REPORT OF STATE PENSION CLERK.

Augusta, December 30th, 1912.

To His Excellency, the Governor and the Executive Council:

GENTLEMEN:—I beg to submit a brief report, covering the operations of the State Pension Office, for the years 1911 and 1912.

Early in the year 1911, Major George E. Dodge was appointed as Pension Clerk. He served very carefully and faithfully, until in September, 1912, when he was stricken with a somewhat sudden illness, which terminated in his death, at his home in Carmel, on September 21st.

Major Dodge was a soldier in the Civil War, and for years he had been actively connected with the matter of pensions, serving the interests of hundreds of soldiers and widows as an attorney. That experience gave him a personal knowledge of conditions which must be considered in connection with the consideration of the granting of applications for pensions.

On September 26th, 1912, I received notice that I had been elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Major Dodge, and upon the following day I took charge of the Pension Office. My personal contact with the work, therefore, has been of short duration, and I cannot recite any of the convictions which had been formed in the mind of my predecessor, from an experience of nearly two years in the work of considering applications for pension, or State Aid, and determining whether those applications should be granted or not.

The 75th Legislature appropriated for the year 1911 \$105,-500. This was divided as follows: Civil and Spanish Wars \$100,000, Aroostook War \$1,000, Military Pensions \$4,500.

According to the records of the Pension Office, the total amount expended for pensions in 1911 was \$101,666. Of this amount \$97,550 was paid for Civil and Spanish War claims, \$276 were Aroostook War claims, \$3,840 was expended in Military Pensions. There was an unexpected balance therefore in 1911 amounting to \$3,834.

The 75th Legislature made available for pensions during 1912 \$100,000. The vouchers for the fourth quarter of this year have not yet been presented to the various town and city treasurers for payment and it cannot be accurately determined just how much the re-imbursement to the various cities and towns, for the fourth quarter will amount to at this date. There are deaths occurring and these deaths thin the ranks of the old soldiers and their widows. Such fatalities are not promptly reported to this office, until the unreturned vouchers have been called for.

As a part of this report, I present a tabular statement showing the number of pensioners in each town and city in the State in 1911 and 1912, together with the amount of State funds expended in 1911 and the amount expended in 1912, covering the first three-quarters of this year. During 1911, 2476 certificates were issued. During 1912, 2425 certificates were issued. These pensioners in 1911 were classed as follows: widows 1563, invalids 805, daughters 22, sisters 15, sons 8, fathers 2, mothers 14, Aroostook War pensioners 6, and, by special legislation known as Military pensions 41. In 1912 the list is as follows: widows 1568, invalids 747, daughters 28, sisters 16, mothers, 9, sons 8, fathers 4, deserted wife 1, orphans 1, and, by special legislation known as Military pensions 39, Aroostook War pensioners 4.

During the year 1911 there were made upon the pension rolls notations which indicated 126 deaths. So far there have been reported during the year 1912, 101 deaths. Although the number of pensioners is being continually diminished by passing out of this life, yet those remaining eligible to receive such aid from the State are older, more feeble, and therefore more in need of this relief. On account of this condition, each succeeding year seems to show a greater need of aid from the State.

Although my predecessor acted with the wisdom gained from his experience in pension matters, actuated by a desire to be

liberal and at the same time to be governed by the funds available for State pensions, there have been received during the year 1012 at this office 230 applications for State pensions. which have been held on file, largely because it appeared that the appropriation of \$100,000 for 1912 would be entirely expended with the certificates already issued. An examination of these 230 applications convinces me that a large proportion of them come from those who are both eligible and needy. Without doubt many of these applications would have been acted upon favorably, had there been sufficient funds to take care of them. It is indeed rather difficult to deny a widow without any means of support excepting, perhaps, a Federal pension of \$12 per month, when it is very truthfully represented that it requires with the most careful management \$8 per month more to support her. It is indeed in such a case difficult to square the granting of \$4 per month with the conscience of the grantor. If she needs \$8 a month to keep her from being a subject of charity, she needs that amount and a lesser sum is insufficient. Right here I would call your attention to the fact that the present high cost of living bears harshly upon the soldier's widow. Food, clothing, shelter and fuel have gone up and up and up. Along with them have increased the prices of rent and of board. The increased cost of living affects the needy far more than it does the well to do or the wealthy. Very logically the State is called upon to take care of this heavier burden, and it is difficult for the State to refuse such supplications.

Reference to the tabular statement given as a part of this report shows that re-imbursement to cities and towns during the first three-quarters of this year for funds advanced in payment of State pensions amounts to \$70,664.83 for Civil and Spanish War pensions, for Aroostook War pensions \$72, for Military pensions \$2,661, a total of \$73,397.83. In addition to this, \$210, has been paid to take care of nine claims belonging in the year 1911, but delayed until the appropriation for 1911 had lapsed. The amount therefore charged against the 1912 appropriation is represented by \$73,607.83, leaving a balance of \$26,392.17 to re-imburse the various cities and towns for payment of State pensions for the fourth quarter of this year.

It would be difficult to determine what would be an adequate appropriation for State pensions. There are too many ele-

ments entering into the question which make an appeal to one's sympathy and which prevent a cold calculation in dollars and cents. These pensions constitute a helping hand, whose palm should be warm and generous, rather than cold and niggardly. On the other hand, there is a business side to the proposition which cannot be ignored. I feel that it is most proper to limit any recommendation that I have to this thought, enlarged on one side by a generous consideration of need and on the other by a restriction to the ability and business consideration of the State's finances.

Thanking you, gentlemen, for the consideration and kindnesses you have conferred upon me, I submit this report.
