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## FOREWORD.

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AUGUSTUS O. THOMAS.

The material for this report covering the school year July 1, 1916, to June 30, 1917, is collected by Mr. Glenn W. Starkey and his co-workers. At the close of the year 1915-16 Honorable Payson Smith, State Superintendent of Public Schools from 1907, resigned his position to accept the Commissionership of Education of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, a well earned professional and financial promotion. During the years of Dr. Smith's incumbency of the office as in previous administrations the state gave evidence of progressive leadership and spirit as is evidenced by the following constructive measures:

1. A law providing for the state certification of teachers.
2. A state agent for secondary schools and increased financial support.
3. Two agents for rural education.
4. A non-contributing pension law for worthy teachers.
5. Strengthening the compulsory education act.
6. The establishing of the common school fund and the equalization fund.
7. Legislation permitting medical inspection in schools.
8. Appropriations for the encouragement of industrial education.
9. Increasing the statutory length of the common school from twenty to thirty weeks.

On the first day of July, 1916, Mr. Glenn W. Starkey, former Chief Clerk and Deputy, and occupying the same position at the present time, became State Superintendent of Public Schools and carried on the work until the coming of the writer, July 1, 1917. During Mr. Starkey's incumbency of the office the legislature enacted the union supervision law, one of the far-reaching measures of the school code. Mr. Starkey and an able corps

of assistants carried on the work, cemented the good feeling and cooperative spirit of the profession, intensified the confidence of the public in the office of State Superintendent of Schools and maintained the high plane upon which the office has been conducted. The laws enumerated herein and the foundation legislation and educational movements inaugurated by former superintendents represent the clearing away and the road building necessary for the speeding up of education in war times and after. They represent also the foundation upon which the state will be enabled to move forward in its educational program to meet the ever increasing demands made upon our schools by the growing complexity of business, society and government, and to bring all of the children of the state equal educational opportunity with a view to increasing educational efficiency and the efficiency of the citizen in the state.

With the great war engaging the undivided attention of the country there is need of every individual and every group of individuals to do the utmost to uphold our nation and our national ideals even through the force of arms. The main purpose of the Department of Education for the immediate future shall be to safeguard the welfare of our schools in the essentials of education, keep up the standard of attendance, instruction and interest and at the same time participate in the great movements which have their foundation in war needs. It may also be said that the teaching of patriotism in an intensified form becomes a necessity of the times. It shall be our purpose also to prepare the way while the war is on to meet the emergencies which must come when peace prevails. We must get ready to accept the newer ideals and the newer conceptions of education.

The writer finds little to criticize and much to commend in what has already been accomplished. He hopes that the schools may keep pace with the advancement of the other great interests of the country and even lead the way. Sensational developments in education are bound to take place in the next few years. New standards must be set and new ideals reached.



## CHAPTER I.

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### GENERAL SURVEY.

GLENN W. STARKEY, Deputy State Superintendent of Public Schools.

The general statement which follows is made up from statistics gathered from returns made by municipal and school officers as required by law for the year ending July 1, 1917.

#### ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

The school census taken on April 1, 1917 and including all persons between the ages of five and twenty-one years in the State on that date shows an increase of 2,189 over the preceding year, or nearly double the increase of the year before. The number of pupils registered in the schools, however, shows a decrease of 1,211, and practically all of this loss was in rural schools. The average daily attendance shows a corresponding decrease and in addition to this the average length in days of the school year for the State as a whole was reduced slightly.

The above differences, while appearing to indicate a trend away from school, the causes for which might be variously assigned, nevertheless are relatively small and do not afford a valid basis for deductions unless it appears that these tendencies continue through a series of years. An examination of the statistics for several years preceding does not warrant the assumption that any decided trend is evident. Future returns must be depended upon to give a true interpretation of the situation.

A somewhat greater permanency in the teaching force is shown by the fact that in 1916 the total number of different teachers employed was 6,185 while in 1917 it was 6,124. There were only 441 male teachers employed in 1917 as against 516 in 1916. A constant tendency toward a decrease in the number of male teachers in elementary schools is evident.

