



# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF MAINE INSANE AND EASTERN MAINE INSANE HOSPITAL.

To the Governor and Council of the State of Maine:

The Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta and the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital at Bangor, having completed their services for the year ending November 30th, 1910, respectfully submit for your consideration the result of their labors during that period, as prescribed by the laws of the State of Maine.

We call your attention to the large appropriations for these two hospitals made by the Legislature of 1909, and placed, by the laws of the State of Maine, in our hands, for personal care and proper expenditure. In making this annual report, we feel justified in saying that these appropriations and every department of the hospital have received our careful attention.

The standing committees and visiting committees, for the requirements of the hospitals, have been duly filled, and the monthly meetings of the full Board of Trustees have been well attended. Every attention has been given by each member of the Board of Trustees to the various matters that required his individual care. It has often happened that financial and other matters have required considerable discussion, and frequently serious mistakes have been averted by such examinations.

We are able to say that the two hospitals stand on broad and comprehensive ground in the fulfillment of their duty for the benefit of their patients; and no insane hospital can afford greater means and privileges for the cure of the unfortunate insane, or promise a more speedy recovery in proportion to the generous means employed.

#### BUILDING COMMITTEES.

The Board of Trustees, after the close of the Maine legislative session of 1909, which made appropriations for the necessary requirements of the two insane hospitals, selected the following members of the Board to have full charge of the expenditure of the said appropriations. During the years of 1909 and 1910, the same individuals have been retained on the several committees.

The appropriations for the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta were placed in the charge of Trustees Macomber, Mrs. Cony and Nickerson.

The appropriations for the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital at Bangor were placed in the charge of Trustees Field, White, Chase and Mrs. Cony.

The appropriations for the sanatorium at Chase Island were placed in the care of Trustees Chase, Field and Mrs. Cony.

The President of the Board of Trustees was made a member, ex-officio, of all the committees.

The firm of John Calvin Stevens and John Howard Stevens of Portland were selected as architects for the work to be done in the years 1909-1910 at the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital at Bangor. The firm of Coombs and Gibbs of Lewiston was selected to perform the same duty for the same time at the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta, and also to have charge of the work to be done, by the appropriation of the Legislature, at Chase Island.

These two firms, during their employment, have always been ready to give information to the several committees of the Board of Trustees. The work which has been done has been finished in a manner that meets the approval of the Trustees.

The Board of Trustees have endeavored to meet all conditions with promptness and efficiency, and the work has been pushed along not without much inconvenience from delay, resulting from causes which could not be prevented.

The appropriations were placed in our care to be expended for purposes, as stated in an act passed by the Legislature, with the expectation that all material purchased, and other necessary matters, should be carefully supervised, and that the work, when completed, should show a finished condition, so as to be in every respect a source of pride and satisfaction to the State of Maine.

THE EARLY COMMENCEMENT AND THE CONTINUED PROGRESS IN CARING FOR THE INSANE POPULATION OF OUR STATE.

We are informed that Governor Jonathan G. Huntoon, in the year 1830, earnestly advocated, in his message to the Legislature, which convened in the city of Portland, the establishing of a Maine State Hospital for the insane. This was the first recommendation by any Governor of this State for a hospital for the insane, and may be considered a monument to his memory.

After much delay and considerable effort on the part of friends of meritorious public benevolence, the stone building was erected on the banks of the Kennebec River at Augusta, and was occupied in 1840, seventy years ago, by one hundred and five insane patients. Prior to that time the condition of the insane in our State was very distressing.

In one town, where one of the Trustees resides, a cave was constructed within the side of a hillock, and an insane person incarcerated there for a long time. There was another instance, where an insane person, during his waking hours, continually walked around a square in a certain village, much to the annoyance and fear of the residents. Such was the strange condition throughout the State.

The large appropriations, which have been made at each session of the Legislature during the past seventy years, represent a vast sum of money, and we are able to show a large amount and variety of property, belonging to the State, for the care and comfort of a most unfortuante class of our population. There has never come from the tax-payers of Maine any complaint but that all this expenditure was wise and just. We shall present what we consider a proper request for the necessities of the insane of this State, and trust that the liberality which their unfortunate condition requires will be shown by your ready consent to the several appropriations.

The appropriations made by the Legislature of 1909, and the Executive Department of the State, for building purposes and other demands of the two hospitals for the insane, are included in the following statement:

The appropriations made by the Legislature of 1909 for the two insane hospitals of the State and placed in the hands of the trustees of these hospitals, to be expended for the purposes named in the several acts, passed by the Legislature, have been given that care and attention which the responsibility of such a large amount required.

The several items of this expenditure total \$431,947.88.

The trustees desire to make the following statement: The several committees, who have had direct charge of the expenditures, have endeavored to perform their duty with fidelity and conserve the financial interests of the State. From the large amount appropriated, there still remains in the hands of the treasurer a small sum to be expended.

VISITING COMMITTEE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Visiting Committee of the Board of Trustees have made monthly visits to the hospitals for the insane at Augusta and Bangor; and they have also given the necessary attention to the sanatorium for the insane at Chase Island, delightfully situated on the open ocean, near the city of Rockland, where selected patients are permitted to pass the summer months.

It is our agreeable duty to inform the State that we found the wards of the hospitals always neat and comfortable, and heard from the patients many expressions of thankfulness for the kind treatment they were receiving and the continued attention given to make their surroundings pleasant.

#### THE INSANE HOSPITAL SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

The school for nurses has been continued in the two insane hospitals with great success. The school at the Eastern Maine Hospital graduated in 1910, with much promise for future usefulness:

#### DEATH OF SUPERINTENDENT BIGELOW T. SANBORN.

Since our last annual report, we have been called to mourn the death of one of the most earnest and devoted friends of the early Insane Hospital of the State. His funeral services in April, 1910, were attended by the Board of Trustees and many distinguished citizens. It was an occasion of much sadness. We shall never forget his upright character, his professional qualifications, his civic attainments, and his long and continuous work for the unfortunate insane. The high esteem in which his memory is held sheds a lustre on his many years of toil for the welfare and progress of this venerable institution.

The death of the late Doctor Bigelow T. Sanborn caused a vacancy in the office of Superintendent of the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta. The Trustees, feeling their responsibility in selecting a suitable person for such a position, gave the matter much thought, and numerous applicants were considered. They finally succeeded in finding a candidate, who had had a sufficiently long term of active service in one of the most noted hospitals in the United States, and who was well recommended by those who had an opportunity to judge of his character and professional merits. He accepted the position of Superintendent. At the same time the Trustees unanimously voted to sustain him in every attempt he should make to advance, in a judicious manner, the interests of the hospital, so that it should rank as one of the foremost institutions in the country. We anticipate that his ability and efforts will receive the approval of the Board of Trustees and of the general public.

