The Honorable Bert M. Fernald, Governor of Maine:

SIR:—In accordance with Section 17, The Military Law, I have the honor to submit the report of this office for the year ending December 31, 1909:

The report should be prefaced with the statement that I was appointed to this office under an executive order dated April 28, 1909, and effective May 1, 1909, succeeding Major General Augustus B. Farnham, who with honor to himself and to the State had served as Adjutant General from December 1, 1901. Further prefatory mention should be made of the unusual conditions which have surrounded the National Guard of this State during the year covered by this report. It was the final year of grace allowed by Congress for conformation with regular service conditions under the federal militia law and it was also the year in which the entire militia law of this State was rewritten. The new law was signed by the Governor April 2d but under the constitutional referendum clause did not become effective till July 3d. This law has made necessary many changes in the conduct of the State's military affairs, but it has been my endeavor to make these changes no more rapidly than they could be effectively met by the officers and men of the active militia. Much of the ground opened through the new law has been entered upon and while it may be premature to pass judgment upon a statute which has been in operation only six months, I think I am within the facts when I state that The Military Law enacted by the 74th Legislature has done much to advance the National Guard of this State and that there is already a perceptible quickening of interest and effort in the State service.

STRENGTH AND CONDITION OF THE ACTIVE MILITIA.

No change has taken place in the organization of the active militia during the year which this report covers, but preparations have been actively carried forward for changes which become effective with the new year and which for this reason may properly be referred to in reporting upon the work of the office for the calendar year ending today.

Principal among these changes is the transfer of the First Infantry to Coast Artillery, announced in General Orders No. 26, dated September 1st, and effective January 1, 1910. This change was made in accordance with the provisions of Section 40, The Military Law, and was in fulfillment of what might be termed an unwritten but binding pledge to the Federal Government.

Facing a constant shortage of officers and men to man its coast defences and seeing no likelihood of securing immediate and material increases in the Coast Artillery branch of the Regular Army, the War Department mapped out a plan for coast artillery reserves, urging the seaboard states to provide the necessary troops. With a view of interesting the states in the plan, the War Department instituted in 1903 a series of Coast Defense Exercises in which National Guard Infantry was given an opportunity to act as coast artillery reserves in service at the guns and mortars. The troops of this State participated in the exercises of that year. They again participated in 1907 but still as infantry, no change in law having been made under which it was permissible to establish a Coast Artillery Corps. The War Department, however, was informed that such changes would be made and this year the assignment of the First Infantry to a part in the Coast Defense Exercises was accepted by the War Department with the understanding that the formal transfer to Coast Artillery would be made within a reasonable time.

While it would have been possible to have effected the transfer of the First Infantry to the Coast Artillery when the new law became effective on the 3d of July, the fact that the organization had already been accepted for this year's work and the still more important fact that there was only a month intervening before the commencement of the tour of duty made it

seem better to defer the formal transfer. By the publication of the order for transfer early in September, with the proviso that the change should not become effective until January 1, 1910, the officers of the regiment were given ample time in which to make preparations for the change. This plan also made it possible for accountable officers to close their infantry accountability at the regular time for making their annual returns on November 30th, thereby starting the new organization with a clean sheet.

In preparing for the transfer many new problems have arisen but it is a pleasure to state that this office has at all times received the cordial and helpful co-operation of the officers of the Division of Militia Affairs in the War Department, and the officers of the Regular Coast Artillery in the Artillery District of Portland. Colonel Charles Collins, the commanding officer of the First Infantry, who will command the newly created Corps of Coast Artillery, is entitled to official commendation for the difficult duty which he has performed in working out the many intricate details attendant on the transfer.

In taking up their new duties, the officers and men of the First Infantry are brought into closest possible and almost constant touch with the regular service; their local armories are to be ultimately equipped with expensive range finding apparatus and working models of the guns and mortars which they would man in time of war; and they will also receive instruction at their armories from an officer of the Coast Artillery Corps, U. S. A., specially detailed for that purpose. While even the War Department regards the coast artillery reserve as more or less in the nature of an experiment, it is given its serious thought and strong support. The Department is disposed to do everything that it can to make the service attractive to the National Guard and throughout evinces a disposition to meet the State fully half way in building up an efficient force. The change from infantry to coast artillery for Maine's First Regiment of Infantry had been long foreshadowed and having come as it has after a fair opportunity for preliminary test, I believe that the future will show it to have been a step in the right direction.

The new law did not affect existing conditions in the Second Infantry and that organization is for the most part an efficient

body of National Guard troops, very largely officered by men who are giving the best that is in them to attain higher proficiency.

Certain changes in the Medical Department have resulted under the new law, first lieutenants of the Medical Corps being advanced to the grade of captain at the end of three years as in the regular service. The Hospital Corps Detachments which were formerly scattered in squads at the home stations of the several officers of the Medical Corps are now recruited at one station for each Detachment, a change which has greatly increased the efficiency of this branch of the service. Contract surgeons now form a Medical Reserve Corps, bringing this part of the State service in closer harmony with the Medical Department of the Army. A large amount of new equipment was purchased for the Medical Department prior to the summer field service and the Department as a whole is in the best condition in the history of the State.

The new law authorized an increase in the Naval Reserve, but as the Navy Department had already accepted the assignment of Maine's Naval Militia forces on the old basis it was not deemed expedient to authorize recruiting to the new limit in the short period intervening between the time the law became effective and the date set for the cruise. The necessary equipment for the increased force has been purchased and the additional men will be recruited early in the coming year, thereby insuring adequately trained forces for the cruise in the summer of 1910.

The new law will ultimately make considerable reduction in the rank of officers serving on the staff of the Commander-in-Chief and will limit the selection of staff officers to those who have had military service, but as officers serving on the staff of the Commander-in-Chief at the time of the passage of the law were exempted from its provisions such changes will not take place during the present administration. In this connection, I may state that I availed myself of the new law in order to reduce the grade of this office from that of major general to brigadier general, believing that while the higher rank was no more than fitting for officers who had rendered distinguished service to their country during the Civil War, it was better that an officer appointed from the National Guard

begin his duties with the lower rank contemplated by The Military Law. This change in rank was accomplished under General Orders No. 23 and brings the rank of Maine's Adjutant General to the grade which obtains in a great majority of the states.

The foregoing would seem to cover the general provisions of the law which requires The Adjutant General to report on the "strength and condition of the active militia," but for detailed information I beg to refer you to the reports of the several department chiefs published herewith. The further provisions of The Military Law requiring detailed statements of expenditures for all military purposes and the statements showing "the disposition of all clothing, ordnance, arms, ammunition and other military property on hand and issued" will be found under their appropriate headings.

THE ARMORY QUESTION.

The most serious handicap imposed on the National Guard of this State today is the lack of suitable armories. The deficiencies in this respect have been pointed out year after year in the reports of my predecessors, in the reports of the inspectors-general and in the reports of United States inspecting officers acting under the provisions of the federal militia law. The Military Law enacted at the last session of the Legislature was designed to improve conditions in this respect, first by creating an Armory Commission, secondly by increasing the compensation paid by the State to municipalities furnishing armories, and thirdly by establishing the legal procedure under which permanent armories may be acquired when funds are available. The Armory Commission was constituted in an executive order dated November 11, 1909, naming as members of said Commission The Adjutant General, *ex-officio*, Major Walter J. Mayo, Second Infantry, Captain Harry P. Carver, First Infantry, Honorable Charles H. Randall of Portland, and Honorable Frederick W. Plaisted of Augusta. The Commission has already inspected many of the armories and early in the coming year will complete its first series of inspections. As a result of the work already done, armory conditions are being improved and while the maximum amount which the

municipality may receive from the State is increased by only \$200 (from a maximum of \$100 to a maximum of \$300), municipal officers generally have appreciated even this slight advancement. It has been the aim of the Commission to make the granting of an increased allowance conditional on a genuine betterment of existing conditions. Although the maximum is still too small to warrant improvements on a scale which will give the Guard fully adequate quarters, it is the beginning of better days and almost without exception the Armory Commission has found municipal officers ready to promptly make required improvements. In meeting municipal officers the Commission has endeavored to give due consideration to both the requirements of the National Guard and the conditions under which municipal officers are sometimes restricted. To this end recommendations have been confined wholly to essentials, leaving for later consideration minor details which should ultimately be readjusted to the greater benefit of the National Guard organizations. After completing its inspections and thereby becoming thoroughly conversant with conditions in all parts of the State, the Commission will be in a position to prepare regulations for the government and control of armories. In framing these regulations the Commission will have data from all states having similar commissions and when the regulations have been approved and published it is believed that much of the past friction between National Guard organizations and municipal officers will be done away with. Nothing has been done as yet toward preparing for the consideration of the Legislature a progressive system of State armory construction, but there is no question that the State will finally have to provide and maintain all National Guard armories and the Commission is now securing information regarding the enactment and workings of such laws in other states. Before the assembling of the 75th Legislature in January, 1911, there will be ready for presentation a report fully covering legislation in other states and affording the groundwork on which like legislation can be enacted for the benefit of the National Guard of this State.

THE YEAR'S FIELD SERVICE.

The annual field service required under the regulations of the War Department governing the Organized Militia was performed this year in accordance with General Orders No. 18, dated May 13th, which prescribed a ten-days' tour of duty for the First Infantry in the Joint Army and Militia Coast Defense Exercises in the Artillery District of Portland, and a ten-days' tour of duty for the Second Infantry at the State campground in Augusta.

