The Honorable Frederick W. Plaisted, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR:—In accordance with the requirements of The Military Law, I have the honor to submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1911.

The year has been one of hard work for the members of the Active Militia and with comparatively few exceptions loyal and efficient service has been rendered. In a service where the several units are so widely scattered as they are in Maine it will always be difficult to maintain a uniform standard of efficiency equal to that of more populous states where entire regiments are quartered in a single armory, thereby being brought under close and constant supervision, yet I feel warranted in saying that there has been steady improvement in this respect and that the present methods of instruction and inspection are certain to result in a higher standard and greater uniformity in the future.

The State now has the detail of two commissioned officers and four non-commissioned officers of the regular service as instructors of the Coast Artillery and Infantry arms of the service and the officers of the Medical Corps are under the instruction of an officer of the Medical Corps of the Army.

The instructor of the Coast Artillery Corps is Captain Marcellus G. Spinks, Coast Artillery Corps, U. S. A., detailed with station at Portland under Special Orders No. 138, War Department, Washington, June 14, 1911. He has as his assistants for the instruction of enlisted men Sergeant Vollie D. Dorsey, Sergeant James K. Wilson, and Sergeant George W. Dalton, all experienced non-commissioned officers of the regular Coast

Artillery. Sergeants Dalton and Wilson are stationed at Portland and Sergeant Dorsey at Auburn, and a schedule has been arranged so that one of them is in attendance at every drill of the Coast Artillery companies of the National Guard.

The instructor for the Second Infantry is First Lieutenant Edwin Butcher, Infantry, U. S. A., detailed with station at Augusta under Special Orders No. 130, War Department, Washington, June 5, 1911. He has as his assistant in the instruction of enlisted men Sergeant John A. Schweitzer, 3rd Infantry, U. S. A.

The correspondence school for officers of the Medical Corps is conducted by Major James Robb Church, Medical Corps, U. S. A., Fort Williams, Maine. This work is wholly voluntary on the part of Major Church, is being performed in addition to his duties as post surgeon at Fort Williams and is highly appreciated by the officers of the Medical Corps of this State.

During the winter and spring months instruction of both officers and enlisted men was conducted with a view to special preparation for practical work at the summer encampments. In the Coast Artillery Corps this instruction was imparted by officers and non-commissioned officers specially detailed by the Commanding Officer of the Artillery District of Portland and inasmuch as this duty was in addition to their regular garrison duties these officers and non-commissioned officers merit the hearty thanks of the State authorities. In the Second Infantry the instruction was imparted through a correspondence school conducted with marked ability by Major George McL. Presson, the senior major of the regiment. In the case of the Second Infantry this work was followed by a five-days' camp of instruction for all officers, held at Augusta in June and conducted under officers of the Regular Army detailed by the War Department. A similar camp of instruction was planned for the officers of the Coast Artillery Corps but owing to circumstances attending a change in instructors and the shortage of officers in the Artillery District of Portland these plans were necessarily abandoned. In my opinion these camps of instruction are of the highest value to the officers of the Guard and accomplish most important results in preparing the officers to act as instructors of the enlisted men of their companies at the annual encampments. Since the

pay of the student officers is taken from federal funds, they entail no drain on State appropriations and I believe they should be made an annual feature of the scheme of instruction.

SUMMER ENCAMPMENTS.

The summer encampments of 1911 showed the effects of preliminary training and it is beyond question that the Coast Artillery, the Infantry and the Sanitary Troops came nearer than ever before to the desired standard of modern field efficiency.

The Coast Artillery was encamped at Forts Williams and McKinley, Portland Harbor, for the period July 17-26, headquarters and six companies being at Williams and the remaining six companies and band at McKinley, the sanitary detachment being divided between the two. This division of the Corps resulted in lack of uniformity in many important details, particularly in the matter of instruction. Steps have been taken to provide for the encampment of the entire Corps at Fort Williams the coming summer and it is believed that if this is done a still higher level of efficiency will be attained at future encampments. The companies were given service practice for the first time, arousing new interest in the handling of the big guns. The report of the Commanding Officer of the Coast Artillery Corps furnishes a detailed review of the tour of duty.

The Second Infantry was encamped at Camp E. D. Keyes, Augusta, August 7-16, and its tour of duty was performed under conditions more nearly approximating actual service than anything in the militia history of the State camp ground. Field kitchens and mess shacks similar in design to those in use at the Texas Maneuver camp were provided for each company and rears constructed according to the latest sanitary standards were substituted for the old latrines. This change from the old frame buildings brought the State camp down to maneuver basis at the start and in every department work was conducted so far as possible in accordance with field service regulations. The encampment was very successful, several of its features receiving special commendation from the Division of Militia Affairs in the War Department. The report of the Commanding Officer of the Second Infantry, supplemented by the reports of the

Chief Commissary and Chief Surgeon, will give complete data regarding the tour of duty.

The Ship's Company Naval Reserve performed its annual tour of duty on the battleship Nebraska during the period July 15-21 and received the commendation of the Commanding Officer of the ship for the excellent manner in which officers and men performed their duty. The report of the Commanding Officer, Ship's Company, furnishes a detailed statement of the duty performed by his command.

PROPERTY ACCOUNTABILITY.

The work of clearing the property returns of obsolete and unserviceable property which was begun last year has been continued and through survey proceedings and the sale of unserviceable articles the storehouses have been placed in a much more orderly condition. In connection with this work, each organization was visited by a representative of the Quartermaster's Department after the conclusion of the year's field service and all obsolete and unserviceable property was shipped to Augusta for survey and sale or destruction. Serviceable articles were issued to each organization to replace those turned in, thus insuring each organization its full complement of uniforms, arms and equipment. By this method the frequent exchange of small numbers of the various articles of uniform, arms and equipment was obviated, with a resultant saving in packing and shipping charges. This inspection of property in the fall, supplementing the actual count of property by United States inspectors in the spring, affords a double annual check on the arms, uniforms and equipment in the hands of troops and is an assurance that the several organizations will not be carrying on their property returns as "serviceable" articles of clothing or equipment which would have to be discarded and replaced upon a sudden call for service.

The requirements of the War Department will make necessary in the future a closer system of property accountability than has obtained in the past, but the year's work along these lines has made it possible to meet the new requirements.

PAY FOR ARMORY DRILLS.

The question of compensation for armory drills has been given careful consideration during the past year and under the amended law new regulations have been put into effect for the first six months of the year 1912. These regulations are designed to bring about both an increase in enrolled strength and larger attendance at drills, both of which are essentials if the State is to continue to share in the allotment of federal funds and without which the State cannot keep up the prescribed equipment without greatly increased appropriations. The system of drill pay which has been in vogue since July 3, 1909, contained no requirement in regard to either strength or attendance and since the whole purpose of such compensation is the development of effective units it was necessary to draft regulations having this purpose in view. With the funds available under present appropriations it is impossible to pay either officers or enlisted men amounts commensurate with the duty performed, but under the new regulations the compensation allowed is placed absolutely at the disposition of the company. This leaves each company to divide its money as it sees fit on a pro rata basis with its own system of fines for non-attendance or non-performance of duty, doing away with the system of arbitrary fines which has admittedly proven a detriment to many companies.

In any consideration of armory drill pay, it must be apparent that any system of State pay is merely temporary in its character and that adequate compensation will not be given officers and men of the National Guard of this or any other state till Congress enacts what is known as the "Federal pay bill." This bill is now before Congress and has the support of the War Department as well as the National Guard Association of the United States. By those who have studied the military situation of the Nation, this measure is regarded as the most important essential in building up a National Guard which will be at all times ready to perform with credit its part in the first line of national defence. The early passage of the federal pay bill will greatly strengthen the Guard in all states which like Maine lack suitable armory facilities and large legislative appropriations.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

The report of the Chief Ordnance Officer, printed herewith, covers in detail the work in small arms qualification. Much has been accomplished in range construction by the use of funds allotted for that purpose by the federal government. New ranges have been constructed for the Infantry companies at Pittsfield and Bangor and the Coast Artillery company at Biddeford. A first-class range within easy access of the city of Portland is greatly needed but a suitable site within the limits of funds available has not been found.

As a measure of economy no team was sent to represent the State in the National Matches at Camp Perry, Ohio, but a Maine team was entered at the New England Interstate Match at Wakefield, Mass., winning second place. In general, qualification under special course "C" has been remarkably high and the records indicate that a larger number of individuals have received adequate instruction than in any previous qualification year. The attempt to raise the general standard of marksmanship rather than the training of comparatively few experts has been consistently followed by the Ordnance Department.

INSPECTIONS.

During the present year every organization of the National Guard has been inspected twice by officers of the Regular service and one or more times by the Inspector General of the State. The inspections at home stations under General Orders No. 2 were made by the following Army officers: State store houses, Augusta, Captain George E. Thorne, 24th Infantry; the Coast Artillery Corps by Captain Harold E. Cloke, Coast Artillery Corps; the Second Infantry by 1st Lieutenant John B. Barnes, 5th Infantry; the Hospital Corps by Major William W. Reno, Medical Corps.

The field inspections during the annual encampments were made by the following Army officers: Coast Artillery Corps by Captain Marcellus G. Spinks, Coast Artillery Corps; the Second Infantry by First Lieutenant Edwin Butcher, Infantry, the Sanitary Troops by Major James Robb Church, Medical Corps.

The annual inspection by the Inspector General was made under the provisions of General Orders No. 8. In addition to this the Inspector General was directed to make supplementary inspections in all instances wherein the conditions disclosed at his first inspection were unsatisfactory. In this way the inspecting officer was enabled to note the manner in which his instructions were carried out and the several organizations were thereby greatly benefited. The report of the Inspector General, printed herewith, gives full detail regarding the work in his department.

CHANGES IN ORGANIZATION.

During the past year one new Infantry company has been organized at Pittsfield and assigned to the Second Infantry as Company A, taking the place of the Gardiner company disbanded in 1910. Under General Orders No. 27, dated November 17, 1911, the 10th Company, Coast Artillery Corps, at Brunswick, was disbanded. The company's armory was destroyed by fire in January and though special efforts were made to bring the organization up to required standard of efficiency disbandment finally became necessary.

FIELD GUNS, CARRIAGES, Etc. There are on hand in the State Storehouse and in the hands of citizens certain field guns with carriages, in bins, etc., all of obsolete pattern. This property has been listed in previous reports and no change has taken place therein during the current year. There is also on hand a small amount of saluting ammunition for this ordnance.

SPARE PARTS. A sufficient supply of spare parts for replacing worn and broken parts of small arms, is kept on hand at the State Storehouse.

TABLEWARE CHINA AND GLASS. The State owns and has stored in convenient buildings on the State Campground a large supply of tableware of various sorts previously supplied to troops when in camp. There is also a large supply of kitchen utensils provided for a similar purpose.

SUBSISTENCE PROPERTY. The commissary chests required by Militia Regulations are kept completely filled at all times and in addition thereto there is a small amount of subsistence property on hand which has been procured for camp uses at Augusta.

AMBULANCE CORPS PROPERTY. There is on hand a small amount of obsolete property at one time in the hands of the Ambulance Corps.

SIGNAL CORPS PROPERTY. In addition to the articles listed there is on hand a small amount of obsolete property at one time issued to the Signal Corps.

BOOKS. The several organizations of the National Guard and Naval Reserve are supplied with the required text books, manuals, regulations, etc., a sufficient reserve being kept at the State Storehouse at all times. Frequent changes rendering whole editions obsolete render any list of publications confusing, hence the enumeration of all books by title is omitted.

MEDICAL AND HOSPITAL STORES. In addition to the articles listed there is on hand a large supply of medicines, surgical dressings, appliances, etc., also a miscellaneous supply of furniture and hospital stores purchased from time to time for use of the Medical Department, but not of standard pattern. There is also on hand at the State Storehouse one ambulance of obsolete pattern, complete with harness and appendages.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL.

STATE OF MAINE.

INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE.

LEWISTON, December 15, 1911.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to present herewith my annual report for the year 1911. The report will be general in its nature inasmuch as special reports of inspections have already been furnished concerning the condition of the property and the efficiency of each organization.

ARMORIES.

With few exceptions the condition of the armories remains the same as outlined in previous annual reports.

The 4th Company, C. A. C., has been furnished new quarters; although small yet they are an improvement over the old. They fail to furnish adequate facilities for the care of uniforms. The store room is located in a small gallery of the drill hall and is very dark and liable to be infested with moths.

The 9th Company, C. A. C., has improved its quarters by the installation of new lockers. This company has the best locker system in the State and provides sufficient room for the proper care of the entire equipment.

The armory of the 12th Company, C. A. C., has been improved by the addition of a locker room for clothing and equipment thus giving this company adequate facilities for the care of these—something it did not have prior to this improvement.

The only available quarters for the newly formed Company A, Second Infantry, at Pittsfield, at the time of its organization was the basement in Union Hall. New, inexpensive lockers were installed, but these are altogether too small for the requirements of clothing and equipment. A change in the near future is imperative.

A new property room has been added to the quarters of Company B, Second Infantry. This is a great improvement over the former system and there is no reason now why its property should not be kept in the best of condition.

The building used by Company L, Second Infantry, for armory purposes has been remodelled and the quarters of the company have been put in very good condition for the care of military property. There was no heating plant at the time of inspection and until such time as one is provided, the armory must be termed unsuitable.

Negotiations are now pending which it is confidently hoped will result in new quarters for the 1st and 2nd Divisions of the Naval Reserve. The quarters of the 3rd Division, Naval Reserve, have been improved by the addition of steel lockers.

CLOTHING AND EQUIPMENT.

The Guard is excellently equipped and uniformed with the exception of the Second Infantry which is still supplied with the old style blue overcoat. It is to be hoped that the new pattern overcoat will soon be issued to this Regiment. The shoes worn by the men are good, so good in fact, as to call forth the approval of the regular inspection officer. The shirts are in excellent condition. Campaign hats are not uniform throughout the Guard, parts of an earlier issue of hats of an inferior quality being found in nearly all of the companies.

At last year's inspection of the 4th and 7th Companies, C. A. C., the rifles were found in poor condition. This year's inspection found these same rifles in a much improved condition, yet not such an improvement as is desired. A short time before the inspection of the 10th Company, C. A. C., new, clean rifles were issued. At the inspection these were in poor condition, being rusty and dirty. The rifles of the 11th Company, C. A. C., as well as those of Companies G and I of the Second Infantry, were found in poor condition. The inspec-

tion of Company G of the Second Infantry was held shortly after the fire at which they were on duty. Sufficient time had elapsed after their tour of duty, however, to properly care for their rifles. This evidently was not done and the same rifles which last year were in the best condition of any in the Guard, were in anything but a suitable condition.

A marked improvement has been made in the care of military property. This is true of nearly every company in the State. This is due to the pains taken by company commanders and the efficiency of the various company quartermaster sergeants. The improvement in the condition of the rifles has been most gratifying. As a whole, they are in the best condition they ever have been.

After the encampment of 1910, General Orders No. 26 were issued, providing for the care of property after returning from the encampment; service shirts were ordered cleaned and packed in some moth preventative. This was done in every case. Socks as well were cleaned and returned to the armories in a majority of instances.

In every case where inspections revealed the presence of moths, the company commanders were instructed to have frequent inspections of their property and to require for preventative against the presence of moths.

SPECIAL INSPECTIONS.

For various reasons, in addition to the regular yearly inspections, several special inspections were ordered for some of the commands. In the case of Company G, Second Infantry, the lack of attendance and the poor condition of the equipment called for a special inspection in July. At this inspection there was an improvement in attendance and a somewhat improved condition of the equipment, although not such as to be expected. This company was on duty at the Bangor conflagration, but this should not be urged as a reason for the poor condition of its equipment and the dirty mess kits.