#### TO THE MEMORY OF THE LATE GOV. ABNER COBURN.

It is becoming, in a review of our annual statement of the condition and progress of the affairs of the Maine Insane Hospital, to express what continually cheers our hearts—our thankful appreciation of the interest of the generous fund, left by the late Abner Coburn, to be expended each year for the recreation and amusement of the patients of this institution. It pays for the choir, which adds so much to the interest of the Sunday religious services; it also furnishes music for the weekly dances, which bring together so many of both sexes to enjoy the pleasures of former years; also at frequent intervals it provides musical entertainment for other occasions. Many a forlorn and

melancholy patient has been cheered by such methods, if not actually started on the road to recovery.

It is a matter of much regret on the part of the Board of Trustees that the Coburn Fund, antedating as it does, the establishment of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital, cannot be applied for the benefit of that hospital also. While it was manifestly Gov. Coburn's generous idea to benefit all the insane of our State, unfortunately the bequest was so worded that the income of the fund can be used only for the inmates of the hospital at Augusta. It remains for some wealthy citizen to extend this blessing by starting a fund for a similar purpose, the interest to be used for the benefit of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital. We earnestly appeal to all such in our State to consider this method of conferring a lasting boon on afflicted humanity.

Another fund, which adds greatly to the diversion and profit of our patients, is the so-called Library Fund, consisting of separate, private, individual bequests, the income of which will enable us to add annually from two to three hundred volumes to the library at the Augusta hospital. This again applies only to the Augusta hospital. Through the kind sympathy of a Bangor lady, a library has been started at the Bangor hospital likewise. During the past two years she has donated a sum sufficient to purchase a couple of hundred volumes, which form a nucleus for a fine library. Occasionally magazines are sent by other interested citizens, and are much appreciated and enjoyed.

We are thankful for such expressions of generosity, and would call public attention to the opportunity for further liberality on the part of some lover of good literature, who can scarcely realize the deprivation caused by being without good books, magazines and papers.

The foregoing has been written by one of the members of the Board of Trustees, and it becomes the pleasure of the chairman of the said Board to offer to the associated officers and others of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital a contribution of \$2,000, to be a perpetual fund, of which the interest only may be applied for the purchase of books or magazines for the library of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital.

#### MEDICAL CONFERENCE OF HOSPITAL PHYSICIANS.

The Trustees are desirous of bestowing upon the superintendents and physicians of both hospitals their commendation for the efforts made by meeting together, as a medical conference, for the purpose of discussing the personal and mental qualities of newly admitted patients, and the propriety of granting discharges.

These several questions are made a matter of record for future use. The Board of Trustees have had an opportunity to be present at some of these meetings, which are held twice during the week, and were pleased with the methods that were in vogue. By obtaining an intelligent diagnosis of the history of each case, a basis is furnished for earlier improvement in the condition of the patient.

The following statement made by the Board of Trustees of the estimated expenditures for the use of the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta for the years 1911-1912:

#### EASTERN MAINE INSANE HOSPITAL.

The Eastern Maine Insane Hospital has increased, during the past two years, its facilities for taking charge of the insane population of the State. The work has been well done, and the additions and enlargements present a full and generous equipment for an additional number of 107 new patients. At the present time there are rooms for future admissions of insane patients. The arrangement is satisfactory and healthful and the appearance of the present buildings meets with universal approval. The recommendations of the Board of Trustees for additional appropriations for the necessities of a new hospital are wise, and should be considered by the present Legislature. The Superintendent, Frederick L. Hills, who succeeds the former Superintendent, Dr. H. W. Mitchell, is engaged in an active work for the success and progress of this hospital. We invite the reading of the annual report.

#### CONCLUSION.

It has been my privilege for nearly twenty years to prepare and deliver the annual report of the Board of Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospital and the Eastern Insane Hospital of the State for the consideration of the Governor and Council of the State of Maine. There have been many interesting and progressive incidents connected with the history of these two benevolent institutions for the welfare and cure of the insane. The President of the Board has been associated with a large number of the most distinguished and earnest workers for the prosperity and usefulness of the insane hospitals. Many of the members of the Board have passed away, but we can look at the magnificent hospitals which are monuments to their memories. The present Chairman of the Board has more than two

years of his appointment remaining, and would be pleased to complete the term of office, but the infirmities of age prevent him from so doing. He therefore tenders his resignation as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospitals, to take effect January 15th, 1911.

At a meeting of Board of Trustees held on May 6th, the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Testimonial in memory of the late Superintendent Bigelow T. Sanborn, M. D., of the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta.

The decease of Bigelow T. Sanborn, M. D., Superintendent of the Maine Insane Hospital at Augusta, removes one of the most distinguished and beloved citizens of the State of Maine, and his long and valuable services in connection with the institution furnish evidence that the State has lost an efficient public administrator of medical skill and experience in the care and amelioration of mental diseases. His unexpected death causes sorrow in every section of the State.

He was deeply interested in public matters, aided and supported religious observances, and was ever ready to increase the social privileges of those with whom he came in contact. No man had had a larger or more agreeable acquaintance. His intelligence, general ability and warmth of heart, of which there is so much evidence in the records of our State, have exerted such an influence that his name can never be forgotten. Such a character naturally found its expression in an important and influential life, and its loss is a source of sorrow to the people of the State of Maine.

To his colleagues in hospital work, it is a source of regret that they will lack the assistance and counsel, which he has been accustomed to bring to the removal of mental difficulties; and his decease will be regretted by the highest Court of our own State, which was accustomed to make frequent use of his experience and judgment in determining important questions involving mental issues.

Farewell, beloved and faithful associate, Superintendent Bigelow T. Sanborn.

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospitals, having followed to its last resting place the remains of the late beloved Superintendent Bigelow T. Sanborn, M. D., do extend to the members of the bereaved family, to the hospital physicians and attendants and the citizens of the State of Maine, who have expressed so much sorrow for the loss they have sustained, their united sympathy.

Resolved, That a copy of the preamble and resolutions as read be forwarded to the members of the family of the late Superintendent Bigelow T. Sanborn, M. D., and the same be spread upon the records of the Board of Trustees of the Insane Hospital at Augusta, Maine.


## To the Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospitals:

In accordance with statutory regulations, I have the honor, as Superintendent, to submit herewith the seventieth annual report of the Maine Insane Hospital for the fiscal year ended November 30, 1910; to this report are appended the statistical tables.



This table illustrates in a concise way the movement of the population during the year. There have been admitted during the year three hundred and nine patients, the largest number of admissions in any one year since the opening of the hospital. The discharges, including deaths and those on six months parole at the end of the year, total three hundred and nine, so that the population at the end of the year is the same as at the beginning of the year. It is to be noted, however, that seventy-one patients were transferred to the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital.