Inasmuch as the First Infantry would have the benefit of contact with the Regular troops, it seemed especially desirable that an assignment of Regular troops be secured for the encampment of the Second Infantry. Such an assignment was at first refused by the War Department, but this decision was later reconsidered and Companies K and L, of the 5th Infantry, U. S. A., Captain Austin F. Prescott commanding, were ordered to report here for the period of the encampment. These troops marched from the Plattsburg, New York, Barracks to Augusta, returning in the same manner, and while on duty here maintained a separate camp which was at all times an object lesson in field service for the Second Infantry of this State. Captain Prescott and his officers and men were always ready to be of service and in co-operation with Captain Franklin S. Hutton, 12th Infantry, U. S. A., detailed by the War Department as instructor and inspector, contributed in a very large measure to make the encampment successful from the viewpoint of increased efficiency. The State was fortunate in having for this detail officers who see the possibilities that lie in a well disciplined National Guard and know how to arouse and maintain the interest of State troops.

Believing that a National Guard regiment becomes really fit for field service only when it learns to depend on itself, greater responsibilities were this year thrown upon the regimental commander and regimental staff officers. Less preparatory work was done in the quartermaster and commissary departments, the regimental quartermaster and regimental commissary being required to quarter and subsist their troops without so much assistance from the Quartermaster General and the Commissary General as has been customary in the past. There is,

however, still room for improvement in this respect and for the next tour of duty the disposition of this office will be to require a still further fulfillment of field service duty by administrative officers. Up to the present time it has been customary for the Quartermaster General to make all transportation arrangements, but this year for its tour of duty in the Artillery District of Portland the First Infantry relied wholly upon its own quartermaster, whose excellent work was commended by Captain Robert B. McBride, C. A. C., U. S. A., detailed by the War Department to make a field inspection of the First Infantry. Such duty gives National Guard quartermasters acquaintance with the blank forms and business methods of the Quartermaster's Department of the Regular Army, thereby acquainting them with the details of the work which will fall to their share in the event of a call to active service.

Further details regarding the year's field service of the National Guard may be found in the reports of officers on duty thereat.

Information regarding the annual cruise of the Naval Reserve will be found in the report of the Commanding Officer, Ship's Company.

A LETTER TO COMMISSIONED OFFICERS.

With the intention of directing attention to certain deficiencies noticeable during the summer tours of duty, I sent to each commissioned officer of the National Guard, under date of August 27th, the following letter:

At the conclusion of this year's field service officers and men of the National Guard should give serious consideration to the work which has been accomplished and thus early begin active preparations for a still more effective tour of duty in 1910. While the Second Infantry at Augusta, and the First Infantry at the forts in the Artillery District of Portland made steady progress, more could have been accomplished had both regiments been ready for comparatively advanced work. Having had no armory equipment for preliminary artillery training, the First Infantry had to begin with elementary work upon reaching the forts; but another year, through constant application and the assistance which will be rendered by the regular establishment, the organization should be ready for more advanced work earlier in the tour. With the right sort of effort in armory

instruction during the coming year, the Second Infantry should be able next August to take up field work on the day following its arrival in camp.

The time is past when "a good showing at camp" is sufficient. The National Guard of the present day must be able to make a good showing at any time and it is steady, progressive work in the home armories which counts. The time to commence preparations for the tour of field service in 1910 is NOW. There is none too much time between the last of August, 1909, and the first of August, 1910, to mould a company into proper working order. From now on, keep the next year's tour in mind. If you are a company commander, make your enlistments with that end in view. Study your expiring enlistments and endeavor to hold the men upon whom you can depend for faithful service in camp and armory. Let the others go, but be sure you fill their places with keen, clean young men who will honor the uniform they wear. And be sure that the recruit understands what will be expected from him. Tell him that it means attendance at every armory drill and inspection and the full performance of duty in camp. Don't make the mistake of showing the recruit a pretty picture of camp and give him to understand that camp is all there is to the service. Under such circumstances, in nine cases out of ten, he will prove useless deadwood when he awakens to what all-the-year-round work means.

The company commander must insist upon the active aid of his lieutenants throughout the armory drill season, and must impress upon them the necessity for thorough training in all matters of company administration. In active service they must be ready to take over the command of the company at a moment's notice and unless subalterns of the National Guard are made to understand the importance of their commissions and are required to thoroughly inform themselves on company work at home they will be of little use in the field. Non-commissioned officers should be made to understand that upon the faithful and intelligent performance of their duty depends, in a large degree, the success of the company in field service, and no soldier should be warranted who will not give the necessary time and study.

The coming year will be one which means much to the National Guard of this State. On January 21, 1910, the provisions of the federal militia act finally go into effect and thereafter the organization, armament and discipline of the Guard must conform to that of the regular service. This means that in the future officers and men must give the best that is in them if Maine is to be credited with an efficient State force—a force which fairly earns its share in the federal allotment. In the past, states have received their share of this allotment regardless of their National Guard conditions. Hereafter they must show efficiency or they get no part of the appropriation. The loss of federal assistance would be crippling to the Maine Guard and every officer and man must come to a realizing sense that neglect on his part may mean the loss of the State's allotment.

SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION.

In the opinion of those who have studied conditions in the National Guard of this State, the principal weakness in the training of both officers and men has been lack of systematic instruction during the armory drill season. Section 76, The Military Law, requires the Commander-in-Chief to prescribe courses in theoretical and practical instruction for the officers and men of the regiments, corps and staff departments in the National Guard, and for the officers and men of the Naval Reserve. Pressure of other work consequent upon the change of the First Infantry to Coast Artillery has delayed the institution of such courses of instruction, but beginning early in 1910 all commissioned officers of the National Guard and Naval Reserve will be following a progressive course of armory instruction. In the Corps of Coast Artillery this instruction will be given by an officer and non-commissioned officer of the Regular service detailed for that purpose. In the Second Infantry the course will be conducted along correspondence school lines. This winter's instruction will form the basis for a more comprehensive system of instruction to be put into effect next fall, under which it is the intention to prescribe proficiency examinations so that the inefficients may be weeded out. Courses of study will also be prescribed in the Medical Department and in the Naval Reserve.

While the instruction of commissioned officers is being taken care of through the foregoing courses of study, the instruction of non-commissioned officers is also being given special attention. In the Coast Artillery Corps such instruction will come from a non-commissioned officer of the Regular Coast Artillery; in the Second Infantry it is being given by Sergt. John A. Schweitzer, First Infantry, U. S. A., detailed by the War Department for this purpose. Sergeant Schweitzer reported on the latter detail October 25th, and since that time has been steadily employed under the direction of this office. Owing to the widely scattered stations of the Second Infantry companies, progress has been somewhat slow. The instructor is being detailed for periods of two weeks to the companies in turn, under instructions to arouse interest among officers and non-commissioned officers and hold as many sessions for instruc-

tion as possible during his stay with a company. In this he has been very successful and, though attendance on such schools is wholly voluntary, has frequently had a majority of both commissioned and non-commissioned officers present every evening. These records of attendance indicate that the non-commissioned officers of the Guard are taking their work seriously and that the State will have good material from which to fill its commissions as vacancies may occur. In the furtherance of instruction for non-commissioned officers and particularly to bring about uniformity of instruction, it is planned to hold a special school for first sergeants prior to the summer's field service.

PAY FOR ARMORY DRILLS.

This year, for the first time, the National Guard of this State has been allowed pay for armory drills. Payment for the first six months was under the provisions of General Orders No. 31, dated October 20, 1908, and for the latter half of the year in accordance with the provisions of The Military Law. I regret to state that prompt payment has been impossible owing to the complications which have arisen in putting a new plan into operation and then changing to another system at the end of six months. Payment for the first six months was made conditional on two-thirds' attendance, which necessitated checking the names of those reported present on drill returns with those reported absent on monthly returns, thereby entailing a large amount of additional clerical work. A new blank form has been prepared for use the coming year and it is believed that it will lighten clerical labor both in the companies and in this office and lead to prompt payment for attendance at drills.

There may be a difference of opinion regarding the benefits to be derived from payment for drills, but this is something upon which judgment may well be suspended until the system has had another year's test.

CARE OF MILITARY PROPERTY.

During the past year an attempt has been made to bring about a closer accountability for military property. When the semi-annual returns were made on May 30th, the records of this office and those of the several responsible officers were carefully gone over and adjustments made so that the statements of property carried on the returns would agree with the books of this office. There had been a tendency in some organizations to carry forward fictitious totals which led to the accumulation of serious losses when a transfer of property made an actual count necessary. In such cases it was difficult to secure the affidavits necessary for the relief of the accountable officer, but it is hoped that in the future prompt reporting of losses with consequent prompt action by a surveying officer will make easier the work of company commanders and others responsible for the safe keeping of military property. A new form for property return based on the loose-leaf system has been put into operation, superseding an obsolete property book.

In this and other ways, this office has sought to lighten clerical labor at company, regimental and corps headquarters. Further changes in blank forms are in contemplation, chief among which is a single enlistment paper which will do away with the triplicate system now in vogue. When this reform is instituted the single enlistment paper will be mailed direct to this office, where descriptive cards will be made out, one being forwarded to regimental headquarters and the other to the commanding officer of the company where the enlistment was made.

The clerical labor in this office which had multiplied rapidly from the date of the passage of the federal militia act was still further increased by the changes consequent on the enactment of a new law for the organized militia of this State. While changes in the method of handling official papers may afford some relief, the saving will be offset by the increased volume of business. In addition to the clerical work directly connected with the National Guard, this office is constantly called upon for records relating to the Civil War. During the current year 358 certificates of service were issued and a great deal of correspondence carried on in reference thereto. Steady progress is being made on the preservation of the regimental rolls of the Civil War.

IN CONCLUSION.

