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

REPORT OF THE BOARD.

Augusta, Maine, December 31, 1913.

To the Honorable Senate and the House of Representatives in Legislature assembled:

In accordance with the provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 196 of the Public Laws of 1913, the State Board of Charities and Corrections respectfully submits herewith its first annual report covering its activities during the period from the time when the law became effective until November 1, 1913.

The members of the Board were appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Council, July 19, 1913, as follows: Robert T. Whitehouse of Portland, for one year; John Wilson of Bangor, for two years; John E. Liggett of Augusta, for three years; Thomas J. Nelligan of Augusta, for four years; Mrs. Grace A. Wing of Lewiston, for five years.

The Board organized at Portland September 10, 1913, by the election of Mr. Whitehouse as President. Mr. Liggett was appointed to act as temporary Secretary. On October 15, 1913, after careful inquiry as to the qualifications, not only of the several candidates, but also of other persons that appeared to be possibly available, the Board unanimously elected, as its permanent Secretary, James F. Bagley of Argyle in Penobscot County, who had been for a considerable term of years employed in a somewhat similar capacity at the National Soldier's Home in this State.

It was manifestly impossible to visit all of the institutions under the supervision of the Board in the brief time before the first report should be prepared. The Board therefore directed its energies toward the perfecting of a proper working organization and collecting, by correspondence, data in relation to the several institutions, which should form a basis for its future work.

The Secretary visited the offices of the State Board of Charities in Massachusetts, Rhode Island and New Hampshire and investigated the systems in use there. Blank forms in relation to the support of the poor, both in almshouses and elsewhere, were prepared and sent to overseers of the poor. A questionnaire covering the activities of each of the several classes of institutions under the supervision of the Board was prepared and sent out.

Arrangements were made with Mr. William T. Cross of Chicago, General Secretary of the National Conference of Charities and Corrections, to visit the State and confer with the Board in relation to its work. Mr. Cross spent a day and a half with the Board and its Secretary and many valuable suggestions were received from him.

A carefully planned filing system has been devised, one which will place all of the data that the Board may collect in its future work where it may be quickly accessible for the use of the Governor and Council, Legislature and the various charitable and correctional officers of the State, a system so arranged that it will expand with the development of what, it is believed, will prove to be an important department of the State government.

A limited number of the best books and pamphlets, dealing with the work of the Board, has been gathered from authorative sources for reference and study so that the State of Maine may have the benefit of the experience of others in this department and keep in touch with the trend of modern thought and progress in charitable and correctional endeavor.

The work prescribed by the Board is defined by Chapter 196 of the Public Laws of 1913, as follows:

"The Board shall investigate and inspect the whole system of public charities and correctional institutions in the State and the work of any department of the same, examine into the condition and management of all prisons, jails, reform schools, industrial schools of a charitable or correctional nature, children's homes, hospitals, sanatoriums, almshouses, orphanages, hospitals for the insane, schools or homes for feeble-minded and any and all other institutions of such nature which derive their support wholly or in part from State, county or municipal appropriations, but not including any institution of a purely educational or industrial nature; and any private institution of

a charitable or correctional nature may upon application and request in writing made to the secretary of the board, be included in the list of institutions under the inspection of said board and become subject to the provisions of this act.

"Each institution under the inspection of the board shall be visited at least once each year by a member of the board or by the Secretary of the board or authorized agent employed by the board for that purpose, and as much oftener as may be found expedient, and at such times said visiting member or secretary shall consult with the officers of such institutions and make such recommendations and suggestions to the management thereof as may seem advisable, and the board as a whole shall, whenever it seems necessary, formally recommend to the trustees or boards of management of any such institution or of any department of public charities or corrections such course of action in the conduct of said institution or department as the board shall deem best. The board shall also give to the governor, or governor and council, or to the legislature or any committee thereof, at any time upon their request, or when the board shall deem it necessary, information and advice with reference to any charitable or correctional institutions which the board is required by this act to inspect or investigate, or as to which it is required to collect information or statistics.

"The board shall give its opinion as to advisability of the proposed organization and incorporation of all institutions of a charitable, eleemosynary, correctional or reformatory character which are or shall be subject to the supervision and inspection of the board.

All plans and specifications for new jails, workshops, prisons, reformatories, children's homes, almshouses, hospitals, or other similar institutions and buildings for charitable and correctional purposes which are to be in any way under the inspection of the state board shall be submitted to the board for criticism and suggestions before the same are accepted."