The total number under treatment during the year, twelve hundred and eleven, is also our highest number.

#### ADMISSIONS.

I beg to refer you to our statistical tables for detailed information on admissions and discharges. There are certain facts in connection with the statistical tables which I desire to bring to your attention.

The forms of our statistical tables have been revised, so as to have uniformity in the tables of the two insane hospitals.

Of the 309 admissions 223 were never before in any hospital for insane; 239 were admitted here for the first time; two men admitted were discharged as not insane.

The nativity table shows that but 28 men and 33 women of all admissions were of foreign birth; of those born in the United States, 131 men and 115 women; 113 men and 92 women were born in the State of Maine.

Dementia Præcox was the form of mental disease in 24.7% of all admissions. The diagnosis of Manic Depressive Insanity was made in 13.6% of all admissions; General Paralysis, 7.7%; Alcoholic Insanity, 3%, but alcohol was found to be the probable cause of the mental disease in 7% of all admissions. In 44 men and 63 women a hereditary taint was reported in the ancestors—a percentage of 34.8% of all admissions. In recording the probable causes of the insanity in Table No. 8 we have endeavored to give the information as exact as we are able to make it, after duly considering all possible factors. Our chief aim in all the statistical tables has been to present the facts with scientific accuracy and it is hoped they will receive careful analysis by those who are interested in our problems.

#### DEATHS.

One hundred and fifteen patients died during the year. The percentage of deaths to the whole number under treatment has been 9.5 as compared with a percentage of 9.7, the average for the preceding ten years. The high death rate is accounted for by the increased number of old, feeble patients admitted, the majority of whom were sent from town farms in compliance with the provisions of the law which went into effect last January. Eighteen men and nineteen women were over seventy

years of age at the time of admission. Forty-three per cent of the patients admitted during the past year were over fifty years at the time of admission.

I regret to report two suicides during the year, both men. One occurred at Chase Island the evening before the patients left there. The other occurred in the Convalescent ward. In neither instance was there any special indication of suicidal tendencies.

We have been singularly free from any contagious diseases. One male attendant was taken sick with typhoid fever two weeks after he was employed. The contagion therefore must have been acquired previous to his coming here. Death resulted during the convalescent period, from a sudden attack of heart failure.

#### SIX MONTHS TRIAL VISIT.

Table No. I shows that there are 33 patients enjoying the privilege of the six months parole law; that is, 33 patients are away from the hospital readjusting themselves to their home surroundings, the majority of whom, were it not for the provision of the law, would be retained in the hospital awaiting complete mental restoration. The economic and therapeutic advantages of this wise provision of the law cannot be overestimated.

Before a patient is granted the privilege of a six months trial, a careful examination is made, the home environment is ascertained, the responsibility of the relative or friend having charge of the patient is taken into consideration and the patient is requested to report either in person or by letter at stated intervals.

Since April, 1910, forty-three patients have been allowed to go on a six months trial visit, five of them have already been discharged at the end of the six months period, five have been returned to the hospital for further treatment.

#### MEDICAL WORK.

I have drawn attention elsewhere to'the work done in the clinical and pathological laboratory. The demands of such a department in a modern hospital for the insane are so great that an assistant especially trained in that branch of medical science is essential if we expect to carry on progressive scien-

tific work, and I earnestly urge the appointment of an assistant physician for this important work. The number of patients to each physician in this hospital under the present rating is one hundred and fifty, based upon a population of nine hundred patients. The rating in similar institutions where advanced work is done is one physician to one hundred patients or less.

The amount of medical work which each physician is called upon to do is increasing yearly and the administrative details are not diminishing. The tendency of psychiatry is toward individualization. Each patient is now given an exhaustive mental and physical examination. Staff conferences are held three times a week, at which every new patient is presented after the preliminary examinations are completed. The patients for discharge are also brought before the medical conference, in order that all facts may be presented and considered before the patient is allowed to leave the hospital. The ordinary medical and surgical work in a hospital of this kind requires a great deal of the time of the physicians.

We have succeeded in abolishing mechanical restraint to control the action of patients, and the seclusion of patients in locked rooms has been materially reduced. In the past two months no patient has been secluded during the day time. The result anticipated by this action has been accomplished, namely: the patients are quieter and more comfortable; the physicians, nurses and attendants appreciate the advantages of the non-restraint methods.

The usual number of patients enjoyed the summer outing at Chase Island the past summer, to which reference is made in the report of the Committee on Amusements and Recreations.

#### CLINICAL AND PATHOLOGICAL LABORATORY.

Dr. Hall, who has had charge of the clinical laboratory, submits the following report of work done during the past year in that department:

During the past six months five post-mortem examinations have been performed. We have at present no suitable autopsy room and we have been forced to work at a disadvantage. With slight alterations the room at present used as a mortuary for female bodies can be fitted up for that purpose.

We are deprived by law of the privilege of conducting postmortem examinations upon unclaimed bodies, and it is very desirable that the anatomy act be revised at the coming session of the Legislature, in order that we may not be deprived of one very important and essential method of investigation of the problems of insanity.

The facilities for clinical pathology have been very inadequate in the past and a room has been selected in the renovated kitchen wing for that purpose. We hope soon to make certain investigations upon the cytology of the cerebro-spinal fluid, a field of research which has already yielded promising results in our special department of medicine. One of the assistant physicians has spent some time in New York investigating methods.

#### DENTAL WORK.

During the past year the following work has been done by Dr. L. L. Dolliver, our visiting dentist:

This important work was made possible by the wise provision of your Board. Dr. Dolliver spends one day each week at the hospital and the results of his professional services fully justify the expenditure.

The patients treated are rendered comfortable, their physical health improved and in many instances they are relieved of one source of mental worry.

#### EMPLOYMENT OF PATIENTS.

Patients have been encouraged, whenever their physical condition permitted, to employ themselves, and I am pleased to report a gratifying increase in the number of patients so em-

ployed. The monthly record for November shows that over fifty per cent of the patients were employed in some useful occupation. The women occupy themselves with sewing, assisting in general housework, in the laundry, kitchen and in clerical work. The men are employed on the farm, garden, grounds and in the laundry, kitchen, workshops and upon the wards.

The advantages of this method of treatment, for it is so considered, require no elaboration. I might cite numerous concrete examples testifying to the efficiency of industrial employment for the insane, were such testimonials necessary to emphasize this feature.

To still further increase the varieties of employment I would suggest the opening of a tailor shop and a shoe shop. The present icehouse, which is not now required for ice storage, could be remodeled at a small expense for this purpose. We would increase the scope and varieties of employment as well as materially reduce our expenditures on these items if the outer clothing for men and the shoes and slippers for both men and women were made in such an industrial department. I trust we may be able to do something in this direction the coming year.