As another report from this office will be due before the assembling of the next Legislature, it seems advisable to defer till that time all recommendations for changes in the existing law.

In bringing this summary of the year's work to a conclusion I should omit an important item if I neglected to specifically mention the loyal support which has been given me during the seven months that I have filled this office. Without exception, officers and men of the active militia have been at all times ready to assist in bringing the military forces of this State to a higher level of efficiency. With the spirit which animates the National Guard and Naval Reserve today, there is every reason to believe that the coming year will be notable in its progress toward the standard of efficiency which will hereafter be demanded of the State troops that form an integral part of the national defence.

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TABLE A.
ENROLLMENT.

The enrollment made this year by the assessors of the several cities, towns and plantations of the State shows that the total number of male citizens of this State of the age of eighteen and under the age of forty-five years, subject to military duty, is one hundred two thousand three hundred and forty-four, a loss of seven hundred and nine since the year 1907.

The following table shows the number of men liable to military service in each city, town and plantation. The towns not making returns this year are marked *, and the return of 1907 is used.

FIELD GUNS, CARRIAGES, Etc. There are on hand in the State Storehouse and in the hands of citizens certain field guns with carriages, limbers, etc., all of obsolete pattern. This property has been listed in previous reports and no change has taken place therein during the current year. There is also on hand a small amount of saluting ammunition for this ordnance.

SMALL ARMS, ETC. In addition to the small arms of present issue pattern there are in the State Storehouse and in the hands of citizens certain small arms and appendages of obsolete pattern in which no change has taken place during the current year.

SMALL PARTS. A sufficient supply of small parts for replacing worn and broken parts of small arms, is kept on hand at the State Storehouse.

TABLEWARE, CHINA AND GLASS. The State owns and has stored in convenient buildings on the State Campground a large supply of tableware of various sorts previously supplied to troops when in camp. There is also a large supply of kitchen utensils provided for a similar purpose.

SUBSISTENCE PROPERTY. The commissary chests required by Militia Regulations are kept completely filled at all times and in addition thereto there is a small amount of subsistence property on hand which has been procured for camp uses at Augusta.

AMBULANCE CORPS PROPERTY. There is on hand a small amount of obsolete property at one time in the hands of the Ambulance Corps.

SIGNAL CORPS PROPERTY. There is on hand a small amount of obsolete property at one time issued to the Signal Corps.

BOOKS. The several organizations of the National Guard and Naval Reserve are supplied with the required text books, manuals, regulations, etc., a sufficient reserve being kept at the State Storehouse at all times. Frequent changes rendering whole editions obsolete render any list of publications confusing hence the enumeration of all books by title is omitted.

MEDICAL AND HOSPITAL STORES. In addition to the articles listed there is on hand a large supply of medicines, surgical dressings, appliances, etc., also a miscellaneous supply of furniture and hospital stores purchased from time to time for use of the Medical Department, but not of standard pattern. There is also on hand at the State Storehouse one ambulance of obsolete pattern, complete with harness and appendages.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith my report for the year 1909.

Inasmuch as I have already submitted a detailed report of the inspections of the various organizations, I shall refrain from including the same in this report. Whatever criticisms were noted at those inspections have been brought to the knowledge of the various commanders and as they are the ones to be most interested and benefited thereby, and as each has received a copy of the report of his organization, it would be but repetition and serve no useful purpose to include the same here.

SPECIAL INSPECTION.

A Special Inspection of Company F, Second Infantry, was made by me November 18th, in accordance with S. O. No. 160 c. s., a detailed report of same being forwarded to your office at the time.

ARMORIES.

Outside of Portland the term "armory" is a misnomer. My tour of inspection disclosed no so-called armory, with the above mentioned exception, sufficiently large in which to drill a company properly. Many company commanders, however, with this handicap, endeavor to do so, and obtain the inevitably poor results. My advice to these officers would be to confine their

work in the armories to drill by squads entirely. Most of the armories will accommodate such work. During seasonable weather company movements may be executed in the open. Lack of space in the drill room is not my only reason for suggesting squad drill. Thorough and efficient work along this line will result in an easier and more efficient moulding together of the various squads into the company.

In addition to the lack of drill room in most armories, is a corresponding absence of room for the proper care of clothing, arms and equipments. This is especially true of the Portland armory. Some arrangements should be made with the municipal authorities of this city to correct this evil which could easily be accomplished by slight remodelling of the present accommodations. So long as cramped quarters exist, one must expect to find wrinkled and unserviceable clothing, and bent and unserviceable equipments. With few exceptions, I found the property cared for as well as the accommodations would permit.

Some municipalities seem to labor under the impression that anything is good enough for the militia in the line of furnishing armories. As a result we have quarters provided that in many cases are absolutely unfit and would not be considered for a moment by other organizations seeking accommodations. Inadequate heating and unsanitary conditions prevail. With this utter lack of congenial surroundings it is not strange to find a want of spirit in some organizations. Better armories should be the watchword. Legislation adopted by the last legislature provides for the erection of armories by the State, but under such circumstances, as are, at present, absolutely prohibitive. Until present conditions are improved we must expect to find inefficiency in drill and poor condition of property. That the officers, under these trying circumstances, are able to maintain the high standard in the personnel of their organizations, speaks volumes for their zeal and enthusiasm.

ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

In accordance with S. O. No. 96 c. s., I attended the encampment of the Second Regiment at Augusta, August 2nd to 11th. Owing to the transportation arrangements the various companies arrived at camp at different times during the day, and immediately proceeded to make camp. In connection with this

encampment, two companies of regulars, K and L, of the 5th U. S. Infantry, under command of Capt. Prescott, were present and worked in conjunction with the regiment during the various duties of the tour. A conference was held the first night in camp, the following being present: The Colonel commanding the Regiment, Commanding Officer of the regular troops, the Military Instructor, detailed for this encampment, The Adjutant General and the Inspector General. At this conference the work to be done during the encampment was outlined. Owing to the fact that the various companies arrived at different times during the day, no attempt was made at any systematic work on that day. The second day was devoted to squad and company drills in close order, in the forenoon; in the afternoon, schools for the officers and non commissioned officers, parade, followed by guard mount. Company and battalion drills in close order and regimental review comprised the work of the second day. This review was for instruction in connection with the review to be held later in the week.

Schools for officers and non-commissioned officers were outlined for each afternoon of the encampment. During the second day a demonstration of normal attack by Companies K and L, of the regular troops present was given for the benefit of the regiment which was present during the demonstration. The fourth day was set apart as Governor's Day. The regiment marched from the grounds to the State House and escorted the Governor to camp. This ceremony completed the morning's work. In the afternoon the regiment was reviewed by the Governor, attended by his staff. Owing to the inclement weather, the evening parade was omitted. Battalion drills in close order and company drills in extended order was the program for the fifth day. An exhibition close order drill was executed by Companies K and L, before referred to. This was not a part of the program for the day, but was given at the request of the Governor who was present. The sixth day was devoted to battalion drill in extended order, advance guard and outpost. Sunday there was a general inspection of troops and camp; also muster for pay. Religious exercises were held at headquarters during the afternoon, conducted by the Chaplain of the regiment. Eighth day, tactical problem, advance guard to position, outposts and patrolling, for each battalion. This was conducted

out of camp. Close order drill by battalions was the program for the ninth day. No drills were had on the tenth and last day, the work consisting in breaking camp, after which the various companies returned to their home stations.

Owing to the apparent lack of armory instruction, the second day's work which was scheduled for close order drills by companies, was somewhat changed, and close order drills by squads was substituted. I have no doubt but that one reason which compelled this change was due to the fact that many recruits were in the ranks, and did not have the opportunity to receive instructions in their armories which their recent enlistment prevented. The earnestness and spirit which the enlisted men displayed in these drills had its reward in a vast improvement in their work at the end of the day. It was gratifying to note this spirit of enthusiasm displayed both by officers and men. As a result of this day's hard work, the company drills the following day showed a marked improvement. The first battalion drill in camp, owing to the conditions prevailing in the State, the scattered companies, and the resulting impossibility of having battalion drills prior to encampment, was, as expected, somewhat indifferent. However, this first drill resulted in some improvement, the field officers gaining confidence in handling their commands, and the companies, as a result, doing better work. Extended order drill was taken up during the fifth day of the encampment and consisted of drills by squads, companies and battalions. This work was fairly good from the start, the men showing the benefit of the instruction received in the earlier close order drills. An exhibition in close order drill by the regular troops was very instructive and of much assistance to the regiment.

Schools for the officers, as a rule, were well attended. The school was devoted to lectures by the Military Instructor, and in addition there was a review of the work done during the day and also a preparation of that to be done the following days. I cannot leave this subject of Officers' Schools without referring to the well prepared and instructive lecture of Map Making and Map Reading, delivered by Captain Partello of Co. L, of the regular troops present, and an equally fine paper on Camp Sanitation given by Captain Hutton, the regular instructor. Both these lectures were most excellent and those privileged to listen

to them were well repaid in added information gained upon these subjects.

As outlined, the school for non-commissioned officers was intended to be one of the most important features of the camp. This was intended to be a school of practical instruction. It was in charge of Captain Prescott of the 5th U. S. Infantry. There was a good attendance Tuesday and Wednesday. Thursday, being Governor's day, no school was held. After Thursday, however, there was no school owing to the limited attendance. This absence from school is a matter to be explained by others. Suffice to say that it was not due to any fault of the Regular Instructor, who was present each day, prepared to execute his part of the program. The limited attendance, however, rendered it impracticable to proceed. And it may be said right here, in passing, that the regular officers detailed to attend this encampment were at all times ready and willing and apparently pleased to give whatever information or knowledge they possessed.

