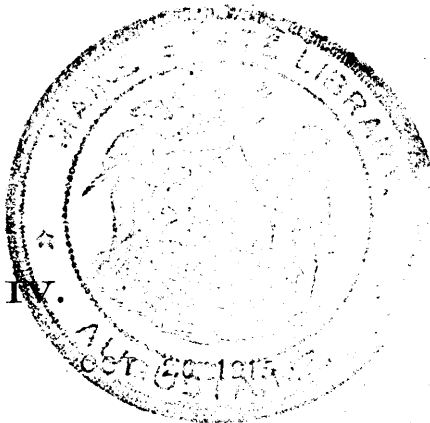

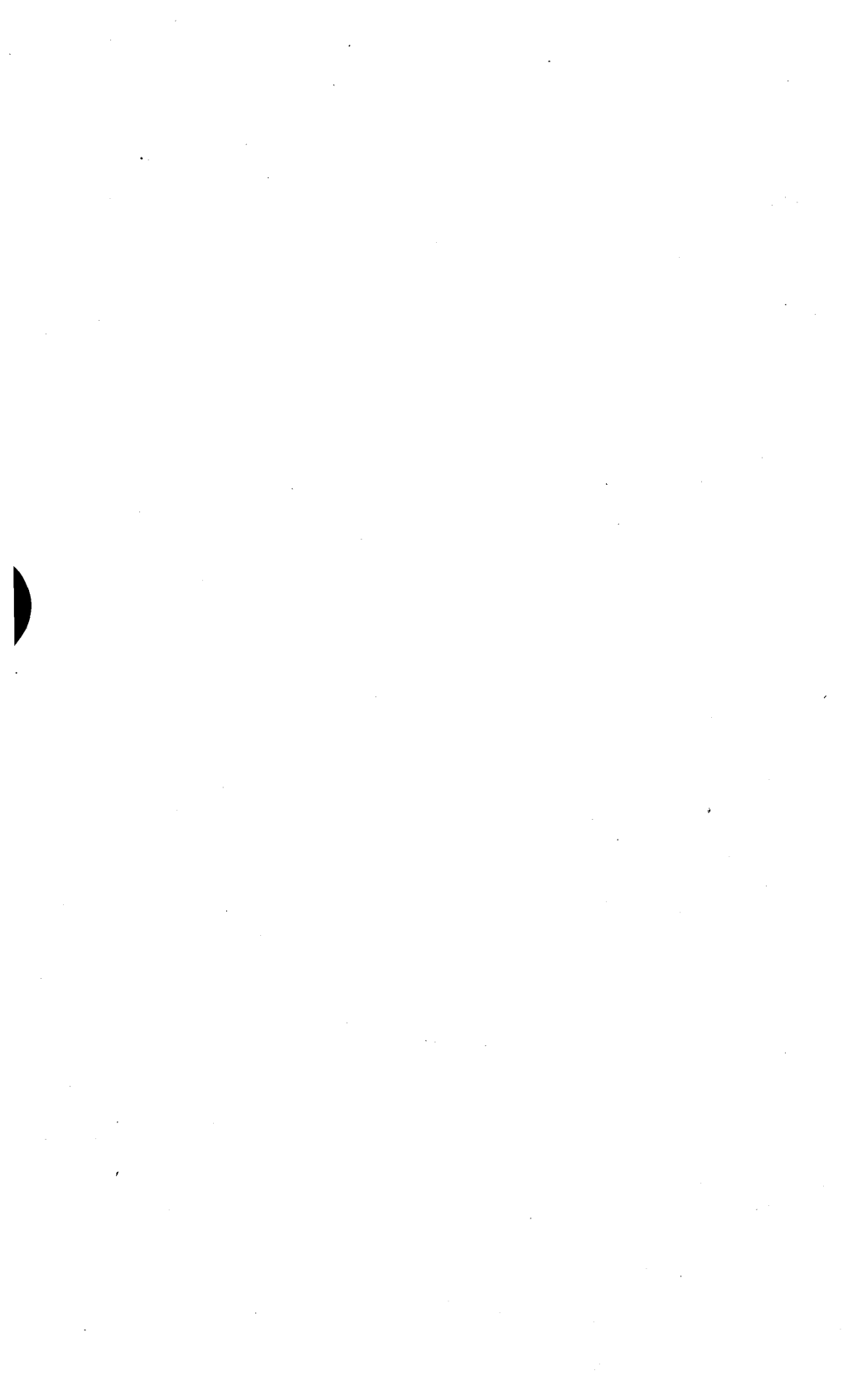

GENTLEMEN:—In obedience to the Constitution of the State I have the honor to submit my annual report of the financial transactions of this Department, together with a brief statement of a few other matters of public interest.

