ANDROSCOGGIN.

STATE VS. GEORGE W. PERKINS AND JOHN F. PERKINS.

Charged with murder of Charles Almon Strout at Poland, on August 3, 1908; warrant issued Aug. 4, 1908; arrest made Aug. 4, 1908; arraigned Aug. 4, 1908, at Mechanic Falls before Frank A. Millett, trial justice; probable cause found against both respondents held without bail on charge of murder for appearance at September Term, 1908, of S. J. C. at Auburn; indictment charging each respondent with murder found at said September Term; arraigned on 9th day of term; plea not guilty as to each; Newell & Skelton appointed by court as counsel for John F. Perkins on 22nd day of term; on motion of respondents' counsel on 26th day of term cont. until January Term, 1909, by reason of illness of an important witness for the defense, both respondents being in court at the time motion was made and decided; trial at nisi prius begun Feb. 15, 1909; Verdict, Feb. 17, 1909, guilty of manslaughter as to each; sentence imposed Mar. 8, 1909, upon George W. Perkins, 8 years at hard labor in the state prison at Thomaston and upon John F. Perkins, 20 months at hard labor in Auburn jail; warrant of commitment as to each, Mar. 8, 1909.

As above indicated this crime was committed during the official term of my predecessor and in the closing weeks of his administration he had the case fully prepared for trial but on motion of respondents' counsel the case was continued until the January term, 1909.

A brief statement of the case may be found in the last biennial report of this department. The details of the homicide, as more fully developed by the testimony at nisi prius, disclosed that there had been some trouble between the respondents and the deceased not many days prior to the tragedy. In the morning of the day on which the shooting occurred the older respondent,

George W. Perkins, went to a neighboring store and bought some ammunition, telling the clerk that he wanted to shoot skunks, and other small animals, but before leaving the store remarked that if Almon Strout came around his premises he might use the ammunition for some other purpose. This occurrence was on Monday morning and in the late evening of the same day, the wife of the deceased, then alone at home, was frightened by the noise of guns and of stones thrown against the house, as she claimed. In great agitation she ran to the home of a neighbor and in doing so was obliged to pass the house occupied by the respondents. During her absence her husband returned and hearing voices from the neighbor's house went there, preceded by his hired man. After a few moments stay at the house of the neighbor, Mr. Strout, accompanied by his wife and hired man, started toward home and just before reaching the house occupied by the two respondents the latter both came out of their doorvard and all met in the highway. According to the witnesses in behalf of the state, the father, George W. Perkins, said to his son, John F. Perkins, "Shoot, John," whereupon the son, who held a shot gun in his hand, fired the same at short range and inflicted a wound upon Strout which resulted in practically instantaneous death. At the trial the respondents admitted the shooting, but claimed that the same was the result of an accident, saying that the younger respondent, as he saw Strout approach, started to run and in doing so fell and, as he was rising, the gun was accidentally discharged. As the son was shown to be the person who did the shooting the degree of his crime fixed that of the father. Many neighbors, including prominent men of the community, testified to the good character and peaceable nature of the son who was a young man still in his minority. Much sympathy in his behalf was aroused which undoubtedly influenced the jury in their finding of the verdict. Both father and son were declared to be guilty of manslaughter and in rendering that verdict the jury, through the foreman, recommended extreme leniency for the younger respondent. The case had been well prepared for trial by the county attorney to whom much credit is due for the result in favor of the State.

AROOSTOOK.

STATE VS. PATRICK McDonald.

Charged with the killing of Ernest Day at Fort Fairfield. The assault occurred on Oct. 6, 1908, and death resulted Oct. 7, 1908; respondent first arraigned on the charge of assault with intent to kill; warrant issued Nov. 4, 1908, charging murder; same day respondent arrested; arraigned at Fort Fairfield before Nicholas Fessenden, trial justice, Nov. 5, 1908; plea, not guilty; trial justice found "proof not evident"—"presumption not great"—but found probable cause and held respondent for his appearance at the April Term of the S. J. C. 1909, at Houlton; bail fixed at \$8000; bail furnished; respondent released under bail; indictment returned April Term, 1909, S. J. C. charging manslaughter; trial April 16, 1909, before Whitehouse J. Verdict "not guilty."

Respondent and deceased were both about twenty-two years of age, and lived approximately two miles apart on what is known as the East Limestone road. The deceased, according to the testimony, was a man addicted to the use of liquor and when under its influence was inclined to be quarrelsome and being of great strength was feared by those who knew his power and disposition. In the middle of August prior to the homicide both parties were at a veteran's reunion at Limestone and upon this occasion the deceased was much intoxicated and was arrested. While under arrest the deceased made threats against the life of the respondent alleging that the respondent's team had been used in conveying him to the lockup. These threats were several times repeated. On the morning of the assault the deceased was proceeding in a northerly direction on the East Limestone road when he was met by the respondent, who held in his hand a pocket knife having a long sharp blade with which he had been whittling. With threatening language the deceased attacked the respondent violently and according to the testimony was overpowering him when the latter, claiming that he feared for his life, stabbed his assailant in the abdomen from which wound death ensued as above stated. The nearest eye witnesses of the

assault were the mother and sister of the deceased but they were at so great a distance that they could not clearly distinguish just what happened. Almost immediately after the assault the father of the deceased hearing the outcry came upon the scene and to him the respondent showed the knife and told him what he had done. The respondent also went directly to the nearest neighbor, told his story and asked that neighbor to give attention to the man who had been stabbed. At a later period in the same day the respondent went to an officer, gave him the knife, and offered to give himself up for detention. At this time an arrest was made on a charge of assault with intent to kill and on this charge the respondent was held under small bail. Nearly a month after the death of Day another warrant was sworn out charging the respondent with murder. The finding of the magistrate is stated above. The grand jury returned an indictment charging manslaughter only and upon this lesser charge the respondent went to trial April 16th. He pleaded not guilty and invoked the law of self defense. The trial was very brief, occupying only one day, and the jury evidently satisfied that the respondent repelled the attack of his assailant with only such force as was appropriate in kind and sufficient in degree, returned a verdict of not guilty.

STATE VS. CHARLES R. FRIEL AND ELLIS BLACK.

Charged with the murder of John Friel at Amity, Nov. 1, 1909; warrant issued Nov. 4, 1909, arrest upon same date, and on same date arraigned at Houlton before S. S. Thornton, Trial Justice; respondent Friel charged with murder, respondent Black charged with aiding and abetting respondent Friel in committing murder; plea of each, not guilty; probable cause as to each found and held for April Term, 1910, of the Supreme Judical Court at Houlton; indictment found at said term charging respondent Friel with murder, indictment found charging respondent Black with aiding and abetting in the same; April term six d. 1910, each respondent arraigned; plea not guilty as to each; 12 d. trial as to Charles R. Friel. verdict of guilty (April 12, 1910); motion for new trial filed; motion overruled; appeal filed 16 d., exceptions filed and allowed; as to respondent Ellis Black, April term 1910 14 d. plea of not guilty retracted; plea entered, guilty of accessory before the fact to the crime of manslaughter; 15 d. sentenced to be imprisoned at the State Prison at Thomaston for the term of five years at hard labor; mittimus issued April 22, 1910, warrant of commitment issued April 22, 1910.

The scene of this homicide was in the eastern portion of the town of Amity and within a few feet of the eastern line of the state. At this point lived Charles Friel who was a brother of the deceased and an uncle of Charles R. Friel, one of the respondents. The house of Charles Friel was a few rods from the highway and between it and the highway was a small building which was then occupied as a tenement by Patrick McIntosh and his wife. On Sunday evening, Oct. 31, 1909, Mr. McIntosh and his wife were at home but Charles Friel was away with his wife. During that evening there assembled at the McIntosh house John Friel, deceased, and the two respondents. The latter brought with them a turkey which they requested Mrs. McIntosh to cook for supper to which all were invited that night. During the progress of the supper liquor was used and later an additional supply of the same obtained. Before the supper was served Charles Friel, uncle of the respondent, with his wife returned home and joined the party at the McIntosh house. All appeared to have partaken of the liquor except the women and after a while Charles Friel and his wife went to their home a short distance from the McIntosh house.

Trouble arose between those who were left at the McIntosh house and in the noise and uproar which followed Charles Friel and his wife were aroused and came down to the McIntosh house where they found the deceased, John Friel, engaged in a fight with Charles R. Friel. The combatants were separated and the two respondents took the team which belonged to Charles R. Friel and went away. It appears that Charles Friel and the deceased ordered the two respondents to depart and there was some evidence tending to show that the respondents were pursued for a distance by Charles Friel and the deceased. The re-

spondents drove quite a distance to the house of another neighbor, Leslie Knapp, where Charles R. Friel inquired for a rifle and upon being asked what he wanted to do with it said that he intended to shoot John Friel if he did not come out and fight fair and added that if Charles Friel interfered they would bleach him. The rifle was not obtained at Mr. Knapp's and the respondents then drove to the house of John McCluskey who was a cousin of Charles R. Friel and there obtained a rifle and cartridges. The rifle was of the type known as the Winchester 32 Both respondents then returned to the scene of the original trouble having been gone from half an hour to an hour. The time was then the early morning of November first. The witnesses fixed the hour as being between three and four o'clock in the morning. Witnesses for the state testified that Charles R. Friel then shouted to the inmates of Charles Friel's house saying that they were ready for them. The respondent Black, according to the testimony of the State's witnesses, was heard to urge Charles R. Friel to shoot and presently the deceased came out of the Charles Friel house followed immediately by Charles Friel. The rifle was discharged three times, two of the bullets lodging in the house of Charles Friel and the third piercing the body of John Friel wounding him so fatally that he died as a result of the wounds on Wednesday, November third. witnesses testified to finding Charles R. Friel standing in the highway with a rifle in his hand and admitting that he had shot his uncle John Friel. After the shooting the two respondents left the scene and at the suggestion of one of the women went to the telephone and called the doctor.

The respondent Charles Friel was first placed on trial and introduced evidence tending to show that his act was done in self defense claiming that the first two shots were fired merely to frighten the deceased but as the deceased approached him in an angry, threatening manner, and, as the respondent claimed, armed with stones and a stick, the third shot was fired which proved fatal, respondent admitting that this shot he fired with the intent to hit. In opposition to this the state offered evidence showing that the claim of the respondent was not founded in fact and after due deliberation the jury rendered a verdict of guilty of murder.

Thereupon, the respondent Black who had been indicted as an accessory to the claim of murder expressed his desire to withdraw his plea and plead guilty to being accessory to manslaughter. The whole affair seemed to have grown out of a drunken row and the wicked impulses which generally follow such a condition of affairs, and feeling that the moral turpitude with respect to the act of Black would hardly warrant imprisonment for life, the State accepted the plea tendered by Black and he was sentenced to five years at hard labor in the State Prison at Thomaston. Council for Friel filed a motion for a new trial which was overruled and appeal was taken from that ruling to the full court.

Counsel for Friel filed exceptions and the same having been allowed the appeal and bill of exceptions were fully argued at the December Term of the Law Court held in Augusta in 1910. When the copy for this report goes to the printers no decision has been received as to the appeal or bill of exceptions.

FRANKLIN.

STATE VS. CHARLES A. WILSON.

Charged with the murder of Leroy A. Brackley at Industry, Mar. 19, 1904. Warrant issued Mar. 22, 1904; same date prisoner arraigned before A. L. Fenderson, Judge of Municipal Court at Farmington; respondent held on charge of murder without bail for appearance at May T., S. J. C. at Farmington; indictment found at Sept. T. 1904, charging murder; trial May 24, 1909, before Cornish J. verdict, guilty of manslaughter.

It will be seen that the homicide in this case was committed in 1904 and that the respondent was committed to jail without bail in March 1904. While confined at the county jail at Farmington he escaped and was not apprehended until the spring of 1909 when he was discovered to be in a Western state and was brought back to Maine for trial on extradition proceedings.

The testimony in the case disclosed the fact that the respondent and the deceased, together with an aged gentleman, who

died between the time of the homicide and the time of trial, started out on the 19th of March 1904 to obtain some hard cider for tippling purposes. During the earlier part of the same day they had drank quite heavily of intoxicating liquor and having obtained the cider which they sought, drank heavily of that also. The result was a frenzied state of intoxication on the part of the two younger men and drunken stupor on the part of the old About supper time the trio returned to the house where the deceased and the old man lived together, the only other occupant of the house being the young wife of the deceased. Soon after their arrival trouble began and according to the weight of the evidence the deceased became very violent and was trying to destroy the household furniture and to injure the walls and windows of the house. The respondent claimed that he was simply attempting to defend himself with a revolver from an impending attack by the deceased and that in so doing he fired three shots which were fatal. The witnesses on the part of the state claimed that there was no self defense about it: that after the deceased had desisted from his violent conduct in the house he went out of doors, laid down the shovel with which he had been destroying things, returned to the house and while entering the door was shot twice without provocation and when he turned to run received the third shot in the back. After the shooting the respondent went some distance to a store for the purpose, as he claimed, of giving himself up to the officers. News of the trouble preceded him and upon entering the store he was promptly arrested, overpowered, relieved of the revolver which he was still carrying and taken to the Farmington jail. On his way to the jail he made several statements boasting of his skill as a marksman and that he fired at the deceased with the intent to Under all these circumstances the grand jury evidently felt justified in returning an indictment for murder. As the case developed at the trial the traverse jury evidently felt that the moral turpitude surrounding a case of murder was wanting in the evidence and that the whole affair arose rather from an excited condition of mind and that the shooting was upon sudden provocation; hence a verdict of manslaughter upon which a sentence was imposed of seven years at hard labor in the State Prison at Thomaston.

KNOX.

STATE VS. FRED JAMES.

Charged with the murder of his infant child, Agnes James, at Thomaston, on November 24th, 1909; no arraignment before lower court; arrest made on capias issued upon indictment which was found at the January term of the Supreme Judical Court, 1910; at said term respondent arraigned, pleaded not guilty; on motion of counsel for respondent case continued until April term 1910; at the latter term on motion of the state case was again continued and respondent was admitted to bail on his own recognizance.

The respondent in this case was a resident of Thomaston where he had resided less than a year before the charge made in the indictment, having come to Thomaston with his wife, and at the time of their arrival at Thomaston they had no children. The respondent, while not being a regular physician, claimed to have some powers of healing by rubbing and other means and was commonly spoken of in the community as Dr. James. On Thursday, Nov. 18th, a female child was born to Mrs. James to whom was given the name of Agnes. According to the testimony of neighbors the child was a healthy one at birth and continued to be so until the morning of Tuesday, November 23rd, when she was found to be suffering from carbolic acid poisoning. A physician was called but the child gradually grew worse and died. The coroner was notified, an autopsy ordered, and the medical examiner for Knox County gave certificate that the death was caused by the administration of a fatal dose of carbolic acid. About that time the mother was taken sick with a disease which proved to be scarlet fever and the house, with its inmates, was guarantined for a time so that no immediate action was taken toward instituting a criminal process. The testimony surrounding the case was laid before the grand jury and that body indicted Dr. James, charging him with the murder of his child. It appeared that during the time when the poison must have been administered there were four, and only four, persons who came in contact with the child, namely, its father and mother, a neighbor by the name of Mrs. Nettie Crouse and a young girl who worked for Mrs. James by the name of Annabelle Curtis. While it seemed certain to the state that the child died as a result of carbolic acid poisoning yet a careful and critical examination and weighing of the evidence did not satisfy the authorities that they could remove from the minds of the jury every reasonable doubt as to whether the poison was administered feloniously or not, or whether it was administered by the respondent or by some other person. It was not deemed wise to put the respondent to his trial and so at the April term of the Supreme Court he was allowed to depart on his own recognizance.

KNOX.

STATE VS. SADIE NEWBERT.

Charged with the murder of her husband, Fremont Newbert, at Thomaston, November 15, 1909; no arraignment before lower court; arrest made on capias issued upon indictment which was found at the January term of the Supreme Judical Court 1910; at said term respondent was arraigned, pleaded not guilty; on motion of counsel for respondent case continued until April term 1910; at the latter term on the sixth day of the term case submitted to a jury which returned a verdict of guilty; motion for new trial filed, motion overruled; respondent appeals to next law term.

Respondent in this case was charged with having administered a fatal dose of poison to her husband, Fremont Newbert, on Monday, November 15th, 1909, upon which date the husband died, death having occurred, as the state claimed, within less than half an hour after the poison was given. Mr. and Mrs. Newbert were people in the humbler walks of life, Mr. Newbert being rather weak physically and mentally and older in years than his wife. She supported both herself and husband by doing washings and scrub work and was necessarily away from her home much of the time during working hours. They resided in a small upper tenement on a street which was in the rear of and parallel to the principal business street of the vil-

lage of Thomaston. The state claimed that Mrs. Newbert had received attentions from a young man living in Thomaston and that her desire to be rid of her husband was the cause of her act. On the day of her husband's death the respondent had been at work in Rockland and her husband remained at home. According to the testimony in the case it appeared that Mrs. Newbert returned home in the latter part of Monday afternoon and began the task of preparing supper for her husband. According to her story she prepared a supper consisting largely of canned baked beans. She said to neighbors that her husband refused to eat the beans after she had prepared them and that soon after he had refused to eat he grew sick and soon died. During the brief time of his illness neighbors heard groans and other signs of distress and came to offer assistance. Finally a physician was called but before he arrived Mr. Newbert was dead. A coroner was called and for some reason a death certificate was given indicating that the cause of death was a disease for which Mr. Newbert had been formerly treated. The remains were buried but rumors soon reached the ears of the authorities which seemed to warrant a more searching investigation. The body of Mr. Newbert was exhumed and the stomach and other parts of the body removed and sent to Prof. F. C. Robinson at Bowdoin College for examination. In the meantime it was ascertained where Mrs. Newbert had bought strychnine just previous to the death of Mr. Newbert and the fact was also ascertained that she had tried to buy strychnine in other places. Before the beginning of the April term of court, at which the case was tried. Prof. Robinson was seized with a severe illness and just before the opening of the April term of court the state learned that Prof. Robinson's testimony would be unavailable. Feeling that the case demanded still more vigorous handling the body of Mr. Newbert was exhumed a second time. Parts of the small intestines and some other portions of the body were removed and sent to Prof. Marshall P. Cram, of Bowdoin College, who made a careful examination and reported not only the presence of strychnine but also partially digested beans. The county attorney then redoubled his energy and accumulated evidence of a circumstantial nature which pointed very directly toward the guilt of the accused. The respondent was ably defended by an attorney of long and varied experience, not only in the general practice of law, but especially in the prosecution and defense of homicides. After a careful consideration of the evidence, and after having been fully instructed as to the law governing such cases, the jury returned a verdict of guilty. Counsel for respondent then filed the customary motion for a new trial which was overruled and from that ruling an appeal was taken to the Law Court. The report of the testimony was not printed by respondent's counsel and at the sitting of the December term of the Law Court at Augusta, 1910, no one appeared for the appellant and the appeal was dismissed. At the term of the Supreme Court held in Knox County, Jan. 11, 1911, the respondent was sentenced to life imprisonment at hard labor in the state prison at Thomaston.

OXFORD.

STATE VS. CARMELO PUIIA.

Charged with the killing of Charles Bombush at Rumford. The assault occurred on Saturday, September 24, 1910, and Bombush died at once from a bullet wound; respondent arraigned at Rumford before Aretas E. Stearns, Judge of Rumford Municipal Court, on the charge of murder; arraignment September 26, 1910; plea, not guilty; Municipal Justice found probable cause and held respondent without bail for his appearance at the October term of the Supreme Judical Court, 1910, at South Paris; indictment returned October Term, 1910, S. J. C., charging murder. On the 6th day of the Term, October 17, respondent arraigned. Plea, guilty of manslaughter. Plea accepted. Tenth day, October 21, sentenced to six years in the State Prison.