In all hospitals for the insane there are a large number of patients who have not been reached by any method of employment heretofore attempted. These are the patients who are mentally and physically inactive, the result of mental deterioration. The experiment has been tried in other hospitals of re-educating such patients by means of a graded system of employment, for the purpose of re-awakening and restoring the mental activities. The results are sufficiently encouraging to warrant us in adopting some such plan. We are at present carrying out the principles involved in this idea upon a small scale, but our methods are limited to simple sewing exercises which in the beginning are too complicated for the more demented patients. The plan is to begin with simple calisthenic exercises and gradually lead up to more complex activities and later into some of the usual methods of employment.

#### TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

We are to graduate from our Training School for Nurses, which was opened two years ago, a class of seven nurses; six

of whom have signified their intention of remaining in the service of the hospital, one expects to take a post-graduate course in a general hospital. The season of 1910-1911 opened with seven members in the senior class and nineteen in the junior class.

Applicants for the training school are required to submit to a written examination, which, if successfully passed, entitles the candidate to enter the junior class. Lectures and recitations are given throughout the year by members of the medical staff and the Superintendent of Nurses. Practical instruction is given upon the wards, in the hydrotherapeutic department and elsewhere.

The committee appointed by your Board has revised the schedule of wages, so that we are now able to offer increased wages to the graduates of the training school. We are hopeful that this inducement will result not only in increased nursing efficiency as a result of the training, but in a more permanent corps of nurses upon those wards where practical nursing is so necessary.

It is our contention that those qualities which go to make up the successful general nurse are required to a greater degree in the nurses who take care of the insane. It is gratifying to note the changed attitude of the nurses and attendants in regard to this important viewpoint. They are recognizing more and more the fact that insane patients are here to be treated for a disease, that they are not here simply for custodial care, and consequently the true nursing spirit is pervading the whole hospital with gratifying results.

Women nurses have been placed in charge of the men's hospital ward and a woman nurse has been placed in the male convalescent building. The improvement in the nursing and in the housekeeping upon these wards is marked. Beyond these considerations, however, is the more pleasing fact that the male patients appreciate the change and become imbued with the hospital idea.

The practice of placing women nurses on many of the male wards of an insane hospital, has become so generally adopted and the results have been so advantageous that I hope soon to extend this practice.

The work of the training school has been carried on most successfully by Miss Donovan, the acting superintendent of the school, whose supervision and assistance have been duly appreciated.

#### LEGISLATION.

I desire to present for your consideration certain suggestions relative to changes in the existing insanity laws.

Some provision for emergency and voluntary admissions would be desirable. With the present law it is necessary to give to the person alleged to be insane at least twenty-four hours prior notice of hearing. This provision, while enacted to protect the interests of the patient, in many instances is an injustice to the patient and a source of distress to relatives and friends for obvious reasons. Quite frequently it has been necessary to restrain the alleged insane person in jail awaiting the hearing. It is my impression that a carefully drawn emergency form of commitment would give the patient the advantage of hospital treatment at a time when that treatment should not be delayed.

An individual who is now desirous of submitting himself for treatment in an insane hospital is compelled to submit to the regulation procedure. A voluntary admission law granting to the superintendent permission to receive and detain in the hospital, any person who is desirous of submitting himself for treatment and who makes written application therefor, and whose mental condition is such as to render him competent to make the application, is in keeping with the modern conception of insanity, and has proven practical and beneficial in other states.

Women patients are frequently brought from long distances, accompanied only by a male officer. While the procedure has not, so far as I have knowledge of the fact, led to any embarrassing situations, the possibilities in that direction are such as to warrant the suggestion that a regulation should be enacted, demanding that each female patient committed to a hospital for the insane shall be accompanied by a woman attendant, unless accompanied by her father, brother, husband or son.

In the Criminal Insane department we are now above our maximum capacity. To obviate the necessity of further construction and as an act of justice to the patients, I beg to sug-

gest that the statute be revised so as to enable the superintendent to transfer, at his discretion, from the Criminal Insane department to the general department of the hospital, any patient whose term of imprisonment has expired. There is at present no provision of the law granting this permission.

A desire has been expressed by your Board, and by others interested in our work, that the name of the institution should be changed, so as to eliminate the word "insane" in the official designation of the hospital. I heartily concur in this recommendation.

#### APPROPRIATIONS.

The expenditures during the year are given in detail in the financial statement of the Treasurer and in your report.

The estimated expenditures for the coming two years have been carefully prepared. The necessary income to be provided by the State for the full support of all State charges at this hospital for 1911 is estimated at \$233,100.00; for 1912, \$243,900.00. The income from the same source during the past fiscal year amounted to \$258,400.00. Included in these totals are those items for which in the past separate appropriations have been asked; namely, salaries of officers, support and maintenance of criminal insane, expenses necessary and incident to the maintenance of the hospital at Chase Island, maintenance and improvement of grounds, roads and sidewalks, printing and binding reports of trustees and officers.

Our most urgent requirement at present is the renovation of the third female wing and the second and third male wings in• the Stone building. These wings, filled to their maximum capacity, are unsafe and unhygienic. The necessity of the fireproof renovation of these wings was advocated by your Board and by my predecessor, Dr. Sanborn, in 1906, and there should be no occasion to again emphasize the urgent necessity of this renovation.

It is to be hoped that a sufficient appropriation will be obtained to renovate the third female wing in the Stone building. In that wing we have at this writing one hundred and nine female patients housed in a dangerous fire trap; sixty-seven of this number are compelled to sleep upon cots which are removed and stored each morning. Our idea in renovation is to remove the separate rooms and provide for one hundred and

twenty-five upon the dormitory plan, thus giving each patient a permanent bed. In the plans which I have submitted, provision is made for a congregate dining-room for the patients of that wing. The economic advantages of a congregate dining-room have been proven in many insane hospitals. A veranda, not necessarily fireproof, attached to each floor would thoroughly modernize the wing and offer increased facilities for open air treatment.

A veranda attached to the two lower floors of the Harlow and Sanborn buildings is also a great necessity.

#### OPERATIONS OF THE MECHANICAL DEPARTMENTS.

During the year 1910 there has been a large amount of work performed in the several mechanical departments of the institution in addition to the work of general repairs.

The Engineer's Department.—New extra heavy return mains have been laid in a trench from the center building directly east of the pavilions, more than three hundred feet, returning the condensation from the eastern brick buildings direct to the main return, doing away with all elbows and angles, giving a straight run, and so arranged as to take in all of the returns, both high and low pressure, from the rear center building and kitchen additions, very materially aiding in the steam heating of those buildings. These return mains, all returns, and all steam supplies will be thoroughly covered with 85% magnesia covering. Direct steam heating for the additions to the kitchen building has been installed and very nearly completed. The direct steam heating in the infirmary building has all been thoroughly overhauled, the radiators reset with new union valves. The entire steam system has been thoroughly overhauled and generally repaired, maintaining the plant and its general efficiency.