The special inspection of Company I, Second Infantry, showed no improvement over the regular inspection. This company is now below the accepted standard of efficiency and should be materially strengthened before another encampment or disbanded.

An improvement was shown at the special inspection of Company E, Second Infantry, an improvement that undoubtedly continued after the special inspection as it proved to be one of the best drilled companies later at the encampment.

The attendance at inspection of Company H, Second Infantry, was unsatisfactory and a special inspection was ordered. At this special inspection a marked improvement was noted and resulted in this company arriving at camp next to the strongest organization in the Regiment.

The regular inspection found the 10th Company, C. A. C., below the standard. They were without suitable quarters which had some effect on the conditions existing at inspection. A special inspection was ordered to be held after the annual encampment, but the conduct and condition of the company at the annual tour of duty was such as to lead to its disbandment before the inspection.

ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The annual encampment of the Second Infantry was held at the State Camp Grounds at Augusta, August 7th to the 16th. All the companies on their arrival detrained quickly and in good order, marched to the camp grounds and pitched camp with despatch. An examination of the cars used for the transportation of troops found them to be in as good condition as the ordinary passenger coach. Each coach was supplied with drinking water in pails.

The camp was pitched in the open. At this encampment, the permanent mess and cook shacks were not used, the entire encampment being under canvas. Field ranges were used for cooking. Garbage was disposed of by incineration, each kitchen being supplied with an incinerator. The water used at the encampment was supplied from the artesian well on the grounds and was piped to each kitchen. Those parts of each kitchen used for the storing of rations and supplies were screened. The waste water from the kitchen taps was taken care of by depressions dug in the ground and filled with stones. Rears were established and burnt out each morning. These rears consisted of a trench with a box covering furnished with closing lids. These were removed each morning as the rears were burnt out. The rears were under the supervision of the sani-

tary officer and were well cared for. From a sanitary standpoint they were a vast improvement over the former system. They should have been filled in, however, at the breaking of camp. This was not done. A detail for that purpose should have been made prior to the breaking of camp.

The condition of the camp after leaving was, on the whole, very good. A critical inspection disclosed one poorly policed company street, particles of food around some kitchens and in one instance a failure to fill in kitchen incinerator. The shower bath was not well policed, discarded underclothing being found on the floor. The mess house used for a post exchange was left in a very dirty condition.

GUARD DUTY.

Generally stated, the performance of guard duty was an improvement on that shown heretofore. For the purpose of a more general instruction and in order that each individual might have practical experience, this important duty was performed by battalions during the first three days. While in the performance of this duty each battalion was excused from all drills. The main object of this arrangement for the performance of guard duty was to give instructions to every individual. It is to be regretted that this object was not attained owing to the failure of the officers to co-operate. After the first three days, there were but three posts, hence the failure to take advantage of the opportunities of the first three days' work was consequently lost.

With the exception of Sunday, the ceremony of guard mount was omitted on all other days. In my judgment, this was a mistake. Ceremonies such as guard mount and evening parade have a healthy effect on the spirit of the body, varying the routine and enlivening the interest. To omit these ceremonies is but to throw aside valuable opportunities for the increase of the morale of the organization.

Sentinels on post seemed to have had a better knowledge of general orders than in the past, but in most cases, it was merely a feat of memory without an accompanying knowledge of the meaning of the memorized text. It was noticed on several occasions that the sentinel on number one post advanced parties without first calling the corporal of the guard.

By request the ceremony of guard mount was performed by Company A on Sunday. The company made a creditable showing, but made the mistake of marching on in details when the entire company should have been marched on by the first sergeant as one detail.

DRILL.

As is usual in encampments, the first day's drill in close order did not have that finish that later appeared. Improvement naturally followed with practice, an improvement steady and rapid to the close of the encampment. The drill in extended order was superior to that in close order, the Regiment being far superior in this line of work. Field work was performed under the supervision of the Regular Army instructors detailed to this encampment, and on the whole was very satisfactory.

The Regiment was inspected Sunday by the regular inspector. The ceremony was well executed and the inspection disclosed the equipment to be in excellent condition with few minor exceptions.

An innovation at this encampment was the detail of a cook from the regular service for the instruction of the enlisted cooks. This was of great benefit, not only to the cooks, but to the company quartermaster sergeants as well.

The Regiment broke camp at noon, Wednesday the 16th, and the various companies entrained as in the order of their arrival.

The discipline observed at this encampment was of the highest. Several complaints in regard to the misconduct of the men out of camp were received, but on investigation these proved to be of little importance.

Much of the success of the encampment was due to the efforts of Lieutenant Edwin Butcher of the 15th Infantry, U. S. A., detailed as permanent instructor to the Second Infantry, and Lieutenant Thomas Crystal of the 5th Infantry, U. S. A., detailed to this encampment as instructor. Tireless in their energy, they entered into their duties with apparent zest and zeal. Whenever their advice or assistance was sought, it was given freely and willingly.

REMARKS.

General Orders No. 8, A. G. O., c. s., covered in detail instructions for the preparation for inspection. Prior to the inspections, advices were issued from the office of The Adjutant General giving means and methods to employ for the cleansing and repairing of the equipment. Very few of the company commanders seemed to take advantage of the opportunity of having this done. Where a failure to do so was noticed, further instruction was given as to the method of proceeding to accomplish the purpose. As heretofore, many buttons, collar and cap ornaments were missing at the inspection of nearly every company.

The First and Second Divisions of the Naval Reserve have shown improvement over previous conditions. With the change of commanding officers in the Third Division of the Naval Reserve, an improvement in the efficiency of this organization is anticipated.

In the past, there has been a great laxity in the proper keeping of the books, papers and records of the various commands. Prior to the inspections, orders were issued from the office of The Adjutant General containing directions and complete instructions in regard to the proper preparation of these records for the inspections. It was evident that these instructions were carefully observed as the books, papers and records without exception were found in better condition than at any previous time.

The permanent detail of an officer of the Regular Army as instructor for each organization of Infantry and Artillery should be of incalculable benefit to the Guard. This means an entire change in the system of instruction. Instead of each company commander relying on his own judgment as to the lessons to be taught at each drill, he is now dependent upon a program outlined by his instructor which is followed simultaneously by all similar organizations.

I do not wish to close this report without a word of tribute to the Guard as it is today. Looking back over many years of intimate connection with the Guard, I do not hesitate to make the statement that the National Guard is in the highest state of efficiency that it has been since my acquaintance with it began.

This is due entirely to the increased morale of the enlisted men, a more interested set of officers, and a spirit of eagerness and willingness on the part of the entire strength of the Guard.

Appended will be found for the purpose of comparison, tables of attendance at inspections for this and the previous year.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF COMMISSARY.

NATIONAL GUARD OF THE STATE OF MAINE,

SUBSISTENCE DEPARTMENT,

AUGUSTA, December 15, 1911.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—In accordance with Section 22, Military Law of the State of Maine, I have the honor to make the following report of the transactions of this office for the year 1911:

Proposals for bids were issued for commissary supplies and advertised in three daily papers for the encampment of the Second Infantry, August 7-16, 1911. This year for the first time in the history of the Guard, commissary stores were purchased and issued according to regular army regulations and I am pleased to say that in every particular the results were eminently satisfactory. There was more interest displayed by all the officers, company quartermaster sergeants and cooks than ever before, for the simple reason that they understood they were learning something of value which could be applied when they attended maneuvers with the regular troops. Beside the general benefit to the regiment, by this system the men were better fed and the cost of supplies very much lower than of former years. It was clearly demonstrated that the arbitrary issue of stores by the commissary is neither practical, economical nor satisfactory.

The encampments in this State should be conducted along the same lines as the regular army encampments in order that when our troops attend joint maneuvers they will have received

instruction in the rudimentary principles at least and be able to take advantage of the great opportunities offered by association with the regulars and not be embarrassed by having to learn first principles which should have been taught them at home. Then again the National Guard is an integral part of the regular defence system of the United States so why should not regular army methods obtain in every instance possible rather than methods devised by individuals, which in case of war or joint maneuvers will have to be discarded?

The only difference in the system used this year and that in use by the regular army was in the matter of cash savings. Our troops were not allowed them and I would respectfully recommend that hereafter cash savings be allowed. It is a just reward of ability and in my opinion is only fair. I have never seen such an intelligent lot of quartermaster sergeants as were in camp this year and if some were able to get along with less stores than others, surely their outfit should receive the benefit of the sergeant's and cook's energies and ability. As a matter of fact it will be hard to stimulate interest if there are no rewards.

I wish to compliment the officers and men in this department on the success they attained in making this tour the best and least expensive the State has known and to thank them for their interest and hard work to which is wholly due the result.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF SURGEON.

NATIONAL GUARD OF THE STATE OF MAINE.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

BATH, December 15, 1911.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my annual report as Chief Surgeon for the year ending December 15, 1911.

In accordance with the provisions of The Military Law, as prescribed by General Orders No. 36, effective January 5, 1911, the Medical Corps of the National Guard, State of Maine, consists of 1 Lieutenant Colonel, Chief Surgeon, 2 Majors and 6 Captains or First Lieutenants.

May 12, 1911, Major Charles L. Cragin and First Lieutenant William L. Haskell were assigned to the Coast Artillery Corps, and Major Bial F. Bradbury and First Lieutenant Harry W. Sampson were assigned to the Second Regiment Infantry.

May 18th and 19th an Officers' School of Instruction of the Medical Corps was held at the Armory of Company H, Waterville. A program of instruction was prepared and executed by Colonel Moriarty, Inspector General, and the Chief Surgeon, which proved to be of great benefit and profit to the officers and men. The men instructed were unanimous in the opinion that more valuable and practical information was absorbed at this tour than at any previous school attended. I cannot speak too highly of this form of instruction for Medical Officers each year and I believe that two such schools should be held each year.

July 17-26, inclusive, the Medical Officers of the Hospital Corps Detachment of the Coast Artillery Corps, N. G. S. M.,

by invitation of the Secretary of War, participated in the Joint Coast Defense Exercises in the Artillery District of Portland. The officers performed the duties assigned them at the various stations with credit and satisfaction to the inspecting officers.

August 7-16, inclusive, the Hospital Corps Detachment of the Second Regiment Infantry attended the annual encampment at the State Camp Ground, Augusta, Maine.

This was the first State encampment in which the Medical Corps had an opportunity to study the problem of camp sanitation as promulgated in the Army Maneuvers at Pine Plains in 1910. The great improvement, from a sanitary standpoint, as evidenced in the open mess tents, cook-shacks and sinks were a great advance over former State camps and I believe every officer is unanimous in recommending their continuance in the future.

Major James R. Church, Medical Corps, U. S. A., was detailed as inspector and instructor of the Detachment of the Hospital Corps and gave very valuable instruction and drills to the officers and men.

The medical and surgical supplies of the Medical Department, N. G. S. M., practically conform to the requirements of the Manual of the U. S. A., Medical Department, 1911, and are indexed and packed at Waterville, Portland and Augusta, where they could be immediately moved for any emergency for the mobilization of State troops.

Upon the invitation of the Secretary of War and the recommendation of The Adjutant General, Major Bial F. Bradbury participated in the joint encampment, maneuver and field instruction of the regular army and militia, 1911, at San Antonio, Texas, and was present for fifteen days. His report of the tour demonstrates the great importance of Medical Officers obtaining practical experience when possible from these large army encampments and the information obtained in this instance will be put to great advantage in the National Guard of Maine.

Captain Fred A. Chandler of the Medical Corps resigned during the year and received an honorable discharge. He had served the State faithfully and efficiently for ten years as Lieutenant and Captain of the Medical Corps.

Under Special Orders No. 164, bearing date of December 1, 1911, Adjutant General's Office, a correspondence school for all officers below the grade of Lieutenant Colonel in the Medical

Corps, N. G. S. M., will commence January 1, 1912, continuing through the months of January, February and March. Major James R. Church, Medical Corps, U. S. A., Fort Williams, Maine, will act as instructor of the school.

I understand that by the provisions of General Orders No. 132, War Department, 1910, pertaining to the Field Service School for Medical Officers at Fort Leavenworth, which begins its annual session April 1, 1912, continuing for a period of six weeks, it is made possible for the attendance of six medical officers of the Organized Militia. Under the provision the allowances are so liberal and the benefits so great it is earnestly desired that advantage may be taken of the order and members of the Medical Corps of Maine be included as members of the school.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. I would recommend that two schools for Medical and Sanitary Instruction be held for the benefit of the Medical Corps each year; one to be held at Waterville previous to the annual encampment, in the early summer months, and one at Norway, subsequent to the encampment, during the fall months. I am convinced that these schools would be of great benefit to the Corps, and the Guard.

2. That the cooks of the various companies of the Guard be selected with great care for their efficiency and general intelligence, having many times observed that the better the cook the better the contentment and good spirit of the company, and the easier it is for the Medical Corps to maintain good sanitation and hygiene about the mess tents and cook-shacks.

3. That whenever the units of the Guard are called out for any tour an ample supply of mosquito netting, nails and large tacks be issued for the use of cooks in their attempt to eliminate flies from mess tents and cook-shacks.

4. That whenever examinations for recruits are to be made in Auburn and Lewiston they be referred to 1st Lieutenant W. L. Haskell of the Medical Corps, Lewiston.

5. That a modern ambulance be supplied to the National Guard, the one now in use being absolutely unfit for ambulance purposes.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the report of the Ordnance Department, which was due in your office December 15, 1911. In submitting it at this late date I have to apologize and to explain that the delay is due to the non-receipt of some returns of Small Arms Practice from all arms of the service, the last one being received yesterday.

As formerly, the attention of the Department has been more concerned with small arms practice than with obtaining and issuing ordnance property; and while I had the honor last year to report "the most successful year for Small Arms Practice in the history of the Guard" that condition was only true last year, this year being a great advance over any year previous.

An examination of the following tabulations will show in detail the result of small arms practice in the various organizations of the Organized Militia including the Naval Reserve.

In almost every instance except the Portland organizations, where the range was closed by an injunction before the season closed, there has been a gain in the figure of merit—and I wish to invite your attention in this connection to the showing made by Company A, Second Infantry. This is our newest organization in figure of merit, returning only one-fourth class man. The whole company, from the commanding officer to the latest recruit cannot be too highly commended for such a return, for we know that it is the result of sustained effort on the part of everybody in the company.

In making these last tables I have omitted to record the standing of all staff and department officers, and all headquarters. Some criticism developed over last year's report because these smaller units with fewer men to get to the range seemed to make a better showing than the companies. And it is true that the company units are the efficient fighting strength.

REVOLVER PRACTICE.

In the work with the revolver the department has continued its policy begun last year, and on the whole there has been a gain in the qualification with the revolver which is as follows:

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Of these 124 qualifications 77 are officers and musicians who are required to practice and the other 47 are sergeants of companies who are allowed but not required to practice. This is a gain of approximately 15 per cent. over last year. It is hoped that when the Guard is armed with the automatic pistol, which is expected this year, a greater number of those required will be stimulated to qualify.

COMPETITIONS.

The first competition of the year was the tryout of candidates for the State of Maine Rifle Team. This was held on the Auburn Range, beginning June 28th. Twenty-four candidates appeared and the thirteen chosen to compose the Rifle Team were detailed in General Orders No. 19, as follows:

This team was sent to Wakefield, Mass., to represent Maine in the New England Interstate Match of the New England Military Rifle Association during the first week in July.

The result of this match was as usual, Maine taking second place with Massachusetts leading, and no other competitor near Maine's position.

The scores will be found in Appendix B of this report.

The annual State Rifle Competitions were held during the first week in October at a Camp of Instruction for Rifle Practice on the Auburn Range under General Orders No. 24.