Respondent and deceased were young men, residents of Rumford for several years, and both employees of the Oxford Paper Mill at Rumford Falls, the respondent being a sweeper and the deceased an oiler. Their work brought them together frequently and a condition of enmity existed between them, the respondent claiming that he was afraid of violence at the hands of the deceased. In the mill, lockers were furnished the men in which they kept their street clothing when at work. In his locker

Puiia had a revolver and he claimed that on the afternoon of the homicide, Bombush had assaulted him by striking him over the head with a heavy oil can, inflicting a scalp wound which bled quite freely. This assault occurred without witnesses. Puiia reported the trouble to the foreman a few minutes later, while blood was still flowing from a scalp wound on his head. The foreman suggested that Puiia wash his head, change his clothes and go home. Then the foreman started in search of Bombush and overtook him, as Bombush neared the locker where Puiia stood. When Puiia saw Bombush coming toward him he fired three shots, one of which proved fatal, claiming that he thought Bombush was about to renew the assault, and that the shooting was in self defense.

OXFORD.

STATE VS. GUISEPPE PIETRANTONIO.

Charged with the killing of Vincenzo Catenacci at Wilson's Mills in Lincoln Plantation, on Monday, June 13, 1910. assault occurred in front of an Italian store and boarding house on the works of the Androscoggin Reservoir Company, and Catenacci died of a knife wound, in the apartment of the surgeon of the company residing at the grounds, about two hours after the assault. The respondent was at once arrested; arraigned on the charge of murder on June 14, 1910, before Allen W. Linnell, Trial Justice; plea, not guilty; probable cause found and respondent held without bail for his appearance at the October Term of the Supreme Judical Court at South Paris: indictment returned October Term, 1910, S. J. C., charging murder. On the sixth day of the Term, October 17, respondent arraigned. Plea, guilty of manslaughter. Plea accepted. Tenth day, October 21, sentenced to eight years in the State Prison.

The parties in this tragedy were laborers of the Androscoggin Reservoir Company employed upon the construction of the Reservoir dam at Aziscoos Falls, in Lincoln Plantation, Oxford County, and the entire evidence in the case was given by Italians, none of whom could understand or speak English. The

respondent was the brother of the proprietor of a boarding house and store whose patrons were Italians. At this store intoxicating beers and whiskey were sold to the workmen. There was evidence of a serious dispute between the deceased and the friends of the respondent on the Sunday prior to the stabbing. The following day was a day celebrated as a holiday in Italy and many of the workmen refrained from labor on this holiday and spent the day idling about the works and this store. In the early evening, the respondent aroused the ire of the proprietor of the store by uncomplimentary remarks woven into songs which he was delivering in front of the store and he and the proprietor had a personal encounter in which blows were dealt with a large stock of wood that the deceased held at the beginning of the collision. The respondent, Guiseppe Pietrantonio, brother of the proprietor of the store, rushed out to aid his brother, and in the melee the deceased received stab wounds in the back and arm and a slashing cut in the abdomen which were the cause of his death. Although Italians were present in the space in front of the store, no clear evidence could be deduced, showing the motive for the assault nor could any satisfactory story be wrung from them as to how the affray arose and continued. It seemed well to accept the plea of guilty of manslaughter and the Justice presiding, after listening to the evidence, awarded sentence as given above.

PENOBSCOT.

STATE VS. ELLA F. HUTCHINSON.

Charged with murder of her infant daughter, Sadie Belle Hutchinson, at Bangor, Maine, on March 16th, 1909; warrant issued March 17, 1909, guard placed over the house; was not formally arrested until March 27, 1909; arraigned March 27, 1909, before the Bangor Municipal Court; held without bail on charge of murder for appearance at the August term of 1909 at Bangor; April 6, 1909, by order of court, Mrs. Hutchinson was ordered to the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital for observation; at the August term of court, the physican in charge was not ready to report; nothing was done at the August term of court; at the February term, 1910, the Grand Jury, after listening to the evidence, reported no indictment by reason of insanity.

This crime was committed the afternoon of March 16th, 1909 at the home of the Hutchinsons, 23 Spring Street, in the City of Bangor. The Hutchinsons had been married about two years and had but one child which was four months old at the time of the murder. Mrs. Hutchinson had evidently been extremely jealous of her husband, Claude H. Hutchinson, for some time past and their relations had not been very pleasant. Mr. Hutchinson had been drinking quite heavily some time prior to the tragedy and a few months previous thereto they had a family quarrel in which Mr. Hutchinson inflicted a slight flesh wound over the eye of the respondent. She petitioned the Bangor Municipal Court at that time for support pending a divorce libel. This matter was adjusted and they lived together again. They had thus lived about a month when, on the sixteenth of March, she wrote a note to the effect that she knew her husband was untrue to her but that she still loved him. She pinned this note to the dining-room table cloth and, after dressing the baby very carefully, she drew a razor twice across the baby's neck. She also gave the baby a bi-chloride of mercury tablet, since analysis showed the presence of mercury on the baby's clothing which she wrapped around its neck. Having also swallowed two tablets of bi-chloride of mercury, she then went to the cellar where she was found by Mr. Charles Gibbs, who was called in by Mr. Hutchinson. It was evident that she took an overdose of the poison and Dr. King, who had been summoned, brought her to consciousness. There was a slight wound on Mrs. Hutchinson's throat where she had evidently attempted to commit suicide with some weapon or instrument but her courage had evidently failed her. At the hospital where Mrs. Hutchinson was incarcerated, she refused to talk to anyone, even her own counsel, and she afterwards became violently insane. When the evidence touching the case was presented to the Grand Jury, that body made return that no indictment was found by reason of the insanity of the respondent at the time of the act. Commitment to the insane hospital was made in accordance with the provisions of statute.

SOMERSET.

STATE VS IVORY E. BUZZELL.

Charged with the murder of his father, John Buzzell, at Skowhegan on Dec. 11, 1909; warrant issued Dec. 11, 1909, arrest made same day; arraigned Dec. 13, 1909, at Skowhegan in the Western Somerset Municipal Court, probable cause found and respondent held without bail on the charge of murder for appearance at the Dec. Term 1909 of S. J. C. at Skowhegan; indictment found at said term charging respondent with murder; by this indictment respondent was named as Ivory C. Buzzell; attorneys for respondent gave notice that plea of insanity would be made, and the respondent was committed to the care of the superintendent of the Insane Hospital at Augusta as provided by statute; new indictment found at the March term 1910, naming the respondent Ivory E. Buzzell, upon this indictment; respondent was tried at the Sept. term 1910 S. J. C., his plea being "not guilty by reason of insanity;" convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to fifteen years at hard labor in the state prison at Thomaston; date of sentence Sept. 29, 1910; warrant of commitment issued Sept. 30, 1910.

This was a case of parricide. The respondent and his father had lived together, without any other inmates of their home, for many years. Both father and son were regarded by the neighbors as somewhat unusual in their disposition and the son especially refrained almost wholly from mingling with others in society or even in neighborhood courtesies. On the day of the shooting James Barrett was driving by the Buzzell house about three o'clock in the afternoon when the respondent came out of the house, called him and wanted him to telephone to Skowhegan for a coroner. The respondent was asked what the matter was and was told that his father was dead, and added that it was a case of homicide. Deputy Sheriff Richard H. Harris was immediately notified and with Alton Goodrich, Scott Lord and Fred Holt went to the Buzzell house. Upon their arrival the respondent came to the door and being interrogated told the officer that his father was dead; on being further interrogated as to how it happened the respondent said that it happened from a

gun. Harris and Lord went into the house and discovered the body of the father lying on the kitchen floor cold in death. The respondent was disposed to be talkative and told the officer that he and his father had some trouble and that he shot his father. He further volunteered the information that during the forenoon his father was out in the door yard and that the respondent was at a window in the upper story of the house. According to further statements of the respondent some vulgar conversation took place and following this conversation the father came into the house and ascended the stairs to the room where the respon-The respondent claimed that the father was armed with a slungshot and tried to strike the respondent; that he and his father clinched and that finally the father broke away and started downstairs whereupon the respondent said he seized a gun standing near him and shot his father in the back. Later the respondent told others how he lingered around the house from the middle of the forenoon until the middle of the afternoon. when he called on Barrett who was passing by, and told of his feelings as he saw his father dead upon the floor. By various bits of circumstantial testimony added to the voluntary confessions of the respondent, the state went to trial, the respondent through his counsel claiming that he was not guilty of the crime of homicide because of insanity. The testimony of the medical experts was overwhelmingly against the contentions of the respondent, so that the plea of insanity availed him nothing. The state urged upon the jury that there was sufficient time for premeditation between the moment when the father and son broke away from the scuffle and the time when the son seized the gun and shot his father. The respondent through his counsel strenuously urged that all was done in a heat of passion and without malice aforethought. Under all the circumstances it appeared to the state that the jury were moved upon by sentiments of sympathy to an extent beyond that which the evidence would justify for after a long deliberation a verdict was announced of guilty of manslaughter. The preparation of the case by the sheriff and the county attorney was complete and acknowledgment is hereby made to those officers for the able assistance which they rendered in the case.

WALDO.

STATE VS. IRA S. GRADY.

Charge, murder of Harriett A. Thomas, at Belfast, February 21, 1910; arrested February 21, 1910; warrant issued Feb. 22, 1910; arraigned Feb. 26, 1910, at Belfast before R. W. Rogers, Esq., Judge of the Police Court; probable cause found and respondent held without bail on charge of murder for appearance at April T. 1910, S. J. Court at Belfast; indictment charging murder found at said April T.; arraigned on eighth day of term; plea, not guilty; J. S. Harriman, Esq., appointed by the Court as counsel for respondent; trial begun May 2, 1910, verdict, May 6, 1910, "not guilty."

In the evening of February 21, 1910, at the alarm given by Sydney E. Bennett, Mrs. Harriett A. Thomas was found in her tenement, on Cross Street, in the city of Belfast, unconscious and bleeding from an incised wound in her left breast. Removed to the local hospital, Mrs. Thomas died just before midnight without revealing any of the history of the tragedy that had taken place.

Bennett and Ira S. Grady, who had been with Mrs. Thomas during the evening were at once arrested, Grady being found dressed, except his coats, lying in a drunken stupor on a bed in a chamber of the Commercial House.

In his overcoat pocket was found a two-bladed pocket-knife, upon the smaller blade of which were stains that looked like blood stains.

This knife was taken to the hospital and laid on the wound of Mrs. Thomas before she expired, and its weight as evidence thereby reduced to its lowest terms.

From the evidence of Bennett and Grady at the trial it appeared that neither could give a credible account of the events of the fatal night and the jury after three hours deliberation brought in a verdict of not guilty.

STATE VS. SYDNEY E. BENNETT.

Charge, murder of Harriet A. Thomas, at Belfast, February 21, 1910; arrested February 22, 1910; warrant issued February 22, 1910; arraigned February 25, 1910, at Belfast before R. W. Rogers, Esq., Judge of the Belfast Police Court; probable cause found and respondent held without bail on charge of murder for appearance at April T. 1910, S. J. Court at Belfast; indictment charging murder found at said April T.; arraigned on the eighth day of term; plea, not guilty.

The entire evidence in this case was taken out in the trial of Ira S. Grady at the April term at Belfast, and it appearing that the state could not produce evidence to convict Bennett, upon motion of the state the charge of murder was nol prossed at the April term, the court fixing bail in the sum of \$500, for Bennett's appearance at the September term. At the September term S. J. C., at Belfast the charge against Sydney E. Bennett was nol prossed and respondent discharged.

YORK.

STATE VS. FRED F. RANKIN.

Charged with the killing of Delia Littlefield at Kennebunk, July 7, 1909; warrant issued July 19, 1909; arrest made July 19, 1909; arraigned July 19, 1909, at Kennebunk before Addison E. Haley, Trial Justice; respondent charged with manslaughter; plea, not guilty, probable cause found and respondent held for September term 1909 of the Supreme Judical Court at Alfred; indictment found at said term charging respondent with manslaughter; on the second day of said September term notice was filed by respondent's counsel that a plea of insanity would be entered accompanied by motion that the respondent be ordered committed to the care of the superintendent of the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta; granted and order issued September 29, 1909; case continued to the January term of said court 1910; on the 14th day of the January term, 1910, respondent arraigned, plea, not guilty, and trial had; on said 14th day by direction of the court jury was ordered to return a verdict of not guilty by reason of insanity; respondent ordered committed to the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta, there to remain until further order of court; warrant of commitment issued Jan. 21, 1910.

Delia Littlefield of Kennebunk, housekeeper for the respondent Rankin, was assaulted by the respondent on the seventh day of July 1909, and the nature of the assault and extent of the injuries were such that Mrs. Littlefield died on the 13th day of July. After the assault she was taken to the home of a relative where she was cared for until her death, and the respondent. whose person exhibited wounds which were at the time thought to be of a serious if not fatal nature, was taken to a hospital. As soon as possible the attorney general joined with the county attorney in making an investigation of the whole affair. result of their investigation the attorney general through the county attorney requested the municipal officers of Kennebunk to commit Rankin to the Insane Hospital at Augusta as an insane person. The municipal officers held an inquest but declined to commit Rankin and although the prosecuting officers of the state felt reasonably sure that the tragedy was the act of an irresponsible person, yet on account of the attitude of the municipal officers no course was left open except to indict and present the matter before a traverse jury. This was done and upon the return of the indictment counsel for the respondent moved that he be committed to the Insane Hospital at Augusta for observation. No objection on the part of the state was made and Rankin was placed under the care of Dr. Bigelow T. Sanborn where he remained until the sitting of the January Term of the Supreme Court at Saco. At this term the trial was very brief. Counsel for the respondent practically admitted all of the evidence introduced by the state in making out a prima facie case but contended that the respondent should not be charged with the crime by reason of his mental condition. As a witness for the defense Dr. Sanborn was called and emphatically and without hesitation declared his belief to be that Rankin at the time of committing the act was not capable of understanding the nature of his act or appreciating the criminality of his deed. After the evidence for the defense had been given the attorney general addressed the court, stating it to be his desire that the court instruct the jury to bring in a verdict of not guilty by reason of insanity. In commenting upon the remarks of the attorney general Mr. Justice Spear, then presiding, expressed himself as co-inciding fully with the views of the attorney general and under the direction of the court the jury without leaving their

DISPOSITION.

One year in jail.

seats rendered a verdict of not guilty by reason of insanity. The respondent was then ordered committed to the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta and the warrant of commitment was issued January 21, 1910.

In addition to the foregoing homicides reported in full, and in all of which either the attorney general or the assistant attorney general appeared with the county attorney in behalf of the state, the following homicides occurred, in all of which more or less advice and assistance was rendered by this department but trial or final disposition of the cases was made by the county attorneys of the respective counties.

The enumeration of the duties of the attorney general as found in chapter 102 of the Public Laws of 1905 declares that "he shall consult with and advise the county attorneys in matters relating to their duties." The broadest possible construction has been placed upon this language and in several instances during my administration I have been called upon by county attorneys in some of the counties to assist in the preparation and trial

of cases below the degree of treason or murder. In every case where such a call has been made I have responded deeming that my duty to the entire state and to the general administration of justice required me to do so. I have also conferred with the county attorneys, and examined evidence, in several cases of suspected homicides where no indictments have been found owing to what seemed to me to be insufficient evidence to warrant requiring the suspected persons to undergo the ordeal and ignominy of defending themselves upon a charge which would in all probability result in their acquittal.

III. CIVIL CASES IN FEDERAL AND STATE COURTS IN WHICH THE STATE OF MAINE WAS A PARTY OR HAD AN INTEREST.



CHARLES MARTEL, PLAINTIFF IN ERROR

v.

STATE OF MAINE.

Forum. Supreme Court of the United States.

Issue. Constitutionality of R. S. Chap 29, Sec. 49.

Counsel. H. E. Holmes, for plaintiff in error.

This action was begun during the term of my predecessor but owing to delays incident to argument of causes in the Federal Court at Washington, no steps were taken toward the disposition of the case until the October Term 1910, when it was argued orally and upon printed briefs.

Plaintiff in error was indicted in the Supreme Court of Maine. sitting at Auburn, on the third Tuesday of January 1906, upon the charge of being a common seller of intoxicating liquors, a prior offense being alleged. The case was submitted to a drawn jury, a verdict of guilty returned, and the respondent was sentenced to pay a fine of two hundred dollars and costs of prosecution taxed at ten dollars and to be imprisoned four months in the county jail at Auburn, and in default of payment four months additional. The respondent took exceptions to the admission of certain testimony, and to certain statements made by the county attorney in argument, but no exceptions to the charge of the presiding justice. His exceptions were carried to the law court where they were overruled in an opinion dated Sept. 10, 1907, by Mr. Justice Peabody. (State v. Martel 103 Me. 63). The mittimus issued Oct. 10, 1907, had been suspended until the term following the receipt of the certificate of opinion from the law court. That mittimus was not enforced after the receipt of the certificate and on June 13, 1908, the respondent became the petitioner for the writ of error which was the basis

of this case. The writ was allowed June 15, 1908, by Mr. Chief Justice Emery and bond given to prosecute the writ to effect and answer all costs and damages.

The plaintiff in error filed the following assignment of errors as being those upon which he would rely in his prosecution of the writ of error.

T.

"That the Supreme Judicial Court, sitting as a Court of Law, erred in overruling the defendant's exceptions to the admission of certain evidence at the trial of said cause in the Supreme Judicial Court at nisi prius against seasonable objection by the defendant. Said evidence being the following—the State offered in evidence an examined copy of the record of special liquor taxes in the Internal Revenue Office of the United States at Portsmouth, New Hampshire, showing payment of a Retail Liquor Dealer's tax by the Tingwick Bottling Company from July 1st, 1904, to July 1st, 1905, at 127 Lincoln Street, Lewiston, Maine, and further showing payment by the same company of a tax as Wholesale Dealers in Malt Liquors for the same period at 84 Lincoln Alley in said Lewiston.

II.

That said Supreme Judicial Court, sitting as a Court of Law, erred in sustaining the admissibility, in the trial of a common seller of intoxicating liquors indictment, of evidence of the payment of the United States special tax as a liquor dealer as prima facie evidence that the person or persons paying said tax are common sellers of intoxicating liquors.

III.

That said Supreme Judicial Court erred in not holding that the payment of said United States special tax is merely a compliance with the Statutes of the United States in that regard made and enacted and that it is not prima facie evidence that the person or persons so paying is a common seller of intoxicating liquors.

IV.

That said Supreme Judicial Court erred in not declaring that that part of Section 49 of Chapter 29 of the Revised Statutes of Maine in which it is provided that the payment of the United States special tax as a liquor seller shall be held to be prima facie evidence that the person or persons paying said tax are common sellers of intoxicating liquors is repugnant to the Constitution and Laws of the United States and therefore null and void."

In its printed brief the State relied upon the following propositions in defense.

- "I. No federal question appears, by the record, to have been raised in the state court.
- 2. The petition for a writ of error forms no part of the record.
- 3. If any federal question exists in this case, which defendant in error denies, the same has not been seasonably or properly raised.
- 4. No Federal question is raised by plaintiff in error even in this court.
- 5. The real question involved in this case is whether a state has the power to prescribe the evidence which should be received, and the effect of that evidence, in the courts of its own government."

That portion of the statute which the plaintiff in error sought to have declared unconstitutional is as follows:

"The payment of the United States special tax as a liquor seller, or notice of any kind in any place of resort, indicating that intoxicating liquors are there sold, kept or given away unlawfully, shall be held to be prima facie evidence that the person or persons paying said tax, and the party or parties displaying said notices, are common sellers of intoxicating liquors, and the premises so kept by them common nuisances."

