#### MAINE STATE PRISON

To His Excellency, Governor Oakley C. Curtis and the Executive Council:

GENTLEMEN: We submit to you our annual report for the year ending November 30th, 1916.

At the commencement of the prison year, December 1st 1915, there were confined in the prison two hundred and five (205) convicts; received during 1916 seventy-five (75); discharged at expiration of sentence seventeen (17); paroled by Governor and Board of Parole forty-four (44); pardoned by Governor and Council five (5); committed to Insane Hospital six (6); died one (1); escaped one (1); returned from Insane Hospital three (3); parole violators returned eight (8); making a total remaining in prison, December 1st, 1916, two hundred and seventeen (217).

Your Board of Inspectors believe that the condition of the prison under the control of Warden Waterhouse is as good as could be expected, considering the poorly ventilated cells and wholly inadequate facilities of so large an institution. It is hoped that the incoming legislature will continue the work of remodeling the prison already begun. We refrain from making any detailed recommendations for extensive repairs, as we believe that should be left wholly to the commission already created for that work.

There are some statutory laws which we believe should be enacted. One is that the men when committed should have a larger sum of money credited to them, especially those who have families, and some of their earnings should be paid over for the support of said families. When released a sufficient sum should be given them, not only to convey them to their homes, but enough to enable them to secure food and lodging for a short time until they may find honest employment. As it is now, on leaving the prison nearly every man is penniless. Is it any wonder that with no helping hand extended to him he again seeks his old habits?

In the administration of the several industrial departments the work shows a well balanced corps of managers, whose long years of service to the State enable them to carry along the work in each department in a most acceptable manner. For particulars relating to the several departments we would refer you to the table and report of the Warden.

For the many courtesies extended by the Warden, the Deputy Warden and the heads of the several departments on our visits to the prison we wish to extend our most sincere thanks.

### WARDEN'S REPORT

To His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable Council:

GENTLEMEN: I herewith submit my annual report for the preceding year. Contrary to the precedents of years past I omit making many recommendations for much needed changes in this Prison.

Your Prison Commission has started a grand reformation in remodeling this Prison, and I earnestly hope that funds be provided them to continue their good work, giving us at an early date a proper mess hall where the inmates can eat their meals like humans and not like animals in their cells as they do now; and good sanitary cells.

Your attention is respectfully invited to the financial condition of affairs here. We cannot sell carriages and sleighs to any great extent, and I am starting to make "Ford Auto Delivery Tops;" my first order being for a lot of two hundred, and on these I shall make for the State a fair margin of profit; thus employing the convicts in the carriage department. Owing to the excessive cost of broom corn for the last year the broom department does not show the gain I hoped for. The harness department is really behind orders, the demand for harness of the heavy type being in excess of the supply, though the price for harness leather is steadily advancing.

To Rev. Fr. Flynn is due more than thanks for his labors with the Catholics who are confined here; and I recommend that a measure be passed by the incoming Legislature to provide a suitable salary for a Catholic Chaplain.



#### REPORT OF ADVISORY BOARD IN THE MATTER OF **PAROLES**

To His Excellency, Oakley C. Curtis, Governor of Maine:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 60, Section 14, of the Public Laws of 1913, the Advisory Board in the Matter of Paroles herewith respectfully submits its report for the year ending Nov. 30, 1916.

Under the provisions of the Indeterminate Sentence Law, P. L. 1013. Chapter 60, applications for parole were received from 48 inmates of the State Prison and one inmate of the State School for Boys.

Paroles were granted by the Board to 41 applicants, and five applications were denied.

Paroles were granted by the Governor to two applicants in whose cases he had exclusive jurisdiction under the law.

Frank Moore, an inmate of the State School for Boys at South Portland, was granted parole by the Board. Moore's application was first received by the Board from an inmate of the State School.

Since the law became effective 149 prisoners have been released on parole. Of this number 35 have become parole violators.

#### PRISON PHYSICIAN'S REPORT

To His Excellency, the Governor, and Council of the State of Maine:

I hereby submit my annual report as physician to the Maine State Prison for the year 1916. I am glad to say there has been less acute sickness and of a less severe type than in the preceding year. During the winter season la grippe was far less prevalent and I have treated but one case of pneumonia, while stomach and bowel trouble of a disabling nature, except in one instance, has not existed. There was one case of appendicitis operated successfully by myself. Pulmonary tuberculosis, the great menace of penal institutions, has been present in but three cases, two of which were greatly relieved by open air treatment, suggested by myself and promptly provided for by the warden, tents being erected in the prison yard where they lived continuously, serving also the important purpose of isolation. I have one case of recent origin of the above disease attended by hemorrhage of the lungs.

There have been but two serious accidents during the year, one a fractured patella, in which case usefulness of the limb has been fully restored. A man in a momentary fit of insanity, leaped over the board fence of the prison yard, down into the quarry, a distance of sixty or seventy feet, sustaining a fractured femur, or thigh bone, at lower third, and internal injuries from which he may die. Eye troubles which have been greatly neglected in the past, in this institution, consisting usually of some form of visual defect and requiring the attention of a specialist are very common. And right here I would suggest that an appropriation be made by the State, sufficiently liberal to secure the services of a competent specialist and pay for suitable glasses.