The Carpenter's Department.—It was found necessary in order to fit and equip the infirmary building for occupancy to replaster the same, so the old plastering and lathing were removed, the building wire lathed throughout and plastered with adamant, the finish replaced, and the floors taken up and relaid. Baggage rooms and mantle were built in the Burleigh Annex, also additions to baggage rooms and drawers in the Sanborn and Harlow wings; additions to hoisting terminal erected at

wharf and extended to cover the newly constructed wharf; the second floor of the rear center building was wire lathed throughout; the renovation and finishing of the Superintendent's rooms completed, laying new floors, etc., making and repairing furniture; new greenhouse and potting house built; new shelving in the grocery store erected; together with the general repairs necessary to keep up all of the departments of the institution.

The Painter's Department.—A large amount of inside and outside work has been completed, as follows: The infirmary was painted inside and outside; the tramway, piggery, slaughter house, third female wing, carpenter's shop, blacksmith's shop, stable at Arsenal, all repainted outside. Rooms on corridor in the rear center building, entry ways in the Harlow and Sanborn wings, and first male and first female wings, repainted inside, Superintendent's rooms and center building stairway repainted and varnished; and all carts, wagons, carriages and sleighs of the institution repainted and varnished; furniture varnished and general repairing carried on as necessary.

The Mason's Department.—General repairing of all kinds, and the labor of laying concrete floors, catch basins, additions to sewerage; resetting stone steps at the female pavilion; large amount of repointing, pointing of potting house at greenhouse; cork insulation and cement plastering of same in new refrigerators, new floors in kitchen refrigerators, removal of loose stones and supports, and erecting brick piers and brick arches for the same; and a large amount of repair work wherever required.

The Plumber's Department.—Plumbed two bath rooms complete in the Burleigh Annex, modernly and appropriately equipped; installed nine hundred feet of sewerage in connection with kitchen work for the bath rooms and floor and roof drainage; erected one bath room in the rear center building; renovated and modernized bath room in Superintendent's rooms; thoroughly renovated plumbing at the infirmary; installed continuous bath tub and completed connection in the Lower First Female; set a new bath tub in the Lower Harlow; laid a copper roofing on the rear center building dormer; tore out all of the plumbing and reset the apparatus in the kitchen building; together with the general work of repairing and keeping up our seventy odd bath rooms and toilet rooms.

The Upholsterer's Department.—Performed a large amount of work, making new mattresses for the Burleigh Annex and other buildings, and the general repairing of all mattresses and pillows throughout the institution, making new laundry bags and upholstering furniture wherever necessary. The work of this department is a great assistance to the internal operation of the institution.

All of the foregoing departments have been diligent, active and interested, working in accord with each other, harmoniously and for the best interests of the institution. They have had a successful and excellent year, due to a great extent to the convenience of connection and the complete arrangement of our mechanical departments. They are adjacent and fitted complete for good work, so that material sent to these departments for repairs passes through the several branches until it is finished before returning to the wards.

#### FARM DEPARTMENT.

The spring was cold and late, with more rain than usual in the early part of the season, making it late getting in the crops. The season was very fair, and the crops came along well after they got started. They were fully up to the average, and were harvested in good shape.

The oat crop was excellent, about thirty acres; five acres cut for green forage, and twenty-five acres harvested and threshed, 1174 bushels.

The corn crop was up to the average yield per acre. Harvested 230 tons of ensilage. The potato crop was fair in average. Drouth in August and the warm rains of September caused some rot. Twenty acres produced 3303 bushels of sound potatoes free from rot.

Had a most excellent hay crop, harvesting 420 odd tons. This together with the grass cut green makes our total hay crop about 450 tons. The stock was fed a good deal of green fodder in the form of peas, vetches and Hungarian grass. The season produced fair average crops. The farm is fast coming into a high state of cultivation, and its hay production will increase every year.

The Garden Department had a very profitable season. With the exception of the onion crop, all crops were fully up to the average and afforded a large amount of fresh vegetables for the table of the institution. A large amount of table vegetables are stored in the vegetable cellar for use during the winter.

The male patients in large numbers have been encouraged to assist in the farm and garden department. During the summer season the scene on our farm and in the garden with the many actively engaged patients is most interesting and stimulating. The outdoor exercise has resulted in both physical and mental improvement to those so engaged.

#### ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

I am deeply conscious of the responsibility you have placed upon me by appointing me to the position of Superintendent to succeed the late Dr. Bigelow T. Sanborn, who is justly entitled to a large share of the credit for the present high standard of efficiency in the care and treatment of the insane in this State. I have been in a position to learn of his devotion to the patients committed to his charge, of his constant and untiring efforts to "minister to a mind diseased."

"Pluck from the memory a rooted sorrow."
"Raze out the written troubles of the soul."

I trust I may not be found wanting in the qualities which endeared Dr. Sanborn to his patients, to his associates and to those with whom he came in contact.

In taking up the duties and responsibilities of this position I may state, that it is my desire to put forth every effort to bring about the fulfillment of what is conceived to be the modern ideal of an insane hospital—a hospital for the care, scientific treatment and study of the insane, as well as a centre for the distribution of the knowledge which we may be able to acquire with reference to such vital problems as the cure and prevention of insanity.

The visiting committee from the Governor and Council have shown a deep interest in the welfare of the institution and the patients and to them I desire to express my appreciation for kindly suggestions.

In closing this report I wish to express my appreciation of the zealous manner in which officers and employes have performed the tasks assigned to them. 

### REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

To the Trustecs of the Insane Hospitals of Maine:

The undersigned, having been by your Board authorized, by a vote passed June 24, 1909, at a regular quarterly meeting, to act on behalf of the Trustees of both the Augusta and the Bangor hospitals in the matter of collecting accounts according to the Act of the Legislature approved March 16, 1909, it being "An Act Additional to Chapter 144 of the Revised Statutes, providing for the recovery of money improperly paid by the State for the Support of Insane Paupers," begs leave to report that he has attended to the duties imposed and submits the following data:

As the above Act contemplated the collection from such persons as an investigation might show to be, or to have been, legally liable for the support of insane patients committed to the above institutions, and as no information was in the possession of either hospital up to the time of the above vote, there was secured from the steward of each institution a list of such persons, known as State Aid Patients, in each hospital, together with the date of commitment and the name of town committing each patient. Aided by this list and information, your committed mailed to the Chairman of the Board of Overseers of each town making a commitment of such a patient, a printed list of questions, approved by your Board and designed to elicit a full and complete statement of facts and conditions relating to each patient. Eventually, but in some instances after repeated requests, a response from each town thus addressed was received, some of such replied affording satisfactory proof that as to some of such patients there was no person to whom the State could look as being legally liable and financially responsible, and the others showing there were relatives or guardians both legally and financially responsible, or furnishing such information as enabled your committee to exhaustively continue

the inquiry. In most of the latter cases, after more or less negotiation, an adjustment was effected mutually satisfactory, a bill for the sum due the State forwarded to each person or guardian liable and upon receipt of payment of same the full amount thus collected, was forthwith turned over to the State Treasurer who receipted to me for the same; and those cases in which an amicable adjustment could not, for any reason, be made, were turned over to the Attorney General for collection by action, at law, if necessary, in the name of the State, at the same time lodging in his office all data obtained with reference to all such cases to assist him in the prosecution of the claims.