The increase in the number of employed teachers who are graduates of normal schools is 178, but this gain still leaves us with more than one-half our schools in which the teachers have not received full professional training. An increase in the number who have taken advantage of the summer schools is an encouraging factor as showing a keener realization on the part of those who have not been able to attend the regular sessions of the desirability of securing at least a minimum of professional contact.

The average wages of female teachers again shows a slight advance but is limited to 29 cents per week, being \$11.42 in 1917 as against \$11.13 for 1916. Total expenditures for common school purposes advanced from \$2,407,220 in 1916 to \$2,481,292 in 1917, all of the increase coming from local funds. Building operations were largely curtailed. Only 30 new buildings were erected and the total expenditure for these did not exceed \$175,000.

A comparison of statistics for 1917 with those for 1907 shows that the ten year period has made available an increase of funds from the State treasury of \$978,861. A large part of this gain comes of course from the towns and cities themselves through an increase in the rate of State taxation for school support, and is coordinate with a decrease in the amount of funds available from local taxation, although the decrease is much smaller in comparison, the figures being \$1,098,707 in 1907 and \$961,966 in 1917. Thus while the funds distributed by the State have become greater by nearly one million dollars, the local funds have now practically regained the proportions reached before the State assumed the responsibility for assessing a materially increased tax upon all property.

#### SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

The report of the State agent for secondary education includes significant data showing an encouraging tendency toward increased enrollment in public schools of this grade. Emphasis is placed also upon the willingness of the people to meet the constantly growing obligation which each year places upon them to provide funds for effectively maintaining high schools for the larger number of students asking admission.

While in the aggregate the appropriations and expenditures evidence reasonably adequate financial support for these schools, yet an examination of the returns shows some notable exceptions. It is these instances which seem to indicate the ever present necessity of educational propoganda for the express purpose of establishing in the minds of the people the recognition of the principle that in schools as elsewhere a high quality of service can be obtained only through sufficient compensation and that inefficient service is dear at any price. Especially inexcusable is a low salary schedule and a consequently low grade of secondary school instruction in those towns in which the tax rate for this purpose is less than might easily be assigned without undue burden.

With the extension of the secondary school privilege to a much larger number of children than formerly its function has undergone a distinct transformation. It finds it necessary to make its appeal not so much to those who are destined to go on to college and thence into the so called learned professions, but to that larger and perhaps less easily satisfied group of boys and girls who are seeking training of a more general character or who are looking toward industrial and commercial careers of one kind or another. This means that not only must the high school facilities be present but that they shall be of such a nature as to afford a greater latitude of choice in courses. Otherwise the opportunity of the school to meet the demands of present day activities is lost and some other agency must be employed to do the work which the public school should properly perform.

To the end that these schools may fully satisfy the requirements of their students a change in the organization and content of courses is noted in the larger towns and cities, while the smaller schools are also called upon to give a similar readjustment most careful consideration in order to maintain their positions. In a degree, at least, the vocational idea must be developed and recognition given to the probable extension of such training to a large number of communities in the near future. The passage of the Smith-Hughes Act by Congress and the acceptance of its provisions by our Legislature opens the way to a reconstructive program in which the vocational idea will

unquestionably have a prominent place, but in which it is difficult at this time to forecast the extent to which this factor will influence our general educational policy.

#### SCHOOLS IN UNORGANIZED TOWNSHIPS.

While the report of the general agent for the schooling of children in the unorganized townships of the state does not show important changes in the general situation relative to these schools it does point out undesirable conditions which call for thoughtful consideration. For some time it has been recognized that the great strides which have been made in the past few years toward the improvement of physical conditions in school buildings throughout the state have placed those of the unorganized townships more than ever in an unfavorable light when it is remembered that these schools are state-supported and state-supervised. The difficulty arises from the fact that the law does not allow the state appropriation for the maintenance of the schools to be used for building purposes. A thorough investigation of the conditions will serve as a means of determining the extent to which it may be feasible to undertake the construction of buildings conforming to standard requirements and the most equitable division of the expense between the state and the township if such a division is advisable.