The Board realizes full well that while its creation was desired and earnestly sought by the great majority of the trustees and officers of charitable and correctional institutions of the State, and earnest philanthropic workers, nevertheless the proposition had its honest critics and opponents, who feared friction from its interference and doubted the advantages to

accrue from its labors. For these reasons partly, and also because in the nature of things it is necessary and desirable that the Board should feel its way gradually, acquire thorough information and act only with full knowledge, the first motto which the Board has adopted for its guidance is to go slowly investigate carefully and act tactfully. The Board credits those who have hitherto opposed its organization with good faith in their opposition. The Board believes that they stand ready to welcome criticism and suggestion for improvement when made in like good faith and to recognize and adopt such suggestions as are made upon their merits, and to all such the Board says merely: "Give us an opportunity. If we can help you, allow us to do so, in order that the State and its institutions may be benefited and its moneys expended to the best advantage. If we cannot, then at least, we propose to see to it that our endeavors shall have done you no harm. We ask for your confidence. We shall seek to get acquainted with you and the conditions under which you are doing your work. We want to meet you, and we hope you will meet us, in the right spirit, and to work with you in harmony for the advancement of the true interests of charity and philanthropy in our State."

As to what the Board may be able to accomplish for good, it can only point at present, standing as it does upon the threshhold of its work, to what has been accomplished by like organizations in other states, where Boards of Charities and Corrections have been tried for many years and demonstrated their efficiency.

As a result of the questions answered by the various institutions and the overseers of the various cities and towns, the Board has obtained much necessary data which will enable it to become familiar with the needs of the several institutions under its supervision and to work in harmony with their trustees and resident officers and to be helpful to them.

All of the institutions under the supervision of the Board will be visited during the next year, either by the Secretary or some member of the Board. It is hoped that the Secretary will be able to visit all of them and that he will, in most instances, be accompanied by some member of the board residing in the section of the State where the institution is located. The larger State institutions will each be visited by a majority of the Board. Recommendations, suggestions and criticisms which may be

made by the Secretary or members of the Board, as a result of their visits will be submitted to the full Board and where, after careful consideration, any action seems necessary, the desire of the Board will be communicated in writing by the Secretary to the institution or institutions concerned.

Seasonably before each biennial session of the Legislature the Board desires to be informed by the several institutions under its supervision of the amount of any appropriations which they propose to ask from the Legislature, the purpose for which the money is desired and the reasons upon which the request is based, so that the Board may be prepared to give to the Legislature such information as it may seek in relation to the comparative necessity or advisability of the several appropriations requested. The Board invites from the public, or from any sources, information of any proposed request for appropriation by the Legislature for charitable or correctional purposes, together with information as to plans, purposes and circumstances which seem to make such request advisable.

The Board proposes eventually to recommend to the several institutions a system of fiscal accounting in harmony with the requirements of the State Auditor, which will enable them to keep track of each department or activity during short periods (at least quarterly) in comparison with corresponding periods of prior fiscal years, suggest methods of economy in the purchase of supplies and furnish uniform data to the Board for purposes of comparison.

It is proposed to make the Board, its Secretary and its office, so far as possible, a central bureau of information, and to collect statistical facts and ideas from any sources from which information can be obtained, that will enable the Board to answer such questions as may arise in the charitable and correctional work of the State. In any case where the information desired is not on file in the office of the Board, effort will always be made to obtain such information as soon as the need becomes apparent to the Board or is brought to its attention.

Efforts will be made to arrange conferences of the trustees, officers and others interested in the various classes of institutions for the purpose of mutual discussion of their several problems and the best methods of solving them.

The Board will cheerfully give its assistance whenever desired to trustees and officers of institutions for the purpose of advising as to methods of policy, adjusting disputes, eliminating friction or correcting any false reports and invites, at any time, from officers, trustees or the general public any information or suggestions which may be thought helpful.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

Augusta, Maine, December 31, 1913.

To the State Board of Charities and Corrections:

Chapter 196 of the Public Laws of 1913 provides that accompanying the annual report of the State Board of Charities and Corrections shall be a report of the Secretary showing the condition of the several institutions under the supervision of the Board. As a Secretary was not appointed until October 15, 1913, and the reporting year of the Board ended November 1, it was not possible to make an examination into the condition of the several institutions by visiting them.