To the Trustees of the Insane Hospitals of Maine:

By virtue of the power conferred by a vote of your Board, December 28th, 1909, authorizing an investigation of the financial condition of all patients receiving State aid, then in, and thereafter to be admitted into, the two institutions for the insane, as well as of all such relatives as might be legally responsible for the support of such patients, an earnest, and it is hoped, satisfactory endeavor has been made during the past year to gather such information as was deemed essential in view of the benevolent provisions of Chapter one hundred of the Public Laws of 1907, which took effect January 1, 1910, and cast upon the State the burden of supporting all patients committed

who have no relatives liable and of sufficient ability to pay for their support.

For valuable assistance generously rendered, grateful acknowledgment is due and made to the Superintendent and Steward of each hospital, who, at the beginning of the year, forwarded to the proper municipal officers of towns from which patients had been committed, "Support Returns" blanks, designed to furnish your committee with the name and address of the person or guardian, if any, paying for the support of each patient, the rate per week paid, and whether or not the patient had property; and who has since then, furnished your committee with a monthly statement of all deaths, discharges and commitments of patients, thus making possible the investigation, when necessary, of cases as they arose.

There have been several cases of patients receiving State aid that have not seemed to warrant the trouble incident to an investigation, because of the very satisfactory, and in some instances, conclusive evidence, furnished by the certificate of the officers ordering the commitment, that the patient had neither property nor relatives legally liable for payment of support, and therefore, as to these no investigation has been made. But with the data obtained from the returned "Support Returns" and the certificates of committing officers, and by much correspondence and interviews with such officers and other citizens, together with a mass of information secured in the work of effecting collections, under authority of your vote of June 24, 1909, of money improperly paid by the State for the support of insane paupers, two hundred and sixty of the numerous cases examined were ascertained to be cases in which the patients had either property or relatives legally liable and a report thereof was accordingly made and filed with the stewards, accompanied with all proper data collected as to rate to be paid and the name and address of the relative or guardian agreeing to pay. in such a case. Some of these cases thus investigated and adjusted as to payment have been, and probably others of them will become, what is termed "repudiated cases" on account of the changing financial conditions of the persons paying.

In this connection it may be well to state that it is impossible to say just how much saving to the State in dollars and cents the investigation in the 260 cases (to which reference has been

made) will be, but this is known, that from \$2.00 to \$4.50 per week will be collected in each of the 260 cases for the period such patients are detained in the hospitals providing of course their financial ability to pay continues.

It is the hope of your committee that, while in the discharge of its duties, the legal rights of the State have been diligently sought out and, in proper cases enforced; it has nevertheless consistently refused to hold any patient's relatives to the payment of his support when such a course would impose upon them a burden too great to be borne by ill-health, feminine weakness, aged infirmity or impoverished resources.

On the 24th day of March last at a full Board meeting, it was "Voted that Mr. Nickerson be appointed a committee to take up the history of the cases of patients in the Insane Hospitals whose residences are in other States or countries and report same to the Trustees" and your committee respectfully reports that in the discharge of the duties above contemplated three alien insane patients were found belonging to the Provinces, and their deportation to their respective home cities was accomplished, as follows:—One to each of the following cities: Montreal, Quebec and St. John, N. B.

There are several other cases under investigation and, while the process is necessarily slow, yet it is believed that additional deportations will be brought about in the near future, arrangements for a few being already well-nigh perfected.

In closing this report your committee begs to thus publicly acknowledge his appreciation of the invaluable assistance and co-operation of the Hon. Timothy Elliott, Inspector in charge of the United States Immigration Service of Maine, Department of Commerce and Labor.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of the Maine Insane Hospitals:

I have the honor to present the following report of the operations of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital for the year ending Nov. 30, 1910.

At the beginning of the year, Dec. 1, 1909, there were three hundred and four patients in the hospital, one hundred and fiftyeight men and one hundred and forty-six women. There were admitted during the year two hundred and thirty-five patients, eighty-seven of whom were men and one hundred and fortyeight were women, ten of the men and sixty-one of the women being transferred from other institutions within the State. whole number under treatment during the year was five hundred and sixty-five and the daily average population was three hundred and seventy-six and four-tenths. Within the year twenty-nine men and forty women, a total of sixty-nine patients, were discharged, while thirteen men and twenty-one women, a total of thirty-four, were allowed to leave on a visit. Nine men and twelve women were discharged as recovered and fourteen men and eighteen women as capable of self-support or as improved. There were fifty-four deaths within the year, twenty-eight men and twenty-six women. At the close of the year, Nov. 30, 1910, there were in the hospital one hundred and seventy-eight men and two hundred and twenty-seven women, giving a total population of four hundred and five, an increase of one hundred and one during the year.

The new building for men patients which has been under construction during the year, will be ready for occupancy early in January, 1911. Immediately thereafter, it is expected that our population will be increased by the transfer of about seventy patients from Augusta, and we will then be in a position to receive all of the commitments from Aroostook, Piscataquis, Washington, Hancock and Waldo counties, including what few

men patients there may still be remaining to be transferred from the town and county almshouses. Reckoning upon the known increase by transfer and the probable increase by the enlargement of the hospital district to include the above counties (up to the present time no women have been received from Waldo and Piscataquis counties), we estimate an average daily population for 1911 of five hundred and twenty-five patients. The annual increase of commitments will probably not tax the hospital to its capacity of six hundred for some years.

We have been fortunate in not having any suicides or fatal accidents during the year. One woman patient eluded a nurse and jumped from an unguarded attic hallway window to the floor beneath, sustaining a fracture of the left hip, from which she has made an uneventful recovery. One senile woman received a fracture of the right radius by falling out of bed, and one man who was paralyzed in both legs, rolled out of bed while attempting to look out of his window in response to hallucinations and sustained a fracture of the right hip and left ankle. One patient violated his parole and escaped, but was subsequently returned. Eight patients ran away while out exercising with the attendants or at work on the grounds, and all but two have been apprehended and returned to the hospital. We have had no epidemic, but one employe developed typhoid fever late in the summer, its source not being discovered.