This provision was enacted by chapter 140 of the P. L. of 1887 and has remained upon the statute book from that time, so that when the plaintiff in error was indicted and tried the section complained of had been a part of the law of the State for nearly twenty years. It had been relied upon by the county attorneys in obtaining indictments in numberless cases, it had received favorable construction and interpretation by the Supreme Court of Maine, the leading case being State v. Intoxicating Liquors 80 Me. 57, where the opinion was given by Mr. Justice Walton, it was an effective weapon in the hands of those county attorneys who desired to enforce the statutes of our state intended to suppress the sale of intoxicating liquors. As will be seen by the points raised in the brief for the state, it was claimed that the plaintiff in error had not so presented his case as to entitle him to a hearing in the Supreme Court of the United States. Believing that the question of jurisdiction formed an important part of the defense the attorney general argued the question of jurisdiction first and the case was finally decided in favor of the contentions raised in behalf of the state upon this point alone viz., that as the case was presented it must be dismissed for want of jurisdiction, no federal question having been properly and seasonably raised or presented. The decision of the case, while in favor of the State, did not indicate what would be the ruling of the Federal Court upon the merits of the question. The law still stands upon our statute books, in full force and effect, as valuable as it has ever been, and will remain so until changed by amendment or some subsequent decision of a court having competent jurisdiction.

H. W. HUGULEY CO. ET ALII

v.

D. R. HASTINGS, ET ALII.

Forum. Circuit Court of the United States.

Issue. The right of sheriffs and deputy sheriffs of Maine to seize intoxicating liquors in transit, involving construction of an act of Congress of August 8, 1890, commonly called the Wilson Act; also an Act of Congress of June 30, 1906, commonly known as the Food and Drugs Act.

Bill in equity. The plaintiffs in this case, six in number, declared themselves to be engaged in the business of selling distilled spirits both at wholesale and retail in the city of Boston, commonwealth of Massachusetts; the defendants, sixteen in number, were the several sheriffs for the several sixteen counties in the State of Maine. The plaintiffs complained not only in their own behalf but in behalf "of all other citizens of the United States of America engaged in the business of wholesaling and retailing distilled spirits under the said Internal Revenue Laws of the United States;" they set forth in their bill

that they sold large quantities of distilled spirits to customers in the State of Maine and that their goods thus sold were protected from seizure in transit under the provisions of the socalled Wilson Act until delivered into the possession of the consignees; they distinctly denied any right of the defendants to seize the liquors in transit under color of the provisions of the Food and Drugs act or under color of any other provision of law; they further set forth that the several defendants had seized and were seizing "in various portions of the said State of Maine many shipments of distilled spirits shipped from the place of business of your orators from outside said State of Maine to points within the said state at places other than the places of consignment and prior to delivery to the consignees and while said distilled spirits were still in the possession of the common carrier and in interstate commerce and under the protection of the interstate commerce clause of the constitution of the United States and of the laws enacted by Congress under the authority thereof." The plaintiffs asked for an injunction to prevent similar seizures in the future and also asked a judgment for damages sustained by the acts of the defendants already committed.

Nothing in the duties of the attorney general, as prescribed by the legislature, required this department to assume the defence of this proceeding but the Governor and Council gave considerable consideration to the matter and felt that in a certain sense it was a proceeding against the state, inasmuch as all the sheriffs were included, and inasmuch as it was an attack upon those officers who were faithfully endeavoring to enforce the laws of this state enacted to prevent the sale of intoxicating liquor. After a conference with the Governor and Council and learning their views and wishes I acted in my official capacity as attorney for the sixteen sheriffs collectively and filed in the Circuit Court of the United States a demurrer to the bill. siderable preparation of the law involved was necessary before the demurrer was argued before Mr. Justice Putnam. murrer was sustained but the court allowed the plaintiffs leave to amend generally. One of the grounds of demurrer was the misjoinder of defendants. When the plaintiffs sought to amend, according to the permission given, a substitute bill was presented, as an amendment to the original bill, and as the defendants had already prevailed in their demurrer on the question of misjoinder of defendants, all the defendants were dropped from the substitute bill except Fred A. Thurlough, sheriff of Aroostook County, and going one step further, for evident safety, all the plaintiffs dropped out of the case except the H. W. Huguley Co. The action then appearing to be purely personal to the Huguley Co. and to Mr. Thurlough I did not feel that the State should be called upon to bear the expense of further maintaining the defense, so I withdrew from the cause in my official capacity although without expense to the state I continued to act as private counsel to Mr. Thurlough.

INHABITANTS OF THOMASTON

v.

INHABITANTS OF GREENBUSH.

Forum.--Supreme Court of Maine, Knox County.

Issue. Construction of R. S. Chap. 27, Sects. 3 and 4; pauper settlements as affected by residence for five consecutive years beyond the limits of this state without receiving pauper suppiles from any source within this state; effect upon emancipated children.

This was an action in which the state was neither party plaintiff or party defendant. While the case was on its way through the law court, perceiving that the interests of the state were involved, the attorney general asked permission of the court to intervene and file a brief in behalf of the state.

The history of the case, briefly stated, was this: Alden B. Partridge, once having a pauper settlement in Greenbush, moved with his wife and minor children to Thomaston and was living there with his family in 1899 when, not having acquired a pauper settlement in Thomaston, he abandoned his family and went to Massachusetts where he continued to reside for more than five consecutive years without receiving on his own behalf any

pauper supplies from any source within this state. His wife obtained a divorce and remarried to a man who had a pauper settlement in the state. The town of Thomaston furnished pauper supplies to the minor children until March 21, 1906, but declined to do so any longer claiming that the town was released under the provisions of R. S. Chap. 27, Secs. 3 and 4, and that the state should thereafter reimburse Thomaston. This was done by the state until the fall of 1908. At that time the state declined to further reimburse the town of Thomaston and held that Thomaston could recover from Greenbush for the supplies furnished to the minor children. Counsel for the town of Greenbush naturally objected. Counsel for the town of Thomaston insisted that the state was liable and not the town of Greenbush. The attorney general insisted that Thomaston could recover from Greenbush and suggested an action at law for that purpose. Counsel for Thomaston felt quite sure that the action would result in a non suit but finally the cause was presented to the law court on report. Naturally the defendant wished to avoid a judgment, and under the circumstances of the case, the plaintiff did not seem to be anxious to obtain judgment, feeling that a non suit would be a ratification of the position taken by the town of Thomaston, viz., that the state must pay for the support of the minor children. It did not appear to the attorney general that the plaintiff prosecuted its action with courage or conviction, and therefore he petitioned the court for the right to intervene in behalf of the state and file a brief. The case involved important questions of law but it also involved a liability for the state which, if it existed, would exist for some time and amount to a considerable sum. These seemed to be sufficient reasons for intervention in behalf of the state on the part of the attorney general. Briefs for plaintiff, for defendant, and for the state, were presented and argued and the contentions of the state were fully upheld by the decision of the court. Thomaston v. Greenbush 106 Me. 242. It is unnecessary to rehearse at this point the reasoning of the court or enlarge upon the decision for reference to the case just made will indicate where the full opinion may be found. The verdict was for the plaintiff, thereby establishing a pauper residence for the minor children in the town of Greenbush, rendering Greenbush liable for their support, and removed liability from the State.

JOSEPH GALEO, PLAINTIFF IN ERROR

v.

STATE OF MAINE.

Forum. Supreme Court of Maine, York County.

Issuc. Construction of R. S. Chap. 53, Sec. 28; R. S. Chap. 119, Sec. 5; sentence imposed for obstructing a railway.

Counsel. Williamson & Burleigh for plaintiff.

Warren C. Philbrook, Attorney General, for defendant.

This was a writ of error brought against the State in its own Supreme Judicial Court under the provisions of R. S. Chap. 104, Sec. 12.

The plaintiff in error, at a term of the Supreme Judicial Court held on the first Tuesday of May A. D. 1908, within and for the county of York, was indicted upon the charge that he "with force and arms did wilfully, maliciously and feloniously place upon the track of the Atlantic Shore Line Railway Railroad, seven large stones, to the obstruction of said railroad track, whereby the lives of many and sundry persons traveling on said railroad, whose names are to the jurors unknown, were then and there endangered, against the peace of said state, and contrary to the form of the statute in such case made and provided."

Upon this indictment the respondent pleaded guilty and was sentenced to imprisonment for the term of eleven years at hard labor in the State Prison at Thomaston. The warrant of commitment was issued March 20 A. D. 1908.

Through his counsel the plaintiff insisted that the sentence was unlawful and assigned the following errors.

"First: That if said indictment is founded upon the provisions of section twenty-eight of chapter fifty-three of the Revised Statutes, the sentence of said court is for a longer term of imprisonment than is authorized by said statute.

Second: That if said indictment is founded upon the provisions of section five of chapter one hundred and nineteen of the Revised Statutes,

- (a) It contains no allegation of an intent on the part of said Joseph Galeo that any person or property passing on the Atlantic Shore Line Railway Railroad should be injured:
- (b) It contains no allegation of any specific intent on the part of said Joseph Galeo whatsoever;
- (c) That said Atlantic Shore Line Railway Railroad is not therein alleged to be a railroad and is not in fact a railroad within the meaning of that term as used in said statute, but is a street railroad, to which said statute is not applicable."

The cause went to the law court on report. While the legal contentions of the plaintiff seemed to possess considerable merit, yet the state pointed out that the sentence, which was probably given under the provisions of R. S. Chap. 119, Sec. 5, was a legal sentence and contained no element of error because

- "I. The words 'any railroad' are broad enough to cover the Atlantic Shore Line Railway.
- 2. Not every indictment need contain the allegation of intent, even though founded on a statute which contains the words 'with intent.'
- 3. The plaintiff in error, as respondent in the court of criminal session, having pleaded *generally* to the indictment, may not now, in this form of procedure, attack the sufficiency of the indictment."

At the time this report goes to the printer the opinion of the court has not been rendered.

HERBERT J. SAWYER

v.

PASCAL P. GILMORE, STATE TREASURER.

Forum. Supreme Court of Maine, Penobscot County. Issue. Constitutionality of chapter 177, P. L. 1909, entitled an act relating to the common school fund, and the means of providing for and distributing the same.

Bill in equity asking for an injunction against the defendant, and his successors in office, to restrain him from enforcing and collecting the tax assessed upon the property of the plaintiff by

virtue of the provisions of chapter 177, P. L. 1909, on the ground that said act is unconstitutional. The substance of the act provides for a tax of one and one-half mills on all the property of the state for the benefit and support of the common schools; that the fund derived from this tax should be distributed among the several cities, towns and plantations of the state, one third according to the number of scholars therein and two thirds according to the valuation thereof. Nothing in the act provided for the distribution of any of this fund among unorganized townships. The plaintiff was a resident of Mattamiscontis, an unorganized township in the county of Penobscot.

Among other points urged by the plaintiff were these: that the act did not promote the "common welfare"; that it provided for a property tax but did not provide for equal disbursement as well as assessment; that it did not aid in the general diffusion of education because, as he alleged, it was of greater help to large cities and towns than to smaller towns and municipalities; that it created an inequality of burden upon the various inhabitants of the state: that, indirectly at least, the sum raised from unincorporated townships did not have a fixed relation to that raised from property in other parts of the state; that it was raised for local purposes, namely, to help the scholars in wealthy and prosperous communities; that its real purpose was to increase the tax on wild lands: that it was in conflict with the fourteenth amendment of the Constitution of the United States because it made an arbitrary and designed discrimination in the distribution of money which had been collected through a tax assessed upon the entire state.

The state argued in reply that the "common welfare" was conserved under all the rules of law pertinent to the discussion; that our own court had sustained the act known as the mill tax which provided for distribution of the common school fund among cities, towns and plantations without making provision for unorganized townships; that the question of constitutionality was not affected by the method of disbursement of a tax; that ample legislation was made for the education of children in unorganized townships which was a full compensation for any supposed oversight in this act and cited many cases sustaining the contentions of the state both from state courts and federal courts.

The provisions of the act of 1909, chap. 177, had been the subject of popular discussion at many times and many places and a large degree of public interest regarding it had been aroused. It was an act far reaching in its benefits and properly became the object of earnest support and equally earnest attack. The case was fully argued both orally and upon written briefs at the December term of the Law Court 1910 but when this report goes to the printer no decision had been announced.

PASCAL P. GILMORE,

TREASURER OF THE STATE OF MAINE,

v.

COUNTY OF PENOBSCOT.

Forum. Supreme Court of Maine, Hancock County.

Issue. Recovery of sums due from the defendant to the State of Maine for services and expenses of the Deputy Enforcement Commissioners in the performance of their duty in said defendant county; constitutionality of chap. 255, P. L. 1909, and of chap. 92, P. L. 1905.

Counsel. Warren C. Philbrook, Attorney General, for plaintiff.

George E. Thompson, County Attorney of Penobscot County, for defendant.

This was an action brought against the county of Penobscot in the name of Pascal P. Gilmore, Treasurer of the State of Maine, for the benefit of the state, to recover the sum of \$7,171.78 with interest alleged to be due from said county to said state under the provisions of chapter 255, P. L. 1909. This act is popularly known as the Havey amendment to the so-called Sturgis law and provides in substance that when the deputy enforcement commissioners were sent into any given county in the performance of their duties, their salaries and expenses should be paid from the state treasury and after notice from the state auditor to the county commissioners of said county of the amount paid by the state, the same should be paid back

to the state by the county treasurer of the county where the deputy enforcement commissioners had been at work. The plaintiff claimed that there was due from the county of Penobscot to the state of Maine for the month of August, 1909, \$1,423.85, for the month of September, 1909, \$1,512.84, for the month of October, 1909, \$1,640.44, for the month of November, 1909, \$1,295.93, for the month of December, 1909, \$1,298,72. The state auditor is required by the act to notify the county commissioners on or before the fifteenth of each month following the month in which the services and expenses were performed and incurred, and further provides that these sums shall be due and payable within thirty days after such notice is given. The plaintiff further claimed interest upon each of these sums after the expiration of thirty days from the state auditor's notice.

Counsel for the defendant questioned the constitutionality of chap. 255, P. L. of 1909, as well as of chap. 92, P. L. of 1905, the latter being an act entitled "an act to provide for the better enforcement of the laws against the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. Thus was raised the question of constitutionality of what was popularly known as the Sturgis law and the Havey amendment thereto. The case was therefore taken to the law court on an agreed statement as follows:

"It is agreed that each and all of the allegations contained in plaintiff's writ are true, but that the above cause is to be heard by the Law Court and if the section of the statute upon which plaintiff bases its right to recover is in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of the State of Maine, or if other sufficient defence in law exist, then plaintiff is to be non-suited; otherwise judgment is to be entered for plaintiff in accordance with the demands of the writ.

Writ, plea of general issue, and this agreed statement make up the case."

As affecting the constitutionality of the act under consideration, the defendant urged in argument that it was a virtual displacement of the sheriff who is a constitutional officer; that the act gave a power of arbitrary discretion to the Governor and enforcement commissioners which alone made the act unconstitutional; that by the provisions of the act counties were obliged to pay for expenses which were equivalent to an assess-

ment or tax and concerning the assessment and levy of which they had no voice and that such a proceeding was not in accordance with "due process of law"; that by the provisions of the act the legislature had indirectly at least surrendered the power of taxation.

Counsel for the plaintiff traversed all of these propositions, citing in support of his contentions not only decisions from our own court but from courts of other states and from the federal courts, and claimed that the act was wholly within the police power of the state authorized by state and federal constitutions.

The case was argued upon written briefs and without oral presentation. The writ was dated February 9, 1910, returnable at the April term 1910 of the Supreme Judicial Court within and for the county of Hancock. The case went immediately to the next term of the law court sitting at Bangor and the opinion of the court was received November 26, 1910. The constitutionality of the act and of the amendment thereto, was sustained and judgment ordered for the plaintiff for the sums claimed in the declaration, the amount be computed by the clerk of courts for Hancock county and judgment entered accordingly. the opinion of the court was received counsel for the defendant gave notice to the attorney general that he in good faith desired and intended to petition for a writ of error so as to have the case heard in the Supreme Court of the United States. Accordingly an execution was not demanded and at the time when this report goes to the printer it is presumed that counsel for the defendant is preparing to take the case to the highest federal court. Feeling that the outcome of this latter step cannot relieve the defendant from the burden of paying the judgment already found, it is with pleasure that I leave to my successor the privilege of collecting and turning into the state treasury the proceeds of the labor involved in this suit.

Forum. Supreme Court of Maine, Hancock County.

Issuc. Recovery of sums due from the defendant to the State of Maine for services and expenses of the Deputy Enforcement Commissioners in the performance of their duty in said defendant county.

Counsel. Warren C. Philbrook, Attorney General, for the plaintiff.

Frank A. Morey, County Attorney of Androscoggin County, for defendant.

This was an action similar to the one last reported, viz., Gilmore v. County of Penobscot. The actions were brought about the same time and both were entered at the same term of the Supreme Judicial Court in Hancock County. In this action also, counsel for the defendant raised the question of constitutionality of the act under which the plaintiff was proceeding, but as the case against Penobscot County was to be taken to the law court on agreed statement for the purpose of testing the constitutionality of the act, it was deemed wise to allow this action to stand continued on the nisi prius docket until a decision could be reached in the Penobscot County case. The latter case having been decided November 26, 1910, and no nisi prius term having been held in Hancock County since that date, nothing further has been done in this case. According to the claim of the plaintiff there was due at the date of the writ from the county of Androscoggin to the State of Maine for services and expenses of the Deputy Enforcement Commissioners during the month of August, 1909, \$504.86, for the month of September, 1909, \$592.53, for the month of October, 1909, \$902.08, for the month of November, 1909, \$529.60, for the month of December, 1909, \$616.51, amounting in all to the sum of \$3,-145.58. Upon these various sums also, there is interest due according to the decision of the court in the Penobscot County case, from the date thirty days subsequent to the notification to the county commissioners from the state auditor.

As will be noted at a later point in this report, large sums are due both from Penobscot and Androscoggin Counties for services and expenses of the Deputy Enforcement Commissioners incurred after the date of the writs in these two cases, and there have also accrued large sums due from other counties in the state upon which, as yet no action has been taken, and if all these actions are prosecuted to final judgment the state treasury must be largely enriched thereby.

CASES FOR THE LAND AGENT.

Near the close of the term of my predecessor a decision was handed down from the law court in the case of Ring, Petr. for location of public lots in Elliottsville, ordering commissioners to be appointed to locate public lots in that township. At the earliest possible term of the Supreme Court in Piscataquis County, after my accession to office, commissioners were appointed to attend to the duty prescribed by the decision of the court. After the public lots were laid out it was found that the Ship Pond Co. had been operating upon the township quite extensively and negotiations were entered into to ascertain if possible how much might be due from the Ship Pond Co. on account of their operations. It was ascertained that the company had received for logs and wood cut and sold from the entire plantation of Elliottsville amounting to the following sums:

For stumpage during the years 1905-6-7-8 and 9 the company had received \$18,790.45, which added to the foregoing receipts made a grand total received by the company of \$89,354.17. They had paid out for taxes, scaling, and other bills during the years 1895-6-7-8-9-1900-1-2-3-4-5-6-7-8 and 9, a total of \$11,-115.82. The question then arose as to the proper distribution of the net balance. It was difficult to ascertain with any degree of accuracy where most of the wood and lumber operations had taken place on the township and there was also a difference between the Land Agent and the Ship Pond Co. as to the allowance of certain charges. Realizing that the most prompt and desirable solution of the problem would be by a mutual adjudication of the controversy, we have been endeavoring for some months to reach a final result and obtain the balance due from the Ship Pond Co. I regret to report that it did seem possible to bring the matter to a close but before this conclusion was reached my term of office had nearly expired and I am therefore obliged to turn this matter over to my successor for completion.

In behalf of the Land Agent this department has also filed in the Supreme Court of Piscataquis County another petition praying for the location of public lots in Township 9, Range 14, W. E. L. S. This proceeding has not been completed owing to lack of time to do so in the regular order of court procedure.

In behalf of the Land Agent this department has also filed a petition for location of public lots in Coplin Plantation, Franklin County, and these lots have been duly located. Here, again, by reason of the expiration of my term of office I have not been able to close up the question of amount due from the land owners and this with the other two cases just reported must be turned over to my successor for completion.