BONDED DEBT.

On January 1, 1913, the total bonded indebtedness of the State was \$269,000.

In accordance with Section 30 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913, providing for an issue of bonds to be designated as the "State Highway Loan," there was advertised and sold on October 1st to the highest bidder Serial Coupon Bonds in the aggregate amount of \$300,000 maturing in one to forty years, bearing date of September 1, 1913 and interest at the rate of four per centum per annum, payable semi-annually. Messrs. Perry, Coffin & Burr, and A. B. Leach & Company of Boston were awarded the entire issue, they having bid 100.52.

The principal and interest on these bonds will be paid from the fees received by the Secretary of State for the registration of automobiles, as provided by Section 31 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

The total bonded indebtedness, therefore, on December 31, 1913, is \$569,000 as follows:

One unnegotiable bond issued to the State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts (now University of Maine) constituting a perpetual fund derived from the United States Government,	\$118,300.
One unnegotiable bond to secure a legacy left to the State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts (now University of Maine) by the late Abner Coburn, due in 1917,	100,000.
One unnegotiable bond to secure a legacy left to the Maine Insane Asylum (now Augusta State Hospital) by the late Abner Coburn, due in 1917,	50,000.

TAXES.

All State taxes assessed against the several cities, towns and organized plantations for the year 1912 have been paid in full with the exception of No. 8 in Hancock County.

CONCLUSION.

The business of the Department, in general, has increased very materially during the past few months, owing largely to the payment of all bills from the Treasury of the several State Institutions, which were formerly paid by them.

No provision was made by the Legislature to take care of this large volume of business, which the Department necessarily was obliged to assume, but by the present force giving more time than the regular business hours, the work in each desk has been carried along and the disbursements made with the usual promptness.

A small appropriation, however, should be made to provide for additional assistance when necessary.

The form of checks has been changed somewhat, and all checks must now be countersigned by the Chief Clerk of the Treasury.

This is an entirely new feature, and I believe one of much importance in safeguarding the funds of the State. Under the present system there are four active depositaries, viz.: Portland

National Bank, Portland; Augusta Trust Company and State Trust Company, Augusta, and Merrill Trust Company of Bangor. These banks furnish all the checks without any cost whatever to the State, thus making a substantial saving over former years, and especially at this time when something like twenty-five thousand checks are being used annually.

The rate of interest on daily balances has also been increased during the past year from two per cent. to two and one-half per cent.

Rising two hundred thousand, however, of the cash balance on hand December 31, 1913, is on deposit in the Savings Departments of the several banking institutions in the State at the rate of four per cent.

The following table shows the location and name of bank, together with the amount on deposit at the close of business December 31, 1913.

TRUST FUNDS.

AUBURN TRUST COMPANY.

On March 15, 1904, as provided by Section 45, Chapter 48, Revised Statutes, there was received from Seth M. Carter, Receiver, for the Auburn Trust Company, the sum of \$62.52.

Of this amount the court has ordered paid \$32.33, leaving a balance of \$30.19 which according to the schedule of the Receiver, would appear to consist of the following unclaimed deposits:—

AUGUSTA STATE HOSPITAL.

The sum of \$50,000 was bequeathed to above Hospital by Abner Coburn in 1887, and under Chapter 70 of the Resolves of 1887, the Treasurer of State issued an unnegotiable bond for this amount bearing interest at rate of four per cent. and payable semi-annually, bond maturing in 1917.

AUGUSTUS HOPKINS LEGACY.

This legacy amounting to \$1,000, the income only of same to be used in such a way as may seem best for the girls of the Institution, was left to the Maine Industrial School for Girls by Augustus Hopkins, of Gardiner.

The fund is deposited under Chapter 174 of the Public Laws of 1909.

BENJAMIN C. JORDAN FUND.