I wish especially to submit to your attention that the teeth of the inmates of this institution are in a deplorable condition, but as no appropriation has ever been made for this purpose, I have been able to accomplish little, and would suggest most emphatically that such appropriation should be made. Surgical instruments and appliances in the hospital are of a very meagre nature and surgical operations and emergencies are liable to occur at any time, requiring the attention of a specialist and I would earnestly suggest that both the above conditions receive prompt attention in the way of suitable appropriations. I would also submit to you that a sum of money not less than \$500 (five hundred dollars) per year, be furnished by the State to provide suitable medicines and surgical materials, which are necessary to supply the inmates of this institution.

#### CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

To the Honourable Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN: In accordance with the requirements of the law I herewith submit the fifth annual report of my work as Chaplain of the Maine State Prison.

Since making my last report additional seats have been placed in the school room, so that twelve or more men may be accommodated at the same time, and an effort has been made to increase the work. I regard the school work as of great value to the men and hope the fullest possibilities may be realized. About forty men are receiving instruction in the common branches, reading, writing, arithmetic, and a few geography. Most of the men are eager to learn and make commendable progress.

A generous supply of reading matter is provided for the men. All who desire may draw two books each week from the library, a magazine is provided each week, and this, with the daily and weekly papers that are allowed, furnish an abundance of reading.

More than fifty daily papers are received and delivered each day. I wish to commend the ruling that has permitted the men to have daily papers, believing that, on the whole, the effect is good.

Mail privileges have been extended so that each man whose conduct is good may write as many letters as he desires. While this involves a large increase in the work of inspecting this mail the benefits to the men amply repay for the extra work.

The amount of first-class mail passing through my hands for inspection has increased more than three-fold since I began my work as Chaplain. In one week during the holiday season nearly 1100 pieces of first-class mail were received or sent.

Few men have applied for parole who did not receive some assistance from the Chaplain. This assistance has ranged from the giving information as to the process in bringing the case before the Board to the securing of First Friends and employment. I am under obligation to the Probation Officers in this and other States who have, on my recommendation, given needed help to

Another writes "I want to know if you can come up and go hunting with me?" These are but samples from a stack of letters I have received from the boys. Most of them are making good.

Religious services are conducted in the Chapel each Sunday. The third Sunday of each month is devoted to the Catholic service and the other services are Protestant.

This weekly gathering of men at the Protestant service presents a problem of no mean dimensions. In the list of men who attend are found those who favor different of the Protestant denominations, also Roman Catholics, Greek Catholics, Hebrews, Mohammedans, and men of no preferences. To arrange a service that will attract and interest such a gathering is a task for any parson, especially when it is not one Sunday but every Sunday, but I am able to boast that the members of my congregation do not attend because compelled, but from choice.

The difference in attendance since this ruling obtained is hardly noticeable. Good music in which the men have a part, short sermons on topics in which the men are interested, together with the loyalty of the men to the Chaplain is the only explanation I can give for this.

The person who hates work will hardly make a success in life, and yet I believe that in the average prison men work under conditions that tend to make them hate work. Here is a big problem clamoring for solution, and prison reform will be incomplete until this problem is solved.

For the discharged prisoner the only real asset he possesses is the measure of manhood he has been able to bring with him.

A definite plan to develop the spark of manhood each possesses will be a most desirable move in the treatment of men in prison.

So long as from 60% to 80% of discharged men return to a life of crime we must feel that we are making costly failures.

If it is true, as I have heard it reported, that in Japan only 1% of the discharged prisoners return to a life of crime it would seem that there is a solution of the problem, and that we have something to learn of the manner of the solution.

#### COUNTY JAILS

To His Excellency, Governor Oakley C. Curtis and the Executive Council:

GENTLEMEN: The members of the Board of Prison and Jail Inspectors have made the regular visits to the several jails in the State during the past year, as the law directs, and we are pleased to report that here has been marked improvement in discipline and sanitation. Several of the jails have made extensive repairs, Somerset County having expended over Eight Thousand Dollars, and is today one of the best, if not the best equipped in the State. We still believe that some arrangements should be made whereby the smaller jails, as well as some of the larger ones, could find suitable employment for the prisoners. In many of the jails the number of prisoners is so small that it would be difficult to arrange for employment without adding considerably to the cost of maintenance; but several of our jails have a population sufficiently large to lead one to feel that the work which might be done therein would be economically profitable. moral and physical benefit would result to those who were employed seems to be so certain that argument on the point appears unnecessary.

We are glad to be able to state that in several of the jails, more effort is now being made than formerly to give prisoners daily exercises in the open air. It is pleasing to be able to report, also, that in a number of jails, suggestions which have been made relative to improved sanitary conditions have been acted upon. These have involved very little expenditure, but have added materially to the healthfulness of the establishments and to the comfort of the prisoners. Improvement is to be noted in some instances, too, in the manner in which the food is served—seemingly a small matter, but one which has a moral effect and which may possibly react favorably upon the health of the prisoners.

For a detailed report of the individual counties we most respectfully refer you to the official reports of the Sheriffs of the several counties.