#### PAROLE.

During the year, eighty-nine patients were dismissed from the hospital on six-months parole. Thirty-five of these were returned, twenty remained away and were discharged at the expiration of the parole period, and thirty-four are still out on parole, having been away less than six months. Of the twenty-six on parole at the expiration of the last fiscal year, Nov. 30, 1909, but one has returned.

Twenty-one of those who died were over sixty years of age. Several senile cases were in the hospital but a short time before death, having been brought in much exhausted and on the verge of dissolution.

#### CHASE ISLAND.

Forty patients enjoyed a six-weeks outing at the summer colony on Chase Island between the 18th of June and the 9th of September, thereby profiting in respect both to their mental and physical health. The benefit as well as the pleasure of these outings is fully appreciated by the patients, who look forward to them with pleasurable anticipation and beg for prolongation of their stay.

#### TRAINING SCHOOL.

In the training school for nurses we have adopted the two years' course recommended by the American Medico-Psychological Association and have arranged a schedule of twenty lectures to be given to each class by the members of the medical staff, supplemented by weekly recitations and practical ward instruction by the superintendent of nurses. It is our aim to so instruct the nurses as to make them competent to give intelligent care to patients suffering from the various psychoses rather than to fit them for general nursing. The following nurses satisfactorily completed their course in 1910 and were awarded diplomas:

#### MEDICAL WORK.

The development of the medical work continues as outlined in previous reports. The staff meetings are held four mornings of each week. Owing to changes in the medical staff, it has not been possible to carry out the planned-for improvement in the service as rapidly as expected. A physician was added to the staff in the spring whose duties were to be chiefly confined to laboratory work and research, but circumstances have necessitated his attention to the ward service. A laboratory has been equipped and we are now prepared to carry on this work with the beginning of the new year. Ten autopsies have been performed during the year. A well equipped operating room was opened in the spring.

An increasing amount of attention is being given to the employment of patients as a therapeutic measure, and we plan for further development along this line. Likewise amusement and recreation have a definite curative value of which we will make increasing use during the coming year. We have installed a moving picture machine equipped also for the use of lantern slides so that illustrated lectures, songs and travelogues may be given to the patients. A combination billiard and pool table has been purchased for the men's wards and we will soon have a workshop for the men in the basement of the new building. All of these things have a definite value in improving the mental and physical condition of the patients and are distinctly a part of the medical treatment of more value than the administration of drugs.


Dr. H. S. Frost has been engaged in dentistry for the patients since last spring, and has found a large amount of urgent dental work to be done. The following changes in the medical staff have taken place:

Dr. James W. Crane resigned as assistant physician in the spring and Dr. Herbert E. Thompson was appointed as pathologist.

Dr. Hattie E. Chalmers was appointed assistant physician in September, succeeding Dr. Mary P. Mitchell, who resigned in June.

#### TUBERCULAR HOSPITAL.

The hospital for tubercular patients was opened Feb. 22, 1910. This building makes ample provision for twenty patients of each sex and is a complete hospital plant in itself. Here tuberculosis can be treated under ideal conditions. Its beneficial effects are already apparent by the improved health of all the patients now under treatment, very few of whom present any objective signs of the disease. Up to the end of the hospital year twenty-two men and twenty-nine women had been treated here and there have been seven deaths. The value of such a hospital lies not only in the benefit derived by the victims of tuberculosis themselves, but also in the opportunity it affords for the segregation of these patients, and the consequent diminution in the risk of infection not only to fellow patients but also to the hospital staff.

#### FARM AND GROUNDS.

The work accomplished under the direction of the head farmer has been considerably in excess of that of former years. Not only did the farm and garden yield the best yet produced, but this was accomplished in spite of the delay in the spring work occasioned by an unusual amount of grading and walk building which was done by the farm crew. Their work included grading about the tuberculosis building, the construction of a walk from the pines to State Street, a distance of 1600 feet, resurfacing with rock and gravel all of the roads about the grounds, the laying of 1300 feet of water pipe to the piggery and the clearing of some ten acres of waste land.

#### REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

A large amount of work in the engineering department has been made necessary during the year by the growth of the plant. This includes the installation of a new dynamo and engine, the moving and enlarging of the switchboard, installation of Watt meters, a boiler feed pump, and a receiving tank in the boiler room. A sterilizer and disinfector for clothing, bedding, etc., has been erected in a room adjoining the laundry. A dish washing machine has been installed in the congregate dining room, the serving room in Building "B" renovated, and a hot closet

installed. The electric light line has been carried to the farm-house, barn and the vegetable cellar, a water main to the piggery, and the stable has been rewired. A new air compressor pump has been installed to replace the old deep well pump.

The old kitchen range has been replaced by a new one of larger capacity, and an additional steam kettle erected in the kitchen. New and larger scales have replaced the old ones for weighing coal, etc. A room adjoining the steward's office has been taken and refitted for use as a vault for keeping records, etc., the old vault being entirely inadequate to meet the present needs of the hospital. Extensive repairs have been necessary in the toilet rooms in Building "E," the flooring being relaid in cement and the fixtures renewed and reset, and two additional bathrooms provided in Buildings "C" and "B." Extensive repairs at the stable were found necessary in the fall by the rotting away of the sills and floor supports and a new floor was laid. The sewing room has been moved from Building "A" to the third floor of "D," where ample provision has been made for storing supplies, a cutting table of good capacity placed in the center of the day room and the sewing machines for heavy work equipped with electric motors. We now have a large, pleasant, well equipped and easily accessible sewing room where a much larger number of patients may be employed than has heretofore been possible.

A stairway has been built connecting the second and third floors in the Superintendent's apartments in Building "B."

A new mangle has been purchased replacing the old worn out machine in use since the opening of the hospital, and a moving picture outfit has been erected in a room on 4th floor "B" adjoining the chapel.

A wagon and tool shed has been erected to the north of the farm barn, and a new roof put upon the old vegetable cellar.

## IMPROVEMENTS DESIRED.

The enlargement of the hospital necessitates the immediate provision of adequate storage room by the enlargement of our present store to a size sufficient to permit of an economical purchase, handling and distribution of supplies. In connection with this, it is desirable to install a refrigerating plant, which would put us in a position to take advantage of the market in purchasing

meat, eggs, etc., thereby effecting a considerable saving each year. We would, also, be thus enabled to make ice for ward use to replace the ice now being cut from the Penobscot River, and which is unfit for drinking purposes. We have plans and estimates for this and will need an appropriation of \$11,000.