This fund amounting to the sum of \$1,000 was accepted by the Legislature under Chapter 67 of the Resolves of 1909 for the purpose of encouraging the cultivation of forest trees upon the following condition:

That in consideration of said gift the State shall, once in eighteen years, offer five prizes to be called the "Jordan Forestry Prizes," as follows:

\$500	1st	prize
\$250	2d	"
\$125	3d	"
\$100	4th	"
\$25	5th	"

Said prizes to be offered now by the State for the five best lots of young forest growth in the State and awarded by the State Forest Commissioner subject to the approval of the Governor, January 1st, 1927, and once in 18 years afterward forever, after a careful examination of all lots computing in accordance with the following rules:

Rule 1. Each lot shall consist of one parcel of not less than ten acres in somewhat regular shape and shall be accurately surveyed and plotted.

Rule 2. The majority of said trees shall not be less than ten feet nor more than thirty feet high and not less than ten nor more than thirty years old when the prize is awarded.

Rule 3. Said forest may consist of any of the following kinds of trees, but other circumstances and conditions being equal, preference shall be given in the following order: White Pine, White Oak, Hickory, Chestnut, Hackmatack, White Ash, Yellow Oak, Red Oak, Bass, Hemlock, Spruce, Norway Pine, Pitch Pine, Cedar, Fir, Poplar, Birch, Maple, Beech and Elm.

Rule 4. All competitors for the prizes shall file in the office of the State Forest Commissioner their intention to compete, together with a correct and definite survey and plan of the lot, ten or more years before each award, and when such notice has been filed, said lot shall be eligible although the ownership may have changed.

Rule 5. Myself and my heirs shall have the same right as others to compete for the prizes.

Rule 6. In awarding prizes, other circumstances being equal, the following conditions shall be considered in the order named: (a) Right number of trees per acre. (b) Even distribution over whole lot. (c) Health and thriftiness of trees. (d) Adaptation of the varieties of trees to the soil in which they stand. (e) Uniformity of size of trees. (f) Size of trees. (g) Size of the lot.

CARLETON FUND.

This fund amounting to \$1,000 was accepted by the Legislature under Chapter 60 of the Resolves of 1911, and consists of a Salt Lake & Ogden Railway Company, First Mortgage Five Per Cent. Twenty-five Year Gold Bond, Due February 1, 1934. The conditions under which this fund is held are as follows:

Whereas, on November 1, 1909, James J. H. Gregory, late of Marblehead, Massachusetts, gave to the State of Maine, an interest bearing, first mortgage bond for one thousand dollars, to perpetuate the memory of his college friend, Marcus Manard Carleton, the interest whereof to be used for the promotion of scientific orcharding in Maine, according to the condition accompanying the gift:

That the Treasurer of the State of Maine and his successor in office be and he hereby is constituted sole trustee to receive and hold said gift, reinvesting same at maturity forever, and collecting and depositing in some approved savings bank in Maine, the interest on said gift, until the year 1914 in which

year, and on every fifth year, thereafterward, said treasurer shall pay as directed by the Governor and Council from the interest at that time accrued the sum of two hundred dollars as a premium to the farmer, in Maine, who shall be named by the committee hereinafter provided, as a premium for the most thrifty and well kept orchard of one acre or more of apple trees five years from planting, on his own land, and shall so pay to said committee from the balance of such interest their necessary disbursements for travel in inspecting such orchards and awarding said prize.

That a committee consisting of three men, versed in the science and art of orcharding, shall in July, 1914, be appointed as follows: Two members to be appointed by the Governor, and one, who shall be the chairman, to be appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture, who shall serve without pay in inspecting the competing orchards, and awarding the premium. At the expiration of five years from 1914, and at five-year intervals thereafter, a like committee shall be appointed to serve as above. Said committee shall visit the orchards entered in the contest for the Carleton prize and report in the month of October to the Governor the name of the winner of said prize and other prizes that may be awarded in this contest, and shall be allowed by the Governor and Council their necessary disbursements as above, provided that, in no year of award shall a greater sum be allowed for disbursements, from this source, than the interest accrued on said gift over and above the sum of two hundred dollars.

That before the month of January next following the season upon which an award is made, the department of agriculture shall mail to the postmaster of each town in the state, to be posted in the post office, a circular giving the conditions of the award, which in addition to those already prescribed, shall provide that the trees planted may be from any one one or more of four standard varieties of trees, the Ben Davis alone excluded.

That, if in the future, it shall be deemed by the department of agriculture inexpedient to continue offering the premiums, the entire amount of interest, as it falls due shall be collected by said treasurer and forthwith paid to the University of Maine to be devoted to the aid of poor and deserving students therein.