In these competitions an innovation for this State was initiated. Instead of holding Regimental and Corps Competitions a State Competition was held and each company was allowed to enter a Tyro Team as well as a Company Team, a tryo to be one who has never shot on a team in any national, interstate, regimental or company team match. Two sets of three prizes were offered, one set to the Company team and one set to the Company Tyro Teams.

At this Camp the Artillery-Infantry Team Match, taking the place of the former Inter-Regimental match was also shot.

Mr. Frank M. Low of Portland gave three cups which were used for individual prizes in a match at 500 yards slow fire.

The Evening Express Publishing Company of Portland also gave three cups which were used as prizes in a match at 200 yards slow fire.

The National Rifle Association Medal was awarded to that member of the tyro teams in the Coast Artillery Corps and in the Second Infantry who made the highest aggregate score.

Twenty-two teams entered the Company Team Match which was won as follows:

STATE TEAM.

A short sketch of the State of Maine Rifle Team may be of interest at this time, the 1911 Team being probably the last one to go out of the State for several years, or at least till Congress makes an appropriation specially to take care of State Teams in the National Matches. This because it seems to this department that the money a State Team costs can be better spent for instruction in the State.

The first State Rifle Team of which we have knowledge in the records was formed in 1882. This was a team to represent the State at Creedmoor in September and was formed under General Orders No. 21. This team consisted of 12 men and 3 alternates. The full personnel of the team was not given either in orders or in the report of the Inspector of Rifle Practice, but in his report as team captain, E. J. Cram mentions a company team of five men from Company F of Augusta, made up as follows:

This team scored 145, tied for third place with Company C, U. S. Engineers, the match being won with a score of 148. The Maine team competed in the Hilton Trophy Match with the result not stated. In the Judd Individual Match E. W. Moore of Company F, First Infantry, made a score equalling the winning score but "unfortunately he gave the scorer the wrong score card and a score could not be credited to him." J. A. Fairbanks of Company F, First Infantry, won 10th prize and W. G. Hussey, Company F, First Infantry, and Captain C. W. Davis, Company B, First Infantry, won prizes. In the skirmishers match, won with a score of 67, E. W. Moore of Maine was third with a score of 60, W. S. Choate was fourth with 59, L. A. Moore was sixth with 57, and W. G. Hussey was seventh with 56. Mr. Choate made a total of 64 but was penalized five points for firing one shot after "cease firing." The team captain reports that "on Thursday the team in full dress uniform acted as guard to the American team in the great International Match, their appearance was highly spoken of and they received many compliments on the manner in which they discharged their duty."

In 1888 the names are tabulated of 25 men who made the highest scores in 7 shots at 200 yards during the encampment, from which number a State team was to be selected. No record is made of such team being selected.

No team was organized in 1889 or in 1890, the two years in which Colonel E. J. Cram was Inspector General of Rifle Practice.

No team was organized in 1891, during which year Colonel E. C. Farrington resumed charge of rifle practice.

There was no report printed for the year 1892, and it is in the 1893 report that Colonel Farrington once more takes up the question of organizing a State team; a State team was organized that year but nothing was done about having the State represented in the National Matches.

In 1894 a team was organized to represent the State in the matches of the National Rifle Association at Sea Girt, New Jersey, and this team gave a good account of itself, especially in the individual matches.

State Teams were also made up in 1895, 1896 and 1897, but did not leave the State.

In 1901 a team was organized and went to Sea Girt using the old single-shot Springfield (Model 1884) while other competitors had the Krag.

Coming down to modern times, beginning with 1905 a State team has been organized each year and has represented the State in the New England Interstate Match of the New England Military Rifle Association at Wakefield, Mass.—in 1905, 1906, 1907, 1909, 1910, 1911, and at the National Matches at Sea Girt, New Jersey, in 1905, and at Camp Perry, Ohio, in 1907, 1908 and 1909.

When this was written (about Oct. 1, 1911) there were in active service in the State thirty-three (33) State team members, two of whom, Capt. Moses P. Stiles, Staff, 2nd Infantry, and Sergt. George E. Emery, Company G, 2nd Infantry, were members of the 1893 team. The personnel of each team can be found, when the team was more than a paper organization, in the general orders or the report of the Inspector of Rifle Practice for the appropriate year.

The fifteen men who composed the 1911 team had had the following service on the State Team:

One member	had 12 years service
Four	had 7 years
One	had 6 years
Two	had 5 years
One	had 4 years
One	had 3 years
Two	had 2 years

and three were serving their first year on the team. These members had issued to them a medal with a bar showing the number of years of service on the team, and it is recommended that this practice be continued. It would also seem advisable to organize a State team each year if it can be done without organizing a special camp for a tryout of candidates.

RANGES.

The range situation is gradually arranging itself, though not to our entire satisfaction. In Portland the range is in an outlying portion of the City, and was closed by an injunction of the Supreme Court, long before the season ended. That portion of the City is being gradually built up, and people are afraid to have the range used.

In my opinion, with its screens and masks, the range is entirely safe for use by men who have been instructed in the gallery; but it is only a question of a few years before a new range must be acquired for Portland where six organizations use the range.

With the foregoing exception, and the fact that the 4th Company of the Coast Artillery Corps must go to Brunswick for rifle practice, the organizations of the State are equipped with ranges. New ranges have been built at Bangor for Company G, 2nd Infantry, and at Pittsfield for the new Company A, 2nd Infantry. Both these ranges are equipped for firing up to 1000 yards.

A new range was built at Rockland for the 3rd Division, Naval Reserve, but for some reason only thirteen (13) men shot over the range and none of them qualified in any class. This range was finished in July, giving sufficient time for rifle practice during the remainder of the season. This range is equipped for firing up to 600 yards.

A new range was also built at Biddeford for the 7th Company, Coast Artillery Corps. Twenty-seven of this company practiced on the range, but none qualified.

The season has been an advance over last year, and more citizen soldiers who know something about a military rifle are being discharged each year, to come back, I am sure when the country needs them, and will come back better prepared for the work because of the training they have had as Guardsmen.

I have the honor to enclose herewith a copy of the report of Small Arms, submitted, to the War Department, changed for our purpose to include the Naval Reserve.

The individual qualifications will be found in Appendix A.

FIELD SERVICE—COAST ARTILLERY CORPS.

NATIONAL GUARD OF THE STATE OF MAINE.

HEADQUARTERS, COAST ARTILLERY CORPS.

PORTLAND, September 1, 1911.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Me.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my report of the duty of the Coast Artillery Corps held at Portland District, July 17th to 26th, inclusive. As part of this report I attach General Orders No. 5, these headquarters, and General Orders No. 13, Headquarters Artillery District of Portland, July 11, 1911. (Omitted in publication.)

As I was in command of that part of the Corps on duty at Fort Williams this report must of necessity deal mostly with the work at that station. The duty performed was carried out as arranged in the orders issued from District Headquarters, but in addition battery drill was held on Monday afternoon and extra artillery instruction was received by the extension of many of our drill periods and during the drills of the regular garrison the men of our companies were present to observe the drill and in a few cases some of our men were made temporary members of the regular gun crew; the range sections also spent extra time at their stations. Rain, with thick weather, interfered with the work on Monday, July 25th, by stopping the service practice at 11.00 o'clock and on account of the bad weather that continued way into the night all work had to be suspended for the rest of the day; the night drill being changed

to Tuesday. Fog also bothered us quite a little interfering with our sub-calibre firing to quite an extent and preventing tracking drill for the range sections. On Wednesday, July 19th, in addition to the regular drills we were engaged in blending powder and cleaning the projectiles for service firing. The lack of towing facilities shortened our sub-caliber practice but the results were such that the District Commander authorized service firing for all our companies except the 10th and without a doubt would have been authorized for them if they could have secured a little more sub-caliber work, but no steamer could be obtained so they had to endure the disappointment of not participating in service firing.

The trial shots were scheduled for Saturday but on account of fog were postponed until Monday and on account of the severe storm but three shots were fired by the 5th and 12th companies at the 10-inch and the 8th at the 12-inch guns. As we had but one steamer to four targets it was decided to allot her to Williams for the forenoon and McKinley in the afternoon of Tuesday, July 26th. The weather clearing by that time firing was resumed, the 4th company firing their six shots at the 6-inch battery and the 9th Company on the 12-inch, firing first their trial shot and then their three record shots, the last shot hitting and completely wrecking the target; this ended the firing for the forenoon as we were without a target; there being but one other for our use and not time enough to secure it for use that forenoon and in justice to those at McKinley that were to fire in the afternoon the same was reserved for their use. The firing was continued after dinner at McKinley, the 11th company firing six shots at the 6-inch; the 3rd, 6th and 7th three each at the 8-inch, with no hits or damage to the targets so at 5.30 p. m. the District Commander decided that if there was an opportunity before dark firing would be resumed at Williams. At 5.50 we telephoned Major Palmer to order the 5th, 8th and 12th companies to their batteries and on return to Williams if chance offered firing would take place in the following order, 12th and 5th at the 10-inch and 8th at the 12-inch. On the return to Williams of the District Commander, we arriving at the wharf at about 6.35 p. m., and on reaching Battery Sullivan found everything in readiness, the first shot being fired at about 6.45 by the 12th company. A misfire on the third shot caused a safety delay of ten minutes.

No hits were made, then the 5th company manned the battery and on their second shot hit and also wrecked the target so they did not fire their third shot and this also prevented the 8th company from firing their record shots. While only two actual hits were recorded the 9th company with the 12-inch at a range in excess of 8000 yards and the 5th with the 10-inch at over 6000 yards all the shots were close and showed good results for our first firing of service ammunition.

Parade was held on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. Muster of the companies Friday afternoon, the troops being paid late Tuesday forenoon.

Guard mount was held each day, commencing Monday and continuing through to Saturday, the companies mounting guard in the following order: 4th, 12th, 8th, 5th, 9th and 10th companies.

Lectures for the officers were held as follows: Monday at 4.00 p. m. by Lieutenant Gage; at 8.00 p. m. by Major Johnston; Tuesday at 11.00 a. m. by Captain Cloke, at 1.30 p. m. by Lieutenant Wildrick; Thursday at 8.00 p. m. by Captain Glasgow. In addition we held various meetings of the officers with instructions mainly by Captain Spinks.

In the performance of our work this year there was a radical departure from that of the past two years; our companies went into camp alone for instruction purposes, we had detailed with each battery the regular battery commander, gun commander and gun pointer, and at the range towers the observer and plotter acting as instructors and as guides for our men, the work being done by us alone but under the guidance and instructions of those detailed with us and I firmly believe the results obtained demonstrated the wisdom of the plan. Another decided benefit was the concentration of six companies at the post instead of four as formerly and I recommend and do believe better results would accrue to the Corps if we could further concentrate so as to bring the entire Corps together at one post so as to have but one system of administration, discipline and instruction, and if this cannot be done it would be well to change our organization from a Corps to that of two Districts, each under a command of a Lieutenant Colonel and allow each to command his companies for the entire year and rest for ten days in each year.

The movement of the companies was in accordance with orders as issued with the following exceptions, the 1st, 2nd and 11th companies were some ten minutes late in leaving the Armory, consequently did not connect with the steamer leaving at 7.00 A. M., and as a result was about two hours late in reaching Fort McKinley, this necessitated an extra trip and made a delay to the 3rd, 6th and 7th companies. The train from Lewiston was about one hour late delaying the arrival of the 5th, 8th and 9th companies at Fort Williams until about 10.15 a. m. The 4th, 10th and 12th arriving there shortly before 9.45 a. m. Quite heavy rain made the movement of the troops and the completing of making camp somewhat disagreeable, camp being made with few exceptions and the rain holding off we were able to commence the artillery instruction at 2.30 p. m. The transportation to McKinley was handicapped by having but one steamer in commission, the other boat being laid off for repairs, this would also have deprived us of service firing but through the efforts of the District Commander he secured for our use during the last four days, one of the Quartermaster's steamers from Boston.

Camp was broken Wednesday forenoon and by General Orders No. 7, these headquarters. Train service was as follows: The 3rd, 8th and 9th companies and Hospital Corps from the Grand Trunk Station at 1.30 p. m., and from the Union Station as follows: 7th company at 11.50 a. m., 6th and 12th companies at 12.30 p. m. and the 4th and 10th at 1.20 p. m., the 5th company to their armory leaving Cape Cottage at 12.00 o'clock, and the 1st, 2nd and 11th companies from Fort McKinley while ordered at 1.30 p. m. were delayed about two hours on account of extra trips of the steamer.

The Medical Corps was under the command of Major Cragin, associated with him at Williams was Lieutenant Farris, while at McKinley were Captain Kendall and Lieutenant Haskell. The health of the command was most excellent.

Guard duty at Williams was conducted in accordance with our orders. Lieutenant Frazier, 89th Company, was detailed from Post Headquarters as the instructor and labored hard and through his efforts good progress was made in the instruction. All companies during their tour also participated in the artillery drill, the guard being withdrawn for the time being,

and from Sunday afternoon no regular guard was mounted. What few details needed for orderlies, etc., were detailed direct from organizations. At Fort McKinley for reasons unknown and without consultation with the Corps or District Commander the guard was formed by details from each company and not as arranged in conference with the District Commander previous to camp and as ordered being in direct conflict with General Orders No. 5, these headquarters—a condition and an example contrary to military discipline and obedience to orders.

The behaviour of the men was excellent, quite prompt at formations, with a willingness to work beyond the recall and there was but one serious breach of discipline and that was the failure of enough men in the 10th company to report for the night drill, Tuesday, July 25th. As the payment to the men may have been one of the causes also the cause of absentees in the other companies, I am of the opinion that the payment should be on the last day and just prior to leaving camp.

The subsistence was of the best and gave general satisfaction, military courtesy was good and showed the gradual improvement as noted from year to year. Sanitation was given the best attention, defects being corrected as noted; cleanliness was the rule whether in kitchen quarters or incinerators. Some of the companies should be commended for their excellent showing and in all a general improvement was noted over the conditions that existed in 1910 showing that these matters had had the personal attention of the company commander.

The Commander-in-Chief visited us on Monday, July 25th, accompanied by The Adjutant General, arriving at the camp at about 9.00 a. m., and watched the firing of the three trial shots, also inspected all the camps and range towers during the waits caused by the change from battery to battery. A heavy storm of wind and rain having commenced reached such a height at 11.00 o'clock as to compel a cessation of all work and also prevented his visiting Fort McKinley after dinner, much to his regret. The Adjutant General also favored us by a visit on Friday afternoon and was able to remain over from Monday and be with us all Tuesday, witnessing the firing at both posts. Major Pence, C. A. C., detailed by the Department of the East, was present several days to observe our work; he also had been observing the work in Massachusetts,

Rhode Island, Connecticut and one of the camps of the New York officers at Fort Levitt. This method of having one officer make observations on the work of the Artillery Reserves of several states will give them a knowledge of our condition and needs that will certainly be a benefit in our future training both at camp and our home stations.

I personally visited Fort McKinley, Thursday, July 20th, with Major Pence and Captain Spinks, our instructor, arriving there about 8.00 o'clock and inspected the camps, etc., and observed the drill. It was our intention to stay for the sub-caliber practice but the weather conditions were so bad we returned back to Williams leaving at 12.30. On Saturday with the District Commander and our instructor, we left Williams at 9.40 to be present at the firing of the trial shots scheduled for the afternoon. On our arrival the camps, etc., were inspected, although the weather conditions were not good. The men were ordered at 2.30 to their batteries, to be there in case the weather cleared. At 3.30 a heavy shower commencing we returned to Williams, leaving McKinley at 4.00 o'clock, but later the weather clearing, a trial shot was fired at the 8-inch battery by each of the 3rd, 6th and 7th companies. We again went to McKinley accompanied by The Adjutant General, on Tuesday, July 25th, leaving Williams before one o'clock and during the afternoon watched the 11th company fire their six shots at the 6-inch and the 3rd, 6th and 7th each their three shots at the 8-inch battery with no hits recorded.

