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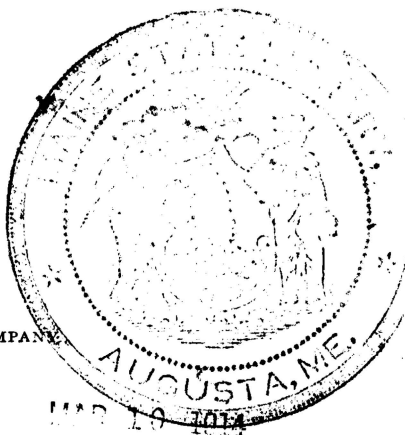

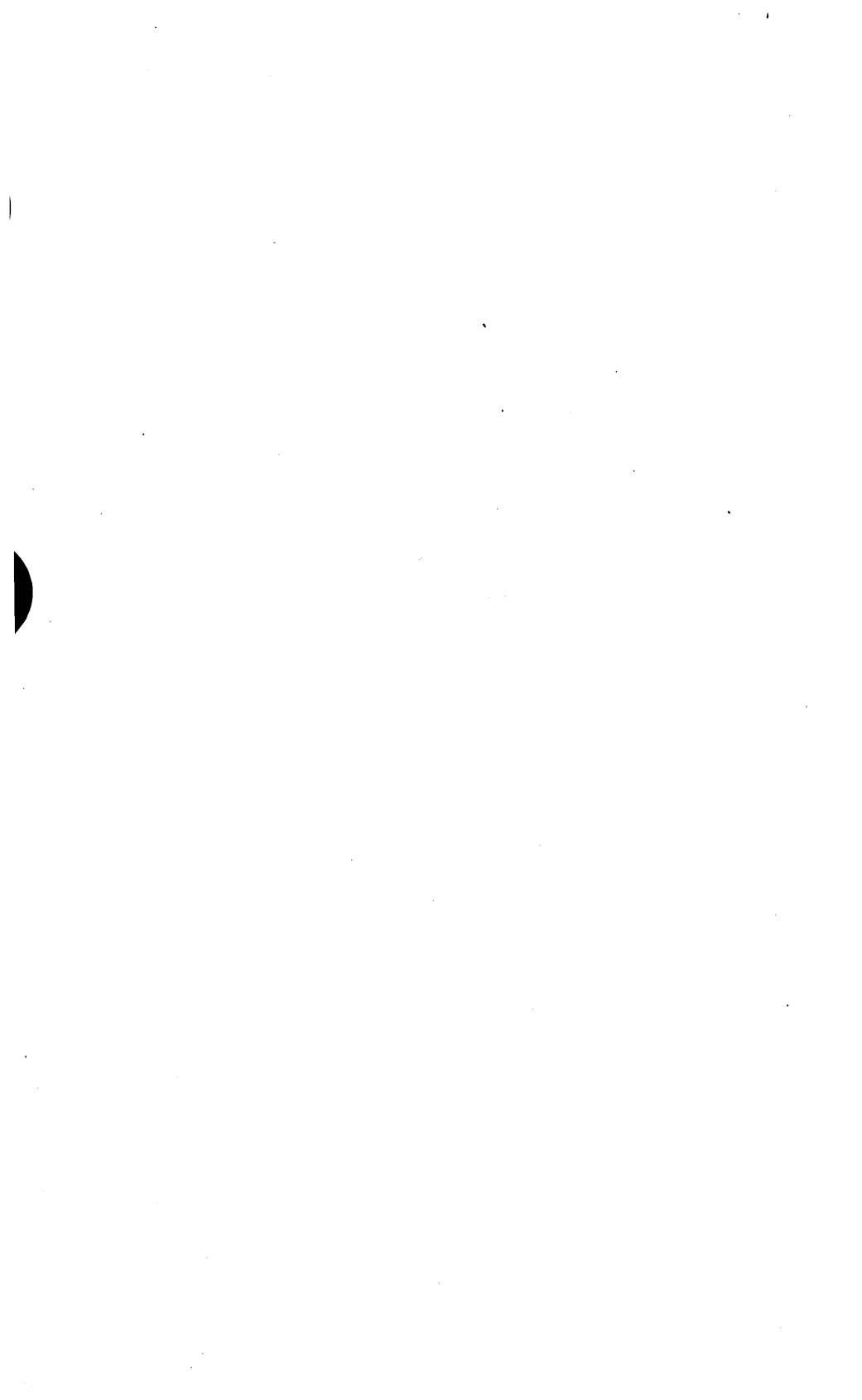

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CHAPTER I.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL PROGRESS.

RECORDS AND STATISTICS.

The municipal and school officers of the several cities, towns and plantations have made returns of school statistics as required by law. These statistics have been tabulated and appear in the tables of the appendix which is a part of this report.

In explanation of several items of the comparative summaries appearing in tables VIII and IX of the appendix it should be said that the decreases indicated are not actual, but appear to be the result of the improved accounting methods which have been adopted during the year both by the state department and by a number of the towns for the purpose of securing greater accuracy in the returns. For example, the returns of the school census were made for the first time under the law which requires the filing of the names and ages of all persons reported in place of the net figure previously required; while the returns made by several of the larger towns and cities are based upon new systems of accounting under the conditions of which duplications of names are avoided. The more accurate results of such systems are undoubtedly reflected in the figures of school enrollment and attendance.

The average salaries paid teachers were computed for the year upon the new rule generally adopted by all the states by which the actual average of all teaching positions is taken instead of the average of town averages. It should be stated, therefore, that the decreases shown in school enrollment and school attendance and the increases shown in teachers' average salaries do not reflect actual changes taking place during the year, but do reflect in a large measure more rigid methods of accounting.

The changes already apparent from improved methods of collecting and reporting school statistics indicate clearly the

possibilities that lie in the direction of making these figures still more accurate. If school statistics are to be regarded as worth gathering then it is quite clear they should be made as accurate as possible, reflecting facts and not estimates. To secure accurate statistics, it is necessary that correct methods be employed not only in the larger units, but in the individual schools. There can be no question that the educational statistics would be vastly more valuable if all the towns and cities could be placed on a uniform basis with respect to their accounting methods. Uniformity in this matter could not be easily secured, unless the State should supply to all towns and cities the material upon which all records and statistics are to be collected and returned. The cost of furnishing these forms would not be great in comparison with the value that would accrue from their use.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION.

Reasonable progress continues to be made in the organization of expert supervision. Nearly all the larger towns of the state and a considerable number of the smaller ones have taken advantage of the provisions of the law whereby they may place their schools under the direction of superintendents who are required to give their entire time and attention to the duties of the office. It is no doubt the purpose of this law to give to the smallest towns the same privileges of supervision that have been enjoyed by the larger towns. It is unfortunate that a great many towns of the class the law was especially designed to benefit are reluctant to take advantage of it.

There is no doubt that a very considerable degree of waste in all school moneys would be found upon examination to be due to inefficient direction of the schools. It is often true that sufficient attention is not paid by citizens of towns to the selection of persons best adapted to render efficient service on school committees. There is frequently an impression that the work of the school authorities is limited largely to matters of mere business routine. The best results cannot be obtained, however, from school expenditure unless there is a continual and careful oversight not only of business details, but also of the school work itself. The small town is by no means less interested in good supervision than the large town. Indeed, the ways of securing efficient school systems for country towns con-

stitute a problem of largest importance. Undoubtedly Maine will eventually find it necessary to follow the example of certain other states which have compelled the placing of all schools under expert supervision. In the meantime it is to be hoped that the beneficial results already obtained in the towns that have adopted the generous provisions of the present law will encourage its rapid adoption by others.