The interest on this fund, amounting to \$206.09, is on deposit in the Bangor Savings Bank.

ELIZA MUSTARD LEGACY.

This legacy amounting to \$4,000 the income of which is to be used in helping to meet the current expenses of the Institution, was left to the Maine Industrial School for Girls by Eliza Mustard, of Richmond.

Under the statutes this sum was liable for a collateral inheritance tax of \$87.50 (the Institution at that time being a private corporation), leaving a balance to be deposited as provided by Chapter 174 of the Public Laws of 1909, of \$3,912.50.

FRATERNAL PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION, INC., BOSTON.

As provided by Chapter 80 of the Public Laws of 1905, there is on deposit and held in trust the sum of \$1,000.

FRATERNITIES HEALTH & ACCIDENT ASSOCIATION,
RICHMOND.

As provided by Chapter 49, Sections 123 and 126 of the Revised Statutes, there is on deposit and held in trust the sum of \$4,687.00.

FOXCROFT ACADEMY FUND.

As provided by Chapter 277, Resolves of 1868, there is held in trust for the use and benefit of said Academy the sum of \$1,000, upon which interest at rate of six per cent. is payable annually to the trustees.

HELEN A. GILMAN LEGACY.

This legacy of \$1,000 was bequeathed to the State by Helen A. Gilman, to be held in trust for the promotion of the pleasure and comfort of the patients in the Maine Insane Hospital (now Augusta State Hospital) at Augusta, upon the condition that a sum not less than fifty dollars a year should be appropriated by the Legislature to be expended annually.

This amount, together with the condition as set forth in said will, was accepted by the Legislature under Chapter 131, Resolves of 1905, interest at rate of five per cent. being payable to the Trustees of said Institution.

HEBRON ACADEMY.

Under Chapter 278, Resolves of 1868, the sum of \$1,000 was appropriated to be held in trust by the Treasurer of State for the use and benefit of said Academy.

Interest at rate of six per cent. is payable annually to the trustees of said Academy, providing it has been open for instruction under the direction of said trustees, for at least two terms of ten weeks each in the year preceding any claim made under the resolve:

And provided, further, that if the trustees of said Academy shall fail to maintain instruction therein for the period of two consecutive years, the grant herein made shall become forfeited.

HOULTON ACADEMY.

This fund of \$2,000 is held in trust for the use and benefit of said Academy from funds arising from the sale of timber and lumber, the Legislature appropriating same for educational purposes.

Under this Resolve, Chapter 370 of the Laws of 1864, interest at rate of six per cent. is payable annually to the trustees.

ISAAC SANFORD LEGACY.

The sum of \$1,300 was paid into the State Treasury in 1854, under the will of Isaac Sanford; \$700 being bequeathed to State Reform School (now the State School for Boys) and \$600 for the benefit of the indigent blind, and deaf and dumb, all of said beneficiaries to be natives of the State.

As provided by Chapter 197 of the Public Laws of 1856, a sum of money equal to six per cent. of the amount bequeathed to the State Reform School (now State School for Boys) is appropriated annually for the support of the library, said sum to be paid in the month of February.

Chapter 43 of the Resolves of 1911 provides that the Treasurer of the State of Maine and his successor in office be and he hereby is the trustee under the will of Isaac Sanford to keep the legacy of six hundred dollars as provided in said will.

And be it further resolved; that the state shall set apart annually a sum equal to six per centum interest on said legacy,

and shall pay such interest, under the direction of the governor and council, as aid towards the education of the deaf, dumb and blind natives of Maine, in institutions established for the education of such persons, provided that if in the future it is deemed inadvisable to continue the payment of such interest, the principal sum and any accrued interest shall be expended as the governor and council shall order.

JOSEPH H. WILLIAMS LEGACY.

This legacy from Joseph H. Williams to the State, amounting to \$1,000, for the benefit of the Maine Insane Hospital, (now Augusta State Hospital) was accepted by the Legislature under Chapter 220, Resolves of 1897, and a sum of money, not less than forty dollars, must be appropriated from time to time by the Legislature, and paid annually to the trustees of said Hospital.

LANDS RESERVED FOR PUBLIC USES.

This fund is received from the Land Agent, being the amount collected by him on account of sales of timber and grass on reserved lots in unincorporated townships, and paid into this Department from time to time as provided by Chapter 7, Section 15 of the Revised Statutes.