It seems probable that more than a mere amendment to the existing law will be required to make possible the changes which appear desirable not only in the matter of providing better housing conditions, but for other improvements in the general administration of the schools in the unorganized territory. Attention is called in the report of the general agent to several of the changes which may be considered and a close study of the situation during the coming year will be made with a view to making definite recommendations to the Legislature of 1919.

#### ACTS OF THE 1917 LEGISLATURE.

By far the most important Act relating to schools passed by the 1917 Legislature was that providing for the including of all the schools of the state under professional supervision. It stipulates that the State Superintendent of Public Schools shall, on

or before January 1, 1918, combine all towns, cities and plantations into unions for the employment of superintendents of schools except those cities or towns which have a total of more than fifty schools. The latter may employ a superintendent without combining with other towns. Unions existing under the present law are to be dissolved and reorganized when necessary, and all unions as arranged by the State Superintendent are to become effective July 1, 1918. All persons serving as superintendents either in a union of towns or in those allowed to have separate organization are required to hold state certificates of superintendence grade and to devote their entire time to the work of supervision.

Election of the superintendent is made by the joint committee of the union as under the present law, but one member from each town may, when authorized, act for other members from the same town and may cast the votes for all. Towns are required to appropriate their part of the salary of the superintendent as fixed by the joint committee.

The Act also provides definitely for the particular powers and duties to be assumed by the superintendent and fixes his responsibility in the employing of teachers as well as in the keeping of the records of the committees, the selecting of textbooks and various other matters relating to the administration of the schools.

Another Act provided for the registration of teachers by the State Superintendent for the purpose of making possible their recommendations for positions. Thus a state teachers' agency is virtually established in the office of the State Superintendent and teachers may enroll for a three year period upon payment of a registration fee of three dollars, no fee being charged for the services of the office when the teacher secures a position through its efforts.

An amendment to the school building law required the approval by the State Superintendent of Schools and the State Commissioner of Health of all plans for repairs to buildings in excess of five hundred dollars.

The high school tuition law was amended so that the maximum liability of towns not maintaining standard high schools is increased to \$36.00 for each pupil attending a secondary school

outside the town. The state aid in reimbursement is corresponding increased.

By another amendment towns maintaining high schools of B grade are liable for the tuition of pupils for the last two years of a standard course even though they may have taken the first two years of the work in a school of equal grade outside the town.

Recognition of kindergartens is contained in an act making legal the attendance of children four years of age in such schools. Upon the petition of parents of thirty children between four and six years of age a kindergarten is to be maintained unless the town votes otherwise.

The term "truant officer" was changed to "attendance officer" in all sections of the law in which it occurred, the purpose being to emphasize the supervising duties of such officers rather than the police duties. No change was made, however, in the actual powers and duties of these officers.

An act to take advantage of the provisions of the Smith-Hughes law providing federal aid to states for vocational education was accepted by the legislature and preliminary organization for this work has already been undertaken. The existing laws relative to the encouragement of industrial education in the state adapt themselves readily in most instances to the provisions of the federal law and it should be comparatively easy to work out a coordinate system which will preserve the lines of work already undertaken and at the same time extend the opportunity for vocational training.

#### STATE CERTIFICATION OF TEACHERS.

The certification of teachers has been carried on through the past year along the same lines which have obtained since the passing of the original statewide law in 1913. Examinations have been held at three different times in a large number of places throughout the state, the dates being the last Saturday in February, the last Saturday in June and the last Friday in August. In addition an opportunity to qualify by examination has been offered at the close of each of the state summer schools.

Temporary teaching permits to the number of 733 were issued by superintendents during the year showing that approxi-

mately one out of every eight teachers was employed on this temporary authority. This is a larger percentage than should prevail and efforts are being made to reduce the number. The growing scarcity of teachers, however, is a factor which must inevitably result in an increase rather than a decrease in the applications for such temporary certification unless it is possible, through a general program of publicity, to induce large numbers of those who, for one reason or another, have left teaching to return at least for a time to the ranks.