I am happy to report that outside of this business for the Land Agent there is very little unfinished work in this department which must be imposed upon my successor for completion. IV. SELECTIONS FROM SUCH OPINIONS GIVEN TO HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS AND OTHERS AS SEEM TO CONTAIN SOME ELEMENTS OF PUBLIC INTEREST.

Subject: Railroad Commissioners; Appointment of clerk and assistant clerk, R. S. Chap. 51, Sec. 48.

Hon. Bert M. Fernald, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your inquiry as to whether the appointment of the clerk and assistant clerk, to the board of railroad commissioners, requires confirmation by the council, also whether the term of office of such clerk, or assistant clerk, is for a period of four years.

The statute provides that "the governor, on the recommendation of the board," meaning the board of railroad commissioners, shall appoint the clerk and assistant clerk in question. Nothing is said about the council having any voice in the matter either by way of confirmation or otherwise.

That there are appointments to be made by the governor and council, and others by the governor alone, is recognized by the fundamental law of the state, and by our court of last resort in Opinions of the Justices, 72 Me., 542. On page 548 of that report occur these words, after discussing certain appointments:

"These are instances of the offices 'otherwise provided for' where the council have nothing to do in advising or consenting to the appointment or removal. The power of the governor is derived from the statutes conferring it, and from them alone."

In the case of appointment of a clerk and an assistant clerk to the board of railroad commissioners the language is so plain, that there seems no room for doubt but that the legislature intended that the governor alone should make the appointment upon recommendation of the board, and that the council should have "nothing to do in advising or consenting to the appointment."

The other part of your inquiry is, as to whether the term of such clerk or assistant clerk is for four years. Chapter two, section thirty-seven, of the revised statutes provides that:

"All civil officers appointed by the governor and council, whose tenure of office is not fixed by law, or limited by the constitution,......shall hold their respective offices for four years and no longer, unless re-appointed."

In the case of the persons in question they are neither civil officers, nor are they appointed by the governor and council, but only by the governor. Again referring to the Opinion of the Justices, supra, we find that

"The general rule is that appointments are by the governor with the advice and consent of the council, and the tenure is during their pleasure. (Referring only to those offices the tenure of which is not otherwise provided for.) The tenure may be at the pleasure of the governor alone, when he has the appointing power without advice or consent of his council."

The words above enclosed in parenthesis are not a part of the quotation. It would seem, however, from the quotation and the rule therein prescribed, that the clerk and assistant clerk to the board of railroad commissioners would not hold their several offices for the term of four years but "at the pleasure of the governor alone."

Subject: University of Maine—Trustees and their powers.

Hon. Bert M. Fernald, Augusta, Me.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a request from yourself and two members of the Honorable Council, that I should indicate what powers, if any, the Governor and Council may have with reference to the selection or dismissal of any member of the board of instruction of the Uni-

versity of Maine. It is a matter of common learning that in 1862 the Congress of the United States passed an act entitled "An act donating lands to the several states and territories which may provide colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts." The act referred to prescribed the character of instruction, etc., which should be given in these land grant colleges, so called, but did not attempt to prescribe any powers which should be exercised in the various states by the Governor, his Council, or the officers of the college. It was evidently the intention of Congress to leave all these matters of management and control to the states in which those colleges might be instituted or located.

In 1865, by the provisions of chapter 532 of the Private and Special Laws of that year, the State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts was incorporated. In the act of incorporation certain gentlemen were designated as trustees. Section three of the act provided that "the Governor and Council shall at all times have the power, by themselves, or such committee as they shall appoint to examine into the affairs of the college, and the doings of the trustees, and to inspect all their records and accounts, and the buildings and premises occupied by the college." The same section provided for action to be taken by the attorney general under the direction of the Governor and Council against any trustees exercising or attempting to exercise any unlawful powers, or unlawfully omitting to perform a legal duty. In the same way it was provided that action might be instituted against any individual trustee for any cause deemed by the Governor and Council sufficient to disqualify him for the trust.

Section eight relates more particularly to the selection or dismissal of any member of the board of instruction. That section provides as follows:

"The trustees shall appoint such directors, professors, lecturers and teachers in the college, and employ such other persons therein from time to time, as the means at their command may permit for the accomplishment of the objects enumerated and described in the fourth section of the act of congress. Every officer and every person employed shall hold his office or employment at the pleasure of the trustees."

The act under consideration provides in section eighteen that the legislature shall have the right to grant any further powers or to alter, limit or restrain any of the powers vested in the trustees. I have endeavored to examine with some care all of the acts relating to the college from its institution in 1865 to the present time but I do not find any instance where the legislature has attempted to modify the powers of the trustees with relation to the selection or dismissal of any member of the board of instruction. It would seem therefore, that the trustees have absolute and complete control in this matter.

As showing the gradual tendency at least to bring the control of the institution more and more into the hands of the Governor, it may be interesting to note in passing that when the college was first instituted the legislature provided that the first vacancy in the board of trustees should be filled by a joint ballot of the two branches of the legislature; that the second vacancy should be filled by the trustees and that all succeeding vacancies should be filled alternately by the legislature and by the trustees. This method of procedure continued until 1867 when by the provisions of chapter 362 of the Private and Special Laws of that year the number of trustees was reduced to seven and the appointment of new trustees was left to the Governor with the advice and consent of the Council, but the trustees had the right to nominate candidates for appointment by the Governor and Council. This somewhat peculiar method continued until 1874 when by the provisions of chapter 194 of the Public Acts of that year the legislature swept away all the previous powers of the trustees to perpetuate their own body and declared that "all vacancies occurring in the board of trustees of the State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts shall be filled by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Council."

Thus we see as before suggested that the legislature is gradually although indirectly, placing the control of the State College in the hands of the Governor more than formerly, by this right to appoint its trustees.

Subject: Marriage; Persons authorized to solemnize marriages; Ceremony by British Consular Officer

Hon. Bert M. Fernald, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge the request from your office for advice upon the following proposition:

Whether the law in force in the State of Maine is to be understood as prohibiting the solemnization of marriages therein by a British Consular officer, (1) where both parties to the marriage are British subjects, and (2) where one party is a British subject and the other a subject or citizen of a state other than the United States.

It is common learning that statutes requiring a ceremonial marriage usually make express provisions as to the persons by whom such marriages may be solemnized. The State of Maine has provided by its latest revision of this law—P. L. 1909, Chap. 161—as follows:

"Every justice of the peace or notary public residing in this State may solemnize marriages therein. Every ordained minister of the Gospel, clergyman engaged in the service of the religious body to which he belongs, or person licensed to preach by an association of ministers, religious seminary or ecclesiastical body, whether a resident or non-resident of this state, and of either sex, may solemnize marriages therein after being licensed for that purpose, upon application duly filed with the secretary of state, as herein provided."

The act just quoted was intended to take the place of R. S., Chap. 61, Secs. 11 and 12, which were repealed by said Chap. 161, P. L. 1909. The act in its present form does not in express terms prohibit a British Consular officer from selomnizing marriages, but it is evident that the words enumerating the persons who may solemnize marriages are words of exclusion as well as inclusion, for the 13th section of R. S., Chap. 61, provides a penalty to be inflicted upon any person who knowingly and wilfully joins persons in marriage contrary to the provisions of said Chapter 61, R. S. It is my opinion, therefore, that our law prohibits the solemnization of marriages in this state by a British Consular officer, and as no exceptions

are made dependent upon the nationality of the persons joined in marriage, I am constrained to believe that the authority to solemnize marriages in this State could not be extended to a British Consular officer, even if one or both of the persons contracting the marriage should be British subjects.

Further inquiry is made as to whether a marriage solemnized by a British Consular officer, where both or one of the parties is a British subject would be recognized as valid by the local courts.

Section 16 of Chap. 61 of the Revised Statutes just referred to, provides:

"No marriage, solemnized before any known inhabitant of the state professing to be a justice of the peace, or an ordained or licensed minister of the Gospel duly appointed and commissioned, is void, nor is its validity affected by any want of jurisdiction or authority in the justice or minister, or by any omission or informality in entering the intention of marriage, if the marriage is in other respects lawful, and consummated with a full belief, on the part of either of the persons married, that they are lawfully married."

You will observe that this relates to a marriage solemnized before any "known inhabitant of the state," etc. Whether this section just quoted would have any effect in case of a marriage solemnized by a British Consular officer, I would not care to express an opinion.

In an early New England case, Londonderry v. Chester, 2 N. II., 268, which is extensively annotated in Vol. 9, Am. Dec., at page 73, the annotator says:

"Whatever the form of ceremony, or even if all ceremony was dispensed with, if the parties agreed presently to take each other for husband and wife and from that time lived together professedly in that relation, proof of these facts would be sufficient to constitute proof of a marriage binding upon the parties, and which would subject them and others to legal penalties for a disregard of its obligations. This has become the settled doctrine of the American courts; the few cases of dissent or apparent dissent being borne down by a great weight of authority in favor of the rule as we have stated."

This exceedingly broad view, however, is not applicable in a criminal prosecution, where the fact of marriage is essential to the crime. In a very early case in our own state, Damons Case, 6 Me., 148, (a criminal proceeding), the court, speaking through Parris, J., says:

"The mere reputation of a marriage, or proof of cohabitation, or other circumstances from which the marriage may be inferred and which are sufficient in almost all civil personal actions, cannot, in cases of this nature, be admissible. There must be evidence of a marriage in fact, by a person legally authorized, and between parties legally competent to contract."

These are statements of the broad rule which would be applicable to the civil side of the question, and of the strict rule applicable to the criminal side of the question, and both have been given because it was not made clear in your letter of inquiry as to whether the person for whom you made inquiry had in mind a recognition of a valid marriage in a civil or criminal proceeding.

Subject: Alien Paupers.-P. L. 1905, C. 142.

Hon. Fred W. Bunker, Council Chamber, Augusta, Maine.

Sir:—In accordance with your request for a written opinion as to the effect and intent of chapter one hundred forty-two of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and five, relating to alien

paupers. I have the honor to advise as follows:

Prior to the passage of the act in question there seems to be no doubt that an alien might, under our statutes, gain a pauper settlement in this state and that, having gained such settlement, he was entitled to the same support from the town, in case of distress, as would be enjoyed by a citizen of the state who had gained such settlement. Obviously, then, prior to the passage of the act in question, cases might arise in which a town would be liable to support an alien pauper.

In a case decided many years ago in this state, Belgrade vs. Dearborn, 21 Me., 334, a legal settlement was declared to be a settlement which gives a right to support from the town in cases of falling into distress and becoming necessitous. In other

words, if a pauper is entitled to support from a given town it is because he has gained a pauper settlement therein. It would seem to be equally plain that if for any reason a person has not gained or cannot gain the right to a support from a town then he has not and cannot gain a pauper settlement in that town.

The act in question declares that the revised statutes shall not be construed to make any town liable for relief furnished to an alien or his family since said statutes went into effect. This seems to be one way of saying that an alien cannot gain a right to support from a town in our state, hence it would seem that under the provisions of the act he cannot gain a legal or pauper settlement in any town in our state.

Section thirty-three of chapter twenty-seven provides that when any person has no legal settlement within the state and needs relief, his wants are to be supplied by the town in which he is found and reimbursement to the town is to be made by the state. So that even if the language of Public Laws, nineteen hundred and five, chapter one hundred forty-two, were less plain it would still seem by examination of the authorities and by reasoning that the legislature, by the act in question, intended to deprive aliens of the power to acquire a legal or pauper settlement in any town in this state, to place the burden of supporting all alien paupers upon the state, and to relieve towns of that burden. The language of the act in question also seems to be sufficiently plain to warrant this conclusion, so that by reasoning and by the terms of the act itself I am constrained to the opinion that whenever any town furnishes relief to this class of unfortunates such town should be reimbursed by the state.

Subject: Chap. 142, P. L. 1905; support of alien paupers.

Hon. Fred W. Bunker, Council Chamber, Augusta, Maine.

DEAR SIR:—You recently submitted to me two questions as follows:

- I. An alien comes to a city or town in this state and resides there without receiving pauper supplies for more than five years prior to the passage of Chapter 142, P. L. 1905, and then received pauper supplies from that city or town. Is he a state or town pauper by virtue of the act just referred to?
- 2. An alien comes to a city or town in this state and from his first arrival until the present time, covering perhaps a number of years, receives pauper supplies and is still receiving them. Would he be a state or town pauper?

I think both of your questions may be answered in one reply. In my opinion it is wholly within the power of the legislature to declare whether the burden of supporting any pauper may be transferred from cities and towns to the state. I am further of the opinion that the legislature intended, by the act of 1905 above referred to, to place upon the state the burden of supporting all alien paupers after the passage of that act. My advice therefore to you is that the state since the passage of the act of 1905 is liable for the support of all alien paupers regardless of the time during which they have or have not received pauper support from any city or town.

You will of course, however, keep in mind the further provisions of the legislature found in Chapter 113, P. L. 1907, which provides that all bills for support of state paupers shall be filed with the Governor and Council within three months after the same are contracted and no such bills shall be allowed unless they are so filed within thirty days after the thirty-first day of December of the year in which they are contracted.

Memorandum.

It may not be improper to say that the City of Augusta, not being willing to accept the views of the attorney general as given in the last two opinions, brought suit against the City of Waterville to get an interpretation of the statute of 1905, chaper 142, by the Supreme Judicial Court of Maine. The opinion of the court was dated February 11, 1910, and the interpretation of the act given by the attorney general was sustained by the court.

Subject: Chapter 113, P. L. 1909. Foreign Corporations, Certificates to be filed with the Secretary of State.

Hon. Arthur I. Brown, Augusta, Mc.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your request for an expression of views with reference to certain provisions of section six of chapter one hundred thirteen of the Public Laws of 1909. Your inquiry resolves itself into this proposition: does section six of the act under consideration require foreign corporations to annually file, and pay a fee therefor, the certificate referred to in section three of the act when no changes have been made by the corporation in the particulars required in the certificate referred to in section three.

Omitting some words as to time and method of signature section six reads as follows:

"Every such foreign corporation shall annually" ** * * * * prepare and file* * * * * * a certificate* * * * * * showing the change or changes, if any, in the particulars included in the certificate required by section three made since the filing of said certificate or of the last annual report."

Whether or not it was the intention of the legislature to make this act a source of revenue to the state we are not required at this time to discuss. Evidently the legislature did intend that public records should be established from which certain information might be obtained relative to foreign corporations doing business in this state. If this information was the sole reason for enactment, then it would seem to be an idle ceremony to

require corporations to repeat annually a statement of facts which was already a record in the state department. It will be observed also from the quotation of the statute above given that while the certificate mentioned in section three calls for certain things, yet the certificate in section six only calls for "the change or changes, if any." Some significance also should be attached to the words near the close of section six, "the filing of said certificate or of." These words together with the last four words of section six "the last annual report," show plainly that there are two conditions of time relating to the filing of the certificate mentioned in section six; that is, the certificate mentioned in section six must show the change or changes either (1) made since the filing of said certificate (referring to certificate in section three) or (2) since the last annual report. If the legislature intended that the certificate required by section six should be an annual certificate then it would have been idle to say "since the filing of said certificate." The use of these last quoted words however would seem to indicate that a time more than a year might elapse between the filing of the certificate mentioned in section three and a certificate showing change or changes.

I am constrained to advise you therefore, that when a foreign corporation has made a return of the certificate mentioned in section three of the act, such corporation is not required to make return of the certificate mentioned in section six annually unless there have been annual changes in the particulars mentioned in the certificate of section three.

Subject: Railroad Companies; Taxation of; Apportionment of tax to cities and towns.

Hon Pascal P. Gilmore, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your favor asking whether in my opinion the refund provided for in

R. S. Chap. 8, Sec. 24, should be allowed to the town of Rumford upon 7,500 shares of stock listed by the Portland & Rumford Falls Ry. Company as follows:

"State Street Trust Company of Boston, Massachusetts, Trustee under and in accordance with the provisions of deed of trust from Rumford Falls Power Company, dated December 1, 1909 7500."

The section of the statute under consideration, after providing that railroad companies should pay certain taxes to the state, further provides as follows:

"There shall be apportioned and paid by the state from the taxes received under this and the five following sections and under Sec. 31, to the several cities and towns in which, on the first day of April of each year, is held railroad stock of either such operating or operated roads exempted from other taxation, an amount equal to one percent. on the value of such stock on that day, as determined by the board of state assessors."

The meaning of the word "held" is the first thing for consideration; that this word in this connection is equivalent to an expression of ownership would seem to be in harmony with the views of various state courts, and I cite you to the following:

Witsell v. Charleston, 7 S. C., 88. Jackson v. Mumford, (N. Y.) 9 Cow., 254. Holland v. Cruft, 69, Mass., 162. Smith v. Gains, 39 N. J. Eq., 545. State v. Oil Company, 42 W. Va., 80.

If this view of the word is correct, then the next step is to read the statute as if it said "owned" instead of "held," and we are next to determine where these 7,500 shares of stock are owned. This leads to a careful consideration of the deed of trust given by the Rumford Falls Power Company to the State Street Trust Company. At the date of this instrument, we may safely assume that the Rumford Falls Power Company owned the 7,500 shares of stock under consideration, and if that ownership of the same had continued, then there would be refunded to the town of Rumford a certain portion of the railroad tax, in accordance with the statute under consideration. Does the Rumford Falls Power Company now own those shares? The answer to this question must determine the main question upon which you requested advice. I am well aware that the answer which I shall

give to this question may be challenged by eminent counsel in this state, who are interested in the proposition, but I must give you my views as best I can, and you will be governed by them according as to their reasonableness or otherwise.

The deed of trust referred to was evidently drawn with great care and great skill, but it is in the form ordinarily and customarily used by a corporation giving an instrument to secure the payment of its bonds. It conveys to the State Street Trust Company its real estate and personal property and specifically states on page 10 of the printed form of the trust deed that the following personal property is also conveyed:

"Also seventy-five hundred (7,500) shares of the capital stock of the Portland and Rumford Falls Railway, a railroad corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Maine, with its principal office in Portland in the County of Cumberland, and State of Maine, of the par value of one hundred (100) dollars each. Certificates for said seventy-five hundred (7,500) shares have been properly issued in the name of said Trusts and delivered to it to be held under and in accordance with the terms of this indenture."

It has been claimed that these shares of stock were simply deposited with the trust company as a pledge. It seems to me that they go as a part of the mortgaged property, for the words of conveyance in the earlier part of the trust deed are words of conveyance and not of pledge, and it will be particularly noticed that the paragraph just quoted, provides that the certificates have not only been issued in the name of the trust company and delivered to it, but are to be "held under and in accordance with the terms of this indenture." I am persuaded, therefore, that the 7,500 shares of stock under consideration passed under the trust deed as a part of the mortgaged property and not as a pledge. The next step in the proposition, then, is to determine who holds the title, or in other words, who owns the stock.

It is familiar law that "the chief distinction between a mortgage and a pledge is, that by a mortgage the general title is transferred to the mortgagee, subject to be revested by performance of the condition; while by a pledge, the pledgor retains the general title in himself, and parts with the possession for a special purpose. By a mortgage, the title is transferred; by a pledge, the possession." Jones on Chattel Mortgates, 5th Edition, Sec. 4. Citing the following authorities: Walker v. Staples, 5 Allen (Mass.), 34. Conner v. Carpenter, 28 Vt., 237. Brown v. Bement, 8 Johns, (N. Y.), 96.

Also the following well known cases from our own supreme court:

Eastman v. Avery, 23 Me., 248. Beeman v. Lawton, 37 Me., 543. Day v. Swift, 48 Me., 368.

If my views upon the trust deed or mortgage are correct, then these shares of stock, being a part of the property conveyed by the mortgage, are no longer owned in Rumford, the title being passed by the mortgage to the State Street Trust Company, subject to a revestment of that title in the Rumford Falls Power Company when the conditions of the mortgage shall have been performed.