When any township or tract is organized as a plantation, the interest on the fund belonging to said plantation is paid annually from the Treasury, upon authority from the Governor and Council, to be applied for the support of schools according to the number of scholars in each school.

When any such township is incorporated as a town, said fund belonging to it is to be paid over by the Treasurer of State to the Treasurer of the trustees of the ministerial and school funds therein, to be added to the funds of the corporation, and held and managed as other school funds of that town are required to be held and managed.

This fund now amounts to \$396,740.63.

MADAWASKA TERRITORY SCHOOL FUND.

As provided by Chapter 100 of the Private and Special Laws of 1861, there is held in trust the sum of \$5,000 for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Madawaska Territory, as their shares of the surplus revenue distributed to the inhabitants of the State in 1837, said sum to constitute a permanent fund, on which six per cent. shall be paid annually for the support of schools in said Territory.

MAINE STATE RELIEF ASSOCIATION, PORTLAND.

As provided by Chapter 49, Section 140 of the Revised Statutes, there is held in trust the sum of \$41,915.62.

MAINE BENEFIT LIFE ASSOCIATION.

On January 12, 1904, there was received from Fremont E. Timberlake and Seth M. Carter, Receivers for the Maine Benefit Life Association, the sum of \$285.72 on account of unpaid final dividends and unrefunded premiums, as provided by Section 72 of Chapter 49 of the Revised Statutes.

\$9.96, however, of this amount has since been paid, leaving a balance of \$275.76 unclaimed on December 31, 1913, according to the schedule of the Receivers as follows:

NELLIE F. SHAW FUND.

Under the will of Nellie F. Shaw, of Boston, the sum of \$5,000 was left to the Maine Industrial School for Girls, to be known as the Nellie F. Shaw Fund.

The estate being subject to a collateral inheritance tax of 5% under the law of Massachusetts, left a balance of \$4,750 to be deposited with the State of Maine, as provided by Chapter 174 of the Public Laws of 1909.

PASSAMAQUODDY INDIAN FUND.

This fund is derived from proceeds of sales by the Land Agent of timber and grass, together with certain rights of flowage, on Indian Township in Washington County since 1853, and now amounts to \$62,723.13.

PENOBSCOT INDIAN FUND.

The amount to the credit of this fund is \$88,092.44. \$50,000 of said sum was received from sale of four townships of land purchased by the State of said tribe in 1833, to which have since been added receipts from leases of the shores of several islands in Penobscot River now occupied by the tribe.

PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND.

The money received from the Land Agent, derived from the sales of land appropriated for the support of schools, constitutes the "Permanent School Fund," and a sum equal to six per cent. of the amount of such fund is annually appropriated to the support of common schools and distributed among the several cities, towns and plantations according to the number of children therein between the ages of five and twenty-one.

On the first day of January, 1913, the fund amounted to \$471,608.02.

PETER LANE LEGACY.

This legacy amounting to \$1,156.65 was bequeathed to the Maine Industrial School for Girls by Peter Lane, of Leeds, and is deposited under Chapter 174 of the Public Laws of 1909.

PORTLAND CASUALTY COMPANY, PORTLAND.

In accordance with the Revised Statutes, Chapter 49, Sections 123 and 126, there is held in trust the sum of \$932.00.

ROBIE AMUSEMENT FUND.

As provided by Chapter 42 of the Resolves of 1911, authorizing the acceptance of a gift from ex-Governor Frederick Robie of Gorham, there is held in trust for the benefit of the Eastern Maine Insane Hospital (now Bangor State Hospital) at Bangor, twenty shares of stock of the First National Bank of Portland, (\$2000) same to be held as a permanent amusement fund, the yearly income thereof to be paid semi-annually to the treasurer of the hospital to be used for the benefit of the institution in accordance with the several terms of the gift, or as the trustees of said institution from time to time determine.

Said investment may from time to time be changed at the discretion of the State Treasurer, with the approval of the Governor and Council, but shall always be kept separate and distinct from other funds.

ROBIE LIBRARY FUND.

As provided by Chapter 42 of the Resolves of 1911, authorizing the acceptance of a gift from ex-Governor Frederick Robie of Gorham, there is held in trust for the benefit of the Maine Insane Hospital (now Augusta State Hospital) at Augusta, twenty shares of stock of the First National Bank of Portland, (\$2000) same to be held as a permanent library fund, the yearly income thereof to be paid semi-annually to the treasurer of the hospital to be used for the benefit of the institution in accordance with the several terms of the gift, or as the trustees of said institution from time to time determine.