TENDENCIES IN ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

A most noticeable tendency of the year in elementary schools has been in the direction of reducing the length of the school course. Outside of New England the elementary school course is very generally of eight grades. Until recently the nine year elementary school course has predominated in the New England states. A number of the larger cities of this section have recently reorganized their elementary school work placing it upon the eight year basis. This tendency has already shown itself in Maine and several school systems have already been reorganized on the eight year basis, while a discussion of the desirability of a general reorganization upon this shorter basis is current. In such a reorganization, however, it is clear that each individual school system will necessarily conform to the conditions that apply locally with regard to the length of the school year.

The school systems which have adopted the eight year basis have, for the most part, a school year ranging from thirty-eight to forty-two weeks. The average elementary school year for Maine is one hundred sixty-three school days or less than thirty-three weeks. It is perhaps safe to say that those school systems that have attained to thirty-six weeks or more may undertake to do the work of the elementary schools in eight years. Doubtless some systems having a school year less than thirty-six weeks could by special effort shorten the elementary school course to eight years. Towns which have a school year of less than thirty-four weeks may safely await the results of the working of the plan elsewhere before undertaking to place their own schools upon the eight grade basis. It should be said, however, that the shortening of the elementary school course contemplates the reorganization of certain subjects by eliminat-

ing unessential topics and placing emphasis upon fundamental ones.

With the movement for the reorganization of the school course there is noted a hopeful tendency to pay more regard to the individual pupil and less to the machinery of a rigidly graded system. The investigations made by a number of superintendents with respect to loss and retardation have developed plans which have resulted in the freeing of the individual student from the unnecessary restrictions of too rigid classification.

A general tendency away from inflexible grading is shown in the more natural transitions from class to class that are displacing the fixed annual promotions. In many school systems the authorities are now transferring pupils at more frequent or at irregular intervals with a freedom that promises favorably for the early release of the individual student from the too rigid exactions of strict classification.

A wholesome indication is to be observed throughout the State in the direction of modifications of the courses of study that shall tend to eliminate useless detail. There is apparently a fairly wide-spread recognition of the fact that the elementary school course should deal chiefly with fundamentals. Consequently there has been and is now proceeding a gradual reduction in the required topics in the various branches of the common school course.

While these modifications tend to increase the opportunity for mastering fundamental and leading facts, they likewise permit the introduction of more hand work and certain groups of subjects, such as music and drawing, whose educational value no longer requires demonstration.

THE SCHOOLS OF MADAWASKA TERRITORY.

In that group of towns of northernmost Maine comprising what is known as the Madawaska Territory is to be found an educational situation unlike any other in the State. The people who are residents of this section are descendants of the Acadian exiles who settled in the upper St. John River valley. When this section was finally adjudged to be within the jurisdiction of Maine there arose the question of providing for the people adequate educational facilities. By an act of the legislature of 1863 the towns of Madawaska Territory were given certain

privileges in the matter of raising school funds with liberal conditions of state aid and with the provision that instruction in all the schools should be given in the English language. Since the French language was the universal language of the people at that time it will be readily seen that this provision was one not to be easily nor immediately met. No teachers were to be found within the Territory who understood the English language and there was not a sufficient supply of teachers from outside the Territory who were available for service in its schools.

This condition led to the establishment of the Madawaska Training School, the chief function of which was to be the training of teachers for the common schools of the Territory. This school, at first alternating its sessions between Van Buren and Fort Kent, was permanently located in the latter town in the year 1886 and has continuously exerted a strong influence upon the educational development of the Madawaska Territory. So well has it performed the service for which it was established that the English language is now generally spoken and understood among the people.

The schools of all the towns of the Territory have been considerably increased in their general efficiency. Their buildings and equipment now compare favorably with those of other rural schools while in nearly all the communities there is a positive and wholesome interest in education. The statistics for the last school year show that there are within the Territory 145 public schools having a total enrollment of 4,883 pupils. A considerable number of these schools are following carefully arranged courses of study and are taught by graduates of the Madawaska Training School and, in a few instances, by graduates of state normal schools.

A recent visit to representative schools of various towns of the Territory showed that the schools generally reach a reasonable degree of efficiency in the teaching of reading both English and French. The requirements of the State with regard to the length of the school term are more than met, text-books are supplied in most instances in satisfactory kinds and quantities. The deficiencies of these schools lie in the direction of such equipment as globes, charts and material for desk work for the younger children. With respect to instruction the greatest need

appears to be in the matter of applying more satisfactory methods of teaching such subjects as arithmetic, history and geography. It ought to be understood of course that the children of these schools labor under a disadvantage in having to carry their work in two languages. The children of this section would greatly profit by an arrangement whereby there could be made available to their teachers such continual help as might come from a school visitor or inspector properly qualified to assist in the adoption and prosecution of superior methods of instruction. Such an agent, supplementing in the field the preparatory work of the Training School, would doubtless aid very greatly in the immediate improvement of a class of schools which have perhaps more than the ordinary educational responsibility of schools of their kind with unusual difficulties in the way of meeting it.

It ought to be said that there are few communities where co-operating agencies show a more earnest interest in the welfare of the schools. The Training School receives an extremely cordial support from practically all parts of the Territory.

New courses in manual training, household arts and agriculture recently undertaken in this institution are already making a wholesome reaction on the several schools of the communities they represent.

The peculiar disadvantages under which the children of this section must for a time work, the loyal attitude of the parents and of the citizens of these towns, and their somewhat remote location combine to make a strong appeal to the entire State to see that every reasonable encouragement be offered to the people and every proper requirement made of them to the end that the school system of the Territory shall, as speedily as possible, be brought to the highest state of efficiency.

SCHOOLS IN UNORGANIZED TOWNSHIPS.

Detailed statistics relating to schools in the unorganized townships, with a summary thereof are presented in table XXI of the appendix.

A comparison of these statistics with those of the previous year shows no change in the number of townships for which school privileges are provided and little change in the number of children schooled.

With this comparison as a basis for future estimates it would seem reasonable to suppose that no great increase in either of these items is to be anticipated from year to year. The history of this particular part of the school system however shows that little reliance can be placed upon such a prediction on account of the uncertainty attending any forecast of the rate of progress in the advance of civilization upon the wilderness sections from which the additions to the number of schools of this class may be expected.

The character of those new schools which have been established during the past year would seem to indicate that in most cases the increase of the future is to come through the opening of small schools in isolated pioneer settlements having only two or three families. It is difficult to foresee the ultimate result of the establishment of a large number of such small schools which barely come within the provisions of the law, but it is probable that some minor change in the statute may be necessary to secure to the larger settlements a more equitable apportionment of the general appropriation. On the other hand it may well be questioned whether there are not at the present time several townships which, by reason of the large number of their inhabitants, should no longer be entirely dependent upon the State for the maintenance of their schools.

The legislature of 1911 made possible the systematic and periodic inspection of these schools under the immediate direction of the state superintendent. Through the medium of information thus gained and by reason of the closer relationship thus established between the State and the individual schools it has been possible considerably to centralize their administration.

Thus far the results have been:

1. The gathering of fairly complete data relative to the general conditions obtaining in each township.
2. An analysis of these data showing the more imperative needs of the schools.
3. The laying of a foundation which will assure greater uniformity in aim and method.
4. Withdrawal to considerable degree of authority in actual school management from the former local agents and recognition of them more strictly as business agents.