I am therefore constrained to the following summary, viz:—That the shares of stock under consideration were a part of the personal property conveyed by the trust deed of the Rumford Falls Power Company; that this conveyance being a mortgage, the title to those shares is now in the State Street Trust Company of Boston; that no part of the shares being now owned in said Rumford, there should not be any part of the refund paid to the town of Rumford which would be payable in case those shares were owned in Rumford.

Subject: Dexter Loan & Building Association.

Hon. Pascal P. Gilmore, Augusta, Me.

SIR:—It appears that there is some difference of opinion as to the amount of tax which should be paid by the Dexter Loan & Building Association under the provisions of Chap. 24, P. L. 1909, and I have been requested to express my views upon the subject.

Prior to the passage of the act in question, R. S. Chap. 8, Sec. tion 57 provided that every loan and building association should make a return relating to, and pay a tax upon, monthly capital dues paid in by its share holders during certain periods. Chap. 24, P. L. 1909, amended said section 57 and provided that each loan and building association should make a return semi-annually on the last secular days of April and October of its "assets and liabilities in detail, of the net amount of its investments other than in loans to individuals or corporations on real estate and on shares of the association, during the six months ending on each of said days," (last secular days of April and October). Said chapter 24 also provided that " a further tax of one-half of one per cent on the average amount so returned of the investments of such associations other than in loans to individuals and corporations on real estate and on shares of the association" should be paid to the state treasurer. The difference in views seems to center about these propositions; (1) when did the first period of time occur in which the tax should be assessed under these last named provisions; (2) did the legislature intend that loan and building associations, under the amendment now under discussion, should pay a tax of one-half of one per cent semiannually, or did it intend that the one-half of one per cent should be an annual tax.

Two principles of construction are easily available. First, that since the adoption of the referendum no act of the legislature becomes effective until ninety days after the adjournment thereof unless the act in question be an emergency act; second, as enunciated by our court in East Livermore v. Banking Co. 103 Me. at p. 424, "it is elementary that no tax can be imposed without express statutory authority, that such authority is to be construed strictly against the state" etc. Other principles of construction applicable to this discussion are not as plainly available but may possibly be invoked in such a way as to throw some light upon this question.

Chapter 24, P. L. 1909, was not an emergency act and therefore did not become effective until July 3d, 1909. R. S. Chap. 8, Sec. 57 continued to be in full effect in its unamended form until July 3, 1909. The new act required that returns should be made to the State Board of Assessors on or before the second Monday of May and of November and related to the six months

period terminating on the last secular days of April and October. Should any accounting be made of the period of time between the third of July when the amendment took effect and the last day of the following October, that being a period of less than six months, or should the first return be made in May, 1910, and relate to the six months existing between October, 1909, and April, 1910, in other words should the time between July, 1909, and October, 1909, being a fractional part of six months be reckoned and a pro rata tax imposed? A similar condition might arise where a loan and building association was organized between the last days of April and the last days of October and the query might be raised whether such loan and building associations must pay a pro rata tax for the period of time between its organization and the last days of October following, such time being a fractional part of six months. If the legislature had intended that the fractional part of six months should bear a pro rata tax the act might easily have said so and, bearing in mind the second principle of construction above stated, I am inclined to the opinion that there is no certain authority for assessing a pro rata tax between July 3, when the act took effect, and the last days of the following October when the six months period would begin to run toward the next April.

We next examine the proposition as to whether after October 1909 the loan and building association is to pay one-half of one per cent semi-annually, or one-half of one per cent as an annual tax. Here again, the legislature was unfortunately less clear than we could desire but it is our duty to examine the language carefully and critically and see whether the intention of the legislature may be ascertained and, if that can be done, such intention must be authority until another session of that body deems it wise to modify the existing law.

We notice then quite carefully the last six or seven lines of chapter 24 under discussion and observe that the treasurer of the loan and building association is required to pay to the treasurer of state a tax of one-half of one per cent a year on the amount of the monthly capital dues returned. Notice that this is one-fourth of one per cent a year but, after a comma, the act proceeds to say that there shall be a further tax of one-half of one per cent on the average amount so returned of the investments of such associations other than in loans etc. What is meant by

the words "so returned?" What are their significance? average amount "so returned" is the amount returned every six months or semi-annually. If the tax was only to be annually upon this average amount, why should not the legislature have said "one-half of one per cent a year" as it did say when referring to the tax on the monthly capital dues. The fact that the legislature did not say so but used other phraseology is significant. The fact also that the tax of one-half of one per cent, as clearly differentiated from the other tax is declared to be payable on the average amount "so returned," which is a semi-annual return seems to present to my mind a somewhat strong argument that the legislature intended that the tax on the average amount so returned, etc., was to be a tax payable every six months thus making a total of annual tax of one per cent. As we have said, we are striving to understand the intention of the legislature and we are also endeavoring to keep in mind the principle that this act is to be construed strictly against the state, and yet it seems as if the legislature in this instance had expressed its intention with sufficient clearness to be understood. It has distinctly stated that the tax on the capital dues is onefourth of one per cent a year, and when it attempts to state the tax upon the "average amount so returned" it abandons the expression showing annual or yearly taxation and refers to the returns which are made every six months. It did not say that it was a further tax of one-half of one per cent a year on the average amount so returned etc, and I am therefore of the opinion that the plain meaning of the entire section when all parts are considered together is:

- (1). No tax should be assessed for that period of time running between the third of July and the last day of October both in the year 1909;
- (2). That each loan and building association, until the legislature may otherwise order by amendment, should pay one-half of one per cent semi-annually or a total of one per cent per annum on the average amount returned of the investments of such associations other than in loans to individuals and corporations on real estate and on shares of the association.

Subject: Military Law; payment for attendance on drill nights.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Me.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge the communication of Col. Charles Collins bearing the endorsement of your office under date of Dec. 28, 1909, asking for an opinion in accordance with the provisions of section 24 of the Military Law, requiring the attorney general of the state to be the legal adviser of the Governor, the Adjutant General, and the Armory Commission.

The plan proposed by Col. Collins amounts substantially to this: Weekly drills, with pay roll made out for each night and, at the close of a period of six months, payment to each officer and man for such drills as he may have attended, not to exceed twelve, regardless of whether the twelve nights of attendance coincided or otherwise with the twenty-four regular drill periods in each calendar year; which must be designated by the commanding officer.

It is my opinion that such a plan is not in harmony with the military law of the state. Section 84 of the military law requires that there shall be designated by the commanding officer, for each company of the National Guard, for the Naval Reserve, and for detachment of the Hospital Corps, authorized by the adjutant general, twenty-four regular drill periods in each calendar year. It is also provided that those officers and men who attend and perform their full duty at each designated drill shall receive certain compensation. Absence from such designated drill, unless under certain circumstances, carries with it a forfeiture. To be sure, there is nothing in the military law which limits the number of drills which any organization may participate in but it is very plain that the funds of the state are to be paid out only for attendance upon a designated drill and not for any other. It is not necessary to discuss any reasons, supposed or otherwise which the legislature may have had in framing the present military law. The language of the act however is so plain that it can hardly be misunderstood. Explicit obedience to, and conformity with the law are the only safe course and I must respectfully advise that payment for attendance upon drills must be restricted to attendance upon those twenty-four regular drill periods designated by the commanding officer and no other.

I have examined section 76 of the military law, to which you call my attention, but the provisions of that section do not to my mind affect the plain, unequivocal provisions as to payment for attendance upon regular drill periods provided in section 84.

Subject: Chap. 49 P. L. 1909—public bonds exemption from taxation—"after the 1st day of February, 1909."

Hon. George Pottle, Office of Board of State Assessors, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your favor of April 10th and in reply beg leave to say:

Your inquiry is in the following language: "Chapter 49 of the Public Laws of 1909 provides exemption from taxation of public bonds issued after Feb. 1, 1909. Can this language be reasonably construed to mean on and after Feb. 1?"

The real question presented is whether the word "after" is here intended to be used as a word of exclusion or inclusion. There is no invariable sense to be attached to this word, but like "from," "succeeding," "subsequent," and similar words, where it is not expressly declared to be exclusive or inclusive, is susceptible of different significations and is used in different senses, as it will in the particular case effectuate the intention of the parties. Its true meaning must be collected from its context and subject matter in any particular case. As to whether the word may be used inclusively or exclusively has been the subject of discussion in our own court as well as in the courts of last resort in other states. There seems to be a general consensus of opinion that when we compute a fixed time within which a legal act must be done after a certain date, that the

word is one of exclusion and that the full time in which the act is to be done is to be reckoned without including the date fixed after which the act is to be done. On the other hand, all the best authorities hold that the word "after" may be construed to include or exclude the day of the act as will best serve to carry out the intent of the legislature, subserve public policy, avoid forfeiture, and validate a proceeding rather than to annul the same.

In harmony with this view in State v. Mounts 15 L. R. A. 243, it was held that when a statute provided that the term of office of a jury commissioner should commence on the first day of June after his appointment, an appointment made by the judge on the first day of June conferred on the appointee the office of jury commissioner and his term commenced on the said first day of June.

The act under consideration, Chap. 49, P. L. 1909, provides that "all bonds issued after the first day of February 1909 by the State of Maine, or any county, municipality, village corporation or water district, therein shall be exempt from taxation." The first day of a calendar month seems to me a more natural and common one on which to fix a date like the one in question rather than some later day in the month. It would hardly seem probable that the legislature intended that the bond in question must be issued after February first in the exclusive sense but rather that it intended to make the word "after" inclusive which would be using the word in the sense of "on and after." As this interpretation is in harmony with a recognized usage of the word I am of the opinion that this inclusive sense was intended by the legislature when it used the word as occurs in the chapter of the Public Laws under discussion.

Subject: P. L. 1907, Chap. 93. Returns to State Assessors by Registers of Deeds.

Board of State Assessors, Augusta, Mc.

Gentlemen:—You have called my attention to Chap. 93, Sec. 1, P. L. 1907, which provides as follows:

"In each county containing wild lands, so called, it shall be the duty of the register of deeds in such counties to transmit to the board of state assessors a certified copy of the record of transfers of wild lands or any portion of wild lands within ten days after such record is made."

You state that in several of the so-called wild land counties the respective registers of deeds have not transmitted the certified copies required by said chapter and that in two instances the registers have flatly refused to comply with this provision of law. You asked me what measures, if any, may be taken and in reply I beg leave to say:

Your remedy is by mandamus. It is a general rule of law that the writ of mandamus may be issued against a public officer to compel him to perform a purely ministerial duty imposed by law. This doctrine is not only announced by many of the state courts but also by the Federal courts of this country and by the courts of Canada and England. In our own state examples are not wanting where this writ has been issued to compel a public officer to perform a ministerial duty imposed upon him by law. Thus in Smyth v. Titcomb 31 Me. 272, the defendant being a treasurer of a town, mandamus was issued to compel the treasurer to perform a duty prescribed and imposed by statute. See also Tremont School District v. Clark 33 Me. 482; Williams v. County Commissioners 35 Me. 345, where the court speaking through Rice J. says: "Mandamus lies to the inferior tribunals; magistrates and officers and extends to all cases of neglect to perform a legal duty where there is no other adequate remedy:" Baker v. Johnson 41 Me. 15, where the court speaking through the same judge declared that the Supreme Judicial Court had power to issue a writ of mandamus when the same may be necessary for the due execution of law; Page Petr. 37 Me. 553; Hawes et alii v. White, Register of Deeds 66 Me. 305; State v.

County Commissioners 83 Me. 282; Attorney General v. Newell et alii 85 Me. 246, where the court speaking through Whitehouse J. says:

"It is a well settled rule that mandamus extends to all cases of neglect to perform an official duty clearly imposed by law when there is no other adequate remedy;" Inhabitants of Brunswick v. City of Bath, 90 Me. 479; in this case the defendants contended that the petitioner had a complete and adequate remedy at law either by indictment or by petition to the county commissioners but the court speaking through the late Chief Justice Peters says: "Such a legal remedy as either of the uncertain modes suggested would be unsuitable and unsatisfactory. This court has said that mandamus will be granted if it be doubtful if there be another effectual remedy, or if the court does not clearly see its way to one. * * * Generally when ministerial duties are clearly defined and legally established mandamus will be upheld to enforce them;" Adams v. Ulmer 91 Me. 47: Keefe v. Donnell 92 Me. 151: Hamlin, Attorney General v. Higgins et alii 102 Me. 510.

Examination of these several cases and applications of the principles of mandamus therein contained seem to make the proposition perfectly plain that this is the remedy to be applied to the case which you present.

Subject: Taxation of personal property of non-residents.

Hon. George Pottle, Augusta, Me.

SIR:—I have your favor enclosing the following statement of facts and inquiry:—

"John Doe, an inhabitant of the town of "A," purchases the standing timber on a parcel of land in the town of "B." He moves a portable mill upon the land for the purpose of sawing the logs when cut.

On April 1st the mill, some logs, and sawed lumber are found there by the assessors of the town of "B."

In your opinion, would this personal property be subject to taxation in the town of "A" under the provisions of section 12, chapter 9, Revised Statutes, or in the town of "B" under clause I of section 13, or clause III."

You call my attention to three distinct provisions of law for taxation of personal property. The general provision of statute relative to taxation of personal property is that it shall be assessed to the owner in the town where he is an inhabitant on the first day of each April. To this general rule is made some exceptions and by your second and third questions you call my attention to two of those exceptions. If your questions do not fall within the provision of either of those exceptions then the property which you describe must be taxed in the town of "A" where the owner is an inhabitant on the first day of April.

The first exception has reference to "personal property employed in trade, in the erection of buildings or vessels, or in the * * * provided that the owner, his servant, mechanic arts. sub-contractor or agent so employing it occupies any store, store house, shop, mill, wharf, landing place or shipyard therein for the purpose of such employment." Your question and statement of facts do not disclose whether the mill, logs and sawed lumber were employed in trade or in the mechanic arts. Unless they were so employed, then of course the property would be taxed in the town where the owner was an inhabitant on the first day of April. But even if they were employed in trade or in the mechanic arts then we meet with the proviso as to the occupancy by the owner, his servant, sub-contractor or agent of some shop, store, mill, etc. From a portion of your letter not quoted in this reply, I suspect that the real object of your inquiry relates to the portable saw mill and whether it is such a structure as to be occupied within the meaning of the statute. If this be your real question the task of answering is easy since our Supreme Court, in a very recent case not yet published but which will appear upon page 54 of Volume 105 of the Maine Reports under the title Norway v. Willis, has determined this exact issue. In the Norway case the inhabitants of that town brought an action of debt against the defendant to recover a tax assessed by the plaintiff town on a portable steam saw mill owned by the

defendant who was a non-resident of Norway. There was no question that the portable saw mill was set up in the plaintiff town on land not owned by the defendant and was in the plaintiff town on the first day of April of the year in which the tax was assessed. Mr. Justice Bird in behalf of the court said, that this mill is not a structure the occupancy of which met the intent of the proviso in R. S. Chap. 9, Sec. 13, Par. I. Upon the authority of this case to which we are now referring, I must advise you that the portable saw mill, logs and lumber were not taxable in the town of "B" where they were found on the 1st day of April but would be taxable in the town of "A" where the owner was an inhabitant.

Your third provision of statute to which you call my attention is R. S. Chap. 9, Sec. 13, Par. III. In your statement of fact you refer to the owner as an individual but Par. III refers only to property belonging to a corporation, hence that provision would have no application to your question.

To be specific, therefore, it is my opinion that the portable saw mill, logs and sawed lumber under the statement of fact contained in your letter would be taxable in the town of "A" where the owner was an inhabitant on the first day of April and not in the town of "B" where it was found on that date.

Subject: Investment of Deposits in Savings Banks. R. S. Chap. 48, Sec. 23, Sub. Division 5, as amended by Chap. 11, P. L. 1909.

Hon. W. B. Skelton, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your favor of July 23rd with statement of fact and request for advice; the statement of fact being as follows:

"A corporation organized under the laws of the State of Maine, for the purpose of doing business in the State of Maine, owns real estate in this State on which it issues first mortgage bonds. The corporation is not yet making the earnings specified in subdivision 5, Sec. 23, Chap. 48 of the Revised Statutes as amended by Chap. 11 of the Public Laws of 1909."

Your statement of fact does not contain all of the elements found in the amendment made by Chapter II of the Public Laws of 1909, for you do not state that the corporation is actually conducting in this State the business for which it was created. You do say, however, that the corporation is not yet making the earnings specified in the amendment of 1909. Your inquiry is as to whether the bonds of this corporation are legal investments for savings banks in this state. It is my opinion that they are not.

You ask certain other questions as to the legality of savings banks investing in such bonds regardless of the ratio of the total authorized bond issue to the total value of the property; and also as to the legality of savings banks investing in the same if the total authorized bond issue does not exceed 60 per cent. of the total value of the property.

After reaching the conclusion which I have above stated, that these bonds are not yet in any way a legal investment for savings banks in Maine, it seems to be unnecessary to consider the inquiries last referred to-

SIR:—I have your favor asking my opinion, upon the following statement of facts and question.

"A corporation included within that class specified in Chap. 48, Sec. 23, sub-div. 6, f, of the Revised Statutes, has two classes of capital stock, of which there is now outstanding \$60,000 of preferred stock, and \$150,000 of common stock. Dividends at the rate of six per cent. per year are being earned and paid on the preferred stock; no dividend has ever been declared on the

common stock. All earnings otherwise available for that purpose, being put back into the property.

Question. Is this preferred stock a legal investment for the savings banks of this State under the statute above referred to?"

I have examined the history of this statute, the decisions of our own courts, the statutes of other states which attempt to regulate the investment of savings banks funds and the decisions of those states in which such regulations are attempted, and in no instance do I find, by decisions of the courts or otherwise, anything which throws satisfactory light upon your question. It would seem necessary for us to consider this a matter of novel impression and base an opinion simply upon a few broad principles which should obtain in matters like these.

It is self evident that the legislature of Maine from time to time has endeavored to throw around the investment of savings bank funds the strictest safeguards possible. It would not seem proper to attempt to enlarge the statute in matters like these but rather to follow with strict construction the rules which the legislature has laid down. Those rules make no distinction between preferred and common stock in the provision to which you refer. The legislature has said "in the stock of any corporation * * * * which earns and is paying a regular dividend of not less than five per cent. a year." The legislature does not say that the investment may be made where a part of the stock earns and pays such dividend.

Another danger suggests itself to my mind if savings banks were permitted to invest in preferred stock earning and paying five per cent dividends when no such dividend was being earned and paid on the common stock of the same corporation. I refer to the fact that our general corporation law not only provides for the creation of two or more kinds of stock, but also provides that corporations may determine the voting powers of those kinds of stock. The powers of common stock and of preferred stock relative to voting vary through a wide range in many of the corporations under our observation and jurisdiction. The power of common stock over preferred stock may be quite extensive in the first instance and if proper charter reservations are made in the issue of the preferred stock those powers may be expanded or restricted. It would seem to me that with such corporate powers as might exist in the common stock there

could be no absolute assurance that the preferred stock would continue to pay the dividends required by law even though they were earning them. It might be argued that the statutory provision under discussion is in the present tense as to the time when the stock is offered for investment, but it seems to me that this view pushed to its extreme would render the statute idle. If stock at the brief moment when it is offered for investment is earning and paving the legal dividend that would hardly seem to meet the requirements of the statute. The intent of the law must be to provide that the stock has under ordinary circumstances not only the earning capacity but that the dividend so earned has been and will continue to be paid under ordinary circumstances. If the corporation should reserve to holders of its common stock the power to declare dividends, or other similar powers which would be imminent to the value of the preferred stock, then there would be no security or safety in such an investment. Some particular corporation might by its certificate of organization and by laws have thrown around its preferred stock all proper safeguards but your question is broad enough to refer to all corporations of the class under discussion and no safe rule could be laid down where conditions may be so vari-

The reasons suggested viz., the lack of explicit authority in the statute, the wisdom of strict construction in such a case, and the possible powers of the common stock over the preferred stock, lead me to advise that the preferred stock in the statement of facts submitted to me would not be a legal investment for savings banks in this State.