Said investment may from time to time be changed at the discretion of the State Treasurer, with the approval of the Governor and Council, but shall always be kept separate and distinct from other funds.

SCHOOL DISTRICT NO 2, MADISON.

This fund of \$1,000 is derived from a bond of the State of Maine, which by Resolve of March 25, 1863, the Treasurer of State was directed to receive from Mahlan D. Spaulding, of Boston, the coupons thereon to be paid to the legal agent of the District as they became due, and at maturity of said bond five per cent. of the amount to be paid annually for all time to come

UNION MUTUAL LIFE INSURANCE COMPANY, PORTLAND.

Under the provisions of Chapter 49, Section 59 of the Revised Statutes, there is on deposit and held in trust for the benefit of all the policy holders in above company the sum of \$102,000.

UNIVERSITY OF MAINE OR AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE
FUND.

From the sale of land scrip apportioned to the State of Maine by the United States Government entitled "An Act donating Public Lands to the several States and Territories which may provide Colleges for the benefit of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts," approved July 2, 1862, there was issued to said college an unnegotiable bond in the sum of \$118,300, which should constitute a perpetual fund, upon which interest at rate of five per cent, should be paid semi-annually.

No portion of said fund, nor the interest thereon, shall be applied, directly or indirectly, under any pretence whatever, to the purchase, erection, preservation, or repair of any building or buildings.

Also as provided by Chapter 105 of the Resolves of 1887 the Treasurer of State was authorized and directed to receive from the Maine State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts (now University of Maine), in trust, the sum of \$100,000 bequeathed to said college by Abner Coburn.

An unnegotiable bond for this amount was issued bearing interest at rate of four per cent. and payable semi-annually, said bond maturing in 1917.

SCHOOL FUNDS.

The regular School and Mill Fund is derived from a tax of one and one-half mills on the total valuation of the State, six per cent. interest on the permanent school fund, and one-half the amount received by the State from the tax on Savings Banks and Trust and Banking Companies.

The Common School Fund is based on a tax of one and one-half mills upon the total valuation of the State, and is distributed to the several cities, towns and plantations as provided by Chapter 177 of the Public Laws of 1909; one-third according to the number of scholars therein, as the same shall appear from the official returns to the State Superintendent of Public Schools for the preceding year, and the remaining two-thirds according to the valuation thereof as the same shall be fixed by the Board of State Assessors, for the preceding year.

Any portion of these funds not expended during the financial year shall at its close be added to the permanent school fund.

The following table shows the number of scholars and the amount distributed to the several cities, towns and plantations for the past ten years, together with the total amount of State Tax assessed.

*To His Excellency, William T. Haines, Governor, and the
Honorable Executive Council.*

GENTLEMEN: The law of 1907 establishing the office of State Auditor provides that the Auditor shall on or before the first day of February, biennially, submit to the Legislature a report showing a full and accurate statement of the financial condition of the State for each of the two preceding years. Believing that the people of the State should annually have a report of the appropriations, receipts and expenditures of all state departments, I hereby submit a brief summarized statement of the financial affairs of the State during the year 1913.

Before proceeding with the statistical part of the report given below, which includes a statement of income and expense and receipts and payments, I wish to call attention to the appropriations made by the Legislature for 1911 and 1912 as compared with those made by the Legislature for 1913 and 1914, showing the principal increases; also the amount of State taxes assessed and when such tax is received. This is a subject upon which much has been said. The tables included in this report give the facts relating to the time taxes assessed in any given year are received by the State Treasurer. They also show the large amounts received for State Taxes during the years 1911 and 1912 as compared with other years.

I also call attention to Chapter 217 of the Public Laws of 1913, which went into effect July 12, 1913, by which all fees or income received by any institution, department, board or commission of the State must be paid to the State Treasurer, and all bills of any institution must be audited before being paid. This applies to the Augusta and Bangor State Hospitals and the Maine State Prison, their receipts going to the State Treasurer and all their bills going through the State Auditor's office. The accounts of the latter institution were audited at the close of 1913 for the first time by the State Auditor's office.