Guard duty was performed by companies. Owing to the various standards of the companies, the work itself varied. There could be no progressive improvement along these lines, inasmuch as the method of guard duty by companies prevented. Some companies executed their work fairly well, while others did so very poorly. As a whole the guard duty as performed was fair to poor. With an occasional exception there seemed to be an absolute lack of knowledge on the part of the guard in extending its compliments to officers entitled to them.

A general inspection of the troops and camp was conducted by me, beginning Sunday at 8 A. M. and concluding at 11.30 A. M. The regular Military Instructor conducted his inspection at the same time. The ceremony of inspection was performed in a creditable manner. The clothing, arms and equipment was found in a serviceable and good condition, with the exception of the rifles of Company A which were rusty and dirty. Canvass shoes formed a part of the clothing of quite a large number of the men. This should not be permitted. Owing to the extreme heat and the length of the ceremony, I can but compliment the regiment upon the excellence of the ceremony as performed by them. I found the kitchens and mess houses, clean, neat, orderly and apparently sanitary. Company H being

engaged in guard duty, was not inspected until the following Tuesday.

Parade was executed each evening. From an indifferent execution the first evening, it improved each day until the latter part of the encampment it could be well criticized as being very good.

The discipline maintained in camp was good, but as suggested elsewhere, military courtesy varied from fair to poor.

The introduction of a system of shower baths proved a good move in the right direction. These were liberally patronized, and thoroughly appreciated by the members of the guard.

For the first time in the history of State encampments a detail of troops from the regular army was present and assisted thereat. The result of their presence was very gratifying. Heretofore one or more of the local organizations appeared prominently as the standard of excellence by which the remainder were compared. With the advent of the regular troops this standard shifted from the home organization or organizations, to the visiting troops, and rightfully so. It would be indeed presumptuous to attempt to maintain an equality between them, the one making military affairs its every day business, the other pursuing it only when the cares of civil life permit. It was a great opportunity for the regiment to be privileged to observe these troops in the every day routine of camp life. This observation could not but produce valuable information on the methods of drill and the general conduct in courtesy and discipline that enters into the make up of the good soldier.

So confident am I of the beneficial results obtained by this amalgamation of the two that I unhesitatingly recommend its adoption in the future, if arrangements can be made, with the added suggestion that a larger detachment of regular troops would proportionately increase the benefits to be gained.

The first regiment encamped at Portland in connection with that part of the regular army stationed there. As I had no official relations with this encampment, I am unable to state the results.

REMARKS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

In my tour of inspection among the different organizations I suggested to the various commanders, matters involving improvements in military courtesy, discipline and drill. I will not

at this time repeat other than to suggest that the feelings of good fellowship existing in every day life between officers and men be thrown aside while performing military duty and the strictest adherence to the requirements of military courtesy be insisted upon. Familiarity breeds contempt; contempt undermines discipline.

Another suggestion I wish to make is what appeals to me as an improvement along the lines of company records. I refer to the methods of issuing clothing and equipments by company commanders to the enlisted men and the recording of the same. I had in mind the issuing of a blank or card, one to be given to the enlisted man indicating the property drawn, the other to be retained by the company commander. This system would enable both to be at all times acquainted with their relations with each other, and remove the doubt which exists in nearly all companies as to what property has been issued and to whom.

The grey blankets have now been in use since 1899. With the constantly changing personnel and the use of these blankets by different persons, their sanitary condition may well be questioned. I would recommend that they be thoroughly cleansed before the next encampment.

My tour of inspection disclosed in every company a variety of leggins. To secure uniformity in dress the old leggins should be recalled and the new pattern issued.

Thorough knowledge of the rifle should be a part of the education of each officer and enlisted man. I have found some enlisted men with absolutely no knowledge of loading and firing, although fairly well acquainted with the manual of arms. Expertness in the execution of the manual is to be commended, but of vastly more importance is a knowledge of the rifle itself, and an ability to use it intelligently whenever the occasion demands. With this object in view I would impress upon company commanders the necessity of a thorough schooling of the enlisted man in the use of the rifle, especially in loading and firing.

The inspection of company property is now conducted with the assistance of the company Quartermaster Sergeant. As a whole this is unsatisfactory. As the responsibility for property is with the company commander and as it is to be assumed that he has knowledge of its whereabouts, condition, etc., it should not seem unreasonable that he be detailed to accompany and

assist the Inspector at the inspection of the property of his command.

At inspection I have noted some officers wearing black shoes with their service uniforms. It would not be at all surprising to find this condition in the ranks, but hardly to be expected among the officers. This practice should be discontinued and each officer should supply himself with russet shoes. Another tendency I find among officers is the wearing of the enlisted man's service uniform. The neatness of the officer's uniform, the added dignity it gives, and the comparative reasonableness of its cost, ought to suggest it as the only proper uniform for officers.

At ceremonies the enlisted men appear in full dress uniform, the officers in dress. There should be harmony in uniform between the enlisted man and officer. I fully realize the embarrassment it would cause to many officers to be forced to uniform themselves completely in accord with the regulations, especially considering the remuneration they receive for their service. If something along the line of a yearly clothing allowance might be adopted, in my judgment it would serve to solve this problem.

With the coming year the change from infantry to artillery comes in the First Regiment. In order that the regiment might be better equipped for the performance of the duties of this branch of the service, I would suggest the holding of an officers' school prior to the next tour of duty. This, in my judgment, should not be a mere theoretical school, but should embrace the utmost practical work. To attain this end, I would have the school held at one of the forts in the artillery district of Portland, where the fullest opportunity would be given the officers to become acquainted with their work.

REPORT OF INSPECTION OF CO. F. 2nd INFANTRY.

STATE OF MAINE.

INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE.

LEWISTON.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of a special inspection of Company F, Second Regiment Infantry, N. G. S. M., made by me November 18, 1909, in accordance with S. O. 160, A. G. O. c. s.

At this inspection, there were present, three officers and thirty enlisted men. There were reported ten enlisted men absent with leave, and thirteen without leave. I was given to understand that the absentees without leave will be recommended for discharge.

The attendance though unsatisfactory may be properly pardoned when one takes into consideration the fact that in this community many of the men are employed in the woods and consequently are unable to attend.

The inspection disclosed a very marked improvement over the annual inspection held earlier in the year. This improvement showed itself both in efficiency in drill and more especially in the care of military property. The condition of the property showed that the quartermaster sergeant has been attending to his duties and it was arranged very systematically for inspection.

The captain of this company has entered into his work with commendable zeal. He has given freely of his time. He is somewhat handicapped in endeavoring to get his company together for drills as it is recruited from a territory many miles in extent. His work showed distinctly in the improvement of the property in his care.

Since the annual inspection this property has been thoroughly overhauled and all unserviceable articles laid aside. This had not been done at the time of the annual inspection, and accounts for the large amount of unserviceable property now on hand. I

would recommend that this condemned property be ordered turned in at once and new issued to replace it.

Acting upon your suggestion, contained in your letter of November 3d last, I devoted considerable time to the practical instruction of the company. This work had to be done by squads owing to the limited space offered by the armory. Further instruction was given the commanding officer along the line of administrative work.

The non-commissioned officers displayed a fair knowledge of their duties.

I would recommend that the practical instruction in the armory be devoted to the school of the squad, and that the meetings of the officers and non-commissioned officers for theoretical instruction be held regularly.

I would also recommend that the captain be furnished copies of G. O. c. s. from January 1 to July 1, in order to complete his files.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my annual report as commissary general for the year 1909.

Acting under the authority, and in accordance with section 22 of The Military Law of the State of Maine as prescribed in section 27, and in compliance therewith, I prepared estimates of quantities of supplies necessary for the encampment of the Second Regiment Infantry at Augusta and advertised for sealed proposals in Portland, Lewiston, Bangor and Augusta daily paper for ten days previous to awarding contracts for same. Said proposals were opened in the presence of the several bidders at the office of the Adjutant General at 10 a. m., July 10, 1909, and under his direction I awarded the contracts to the successful bidders; acting under the authority given me, as per General Orders No. 18, and Special Orders No. 96, c. s.

I attended the encampment of the Second Regiment Infantry, and remained during the entire tour of duty. I received all the subsistence stores, carefully weighed and inspected same. These supplies were of the highest grade and first class in every respect, and, as required by section 29, of said law, I approved all bills and forwarded them to you with certificate of inspection attached.

Sunday, July 31, I made an emergency issue of rations to the Quartermaster Sergeants and cooks then in camp.

Monday, August 1st, I issued to the Regimental Commissary rations for the entire period of the tour of duty and as provided in Special Order No. 96, c. s. had personal supervision over all issues.

I wish to comment again upon the high order of the components of this ration, and the comparative components of the regular Army ration, and the slight difference in cost when milk and butter components are added to the Regular Army ration being more than offset by the satisfaction obtained. I would also respectfully call your attention to the fact that the cost of rationing a body of men for a short tour of duty in the field is at least 30 per cent greater than when the same men become acclimated to camp life.

The success of either ration depends entirely with the cooks and I would suggest that the greatest care and attention be paid to the selection and enlistment of same; also would suggest that the cooks be required to carefully study the "Manual for Army Cooks," in order that they may obtain the best results in handling the army ration at maneuver camps.

I would further suggest that the Regimental and Battalion commissaries make a careful study of the workings of their department and become more familiar with the paper work.

Following is a statement of the receipts and disbursements of this department during the year:

SURGEON GENERAL'S OFFICE.

PORTLAND, DEC. 24, 1909.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my annual report as Surgeon General for the year ending Dec. 15th, 1909.