5. The placing of more responsibility upon teachers in their relations with the State.

The inspectory report presents information concerning the physical conditions of the buildings, including heating, ventilation and sanitation, as well as the size and condition of school grounds; equipment as indicated by textbooks, blackboards, charts, maps and furniture; attendance; program; recitations; teaching efficiency; and the general spirit of the school and community.

An examination of these reports shows:

1. A large number of cases in which buildings are either very unsatisfactory or unattractive. Recognizing the fact that the influence of physical environment is a potent factor in determining school efficiency it would seem proper to require, as a prerequisite to the establishment of a school, that each community should furnish a building for school purposes that meets the formal approval of the state superintendent.
2. A considerable number of instances in which a rather low standard of teaching efficiency is in evidence. Several causes are responsible for this condition, among which may be mentioned the isolation which renders it difficult in some cases to secure teachers of training and experience who are willing to give these schools the benefit of their services, and the comparatively low schedule of wages which it is necessary to keep in force in order to maintain the large number of schools even for the minimum length of school year. It is hoped gradually to raise the general standard through various agencies which can be brought to bear upon the less well equipped teachers by more direct responsibility to the State as well as by the more intimate relationship resulting therefrom, and it is also important that sufficient funds for the support of these schools be assured not only to provide for the natural increase in their number from year to year but also to make possible the employment of a greater proportion of trained teachers, fitted to cope with the peculiar difficulties which are presented.

3. The need of more complete equipment in blackboards, maps, globes and textbooks, especially with reference to supplementary material for regular texts. This deficiency is gradually being met, in so far as the appropriation permits, and the past year has seen a considerable addition to general equipment.
4. Occasionally a lack of that degree of local interest which is essential to insure the best educational results. It is not to be assumed that this statement applies with greater force to these communities than to larger towns, but in any event such a condition is one which must be recognized and some means found by which the people will be made to feel not only the need of their co-operation in plans looking to progress, but their responsibility for deficiencies. The placing of an especially strong teacher in a community of this kind is probably the surest and quickest solution of the problem.
5. The present method of assessing taxes for school purposes upon a per capita basis works injustice and hardship in many townships. In practice it apparently imposes a penalty upon the man who rears a large family. The revenue from this source is comparatively small and the cost of collection is large in proportion to the amount collected. In view of these facts, and if any requirement looking toward the betterment of physical conditions is to be made, it would seem wise to dispense with the tax entirely.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

Progress in the secondary schools has been indicated by a steady increase in attendance and by more liberal support as shown in appropriations for instruction and needed equipment. Since the classification of these schools under the legislative act of 1909 a gratifying increase in attendance is noticeable. The total enrollment of secondary schools for the year ending July 1, 1910 was 15,684; for the year ending July 1, 1912 it was 16,467.

The amount available for the support of high schools has increased from \$318,937 in 1910 to \$390,605 in 1912. The amount expended for instruction is \$34,586 more than two

years ago. In the enrollment figures it is of interest to note that the number of boys has increased nearly eight per cent during the two years past and the rate of increase of girls enrolled is two per cent.

There have been few changes in the classification of the schools during the past year. One school was advanced from class B to class A. Two were changed from class C to B. Two were reclassified from B to C. Four new schools were organized and were approved in class C. Four schools were discontinued by action of local authorities and one was combined with another school in the same town.

In approving schools for advanced classification an effort has been made to make a thorough inquiry into the conditions under which the school would be maintained and consideration has been given to the work done under the original classification. In several cases the attempt to raise the class of the schools has appeared to be due, primarily, to a desire to avoid tuition liabilities, hence it has often resulted that little effort has been made to do more than meet the minimum legal requirement for such schools. A town which undertakes to support a standard school must guarantee to the youth of the community a certain accepted standard of school opportunity. This standard would be available to them under the law if their home town should not by its own act meet that standard. Hence justice to the youth would demand that these schools be well housed and equipped and under good instruction and management.

The standard school must always be regarded as a means of furnishing the educational opportunity which the free tuition enactment contemplates shall be within reach of every qualified boy and girl. School authorities should consider carefully whether the maintenance of a standard school which barely meets the legal requirements is serving the community interests as well as they might be served if pupils could avail themselves of the tuition privilege for one or more years. When salaries must continue so low that only teachers of limited training and experience can be secured and when the equipment of the school is so meager that state requirements are barely met and library facilities are quite inadequate, the justice and wisdom of attempting to maintain a class A school may be seriously questioned.

It should be observed that in the majority of cases the efficiency of the schools is being increased by judicious expenditures for salaries, equipment and improvements in buildings.

No single question more seriously concerns the progress of these schools than the training and qualifications of teachers. No specific regulations exist in the matter of qualifications of secondary school teachers. The influence of the college upon courses preparatory to these institutions has been felt in determining the qualifications of teachers. There is a strong tendency toward securing college graduates as secondary school teachers. Except for a limited number of teachers whose long experience and continued efforts for professional improvement fully qualify them for such positions, a college degree, or training representing its equivalent, should in general represent a minimum requirement for teachers in secondary schools.

The following data taken from the reports upon the teaching force furnished at the beginning of the year make quite evident a high standard of preparation of the secondary school teaching force as a whole.

Of the 128 high schools of the A class the qualifications of principals are as follows:

Number holding college degrees	108
Number having partial college course	14
Number having secondary school course only...	4
Number having normal school course	2

Of the assistant teachers in these schools the following facts are shown:

Number holding college degrees	249
Number having partial college course	35
Number having only a secondary school course	34
Number having normal or other special training and not college graduates	52

In the training of teachers for high school work there are two important considerations which complicate the situation. First, the strong trend of high school curricula and content of courses away from the formal college preparatory lines is demanding teachers who are prepared to adapt themselves to the new lines of work; and, second, the demand that youth of high school age receive a kind of instruction peculiarly adapted to

its need calls for teachers who have made a serious work of the educational problems involved. It would appear to be the duty and the opportunity of the college to undertake to meet these two needs.

To secure the first end, adaptation of certain college courses will be required primarily in science, English, sociology and history, and modern languages. To provide the professional training contemplated in the second requirement there must be courses in educational theory and administration and, above all, practice and observation in secondary schools under expert critic teachers. These adjustments fully carried out would greatly increase the efficiency of the secondary school teaching force.

To encourage professional study on the part of men and women who are now teaching and who are preparing to teach, there should be further professional recognition through state certificates of secondary school grade based upon examination, service, record and reciprocal relations. These certificates would demand knowledge of the science of teaching as well as knowledge of the subjects taught. Certification would tend to place a premium upon special training, would raise the general standard of qualifications and would encourage the study of secondary school problems.

The annual visitation of secondary schools made under the provisions of the act of 1909 has made it possible to secure detailed facts in relation to the physical conditions under which these schools are working. A few of these facts presented here are not to be interpreted as an indication that the proper equipment of the secondary school ranks in importance before that of the elementary schools. On the contrary, it is agreed that the common schools ought to have first attention and that a town might well postpone the establishment of a high school if such establishment is to defer proper attention to the equipment of the lower schools.

Of the high schools forty-six belonging in the A class and six belonging in the B and C have buildings devoted exclusively to high school purposes. Eighty-two schools of the A class and forty-nine of the other classes hold their sessions in buildings which are devoted in part to elementary school pur-

poses. Out of the one hundred twenty-eight A class schools and fifty-five B and C class schools reported, thirty-nine of the former and three of the latter are in buildings of modern construction.