The presence of General Dill at the firing of all of our record shots and the interest he manifested in watching all the details of the firing proved to be an incentive to the men and will be productive of much good to our Corps, being a welcome visitor to all our camps and it is to be regretted that the weather was such as to interfere with the visit of the Governor and prevent his inspection of all our camps and seeing all the men at work under actual firing conditions.

The value of an inspector-instructor was demonstrated and the good fortune of our Corps to have detailed to it an officer as well qualified as Captain M. G. Spinks was proven not once but during the entire tour. Outside of these visits to McKinley he was present at Williams and during each drill present with some detail, instructing, correcting or urging in-

creased efficiency by putting zeal and spirit in all the work between drill periods at work for or with us; the gain to us was evident with the progress shown from drill to drill. Associated with him at this post were the regular battery commanders and the rated men of that company, each at work to improve his section, with a result by their combined efforts in producing results pleasing to all.

To Colonel Newcomb and to those officers associated with us and especially to the rated men detailed with us, we are indebted for our improvement in drill and in behalf of this Corps, I herewith extend to them our thanks.

As to the work of our organizations at Fort McKinley for a detailed report I refer you to the report of Lieutenant Colonel William O. Peterson, there commanding, which with the enclosures are made a part of this report.

In regard to the attendance, the 12 companies showed but an average strength of about 45 enlisted, too small for effective work as artillery organizations. While it is true enlistments come hard, still an organized effort will produce results. Care should be taken to enlist none but the best and with all working together the membership of each company should be increased. While the strength of each company varied a trifle from day to day the following represents the average enlisted strength: 1st Company 43, 2nd Company 35, 3rd Company 47, 4th Company 53, 5th Company 43, 6th Company 42, 7th Company 52, 8th Company 46, 9th Company 35, 10th Company 47, 11th Company 42, 12th Company 49.

I can recommend as I have done before that a certain standard be exacted and if not attained that the condition be made a subject for official inquiry and unless conditions can be bettered, either a change in commanding officers or if deemed best disbandment. In the case of the 2nd company, a small enrollment but 42, with several unlooked for absentees brought them down as low as 35, with a maximum of 36; the 9th company in process of reorganization was also down to 35, in both of these organizations I look for a decided improvement. The 4th company showed a decided gain over 1910, a result of a united effort which I believe could be accomplished in the other companies.

In closing I wish to congratulate the officers and men on the improvement over 1910. While much remains to be accomplished and certain changes must be had in several organizations, to bring about the best results, we have cultivated a feeling for artillery and with the right spirit in taking hold of our armory work for 1911 and 1912, we shall be in a position to show further improvement and in our tour of duty for 1912 ought to demonstrate greater efficiency as Artillery Reserves.

Thanking each for their work and assistance in making this tour of duty one of extreme value to Coast Artillery Corps, I have the honor to remain,

REPORT OF LIEUTENANT COLONEL WILLIAM O. PETERSON, C. A. C.

PORTLAND, August 28, 1911.

SIR:—I have the honor to report compliance with General Orders No. 5, c. s., July 1, 1911.

The schedule of exercises laid down in General Orders No. 11, Artillery District of Portland, July 11, 1911, was as closely adhered to as circumstances and orders of the Post Commander would permit.

As directed by the Post Commander of Fort McKinley, the manner of performing guard duty was changed and the guard was made up of details from all the companies, instead of having the duty performed by company.

Some instruction was given the Adjutant in the ceremony of Guard Mount, but no systematic instruction was given in the performance of the duty of a sentinel nor non-commissioned officer of the guard by any one of the United States Army.

Instruction of the First and Second Companies, assigned to Battery Ingalls, was very limited, as the regular officer in command of the mortar battery had been but very recently assigned to command and made the statement that his knowledge of the mortars was very limited. He, however, appeared to be using his best endeavors to make the tour instructive to the First and Second Companies, but the results were unsatisfactory.

The instructors assigned to the rifles were competent but owing to the shortage of officers at Fort McKinley and the resulting press of regular work could not give to the companies of the National Guard the attention which was needed to get the full benefit of the tour of duty, especially those assigned to

the Sixth and Seventh Companies; these companies not showing nearly so good results as the Third and Eleventh.

The conduct of the enlisted men of the companies assigned to my command was generally very satisfactory, there being very few breaches of discipline and there was a noticeable improvement in military courtesy over previous tours of duty.

Sanitary regulations were well observed and the health of the command was very good.

The cook houses and mess shelters were decidedly unsatisfactory in several cases, not being finished until the organization using them had been in camp for several days, and then they were insufficiently provided with covering for the roof, so that there would be no dry spot in the mess house, and the rain came through the cook house roof in such quantity that it interfered with the preparation of the food.

Copies of general and special orders issued are forwarded herewith. (Omitted in publication.)

SUGGESTIONS.

I would suggest that in the interest of economy of wear and tear of tentage, a storehouse be provided for the storage at Fort McKinley of all Quartermaster's supplies to be used at that Post.

That equipment could be better cared for in camp if the tents were provided with floors. (I understand that the State owns floors now.)

That if the elements of the command are to be as widely separated as they have been at Fort McKinley, arrangement be made for an additional medical outfit, so that one surgeon can be stationed on each fork, with supplies.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the tour of duty of the 2nd Infantry at Camp Keyes, Augusta, Maine, August 7th to 16th, 1911, in compliance with Paragraph II, G. O. No. 16, c. s., A. G. O., Augusta, Maine, May 13, 1911.

II. Lieut. Col. Cummings, certain members of my staff and myself reported in camp August 5, 1911, and spent most of the sixth in looking over the country west of the camp with a view of selecting suitable places for field maneuvers.

III. For a detailed account of operations I refer you to the Diary of Operations, kept by The Adjutant, herewith attached marked "A." (Omitted in publication.)

IV. The making and breaking of camp was very creditable and was done much better than I have ever seen it done before by the Regiment.

V. The camp itself was one of the best that I have ever seen for which I wish to thank you and Major Goodwin. The kitchen and mess shacks were especially appreciated by both officers and men. The water supply proved abundant and the supply of tentage was more than ample.

VI. The officers, other than headquarters, messed by battalion which worked out very satisfactorily and was, I think, far superior to the old method.

VII. The field exercises were very well carried out but we were hampered greatly in not being able to get permission from

the farmers to occupy their fields. Some of the farmers were very cordial and liberal while of others the least said the better.

VIII. The athletic field day proved very successful and most interesting to the men. I think that it should be continued at each encampment held in Augusta.

IX. The Regiment made a very good appearance at the U. S. Field Inspection August 13, 1911, but a lack of uniformity was noted among the companies as to the method of preparing the articles of field equipment for inspection. I would recommend that Sergt. Schweitzer be instructed to give particular attention to this when with the several companies.

X. The work of Lieut. Butcher, U. S. Infantry, and Lieut. Crystal, 5th U. S. Infantry, was of the highest character and the Regiment is under great obligations to them for the thorough and conscientious instruction given.

XI. The officers particularly enjoyed and showed the keenest interest in the war game as exemplified by Lieut. Butcher while the non-commissioned officers profited by a thorough company drill given by Lieut. Crystal. Arrangements should be made for at least two such drills at each encampment.

XII. The detail of a cook from the Regular Army proved very effective and was, in my opinion, one of the best things that could have been done—in fact it was most conducive to satisfaction among the enlisted men. With the exception of one company there was absolutely no complaint as to the rations, and in this case the matter was quickly adjusted.

XIII. The rations proved more than ample and in regard to this I respectfully call your attention to the report of Lieut. Libby, Battalion Quartermaster and Commissary, herewith enclosed. Also to his suggestion that a large tent is preferable to two mess houses for officers, etc.

XIV. In future camps I would suggest that the Medical Department make up their minds before going into camp just what kind of an incinerator they wish constructed and that after they are constructed by the companies that one and the same medical officer inspect all.

XV. I again recommend that extra blankets or mattresses be issued at each encampment.

XVI. The Bass shoe worn by some of the companies proved far superior to any shoe worn hitherto.

XVII. The field exercises proved that mounted scouts were almost a necessity to successful field operations. In order for the Sergeants Major to be of any use in the field or at any drill under new Drill Regulations they also should be mounted.

In conclusion, General, I wish to thank you for the many courtesies which the Regiment and I myself received at your hands.

EXCERPTS FROM REPORTS OF OFFICERS OF THE SECOND INFANTRY.

The following are excerpts from reports of officers of the Second Infantry:

Major WILLIAM E. SOUTHARD—

Recommends that each company be issued one conical tent for use at home stations in order to learn to pitch camp expeditiously; that for purposes of instruction the ceremony of guard mount should be used when possible; that officers of the Medical Corps give exact specifications for preparation of kitchen incinerators; that mattresses be supplied for enlisted men; commends abandonment of the old mess houses and program of field sports; states belief that close order drill was the best he had ever seen in camp and that "it lays the foundation on which to make a good soldier and that at least half of the time in camp should be devoted to this work." Referring to field problems, he says: "While these problems were instructive and much was learned by the officers and men I am of the opinion that under the existing circumstances the Guard is not getting the proper kind of instruction. Unless the State can arrange to acquire a tract of land for use during these maneuvers over which the troops can maneuver without changing their plans to suit every farmer whose land they wish to occupy we cannot get the proper instruction."

Captain MOSES P. STILES, A. I. S. A. P.—

Commends program as best he has ever seen and in particular approves half-day devoted to athletic sports; praises work of Lieutenants Butcher and Crystal, also lectures on first aid by Majors Church and Bradbury; recommends either a more liberal allowance of blank ammunition for field problems or none at all; recommends that whenever the regiment camps at Augusta the Acting Assistant Inspector of Small Arms Practice be allowed to open the rifle range every day and that two

men be detailed from each company each day for instruction. In this connection, he states: "I am firmly convinced that the reason so many company commanders find it so difficult to get their men interested in rifle practice and to get them to qualify, is because in some companies there are so few good or even fair instructors; and I believe if this recommendation is carried out that it will help them to a large extent and gradually educate some instructors and riflemen in those companies where now there are few. Then again some men would be qualified who can get no other time to go to the range during the season."

1st Lieut. THOMAS M. J. ENRIGHT, Battalion Adjutant—

Recommends that in the future the check system be used at the post exchange in preference to cash.

1st Lieut. JAMES W. HANSON, Battalion Adjutant—

Recommends that afternoon of field sports be made a feature at subsequent camps; recommends that enlisted men be provided with mattresses or that extra blankets be issued for use at camp; that the battalion sergeants major be quartered in rear of their battalions and that they should be mounted.

2nd Lieut. JOSIAH M. LIBBY, Battalion Quartermaster and Commissary—

Recommends that in future camps at Augusta one large tent be used for storage and issue of supplies rather than the present frame buildings; that hours of issue be more limited so as to give more time for clerical work; states that at present prices twenty-six or twenty-seven cents per ration is ample; commends work of Private Ray Butler, Company A, detailed as clerk.

Captain CHARLES H. NORTON, Company F—

Reports in detail regarding duty performed and shows commendable percentage of men present at all formations.

Captain WILLIAM A. McDONALD, Company G—

Refers to difficulty in constructing kitchen incinerators so as to meet wishes of the officers of the Medical Corps and suggests that confusion in this respect be eliminated by detailing a single officer of the Medical Corps to inspect incinerator construction; states that the kitchens used this year were very satisfactory but complains that the smoke blew directly into the officers' tents; especially commends the program of field sports.

Captain DANIEL B. BELCHER, Company K—

States that camp was one of the best he has ever seen and that the new way of cooking and messing under canvas shelters was a great improvement over the old way of using the buildings; states that there were less flies than at Pine Camp and that this was a great improvement over previous years; recommends that extra bedding be supplied, that more blank ammunition be supplied and that khaki clothing be issued for drill and maneuvers.

Captain JAMES F. BAGLEY, Company M—

States that tour of duty throughout was most instructive, that the men were not overworked and probably assimilated more knowledge by the system of practical work in the forenoon and a short theoretical lecture in the afternoon than they could have done in any way; that the company was well fed, had no difficulty in handling the ration as a result of constant attention on the part of the officers and quartermaster sergeant. Suggests that additional bedding be issued; that commutation of rations be allowed to companies that spend the day previous to encampment on the rifle range; states that company commanders should in some way be impressed with the importance of filing their morning reports and ration returns immediately upon arrival, stating that his company filed its reports promptly but was delayed in drawing rations by failure of other companies to do likewise; expresses belief that on field problems the men should stay out long enough so that they must cook the ration; suggests that in field problems the signal "butts up" in calling for a decision should be thoroughly explained to the men and used.

In a special report on the Infantry camp at Augusta, Lieut. Col. Blaine Owen, Subsistence Department, Chief Commissary—

States that in many cases supplies were the most satisfactory and the least expensive that he has seen in his seven years experience in the Commissary Department and attributes this to application of Regular Army methods in purchase and issue; reports large saving on beef owing to purchase by the cattle instead of the cut and like saving in issue of pea beans to be cooked in the field ranges; states that all perishables were issued as soon as delivered and no more than one day's supply at a

time, thus obviating waste and assuring issue in perfect condition; commends location of company kitchens directly across the street from company commanders' quarters but says company commanders should exercise more supervision over their kitchens and suggests that company officers establish separate messes and be served from their company kitchens, paying the company therefor, in this way gaining intimate knowledge of conditions so as to make necessary changes in cooks, etc., with intelligence.

In a special report on the Infantry camp at Augusta, Lieut. Col. Edwin M. Fuller, Medical Corps, Chief Surgeon—

States that enlisted men improved greatly in drill and that there was a fine co-operative spirit between officers and men; that the paper work was unsatisfactory; that sanitary conditions of company streets and quarters were better than usual; that mess houses were kept clean and that kitchen crematories and faucet drips were kept in better condition than at Pine Camp where they were first used but that specific directions should be given each company so as to have construction uniform and obviate misunderstandings; recommends that each company be supplied with sufficient mosquito netting, small board stuff with nails and tacks to make kitchens practically fly proof immediately on arrival in camp; especially compliments Companies A, M, D and C on the uniform and excellent sanitary conditions of their mess houses, kitchens and crematories; states that officers' mess houses and kitchens were generally unsanitary and recommends that officers hereafter mess the same as the men of the companies; criticises unsanitary conditions in the Commissary building on account of fly contamination but says that all food supplies and meats were of good quality and fairly and justly distributed; states that stables were absolutely unsanitary for the entire camp; that rears were in a fair sanitary condition for most of the time but that sanitary details were not furnished promptly; criticises unsanitary condition of post exchange but states that it was well run and orderly; criticises unsanitary condition of rear platform at general headquarters mess kitchen; recommends that a medical officer be detailed to give at least one talk each year to each company on military hygiene; recommends purchase of new ambulance.

ANNUAL CRUISE OF THE NAVAL RESERVE.

HEADQUARTERS SHIP'S COMPANY, N. R. S. M.

PORTLAND, August 1, 1911.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit respectfully the following report of the Annual Cruise of the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve of the State of Maine, July 15th-21st, inclusive.

In accordance with Special Orders No. 109, the Third Division left Rockland for Portland on Friday, July 14th. The original order to depart by the 1:30 p. m. train was countermanded on request and the detachment granted special permission to leave by the 10:10 a. m. train. Upon arrival in Portland the Division reported to the Commanding Officer and was quartered at the armory prior to the hour of embarkation, subsistence in the interim being furnished by the Paymaster's Department.

In accordance with Special Orders No. 109, six (6) officers and eighty-one (81) men reported aboard the U. S. S. Nebraska, anchored in Portland harbor, at 8:30 o'clock a. m., Saturday, July 15th.