#### TEACHERS' PENSIONS.

Pensions were granted to eleven teachers retiring from service during the year ending July 1, 1918. The total number issued to that date was 221. There were six pensioners who died during the year, making a net increase of five in the total number on the active pension list.

#### EQUALIZATION FUND.

Apportionments amounting to \$47,375.00 were made from the Equalization Fund to 162 towns coming within the provisions of the law for the year 1917. These towns all showed a tax rate for common school purposes in excess of the state average of .00334 and a municipal tax rate in excess of the state average of .02604. In spite of a marked increase both in the average school rate and the average municipal rate the number of towns qualifying for apportionments showed a decrease of only two. These apportionments were made subsequent to the close of the school year which this report covers but are for the year 1917 and are included in Table IX of the Appendix.

## CHAPTER II.

### Reports of State Agents and Principals of State Normal and Training Schools.

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#### SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1917.

*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:*

DEAR SIR:—I herewith submit my report as Agent for Secondary Education.

*Secondary School Progress.* In spite of adverse conditions which obtained during the year 1916-1917 practically every item in the Comparative Statement for secondary schools (Table XIX) shows a distinct gain over the previous year. The total enrollment is six per cent larger than for 1916. The total expenditure for all secondary school purposes shows an increase of more than \$100,000 or nearly eleven per cent over that of the year before. The increase in the number of teaching positions has slightly more than kept pace with the additional pupils for the gain in this item is six and one-half per cent. These comparisons include the figures for both high schools and academies.

Turning to the high school statistics alone it is significant that the gain on a percentage basis was practically three times as great in the item of enrollment as for the academies. An increase of 1,100 pupils in the high schools over the year preceding in face of the stress of economic conditions, the demand for labor at high wages and other disturbing factors of the times is indicative of the confidence of our people in the service of the high school.

A comparison of fourth year classes shows that the number of pupils who finished their high school course is on the whole very satisfactory. Referring back over a longer period, namely, to 1911 when corresponding figures are first available, the number of pupils who entered high school in 1917 is greater by nearly thirty-eight per cent. The number in the fourth year class is greater than the corresponding class in 1911 by thirty-



three per cent showing a strong tendency for boys and girls in Maine to finish the high school course when once it is begun.

The increasing cost of high school might easily be a matter of concern were it not for the fact that a far greater number of young people are availing themselves of the opportunity afforded. During the seven years since the present classification of high schools has been in effect the total expenditure for instruction has risen from \$353,540 to \$547,152 yet due to the increase in attendance the cost per pupil has only advanced from \$30.25 to \$32.55. It should be noted that this item refers to the cost of instruction only.

These figures are sufficient to show the confidence of the people of the state in their high schools. Measured in terms of support and sacrifice occasioned by keeping boys and girls in school so generally throughout the four years course such confidence is highly gratifying to those engaged in the administration of these schools.

*Attendance.* There is, however, one constantly recurring question with reference to high school attendance. In spite of the satisfactory showing as a whole a study of classes reveals the fact of very considerable losses. For last year the second year class was smaller by 23.3% than it was when it entered school the year before. In other words nearly one-fourth of the pupils had left school within the first year. A loss of 15.4% between the second and third years and of 12.6% between the third and fourth years are but slightly less significant. The mortality is far too high. It can be reduced only by a thorough study of each school individually and carefully planned measures for saving waste. Every boy or girl who leaves the high school means a distinct economic loss to the community and to the state. Every high school may conserve the individual in several ways; by efficient instruction saving the pupil from discouragement and failure which are among the most common reasons for leaving school, by making the aims and content of instruction reach the needs and interests of the pupils; for lack of interest based on lack of appreciation of the pupil's needs turns many from school, and lastly by maintaining courses with distinct vocational aim. These measures cannot be emphasized too strongly.