During the year there was but one change in the personnel of the commissioned officers of the Medical Department, that being the resignation of Capt. James F. Hill and the appointment of a former sergeant, first class, of the Hospital Corps, Dr. John G. Towne of Waterville, as surgeon with the rank of First Lieutenant.

The annual tour of military duty of the Second Regiment, N. G. S. M., was held at the State camp grounds at Augusta, August 1st to 11th, 1909. In many respects the conditions that prevailed, from a sanitary point of view, were an improvement on those that have existed in any previous encampment of State troops in this State. Shower baths for the men were provided before the troops came into camp and proved not only a luxury but went far to promote good health and contentment among the men.

Kitchen sinks were established and owing to the character of the soil proved to be the easiest and most sanitary way to dispose of waste water.

The kitchens and mess houses were kept in as sanitary condition as possible under the circumstances and the general

policing of the camp was as good as an energetic inspecting officer was able to make it.

The second detachment of the Hospital Corps, N. G. S. M., was on duty at this encampment and considering the short time which they had to learn the drill and the duties of the Hospital Corps, they acquitted themselves with credit both to themselves and their instructors, Lieutenant John G. Towne and Sergeant, First Class, Edson E. Goodrich.

MEDICAL AND SURGICAL SUPPLIES AND OUTFIT.

Heretofore the Medical Department was largely fitted with a medical supply which was deemed adequate to care for the troops while in camp at Augusta on the State camp ground. These supplies were not in regulation chests or fit for transportation and were considered incomplete by the U. S. Inspecting Officer. Previous to the encampment this year, this department was provided with a complete outfit in accordance with the U. S. regulations for one Regimental Hospital. During the encampment a regimental hospital was established in the camp and did very satisfactory work.

The first detachment of the Hospital Corps accompanied the First Regiment, N. G. S. M., which was acting with the Coast Artillery at Portland harbor and which was stationed at four local forts at a considerable distance from each other requiring four medical outfits for the care and treatment of the men with whom they were stationed. These supplies were made up from such miscellaneous articles as we had in excess of our regulation outfit for one regiment and with the purchase of additional supplies, four regimental infirmaries were established at these points and under the command of Major Bial F. Bradbury, did capable and efficient service.

MEDICAL RESERVE CORPS.

Under The Military Law of 1909, there was created a Medical Reserve Corps for the purpose of conducting the physical examination of recruits, more particularly for such companies or other organizations so situated that the services of a commissioned officer of the Medical Department cannot be effectively available, and to render medical service to any organization called out by the Governor to suppress insurrections, riots or resistance to the laws.

Such officers have been appointed in different parts of the State and are apparently interested and enthusiastic in the work.

As soon as proper instruction books can be obtained, a school in military science as pertains to the Medical Department will be started and made progressive in character, commencing with the examination of the recruit and ending with sanitary science as pertains to camp hygiene.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

First:—I would earnestly recommend that both detachments of the Hospital Corps be furnished with proper quarters for their instruction and drill, as well as suitable individual lockers for the care and preservation of their clothing and other equipment which would be a saving to the State in the end, a condition which is woefully lacking. It is hard enough to keep a detachment of men together, of a mental caliber such as an efficient hospital corps man should be, under proper conditions and surroundings. It is doubly so when conveniences for drill instruction and recreation are wanting. This matter has been called to the attention of the department, in an unofficial manner on several occasions, but so far as I am informed nothing as yet has been done to remedy the condition. The efficiency of the corps demands it.

Second:—That a modern ambulance be supplied. The one on hand is archaic, incomplete and not suited to the use of one regiment.

Third:—That, if we are to supply the First Regiment with a medical outfit, as it is now divided into coast artillery companies, that at least two regimental infirmary outfits be obtained at once. This would give one to each large post and the two smaller posts could be supplied with detached service outfits already on hand.

Fourth:—That an effort be made to have the surgeons of the National Guard, while on duty with the Coast Artillery at the forts, participate with the regular surgeons in the working of the U. S. Medical Department at those posts. Every other department is taken in and shown the working of that department by the regulars. Why not the surgeon? The book work and reports are the points upon which we are weak. To my mind the post hospitals should be open to the surgeons of the guard and, under the direction of regular surgeons, both regulars and national guardsmen should be treated in the same post hospital.

Fifth:—That at the State camp grounds, if they are to continue to be used as such, the sinks which have been there since the State first used the grounds for that purpose, should be replaced by a sufficient number of incinerators to supply their places. Notwithstanding all the care and attention possible, these places are the breeding places of innumerable flies which, as is well known, carry infection and filth to the kitchens and mess houses. The result cannot but be obvious.

Sixth:—That the present system of kitchen and cookstoves should be abolished for the welfare of the Guard, and the regular cooking outfit of troops in camp or on the march be substituted. A man who may be an efficient cook on a cookstove may find himself a very poor one when he has a field equipment or Buzzocott outfit to deal with. Napoleon said, "An army fights on its belly." And that most important department of the commissary, the cooking, should be done in camp in the same way it would have to be done in the field, where household kitchens and cookstoves are not in existence. In that way the cooks would have some experience that would enable them to produce good results if ordered out for active duty. If unable to give the men well cooked and digestible food, the result is easily foreseen. Very many are sick from intestinal trouble and typhoid soon stalks through the camp. The expert riflemen who have cost the State thousands of dollars to train and equip are no better or rather not so good as so many farmers with pitchforks at the front, they are twenty miles in the rear perhaps in the hospital largely victims of the cooking of the inexperienced cook or cooks who never had any experience with the outfit provided for them.

If we are to retain the old kitchens, I recommend that they be thoroughly whitewashed just before each encampment and I repeat my former recommendation that the drop door or serving board be covered with zinc, which can be thoroughly cleaned, in place of the plain board now used which becomes foul from grease, etc.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my report as Judge Advocate General for the period covered from the date of my appointment, viz: January 7, 1909, to December 15, 1909, as follows:

While the new Military Law which went into effect July 3, 1909, was carefully prepared by an able board of revision, composed of officers of the National Guard under the efficient supervision of Captain Samuel T. Ansell, U. S. A., a West Point instructor, it nevertheless entailed a great deal of work first and last, on the part of The Adjutant General's Office, in which I rendered such assistance as I was able, as called upon from time to time during the session of the Seventy-fourth Legislature, to which the original draft was presented under the title, "An Act to Consolidate and Revise the Military Laws of the State of Maine."

As is usual in such cases, many changes were found to be necessary in order to make the bill satisfactory to the National Guard and to the committee on Military Affairs to which it was referred, and from which it was finally reported in a new draft, and enacted. The most important feature of the revision was that which brings the military laws of the State into harmony with the Federal military law, known prior to its passage as

the "Dick bill," and now commonly called the "Dick law." Many other changes were made, however, not suggested by the provisions of the "Dick law," that are entirely new and untried here, the wisdom of which, time and practical application alone will determine. I shall be surprised however if some additional legislation is not required at the hands of the next Legislature, in order to meet the practical demands of the military establishment of the State.

There have been no proceedings of court martial, court of inquiry or military court or board of any kind submitted to me, nor have I been called upon to act as judge advocate or recorder of any such court or board during the past year.

I have been required to rule upon quite a variety of military questions involving the application of military law, wherein my written opinions may be found upon the files of The Adjutant General's office.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF ORDNANCE.

BRUNSWICK, DECEMBER 12, 1909.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—In accordance with section 20, The Military Law, I have the honor to submit the report of the Ordnance Department of this State.

The vacancy made by the promotion of General Elliott C. Dill, who had been Chief of Ordnance, to be The Adjutant General, was filled by the appointment of Major John J. Dooley, Assistant Chief of Ordnance, to be Chief of Ordnance, and Capt. Gilbert M. Elliott, First Regiment Infantry, was selected by the Governor to be assistant Chief of Ordnance. A further change has been made by establishing the office of the Ordnance Department in Brunswick, and by requiring all correspondence with the Ordnance Department to be sent there direct. The Ordnance Department also receives requisitions for all Ordnance Department property and approves all issues to the Quartermaster General.

Later in the year, the record of small arms qualification which has always been kept in The Adjutant General's office was transferred to this department, and has since been compiled in card index form. The issue of qualification insignia has also been turned over to this department. It is hoped that during the coming year, issues of insignia will be made automatically, after the filing of the season's qualification returns by commanding officers of organizations.

An examination of the following tabulations will show in detail the results of small arms practice in the various organizations of the Guard, including the Naval Reserve. The "Report

of Small Arms Firing of the Troops of the State of Maine for the year 1909," made to the Chief of the Division of Militia Affairs under date December 11, 1909, shows the following with the Naval Reserve added:

Companies B and C, Second Infantry, are organizations not yet two years old. The other changes made in the Guard by G. O. No. 15, A. G. O., State of Maine, series 1908, have had the figure of merit of their former organization carried to their credit.

REVOLVER PRACTICE.

In this connection I desire to request your attention to the fact that revolver practice among officers of the Guard and enlisted men armed with the revolver is given very little attention. I find that only thirty-one officers, and of those one was a medical officer, qualified with the revolver, and of the others only seven had any practice, and so little that it was insufficient to qualify in any class. Of the combatant officers in all grades including the Naval Reserve, we have an efficiency of only 27 per cent. The enlisted men armed with the revolver for whom any revolver practice is reported is limited to the Color Sergeants, Second Infantry.

I recommend that the Revolver course under Special Course "C," Small Arms Manual 1909, be made mandatory on all officers, and the personal reports of officers, and the efficiency re-

ports of commanding officers contain the record of revolver, as well as of rifle qualification.