A wide variety of systems of heating and ventilation are to be found in these schools. Forty-nine are heated by stoves, forty-seven by direct warm air furnace, thirty-two by direct steam heat and forty-nine by some indirect method.

Ninety school buildings lack absolutely any means of ventilation except by the windows. In a few of these cases window boards and similar devices for the introduction of fresh air have been provided without, however, and foul air ducts. Twenty-five school buildings have some partial systems of ventilation. In none of these cases was there an adequate method and in most instances the study room alone was provided with even these partial means of ventilation. Sixty-two schools are housed in buildings that have reasonably effective systems of ventilation.

The problem of securing proper ventilation for school rooms warmed by direct steam, warm air furnace or stove is a difficult one, but the intolerable conditions existing in several buildings visited make it of extreme importance that some effort be made to provide at least partial systems of ventilation. Good school work is not possible where so unsatisfactory physical conditions obtain.

The lighting systems of school rooms appear to be better relatively than the methods of ventilation. Upon approximate estimates of ratios of floor space to window surface it is noted that eighty-two meet a reasonable standard in this respect. There were found twenty-five study rooms in which there were cross lights resulting from the incorrect placing of windows or of seats. In many rooms there was a manifest deficiency of lighting area.

Very great improvement could be made both in the heating and lighting of these school buildings at inconsiderable expense. The importance of these items is frequently underestimated in many communities and school authorities are sometimes slow to act in recommending changes.

The growing appreciation on the part of the public that the work of the schools cannot be satisfactorily done under adverse physical conditions should bring more rapid improvement on these fundamental points of school construction for both elementary and secondary schools. In the meantime through inspection and reports the attention of school authorities is being constantly called to existing deficiencies with recommendations for the earliest possible attention to them.

The action of the University of Maine with reference to the mode of admission is of significant interest to secondary schools and to the public. Beginning with the college year of 1912 the University proposes to admit students from any standard school of the State upon the record of satisfactory completion of subjects required for admission. This action places the transition from the secondary school to the higher institution upon the same basis as that from the elementary to the secondary school, namely the completion to the satisfaction of the local school authorities of certain courses of study. It obviates the method of admission by examination and the double standard required by the certificate system.

The relation of the state department of education to this action of the University of Maine has already been set forth in a letter addressed to those persons immediately in charge of the secondary schools. In order to give wider expression to this position the letter is here introduced.

To School Officers:

The recent important action of the University of Maine relative to secondary schools of the A class renders appropriate a statement of the position taken by the state superintendent of public schools in the matter of approval of such courses as are affected by that action.

It will of course be clearly understood that this action implies no change in the authority to approve courses or to classify schools, since that authority is fixed by law.

In approving courses and in continuing approval weight should and will be given so far as practicable to the evidence shown by results. In the case of students who go to college such evidence can be made readily available and it is the intention of the state superintendent to prosecute inquiries relative to the graduates of schools of the A class when they enter college upon the standing of their preparatory schools.

The University of Maine by its action will accept graduates of A class schools offering the branches required for college entrance. The state superintendent will take into consideration, in approving or considering the approval of schools, the records made by these students. The evidence shown by the student's record will not of course be final. It will be only one of several points considered and will result in the loss of approval only when investigation shows that the failure was due to the continued faults of the preparatory school.

It should be very plainly understood that a school is not required to offer college preparatory subjects in order to receive approval in the A class. The school authorities having in charge each school determine for themselves whether the demands of a school's particular constituency are such as to make advisable the incorporation of college preparatory work into the school's curriculum.

When a committee does elect, however, to offer in its school college preparatory work, it must be of that kind and quality that will justify the expectations that students finishing the college preparatory studies will be able to enter any Maine college and do its work creditably. Any school that should continuously fail to meet this condition would not deserve and would hardly expect to retain its classification.

In passing judgment upon the adequacy of a school to prepare for college there must be taken into account the equipment of the school and the character of the instruction as shown both in the routine work of each year and as shown also in the records later made by those who go to college.

Beginning with the next school year the present inspection of the schools will be supplemented by inquiries relative to the work of students who have gone forward into higher institutions. The fundamental purpose of these inquiries will be to secure reactions helpful to the secondary schools. When they show unfavorable conditions opportunity for improvement will always precede action that will result in loss of classification.

It is proper to state in this communication that the relationship resulting from the action of the University of Maine is not to the exclusion of other Maine colleges, which have sympathetically considered all proposals made by the state superintendent for closer relationships with the lower schools.

Finally, it should be made clear to communities that they should not finally judge their schools upon the sole point as to whether they "prepare for college." If they attempt to do that work they should do it well. In very many cases, however, schools may wisely take into consideration other student needs aside from college preparation and often these may be so important as to point to other courses even to the exclusion of those now recognized for college preparation. In cases where college work is thus frankly given up in favor of other demands the community should not withdraw its support on the grounds of some alleged inferiority.

INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION.

The provisions of the act of 1911 for the encouragement of industrial education are among the most liberal of any similar acts adopted by any of the states. Among its fundamental provisions is one which requires the establishment in all of the state normal schools of special courses for preparing teachers of manual training and household arts. All the normal schools and the Madawaska Training School are now offering these courses, the aim of which is to prepare teachers of elementary and rural schools for making such application of these subjects as the conditions obtaining in their schools may require or permit. The course in manual training at the Gorham Normal School has been sufficiently extended to prepare persons for special supervisorships of that subject while at Farmington the course in household arts has been extended for a similar purpose. Great emphasis is being laid in all these courses upon the most practical application of the principles studied. It is expected that as a result of the establishment of this work there may be within a few years an adequate supply to meet the growing demand for teachers of both subjects.

Tables XXII and XXIII of the appendix indicate the extent to which the towns and cities are availing themselves of the opportunities offered for the introduction of hand work into the elementary schools. It will be observed that eighteen towns have introduced manual training while fifteen towns have made provision for teaching those branches related to household science.

There is still a considerable reluctance on the part of many communities introducing these subjects to give to them as much time as they ought to have. There is however a growing recognition among the people of the principles underlying those forms of education that involve the motor activities and this will inevitably lead to greater emphasis upon them and more liberal allotments of time to them. The figures showing the towns that have already introduced these branches are not to be taken as complete evidence of the interest that is manifest in them. This interest extends throughout the State and will doubtless lead to the very rapid development of hand work in the elementary schools within the next few years.

While there has been a little attention to the modification of secondary school courses with a recognition of the points covered for those schools by the act mentioned, the most concrete results are to be noted in connection with agricultural courses. Five academies and two high schools have within the two years definitely adopted distinct agricultural courses. The requirements made for this work are somewhat rigid. From the brief experiments with these courses it would appear that they are to be undertaken with expectation of success only in the cases of those schools which have such large funds and facilities as to insure their support as separate courses at a high grade of efficiency, or in those smaller schools which are willing to give up entirely all other courses and devote themselves rather exclusively to the agricultural work.

In the small school offering a general course the work in agriculture must of necessity be merely incidental and can hardly be expected to produce the tangible results that can be obtained in the other instances.