The Nebraska got under way immediately and at a standard speed of ten knots, proceeded to latitude $41^{\circ} 15' N.$, longitude $68^{\circ} 30' W.$, a previously designated point of rendezvous, outside the frequented path of coastwise shipping.

Nearing the prescribed meeting point, we sighted men-of-war off the port bow at 8:40 o'clock, Sunday morning, July 16th. At 8:50 we observed the 3rd Division in formation as follows: Missouri, Ohio, Mississippi, Washington and Maine. At 9:35 we stopped our engines in company with the battleships Connecticut, Michigan and Virginia, these three ships constituting with us (Nebraska) the 1st Division of the North Atlantic Fleet. Upon signal from the flagship Connecticut we took our position as third ship of the Division, the Connecticut leading, followed by the Michigan as second ship. The Virginia fell in astern of us as the fourth ship.

Signals from the flagship immediately put both Divisions under way in line of columns at a standard speed of six knots. The squadron steamed on various courses and engaged in tactical maneuvers during the remainder of the forenoon and most of the afternoon. At 8:00 p. m. the Idaho was sighted and immediately assigned as eighth ship of the squadron (fourth ship of the Second Division). The Washington took a position as fourth ship of our Division while the Virginia joined the Second Division as the third ship.

Tactical maneuvers were executed during the night by means of Electric Night signals. At 8:00 o'clock on the morning of the 17th, the standard speed was increased to eight knots and the tactical maneuvers resumed. At 11:12 a. m. the cruiser Washington hoisted the "break-down" pennant and at 11:30 fell out of column. The battleship Virginia joined the First Division in lieu of the Washington at 11:40. At 11:55 the Washington hauled down the "break-down" flag but remained out of the formation. At 2:00 p. m. the standard speed was increased to ten knots. At 2:45 drill was held for torpedo-defence. At 4:18 tactical maneuvers were discontinued and the squadron proceeded under reserve speed on course 191 degrees. At 8:04 p. m. of the 17th, a fleet search-light drill was held and continued until 8:55 p. m.

At 12:40 a. m. of Tuesday, July 18th, the squadron anchored in 23 fathoms of water 18 miles east of the southerly end of Block Island. At 7:00 a. m. the fleet got under way with a standard speed increased to twelve knots, cruising on a course 186°. At 3:00 p. m. the flagship left the head of the column and took a position midway between the two Divisions. Boats were lowered from all ships on signal and sent to the flagship for instructions.

Directions for the impending attack on the easterly entrance to Long Island Sound were received on the returning boats, the Nebraska incidentally being commended by the Admiral for the expeditious maneuvering of her life-boat.

Standard speed of eight was resumed and immediately on the signal at 6:07 p. m., the various ships of the squadron took their designated positions as per orders for battle. Column was formed in open order, the First Division leading, with the

Connecticut (flag) at the head of the column. Five hundred yards astern of the flagship and two hundred yards to port (for open order) the Michigan was in position. Five hundred yards astern of the Michigan and directly behind the flagship, the Nebraska was in position. Following, in open order, came the Washington, Missouri and Maine. The battleships Ohio, Mississippi and Idaho were detached from the column, the first two to act as pickets to guard the flank of the main column, the latter to act as a scout in advance of the same.

Carefully arranged tail-lights of low candle power were adjusted, to guide ships astern, and all ships turned off running lights at 7:16. At 7:20 all light ports were closed and bolted, all lights extinguished and battle lanterns turned on.

Special watches were assigned and crews stationed at the secondary batteries for emergency torpedo-defence.

At 4:03 a. m. of July 19, the picket ship Ohio was sighted off the starboard bow. Daylight now made it possible to observe the approach of torpedo-boats before the latter could reach effective torpedoing range, and the picket ships therefore returned to the main column at 4:30 a. m.

At 4:32 a destroyer was sighted bearing 6° per standard compass. During the interval between 4:32 and 6:45 a. m., seven additional destroyers and a monitor were sighted on various bearings. Ranges were carefully determined from the fire-control stations and the ships fired upon by the six and three-inch guns of the secondary batteries.

At 7:37 five of the enemy's battleships, the main defence, were sighted off the starboard bow. General Quarters were sounded immediately, calling all hands to the battle-stations. At 8:15 the enemy's distance was 7,500 yards, within the required range for effective engagement by the defence.

At 8:28 a submarine was sighted on the beam at a range of 2200 yards, conning tower submerged and approaching at an estimated speed of ten knots. She was immediately placed under fire of heavy guns. A second submarine was sighted at 8:40, approaching the ship from the starboard bow, being at the close range of 1400 yards. Advancing with conning tower submerged, she was made the object of fire from heavy guns. Approaching within 100 yards, she emerged and departed on another course.

At 8:43 the fleet anchored in 17 fathoms of water, in the offing east of Block Island. At 10:40 a. m. orders were received from the flagship Connecticut to get under way at 1:00 o'clock at a standard speed of 12 knots.

Anchor was weighed at 1:15 p. m. and the ship under way at standard speed at 1:20. At 1:45, battleship Michigan hoisted the pennant of the Third Division.

Flagship Connecticut retired from the squadron on account of her uncertain condition subsequent to a breakdown and signalled the battleship Missouri to act as guide.

Steaming a course of 165° by the standard compass, (south-south-east) the squadron formed column in the following order: Battleships Missouri, Mississippi, Idaho, Virginia, Ohio, Maine, Michigan, Nebraska; cruiser Washington; scout cruisers Chester and Salem.

At 6:28 p. m. battleship Maine hoisted the "break-down" and sheered out to starboard of the main column.

At 6:30 Missouri signalled to change course to 358° (north). The squadron took up this course without change of formation by executing column left at 6:40 and repeating the movement at 6:48.

At 7:00 p. m. the squadron steamed at reserve speed. The Nebraska sheered out to port and gained her position as leading port picket at 7:35. The scout ships Chester and Salem proceeded at reserve speed for their posts as scouts in advance of the column. Virginia sheered to port and took up position as rear port picket. Ohio and Washington were respectively leading and rear starboard pickets. This was the battle formation for the second night attack.

At 8:11 the ship's gongs sounded General Quarters. All lights were extinguished and battle lanterns lighted.

At 10:28 the Virginia flashed two search-lights simultaneously over her port beam, the rays falling directly upon a destroyer making full speed for the column. A red star from the destroyer indicated that she had already launched torpedoes within the required range.

All picket ships at once turned on all search-lights and swept the sea in an effort to screen the main fighting column from torpedo attack. At 10:29 the Nebraska picked up two destroyers bearing north-east by east and east-north-east. Each

destroyer fired red stars at the moment of discovery, to indicate that torpedoes had already been launched at effective range.

Sighting one of the enemy's battleships at 10:47, bearing 344° , 5200 yards. Engaged her with the forward 8 and 12-inch turrets and the starboard 8-inch turret.

The starboard picket (Ohio) sighted two destroyers in quick succession at 10:55, bearing 47° . Found range as soon as possible, 1070 yards, but red stars had been fired at Missouri, leading main column.

At 10:56 Nebraska picked up two destroyers, 1500 yards, bearing 315° , advancing on the column at full speed. Ranges and azimuths were sent to 3 3-inch and 3 6-inch guns and green stars fired to indicate repulse at required range.

Five additional destroyers were sighted and fired upon; two, however, were successful with torpedoes.

The squadron steamed various courses and came to anchor at sea at 12:25 a. m., July 20th.

At 1:23 p. m. anchor was weighed and course laid for Block Island. Orders were received from the flagship to proceed with all speed to Portland for the purpose of disembarking the Reserve before coaling at Provincetown and taking on the Admiral.

At 1.54 course was changed to 129° and the ship put under full speed. Land was sighted on the port beam at 2:17 and departure was taken from No Man's Land at 2:33, bearing 65° 15 miles.

Nantucket Shoals Lightship was sighted at 7:30 p. m., 3 points off the starboard bow and course was changed to 166° at 7:40.

At 1:00 a. m. July 21st, course was changed to 359° . Cape Elizabeth Lightship was sighted at 1:25 p. m. and land at 1:40.

Anchor was dropped in Portland harbor at 3:30 and the Reserve disembarked immediately, leaving the ship's side at 3:45.

Each day during the Cruise the Reserve was given the benefit of special instruction in ordnance in addition to the regular routine drill, including the 3-inch rapid-fire gun, the 6-inch gun of the secondary battery, the 8 and 12-inch turrets and the torpedo tubes. The chief Boatswain also gave the enlisted men of the organization some very valuable instruction in seamanship.

On account of the small number of watch officers, no attempt was made to stand day and night watches by relief, the officers devoting their time to the inspection and study of the various departments of the ship when not required for other duty.

The remarkably clean condition of the men's clothing despite the frequent gun drills and long battle-watch was a source of much satisfaction to the officers of the Ship's Company. Clothing was washed at every opportunity and uniforms kept in a condition in every way equal to that of the regular ship's company, thus eliminating the unfavorable comparison which has been remarked on former cruises.

The provisions for the men's mess were up to the usual high standard which has prevailed for the last few years, the food being wholesome and ample.

Upon leaving the ship the organization was complimented by the Executive Officer, in behalf of the Commanding Officer, for their diligence and genuine enthusiasm.

REPORT OF INSTRUCTOR, OFFICERS' SCHOOL SECOND INFANTRY.

FARMINGTON, MAINE, September 1, 1911.

*Col. Frank M. Hume,
Second Regiment Infantry, N. G. S M.,
Houlton, Maine.*

SIR: I have the honor to report that in accordance with General Orders No. 14, these headquarters, series of 1910, a school of instruction was inaugurated for all officers of the regiment below the grade of lieutenant colonel.

The school embraced the subjects in military map reading, field service regulations and tactical principles as set forth in the scheme of instruction laid down in the order establishing the school.

While the work of the school was primarily for the officers of the regiment below the rank of lieutenant colonel, nevertheless the questions for each month were sent to all officers in the organization so that, if they pleased, they could keep fully conversant with the work being done month by month.

It was the ambition of the Instructor to make the school one of instruction in fact as well as in name, and to this end all errors that were detected in the answers to the examination questions were noted, and to the officer submitting the same correct versions or solutions were forwarded. To accomplish this with the least loss of time, sheets were prepared for each month, in each subject, containing the correct answers or solutions to those questions which an examination of the papers showed were the most commonly incorrectly answered. Then the paragraph was checked to which it was desired to call the officer's attention and the sheet forwarded to him. In addition, any point not covered by these sheets was taken up in a personal letter.

The entire work of the school was conducted by correspondence and this resulted in the sending by mail of a large number of communications, the total being in excess of 1500 such communications.

As a body the officers have pursued the school course with interest and there is a general belief among them that great good has been received from the work. There have unfortunately been many changes among the officers during the school year and this has had the effect of lessening the number of those who completed the course. It was not deemed wise to require the work of the school to be done by new officers who had not had the advantage of the course of last year, but in some instances the new officers desired to take the course and their wishes were granted.

The instructing officers who have been detailed to Maine have noted the familiarity of the officers of the regiment in the subjects pursued in the school and many words of praise have been given to the organization as a result. The ability to read a military map is of the greatest benefit to all officers at maneuvers and the progress the officers have made in this subject will be of much value to them at the maneuvers which the organization may participate in next year.

Each month the Instructor, after sending out the papers for that month, prepared a set of answers and solutions which were used as the basis of comparison for the answers and solutions submitted by those in the school. These solutions are filed in an envelope properly marked with the papers received from each officer and the other school records.

In military map reading the officers have a good working knowledge of the theory, but it would be of great additional benefit if it were possible to have a military map prepared of some section where they could compare the map with the actual conditions it is intended to delineate. This would be of particular advantage in giving the proper impressions of the degrees of slope portrayed by contour lines of varying intervals and is believed that only in having a map of the ground one is actually on can this particular phase of the work be acquired.

The principles embodied in Hanna's "Tactical Principles and Problems" were brought out in the examinations in field service regulations, so far as possible, and it is thought that considerable progress has been made in the theories laid down in that work.

There were some officers who did not complete the course as prescribed. Those who did take the whole course succeeded, without exception, in attaining a per centage rank of 75 or better and of receiving the marking of "satisfactory."

This would seem to show that the course was not excessively difficult and that it was only necessary for the officer to apply himself to the subject matter to attain the modest requirements of efficiency prescribed. It was attempted to have the problems submitted each month embrace as far as possible a practical application of the theories studied. Practice was given in writing messages and orders, while maps were asked for with positions of troops and other points in the problems marked thereon.

MONTHLY RANKING SHEETS.

The ranking of the papers submitted each month during the course in each subject was determined on the per centage system; a perfect set of solutions being marked 100, while errors were deducted from that rank according to their relative importance.

The rank given to the papers of each officer for each month is shown by the following table:

II. Regimental and Corps Commanders will direct members of the field, staff and non-commissioned staff to report in person at the most convenient point.

III. The inspection being made to determine whether the organized militia of this State is uniformed, armed and equipped for field service, organizations will be inspected in field uniform (olive drab) only, including the full equipment prescribed in paragraph 132 and 133, Militia Regulations, 1908, excepting ammunition and rations but including intrenching tools for mobile troops. The inspection will include all property available for field service or of use in connection therewith or preparatory thereto and which is of the pattern and quality issued to the Regular Army whether the property belongs to the United States or not. Articles of dress and full dress uniform and equipment will not be inspected.

IV. Inspections of organizations will be made at 8 P. M. Property in storerooms will be inspected during the afternoon preceding the inspection of the organization at such time as the inspecting officer may

arrange. During the inspection of property in storerooms the responsible or other commissioned officer familiar therewith should be present with sufficient detail of men to handle the property. In order to expedite the work, this property should be previously assorted and neatly arranged for inspection. The annual allowance to quartermaster sergeants will be conditioned on the faithful performance of their duties in this respect. Attention is especially invited to the following instructions to inspectors: "Only such property as is submitted to the personal inspection of the inspecting officer will be included in the inspector's report." This means that inspecting officers will give credit for only such property as is actually in the armory for inspection. It will greatly facilitate the inspection if all property not in the hands of the men be assorted and arranged with tags showing the number of each article.

V. Commanding officers will carefully note the date set for the inspection of their commands, will see that the drill hall is available and will use every endeavor to secure full attendance. All company records should be strictly up to date and ready for inspection. Blank forms furnished in advance by inspecting officers should receive immediate attention so that there may be no delay on the day set for the inspection.

VI. Commanding officers should have on hand for inspection the necessary field service uniform, arms and equipment for the established minimum, which is 58 for a company of infantry and 63 for a company of coast artillery. Requisition should be made well in advance of the date set for inspection for any articles of field service uniform, arms or equipment necessary to fully provide for the minimum number herein stated.

In accordance with Section 19, The Military Law, the Inspector General will proceed forthwith to make the annual inspection for 1911 of the several organizations of the active Militia, giving not less than ten days' notice to the commanding officer of each organization of the date fixed for the inspection of his command, which notice shall be promptly acknowledged to the Inspector General direct.

UNIFORM.

All organizations will parade for inspection in dress uniform. Enlisted men will not wear the breast cord but the full dress cap band will be worn.

MILITARY PROPERTY.

All military property must be in the armory on the day of the inspection. All uniform lockers will be systematically and uniformly arranged and will contain only the military property issued. All other military property will be conveniently arranged for this inspection.

All unserviceable property will be separated from the serviceable. Rifles will be thoroughly inspected and the condition of each reported.

Attention is invited to General Orders, No. 26, A. G. O., series of 1910, and company commanders will see that the provisions relative to inspection are complied with.

BOOKS AND RECORDS.

A careful inspection of all books, papers, order files and company records will be made and their condition reported. Specific reports will be made upon the condition of the following books and records:

Property Book, Descriptive List, Correspondence Book, Document File, Order Files, Morning Report Book, Roll Book, Company Record Book, Target Record Book and Treasurer's Book.