The detailed qualifications of the whole Guard will be found in Appendix A of this report.

COMPETITIONS.

The first competition of the year was the try-out for places on the State of Maine Rifle Team, held on the range of Company K, First Infantry, in Brunswick under G. O. No. 19, A. G. O. In response to that order seventy-two officers and men were recommended to the Chief of Ordnance, of whom forty-nine appeared on the range to take the test. As a competition from which to choose fifteen men who know how to handle their rifles under any conditions of light and wind and sun and rain, the time could not have been better chosen. After two days' hard shooting, those having the highest scores were reported to The Adjutant General for detail as the State of Maine Rifle Team, and they were detailed in G. O. No. 24 as follows:

This team represented the State of Maine in the New England Interstate Match of the New England Military Rifle Association on July 29 and 30, winning second place, with Massachusetts leading. The scores made will be found in Appendix B of

this report. The team had only a four-days' tour of duty, though the members of the team were allowed to attend individually to shoot through the other matches of the association.

This team also represented the State of Maine in the National Rifle Competition held at Camp Perry, Ohio, August 23, 24 and 25. With the amount of money we have to spend on rifle practice, and the time National guardsmen can devote to military affairs, Maine can never hope to be prominent in a class with the service teams; but in this year's matches the team acquitted itself with the same credit as in previous years, finishing eighteenth in a field of forty-eight teams. At the end of the 200- and 600-yard stages we were in twenty-first place, finishing 800 yards at the same station. The 1000-yard range brought us up a notch to twentieth place, the 200-yards rapid-fire gained us another place, and we finished one place higher after the skirmish run, ending with a score of 3548. The scores made by the team will be found in Appendix B of this report.

The team was kept in camp after the National Team Match in order that the members might shoot through the National Individual Match. That we had riflemen on our team is evidenced by the fact that Captain Daniel W. Wentworth, Assistant Inspector of Small Arms Practice, First Infantry, won sixth place, and Captain Moses P. Stiles of Company D, Second Infantry, won twenty-first place in a field of six hundred entries, Maine being the only New England Team that had two prize winners in the Individual Match. The scores of the team in detail appear in Appendix B.

The Second Regiment Team Match was held on the State Range in Augusta on August 6th, during the tour of duty in camp of the regiment. In spite of the fact that all the companies were in camp, two companies did not enter teams, though each shows a creditable figure of merit for the season's work. In connection with this subject, I think that all competitions should be held at the same time, and I would recommend that a "Camp of Instruction for Rifle Practice" be held late in the season during which all matches shall be held.

RANGES.

The range question is still unsettled. The new State range in Auburn will be ready for the season of 1910, and will accommodate the companies of Lewiston and Auburn, and will help companies that have not the long range required to qualify their experts. The organizations in Portland are dependent on a leased private range; Company D of the First has been without a range, and it would seem that the State should supply carfare to send the men to the range in Brunswick at least once in the season. Company G, First Regiment, has no range, and there has not yet been found a location for one. Company C, Second Infantry, of Livermore Falls, has a new range with firing points up to 1,000 yards. Company F, Second Infantry, of Dover, is still without a range, but with the possibility of acquiring one. Company L, Second Infantry, has a new range, built by the town, with all the stages to 1,000 yards. But all companies should have access to a range, and where it is impracticable or impossible to provide one, transportation should be provided for each officer and each enlisted man to visit a range at least once in the season. The efficiency of our Guard is dependent not only on how well the units can be handled, but also on how well the men can shoot; and it is in my opinion inexpedient to issue our expensive rifles to the troops, and not give them a chance to learn to do more than to execute the Manual. This has been, I know, the very earnest

desire of my predecessor for the last ten years; and I hope, with the federal government supplying some funds, that we may make a beginning toward its accomplishment.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I desire to make the following recommendations:

1. That a State rifle team be selected to represent the State in the Inter-State Match of the New England Military Rifle Association, and in the National Team Match.

2. That an increased ammunition allowance be made to organizations of the Guard, for all qualifications higher than Marksman.

3. That when an organization has no range, a money allowance for transportation to the nearest available range be made, no officer or man to have such allowance more than once in the season, and not more than forty dollars (\$40.00) be allowed to any organization. But no transportation allowance shall be made to any organization with which to help any member to qualify as Sharpshooter or Expert, until all have qualified as Marksmen.

4. That when the First Regiment Infantry is transferred to become the Coast Artillery Corps, Special Course "C" be prescribed for small arms practice in that corps.

5. That when the First Regiment Infantry becomes Coast Artillery the Inter-Regimental Match be abolished.

6. That all officers and all enlisted men armed with the revolver be required to practice with the arm.

7. That a "Camp of Instruction for Rifle Practice" be held in September and all competitions be held at that time.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report on our trip to Washington to attend the Inauguration of President Taft, March 4th, 1909.

SIR:—1. In accordance with the Commander-in-Chief's letter No. 8837 of July 31, 1909, I respectfully submit the following report in regard to the Naval Militia organization of the State of Maine.

2. The organization consisting of 3 officers and 55 enlisted men, reported on board this ship on July 25, 1909, and remained until August 1, 1909. The enlisted men belonged to the seaman branch, there being no artificer's or engineer's force with them. These men were divided among the five deck divisions and were given ship's numbers and gun numbers corresponding to ship numbers and gun numbers of men in the division to which they were assigned, care being taken that each man in the Naval Reserve should be given a number corresponding to the number of a man in this ship, it being desired that every man should learn as much as possible of the duties performed by the man in our regular ship's force whose number he held. In assigning the Naval Reserve to ship's numbers every care was exercised in selecting numbers held by the best men in this ship, who were directed to instruct the Naval Reserve in the various duties of his rating.

In addition to the instruction which the Naval Reserve men received from the enlisted men of this ship whose numbers they held, the officers of the divisions were instructed to drill them in the drills which were carried on during the period they were

on board this ship; this included mines and mining, torpedo practice, coaling ship, and instructions given at the battery in preparing for target practice. It is believed that these men became as proficient in these drills as the limited time would permit. The officers had blue and white service dress only; the crew blue dress and undress, and white undress. The men brought bags and hammocks and were assigned to a separate compartment for berthing and stowage of bags.

The officers were stationed in the divisions according to rank, and the senior officer in each division was directed to instruct each officer of the Naval Reserve in all their duties. The Naval Reserve Officers also stood watch on deck with the officers to whose divisions they were assigned.

3. Lieutenant Heseltine, the Commanding Officer of the Maine Naval Reserve, informed me that he believed his officers and men received as much instruction as the limited time they were on board permitted.

4. I am of the opinion that the best results can be obtained by stationing the officers and men of the Naval Militia, during their short period of time on board our ships, about the vessel just as they were during their recent cruise. In this way they are constantly under the supervision and being instructed by men who are familiar with the duties, and I believe much better results can be obtained in this way than by keeping them together as a separate organization.

SIR:—I have the honor to respectfully submit my report of the annual tour of duty of the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, from July 24th to August 2nd, 1909, in compliance to S. O. 81, A. G. O. July 13th, 1909.

Ensigns Weymouth and Doble and 55 men reported for duty Saturday p. m. and the Company proceeded by E. S. S. Co.'s steamer to Boston, Mass. Breakfast was served at 328 Atlantic Avenue and the Steamer "CAPE COD" was boarded for the trip to Provincetown, arriving at 1.30 p. m., lunch having been carried from Boston and served on board. The U. S. S. New Hampshire boats were in waiting and at 2.30 p. m. we were on board.

The men were immediately mustered and station billets issued, each member of the Naval Militia holding a duplicate billet with some member of the regular crew with whom he was to work the entire week. The men having been assigned to regular ship's messes and divisions, I can make no special report on the Ship's Company but will give a list of the work that was carried on throughout the week.

As Sunday is generally observed by the belaying of all unnecessary work the members of the Ship's Company strolled about getting acquainted with the ship and locating their running mate for the week.

Monday was given over to mine-laying practice, being carried on by the officers of the Ship, the Militia Officers observing and helping wherever possible. A night torpedo boat attack finished the day and kept everyone on the alert until hammocks.

Tuesday forenoon, more mine-laying and preparations for coaling ship. Started coaling at 1 p. m. and knocked off at 9 p. m.

Wednesday, continued coaling and finished at 5 p. m. Got underway and steamed out into Cape Cod Bay and anchored in fleet for another torpedo boat attack.

Thursday, record torpedo practice for the New Hampshire.

Friday forenoon, continued torpedo practice finishing at noon. During the afternoon the New Hampshire towed targets for the Mississippi's practice, which was continued through Saturday forenoon and early afternoon. Anchored in Provincetown Harbor at 4.30 p. m. Saturday. Saturday evening the crew of the Ship held a very enjoyable entertainment on the Forecastle, which was greatly enjoyed by over 1000 officers and men of the Fleet.

Embarked in Ship's boats at 1 p. m. Sunday and returned to Portland, via the Steamers CAPE COD and BAY STATE arriving in Portland August 2nd, 1909.

As the fleet was very much behind in their program, very little time could be given to the Naval Militia but I believe in mixing the men with the regular men, as was done this year, the Militia man can and will learn and absorb more knowledge of what to do and when to do it than he will in any other way. At all times, the Naval Militia men could be seen about the ship at some work under the eye of the trained men and while coaling a ship is not a very desirable or attractive job for men accustomed to shore work, the men of the command worked from start to finish and received hearty compliments from the officers and crew of the Ship.

I. The season for Small-arms Qualification Practice will begin April 19, 1909, and end October 31, 1909.

II. Commanding officers of companies and divisions will make monthly return of qualification practice, using the postal memorandum card therefor. Blank forms for the annual return will be sent out from this office prior to the close of the season and one copy will be forwarded to the Chief of Ordnance not later than November 10, 1909.