It is, however, encouraging to find teachers turning to the supervision of the study of pupils as an effective means for reducing failures and increasing self-reliance and successful prosecution of work. This plan must be carried much further and used much more generally. It involves a longer school day, higher skill on the part of the teacher and probably a larger teaching force but if it results in keeping boys and girls in high school or in eliminating failures it will be worth all that it costs.

Adaptation of subject matter to interest and needs is receiving very great attention on the part of leaders in secondary education but many teachers are slow in making their work of this practical nature. College training tends to theory, generalization or narrow specialization. Lack of experience with practical affairs handicaps many teachers and failure to study the pupil's point of view results in unwise choice of materials.

Perhaps the largest phase of the problem is that of vocational training of the right kind. Young people will stay in school at the cost of hard work and sacrifice when they feel that its benefits are real and tangible. It is right that they should expect such returns for effort and time. The high school is primarily the place for this beginning though not for the completion of vocational training.

*Field Work for the Year.* The work of the agent for secondary education was concerned for the most part with the larger high schools. The length of the visit in most instances was a half day but considerably longer visits were made in several schools. In a large number of cases the visit was followed by a meeting of the teachers for the purpose of conference on points of interest. A number of conferences of this kind were attended by the teachers from neighboring schools. A consistent effort was made to emphasize the improvement of study habits of pupils and the importance of relating classroom work to life interests and activities. The visit was made constructive in every possible way.

In addition to informal meetings of this kind conferences for teachers were conducted at several of the county meetings along somewhat similar lines.

*Commercial Courses.* The visiting of the larger schools gave an opportunity for special study of certain special topics. Among them was the commercial course. This course was

found to occupy a place of considerable importance, registering as it appears, nearly one-fourth of the entire student body of all schools. It is the one distinctly vocational course and there is evidence that it is notably successful in its work. For the sake of a more thorough study of the organization of the course in various schools a questionnaire was sent out. Through this means the scope and method of the work and the facilities at the command of the schools were examined in some detail.

Among the outstanding features of the courses noted in visiting or through reports was the strong tendency to make the clerical work the most significant. Very few if any of the schools appeared to be laying stress upon preparation or training for ordinary business activity. On the contrary office training with emphasis upon bookkeeping, stenography and type-writing were occupying the attention of the teachers. It appeared to the visitor that some emphasis ought to be laid upon what is termed the "service side" of business or merchandising. This opens a practically new field and a large one. It concerns the organizing of business large and small from the farm and general store to the department store and wholesale house, with selling and buying goods, advertising, transportation and allied topics. It is obviously distinct from the conventional course though touching that course at several points.

The demand for trained salespeople is rapidly increasing. The opportunities for promotion are quite as good as from the clerical side of business. The service which such courses may render especially to boys who may be later engaged in general business promises to be distinctly greater than the training of the highly specialized clerical course.

A study of the commercial courses emphasized the importance of studying the community and its needs prior to the introduction of this or any vocational course, and furthermore the adaptation of the course itself to the special needs of the pupils. Thus while most of the courses were found in towns of considerable size with at least a limited demand for the product several were maintained in towns in which there was no demand whatever for young people with clerical training. In these towns either the course was introduced without due consideration or it was not so organized as to meet the real needs of the pupils.

The principal criticism upon these courses beyond the above comments upon the aims is upon the limited facilities especially in the smaller towns, the lack of office machinery, the difficulties of securing pre-graduation practice of an effective kind and the limited training of teachers. Specifically unsupervised typewriting is extremely wasteful in all respects; pupils should know something of the adding machine and filing case before entering an office; they should take dictation from someone other than the teacher. Teachers of commercial work should have training as broad in all respects as those of other subjects. It should be measured by not less than two years of study subsequent to the secondary school.

It is a pleasure to say that as a whole there appears to be no department of the schools where more serious and thorough work is done or where a more earnest enthusiastic attitude on the part of teachers and pupils is to be found.

*School Libraries.* An attempt was made to press the claims of the high school library. Superintendents of schools were asked to report upon the available material and special letters were written as the case appeared to demand. In many instances these letters were used in connection with the superintendent's report in his recommendations for appropriations. Reports and later investigations show that a very general response was made. There is perhaps no one phase of high school education which has a greater opportunity.