The following instructions for the preparation of books and records will be observed:

Property book will be kept up to date by entering all invoices and transfers of property since "last return."

Descriptive cards for every enlisted man will be filed and "descriptive list to be complete."

Briefs of all official correspondence since the receipt of the correspondence book to be entered therein.

Document file to contain a copy of all official documents numbered to correspond with correspondence book.

General Order file series of 1910 complete, series of 1911 complete to date.

Roll book to contain a record of each drill or other meeting for instruction of the company.

Company record book to contain a record of each business meeting, of the company and company orders.

Target record book to contain a complete record of target practice for the season of 1910.

Company treasurer's book to be balanced to date of inspection and bank deposit book showing the amount to the credit of the Company with vouchers for all expenditures.

HOURS FOR INSPECTION.

Armories, books and records will be inspected during the day of the date set for the inspection of each command. Companies will be formed for inspection promptly at 8 o'clock p. m., unless otherwise directed by the Inspector General. Attention is invited to Paragraphs 59, 129, 486 and 487, Infantry Drill Regulations, relative to inspection.

Company commanders with their quartermaster sergeants are hereby ordered to report for duty on the date of inspection of their command at such time as to insure everything being in readiness upon the arrival of the inspecting officer and to assist in the inspection and verification of military property.

Companies will be inspected as to their efficiency in drill in school of the squad, close and extended order and such company movements as the size of the drill hall will permit; in guard duty, and the efficiency of officers and non-commissioned officers as instructors.

Upon receipt at this office of such report the responsible officer will be notified regarding the further disposition of the case. This blank form is primarily designed to serve as a notification of loss or damage and if responsible officers report all cases of loss or damage promptly it will serve to keep their property accountability clear and save much time in the verification and settlement of their semi-annual returns.

In the event of destruction by fire or otherwise of a large amount of military property is should not be listed on Form 20 but be made the subject of a special report.

A supply of the revised Form No. 20 has been forwarded to responsible officers and all copies of the old Form 20 should be destroyed.

General Orders, No. 12.

By an emergency act of the Seventy-Fifth Legislature made effective by the signature of the Governor on March 23, 1911, Sections 2, 8, 20, 38, 52, 53, 54, 62, 66, 75, 84, 86, 87, 90, 92, 95, 100, 104, 108, 114, 123, 132 of The Military Law have been amended to read as follows and are hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

(Additions and changes are printed in **bold face** type, omissions are indicated in *italics* enclosed in parenthesis.)

'Sect. 2. All male citizens who are more than eighteen and less than forty-five years of age, excepting idiots, lunatics, paupers, vagabonds, habitual drunkards, and persons convicted of infamous crimes, and who are resident in this state, shall, **whenever the governor may deem necessary**, be enrolled by the assessors in the several cities, towns and plantations in which they reside, in such manner and according to such regulations as the governor shall prescribe. On such enroll-

ment and opposite the name of each person who is exempt from duty under section one, or who is serving in the active militia, or who is unable by reason of physical disability to perform military duty, the assessors shall write the word "exempt" and state in each case the cause of exemption. The assessors shall subscribe said list and make oath that the same is true to the best of their knowledge and belief; and shall file the same with the clerk of the city, town or plantation **forthwith**; and each clerk shall, **within ten days**, make a certified statement of the total number enrolled, the number marked exempt, the number belonging to the **active militia** and the number marked disabled, and forward the same to the office of the adjutant general.'

'Sect. 8. The staff of the commander-in-chief shall consist of the adjutant general who shall be ex-officio chief of staff, quartermaster general, and paymaster general, with rank of brigadier general, an inspector general with rank of colonel, a judge advocate, with rank of lieutenant colonel, the senior officer on duty with each of the staff departments, and four aides-de-camp, with the rank of major, and one naval aide, with rank of lieutenant commander. All officers, except as otherwise provided in this chapter, and except the aides herein provided, must be at the time of their appointment, commissioned officers in the active militia, on the active or retired list of or above the grade of captain, but no officers shall be appointed from the retired list who shall have had less than eight years of service in the active militia, the last year of which shall have been within ten years immediately preceding the appointment.

'All officers of the staff of the commander-in-chief excepting the senior officer on duty in each of the staff departments shall be appointed and commissioned by the governor and shall hold office during his pleasure and until their successors are appointed and qualified.'

'Sect. 20. The senior officer on duty in the ordnance department shall have the rank of lieutenant colonel and shall from time to time submit to the adjutant general requisitions for all ordnance property, equipment, and accoutrements and all range and target material, which requisitions when approved by the adjutant general, and submitted to and signed by the governor shall, if they be for material issued to the state by the ordnance department, be forwarded to that department for supply, and if they be for material not so issued, then by direction of the adjutant general and in the manner prescribed in section twenty-seven, the senior ordnance officer shall purchase and direct the issue of such ordnance property and range material, certify all bills therefor as correct, and transmit them to the adjutant general.

'He shall, when required or whenever he deems it necessary, report to the adjutant general upon the condition of the ordnance, arms, and accoutrements on hand or issued to the national guard; he shall point out all deficiencies and, so far as he is vested with authority, he shall be responsible that all organizations are armed and equipped as prescribed or as may hereafter be prescribed by the war department.

'He shall be the inspector of and shall exercise general supervision over the small-arms practice of the national guard. No target range or shooting gallery for the national guard shall be acquired, constructed, maintained or equipped, except upon his recommendation, unless the governor shall expressly order otherwise. **Whenever ordered by the governor** it shall be his duty to make or cause to be made by the regimental inspectors of small-arms practice an (*omit: annual*) inspection of all target ranges and shooting galleries used by the national guard; to submit a report to the adjutant general of the condition and necessities of each; and to make a detailed report of the transactions of his office to the adjutant general on the fifteenth day of December annually.'

'Sect. 38. For the purpose of securing competent medical practitioners to conduct the physical examination of applicants for enlistment and to render medical service to any organization when so ordered by the commander-in-chief, the governor is authorized to issue commissions as first lieutenants of the medical reserve corps to such active licensed practitioners of medicine and surgery in this state as shall be favorably recommended by the senior officer of the medical corps, not to exceed one for each company or other organization so situated that the services of an officer of the medical corps cannot be effectively available. Such officers are not entitled to retirement, but the commission so given shall confer upon the holders all the authority, rights and privileges of commissioned officers of like grade in the medical corps of the national guard, except promotions, but only when engaged in active duty in examining recruits or under orders from the commander-in-chief. They shall have rank in said corps according to the date of their commissions therein, and when employed on active duty shall rank next below all officers of like grade in the active militia; provided that any officer of the medical reserve corps who fails to perform his duty as herein prescribed shall forfeit his commission and not be eligible to reappointment.

'Officers of the medical reserve corps when called into or engaged in active duty shall be subject to all the laws, regulations, and orders for the government of the active militia; and for conducting the physical examination of applicants for enlistment shall be entitled to such compensation as the governor in regulations may prescribe, and for all other services to the pay of first lieutenants of the medical corps.'

'Sect. 52. No person shall be elected, appointed or commissioned to any of the following grades, who is over the age limit prescribed for each of the several grades, namely: Brigadier general, sixty-four years; colonel and lieutenant colonel, sixty-one years; major, fifty-six years; captain, fifty years; first lieutenant, forty-five years; and second lieutenant, forty years. Any officer who shall, while serving in any of the above grades, reach the age limit prescribed for said grade, shall, if eligible, be retired; otherwise, honorably discharged. This section,

shall not apply to the adjutant general of the state of Maine, and shall not serve to vacate any commission now in force; (*Omitted: nor shall it, upon the expiration of his present commission, prevent the re-election or reappointment of any officer to the office he now holds for the same period of time and under the same conditions as obtained heretofore and up to the passage of this act.*) nor shall it apply to chaplains of the national guard.'

'Sect. 53. No officer of the active militia shall be permitted to serve in any of the following grades for a greater period than that prescribed for each of the several grades, namely: Brigadier general, five years; colonel, six years; lieutenant colonel, seven years; major, eight years; captain, nine years; first lieutenant, ten years, and second lieutenant, ten years. But should any officer be re-elected or reappointed to the office he now holds, the time limit of service in that grade shall be reckoned from the date of the approval or passage of this act. When an officer shall have served the prescribed time in any one grade he shall be placed on the retired list. **This section shall not apply to the adjutant general of the state of Maine.**'

'Sect. 54. Vacancies occurring in the various grades, excepting the lowest, of the several staff departments and corps shall be filled by promoting and appointing the senior officer in the next lower grade of said department or corps. Vacancies occurring in the lowest grade thereof shall be filled in the following manner:

'In the medical department appointments shall be made by the governor upon the recommendation of a board of examination consisting of three officers of the medical corps. **Such boards of examination shall be convened by general orders from the adjutant general's office, which orders shall indicate the number of vacancies to be filled, and any active licensed practitioner of medicine and surgery in this state and who is physically sound shall be permitted to appear for examination.**

'**In the ordnance and subsistence departments any vacancy shall be filled by the appointment thereto of any commissioned officer in the active militia on the active or retired list; but if from the active list, of at least five years service, two of which shall have been as a commissioned officer, and if from the retired list, that the last year of service on the active list shall have been within eight years immediately preceding the appointment.**

'Commanding officers of brigades, regiments and separate battalions shall appoint their respective staff officers subject to the provisions of sections forty-seven, forty-eight, fifty-seven and fifty-eight of this act, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the officer making the appointment and until their successors are appointed and qualified, subject at all times to the same laws and regulations as apply to other commissioned officers of the national guard.

'Battalion staff officers are appointed by the regimental commanders upon recommendation of the battalion commander.'

Sect. 62. Any officer who is sixty-four years old, or who is found incapacitated for service by reason of physical disability under the provisions of section fifty-eight, or who hereafter shall serve in any one grade the time limit as prescribed in section fifty-three, or who shall while serving in any grade reach the age limit prescribed for that grade in section fifty-two and be eligible for retirement due to length of service or other cause specified in this section, shall be withdrawn from the active service and placed on the retired list.

'Any officer who has served twenty-five years as a commissioned officer in the active militia of this state, or who is sixty years old, may be, by order of the commander-in-chief, withdrawn from the active service and placed on the retired list.

'Any officer who has served as a commissioned officer in the active militia of this state six consecutive years, or as such nine years not necessarily consecutive, or nine years either as an officer or soldier in which shall be counted honest and faithful service in the military or naval service by the United States, or both, provided six years of which have been service as a commissioned officer in the active militia of the state, shall, if he make application, be placed on the retired list with the highest rank held by him during his service.

'Any officer who has served as a commissioned officer in the active militia of this state for a continuous period of fifteen years, honorable service in war to be counted double, may at his own request be placed upon the retired list with one grade higher rank than that held at the time of his retirement.

'Retired officers shall be entitled to wear the uniform of the rank with which they were retired; they shall continue to be borne on the national guard register, shall be subject to military law, and may, in the discretion of the governor, be assigned to active duty.' (*Omitted: in time of war, insurrection, invasion or imminent danger thereof.*)

'Sect. 66. Recruits enlisting in the active militia must be able-bodied men, free from disease, of good character and temperate habits, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years; (*omitted: except that men may be enlisted as musicians if more than sixteen years of age,*) and in time of peace no person who is not a citizen of the United States and of this state, or who has not made legal declaration of his intention to become a citizen or who cannot speak, read, and write the English language or who does not reside within a town where an organization of the active militia is stationed, or within a radius of twelve miles, shall be enlisted in the active militia; provided that the character and the standard of the physical examination required for enlistment in the national guard shall be as prescribed in the regulations of the war department and the laws of the United States for the government of the organized militia, and provided that no person under the age of twenty-one years, having parent or guardian entitled to his custody, shall be enlisted or mustered into the active militia of the state without the written consent of such parent or guardian.

'No person not of the age specified above, no insane or intoxicated person, no deserter from the military or naval service of the United States or of this or any other state, and no person who has been convicted of a felony shall be enlisted in the active militia.

'Hereafter all enlistments in the active militia shall be for a term of not less than three years, and no person shall again be enlisted whose service during the last enlistment in the active militia was not honest and faithful, or who has been dishonorably discharged or discharged without honor from any military or naval organization of the state or of the United States, unless he produces the written consent to such enlistment of the commanding officer of the organization in which he last served or from which he was dishonorably discharged or discharged without honor and unless such enlistment be approved by the adjutant general.

'Men who have been discharged by reason of disbandment may be enlisted and shall then receive credit for the period served at the time of disbandment; and a man discharged for physical disability shall if such disability cease and he again enlists, receive credit for the period served prior to such discharge.

'Chief and principal musicians, musicians, and privates of the hospital corps may be enlisted as such.'

'Sect. 75. The commander-in-chief may in his discretion, at such times and under such regulations as he may prescribe order each colonel commanding a regiment **or corps**, or, in case of his disability or when designated by him, of the lieutenant colonel, and each major commanding a battalion, to parade, inspect, and report upon the general military efficiency of the several companies under his command at least once each year. In addition to the inspections provided for in this section, the inspector general shall make the inspection prescribed in section nineteen of this chapter; and the commander-in-chief may, whenever he deems it necessary, order an inspection by a medical officer of the officers and men, armories, clothes and equipments of the active militia.'

'Sect. 84. Whenever in his opinion the state of the military fund and the appropriation to defray the current expenses of the naval reserve will warrant the expenditure, the commander-in-chief is authorized to allow officers and enlisted men of the active militia reasonable compensation for attendance at drills under such regulations as he shall prescribe, such regulations to be prepared for his consideration by a special board consisting of the adjutant general, the commanding officer of the coast artillery corps, the commanding officer of the second infantry and the commanding officer of the ship's company, naval reserve.'

'Sect. 86. In addition to all other pay and allowances herein provided, there shall be allowed, subject to such regulations as the commander-in-chief may prescribe, to an adjutant general on the staff of a brigade commander, to a regimental adjutant, to the senior officer of the medical

department, to the senior officer of the ordnance department, each, a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars per annum. To the senior officer of the subsistence department, not exceeding fifty dollars per annum. To each company commander **or other officer who in the opinion of the adjutant general is entitled to such remuneration**, for care and responsibility of military property, not exceeding fifty dollars per annum; to each company clerk, and to each company quartermaster sergeant, not exceeding twenty-five dollars per annum.

'To all officers ordered to make inspection or other journeys necessary in the military service, there shall be allowed all actual and necessary expenses incident to the performance of said service, including such incidental expenditures as are allowed by law and regulations to officers of the regular army when inspecting the organized militia.

'Whenever deemed necessary, the adjutant general may authorize the computation of rations for enlisted men, which shall be at the rates fixed by the regulations of the United States in force at the time.

'The adjutant general whenever necessary, and in such manner as he may deem best, shall provide suitable mounts for all officers and enlisted men required to perform mounted duty. He shall also approve all other just and reasonable claims, payments, and expenditures, legally made in behalf of the military service of the state.'