III. Qualification practice will be conducted in accordance with the 1908 revision of the Small Arms Firing Regulations for the United States Army and the Organized Militia, except as modified in General Orders. The 1908 revision has been issued to all organizations and all copies of previous editions will be at once returned to this office.

IV. Prior to permitting practice on the outdoor range, the commanding officer in charge will satisfy himself that it is in proper condition for use. If repairs are needed, or new equipment is necessary, he will at once furnish the Chief of Ordnance with a detailed statement of what is required and an estimate of expense likely to be incurred if repairs are to be made. The Chief of Ordnance will forward the same with his recommendations to the Adjutant-General. Frequent inspection of ranges is enjoined on commanding officers having charge of same, particularly after heavy storms. Prompt notification should be given when repairs are needed during the season, and an estimate of expense should always be included.

V. The season issue of rifle ammunition will be 5000 rounds to each company of infantry, with an additional issue of 1000 rounds to any company which prior to September 1st attains a figure of merit of 75.00 or better. Any company which on September 30th has attained a figure of merit of 100.00 or better will be entitled to an additional issue of 1000 rounds, and any company which does not attain a figure of 75.00 by September 1st but does attain a figure of 100.00 by September 30th will be entitled to an additional issue at that time of 2000 rounds. Each division of the Naval Reserve will be entitled to 3000 rounds of rifle ammunition, with an additional issue of 1000 rounds upon attaining a figure of merit of 85.00 prior to September 30th. Any officer or non-commissioned officer not attached to any company or division, who did not qualify above the grade of Marksman in 1908, shall be entitled to draw 100 rounds of rifle ammunition upon requisition, with an additional issue of 100 rounds upon certificate showing qualification in the grade of Marksman or better. Any such officer or man who in 1908 qualified as a Sharpshooter shall be entitled to an issue of 100 rounds of ammunition, with an additional issue of 100 rounds upon certificate of requalification as a Sharpshooter. Any such officer or man who in 1908 qualified as an Expert shall be entitled to an issue of 100 rounds of ammunition. Each requisition for ammunition under this paragraph must specify the grade of

qualification attained in 1908. To each commissioned officer and each enlisted man to whom the revolver is issued, upon requisition, 200 round of revolver ammunition.

VI. Before the beginning of the outdoor range season each commanding officer will ascertain that he has on hand a sufficient quantity of—

Ammunition.

Targets.

Target pasters.

Score cards for range use.

Loose pages for target record book.

Monthly postal returns of qualification practice.

Memorandum requisition blanks for qualification insignia.

VII. Complying with the provisions of Paragraph II of Circular No. 3, War Department, Division of Militia Affairs, Washington, February 26, 1909, those qualifying under Special Course "C" will receive insignia of the same pattern as the standard insignia issued to the Regular Army but made of bronze. But one medal for rifle qualification and one for revolver qualification will be worn and such medal will be the highest to which the wearer is entitled. In addition to the medals signifying qualification with the rifle or revolver, any member of the Guard may wear any medal won in any duly authorized company, battalion or regimental or any State or interstate military competition; but not more than three medals (including qualification insignia) indicative of excellence in small-arms practice will be worn at any one time.

VIII. Regimental inspectors of small-arms practice will at all times carry out the suggestions of the Chief of Ordnance relative to small-arms practice. They will secure such reports and make such returns as he may from time to time require, and upon matters which do not concern intervening headquarters they may correspond with him direct.

The non-commissioned officers of the organizations mentioned in paragraph III will be issued new warrants as non-commissioned officers of their respective grades in their respective companies (or band) in the Coast Artillery Corps, such warrants to date from January 1, 1910, and with date of rank as given in their present warrants. The Commanding Officer, Coast Artillery Corps, is charged with the issuance of these warrants which will be accomplished as soon as practicable after January 1st.

VI. Colonel Charles Collins, First Infantry, is assigned to command the Coast Artillery Corps.

VII. In accordance with the provisions of paragraph II the following officers of the Field and Staff, First Infantry, are hereby assigned to duty with the Coast Artillery Corps and will report not later than January 1, 1910, by letter to the Commanding Officer thereof:

Attention is called to paragraph II, Circular No. 10, War Department, Division of Militia Affairs, Washington, December 1, 1908, which is as follows:

"II. The Secretary of War having decided that campaign badges are a part of the uniform and that their issue to members of the Organized Militia entitled thereto and to wear the uniform, is authorized, instructions covering the requisition for the badges and their issue are prescribed as follows:

Campaign badges of the patterns in the office of the Quartermaster General of the Army will be issued to the Organized Militia upon requisitions submitted in the manner prescribed in paragraph 115, Militia Regulations, as amended by Circular No. 6, Division of Militia Affairs, September 5, 1908. These badges may be issued to officers and enlisted men on the active list of the Organized Militia of a State, Territory,

or the District of Columbia, who have had service as indicated in paragraph I, General Orders, No. 129, War Department, series of 1908.

A requisition for campaign badges for issue to the Organized Militia will be accompanied by the lists, in duplicate, of officers and enlisted men entitled to the same, as prescribed in paragraph 8, General Orders, No. 129, War Department, series of 1908. When these lists shall have been verified from the records of the War Department and duly approved, the badges will be sent by the Quartermaster General to the proper officers of the Organized Militia for distribution."

Commanding officers will at once ascertain if any officers or enlisted men of the command are entitled to campaign badges as indicated in paragraph I, General Orders, No. 129, War Department series of 1908, as follows:

"(a) Civil War campaign badge: For service in the Regular or Volunteer Army or in the Militia in the service of the United States during the Civil War between April 15, 1861, and April 9, 1865.

(b) Indian campaign badge: For service in the following-named campaigns against hostile Indians or in any serious action with hostile Indians in which there have been killed or wounded upon the side of the troops; decision to be made in each case of the latter class, upon individual application, whether the action concerned was such as to be properly considered serious within the meaning of the order:

In southern Oregon and Idaho and northern parts of California and Nevada, 1865-1868.

Against Cheyennes, Arapahoes, Kiowas, and Comanches in Kansas, Colorado, and Indian Territory, 1867, 1868, and 1869.

Modoc war, 1872 and 1873.

Against Apaches of Arizona, 1873.

Against Kiowas, Comanches, and Cheyennes in Kansas, Colorado, Texas, Indian Territory, and New Mexico, 1874 and 1875.

Against Northern Cheyennes and Sioux, 1876 and 1877.

Nez Percé war, 1877.

Bannock war, 1878.

Against Northern Cheyennes, 1878 and 1879.

Against Utes in Colorado and Utah, September, 1879, to November, 1880.

Against Apaches in Arizona and New Mexico, 1885 and 1886. The operations of officers and enlisted men who served with Troops C, E, F, and L, 3d Cavalry, from Fort Davis, Texas, and detachment of Troop M, 3d Cavalry, from Camp Peña Colorado, Texas, in June and July, 1885, in preventing hostile Apache Indians from entering the State of Texas, form part of their campaign.

Against Sioux in South Dakota, November, 1890, to January, 1891. The operations of the command of Lieutenant Colonel *Edwin V. Sumner*, 8th Cavalry, on the Cheyenne river, South Dakota, from November, 1890, until January, 1891, and of Troops F and G, 8th Cavalry, which proceeded from Fort Yates, North Dakota, to the camp of Sitting Bull at the time of the skirmish which resulted in the death of that Indian, form part of this campaign.

In such minor campaigns as involved marches, camps, and bivouacs by troops actually in the field and operating against hostile Indians.

The question of the issue of Indian campaign badges for service in campaigns other than those herein designated by name will, in each case, be decided on its merits, upon individual application.

(c) Spanish campaign badge: For service on the high seas *en route* to, or ashore in—

Cuba, between May 11, 1898, and July 17, 1898.

Porto Rico, between July 24, 1898, and August 13, 1898.

Philippine Islands, between June 30, 1898, and August 16, 1898.

(d) Philippine campaign badge: For service ashore in—

Philippine Islands, between February 4, 1899, and July 4, 1902.

Department of Mindanao, Philippine Islands, between February 4, 1899, and December 31, 1904.

In the following expeditions:

Against Pala and his followers, Jolo, Philippine Islands, April and May, 1905.

Against Datu Ali and his followers, Mindandao, Philippine Islands, October, 1905.

Against hostile Moros on Mount Bud-Dajo, Jolo, Philippine Islands, March, 1906.

The fact of service in any one of these three expeditions will be certified to by the commanding officer of the organization in which such service was rendered.

(e) China campaign badge: For service ashore in China with the Pekin Relief Expedition, between June 20, 1900, and May 27, 1901."

Only one Indian Campaign badge will be issued to an officer or an enlisted man, notwithstanding the fact that service may have been rendered in more than one Indian campaign.

Lists in duplicate of officers and enlisted men entitled to campaign badges will be forwarded through military channels to the Adjutant General. The lists will be made separately in the following form for each of the badges hereinbefore mentioned, officers to be named in order of rank, enlisted men to follow in alphabetical order.

Circular No. 1.

A careful perusal of the following suggestions will be found of service in conducting the season's practice on the outdoor range.

REQUALIFICATION OF EXPERTS.

Anyone who in the season of 1908 qualified as an Expert begins the season of 1909 with the assumed qualification of a Sharpshooter and when he has secured the required 40 out of 50 at 800 yards and 35 out of 50 at 1,000 yards will be classified as an Expert of 1909.

REQUALIFICATION OF SHARPSHOOTERS.