The work of the Secretary has been, therefore, largely devoted, as directed by the Board, to the obtaining of preliminary information concerning the institutions coming under its supervision and the data prescribed by law in relation to the expenditure for poor relief by the cities and towns. Statistical tables compiled from this information so far as it has been possible to obtain replies up to this time, are submitted herewith as a basis for future reports. Where necessary to a fuller understanding of the tables they are accompanied by brief descriptive text.

In examining the accompanying tables, it should be borne in mind that varying conditions in the different cities and towns and the different institutions, make the comparisons often impossible or unjust, and the primary purpose of the tables is to place the information in a compact form for the information of the Legislature, and those who have occasion to refer to the reports of this Board.

During the ensuing year it is the purpose of the Secretary, pursuant to the requirements of the law and the instructions of the Board to visit personally, accompanied whenever possible at state institutions by members of the Board, every institution of a charitable or correctional nature, supported wholly or in part

by State, county or municipal appropriations, including all almshouses in the State.

INSTITUTION STATISTICS.

The statistics in the following tables have been compiled from the answers to lists of questions sent out by the department and from the annual reports of the institutions reported upon. If any inaccuracies are noted therein, it is doubtless because the questions sent out by the department have not been understood by the institutions reporting, or because, where the institution made no reply to a particular question, it was necessary to obtain the data from its printed reports. In the latter case it not infrequently occurred that the desired data was not contained in the report or some of the facts were so stated as to leave the department in doubt as to the exact application.

In general the questions asked by the department were painstakingly answered, particularly by the charitable institutions. Many of the correctional institutions were equally conscientious in their answers. A few of them, however, particularly the county jails, did not appear to understand the importance or the application of the questions and did not make satisfactory answers. Much of this is no doubt attributable to the fact that the investigations of the department, directed as they were towards ascertaining per capita costs not only in terms of dollars and cents, but also in connection with the humanitarian side of the problem measured by the standards of care given, opened up a field which was new to some of the officers concerned.

Much of the data which has been obtained in relation to the several institutions was so varied in its character, even in relation to institutions of the same class, that it cannot be tabulated but it has been carefully filed where it will form a valuable basis for the future work of the department.

In the following tables, where no data is given, it is because the institution was unable to furnish same. Where the name of an institution does not appear at all in a given table relating to the class to which it belongs, it is because no data was furnished which could be used in that table.

Separate tables are arranged for the two phases of the work of the Board, charitable and correctional. In some of the larger states separate departments have supervision of the two classes of institutions but the care of dependents and delinquents is sufficiently inter-related, so that in a state like Maine the work can be more economically done by one department.

An examination of this table in connection with the table showing the number of beds in the various hospitals, auggests that a few of these hospitals may have reported as "recident" physicians, those residing in town rather than the number residing at the hospital, sometimes designated as "house" surgeons.

PER CAPITA COSTS.

In the table of per capita costs the figures shown in the average present and per capita costs columns are those given by the institution when contained in its report. When the institution did not give its per capita cost it was determined by dividing the total expenditure for all purposes by the average number present of inmates or persons cared for.

It is evident, however, that an actual per capita cost can only be obtained by taking into account not only all expenditures, but also the indebtedness for maintenance purposes at the beginning and end of the year and the difference in the value of the supplies and equipment on hand at the beginning and end of the year.

So much comment in relation to including interest charges on indebtedness and interest on the value of the plant, depreciation, etc., has come to the attention of the Board, that an additional column called the "Comparative per capita cost" has been added.

The figures in this column have been obtained in the manner indicated in foot note." It has been possible to make an entry in this column only when the institution has reported the average number cared for and its financial officer has answered the questions of the Board in relation to the value of the property owned and used, the value of its investments, endowments and trust funds and the amount of its indebtedness.

In order also to obtain an idea of the amount of capital invested in proportion to capacity in the several classes of institutions, the number of beds available for persons cared for has been used in connection with the estimate of the financial officer of the institution, as to the value of real and personal property owned or used and held in trust

MAINE MISSION FOR THE DEAF.

The information furnished in relation to this institution, or rather agency, was such that it could not well be included in the statistical tables. The Mission has no permanent home. At present the Treasurer resides in Brownfield. It assists the needy as opportunity offers. Last year it received from the State \$100. The Treasurer states that two hundred dollars were expended and that on November 1, 1913, the Mission was assisting two people.