The provision of this act which gives, under certain conditions, encouragement to evening schools offers a very direct opportunity for making use of the evening school for continuation school purposes. Already some of the cities have organized their evening school courses in such a manner as to make them efficient aids to persons already engaged in various occupations. Undoubtedly for the present the most practical procedure adapted to the evening school is to conduct its work along the line of various short courses organized in each instance with a certain specific aim. Brief courses running from six to eight weeks covering a definite amount of work in lines connected with the daily employment of the persons taking such courses will make a practical appeal to those who are likely to benefit by evening school work.

While the act makes provisions for independent industrial schools no steps have yet been taken by any town for a distinct school of this kind.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTES.

In accordance with section 89 of chapter 15 of the Revised Statutes teachers' institutes have been held during the year. STATE EXAMINATIONS.

The report of state examinations given and state certificates granted includes:

1. The examination given at the summer school of 1911.
2. The regular annual examinations for state teachers' certificates given August 25, 1911.
3. The regular semi-annual examinations given February 23, 1912.
4. The examinations for superintendence grade certificates given January 26 and July 26, 1912.
5. It includes also the record of certificates regularly granted to members of the graduating classes of the State Normal Schools of 1912 and of special certificates granted to former

graduates of these schools issued since September 1, 1911.

The whole number of candidates taking examinations for state teachers' certificates was 477 of whom 404 attained ranks required in order to receive certificates. At the examinations for superintendence grade certificates 19 candidates took the required tests, of whom 18 were granted certificates. The number of certificates regularly issued to normal school students at graduation was 233, and the number of special certificates granted former graduates was 92. The aggregate number of certificates granted during the year, therefore, was 747.

Detailed statistics of examinations given and certificates granted are shown in Table XXXI.

As shown by report of last year, the number of state certificates then in force was 3012, of these 317 have ceased to be valid during the present year by reason of expiration of the terms for which issued and of non renewal. Adding to the number thus left, in force, 2695, the number granted this year, 747, there appears to be now in force 3442 certificates of all grades.

This year has been marked by the introduction of the new course in household arts which is part of the general plan of industrial education provided for by the last legislature. The teacher in that department, Miss Marion C. Ricker, has come to the department with admirable training and experience for the work. She is not only the resident teacher of the subject but is state director of this branch of industrial education. Her range of duties calls her often from this school and it will be necessary to provide an assistant for next year to begin work in September. Household arts, including cooking, sewing, household economy, and the various branches of those subjects, are taught in a separate building, formerly a dwelling house, which is one of the houses on the recently purchased dormitory site, and so became available for the purpose with but slight expense to the State,—the fittings and remodellings necessary being kept within an expenditure of less than eight hundred dollars. The wisdom of the State in providing this course is sure to be demonstrated as time goes on. The course as outlined is for three years so that the preparation of teachers for household arts shall be not less than the preparation of teachers for any other special subject.

It becomes necessary in this report to repeat the urgent need of this institution for a dormitory which shall accommodate one hundred students. Every year and every term students who wish to come here are debarred by our inability to properly take

care of them in a modern dormitory. I cannot too strongly urge that the legislature should increase the general efficiency of this school by providing adequate boarding accommodations such as a new dormitory would furnish.

MODEL TRAINING SCHOOLS.

Miss Bills has had charge of grades I and II, Miss Jellison, grades III and IV, Miss Wardwell, grades V and VI and Miss Douglass, grades VII, VIII and IX, the last three grades being the village grammar school. The students of the normal school have, therefore, practice in nine grades.

AGRICULTURE.

The class of 1912 has studied this subject this term and has seemed interested and has done good work. They planted a garden on the dormitory lot. All of them took part in the work and seemed to enjoy it. We are glad this study has been included in the course.

MANUAL TRAINING.

This work has been still more practical than last year and has been taken by all the classes except the graduating class, who take agriculture instead during their last term.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE.

The course in domestic science was established at the opening of the school year in charge of Martha B. May of Rockland, who taught cooking and sewing.

The students have entered into the spirit of this work and Miss May did her best to make it successful. We should have had a fine display in this department if Miss May's health had allowed her to finish the year, but she was taken sick a few weeks before the term closed and died at Hebron June 3rd.

THE LIBRARY.

Our library is constantly increasing. The class of 1912, just graduating, has presented us with about \$25.00 for books and we have received additions from other sources. We are using the books more each year as the students become better acquainted with library methods.

THE JANITOR.

Eugene S. Thombs has had the care of the normal building now for about twelve years. As a janitor he is ideal. He uses great care, keeps the rooms neat and clean and is ready and glad to do many little things called for by the various teachers.

THE NEW DORMITORY.

The new dormitory is fine. Every room in it has been occupied during the year and the students are delighted with it. We were fortunate in the selection of Mrs. Ella G. Hussey as matron and of Devereux Hanson as cook; and nearly all the rooms are engaged for the fall term.

CONCLUSION.

The principal has had the cordial and earnest support of all the teachers and the utmost harmony has prevailed. The pupils have been studious and the whole management of the school has been made much easier on account of the new dormitory.

I. Of the teachers employed by the State all teach in the normal school building except Miss Edith M. Pitts who has charge of the rural school at West Gorham. The other officers of the school consisted of R. Estelle Bradbury, secretary and librarian, Mrs. Florence L. Pottle and Mrs. Addie I. Andrews, matrons at Robie Hall, Melville B. Alley, caretaker of the normal school building, and James Cullen, janitor at the dormitories.

III. The expense for the normal school is met by the State. The expense for the practice schools is borne in part by the State, in part by the town of Gorham, and in part by the city of Westbrook. The total salary expense paid by the State for the support of the normal school and practice schools was \$12,535. Dividing this amount by the average number attending for the year makes the total cost per pupil for salary less than \$63.00 per year. To get the total expense of the school the cost of repairs, supplies, and supervision must be added.

IV. Two regular courses of study are offered, (a) a two years course for teachers in elementary schools, (b) a three years course for teachers and supervisors of manual training.

VI. The present number of bound volumes of our school library is 1,589. This is but a slight increase over the number last year. If the appropriation should warrant it a great many more books ought to be added to the library during the coming year.

VII. There has been no change in the school buildings during the past year except that one of the new rooms on the third floor of the recitation building has been fitted up for cooking. It is provided with a wood and coal range, with a three burner oilstove with oven, and with twenty electric stoves suitable for the individual work. These, however, are used mainly to supplement the range and oil stove.

Both the recitation building and the two dormitories have been crowded to their capacity during the school year. There is urgent need of a new dormitory and an extension to the normal school building. These additions to the school plant are needed to properly take care of the present membership of the school and if the rate of increase in attendance which has marked the last five years continues the increase of buildings asked of the last legislature will be crowded within the next five years.

EQUIPMENT.

Physical and chemical laboratories and complete manual training and domestic science outfits have been provided. We are located in a part of the State where the smaller high schools are not adequately equipped with laboratory material, and many of our students come to us with little knowledge of the manipulation of apparatus. Our equipment gives them a new outlook over the educational field.

AGRICULTURE.

A school garden containing plots for cultivation by individual students and also plots for trial and observation was begun last year. Many of the standard grasses and grains were studied; seeds from every kind of tree that can be grown in Maine were planted, and a few of the ordinary garden vegetables were raised. In the summer of 1913 we plan to raise all the vegetables required during the following school year by the department of domestic science. As soon as our seedling trees are large enough for transplanting, a forest nursery will be started. It is hoped that a very complete arboretum may eventually furnish to our students an opportunity for study of New England trees.