I also call attention to unpaid bills left by the Plaisted Administration which were included in the deficiency appropriation bill of 1913; also to other unpaid bills which did not go into the deficiency bill and for which no appropriation was made but were paid out of money in the treasury, such as the Augusta and Bangor State Hospital bills for 1912, forestry fire bills of 1911 and other deficiencies of those years. The correction of the accounts of the Penobscot Indian Trust Fund by Legislative Resolve of 1913 added \$15,763.96 to their fund and increases the State debt that amount. It was a just act correcting an error of many years standing.

The new law creating a Highway Commission and providing for issuing bonds for State Highway Loan adds to the expense as well as receipts for that department. In this connection I wish to add that before the new highway law went into effect July 12th the Governor and Council gave to cities and towns from the automobile license fees received between January 1, 1913 and July 12, 1913 the sum of \$110,221.00, to help build good roads which was a gift from the State, the only condition being that the work should be done to the satisfaction of the State Highway Department. In giving the debt statement I have separated the regular State Debt from the State Highway Loan Debt. At the present time as very little of the bond money has been expended, it would not make much difference, but as time goes on and several hundred thousand dollars will be expended each year from the sale of bonds, it will make considerable difference. On that account it is better to separate the two so the average citizen can more readily see and understand the financial condition of the State from year to year without being confused by this indebtedness from the State Highway Loan Bonds. While it is true the bonds will be a liability of the State, they are different from all other bonds issued, as they will be no burden to the tax payers. The law provides that the principal and interest of those bonds shall be paid from the receipts of the automobile license fees. The necessary amount to pay the semi-annual interest on the bonds and to pay the serial bonds as they severally become due each year is set aside from the automobile license fees, the balance of the receipts going to maintain state highways.

It is a well known fact that the Legislature of 1911 made practically no appropriations for new public buildings or im-

provements in any educational or State institutions; the same policy was pursued toward all charitable institutions. When the Legislature of 1913 met there was an increased and legitimate demand for extra appropriations on this account. This also extended to highways and bridges. With the necessity of these improvements in view and also from the natural increase of the business of the State, the appropriation bills for 1913 and 1914 exceeded those of 1911 and 1912 by \$1,386,242.23. The principal part of this increase was for the following departments:

Included in this amount is nearly \$420,000.00 for new buildings and additions for State institutions, including \$40,000.00 for water supply for the Maine School for Feeble Minded.

To meet these increased appropriations without increasing the tax rate was the question that confronted the Legislature. As the State tax assessed in any one year is not received until the following year the appropriations for 1913, exclusive of temporary loan item, amounting to \$4,956,724.95 had to be met by the State tax levy of 1912 amounting to \$1,809,081.65 and such indirect taxation of 1913 as came from railroads, savings banks, corporation tax, etc., and which in 1912 amounted to \$2,695,077.26.

When appropriations are made for any two years the receipts from direct and indirect taxation should be enough to meet these expenditures. Knowing that the receipts from all sources for the year 1913 would not equal the appropriations made for that year by many thousands of dollars, the State Auditor's office gave considerable attention to the estimate of receipts from all sources other than the State tax for the years 1913 and 1914, and also the estimates of the appropriations and expenditures.

The object being to find out what rate was necessary to meet all the State's expenses. Those estimates and figures were given to the Committee on Financial Affairs. As the principal part of the tax assessed in 1913 would not be received until 1914 that rate had to be made large enough to take care of the deficiency for 1913, which all knew could not be avoided. The rate was made 5 Mills for 1913 and 4½ Mills for 1914 against a rate of 6 Mills for 1911 and 4 Mills for 1912. I give below two tables which will enable any person to understand when taxes which have been assessed are received by the State Treasurer. The first table gives the State taxes from 1909 to 1914 inclusive. It also shows the amount received the year they are assessed. And it shows the amount of the balance received the next January and February. And finally it shows the total amount of the tax assessed in any year that is received during the whole of the next year.

By this table you can see that of the tax of \$2,143,156.45, (5 Mills) assessed in 1910 only \$371,505.77 of it was received in the year it was assessed, 1910 and \$1,769,037.72 of it was received during the year 1911, \$1,633,490.47 being received during the first two months of 1911. Of the tax of \$2,712,641.88 (6 Mills) assessed in 1911 to pay the expenses of 1911 (and the back bills of 1910 so it was stated) only \$373,076.84 was received in 1911 the year it was assessed and \$2,277,008.07 of it was received the next year, 1912. Of the tax of \$1,809,081.65 (4 Mills) assessed in 1912, \$216,647.68 was received during 1912 and \$1,589,539.24 of it received during the year 1913. Of the \$2,392,936.39 (5 Mills), assessed in 1913 \$280,604.68 was received during 1913 and \$1,705,484.19 was received the past month of January, 1914. From the above anyone can

see when the tax of any given year is received. All taxes are not paid within two years; there are balances of three, four and five years that are received each year. I give below the second tables which show the tax assessment and the total receipts from all taxes for the years 1909 to 1913 inclusive.