SIR:—You have called my attention to a certain situation relating to a free high school in the town of S and have submitted to me what purport to be copies from the records of

the annual meetings of that town from 1900 to 1909 inclusive. The vote of 1909 is as follows:

"To raise the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars for support of Free High School subject to the following amendments: That the money appropriated shall be available when a suitable building properly equipped with furniture and out buildings, shall have been furnished without costs to the Town and in the event that such building is not furnished then no High School shall be maintained."

Your inquiry is if a town has established a free high school and has continued its support for a term of years may it, by passing an amendment as indicated in the vote just quoted, condition its appropriation and support upon a provision such as is named in the amendment.

You do not submit to me a copy of any vote whereby the town of S in terms has voted to establish and maintain a free high school but that town having voted an appropriation through a series of years, I do not deem it a violent presumption to say that the town to all intents and purposes and by legal implication and possibly by legal vote, established a free high school. Undoubtedly a town which has established a free high school may by a proper vote discontinue and cease to maintain such a free high school. In the absence of any statute restricting the voting power of the town on the subject a town may doubtless impose certain conditions or restrictions upon the method of maintenance and conduct of such a school when the same are consistent with law. Your precise point however, relates to a condition which shall be contingent upon having a building furnished without cost to the town and that if any such building is not furnished then the free high school shall not be maintained. I do not think it within the power of the town to impose this condition. R. S. Chap. 15, Sec. 58 referring to free high school says "the town or precinct, in which said school is thus held, shall supply appropriate equipments, and furnish and warm a suitable building for the same." Thus you will see that as long as the vote of the town to establish and maintain a free high school has not been revoked, the town is under an obligation to furnish and warm a suitable building for the same. Hence the conclusion to which I arrive that the conditions imposed upon the vote of Mar. 1, 1909, and which I have above quoted in full, are not conditions which the town would have an authority to impose and insist upon. The town has a right to vote to discontinue the free high school. Until that vote is passed I think the statute plainly imposes the duty of furnishing a building in which the school may be held.

Subject: State aid to plantations—Plantations required to pay state and county taxes to receive state aid under provisions relating to towns—Plantations not required to pay state and county taxes to receive state aid under provisions relating to unincorporated places.

Hon. Paul D. Sargent, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—Your request for advice upon the question of authority of county commissioners to assess taxes for the purpose of expenditure on ways under the State road law, so-called, approved March 26, 1907, has received consideration. With the hope of making the situation more clear I have first considered

I. WAYS IN UNINCORPORATED PLACES.

County commissioners, upon the petition of responsible persons, under the provisions of R. S. C. 23, Sec. 43 and C. 9, Sec. 56, may lay out, alter, or discontinue a highway on any tract of land in their county not within any town or plantation required to raise money to make and repair highways. The attendant expense is to be borne by the owners of the land over which the highways pass, excepting in case of lands reserved for public uses, and by adjoining townships benefited thereby, such expense to be apportioned according to the judgment of the commissioners. The assessment of expense is to be made by the commissioners who may, in certain instances, require the county to pay a portion of the expense. The com-

missioners are also charged with the duty of fixing the time when the work shall begin and of appointing an agent or agents, not members of the board, to superintend the work and to faithfully expend the money. When such ways have been constructed it becomes the duty of the commissioners annually, in the month of September, to inspect the same, make an estimate of the amount needed to put them in repair so as to be safe and convenient for public travel and assess an amount sufficient for such repair. This assessment is to be upon the lands within the unincorporated place and may also be in part upon the county.

Under the State road law, so-called, enacted March 26, 1907, to take effect January 1, 1908, the county commissioners are required to set aside, from the money thus raised and appropriated, 33 1-3 cents on each thousand dollars of the valuation of the unincorporated township for permanent improvement of highways. It is apparent that the duties thus indicated, so far as highways in unincorporated places are concerned, are solely incumbent upon county commissioners.

II. WAYS IN ORGANIZED PLANTATIONS.

Some confusion has arisen regarding ways in organized plantations by reason of the fact that our statutes make two distinct provisions for organizing plantations under general law, one of which may, for convenience, be called compulsory and the other voluntary, so far as the inhabitants of the plantation are concerned. The civic and municipal duties imposed upon these plantations differ according to the form of organization. The legislature may also organize plantations by special act, and has frequently done so, but unfortunately in many instances those special acts have not clearly set forth the civic and municipal duties of the new plantation. Without going into details of plantation organization at this time it may be said that those plantations which are organized under the provisions of R. S. C. 4, Sec. 114, for convenience herein called compulsory, are required by law to pay state and county taxes. and have like powers and are subject to like liabilities and penalties as towns respecting ways; the statutes also provide that the assessors in such plantations have like powers and perform like duties as municipal officers of towns respecting

ways. On the other hand the statutes provide that plantations organized by voluntary proceedings are not required to pay state and county taxes unless by special act of the legislature, and there is no statute which provides that plantations paying no state and county taxes shall have like powers and be subject to like liabilities and penalties as towns respecting ways; nor any statute which provides that assessors of such plantations shall have like powers and perform like duties as municipal officers of towns respecting ways. It becomes apparent therefore that in determining the question as to whether any given plantation has control over its ways as towns do, we must first ascertain the history of its organization and whether, by virtue of that organization, or by special order of the legislature it is required to pay state and county taxes. Moreover if that plantation was organized by special act of the legislature we must examine that act to see if by the terms thereof the plantation was created with liabilities of compulsory or of voluntary plantations, or in other words whether or not it must pay state and county taxes. Taking into account all the legislation upon the subject, including the State road law, I am of the opinion that in the case of those plantations required to pay state and county taxes the inhabitants and assessors thereof act with the same authority and under the same provisions as pertain to inhabitants and municipal officers of towns, but in the case of plantations organized under voluntary proceedings and not required by special act of the legislature to pay state and county taxes the inhabitants and assessors do not act with the same authority and under the same provisions as pertain to inhabitants and municipal officers of towns. I am of the further opinion that state highway aid in the latter class of cases should be given under the rules relating to unorganized places.

This opinion in no way conflicts with that given by this department in 1906 and found on pages 31 and 32 of the biennial report of 1905-6, for in that opinion no attempt was made to distinguish between plantations organized under different provisions of statute but only enunciated the general doctrine that plantations are entitled to state highway aid.

Subject: State Roads..Contract for Construction— Parties thereto.

Hon. Paul D. Sargent, Augusta, Maine.

Str:—I am in receipt of your favor of May 20, 1910, in which you ask my advice as to whether in making contracts for state road work the State Commissioner of Highways should assume entire charge of letting contracts, or whether contracts should be let through the municipal officers, or whether contracts should be let jointly by the municipal officers and the State Commissioner of Highways.

You state four distinct cases under which contracts may be let for the construction of state roads. Those four cases are as follows:

"FIRST: When, as in the case of the Rockland-Rockport trunk line work, a portion of the money is subscribed by individuals, a portion of the money comes from appropriations by municipalities and a portion of the money is furnished by the State.

SECOND: When a portion of the money is appropriated by one or more municipalities and the balance is furnished by the State.

THIRD: When all of the money is furnished by the State. FOURTH: There might be another case arise where part of the funds were subscribed by individuals or municipalities and the remainder furnished by the State."

According to my view of the statute certain general principles govern in all of these four cases and without attempting to state an answer to each distinct case I respectfully advise as follows:

Evidently the legislature did not take into consideration the existence of any condition of affiairs arising over a contribution to the joint fund for state road work by individuals or by corporations other than municipal corporations. No provisions having been made for such a contingency I think that these elements of the problem should be disregarded and that the fact that a portion of the joint fund has been contributed by individuals or by corporations other than municipal cor-

porations should not be taken into account at all in letting contracts for the state road work.

The expense of constructing a state road may be borne entirely by the state as provided in P. L. 1909, Chap. 69, Sec. 13; or the expense may be borne by what has been denominated a joint fund; that is, a fund composed of moneys furnished by the state and by the municipalities. As I have just said if this joint fund is increased by private contributions I do not regard this latter element as a factor in the problem.

If the construction of a piece of state road is to be paid for out of the joint fund, then we turn to Chap. 69, P. L. 1909, Sec. 8, and find that when the location and general character of the proposed work has been determined upon, and when the plans and specifications have been made, these plans and specifications are to be forwarded to the selectmen or other officers having jurisdiction over highways in the town in which the particular work is to be done. The act then makes it the duty of these officers to advertise for bids upon the work and each bidder is required to accompany his bid with a certified check as a guarantee "that if the work is awarded to him, he will enter into a contract with said board for the same."

Thus you will see that in the expenditure of a joint fund, except in a case hereinafter to be pointed out, a contract must be with the selectmen or other officers having jurisdiction over the highways in the town in which the work is to be done. To be sure the selectmen or other local officers having jurisdiction and the State Commissioner of Highways have a joint supervising authority, which they must exercise, over the acceptance or rejection of any bids, but the contracting parties must be the town on the one side and the bidder on the other.

The exception to this rule which I have just referred to is found in the later provision of Sec. 8 of Chap 69, P. L. 1909, where provision is made that a town may have an opportunity to bid on the construction work and the part of the section just referred to provides that where a contract is let to a town "the board of local officers having jurisdiction over highways in such town shall forthwith execute a contract in behalf of said towns with the State Commissioner of Highways in behalf of the state, to fulfill etc. In such an instance you will see that the contracting parties must be the town on the one

side and the state on the other. This condition also relates to the expenditure of a joint fund.

I think these general principles will furnish an answer to the first, second and fourth cases stated in your letter.

The only case remaining to be discussed is the third, "when all the money is to be furnished by the state." Here we should refer to the provisions of Sec. 13 of Chap. 69 of P. L. 1909. While the requirements as to the parties to the contract are not as plain in this section as in the preceding sections of the act and while it might be assumed that if the state should furnish all the money then the contract should be with the state, yet the legislature has not so provided. It has provided that the state may expend by the State Commissioner of Highways an amount of money sufficient to cover all the expense of a given piece of work but the legislature did not say that the party who did the work was to contract with the state. On the other hand the legislature in the last few lines of Sec. 13 distinctly provided "that the same general provisions made for the construction and maintenance of other state roads under this act shall apply to roads constructed under authority of this section, except that the whole cost of construction would be paid by the State."

It is my opinion therefore, that in those cases where the state pays the entire cost of construction that there should be the same location and general character of the proposed work determined upon, plans and specifications should be made and forwarded to the town officers, bids should be advertised by those town officers and contract entered into between the town officers and the bidder if the town does not do the work; the contract should be entered into between the town and the state if the town were to do the work.

I feel that my construction of the statute is not only in harmony with what the legislature intended but will also promote a uniformity in awarding contracts for the work whether done by a joint fund or by the state alone and much contention and misunderstanding may be prevented by adhering to the provisions of the act as I have viewed them.

Subject: Distinction between wild birds and game birds; transportation out of State.

Hon. J. W. Brackett, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I am in receipt of your favor of July 1st inclosing letter from Mr. A. J. Wilson of Moosehead, Maine, in which he makes inquiry as to the right to transport a pair of gulls out of this state; also whether in case of any prohibition, he could obtain consent from any official to transport the birds.

You will understand, of course, that our laws relating to fish and game, recognize a distinction between birds which might be called game birds and those which would be more properly called wild birds only. While the statute does not in terms make this distinction or attempt the definition of game birds, yet it is generally understood that there are certain species of birds and animals which inhabit various portions of the world which are, by common custom, designated as game. This designation does not include all ferae naturae but only those which are good for food or else by their presence are dangerous to man or to domestic animals. It will be necessary then to determine whether the gull is a game bird or otherwise. Here our statute has assisted us in the interpretation so far as our State is concerned. R. S. Chap. 32, Sec. 8 as amended by Sec. 12, Chap. 132 P. L. 1905, and Sec. 5, Chap. 90 P. L. 1909 provides:

"No person shall, within the State, kill or catch or have in his or her possesion, living or dead, any wild bird, other than a game bird, nor purchase, offer or expose for sale, any such wild bird after it has been killed or caught. No part of the plumage, skin or body of any bird protected by this section shall be sold or had in possession for sale. *****; and for the purposes of this act, the following only shall be considered game birds; the anatidæ, commonly known as swans, geese, brant, and river and sea ducks, the rallidæ, commonly known as rails, coots, and gallinules; the limicolæ, commonly known as shore birds, plovers, surf birds, snipe, woodcock; sandpipers, tatlers and curlews; the gallinæ, commonly known as wild turkeys, grouse, prairie chickens, pheasants, partridges and quails."

From this you will see that the game birds, according to our statute, are only those which are found within the groups known as anatidae, rallidae, limicolae and the gallinae. The gull (more poetically known in old English as the mew) belongs to the genus larus and does not fall within any of the classes which our statutes have declared to be game birds. It follows, therefore, that the gull or mew would be considered under our law as a wild bird and not a game bird. The provisions of the statute which I have just quoted are plain and imperative that no person within this state shall kill, catch or have in possession, living or dead, any wild bird which does not fall within the list of game birds, and it therefore follows that as the gull does not fall within the list of game birds, no person can lawfully kill, catch or have in possession any gull or mew, whether living or dead. Furthermore, our statute does not authorize any official to give right or authority to anyone to have in possession these wild birds except as provided in R. S. Chap. 32, Sec. 40. Here care should be observed also to distinguish between game birds and wild birds. The early part of Sec. 40, allows the Commissioners of Inland Fisheries and Game, for certain purposes, to take fish and game of any kind, when, where and in such manner as they choose and authorize written permits to other persons to take fish and game for the same purposes. This, however, is not broad enough to cover wild birds. Later in the section, there is a provision in the following language:

"The Commissioners of Inland Fisheries and Game may grant permit to take moose, caribou, deer, and birds for park purposes in the state under such rules, regulations and conditions as they shall establish."

The broad and unqualified use of the word "birds" would undoubtedly allow the Commissioners of Inland Fisheries and Game to take wild birds for park purposes in this State but that would not allow them to be taken for any other purposes or even for park purposes outside of the state.

Summarizing therefore, it is my opinion that the gulls, being wild birds, could not be taken by any private citizen to have in possession in this State or for transportation out of it.

Subject: R. S. Chap. 32, Sec. 40—Screening Outlets of Ponds or Lakes—Payment of Expense—From what Source.

Hon. J. W. Brackett, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—In your letter of July 6th you call attention to the provisions found in the last two sentences of Sec. 40, Chap. 32 of the Revised Statutes relating to the power of the Commissioners to screen outlets of lakes or ponds, and you inquire if the Commissioners, under that section, have a right to build screens and pay for the same out of the appropriation for fish hatcheries, feeding stations and for the protection of fish.

It is my opinion that the present condition of our statutes and appropriation resolves do not authorize commissioners to screen the outlets of lakes and ponds and pay for such expense out of the appropriation for purposes of operating fish hatcheries and feeding stations for fish and for the protection of fish. The last named appropriation is found in Chap. 145 of the Resolves of 1909. The reasons which lead me to this view are as follows: R. S. Chap. 2, Sec. 20 clearly provides that all appropriations of money for expenditure in the public service shall be applied solely to the object for which the appropriation is made. A reasonably strict construction of this rule should be applied. Chap. 145 of the Resolves of 1909, just referred to, makes an appropriation of \$47,500 for the year 1909, and a similar appropriation for 1910, and designates that this appropriation is "for the purpose of operating the fish hatcheries and feeding stations for fish in the state and for the protection of fish." Nothing is herein said about using any of the money for erecting screens at the outlet of lakes or ponds.

I am constrained to believe that the legislature never intended that any part of this large appropriation should be used for the erection of screens, except where the power had been especially given so to do. You will observe that the legislature of 1909, Chap. 215 of the Resolves authorizes the expenditure of \$300 out of the appropriation of which we have been speaking, for the purpose of screening Taylor Lake, so-called, in the city of Auburn, but the authority to do this was conditioned

upon the raising of a certain sum of money by the citizens of Androscoggin County, and also required a vote of the city of Auburn that it would assume all liability for keeping said screen at all times free from sticks, leaves, etc., so that the same would not become clogged and prevent the free running of water through the same. Eight other instances are to be found with similar provisions—namely, screening of Biscay Pond, of China Lake, of Estes Lake, of Messalonskee Lake, of Spring River lake, of Squa Pan Lake, of Toddy Pond and Worthley Pond. If the legislature had understood that any part of the appropriation of \$47,500, which we have been speaking of, could be used for screening outlets of lakes and ponds at the discretion of the commissioners, why did they take the trouble to give special authority in these nine cases?

The answer to the question seems irresistably to suggest to my mind the questions which I have indicated above. It might be argued that here is a plain provision of the statute in Chap. 32, Sec. 40, giving the commissioners certain powers, but those who have been close students of statute law, have oftentimes discovered that an authority is given to do a thing and no money provided with which to do it.

It seems to me therefore, quite plain, in view of the special resolves for screening, that the legislature never intended that there should be such a liberal construction of Chap. 145 of the Resolves of 1909 as to authorize the commissioners to use any part of that appropriation for screening ponds or lakes.

Subject: Fish Ways, R. S. Chap. 32, Sec. 41.

Hon. J. W. Brackett, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—I am in receipt of your recent favor in which you desire my views as to whether the commissioners of inland fisheries and game are obliged in every instance to order fish ways to be built when requested so to do, or whether this requirement is wholly in the discretion of the commissioners.

In reply I beg leave to say that it does not appear to me to be a question of discretion for the commissioners so far as that question relates to ordering the construction of fish ways. The statute in plain and positive terms requires the owner or occupant of every dam or every artificial obstruction in any river or stream frequented by salmon, shad, alewives, or landlocked salmon to provide said dam or artificial construction with a durable and efficient fish way. This is a positive requirement of law, and as I have said, there does not seems to me to be any element of discretion on the part of the commissioners of inland fisheries and game whereby the owner or occupant just referred to may be relieved from the duty required by law. On the other hand, the judgment of the commissioners of inland fisheries and game, in the first instance, is to be taken as to the form, capacity and location of the fish way. Of course, it must be observed in passing, that the river or stream in question must be frequented by the fish above. named, otherwise there is no obligation resting upon any one to build a fish way. It may be, therefore, that the judgment of the commissioners of inland fisheries and game may be an important element in determining whether the river or stream is frequented by the above named fish. It is my view that those commissioners must be well satisfied that the river or stream is, as a matter of fact, frequented by these fish before any movement is taken to require the building of a fish way, and in this connection, it is my view that the word "frequenting" would be construed to mean habitually frequenting; an isolated case or even a few rare cases where a salmon, shad, alewive or landlocked salmon might be found in a river or stream, would hardly seem to be sufficient cause for invoking the machinery of the act under consideration.

If, however, the commissioners are satisfied that the river or stream is frequented in the way I have just described and by the fish referred to, then there would seem to be no excuse for the owner or occupant of any dam or artificial construction whereby he might be relieved from building the fish way required by the act.

The next step then would be as to the location, form and capacity of the fish way, and here the judgment of the commissioners must obtain in the first instance. You will notice that

in case of a disagreement between the commissioners and the owner or occupant of any dam as to the propriety and safety of the plan submitted, that there is an appeal, but the appeal is only as to the propriety and safety of the plan, not as the necessity of constructing a fish way. And later in the act, you will find that the decision upon the appeal "shall be final as to the plan and location appealed from," again emphasizing the fact that the decision of the commissioners from which the appeal is taken is as to the plan and location and not upon the prior question as to whether any fish way must be located and constructed.

Summarizing, therefore, the situation appears to me to be this: If a river or stream is habitually frequented by salmon, shad, alewives, or landlocked salmon, the owner or occupant of any dam or other artificial construction upon that river or stream, must provide a durable and efficient fish way; as to the form, capacity and location of the fish way, the question is to be passed upon by the commissioners of inland fisheries and game, but they cannot excuse the owner or occupant of the dam or other artificial construction from complying with the law as to the provision of the fish way.