'Sect. 87. All military accounts, unless otherwise specially provided by law, shall be approved by the person authorized to contract the same and transmitted to the adjutant general for his examination and approval. They shall then be presented to the governor and council, and if found correct shall be certified to the paymaster general for payment, and a warrant shall be drawn for the amount thereof on the state treasurer in favor of the paymaster general; accounts so allowed shall be paid by him to the persons to whom they are severally due, or to their order; provided that no payment whatever shall be made or allowed except for duty actually performed or services actually rendered; and provided that no payment of any sum authorized by this chapter shall be made to any person until there shall have been first deducted therefrom all amounts due by him to the state on any military account whatsoever; **and provided further that whenever the governor shall deem it necessary he may draw his warrant on the state treasurer in favor of the paymaster general for such sums from the military fund or the appropriation for the support of the naval reserve as may be required to meet immediate payments for current expenditures, such funds to be accounted for separately on a monthly account current to be filed with the state auditor and any unused balance to be covered into the state treasury whenever directed by the governor.'**

'Sect. 90. It shall be the duty of the municipal officers to provide and maintain for each company of the active militia located within the limits of their respective towns a suitable drill-room, offices, and armory, or place of deposit of all military equipment, and for the headquarters of each separate battalion, corps, regiment, and brigade

established within said municipal limits suitable headquarters offices; and the suitability for the necessary military purposes, of such drill-rooms, armories and headquarters offices, shall be determined by the armory commission. A reasonable compensation to be fixed by the armory commission, after hearing and consulting with the responsible municipal officers, not to exceed three hundred dollars per annum for each company, other organization, band or separate headquarters shall be allowed as rent for such suitable building or buildings to the municipality providing and maintaining them, and paid by the state out of the military fund. **Provided further that when he shall deem it necessary for the proper care of military property the adjutant general is authorized to lease any building or buildings or storage room, but no such lease shall be made without the approval of the governor.'**

'Sect. 92. Any municipal officer who fails, refuses, or neglects to take effective measures for providing and maintaining such suitable drill-rooms, offices, armories, or headquarters as prescribed in section ninety, and any municipal officer who fails, refuses, or neglects to take effective measures for providing and maintaining a suitable target range as prescribed in section **ninety-one**, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, prosecuted by complaint or indictment before a court of competent jurisdiction, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars nor more than four hundred dollars, or imprisoned for not less than three months nor more than six months, or shall suffer both such fine and imprisonment, which fine shall be paid into the state treasury and credited to the military fund.'

'Sect. 95. The adjutant general, together with two officers of the line of the active militia of or above the grade of captain and two civilians appointed by the governor for a term of four years, unless sooner relieved by proper authority, and eligible to re-appointment for a like period, shall constitute an armory commission of which the adjutant general shall be the chairman, whose duty it shall be to exercise general supervision and control over all armories, drill-rooms, and headquarters offices, to consult and co-operate with the municipal authorities and to devise effective means of obtaining and maintaining such armories, and to fix, subject to the approval of the governor, the compensation to be allowed to the municipalities as rent for them; they shall have the power, after consulting and hearing the responsible municipal officers, to determine the administrative question of military suitability and adequate maintenance of all armories, drill-rooms, offices, and headquarters offices; and it shall be their duty to notify the responsible municipal officers of all deficiencies in these respects, and should such officers fail, refuse, or neglect to take effective measures for providing such suitable buildings and their maintenance, the chairman of the commission shall initiate the prosecution prescribed by section ninety-two. **For each day actually employed in the transaction of the business of the armory commission military members other than the adjutant general shall receive the pay of their rank as provided in section 85 and civilian members shall receive as compensation the sum of**

five dollars; and all members shall be reimbursed for actual traveling expenses, such accounts to be paid from the military fund in accordance with the provisions of section 87.'

'Sect. 100. In all court-martial proceedings the judge advocate or summary court shall have authority to issue in the name of the state an order directing any military person or persons or any sheriff or constable to arrest and produce the accused before the court, and the accused shall have the right to demand the nature and cause of the accusation against him, and to be presented with a copy of the charges. He shall have the right of being heard by himself or counsel or both; and shall have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor. The officer ordering a general, regimental or garrison court-martial will, at the request of any prisoner who is to be arraigned, detail as his counsel a suitable officer who shall perform such duties as devolve upon counsel for defendant before civil courts in criminal cases.'

'Sect. 104. When the sentence of a court-martial adjudges a fine and costs against any person, and such sentence has been approved as provided in article 104 of section 132 of this act, or whenever a person in the military service is ordered confined to await trial or is sentenced to confinement by a court-martial, or whenever any person is ordered into confinement under the eighty-sixth article, at a place or station not provided with a guard-house or military prison, the governor, the court or officer ordering the court, or the officer commanding for the time being, as the case may be, shall issue a warrant of commitment directed to the sheriff of the county in which the court-martial was held, directing him to take the body of the person so convicted and confine him in the county jail; and it shall be the duty of the sheriff to take the body of the person convicted and confine him in the county jail for the time specified in the sentence, or for one day for any fine not exceeding one dollar, and one additional day for every dollar above that sum, and one additional day for each dollar of cost. **The costs of arrest and commitment in all court-martial proceedings shall be paid by the adjutant general from the military fund on presentation of all papers, showing service thereon, such copies to be certified by the judge advocate or summary court.'**

'Sect. 108. The provisions in regard to courts and boards established by this act shall apply, so far as apposite, to the naval reserve.'

'Sect. 114. The uniform, arms, and equipment of the active militia shall be the same as those of the regular army and navy of the United States, except that on articles of uniform and equipment the distinguishing letters "Me." may be substituted for the letters "U. S."; each organization of the national guard and every enlisted man thereof shall be uniformed, armed, and equipped by the state, as is or may hereafter be prescribed or provided by the laws and regulations of the United States for the organized militia, and no member or organization of the active militia, shall adopt, use or wear in the military service of the state any other uniform, arms, or equipment.

'All commissioned officers shall provide themselves with such uniforms, arms, and equipment as are required of commissioned officers of the regular army; and the adjutant general may purchase and issue as state property on memorandum receipt to commissioned officers such articles of arms, **uniform**, and equipment as he may deem necessary.

'The clothes, arms, military outfit, and accoutrements furnished by or through the state to a member of the active militia, and the uniforms, arms, and equipment required of commissioned officers shall not be subject to any suit, distress, execution, or sale, for debt or payment of taxes.'

'Sect. 123. All property furnished by the state shall remain and continue to be the property of the state, to be used for military purposes only, and when not so in use shall be kept in the armories or designated places of deposit, **provided, however, that upon order of the governor and council, the quartermaster general is authorized to issue to the municipal officers of any city or town field ordnance of obsolete pattern under such regulations as the governor and council may prescribe.** Every officer receiving public property for military use shall be held responsible for the safe-keeping and the return of the same when called for; he shall account for and make such returns thereof as may be prescribed whenever called upon so to do by the governor or other proper authority, and every such officer shall, when required by the governor, give bond payable to the adjutant general of the state in such sum as he may direct, with good and sufficient sureties, conditioned to account for, safely keep, and return all military property of the state and the United States for which such officer may be accountable and responsible, **and the costs and expenses incurred by entering into such bond shall be paid out of the military fund.** Any officer, enlisted man or other person, who shall wilfully or maliciously destroy, injure or deface any article of military property belonging to the state, or shall use it for other than military purposes, or shall have or retain the same in violation of law or regulations, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars. And in case any officer or enlisted man of the national guard who has at any time through carelessness or inattention lost, destroyed, or suffered to be lost or destroyed, any state or government property which has been issued for his use, the paymaster general shall retain out of the pay or allowances or moneys due such officer or enlisted man for any military services whatsoever, an amount of money equal to the value of the property so lost or destroyed, and money so retained shall be credited to the account of such officer of the national guard as may be accountable to the state for said property. Such portion of said money as shall be for state property shall be turned in to the treasurer of the state, to be credited to the militia fund, and such portion as may be for United States property shall be turned in to the United State treasury to be credited to the state on its property returns.

'Sect. 132. Except as provided in the preceding section the officers and soldiers of any troops whether active or reserve militia of this state or otherwise, appointed, enlisted, mustered or drafted into the military forces of this state, shall, at all times, and in all places, be governed by the following rules and articles and shall be subject to be tried by courts-martial. The word "officer," as used therein, shall be understood to designate commissioned officers; the word "soldier" shall be understood to include non-commissioned officers, musicians, artificers, and privates, and other enlisted men, and the convictions mentioned therein shall be understood to be convictions by court-martial.'

Section 132 is further amended by (*omitting all of Article 64*) and inserting the following new articles:

'Article 29. Any officer who thinks himself wronged by the commanding officer of his regiment or corps, and, upon due application to such commander, is refused redress, may complain to the adjutant general. The adjutant general shall examine into said complaint and take proper measures for redressing the wrong complained of.

'Article 30. Any soldier who thinks himself wronged by any officer may complain to the commanding officer of his regiment, who shall summon a regimental court-martial for the doing of justice to the complainant. Any party may appeal from such regimental court-martial to a general court-martial; but if, upon such second hearing, the appeal be groundless and vexatious, the party appealing shall be punished at the discretion of said general court-martial.'

'Article 81. Every officer commanding a regiment or corps shall be competent to appoint for his own regiment or corps, courts-martial, consisting of three officers.

'Article 82. Every officer commanding a garrison, fort, encampment for field service, or other place, where the troops consist of different corps, shall be competent to appoint, for such garrison or other place, courts-martial consisting of three officers.'

'Article 113. Every judge advocate, or person acting as such, at any general court-martial, shall, with as much expedition as the opportunity of time and distance of place may admit, forward the original proceedings and sentence of such court to the adjutant general, in whose office they shall be carefully preserved.

'Article 114. Every party tried by a general court-martial shall, upon demand thereof, made by himself or by any person in his behalf, be entitled to a copy of the proceedings and sentence of such court.'

'Article 125. In the case of death of any officer while engaged in field service for instruction or otherwise, the second officer in command of the troops with which said officer was serving at the time of his death shall immediately secure all his effects then in camp and shall make and transmit to the adjutant general an inventory thereof.

'Article 126. In the case of death of any soldier while engaged in field service for instruction or otherwise, the commanding officer of his troop, battery, company or detachment shall immediately secure all his effects then in camp and shall, in the presence of two other officers, make an inventory thereof and transmit the same to the adjutant general.

'Article 127. Officers charged with the care of the effects of deceased officers or soldiers shall account for and deliver the same in accordance with such instructions as may be given by the adjutant general. And no officer so charged shall be discharged until he has deposited in the hands of the commanding officer of his regiment or corps all the effects of such deceased officers or soldiers not so accounted for and delivered.'

I. The following appointment by the Commander-in-Chief is announced:

Eben F. Littlefield, Judge Advocate, with rank of lieutenant colonel *vice* John R. Mason, failed to qualify.

The officer herein named is assigned to duty with the Commander-in-Chief and will report by letter to The Adjutant General, Chief of Staff.

II. The small arms qualification season for out-door range practice will open Patriots' Day, April 19, 1911, and close October 31, 1911. Both rifle and revolver practice will be held in accordance with Special Course "C" as published in the Provisional Small Arms Firing Manual for 1909 which is hereby made official for 1911. In all other respects practice will be governed by the rules and regulations promulgated in General Orders, No. 13, State of Maine, A. G. O., Augusta, March 19, 1910.

III. The hat badges issued to organizations assigned to the First Field Army and to the Coast Artillery Reserves are a part of field uniform and each organization should at all times have on hand a sufficient number to equip its authorized strength. Excessive losses have been reported in many instances and hereafter when losses are deemed excessive charge will be made against the responsible officer at the rate of seven cents per badge. Badges may be purchased from the Quartermaster General at the price named.

II. In addition to the duties prescribed in Paragraph I, the board therein appointed will examine into and report on the fitness for promotion to the grade of major of Captain Charles L. Cragin, Medical Corps, who is hereby ordered to appear at the time and place specified for the meeting of the board. Captain Cragin will be furnished transportation, quarters and subsistence and will be reimbursed for necessary traveling expenses.

I. The following commissions have been issued in the Medical Corps, N. G. S. M., under the provisions of Section 54, The Military Law, and upon the recommendation of a board of examination convened under General Orders, No. 14, this office, c. s.:

Captain Charles L. Cragin as Major.

Harry W. Sampson and William L. Haskell as First Lieutenants, to rank from May 2, 1911.

II. Upon recommendation of the Chief Surgeon, the following assignment of officers of the Medical Corps is hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

Major Bial F. Bradbury is relieved from duty with the Coast Artillery Corps and assigned to the Second Regiment Infantry.

Major Charles L. Cragin and First Lieutenant William L. Haskell are assigned to the Coast Artillery Corps, and First Lieutenant Harry W. Sampson is assigned to the Second Regiment Infantry.

III. While under the provisions of Section 67, The Military Law, a soldier re-enlisting within sixty days from the expiration of his last preceding enlistment is entitled to continuous service, the warrant of a non-commissioned officer will not be continued in force unless such non-commissioned officer re-enlists on the day following that of discharge. When re-enlistment is made as herein provided such re-enlistment and continuance will be noted on the warrant by the commanding officer of the company.

IV. "H. and H." Soap, which is recommended by the Ordnance Department, U. S. A., for washing cartridge belts, cartridge belt suspenders, haversacks and canteens, will be issued on requisition for the purpose indicated.

V. In order to meet the requirements of the State Auditor, it is necessary to manifest military accounts on the first of each month and all vouchers reaching this office at a later day will lie over till the first of the month following. Accounts manifested to the State Auditor the first of the month will ordinarily be acted upon by the Governor and Council in time for payment about the fifteenth of that month; but accounts reaching this office after the first day of the month will not ordinarily be paid till about the fifteenth of the month following.

General Orders, No. 16.

I. Upon the invitation of the Secretary of War the following organizations of the National Guard of the State of Maine will participate this year in the Joint Coast Defense Exercises in the Artillery District of Portland:

The Coast Artillery Corps and Hospital Corps Detachment for the period July 17th-26th, inclusive.

II. The Second Regiment Infantry and Hospital Corps Detachment will encamp at the State camp ground, Augusta, Maine, for the period August 7th-16th, inclusive.

III. The Commanding Officer, Coast Artillery Corps, will confer with the Commanding Officer, Artillery District of Portland, relative to the program of instruction for the period that his command will participate in the Joint Coast Defense Exercises and if practicable such program will be published sufficiently in advance of the date set for encampment to permit commanding officers of companies to make suitable preparation.

IV. The Commanding Officer, Second Infantry, will submit to this office on or before July 1st a program of instruction for the period that his command will be in camp at Augusta and such program will be published so that commanding officers of organizations may make suitable preparations.

V. The Commanding Officer of the Coast Artillery Corps and the Commanding Officer of the Second Regiment Infantry will issue necessary orders for the performance of the duty herein ordered.

VI. No new enlistments will be made in any organization within thirty days prior to encampment without special permission from The Adjutant General, and during the period of three months prior to encampment recruiting officers will make special efforts to confine enlistments to men who have had at least three months' service in the Army, Marine Corps or Organized Militia of the United States, or have been students at an educational institution at which military instruction is given. Unless men enlisted within three months have had the service or training herein specified they cannot be paid from federal funds and their payment will entail added expense to the State of Maine. By careful canvass of former desirable members of their organizations it is believed that recruiting officers will be able to fill most vacancies without the enlistment of new men.

General Orders, No. 17.

I. As this year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of the great war in which so many patriotic sons of Maine gave up their lives in defence of their country, it is especially fitting that the organizations of the National Guard and Naval Reserve of the State of Maine do all in their power to render memorable the observance of Memorial Day by surviving veterans of that war. To this end com-

manding officers of organizations will place their commands at the disposition of local representatives of the Grand Army of the Republic on Tuesday, May 30th.

II. In accordance with paragraph 444 of the Regulations for the United States Army, on all armories and stations of the National Guard the national flag will be displayed at half-staff from sunrise till mid-day on Memorial Day. At noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the staff and will remain there till sunset.

The Herman Company will supply either the Army "Marching" shoe, the Army "Garrison" shoe or the "Service" shoe and will furnish either style in single, half double, or full double sole. The Bass Co. offers two styles, both of which are heavy, unlined shoes, one being oiled stuffed to render it as nearly water-proof as possible. The styles and prices of the several shoes are as follows:

The "Marching," "Garrison," or "Service shoe" at \$2.90 per pair; with half double sole \$3.00 per pair; with full double sole, the middle sole extending through to the heel, \$3.05. The Herman Company states that it guarantees each pair of shoes furnished under this General Order to give "good wear and satisfaction."