You will note from the above that the Plaisted Administration assessed a State tax in 1912 of \$1,809,081.65 and received for taxes that same year \$2,626,634.46, or \$817,552.81 more than they assessed for the year, and \$755,372.04 more than we have received for State taxes during the year 1913.

The past year 1913 the State tax was \$2,392,936.36, total tax receipts \$1,871,262.42. The total appropriation bills for 1911 and 1912 passed by the Legislature of 1911, including temporary loan item amounted to \$8,749,556.88 and to meet this expense they levied a direct State tax of \$4,521,723.53 for the two years 1911 and 1912 and received for State taxes during the same period \$4,768,802.30 and received from all other sources \$5,437,863.99 making total receipts for the two years of \$10,206,666.29.

The total appropriation bills for 1913 and 1914 including the temporary loan item amounted to \$10,135,799.11 or \$1,386,242.23 more than 1911 and 1912. Our receipts from State taxes will be about \$500,000.00 less than the amounts received during 1911 and 1912.

Much has been said in the past about unpaid bills left over from one administration to another and go to make up the deficiency bills. It is impossible for any administration to pay all its bills for the reason that they are not sent in. I have no doubt the former administration made an honest effort to pay all their bills but they did not. During the year 1913 we paid deficiency and other bills of the former administration of over \$175,000.00, and in addition to this they closed the accounts of the Augusta and Bangor State Hospitals which totaled over \$35,000.00 and should have been kept open and carried as a liability which would have shown their net debt about \$1,285,000.00 in place of \$1,249,663.92. This administration had to

pay Bangor State Hospital bills of 1912 and \$23,600.00 of the 1912 Augusta State Hospital bills. The forestry fire bills of 1912 were not brought to the attention of the State Auditor until a few months ago and we paid them in December 1913. Those bills were known to the previous State officials, as a representative of the largest creditor told me they wished to settle with his company for 80 per cent of the bill, or eighty cents on the dollar. As the bill was for cash paid out for fighting forest fires, the company would not accept the offer. The change occasioned by Chapter 217 of the Public Laws of 1913, whereby all bills now go through the Auditor's office and paid by the State Treasurer, is a great improvement. Now all bills of the State institutions are paid promptly and all discounts saved to the State. This change adds about twenty per cent extra work to the State Auditor's office.

The appropriations for the year 1913 exceeded those of 1912 by \$1,212,585.00 and as I have just shown by the official figures the receipts from State taxes for 1913 was \$755,372.04 less than the amount received for 1912. Notwithstanding this credit difference of \$1,967,957.04 in favor of 1912 the net debt is but slightly increased for the year. This financial result is one to be proud of by any State administration. Before closing I wish to note that we paid over \$116,000.00 of deficiency bills of 1911 and 1912 that went into the appropriation bills of 1913. In addition we paid out of the treasury, for the Bangor State Hospital \$14,975.71, Augusta State Hospital \$23,600.00, forest fire bills \$22,846.22 and added to our net debt \$15,763.96 by a correction of the Penobscot Indian trust fund, a total of \$77,185.89.

Below is a statement of the income and expense for 1913, also receipts and payments. The income includes the receipts and tax assessment of 1913; the expense includes expense of 1913 bills and all appropriations carried forward as a liability. The difference between income and expense determines the increase or decrease of the State Debt.

The statement of receipts and payments show the actual cash received and actual payments made. The receipts including all taxes amounted to \$5,081,853.52, but of this amount \$303,560.00 came from sale of bonds for State Highway and \$102,188.10 from the receipts under Chapter 217 of the Public

Laws of 1913, a total of \$405,748.10. By this law all institutions pay their receipts to the State Treasurer to be used in payment of their bills and cannot be used like the receipts from railroads, savings banks and corporations to pay other State bills. The receipts from the Maine State Prison alone since July amounts to \$52,725.78. Deducting this \$405,748.10 from the total of \$5,081,853.52 leaves \$4,676,105.42 receipts as compared with other years on same basis.