Subject: License to corporation to buy, sell and tan deer skins and other valuable skins.

Hon. J. W. Brackett, Augusta, Me.

DEAR SIR:—Some time ago your department submitted questions relating to R. S., Chap. 32, Sec. 30, as amended by Chap. 226 of the P. L. of 1907 relating to the issuance of licenses to buy and sell or tan deer skins and other valuable skins.

The question or questions submitted by your department were (1) "Can more than one person buy deer skins and the skins of otter, sable and fisher under one license"; (2) "Can a corporation send out more than one of its regular employees

to buy skins under the license issued to a corporation"; (3) "Can a person, not a corporation, to whom one of these licenses has been issued employ agents to buy those skins for him under his license."

I have tried to examine the statute as carefully as possible and while I am of the opinion that a clearer statement of its intention might have been made by the legislature and possibly the incoming legislature may well be asked to remove the ambiguity or doubt by amendment, yet from a reading of the statute as it now stands and from an examination of cases involving similar elements reported in the courts of last resort in other states, I am constrained to answer your questions as follows:

(1). Only one person should be allowed to buy deer skins or skins of otter, sable and fisher under one license (2). A corporation should not send out more than one of its regular employees to buy such skins, and I am inclined moreover to the opinion that if the employee is sent out by the corporation the license should stand in the name of the employee rather than in the name of the corporation. Of course it naturally follows that other employees of the corporation if also licensed might be properly sent out. (3). That a person not a corporation to whom one of the licenses has been issued may not employ agents to buy those skins for him under the license issued to the employer.

I do not find the precise question involved to have been passed upon by any of the courts of last resort but I do find some cases relating to licenses issued to persons authorizing them to sell and the principle involved between buying and selling seems to be so similar that I am inclined to apply the principles of law to this case which were applied to those cases where the licensee was selling instead of purchasing. Of course the fact that in given states the statute varies from the one under consideration makes some difference in the weight or application of any citations to which I may refer but there seems to be an underlying principle in all, on which we may safely rely.

In Standard Oil Co. v. Commonwealth 55 S. W. 8, discussing a Kentucky statute relating to peddling, the court says, "indeed, a license cannot be issued to a corporation to sell, except that license designates some person by name and descrip-

tion to sell." In that particular statute there was a requirement that the person who was licensed to sell should furnish a certain description of himself.

Again, in 88, N. E. 945, we find the following: "A license is a privilege granted to a person or persons and not to inanimate things to pursue some occupation, or to exercise some right, which has been declared unlawful except upon compliance with certain conditions."

In State v. Morrison found in 36, S. E. 329, is the discussion of a case where a corporation was granted a license to sell pianos and organs. The corporation sent out several agents each of whom traveled and sold under that one license. A prosecution having been instituted against one of the agents for selling without a license an attempt was made to justify through a license which was held by the corporation. The court declared that the license "authorizes only the person having it in possession to sell under it." Obviously, if there were but one license and that held by the corporation each and all of the various agents could not have it in possession. In the same case the court went further and said, "such has always been the policy of the law, except when the statute authorized the issuance of certified duplicates or copies of the license." It is needless to say that our statute does not authorize such issuance.

Without extending this discussion to a wearisome length I think I have sufficiently indicated the reasons which lead me to the answers which I have given above.

Subject: Powers of Public Boards of Health in connection with School Property.

Dr. A. G. Young, Augusta, Maine.

SIR:—By your letter of May 12, you ask whether the local board of health has authority to destroy school books believed by them to have been exposed to infection.

School books within any school house in Maine may be the property of the town where located, or may be owned by the parents of the children who occupy the school house.

I assume that your inquiry relates in the main to books which are the property of the town, for, as to others, the provisions of R. S. Chap. 18, Sec. 41, which prevent exposing any article that has been used by persons affected with certain diseases would seem to prevent a child from bringing to school and exposing any books or other property which had possibly been affected by the presence of a contagious disease. With regard to books owned by the town, it is well to have clearly in mind the fact that, "the custody and care of all school property in every town, shall devolve upon the superintending school committee," as expressed in section 34, chapter 15, R. S.

No authority is given to anyone outside of the superintending school committee to select, purchase, care for, or dispose of school text books, the property of a city or town.

Sections 43 and 44 of said chapter 18, group closely teachers, school officers and local boards of health in specifying the duties of those first made aware of the existence of the diseases called contagious in school communities, and in directing their action when infection of the school room is discovered. Each is to act promptly; the teacher to dismiss the school and notify both committee and board of health; and no school can again be held in such infected school room until it (and, we may safely add, its contents), has been disinfected to the satisfaction of the local board of health. Either may disinfect, but the local board of health must do so, as soon as possible, if the committee fails to properly disinfect.

Article 42, of which you specifically inquire, particularly applies to matters and things discussed in the preceding sections, but I have no hesitation in saying that the local board of health may "direct the destruction" of school books, in the sense of recommending such destruction.

I do not believe, however, that the local board of health has authority to destroy school books and the furniture and fittings of a school house. If the local board of health is of the opinion that disinfection of such books, furniture and fittings is impossible or impracticable without destroying them, it may recommend to the school committee or to the owners of the books,

their destruction, and it may prevent the holding of school in the infected room until the room and its contents have been properly disinfected.

It seems inconceivable that any collision or clash of authority could arise between these two boards, but in case of such collision, I feel that the statement as above of their respective powers and duties should guide either body in an honest endeavor to do its whole duty.

You ask further, "what effect chapter 73, Public Laws of 1909, has upon the powers and duties of local boards of health under sections 43 and 44, chapter 18, R. S.", and my reply is that said chapter 73 neither diminishes nor enlarges the powers and duties of the local boards of health.

Subject: Protection of trees and shrubs from the introduction and ravages of dangerous insects and diseases. Certificate on nursery stock shipped into this state from any other state, country or province. Agent's license—R. S. Chap. 15 as amended by P. L. 1909, Chap. 34.

Mr. E. F. Hitchings, Augusta, Maine.

Sir:—You invited my opinion upon two points relative to the purchase and shipment of nursey stock under the provisions of P. L. 1909, Chap. 34.

The first inquiry relates to R. S., Chap. 15, Sec. 4, as amended by said P. L. 1909, Chap. 34. The amended section reads as follows:

"All nursery stock shipped into this state from any other state, country or province shall bear on each box or package a certificate that the contents of said box or package have been investigated by a duly authorized inspecting officer, and that said contents appear to be free from all dangerous insects and diseases."

I have been informed that it has been the practice in the past for owners of nurseries in other states, countries or provinces, to cause their nurseries to be inspected annually and to affix the certificate of such nursery inspection to the goods which they shipped into the State of Maine. While this may have been sufficient prior to the amendment which we are now discussing, it seems to be perfectly plain that the new law contemplates an entirely different thing. Indeed the amendment is so plain that it hardly admits of misunderstanding. It does not matter when or how many times the nursery from which the stock was taken has been inspected or by whom (I am now referring to nurseries outside of the State of Maine), but the present requirement is that each box or package shipped into this State shall bear a certificate that the contents of that particular box or package have been investigated by a duly authorized inspecting officer. I go further and say that in my opinion the intent of the law is that if several packages are contained in one box, then the box itself should bear a certificate and that each package therein contained shall bear such certificate. By this means if there are packages to be delivered to various customers coming in one box, the box itself will be amply protected in transit and each customer will be protected when his package is brought to him after it may have been taken from the box in which it came.

The second inquiry relates to R. S., Chap. 15, Sec. 6 as amended by striking out all of said section and inserting in place therefor the following:

"Agents or other parties excepting growers who wish to sell nursery stock shall make application for an agent's license and shall file with the state entomologist the names and addresses of nurseries or parties from which they purchased their stock. On receipt of such application the state entomologist shall issue an agent's license valid for one year in such form and with such provisions as the commissioner of agriculture may prescribe. Such license may be revoked at any time for failure to report names and addresses of nurseries from which stock is purchased or for such other causes as may in the opinion of the commissioner of agriculture be deemed sufficient. Any violation of this requirement shall be fined not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars for each offense."

I confess that the intent of the legislature with reference to this amendment is not wholly free from doubt. The words "agents", "sell", "purchase", if used in a strict legal sense might lead us to one conclusion while if we attempt to ascertain the purposes for which the act was drawn and the evils which it intended to correct one might reach another conclusion. Adopting the latter method of interpretation, I am constrained to believe that the legislature intended that each person soliciting an order for nursery stock should have a license under the provisions of Sec. 6, and that a license issued simply to some person, firm or corporation employing solicitors would not meet the intent of the law or prevent the evils which the amendment was designed to correct.

Subject: State School for boys—Powers of Trustees relating to probation and release.

E. P. Wentworth, Supt, Portland, Maine.

SIR:—Your favor of Oct. 16th is at hand, with the following statement of facts and questions:—

"A certain boy in the State School for Boys is deemed reformed, and fit to be released from the School. His home in A is believed to be totally unfit for the boy. The Roman Catholic priest in A wishes the boy to be sent to a Roman Catholic school near Quebec, Canada, and the boy's mother consents to his going there for one year.

Question I—Can the trustees of the State School for Boys lawfully release this boy on probation and send him to the above-mentioned Catholic school?

Question 2—Can the trustees of the State School for Boys lawfully grant this boy his final discharge from this School, and then send him to said Catholic School; or send him to the said Catholic school and then grant final discharge from the State School for Boys?

In answering the two questions submitted, you and all others interested, will of course readily understand that the question is in no way affected by the character or denomination of the school in question. It hardly seems necessary to say this but I deem it proper and wise to preface my answers with such a statement.

In answering the first question whether the trustees of the State School for Boys may lawfully release a boy on probation and send him to an institution located in Canada, my reply must be in the negative. The provision for probation as applied to boys in your institution is found in R. S., Chap. 143, Sec. 10, and only authorizes the trustees to commit a boy on probation "to any suitable inhabitant of the State." This provision clearly limits the powers of the trustees in that respect. If they exercise the power of probation the commitment of the boy must be to a suitable inhabitant of this State and clearly cannot be extended so as to allow the commitment of a boy to a school in Canada.

Your second question is in two parts and those two parts should be answered separately. The first part of the second question as to whether the trustees of the State School for Boys may lawfully grant a boy his final discharge from the School and then send him to a school in Canada must be answered in the negative. The provision of statute for discharge is found in R. S., Chap. 143, Sec. 7, and is in these words, "The trustees may discharge any boy as reformed." The statute does not give the trustees any power to exercise dominion or control over the boy after this discharge is granted by reason of his reformation. If they discharge him for that reason that closes their control over him unless within the age limit provided by the statute he is recommitted to the school on a new charge... second part of the second question should also be answered in the negative for there is no authority in the statute by which the trustees can send one of the inmates of your school to an institution in Canada and that seems to be the condition precedent in the second part of the second question-

I regret that I cannot advise you differently if the welfare of the boy could be greatly promoted by his being sent to the school in Canada, but I can only advise you as to the powers given you by statute.

Subject: Fees of officers for commitment to State School for Boys.

E. P. Wentworth, Supt., Portland, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your favor of March 19, 1909, asking opinion upon two questions as follows:

Question 1. Two boys, A and B, are conveyed by a deputy sheriff to the State School for Boys, from the officer's residence in the town of X and committed to the custody of the superintendent thereof by virtue of a single mittimus. The actual distance from the officer's residence in the town of X to the school by the usually traveled route is 150 miles. How much mileage is the deputy sheriff lawfully entitled to receive?

Question 2. If the two boys, A and B, were conveyed to the school at the same time by the same officer, but by virtue of two seperate mittimuses, one for each boy, would the total amount of mileage lawfully chargeable by the officer be different from what it would be if the two boys were conveyed upon one mittimus?

Replying to the first qustion, it is my opinion that for the service of the single mittimus, although two persons were committed thereby, the officer would be entitled to six cents a mile each way, or travel for three hundred miles. The statutory provisions seem plain; "For travel actually performed * * * * six cents a mile each way, from the officer's residence to the place of the service of the precept, by the usually traveled route. * * * * Only one travel shall be allowed for any one precept, and no constructive travel." F. S. C. 117, Sec. 5.

Replying to the second question, where two or more precepts are served at the same time, and in making such services, the travel of the officer is all included in one trip, then it is my opinion that only one charge for travel should be allowed, otherwise the provisions of the statute giving fees "For travel actually performed", and forbidding fees for "constructive travel" would be idle and meaningless expressions.

Subject: P. I. 1909, Chaps. 202, 228, State work to be done by contract.

George S. Bliss, M. D., Maine School for Feeble-Minded, West Pownal, Maine.

SIR:—Your favor of Sept. 25th is at hand asking my views regarding Chaps. 202 and 228 of the Public Laws of 1909, your special question being "do these laws allow of the Trustees of the institution doing construction by day work of over \$3,000, provided that no contract is signed for the same."

These two acts have been the source of quite a good deal of discussion and some have seemed to find some contradiction either in the spirit or the terms of the two acts. One was approved April I and the other April 2, but both went into effect the same day, viz., July 3.

It is a common and familiar rule of the interpretation of statutes that if possible statutes should be so interpreted as not to conflict with each other, if such a construction is possible. In this case I do not think there is any necessary or even implied contradiction of thought. Chap. 202 explicitly requires that on or after Aug. 1, 1909, all contracts for construction or repairs of buildings at the expense of the State, involving a total cost of more than \$3,000, shall be awarded by a system of competitive bids in accordance with the provisions of that act, and such other conditions and restrictions as the Governor and Council might from time to time provide.

Chap. 228 provides that when certain work is done by contract then certain provisions prescribed in the latter act as to advertising, etc., must be complied with. It would appear, therefore, that if any contract work is done whether the amount be large or small, under the provisions of Chap. 228, then the provisions of that chapter must be complied with. On the other hand, as I have said, Chap. 202 seems to require a contract in every case where construction or repair of buildings are at the expense of the State, involving a total cost of more than \$3,000.

To your specific question therefore, I think I must reply, that if your work is to cost more than \$3,000, you must have a contract and would further add that in such case the contract should not only take into consideration this obligatory provision but also the provisions of Chap. 228 as to advertising, preference to workmen, bidders, etc.

Subject: Registration in Optometry.

Albert M. Wentworth, Esq., Sec. Maine Board of Optometry, Portland, Maine.

SIR:— I am requested by the chairman of the Maine State Board of Registration and Examination in Optometry to write you an opinion as to whether the provisions of section 8 of chapter 105, P. L. 1909, forbid said board to act upon affidavits for registration received more than ninety days after said act took effect.

The question resolves itself to this, is the requirement that applicants for registration, who have been engaged in the actual and continuous practice of optometry, etc., "shall within ninety days" after said act takes effect file affidavits mandatory, or directory?

Are affidavits received after the lapse of said ninety days entitled to consideration or are they not?

It seems that when a statute prescribes the doing of an act and fixes the time for such doing, the requirement as to time is to be regarded as directory, and not a limitation of the exercise of the power, unless it contain some negative words, denying the exercise of the power after the time named.

This is the conclusion of the courts of last resort in our own and several other states where the question has been considered.

Had the legislature added a negative provision, that no affidavits should be entertained after the passage of ninety days from the time said act took effect, no discretion would have been left to the Board.

Such negative was omitted and the general interpretation giving said Board the liberty to exercise its discretion upon the question of entertaining such delayed affidavits without question obtains.

In my judgment the Maine State Board of Registration and Examination in Optometry may exercise a wide discretion as to receiving and acting upon affidavits filed after the first day of October, 1909.

Subject: Dental Registration, Statute of 1891, Reciprocity with other states.

Langdon S. Chilcott, President, Board of Dental Examiners of the State of Maine, Bangor, Maine.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of two inquiries upon which you desire my opinion.

"First. A man who was formerly in the practice of dentistry in this State, moved away prior to 1891. He has been in practice in another state, but did not register in Maine in accordance with Section 4 of the Dental Registration Act. He has now returned and desires to re-enter the practice of dentistry in Maine. Can he register without an examination, or has he forfeited his right to do so by his own neglect?

Second. Can the Board of Dental Examiners of the State of Maine under the present Dental Law, enter into reciprocity agreements with the dental examining boards of other States and accept certificates issued by such State boards in lieu of examinations by the Maine board?"

The dental registration act so-called, was enacted in 1891 and contained some provisions which are now obsolete and some of the provisions of the act of 1891 have been modified by subsequent acts of the legislature so that the law as now recorded in R. S. Chap. 17, Secs. 18 to 23 inclusive, is the law of the State today although the wording in some respects differs from the original act of 1891.

Sec. 4 of the act of 1891 provided as follows:

"Every person engaged in the practice of dentistry or dental surgery in this state at the time of the approval of this act shall, within three months thereafter, cause his or her name, residence and place of business to be registered with said board of examiners. The statements of every such person shall be verified under oath before a notary public or justice of the peace in such manner as may be prescribed by the board, and upon due compliance and payment of the fee as provided in section seven of this act, shall receive from said board a certificate in due form, signed by the president and attested by the secretary authorizing such persons to practice dentistry in this state."

This provision you will observe related only to those who were engaged in the practice of dentistry or dental surgery in this State at the time of the approval of the act. Your question involves the right of a dentist who had moved away from this state prior to 1891 and, as I assume from your statement, was not a resident of the State at the time of the approval of the act of 1891. The provisions of the act above quoted could not apply to him under any circumstances for it only applied to those who were engaged in practice in this State at the time of the approval of the act. It will therefore be necessary for him to comply with the law as it now stands as to examination and payment of fees.

Your second question must be answered in the negative. Examination in certain subjects as well as the payment of a fee is made by our law a fundamental prerequisite to the issuance of the certificate referred to as entitling a man to practice dentistry

in this State. The board of dental examiners have no power whatever to enter into reciprocal arrangements with dental examining boards of other states whereby a certificate issued by another state would stand in lieu of the examination which the law requires to be made under the statute as it now stands upon the books.

V. MISCELLANEOUS MATTERS NOT PROPERLY CLASSIFIED UNDER EITHER OF THE ABOVE HEADS, AND SUGGESTIONS, AS REQUIRED BY LAW.

CORPORATIONS.

The work of this department with respect to corporations consists chiefly in the examination and approval of certificates of organization under the general law, granting excuses whereby corporations are relieved from filing annual returns with the secretary of State, and enforcing collection of franchise taxes from those corporations which are delinquent in their payment of such taxes. The fees paid for approval of certificates and granting of excuses, which prior to the first of July 1905 were retained by the attorney general as a portion of the lawful income of that office, are now turned over to the State treasurer and form a substantial item of income to the State. The number of certificates approved during the year 1909 was nine hundred twenty-two (922), and during the year 1910 was seven hundred thirty-five (735). During the year 1909 two hundred ninety-six (206) excuses were issued, and during the year 1010 two hundred eighty-nine (289) excuses were issued. As a fee of five dollars is paid the attorney general for each approval and each excuse, it will be seen that the income to the State from these two sources, for the two years, was \$11,210.

The statute provides that whenever any franchise tax against a corporation shall have remained in arrears for a period of six months after the same shall have become payable, that fact shall be reported by the State treasurer to the attorney general who shall proceed to collect the same. This task is by no means as simple a one as might be supposed. Under a practice quite general, these corporations formed under the general law are, in the first instance, formed by what are known as dummy incorporators who, immediately after the organization is completed, resign their several offices and in their stead are elected the real promoters, in a great majority of instances non-residents of the State, their names and residences being unknown to the attorney general or to any other officer of the State until

an annual return is made to the secretary of State, and in hundreds of instances no such annual return is ever made. No one is personally responsible for the payment of these taxes and the assets of the corporation, in a very large majority of the cases are in distant states and even in foreign countries, where the corporations are engaged in business. In many cases the amount due from the corporation for the annual tax is only five dollars. From these delinquent corporations, by the efforts of this department there was collected for the State, of taxes assessed for the year 1908, \$45,132.00 and of taxes assessed for the year 1909, \$33,060.00. The charters of corporations in arrears for franchise taxes for any year prior to 1908 have been suspended by virtue of appropriate acts of the legislature in recent sessions. According to the practice of this department, since the office of assistant attorney general was created, diligent endeavor has been made to collect over due taxes even from this last class of corporations, with the result that out of franchise taxes assessed for the years 1903-1907, and not collected heretofore, there have been collected during the two years covered by this report the sum of \$13,585.00. This work of collection of franchise taxes has been made possible almost entirely from the fact that the office of assistant attorney general was created, for prior to that event but little was or could be done along this line by the attorney general alone.