The season of 1912 was very backward, but the school garden did remarkably well. We plan to take up the work even more systematically in the future. It is the aim of this department to so distribute the work over the whole two years' course that the students shall have had before graduation actual experience in seed testing, germination, planting, transplanting, cultivation, harvesting the seed, and preparing seed for next year's planting.

THE TRAINING SCHOOL.

Every student who graduates from the normal department has 12 weeks actual teaching experience in the model school. During this period the student's entire time is devoted to teaching. She assists the model teacher in preparing the work for the day, submits plans for teaching exercises to the critic teacher, and upon the approval of these plans conducts the classes of the model school. Near the end of her training each student takes the room for a day and carries on the work without the presence of the model teacher. A ninth grade has been added to our model school this year and every student on graduation must have observed in each of the nine grades, and have taught in two of them.

During the spring term of 1912 a sub-primary class was organized for those pupils who were not old enough to enter the model school in September, 1911. These pupils were taught by one of the students in the normal school. This class served a double purpose: first, it took care of the children who became of school age during the school year; second, it gave to the students of the normal school an opportunity to learn something of kindergarten methods.

STANDARD OF ADMISSION.

Our attendance has suffered from the new standard of admission which requires that applicants must be graduates of class A high schools. But I am convinced that the requirement is necessary, and I feel that within a few years the attendance will be increased because of the law.

NEEDS OF THE SCHOOL.

There are a few things imperatively demanded for first class work:

1. A library.
 2. A dormitory.
 3. The addition of a wing to the present building.
- A girls' gymnasium should be located in the dormitory.

CHAPTER III.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

In accordance with paragraph XI, section 100, chapter 15 of the Public Laws of Maine the following recommendations are made by the superintendent:

I. Certification of Teachers:—

Teachers' certificates as provided by present laws are of two kinds, those granted by the State to such candidates as voluntarily present themselves for a written examination given under state direction, and those granted by written examination given by the local school authorities. No teacher may legally conduct a public school unless he holds a certificate of one of these two classes.

The local plan of certification is unsatisfactory for the reason that standards of entrance to the teaching profession must vary so widely when certificates are issued by more than five hundred different examining authorities. In many instances the examinations are of so low a grade that the entire system is brought under the contempt both of teachers and of the public. By means of these low local standards persons of extreme immaturity and of only common school education find place in the school system with little difficulty.

Both the protection of children and the proper safeguarding of school funds, state and local, against the waste of inefficiency demand that the State take a position with the forty-four states that have already enacted state certificate requirements.

Since written examinations are not the sole nor most satisfactory means of testing teaching skill a state certification measure ought to provide for the granting of certificates upon the teaching and school records of the candidates as well as on written examinations. In order that time be allowed for an understanding and an adjustment of the conditions of the law of this kind it should not be made effective immediately upon its passage.

The superintendent recommends the enactment of a teachers' certificate law containing these provisions.

- a. The law should be made effective September 1, 1914.
- b. No person should be held to be eligible to a certificate unless he is at least eighteen years of age and has completed at least a high school or academy course.
- c. Certificates should be of several classes and should be granted in any of the following ways:
 1. On written examination, or
 2. On service or teaching record, or
 3. On record in a higher educational institution or
 4. On the basis of a similar certificate issued by the authority of another state.
- d. Any certificate should be voidable for cause, after investigation.

2. Schoolhouse Construction:—

While recent legislation provides reasonably effective safeguards against defective heating, lighting, ventilation and sanitation in the cases of new buildings there remain a considerable number of buildings already erected in which these matters, vitally affecting both the health and the educational progress of children, call for attention. The responsibility assumed by the State of compelling school attendance is a serious one, and implies an obligation to insure to the children thus required to attend every reasonable precaution against any condition that may menace health or physical welfare.

The regulation of schoolhouse construction should not, of course, extend beyond the fundamental points that affect the health and safety of the children, but on these points, the State should fix requirements below which a town should not permit its school buildings to go. These requirements should deal solely with the fundamental points of (a) heating (b) lighting (c) ventilation and (d) toilets and outbuildings.

3. Uniform School Records:—

The value of educational statistics depends upon their accuracy. The statistics for the entire State cannot be made accurate unless those that come from the various towns are themselves exact. These in turn cannot be made complete unless the means for gathering and recording statistics are reasonably

full. It is essential also that statistics be gathered in practically the same way from the various educational units. To rely upon a variety of systems is to encounter the risk of a considerable variation in terms and results. Many of the towns are not in a position to provide themselves with pupils' record cards and proper forms for keeping school records and statistics. So much depends upon the accurate accounting of school funds that it is highly desirable to safeguard in every possible way the manner of their expenditure. It is recommended that the state superintendent be authorized to supply all towns with proper forms for keeping school records and accounts and that the local school and municipal authorities be required to keep full and accurate records of all financial and educational statistics in such detail as may make possible at any time most complete verification of the facts.

4. The School Year:—

The law now requires that all annual returns both financial and educational be made by municipal officers to the state superintendent for the fiscal year last preceding April 1 of each year. This is satisfactory in so far as the arrangement relates to financial returns. It is not satisfactory as it relates to educational returns. The school year for practically every town closes later than April, usually, at some time in June. To return figures for the period ending April 1 is to introduce a large element of confusion into the returns since facts involving a period covered by the parts of two separate school years must be reported. The superintendent recommends therefore that the law be so amended as to provide for two separate returns on separate dates, one to cover financial items only and to be returned, as at present, so as to cover the fiscal year of each town; the other to deal exclusively with educational statistics and to cover the period ending July 1, of each year.

5. Penalty for Failure of Towns to Observe Legal School Requirements:—

By the provisions of the present law any town that fails to observe any of the legal requirements relative to schools loses its entire state fund. Since this fund has been so largely increased this penalty is too drastic to permit of consistent enforcement. To withhold state funds means, in effect, to deprive a town of the major part of its school resources. In order that

the penalty may be an enforceable one the forfeiture should not be of the entire amount but of such percentage of the whole as the deficiency appears to warrant. It is recommended, therefore, that the law be so amended as to make it discretionary with the governor and council, on recommendation of the state superintendent, what part of the state fund shall be withheld as an appropriate penalty for any deficiency in meeting the requirements of the law.

6. Unions of Towns for the Employment of Superintendents of Schools:—

Amendments recommended to the act which provides for the union of towns for the employment of school superintendents are as follows:

- a. That the pay of superintendents due from the State be made monthly on proper vouchers, instead of quarterly as at present.
- b. That any superintendent by virtue of the proportion of the salary paid by the State be permitted to perform such state educational service as may be approved by the state superintendent and consented to by the employing committee.
- c. That an annual conference on school administration be attended by persons serving under the provisions of this act.

7. The Compulsory Education Law:—

The provision of the law which defines the habitual truant as one who has been absent "six or more consecutive sessions" leads to extreme difficulty in the enforcement of the law. The fact is that many children of compulsory school age are truants through extreme irregularity of attendance without, at any time, coming within this definition mentioned. The better enforcement of regulations against truancy would be further insured by giving to school committees authority to choose truant officers, and to fix, within proper legal restrictions, their compensation. It is recommended, therefore, that the law be so amended as to permit the court to determine whether the absences from school are of a kind to bring the person named within the truant class, and that superintending school committees be given power to choose and to fix the pay of truant officers.

8. Unorganized Township Schooling Act:—

The present law providing for the schooling of children in unorganized townships requires that a percapita assessment of forty cents be made on each inhabitant. This assessment has been extremely difficult to collect of those families in which there were no children and it has occasionally worked hardship in the cases of large families. Because of the cost of collection the assessment has rarely resulted in a net addition of more than five hundred dollars to the general fund. It is recommended that the provision for a percapita assessment be repealed.

