEEPING SCORES.

Those who wish to master the finer points of rifle shooting will keep a score book and make a careful record of each shot, noting all conditions of heat, light, etc. If the rifleman does not have a hygrometer, he will do well to be sure that his thermometer record is carefully made each time at the range.

No permanent record of elevations will be made till the rifle has been fired at least 100 rounds and the true elevations may not be found till 200 rounds have been fired.

Owing to the nature of the proposed maneuvers at the annual encampment this year, it is important that no part of the time in camp should be taken for the drilling of newly enlisted and uninstructed recruits in the "School of the Soldier" and first principles of military training, as has been necessary in former years.

In order that all recruits may receive instruction before going to

camp, no new enlistments will be allowed in any organization of the National Guard between June 15 and August 8, 1908.

II. No more than one medical examination will be allowed for each organization between June 15 and August 8, 1908, which should be ordered as soon as practicable after June 15th. All men whose period of enlistment expires at any time between the above dates, and who wish to reenlist, should be reexamined at this time in order to save delay in reenlistment and insure continuous service.

I. Paragraph 69, Infantry Drill Regulations was, by G. O. 98, War Department, 1907, amended to read as follows:

69. Being at order arms: 1. Fix, 2. Bayonet.

Execute parade rest; grasp the handle of the bayonet with the right hand, back of the hand toward the body. Draw the bayonet from the scabbard and fix it on the barrel glancing at the muzzle; resume the order, drop the left hand at the side.

Note: The new bayonet is fixed exactly as was the bayonet for the model '98 rifle.

Paragraph 74 was amended to read as follows:

74. Being at order arms: 1. Unfix, 2. Bayonet.

"Take the position of parade rest; grasp the handle of the bayonet firmly with the right hand, pressing the spring with the forefinger of the right (left) hand, raise the bayonet until the handle is about 12 (6) inches above the muzzle of the piece, drop the point to the left, back of the hand toward the body, and glancing at the scabbard return the bayonet, the blade passing between the left arm and body; regrasp the piece with the right hand and resume the order."

Note: The new bayonet is unfixed exactly as was the old bayonet except as to the differences indicated, the words in parenthesis denoting the old method.

"If marching, the bayonet is fixed or unfixed in the most expeditious and convenient manner and the piece returned to the original position," that is, in which it was when the command was given. Neither fix nor charge bayonet should be given in double rank when ranks are closed.

II. Paragraph 2, Circular 37, War Department, 1907, prescribes that the bayonet will not be fixed at the command, "1. Inspection, 2. Arms."

The 5th general rule, paragraph 54, Infantry Drill Regulations, prescribes:

"The bayonet is not fixed except for instruction, in bayonet exercise, on guard, or when needed for purposes of defense or offense."

The description of the new bayonet is to be found on pp. 21, 24, of the "Description and Rules for the Management of the U. S. Magazine Rifle," revised to Feb. 14, 1908.

III. Attention is invited to par. 248 and 286, A. R., amended, which require that public property pertaining to the headquarters of a regiment will be marked "H. Q.," with arm and number of regiment. Haversacks, canteens, and similiar articles of equipment in possession of the noncommissioned staff will be marked with the cross rifles, with the number of the regiment above and "N. C. S." below the intersection.

Also, that public property issued to a company for its exclusive use will be marked, when practicable, with the letter of the company, and number and arm of the regiment; such articles issued to an enlisted man (arms and clothing excepted) will be marked, when practicable, with the number of the man, letter of the company, and number of the regiment. The articles of infantry equipment will be marked on the outside with crossed rifles with the number of the regiment above and the letter of the company below the intersection. The design will be stenciled in black, letters and numbers in fullfaced characters. The design will be placed above the letters "U. S." on equipments, and the soldier's number in characters one inch below the letters "U. S." Articles in the hospital corps will be marked with its special device, but not with the number of the man.

IV. Circular 16, War Department, 1907, prescribes the assembling of the gun sling as follows:

The sling is made up of four parts, the long strap, the short strap, and two keepers. To assemble it, the plain end of the long strap is passed through the larger keeper, then through the metal loop of the short strap, passing from the undressed to the dressed side of the latter, then back through the larger keeper, forming the arm-loop dressed side out. The same end is then passed through the smaller keeper, through the upper sling swivel from the butt toward the muzzle, and back through the smaller keeper, the arm-loop being completed by engaging the claw of the long strap in the proper holes in the other end of same.

The size of the arm-loop is adjusted to suit the individual who is to fire the piece, the loop being drawn through the upper swivel until the claw comes well up toward the upper swivel. The claw end of the short strap is then passed through the lower swivel from muzzle to butt and brought up and engaged in the proper holes in the long strap, drawing the sling taut. This gives the parade position of the sling.

To adjust it for firing or carrying, the claw of the short strap is disengaged and reengaged in the proper holes of the short strap, no change being necessary in the adjustment of the arm-loop.

V. Officers of the Guard must pay more attention to orders both from the War Department and the office of the Adjutant General of the State than it is believed they now do; and they are enjoined to read over carefully all orders before filing them.

In accordance with a ruling of the Secretary of War under date of June 16, 1908, in response to an inquiry from this office under date of June 6, 1908, paragraphs two and three of Circular No. 36, War Department, series of 1907, are made applicable to the National Guard of the State of Maine, as follows:

"2. An officer or enlisted man qualifying as expert rifleman enters the next succeeding regular practice season with the assumed qualification of a sharpshooter and is required to take the expert rifleman's test only. Similarly, an officer or enlisted man qualified as a sharpshooter enters the next succeeding practice season with the assumed qualification of marksman and is not required to take the marksman's course.

"3. Hold-over qualifications should be counted in computing the figure of merit of organizations in the same manner as those actually attained on the range."

#### INSIGNIA.

*Collar ornaments.* The letters ME. gothic design, will be worn by all officers on the collar of the dress, service and white coats, placed at a distance of 1 inch from each end of the collar, a suitable space to be left between the letters. On the dress and white coats the letters will be of gold or gilt metal. On the service coat they will be of dull-finish bronze metal for all officers.

The Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta:

SIR:—Referring to Article XII of the Regulations of the War Department Governing the Organized Militia, which pertains to the attendance of officers of the Organized Militia at the Garrison Schools and several Service Schools for Officers enumerated in paragraph 220 of the Militia Regulations, I am directed by the Assistant Secretary of War to request that, if there be any officers of the Organized Militia of your State who desire to attend any of these schools, or who, having been in attendance at a Garrison School, desire to renew their attendance for the ensuing scholastic year, the names of such officers may be submitted to the War Department prior to September 30th in connection with the requirements prescribed in paragraphs 222 to 224, inclusive, Militia Regulations, and that information may be conveyed to the Organized Militia of your State to the effect that the Department desires to act collectively on such requests with a view to organizing classes early in October to take the prescribed courses in the several schools.