FROM G. H. BASS & Co.

No. 1286, price \$2.75; uppers of russet kangaroo leather; full double Goodyear sole of viscalized sole leather.

No. 1291, price \$3.00; uppers of brown crome waterproof leather; soles same as No. 1286.

Shoes may be ordered from either company at the option of commanding officers. Either company will supply the shoes direct to company stations, freight prepaid, at the prices quoted above and will furnish commanding officers with necessary information as to terms, method of measurement, etc., and will supply measurement cards. Either company will forward sample shoes upon request. Commanding officers will deal directly with the Herman Co. or the Bass Co. and

not through The Adjutant General's office. The basis of payment will be as follows: \$1.00 per pair will be paid by the State to the contracting shoe company direct and the commanding officer will transmit the balance to the contracting shoe company direct, upon receipt of pay for field service, deducting the amount due from the pay of each enlisted man supplied with shoes under this arrangement. Commanding officers will notify this office of the number of shoes supplied under this order for the enlisted men of their commands but the allowance of \$1.00 per pair to be made by the State will not exceed the number of men actually on the pay-roll for the tour of field service. The entire cost of any shoes in addition thereto must be met from company or other funds. Commissioned officers may purchase shoes on their own account at the prices herein quoted but no allowance will be made by the State therefor. The shoes purchased for enlisted men under this arrangement will become the individual property of the men at the conclusion of the tour of field service.

General Orders, No. 20.

1. During the periods beginning August 1st, 1911, and ending September 30th, 1911, and beginning June 1st, 1912, and ending July 31st, 1912, no compensation for attendance at armory drills will be allowed. Due return will be made of all drills, practice marches, or rendezvous for target practice during these periods. The number present at all such meetings will be noted on the monthly return, but signed copy of drill return will not be required.

2. Exclusive of ordered field service, the months of August and September will be utilized under the direction of commanding officers in small arms qualification and the months of June and July in preparation for field service. It is recommended that each organization be required to rendezvous at least once for target practice under its commissioned officers and every endeavor should be made to secure the attendance of at least 35 enlisted men, thereby constituting such meeting a rendezvous within the limits set by the Secretary of War.

3. The State small arms competition will be held during the month of September, the exact dates to be announced in subsequent orders.

4. Upon return from field service company commanders will see that all public property for which they are accountable is in the armory and ready for inspection. They will satisfy themselves by actual count that each article is in its proper place and that it is in serviceable condition. Special attention should be given to rifles to see that they are thoroughly cleaned and oiled; to each article of the mess kit, making sure that it is clean and bright and free from any trace of grease; canteens should be inspected to see that they are entirely clean and dry inside so that they will not rust during the winter; haversacks should be examined to see that no particles of food or other matter are left to decay; in general, every article should be made ready for inspection. Relative to the issue of olive drab flannel shirts, responsible officers will see that all shirts are returned to armory at once and that those which are issued for field service are laundered and packed away with those not issued, moth preventative being used when necessary. Reasonable bills for laundering shirts will be allowed, but only up to the number of men actually performing field service. Each enlisted man should be required to have laundered and returned to his locker at least one pair of stockings to complete his personal kit.

5. Company commanders in making personal inspections ordered in Paragraph 4 will lay aside all property which they deem unserviceable and such property will be inspected by a representative of the Quartermaster General's office during the month of October. Full explanations should also be prepared for the consideration of this representative in all cases of loss and where such loss is of long standing all possible evidence will be secured in the form of affidavits, written statements or by the presentation in person of witnesses having knowledge of the facts.

6. The commanding officers of companies, prior to October 1st, 1911, will carefully go over their company rolls with a view to the dropping or discharge of all men who can not be in regular attendance at semi-monthly drills during October and November, and at weekly drills throughout December, January, February and March, and thereafter at semi-monthly drills during April and May. The places of men so dropped and discharged should be filled by the enlistment of men who will be able to give the required attention to military work and so far as possible, no men will be taken up from dropped, enlisted or re-enlisted, unless it is reasonably certain that they will be able to attend not only armory drills for the ensuing year but participate in field service in the summer of 1912.

7. In consultation with the United States Instructors assigned to duty with their respective organizations, regimental and corps commanders will prepare and submit to this office prior to September 15th, systematic courses of instruction for the months of October, November and December, 1911, and January, February, March, April and May, 1912. In general, such schedules will provide for two company meetings for instruction in the months of October and November, 1911, and April and May, 1912, and for weekly meetings during the months of December, January, February and March.

8. The Commanding Officer, Ship's Company Naval Reserve, will submit to this office on or before September 15th, 1911, a systematic course of instruction for his command for the period beginning October 1st, 1911, and ending May 31st, 1912.

9. Commanding officers will, prior to September 15th, ascertain whether the armories used by their commands will be available for semi-monthly and weekly drills as outlined in Paragraph 6, and if suitable arrangements cannot be made with the municipal officers, they will report that fact through channels to The Adjutant General. Whenever any officer in charge of an armory deems repairs or alterations necessary and cannot secure the same from municipal officers, he will report such fact through channels to The Adjutant General, accompanying such report with a concise statement of repairs and alterations desired, including approximate estimate of expense involved.

General Orders, No. 35, State of Maine, The Adjutant General's Office, Augusta, December 27, 1910, is rescinded, and in accordance with the provisions of Section 114, The Military Law, the following modification of the regulations for the uniform of the United States Army with respect to officers is published for the guidance of the National Guard of this State:

1. The following articles of uniform and equipment are no longer authorized:

Dress cap.—Except for veterinarians of cavalry and field artillery, chaplains, contract surgeons, and acting dental surgeons. All other officers and all enlisted men will wear the full-dress cap with the dress uniform.

Cotton khaki cap.—The olive-drab woolen cap is substituted therefor and will be worn with both summer and winter service uniforms by both officers and enlisted men.

Trousers.—Cotton or woolen with the service uniform.

Saddle cloth, dark blue.—On mounted duty the service saddle cloth will be used on all occasions.

INSIGNIA OF RANK.

2. For full dress, special evening dress, and mess jackets to be on sleeves as at present, and on shoulder knots in positions, as prescribed for insignia on shoulder loops of service uniform. On epaulets the insignia will be on the shank.

AIGUILLETES.

3. Officers entitled to wear aiguillettes will wear them with the full dress on all occasions; with the special evening dress and mess jackets on special occasions when directed by commanders; and with the dress uniform and white uniform when under arms. Aiguillettes will be altered according to sealed pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General, so as to be detachable from the brass loop. When worn with the dress coat they will be attached to a brass strip slipped lengthwise under the right shoulder strap. With the white uniform the present brass loop used with the full dress will be attached underneath the shoulder loop of the coat and concealed thereby.

SOCKS.

4. With the blue uniform black socks and black shoes will be worn; with the white uniform white socks and white shoes will be worn.

SHOES.

5. *For all officers.*—High shoes of russet leather, or of polished black leather, of black enamel or patent leather, of general cut and style of prescribed shoes for enlisted men. Low white canvas shoes.

Shoes to be worn as prescribed in table of occasions.

SPURS.

6. All officers when mounted will wear spurs. Spurs will always be worn with boots, mounted or dismounted.

7. The full-dress uniform, mounted, may be worn by mounted officers on dismounted occasions, when prescribed by commanding officers.

The N. R. A. medals, one each for the Coast Artillery Corps, the Second Infantry and the Naval Reserve will be awarded to the member of the tyro-teams from each arm of the service who makes the highest score.

4. Quarters will be provided in the armory of the Third Company, Coast Artillery Corps, in Auburn and folding cots will be supplied. Competitors will bring blankets and ponchos. Subsistence will be furnished enlisted men. Tickets for subsistence will be procured from the Post Adjutant or Commissary.

5. Company and division commanders will prepare payrolls in triplicate (two copies to be signed) for the team or teams representing their commands. If two teams are entered, both will be carried on one roll. No team will be paid or permitted to compete unless five men and the substitute are on the range. The Commanding Officer of the camp will prepare payrolls for the officials and other members of the organized militia on duty at the competition but not members of teams.

6. Officers and men shooting on company teams will be carried on payrolls for one or two days, according to the time consumed in carrying out the program, but will not be paid for time consumed in travel to and from the camp; provided, however, that officers or men shooting on teams in the Artillery-Infantry Match will receive pay for the additional day and that enlisted men held for duty as markers or scorers will receive pay therefor; provided further that any officer or enlisted man remaining to compete in the individual matches will be furnished with subsistence tickets upon application to the Post Adjutant.

At the request of the Secretary of War and in accordance with the provisions of The Military Law relating to enlistments the following War Recruiting System is hereby established for the National Guard of this State:

1. In all cities and towns where there is but a single company belonging to an organization of the National Guard, the junior subaltern officer will be the recruiting officer for war.

2. In cities and towns where there are two or more companies belonging to an organization of the National Guard, the Commanding Officer of such organization will, in orders, designate a war recruiting officer to act for all companies stationed in such city or town. For the purposes of war recruiting, Lewiston and Auburn will be considered as one city.

3. The Chief Surgeon, Medical Corps, will designate a junior officer of the Medical Corps to act as war recruiting officer for the sanitary troops. He will notify such officer of his designation and will report the same to this office.

4. War recruiting officers will make special study of the requirements of the recruiting service as set forth in Article LXVII, Army Regulations, 1910, and will by application to this office secure necessary blank forms.

5. When any organization of the National Guard is called into the service of the United States its recruiting officer will at once begin recruiting the same to war strength as fixed by Field Service Regulations.

6. When the local organization goes to the State Mobilization Camp the recruiting officer will remain behind with a suitable detail of enlisted men and continue recruiting, forwarding all recruits to the State Mobilization Camp. The recruiting officer and his party will rejoin their proper organization before the latter leaves the Mobilization Camp.

7. Before leaving the State, after being called into the service of the United States, each regiment or separate battalion will establish a recruiting party to recruit for its organization during the continuance of the war.

8. A general recruiting party for all militia organizations for this State will be maintained at the State Mobilization Camp.

9. All recruits will be forwarded through the State Mobilization Camp where they will be thoroughly examined physically, fully armed and equipped, and instructed as far as time permits.

Under instructions from the War Department, Federal Inspectors in their annual inspections are required to report whether or not local organizations are prepared to meet the requirements in regard to war recruiting.

General Orders, No. 28.

I. The following regulations governing compensation for attendance at armory drills having been prepared by a special board as provided in Section 84, The Military Law, as amended, and approved by the Commander-in-Chief, are published for the information and guidance of the active militia:

1. Payment for drills for the current semi-annual period ending December 31, 1911, shall be made upon the same basis as for the first semi-annual period of the present calendar year, except that no compensation shall be allowed for attendance at armory drills for the months of August and September.

2. For the period commencing January 1, 1912, and ending June 30, 1912, all organizations of the active militia will hold weekly meetings for drill or theoretical instruction and compensation shall be fixed in accordance with the provisions hereinafter set forth. The general scheme is designed to compensate the officers and enlisted men of all organizations which attain and thereafter maintain the required standard of efficiency; this compensation to be based on the work of the organization as a whole, leaving to the several organizations the disposition of the funds, making it possible for an organization to use its money either for company purposes or pro-rate it among its members in accordance with its own by-laws. The purpose of the regulations is, so far as possible, to secure an initial standard of efficiency as shown by strength and attendance at drills and to offer inducements to those organizations which show progressive and permanent improvement.

3. The requirements which must be met are as follows:

(a) STRENGTH.

To be eligible to receive the minimum sum hereinafter fixed the return of the organization for the month ending January 31st must show an enlisted strength of not less than 50 for a company of Coast Artillery or Infantry, of not less than 20 for a detachment of the Hospital Corps and not less than 100 for the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, and this minimum number as shown by the average of the monthly returns must be maintained throughout the drill period. Alterations in strength causing an organization to temporarily fall below the required minimum will not be held to disqualify the organization for compensation, provided gains are made during the drill period which will bring the average up to the required number. The average herein referred to will be determined by dividing the aggregate enlisted strength shown on the monthly returns by the number of such returns.

(b) ATTENDANCE.

Coast Artillery and Infantry.—At not less than two of the drills for each month there must be an attendance of not less than 25 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer; provided, however, that when any organization is prevented for any reason from holding a prescribed meeting for drill or instruction it may, upon approval of the Commanding Officer of the Corps or Regiment, count in place thereof another meeting; and provided further that it must appear by the monthly returns that during the period ending June 30th at least 35 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer have performed duty equivalent to not less than 12 meetings for drill, target practice or other military instruction.

Hospital Corps Detachments.—Same general conditions as for Coast Artillery and Infantry except that at two drills for each month there must be present at least 10 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer and that for the entire period the monthly returns must show that at least 60 per cent of the enlisted personnel and 1 commissioned officer have performed duty equivalent to not less than 12 meetings for drill and instruction.

Ship's Company, Naval Reserve.—Same general conditions as for Coast Artillery and Infantry except that at two drills for each month there must be present at least 50 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer and that for the entire period the monthly returns must show that at least 66 per cent of the enlisted personnel and 1 commissioned officer have performed duty equivalent to 12 meetings for drill, target practice or other instruction.

COMPENSATION.

4. To each organization complying with the foregoing minimum requirements regarding strength and attendance at two drills per month there shall be paid to the bonded treasurer of such organization and thereafter be subject to such disposition as the company by-laws may provide the following sums:

To each company of Coast Artillery or Infantry.....	\$100.00
To each detachment of the Hospital Corps.....	40.00
To the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve.....	200.00

ADDITIONAL COMPENSATION.

Each company of Coast Artillery or Infantry which having met the requirements for January and February shall by March 31st attain a membership of not less than 55 enlisted men and for the remainder of said period maintain this minimum and show an attendance at two drills each month of not less than 30 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer shall receive an additional sum of \$25.00, making \$125.00 in all; provided further that having met the requirements for January and February any company of Coast Artillery that shall by March 31st attain a membership of 63 enlisted men and any company of Infantry which

shall by March 31st attain a membership of 58 enlisted men and for the remainder of said period shall maintain that number and show an attendance at two drills each month of not less than 35 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer shall receive an additional sum of \$50.00, making \$150.00 in all.

Each detachment of the Hospital Corps which having met the requirements for January and February shall by March 31st attain a membership of not less than 22 enlisted men and for the remainder of said period maintain this minimum and show an attendance at two drills each month of not less than 12 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer shall receive an additional sum of \$10.00, making \$50.00 in all; provided further that having met the requirements for January and February any detachment of the Hospital Corps that shall by March 31st attain a membership of 24 enlisted men and for the remainder of said period shall maintain that number and show an attendance at two drills each month of not less than 14 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer shall receive an additional sum of \$20.00, making \$60.00 in all.

If the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, meets the requirements for January and February and by March 31st attains a membership of not less than 110 enlisted men and for the remainder of said period maintains this minimum and shows an attendance at two drills each month of not less than 60 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer, it shall receive an additional sum of \$50.00, making \$250.00 in all; provided further that having met the requirements for January and February it shall by March 31st attain a membership of 123 enlisted men and for the remainder of said period maintain that number and show an attendance at two drills each month of not less than 70 enlisted men and 1 commissioned officer it shall receive an additional sum of \$100.00, making \$300.00 in all.

5. An organization mustered into the service during the drill period and performing for the remainder thereof the duty required by these regulations shall receive compensation in proportion to the strength and attendance shown by its monthly returns.

6. Any organization failing to meet the minimum requirements set forth in these regulations may be paid a fractional portion of the minimum compensation upon the recommendation of a board consisting of The Adjutant General, the Commanding Officer of the Coast Artillery Corps, the Commanding Officer of the Second Infantry, and the Commanding Officer of the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, such board to be convened as soon as practicable after the expiration of the drill period.