It is further recommended that in all cases where the conditions require the establishment of a school the community be required to provide for its sessions a building or room that meets the approval of the state superintendent.

The general appropriation for the support of these schools should be increased in order that the length of the school year may be increased beyond the present twenty-six weeks and that the teachers may be more adequately paid.

9. History and Geography of Maine:—

In order that Maine schools may be in a position to give more adequate instruction to the youth of Maine in its past history and present industrial opportunities, it is recommended that the legislature authorize for use in elementary schools the compilation of suitable texts and outlines in the history and geography of the State.

10. Secret Societies in Public Schools:—

Secret societies among students, beyond the control of school authorities and often of parents, are inimical to the interests of the public schools. They increase the cost of education, they tend to create class distinctions among the students and they generally react against the democracy of the schools. To give local authorities adequate power to deal with these societies and to eliminate them from the public schools, it is recommended that legislation similar to that already adopted by a majority of the states be enacted, the purpose of which is to prohibit the organization or existence of secret societies in connection with any public schools.

11. State School Funds:—

The existence of a special legislative committee to investigate and report on methods of distribution of state school funds makes inappropriate any recommendation by the superintendent in advance of the report of that committee.

12. Teachers' Pensions.

A committee of the Maine Teachers' Association will ask for legislative consideration of a bill to provide for a pension system for teachers of the public schools. The report of this committee makes unnecessary here any extended reference to the subject. The superintendent would call special attention, however, to the facts that few communities are paying or appear likely to pay more than a living wage to their teachers, that other states are adopting pension plans, that Maine has already suffered great loss because of the departure of her skilled teachers to other fields more attractive financially and that Maine children, whose interests should be given first place in every discussion of this kind, should be safeguarded by every possible and proper means that will tend to the greater efficiency of the teaching force.

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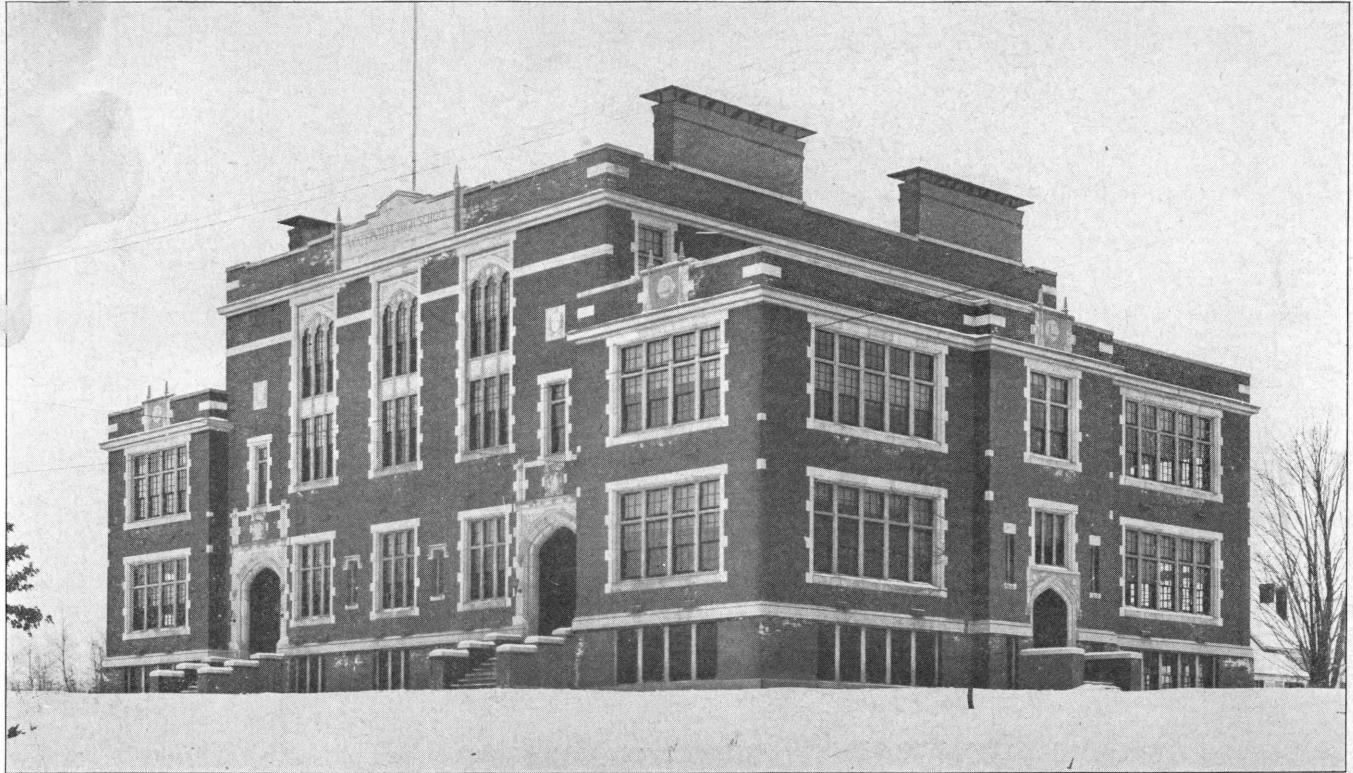
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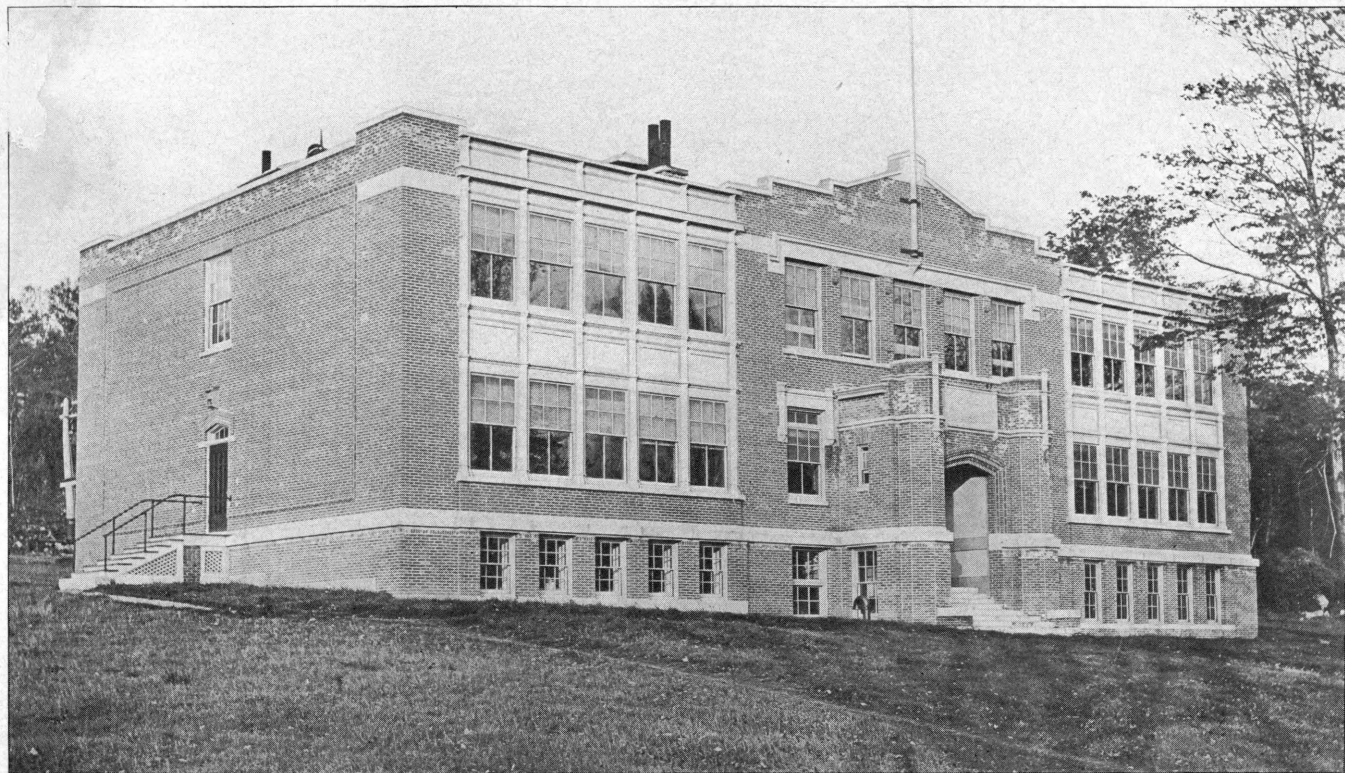