DAUGHTERS OF WISDOM.

This organization is understood to be maintaining a small hospital at St. Agatha, but no data was received from the institution in such form that it could be included in the foregoing tables.





PART III. POOR RELIEF.

The data in the following tables has been compiled from replies to a series of questions which was sent to the overseers of the poor of every city and town in the state. The ready response and the interest taken by these officials was in general very gratifying. In a few instances, however, no replies have been received, and in accordance with the instruction of the Board, those cases have been referred to the attorney general. As was to be expected some of the towns did not so keep their records that the desired information could be furnished. will doubtless be remedied next year. Future returns will come in earlier in the reporting year of the Board so that there will be more time to study the information given and to clear up any points upon which there appears to be doubt. Sufficient data was obtained so that a reasonably approximate average could be obtained from which to estimate those few towns which did not report.

The widely varying number assisted per 1000 of population in the different cities and towns suggests not only widely differing methods but also diverse local conditions. In general, however, it will be noted that while the numbers assisted do not appear to vary with any exact relation to the density of population, the cost per capita of population does vary very generally in inverse ratio to the number of people in a given area.

METHOD OF ADMINISTERING POOR RELIEF.

AUBURN, (Androscoggin.)

This town maintained an almshouse at a net cost of \$1,900.00 the past year. The building is of wood, 2 floors, 40 rooms, 31 of which are used as sleeping rooms, with 1 bed in a room. Has modern toilet facilities, sewerage connection. Water supply hydraulic rams. Sexes separated all of the time. Present in the almshouse November 1, 1913, 6 males, 5 females. Of the number of persons cared for or assisted during the year 1 was reported as being a child sixteen years of age or under. Salary of the superintendent, \$1,104.00 per annum.

AMITY, (Aroostook.)

This town has no almshouse. The highest price paid for board during the last year was \$2.00 per week. Of the number of persons cared for or assisted during the year none are reported as mentally defective.

ASHLAND, (Aroostook.)

Ashland maintains no town farm or almshouse. Among the persons cared for or assisted during the past year one is reported as blind and two feeble minded.

AVON, (Franklin.)

This town maintains no almshouse. Prices paid for board \$1.50, \$2.00 and \$2.50 per week. Of the persons cared for or assisted during the year 1 was reported as feeble minded.

AURORA, (Hancock.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$5.00 per week.

AMHERST, (Hancock.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$2.75 per week.

ALBION, (Kennebec.)

Albion rents its town farm and pays board for its paupers. The rent received for farm for the last fiscal year was \$220.00. The farm made a net profit of \$158.56. The almshouse consists of a house, ell, barn and shed, all of wood. There are nine rooms in the almshouse, six of them sleeping rooms. There is only one bed in a room, no sewerage connection, no modern toilets, water supply from a well. No children have been cared for at the almshouse during the past year. Of the persons cared for or assisted one is reported as feeble minded.

AUGUSTA, (Kennebec.)

Travellers and vagrants are lodged at the expense of the police department. The almshouse is a three story brick building, with an addition of wood for storehouse, shed and washroom. There is a barn on the farm, 50x100 feet. The almshouse contains 42 rooms, 29 of them sleeping rooms. Largest number of beds in any one room 2, average number 1. Building is provided with toilets and bath room, has sewerage connection, water supply is from the city system. Children are kept at the almshouse only with their mothers and then only for a short time. There were present at the almshouse November 1, 1913, 13 men and 7 women, 11 of these were over 70 years of age. The Superintendent and Matron of the almshouse receive an annual salary of \$600.00.

Prices for board outside of the almshouse range from \$2.00 to \$5.00 per week. Eight adults and 23 children under 16 years of age are reported as having been boarded at the expense of the city outside the almshouse during the year.

The city maintains no workhouse or house of correction aside from the city farm. Persons sentenced by the Municipal Court to the city farm have no separate quarters from those who are there by reason of misfortune or by reason of disability.

APPLETON, (Knox.)

Appleton maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board outside is \$2.50 per week. Of the persons cared for or assisted during the year one is reported as feeble minded.

ALNA, (Lincoln.)

Alna maintains no almshouse. Prices paid for board outside vary from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per week.

ALBANY, (Oxford.)

Albany has no almshouse. Price of board \$2.00 per week. But one person was fully cared for during the year, that one a cripple.