Much has been said in regard to the wisdom or otherwise of our general corporation laws. As a special commission was appointed by the last legislature to investigate and report upon this subject no discussion of those laws will be undertaken in this report. It may not be improper, however, to observe that much of the criticism of the failure of this department to take certain legal steps with reference to the acts of those who mismanage corporations is founded upon a mis-apprehension of the powers of the attorney general, either at common law or by virtue of the statutes of the State.

INHERITANCE TAXES.

The legislature of 1909 added to the inheritance tax laws of this State, by the enactment of chapters 186 and 187 of the Public Laws of that year. In some of their provisions these chapters are simply amendatory of sections of chapter 8 of the Re-

vised Statutes, and in other provisions the enactments of the chapters named are entirely new. Prior to the date when the Public Laws of 1909 took effect an inheritance tax was not required if the entire estate under consideration descended to or for the use of a lineal heir, as defined in Section 69 of Chapter 8, or to any educational, charitable, religious or benevolent institution in this State. The tax was limited to estates or distributive shares thereof passing to collateral heirs.

Chapter 186, P. L. of 1909, however, requires a graded tax on all shares of estates passing by will or by the intestate laws of this State to even the most direct lineal heirs, when such shares exceed ten thousand dollars in value. This is new legislation. The same chapter provides a graded tax on shares so passing to collateral heirs, or to strangers to the blood of the decedent, differing in amount from the tax required by laws formerly enacted. The exemption to collateral heirs is retained as formerly, and this exemption of five hundred dollars is all that is granted unless the bequest, devise or distributive share of an estate passes to or for the use of a husband, wife, father, mother, child or adopted child. The only bequests or devises of property not subject to an inheritance tax as the law now stands are such as are less than the exemptions granted to certain classes of heirs and those made to or for the use of an educational, charitable, religious or benevolent institution in this State, the property of which is by law exempt from taxation.

Chapter 187, P. L. of 1909 also changes the duties incumbent on Judges of Probate, Registers of Probate and the legal representatives of persons deceased, whose estates are subject to an inheritance tax, and imposes new and somewhat onerous duties on the attorney general's department. In passing it should be said that these duties were not only cheerfully assumed by this department, but when the act was under consideration by the legislature of 1909, it was my personal suggestion that the same be undertaken by this department in the trial stages of the new law, rather than by a new officer and a new department, to be created with additional expense to the State, as the act originally contemplated. At that time it was not supposed that the office of the assistant attorney general was likely to be abolished.

Section 1 of this chapter re-enacts section 86 of Chapter 8, R. S., so that section reads as follows:

"Section 86. The registers of probate in the several counties shall deliver to the attorney general, on or before the first day of June in each year, a list of all estates in which it appears from the record that some part of said estate may be liable to an inheritance tax, and in which a will has been offered for probate or administration granted for more than one year prior to the time of filing such list, and in which no inheritance tax has been assessed or paid.

Said list shall contain the name of the deceased, the date of the administration granted, and the name and residence of the administrator or executor.

The attorney general shall promptly investigate all cases so reported, by notifying the executor, administrator, trustee, heir or devisee, and in such other manner as he may determine, and if it appears to him that in any such case an inheritance tax is due the state and has not been paid to the state, he shall, unless said tax is paid to the state, within thirty days after notice from him to the executor, administrator, trustee, heir or devisee, that the same is due, cite the executor, administrator, trustee, heir or devisee, whose duty it is to pay said tax, before the proper probate court in such manner as is provided for the citation of trust officers in probate proceedings and shall take all other action necessary to secure the payment of said tax.

In such proceedings the attorney general shall recover costs to be fixed and determined by the judge of probate in his discretion, which costs may be retained by said attorney general for his own use and shall be additional to any salary allowed him by law."

As this act did not become effective until the third day of July, 1909, the lists of estates properly chargeable with an inheritance tax were to be delivered to the attorney general for the first time, on or before the first day of June, 1910. It seemed to be the intent of the legislature that all collateral inheritance taxes due and payable since the enactment of the former statute providing for such taxes, and which had not been collected, should be collected by the attorney general, and, therefore, in April, 1910, a letter was mailed to each of the sixteen registers of probate, reminding them of the requirement of the statute, and requesting that they promptly forward the list of delinquent estates. At varying intervals the lists called for were submitted and the legal representatives, or beneficiaries, of estates thus reported delinquent were promptly notified of the conditions reported in the various courts of probate. From the county of Cumberland it was evident that a complete list

was not obtainable because the records of the probate office of that county were destroyed by the fire of January 24, 1908. Registers of probate in some of the counties were dilatory in making up the lists, but after visits by the assistant attorney general to those counties, and with the aid of this department, lists which are supposed to be complete have been made up and are on file, with the exception of the list from Cumberland county as noted above, and from York county, from which latter county the register has forwarded a list dating from January 1901, when the present incumbent assumed the duties of register of probate for York county. The volume of work assumed by this department, in complying with this statute, in addition to duties already required by law, can be inferred from the fact that one register reported two hundred and one estates for our investigation.

Section one of the new act under discussion further makes it the duty of the attorney general to apply for the appointment of an administrator when, after the decease of a person, a will is not offered for probate, or an application for administration made within six months after such decease. Section five requires that the attorney general, and not the county attorney of the county, as formerly, shall represent the State when questions arise in any probate court in relation to an inheritance tax.

Two sections of statute were enacted additional to said Chapter 8, the former of which provides as follows:

"Section 88. If any executor, administrator or trustee neglects or refuseses to file an inventory of the estate under his charge within three months from the date of the warrant of appraisal, unless such time be extended by the judge of probate, he shall be cited to file such account (this was evidently intended to be "inventory") by the judge of probate and if he neglects or refuses to file such inventory within sixty days thereafter he shall be liable to a penalty of not more than five hundred dollars which shall be recovered in an action of debt by the attorney general for the use of the state and the register of probate shall notify the attorney general of the failure of any executor, administrator or trustee to file an inventory as above provided."

This section seems intended to forbid private apportionments of the estate of all decedents, and requires that an inventory shall be filed in court in every instance. It places squarely upupon the judges of probate the duty of requiring inventories in all cases, and provides that the attorney general shall be notified by the register of probate as often as there is a failure so to file the inventory. In several of the counties the registers of probate have provided printed copies of this section which they mail with each warrant of appraisal, and if all judges of probate would adopt this practice, and carry out the plain requirements of the section, the collection of inheritance taxes in future would be much less troublesome.

'Section 89', the other new statute, is an attempt to avoid double taxation, and is very plain in its provisions and is here quoted in full:

"Section 89. Property belonging to a deceased resident of this state which shall be distributed by order of the probate court subsequent to the passage of this act, and which is not therein at the time of his death shall not be taxable under the provisions of this chapter if legally subject in another state or country to a tax of like character and amount to that imposed by section sixty-nine and if such tax be actually paid or guaranteed or secured in accordance with the law of such other state or country; if legally subject in another state or country to a tax of like character, but of less amount than that imposed by section sixty-nine and such tax be actually paid, guaranteed or secured as aforesaid, such property shall be taxable under the provisions of section sixty-nine to the extent of the difference between the tax thus actually paid, guaranteed or secured and the amount for which such property would otherwise be liable under this chapter. Property of non-resident decedent which is within the jurisdiction of the state at the time of his death if subject to a tax by the law of the state or country of his residence, of like character with that imposed by this chapter, shall be subject only to such portion of the tax imposed hereunder as may be in excess of such tax imposed by the laws of such state or country."

A brief experience with this new law for the collection of inheritance taxes has led me to believe that it should be modified in some features, and the following suggestions are made for the consideration of the legislature

In order to secure for the attorney general the information requisite to enable him to act under section 87 of chapter 8, a statute should be enacted, in substance as follows:

"Assessors of towns shall report to the attorney general the names of all persons dying within their respective towns, who in the judgment of said assessors leave estates the value whereof exceed five hundred dollars each, together with the names of husband, wife, and next of kin; such report to be mailed to the attorney general within ten days of the time when the death becomes known to such assessor."

To render the payment of inheritance taxes more prompt and certain it would seem that section 72 of said chapter 8 should be revised and amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 72. All taxes imposed by section sixty-nine upon the estates of deceased residents of this state shall be payable to the treasurer of state, and all taxes imposed by said section sixty-nine upon the estates of non-resident decedents to the attorney general, to be by him paid to the treasurer of state, by the executor, administrators or trustees, before the expiration of two years from the date of their giving bond; but if legacies or distributive shares are paid within said two years, the tax thereof shall be payable at the same time; and if the same are not so paid, interest at the rate of nine per cent, a year shall be charged and collected from the time the same became payable; but no such tax upon estates of residents of this state shall be accepted except upon presentation of a certificate from a probate court showing the amount of such tax due. Property of which the decedent died seized or possessed subject to taxes as aforesaid in whatever form of investment it may happen to be, and all property acquired in substitution therefor shall be charged with a lien for all taxes and interest thereon which are or may become due on such property; but said lien shall not affect any personal property after the same has been sold or disposed of for value by the executors, administrators or trustees. The lieu thus charged upon any real estate or separate parcel thereof may be discharged by the payment of all taxes due and to become due upon said real estate or separate parcel, or by an order or decree of the probate court discharging said lien and securing the payment to the state of the tax due or to become due by bond or deposit."

Two clerical errors in the chapters enacted by the legislature of 1909 should be corrected. In line four of section 69, as printed, the word "interstate" should be "intestate"; and in line five of section 88, the word "account" should be "inventory".

In answer to a request by the State treasurer for an opinion as to whether the capital stock of corporations organized under the laws of Maine, and owned by non-residents, is subject to the Maine Inheritance Tax Law, the treasurer was advised, basing that advise upon the decisions of courts in certain states having inheritance tax laws, that such property is, "within the jurisdiction of this State", as expressed by section 69 of chapter 8 of the Revised Statutes, and executors, administrators and trustees of non-resident decedents seeking to transfer such shares of stock have been notified of this decision, as their cases have been brought to our notice. If our advice is sound, a source of revenue too promising to be neglected is opened to the State, and a small sum has already been paid in to the treasury by the legal representatives of non-resident decedents.

But our statutes need enlargement if this revenue is to be thoroughly collected. Authority should be given the attorney general to charge against any inheritance taxes collected by the State, under the provisions of this act, all reasonable expenses incurred in the collection of such taxes from non-resident estates. The legislature should also provide for notice to officers of corporations, such as those we are discussing, forbidding transfer of stock of decedent stockholders until a proper certificate, from the proper officer of the State, is obtained, showing that the inheritance taxes are paid.

So far as this State has enacted inheritance tax legislation it has largely followed the Massachusetts statutes. We find in Massachusetts, therefore, valuable models for legislation and as enlargement of our statute just suggested, and with the idea of providing more effective measures whereby to collect the taxes on estates of non-residents within the jurisdiction of Maine, I suggest the enactment of the following sections additional to said chapter 8.

"When personal estate passing from any person not an inhabitant of this state, as provided in section 69 of chapter 8 of the Revised Statutes, shall consist in whole or in part of shares of any railroad, or street railway company or telegraph or telephone company incorporated under the laws of this state and also of some other state or country, so much only of each share as is proportional to the part of such company's lines lying within this state shall be considered as property of such person within the jurisdiction of this state for the purposes of said chapter."

"If a foreign executor, administrator or trustee assigns or transfers any stock in any national bank located in this state or in any corporation organized under the laws of this state, owned by a deceased non-resident at the date of his death and liable to a tax under the provisions of this chapter, the tax shall be paid to the attorney general at the time of such assignment or transfer; and if it is not paid when due, such executor, administrator or trustee shall be personally liable therefor until it is paid. A bank located in this state or a corporation organized under the laws of this state which shall record a transfer of any share of its stock made by a foreign executor, administrator or trustee, or issue a new certificate for a share of its stock at the instance of a foreign executor, administrator or trustee, before all taxes imposed thereon by the provisions of this chapter have been paid, shall be liable for such tax in an action of contract brought by the attorney general."

"An executor, administrator, guardian or trustee duly appointed in another state or in a foreign country, and duly qualified and acting, who may be entitled to any personal property, situated in this state, may file an authenticated copy of his appointment in the probate court for any county in which there is real property of his trust, or, if there is no such real property, in any county in which there is personal property of his trust, and may upon petition to said court, after such notice to the attorney general, creditors and all persons interested as the court may order, be licensed to receive or to sell by public or private sale, upon such terms and to such person or persons as he should think fit, or otherwise to dispose of, and to transfer and convey, shares in a corporation or other personal property, if the court finds that there is no executor, administrator, guardian or trustee appointed in this state who is authorized so to receive and to dispose of such shares or estate, and that such foreign executor, administrator, guardien or trustee will be liable, upon and after such receipt or sale, to account for such share or estate, or for the preceeds thereof, in the state or country in which he was appointed; and that no person resident in this state and interested as a creditor or otherwise objects to the granting of such license or appears to be prejudiced thereby; but no such license shall be granted to a foreign executor or administrator until the expiration of six months after the death of his testator or intestate."

"Securities or assets belonging to the estate of a deceased non-resident shall not be delivered or transferred to a foreign executor, administrator or legal representative of such decedent, unless such executor, administrator or legal representative has been licensed to receive the said securities or assets under the provisions of this chapter. License to receive, sell, transfer or convey securities or assets under the provisions of this chapter shall not be granted unless it appears to the judge of the probate court that all taxes imposed by the provisions of this chapter have been paid or secured according to law. Any person or corporation that delivers or transfers any securities or assets belonging to the estate of a non-resident decedent before all taxes imposed thereon by the provisions of this chapter have been paid or secured according to law, shall be liable for such tax in an action of contract brought by the attorney general."

"The attorney general shall commence proceedings for the recovery of any of said taxes within six months after the same become payable; and also whenever the judge of a probate court certifies to him that the final account of an executor, administrator or trustee has been filed in such court, and that the settlement of the estate is delayed because of the non-payment of said tax. The probate court shall so certify upon the application of any heir, legatee or other person interested therein, and may extend the time of payment of said tax whenever the circumstances of the case require."

"This act shall not apply to estates of persons deceased prior to the date of taking effect of the same, nor to property passing by deed, grant, sale or gift made prior to the date hereof; the said estate and property shall remain subject to the provisions of law in force prior to the date when this act takes effect."

The value of the inheritance tax law as a source of revenue to the state may be estimated by reference to the books of the state treasurer where it will appear that during the year 1910 there was received from this source \$138,709.92. Whether our department has done its share of the labor involved in collecting this sum, is also shown by the fact that we were actively concerned in the collection of \$92,922.59, or in other words, nearly seventy per cent. of the large amount of revenue which the state received from inheritance taxes was collected through the instrumentality and activity of the attorney general's department.

This branch of the department's work has been done almost wholly by the assistant attorney general and would seem to amply justify the wisdom and good policy of retaining that officer in the employ of the state. His work is not that which could be done by a clerk. The tasks call for a person learned in law, patient and accurate in detail and courteous in the treatment of all with whom he comes in contact and especially with an eye single to the interests of the commonwealth.

CLAIMS AGAINST COUNTIES UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 92, P. L. 1905 AND CHAPTER 225, P. L. 1909.

These public acts are popularly known as the Sturgis law and the Havey amendment thereto. Under section 6 of the act of 1905 certain fees of the enforcement commissioners and their deputies are to be taxed in the bill of costs as the fees of sheriffs and witnesses are taxed and these fees are to be paid directly to the state treasury. Section 9 of that act provides that all fines collected by prosecutions undertaken by the enforcement commissioners or their deputies are to be divided equally between the state and the county in which the prosecution is had. Under these two sections fees and fines due to the state accrued in certain counties. Reference to the financial statement below, showing the amounts collected by the attorney general's department, will disclose the fact that the county of Knox has already paid for such fines \$575.00 and for such fees \$666.34, a total of \$1,241.34. The enforcement commission claims that there is due from the county of Androscoggin for fees and fines up to March 30, 1910, \$3,765.19, and from the county of Penobscot up to and including January 1910 the sum of \$860.25. No suits have been instituted for the collection of these two sums against these two counties because the constitutionality of the entire Sturgis act has been raised by the suits already brought against those two counties upon another branch of the Sturgis act as hereinbefore reported. These sums should be distinguished from the sums due under the so-called Havey amendment to the Sturgis law. As will be seen by reference to the case of Gilmore v. Penobscot County, hereinbefore reported, judgment has already been obtained against Penobscot County for fees due under the Havey amendment, and reference to Gilmore v. Androscoggin County, hereinbefore reported, will show that another suit is pending against Androscoggin County on the same account-Since the date of bringing these two suits other claims have accrued against those two counties and there are also similar claims against Knox County and Cumberland County. A condensed statement of these claims may be made as follows:

Thus it will be seen that the entire claims of the state against the above counties, under chapter 92 P. L. 1905 and the Havey amendment, not including December 1910, is \$35,581.40. This office has not received from the auditor's office since January I, 1911, any statement of the amount which would be due to the state from any of the counties in which the enforcement commission was at work during the month of December 1910. This very large total, when collected and paid into the state treasury, will be of so much financial importance to the state that my successor will doubtless give to it his best efforts and endeavor.

From the tables immediately foregoing, it wilt be observed that this department has kept entirely within the appropriations made for its own support and expenses and with reference to those appropriations which were to be expended for other purposes under the direction of the attorney general, we have expended for the two years only about one-twelfth of the appropriations made by the legislature. Contrasting the total expense to the state of the department for two years, viz, \$16,115.40, with the amount which we have been instrumental in turning into the state treasury, viz, \$197,150.93, it would seem that this department has been fairly profitable to the state based upon a financial estimate at least.

When we further consider that prior to 1905 when the office of assistant attorney general was established and the attorney general placed upon a fixed salary, the heads of the state departments hired private counsel to conduct suits and advise with reference to matters in which their departments were interested and that since that date the attorney general and one assistant has conducted the trials of nearly all the homicide cases and some other felonies, and has done all the civil business for the state and the heads of departments, we trust that our stewardship will be acceptable.

CONCLUSION.

In thus closing my official career, I desire to record my appreciation of the efficiency, diligence, integrity and ability of the several sheriffs and county attorneys with whom I have had dealings during my term of office. My relations with them, collectively and individually, have been exceedingly pleasant and I acknowledge myself under obligations to them, not only for the assistance which they have rendered me, but for the uniform and abundant courtesy which they have shown toward me in every instance.

Hon. Charles P. Barnes, who has served me as assistant attorney general for the last two years, is entitled to especial mention and commendation. Largely to him is entitled the credit for the collection of inheritance taxes and franchise taxes. He has devoted himself to the corporation work of the department with great skill and with a discerning knowledge of corporation law. In his relations toward all with whom he comes in contact, he is courteous, patient, accommodating and kind. Our personal relations have been so close and intimate that I dare not speak of them in this connection. I shall always cherish his friendship, respect his ability, commend him to the attention of others, and wish him God speed through life.

To your Excellency, the Governor, to the members of your Council, and to the heads of departments and other state officials with whom I have had official relations during these two years, I express my sincere thanks for the courtesy you have always shown me, for the consideration with which you have assigned my tasks, and the never failing patience which you have exercised toward my shortcomings.