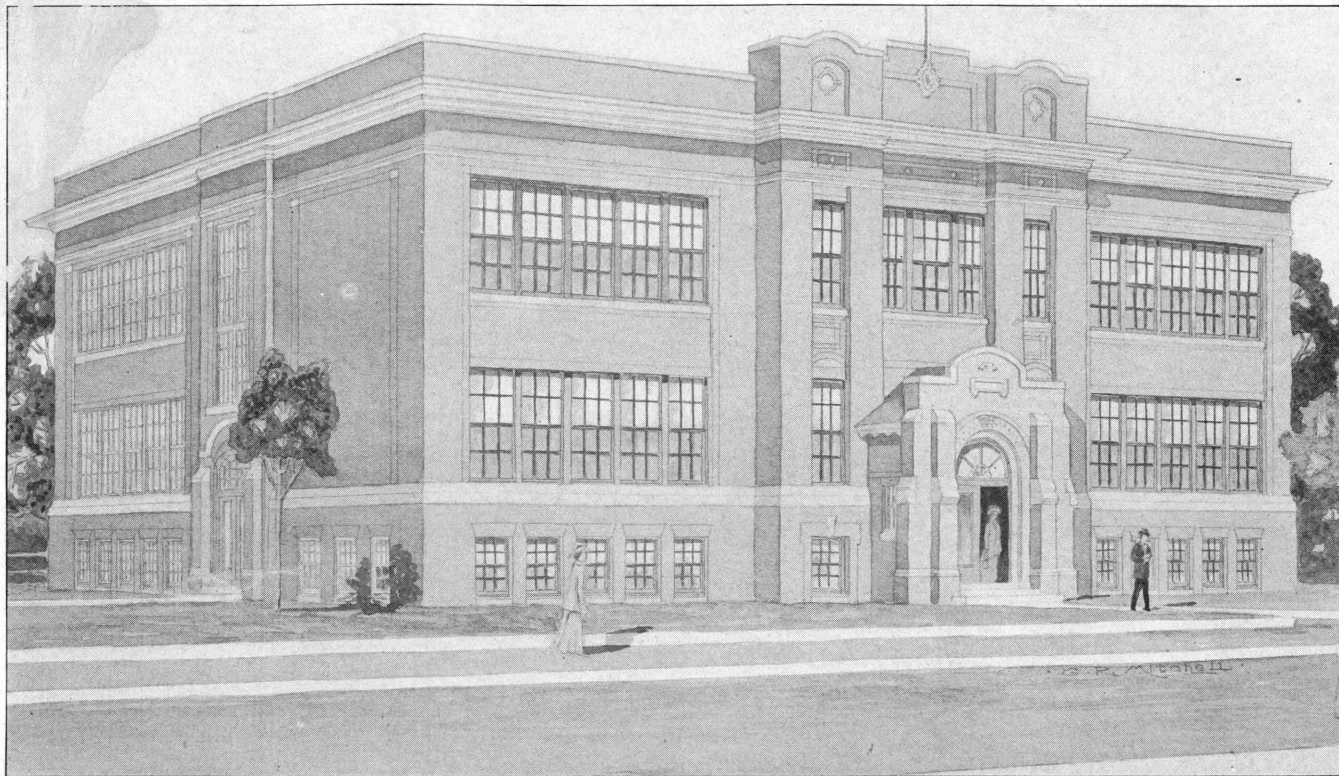

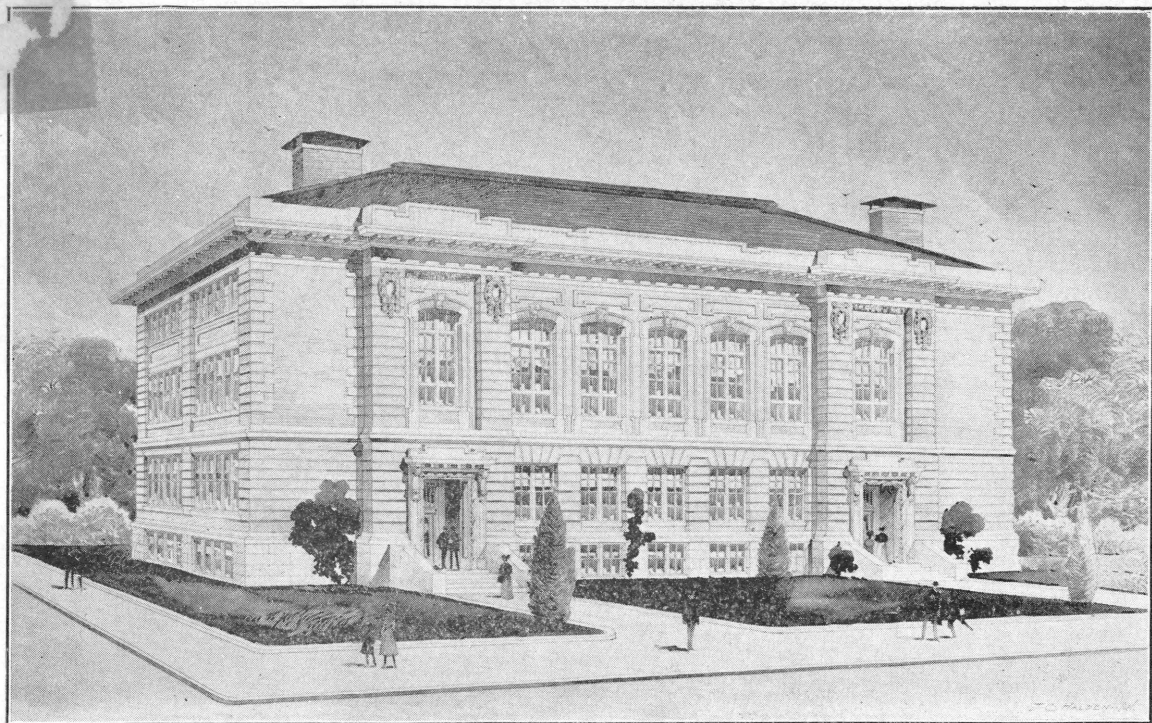