ANDOVER, (Oxford.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board from \$1.50 for children to \$4.00 for men. One of the persons cared for during the year was reported as a cripple.

ALTON, (Penobscot.)

This town maintains no almshouse. Prices paid for board vary from \$2.00 to \$4.00 per week.

ARGYLE, (Penobscot.)

Maintains no almshouse. Of the persons cared for or assisted, one is reported as either feeble minded or insane.

ABBOT, (Piscataquis.)

Maintains no almshouse. Prices paid for board vary from \$2.50 to \$6.00 per week. Of the persons cared for or assisted, 2 were reported as tuberculous.

ATKINSON, (Piscataquis.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$4.00 per week.

ARROWSIC, (Sagadahoc.)

Maintains no almshouse. Prices paid for board \$1.50 per week for children, women \$4.00. Of the two persons reported as fully supported, both are stated to be feeble minded.

ANSON, (Somerset.)

Maintained an almshouse during the past year at a net cost of \$111.65. Salary of superintendent \$365.00 per annum. Main building of brick with annex of wood, 2 floors, 8 rooms, 4 of which are used as sleeping rooms, I bed in a room with one exception, 2 beds. Has no modern toilet facilities, no sewerage connection. Water supply, running spring. Sexes separated at night only. Present at the almshouse November I, 1913, 2 males, 3 females. Of the persons cared for or assisted during the year I was reported as being a child sixteen years of age or under. I person cripple, I dumb and I feeble minded.

ATHENS, (Somerset.)

Maintains no almshouse. Of the persons assisted during the year, 7 were reported as feeble minded and 2 deaf. Among the number were 44 children.

ADDISON, (Washington.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$2.50 per week.

ALEXANDER, (Washington.)

Maintains no almshouse.

ACTON, (York.)

Maintained an almshouse during the last fiscal year at a net cost of \$262.00. Annual salary of the superintendent of the almshouse \$240.00. The building is of wood, I story with 6 rooms, 3 used as sleeping rooms. The only person fully supported during the year was one feeble old lady. No one was being cared for at the almshouse November I, 1913.

ALFRED, (York.)

Maintains no almshouse. Prices paid for board are from \$2.00 to \$4.00.

BANCROFT, (Aroostook.)

Maintains no almshouse.

BENEDICTA, (Aroostook.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$3.50 per week.

BLAINE, (Aroostook.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$3.75 per week.

BRIDGEWATER, (Aroostook.)

Maintains no almshouse. This town boards no persons, but assists them in the way of supplies, groceries, clothing, etc.

BALDWIN, (Cumberland.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid per week for board from \$4.00 to \$5.00. The town owns a poor farm but it is closed at the present time.

BRUNSWICK, (Cumberland.)

Maintained an almshouse the past fiscal year at a net cost of \$934.71. Salary of superintendent \$500.00 per annum. Building is of wood, 2 floors, 25 rooms, 16 of which are used as sleeping rooms, 1 bed in a room with one exception, 3 beds. Has modern toilet facilities, sewerage connection. Water supply, city system. Sexes separated at night only. Present at the almshouse November 1, 1913, 16 males, 2 females, 2 of which were reported as blind, 6 crippled and 6 feeble minded.

BRIDGTON, (Cumberland.)

Maintained an almshouse last year at a net cost of \$985.00. The building is of wood, with 3 floors, contains 18 rooms, 15 of which are used as sleeping rooms, only one bed in a room. The almshouse has no sewerage connection, spring water is piped to the house. Sexes are separated only at night. Present at the almshouse November 1, 1913, 4 men and 1 woman, the 4 men were over 70 years of age. Of the persons cared for during the year, 2 are reported as feeble minded, 1 epileptic and 1 cripple. One child under 16 years of age has been boarded outside the almshouse during the year, price \$2.00 per week.

BLUEHILL, (Hancock.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$2.50 to \$3.00 per week. Of the persons cared for or assisted during the year, I is reported as a cripple and 5 as feeble minded.

BUCKSPORT, (Hancock.)

Maintained an almshouse last year at a net cost of \$809.69. The salary of the superintendent was \$300.00 per year. The building is of wood, 3 floors, 25 rooms, 20 of them used as sleeping rooms. Only I bed in a room. No sewerage connection, water supply wells and springs. Sexes separated only at night, no children at the almshouse. Present November I, 1913, I man and 2 women, the man over 70 years of age. Of the persons cared for or assisted during the year two are reported as feeble minded.