It seems very desirable for the institution to have a herd of cows to furnish us a milk supply, over which we would have full control and also for the improvement of the farm. We can undoubtedly produce milk at less than we now pay, and as we at the present have to buy our fertilizer there would undoubtedly be material advantage to the farm from this item alone, as well as an additional economy by its production. Plans have been made for a barn so constructed that it can be administered on modern sanitary principles and with ample storage capacity for 100 tons of hay and a 200-ton silo, at an estimated cost of \$14,000. An additional amount (\$2500.) would be needed for the purchase of a small herd and a sum of \$3500, for pasturage.

We need a cottage for the Chief Engineer of the hospital. This official now lives in the city, no suitable provision being made for him on the grounds, and to my mind it is of great importance that he be always within call because of the ever present possibility of fire or serious accident to the heating or lighting system when his immediate presence would be urgently required. An appropriation of \$3000, would be sufficient for this purpose.

The new building "F" gives us excellent facilities for the treatment of men patients suffering from acute psychoses and for disturbed patients, having as it does, continuous baths and a separate wing for noisy patients. In order that our equipment for the up-to-date treatment of our women patients may be equally complete, I wish to urge the addition to building "C" of a wing three stories in height, conforming in architecture to the main building and containing fourteen rooms on the first two floors, with continuous baths and verandas, the latter affording opportunity for open-air treatment of certain acute cases, and with a dormitory of twenty-five beds on the third floor. This addition, completely equipped and furnished can be erected at a cost not to exceed \$35,000., and with it we would have a hospital as well equipped as any in the country for the modern treatment of psychosis.

#### ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS.

Again we are indebted to the generosity of Mrs. George Fred Godfrey who has given \$100 worth of books for the patients' library, the nucleus of which was furnished by a like contribution from her last year.

Another delightful concert by Mr. H. M. Pullen and his orchestra was in the spring added to the long list of those so generously contributed by them for the entertainment of the patients. We have, also enjoyed several musical evenings through the kindness of Mr. B. Parker Childs of Boston, Mass., Miss Stella Durell and Miss Josephine Durell of Melrose, Mass., and Mr. Frank W. Goodrich. The University of Maine Glee Club gave us a concert which was much appreciated.

The visiting committee from the Governor and Council have been ever helpful by their regular visits and timely suggestions.





Know all Men by these Presents, That we,—, of—, in the county of —, as principal, and —, of —, in the county of —, as sureties, are jointly and severally held and bound unto —, Steward of the Insane Hospital at Augusta, or to his successor in said office, in the sum of three hundred dollars, to the payment of which sum, well and truly to be made to him, the said —, or to his successors in said office, we bind ourselves, our executors and administrators, firmly by these presents.

Previous attacks, if any; history?

When and how did the first symptoms of the disease become manifest? ...... Preceded by what mental or physical strain? ...... Was there, previous to that date, any change in disposition, or evidence of physical or mental depression or disorder? '

Describe as fully as possible the present symptoms of insanity.

What are the probable causes of the present attack, either predisposing or exciting?..... Do suicidal or homicidal tendencies exist, if so how manifested?..... In what institution, if any, and when, has patient received treatment?..... Any restraint or confinement been applied?..... If any, what?..... What special medical treatment has patient received during this attack?

#### QUESTIONS FOR FEMALES.

Number of children, .....; age of youngest, .....; number of miscarriages, .....; date of last one, ..... Has patient had any uterine or ovarian disease? ..... Menstrual irregularities, if any?

Male patients admitted into the institution, should come provided with at least three good cotton shirts; coat, vest and pants, of strong woolen cloth; two pairs woolen stockings, one hat or cap, pocket handkerchiefs, brush and comb, and one pair of boots or shoes.

Females should have, at least, a change of underclothes, shoes and stockings, brush and comb, decent bonnet, and two substantial dresses; the woolens should be of dark color. It is quite desirable, also, that a Bible or Testament should not be forgotten in the outfit.

#### INSTRUCTIONS TO MUNICIPAL OFFICERS IN COMMIT-MENTS TO EITHER INSANE HOSPITAL.

To the Municipal Officers of the Towns in the State of Maine:

GENTLEMEN:-Revised Statutes Chapter 144, Sections 16 and 17: "Sect. 16. Insane persons, not thus sent to any hospital, shall be subject to examination as hereinafter provided. The municipal officers of towns shall constitute a board of examiners, and on complaint in writing of any blood-relative, husband or wife of said alleged insane person, or of any justice of the peace, they shall immediately inquire into the condition of any person in said town alleged to be insane; shall appoint a time and place for a hearing by them of the allegations of said complaint, and shall cause to be given in hand to the person so alleged to be insane, at least twenty-four hours prior to the time of said hearing, a true copy of said complaint, together with a notice of the time and place of said hearing and that he has the right and will be given opportunity then and there to be heard in the matter; shall call before them all-testimony necessary for a full understanding of the case; and if they think such person insane, and that his comfort and safety, or that of others interested, will thereby be promoted, they shall forthwith send him either to the Maine Insane Hospital or to the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital with a certificate stating the fact of his insanity, and the town in which he resided or was found at the time of examination, and directing the superintendent to receive and detain him until he is restored or discharged by law, or by the superintendent or trustees They shall keep a record of their doings, and furnish a copy to any interested person requesting and paying for it."

"Sect 17. In all cases of preliminary proceedings for the commitment of any person to the hospital, to establish the fact of the insanity of the person to whom insanity is imputed the evidence of at least two reputable physicians given by them under oath before the board of examiners, together with a certificate signed by such physicians and filed with said board, that in their opinion such person is insane, such evidence and certificate to be based upon due inquiry and personal examination of the person to whom insanity is imputed; and a certified copy of the physicians' certificate shall accompany the papers, of commitment of the insane person to the hospital."

By careful reading of the law as it now is you will observe that it is necessary to give to the person alleged to be insane at least twenty-four hours prior notice of hearing and that he has the right and will be given opportunity to be heard in the matter.

You will also perceive that the amended statute more distinctly sets out the necessity that the physician shall testify under oath before the Municipal Officers as to the alleged insanity of the person.

Proper blank forms have been prepared for use hereafter in proceedings for the commitment of insane persons to our hospitals; and a set of such forms will be forwarded you on your request therefor.

#### THE FORMS ARE

- 1. The complaint to be signed by the person making the complaint; to which is attached the order for the hearing and notice, to be signed by the Municipal Officers. Form 1 is to remain on the town files.
- 2. Copy of such complaint and order, attested by the Town Clerk; to be delivered in hand to the person alleged to be insane, by the town constable.
- 3. The commitment paper to be signed by the Municipal Officers and sent forward to the hospital with the patient.
- 4. Record of the doings of the Municipal Officers to be signed by them and attested by the Town Clerk and filed with the town records.
- 5. (a) Physicians' certificate to be filed with the Municipal Officers. (b) Attested copy of such certificate to be sent to the hospital with the commitment paper.