The time should come shortly when there will be at the service of the state a trained librarian for schools whose work will be to develop the school library, instruct teachers, select material and direct instruction in the use of the library. Meanwhile towns should make liberal appropriations for the purpose of furnishing schools with suitable material.

*The Large High Schools.* The larger high schools of the state appear to the visitor as a whole in good condition. The teaching staff is competent and fairly permanent. The men and women in charge of schools or departments are progressive, alert to the demands of the times and anxious to meet conditions effectively. A considerable number are taking regular summer courses and a large group of principals from the large high schools were in attendance at the Castine Conference. A strong professional spirit is clearly evident throughout these schools.

Under these conditions I have urged that experimentation be undertaken in various lines of educational procedure such as supervised study, special courses in general mathematics, measurements of progress, studies of ranks and ranking and like topics. These studies can be made successfully in the larger schools. Such schools should be to a much larger extent laboratories where educational experiments may be tested thoroughly and the results passed on.

There is very great need of better facilities in a number of the larger towns and cities. Several of the latter have buildings which were adequate and built according to standards a generation or two ago but with the great increase in enrollment and present demands in high school education no longer serve the needs of the community. The city of Portland has risen to the situation in a splendid manner and has made provision for a high school plant which will have few if any peers in the East. Meanwhile the high school has been working under very serious difficulties. Crowded conditions made it necessary for East Livermore to build and the result is an admirably suited building for a Junior-Senior high school ready for occupancy in the fall of 1917. Sanford provided funds for a splendid high school building to be erected for occupancy in 1917-18. Auburn has recently relieved a serious congestion by transferring the first year class to the Webster building where a Junior high school was organized. High school efficiency is very seriously impaired by lack of suitable building in several cities notably Gardiner, South Portland, Rockland, Belfast, Calais and Brewer. These cities have good high schools but programs might be broadened and work done more efficiently were modern buildings provided.

In most of these buildings the essential requirement of proper lighting, ventilation and even of sanitation are far below standard and must be a constant menace to health. The advisability of extensive building programs for the immediate future might be seriously questioned but for the importance to the nation as well as to the individual of effective high school training.

The extension of vocational courses in the large schools seems particularly desirable. While in general the attendance is good in point of numbers the ratio of high school pupils to all pupils attending school is distinctly low in several of the

manufacturing cities and towns. How far well organized industrial courses would remedy this condition it is difficult to say. But a study of the high school courses in several of these places shows that very little of a vocational nature beyond the commercial course is attempted. It is also characteristic of these communities that the amount provided for high school education is in general lower than the average for towns or cities of approximate valuation and distinctly below that of the small towns throughout the state. The introduction of effective industrial or vocational education should be taken under serious consideration by school officers in the larger towns and cities throughout the state.

## RURAL SCHOOLS.

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*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:*

DEAR SIR: I submit herewith a summarized account of my activities for the year ending July 1, 1917.

### ADMINISTRATIVE WORK.

*Extension of Professional Supervision.* Under existing legal provisions whereby towns may vote to authorize their superintending school committees to unite with others for the employment of professional superintendents of schools it has been necessary to encourage this action and give publicity to the good results usually thus secured. This has been done by means of the preparation and distribution of printed material, correspondence, conferences and talks at town meetings and public meetings. Because of the fact that many committees found it difficult to complete arrangements after authorization had been given it has been necessary to give assistance to joint committees and to attempt readjustments.

*Legislation for State-wide Supervision.* For the promotion of legislation to provide for state-wide professional supervision material was gathered and tabulated, maps prepared, towns visited for conferences and the study of conditions, and citizens and legislators were interviewed. A bill was drafted and discussed with a committee of superintendents. The provisions of the bill in its final form as presented to the legislature were described and defended at the hearing before the legislative committee on education. Briefs and material showing the need of such legislation were prepared for the use of legislators. This bill was enacted on April 6th.