BROOKLIN, (Hancock.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$1.50 to \$2.00 per week.

BROOKSVILLE, (Hancock.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$1.50 to \$2.35 per week.

BELGRADE, (Kennebec.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$2.50 per week.

BENTON, (Kennebec.)

Maintained an almshouse last year at a net cost of \$117.95. Building is of wood, 2 floors, 10 rooms, 4 of which are used as sleeping rooms, with only 1 bed in a room. Has no modern toilet facilities, no sewerage connection. Water supply, a well. Sexes separated at night only. Present at the almshouse on November 1, 1913, 3 males, 1 female, 1 of which was reported as a cripple, 1 blind and 2 feeble minded.

BOOTHBAY, (Lincoln.)

Maintains no almshouse. All persons were taken care of by the town by contract with the lowest bidder, \$557.00 for the year. Of the persons cared for or assisted, one is reported as crippled and feeble minded, I feeble minded and I blind.

BOOTHBAY HARBOR, (Lincoln.)

Owns a poor farm but does not use it for that purpose. Price paid for board \$2.00 to \$2.50 per week. Of the persons assisted during the year, two are reported as feeble minded, I epileptic, two crippled, father and son, and I insane.

BREMEN, (Lincoln.)

Maintains no almshouse

BRISTOL, (Lincoln.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board from \$3.00 to \$6.00 per week. Of the persons cared for or assisted, I was reported as blind and 4 feeble minded.

BETHEL, (Oxford.)

Does not maintain an almshouse. Price paid for board \$1.50 for children, \$3.00 for men.

BROWNFIELD, (Oxford.)

Maintains no almshouse. Price paid for board \$3.50 to \$7.00 per week. Of the persons cared for or assisted, 2 are reported as crippled, 6 feeble minded.

BUCKFIELD, (Oxford.)

Maintains no almshouse. It owns one, a 2 story building of wood with 12 rooms but it has been closed for 3 years. Of the persons cared for or assisted, I is reported as crippled and I as feeble minded.

BYRON, (Oxford.)

Supported or assisted no poor during the last fiscal year.

BANGOR, (Penobscot.)

The net cost of maintaining the almshouse, including the house of correction and hospital was \$16,354.63. The salary of the superintendent of the almshouse is \$1,000.00 per annum. The building has 4 floors, 42 rooms, 25 of which are used for sleeping rooms. The largest number of beds in any one room is 9, the average 3. Twenty-seven rooms have only a single bed, the remaining 8 have 68 beds. The hospital portion of the almshouse contains 16 rooms with single beds. The building is supplied with modern toilets, has sewerage connection, is connected with the water system and also has a well. Sexes are separated all the time. Present November 1, 52 males, 17 females. Of this number only 3 were under 16 years of age, 17 were over 70.

Price paid for board outside the almshouse \$2.50 to \$5.00 per week. Of the persons cared for or assisted, 3 are reported as blind, 67 crippled, 14 tuberculous, 3 feeble minded, 11 insane.

A portion of the almshouse is used as a workhouse or house of correction. Present November 1, 1913, 8 males and 1 female.

BRADLEY, (Penobscot.)

Maintains no almshouse. Rates paid for board from \$2.00 to \$5.00. Of the persons assisted or cared for, two are reported to be crippled, one feeble minded.

BREWER, (Penobscot.)

Net cost of maintaining the almshouse \$1,490.55. Price paid for board of children outside the almshouse \$2.00 per week.

Buildings consist of main house and ell, carriage house and barn, hen house, contagious hospital, all of wood. Almshouse has three floors, 17 rooms, eleven of them sleeping rooms. Largest number of beds in one room is two, average, one. Almshouse has modern toilets, sewerage connection, water supply, city system and well. Sexes separated all of the time, adults and children provided with separate rooms. Number present November 1, 1913, 4 males and one female. One of the males was under 16. Travellers and vagrants are lodged at the poor farm and no record kept. Net cost of maintaining the almshouse last year

\$544.42. Almshouse buildings are of wood, consisting of house, barn, shed, hen house, and corn shed. Almshouse has two floors, eleven rooms, 6 of them sleeping rooms, only I bed in a room. No modern toilets, no sewerage connection, water supply, spring. Sexes separated only at night. Present at almshouse, November I, 1913, I male.