Anyone who in the season of 1908 qualified as a Sharpshooter begins the season of 1909 with the assumed qualification of a Marksman (120)

and when he has secured the required 40 out of 50 at 600 yards, at least 25 in two scores in timed fire at 200 yards and made a skirmish run sufficient to bring the total of his assumed and actual work up to 235 will be classified as a Sharpshooter of 1909.

OTHER REQUALIFICATION PRACTICE.

While the 800 and 1000 yard practice is all that is necessary for the requalification of Experts and the 600 yard slow fire, 200 yard timed fire and skirmish practice are all that is necessary for the requalification of Sharpshooters, Experts and Sharpshooters of 1908 may fire at other than the required ranges with the consent of their commanding officers. Commanding officers will note that much ammunition can be saved by confining the practice of requalifying Experts and Sharpshooters to the stipulated ranges, thus affording more ammunition for the less experienced members of the organization. It is suggested that each commanding officer endeavor to requalify at the earliest opportunity all his Experts and Sharpshooters, leaving to later in the season the question of allowing them further practice at the ranges not required for requalification.

INSIGNIA.

Any person becoming entitled to small-arms insignia of any sort during the season may secure the same by asking his commanding officer to make requisition therefor on Form 70. Such requisitions will be made on the first of each month for the qualifications of the preceding month. This applies to requalification as well as new qualification, so that anyone who by requalification becomes entitled to a three-years' bar in 1909 may secure the same in the month following his requalification. Commanding officers will find that interest may be stimulated by carefully going over the list of previous qualifications and calling the attention of the officers and men who can secure their three-year bars by requalification in 1909. It will require very little urging to get such men to the range when it is brought to their attention that a small amount of extra effort will give them a requalification bar. By making prompt requisition for small-arms insignia and presenting the same in the presence of the company on the next drill night, company commanders will find that there will be a greater desire for qualification in the higher classes.

QUALIFICATION REQUIREMENTS.

Though Special Course "C" has been in use in this State for five years there is now and then an indication in the annual returns of small-arms practice that its requirements are not fully understood. The practice required for requalification in the several classes is therefore recapitulated below:

Fourth-Class men—All who have not fired.

Third-Class Men—All who have fired but have failed to attain the Second class.

Second-Class Men—All who have fired two or more full scores of five shots each at 200, 300 and 500 yards and from the best two at each range have made a total of 67 out of a possible 150.

First-Class Men—All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards and from the best two have made a total of 83 out of a possible 150.

Marksmen—All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300 and 500 yards and from the best two have made a total of 98 out of 150.

Sharpshooters—All who have made at least 120 out of 150 at 200, 300 and 500 yards; at least 40 out of 50 in two scores at 600 yards; at least 25 out of 50 in two scores in timed fire (30 seconds to a score) at 200 yards; and one skirmish run; the total of all scores being not less than 235.

Experts—All who have made the score required for classification as a Sharpshooter and who have in addition made at least 40 out of 50 at 800 yards and 35 out of 50 at 1000 yards.

FIGURE OF MERIT.

Commanding officers will do well to keep their Figure of Merit checked up from month to month during the practice season, in order to be at all times conversant with the exact standing of their organizations.

The Figure of Merit is arrived at by multiplying every

- Expert by 200
- Sharpshooter by 150
- Marksmen by 100
- First-Classman by 75
- Second-Classman by 50
- Third-Classman by 10
- Fourth-Classman by 0

and dividing the sum of the results so attained by the total number of officers and men in the organization, carrying the division to two decimal places and increasing the last decimal by one if the remainder be more than half. The following example shows the method by which the Figure of Merit is secured for a company of 60 officers and men, which has qualified 5 as Experts, 10 as Sharpshooters, 20 as Marksmen, 3 as First-Classmen, 4 as Second-Classmen, 10 as Third-Classmen, and has 8 who have not fired:

THE POSSIBILITIES.

Some commanding officers seek to excuse a low figure of Merit on the ground that they do not have an opportunity for practice in the Expert and Sharpshooter grades. This is true only to a limited extent. A range limited to 200, 300, and 500 yards may be so utilized as to secure a Figure of Merit of 100, and the figure taken for an example in the foregoing illustration may be quite easily exceeded on a range limited to 200, 300, and 500 yards. If 40 men be qualified as Marksmen, 10 as First-Classmen, and the remaining 10 as Second-Classmen, the result will be as follows:

These two examples show the importance of making every member of an organization fire at 200, 300 and 500 yards. Every officer or man left in the Third or Fourth-Class at the end of the season is a dead weight on the other members of the organization. It is only by getting

every member above the Third-Class that the best results can be attained, and every organization that does so is assured a Figure of Merit of which it need not be ashamed.

INSTRUCTING NEW MEN.

Ammunition may be saved and a higher qualification attained if under experienced coaches, new men are given their first out-door practice at 500 yards so that they will have the advantage of the prone position. When they have accomplished satisfactory results at this range they may be taken to 300 yards and finally to 200 yards. In the prone position using the gunsling the man learns what the rifle will do if it is given a fair chance, but at 200 yards in the offhand position he is apt to attribute to the rifle a great many faults which should properly be charged to his personal account. When his own unconscious tendency to "pull off" results in a "two" at five o'clock he insists on taking left wind and more elevation. And when, in his erratic newness, he happens to throw up the piece on his next shot, the bullet goes high and wide to the left, missing the target altogether and absolutely convincing him that circumstances have conspired to give him the worst shooting rifle ever issued. It is the experience of every company inspector that it often takes a great deal of ammunition to get a new man past the 200 yard stage, and it is the testimony of all who have used the 500 yard method that men very quickly acquire confidence in the rifle when they find the bullets going where they hold. *But regardless of whether the recruit be started at 200 or 500 yards, he should never be permitted to go to the range save under the direction of an experienced coach, nor until he has had practice on the gallery range.*

With new men the first range practice should be watched with the utmost care and every effort made to correct the novice's errors in holding, sighting and pulling so that he will be able to round out a qualifying score and KNOW HOW HE DOES IT. There is a reason for every "off" and in short-range work the reason is never hard to find. Do not allow the beginner to lay it to the ammunition or poor light. Neither have sufficient effect to spoil the scores required for qualification on the short ranges. The trouble lies in the rifle or the riflemen. If you think it may be the rifle, try it yourself. Finding the rifle all right, you then know that the trouble lies with the man. WATCH HIM! Note whether he holds fairly steady. If he doesn't, coach him into a more comfortable position where he can take better advantage of the sling. If his hold seems to be satisfactory, study his method of sighting, getting him to tell you just what he sees and whether he keeps on looking as the piece is discharged. He may take a very good sight up to the exact instant of discharge, and then shut his eyes and yank the trigger. If this be the case, start him with the empty rifle and teach him to keep on pulling and looking till it is all over. When he can do that and is honest with himself and with you, he can tell whether he's close in, far out, or way off. If both the hold and the sighting seem satisfactory, but the score is not, study more closely

his method of pulling the trigger. You will probably have found and corrected this error, if it exists, while studying the question of holding, but if further investigation may disclose a tendency to exert more strength than is necessary, which will pull the muzzle down at the instant of discharge. Or there may be a tendency to do the last end of the pull in "double-time," so to speak, and this is very unsteady. At all times be careful that the novice keeps his sight plumb by the side-lines of the target.

If the instructor will observe all these points in his early coaching the novice will soon be calling his shots with certainty and, good or bad, will know where he is going. And a cold "three," called before the disc comes up, is far better than a bull when you have just told your shooting mate that you were "way out" when you pulled. It is understood that all of this instruction should have been imparted on the gallery range, but it will be found that men have difficulty in getting their feet under them outdoors, even after putting up excellent scores indoors. Careful heed to these suggestions will save ammunition and increase the Figure of Merit.

Circular No. 2.

The members of the National Guard of the State of Maine have no more sacred duty, no duty which will be more lovingly performed, than to honor the men who saved the stars and stripes of the flag beneath which the National Guard marches.

In this connection attention is especially directed to paragraph 246 of the Regulations for the National Guard which provides that "all organizations of the Guard may parade within the State, in uniform and under arms, on * * * * Memorial Day." Under this regulation commanding officers of National Guard organizations will place their commands at the disposal of the general committee of local posts of the Grand Army of the Republic on the day set apart for memorial services and will assist the veterans in doing honor to the patriotic dead.

In accordance with paragraph 444 of the Regulations for the United States Army, on all armories and stations of the National Guard, the national flag will be displayed at half-staff from sun-rise till mid-day on Memorial Day. At noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the staff and will remain there until sunset.

Stacked in the State House rotunda are the flags beneath which the

men of Maine fought during the Civil War and the literature of the Pine Tree State contains no more beautiful tribute than "The Returned Maine Battle Flags," written by Moses Owen, which is published herewith. It is fitting that this poem shall be brought to the attention of every member of the National Guard on the eve of Memorial Day.

Circular No. 3.

The following extract from War Department Circular No. 26, May 18, 1909, is hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

I. Circular No. 4, War Department, January 24, 1908, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

The following minimum visual requirements for recruits are announced and will supercede such requirements of the *Épitome of Tripler's Manual* as are in conflict therewith:

1. For the line of the Army and for the Signal Corps: 20-40 for the right eye and 20-100 for the left eye, provided that no organic disease exists in either eye.

a. Recruits may be accepted for the line of the Army when unable with the right eye to read correctly all of the letters on the 20-40 line, provided that they are able to read some of the letters on the 20-30 line.

2. For the Ordnance Department and for the Hospital Corps: 20-70 in each eye, correctible to 20-40 with glasses, provided that no organic disease exists in either eye.