*Equalization Fund.* The equalization fund, to the amount of \$50,000 annually, is distributed to towns wherein the rates of taxation for common school purposes and for all municipal purposes are in excess of the averages of those rates for the State. Tabulations have been prepared, rates determined, reports re-

ceived and studied and recommendations made to the State Superintendent of Schools relative to the amounts and purposes of the sums so apportioned. Apportionments were made to 156 towns and plantations. The averages of the rates were as follows: for common school purposes .003; for municipal purposes .025.

*Improvement of Physical Conditions.* The campaign on this important phase of school improvement has continued with special efforts for the improvement of buildings and equipment in rural communities and particularly for the adoption of programs whereby at least one building each year may be placed in standard condition. Aid from the equalization fund has assisted materially in this work. A statistical survey of existing conditions of arrangement in one-teacher schools has been made. This covered 1,438 such schools in 280 towns and included data on new construction, state of repair, lighting arrangement, means of heating and ventilating, arrangement of wardrobes and blackboards, condition of equipment, sanitary provisions and school grounds. Improvements have been encouraged through the preparation of printed material, working blue prints, correspondence, conferences and sketches and plans for particular projects. Legislation was prepared to provide for the approval of plans for extensive repairs and remodeling by the State Superintendent of Schools and the State Commissioner of Health. On the passage of this legislation forms for application for approval and minimum standards were prepared.

*Legislation on the Distribution of State School Funds.* A bill to provide for the distribution of state common school funds on the basis of aggregate attendance was prepared and introduced by the State Grange. At the request of the committee in charge assistance was given in framing this bill and in preparing tabulations showing the probable effect of the changes proposed. Information and figures relative to the application of this proposed law were furnished to legislators and others in favor of and opposed to the measure.

*Teachers' Meetings.* A schedule of the meetings of the county teachers' associations was arranged and assistance was given to the association officers on the preparation of programs for these meetings. Several conferences and local teachers' meetings were also arranged.



*Summer Schools for Teachers.* Advertising material, consisting of booklets, placards and circular letters, was prepared and distributed to encourage attendance at the state summer schools for teachers.

*Professional Improvement.* Material designed to interest teachers in improvement through professional study has been prepared and the wider use of teachers' traveling libraries and the National Rural Teachers' Reading Circle has been encouraged.

*Rating Rural Schools.* Forms for use in field work in the visitation of schools have been prepared and tested. These are in the form of rating sheets or score cards and give a complete record of the conditions observed.

*Reports.* Monthly reports of office and field activities have been prepared for the General Education Board and the State Superintendent of Schools. Frequent reports on conditions observed and recommendations for improvement have been sent to the school officers of towns visited.

#### FIELD WORK.

Visits have been made to 117 towns within the year. These visits have been for a variety of purposes and have often combined two or more errands. A division of the field work might be made as follows:

For general visitation and criticism of schools—28 towns.

For visitation of schools combined with special investigations of conditions of buildings, supervision, organization, attendance, etc.—30 towns.

For complete study or survey of some special feature—2 towns.

For conferences with superintendents, local and joint committees and others, sometimes combined with the visitation of schools—27 towns.

For county, union and local teachers' meetings—24 towns.

For public meetings, including granges, clubs, church associations, annual town meetings and those arranged in the interests of schools—35 towns.

## CONCLUSION.

A review of the year's work indicates a most encouraging condition of rural schools. With the extension of professional supervision and the expert direction of the teacher in the more remote schools the quality of instruction is being much improved. The active interest in school building improvement in a number of towns forecasts better conditions for the health and comfort of the child in the rural school. With full time professional supervision assured for all of the communities of the State a period of steady improvement is before us.

DEAR SIR: The special lines of work undertaken by me in the interests of rural education during the year July 1, 1916—July 1, 1917 are indicated by the following outline:

I. Community interest and support through active cooperation with:—

- a. The Grange.
- b. Women's Clubs.
- c. Parent Teachers' Associations.
- d. School Improvement Leagues.
- e. Community meetings for educational purposes.

II. Professional rural school work through:—

- a. Personal visitation of individual village and rural schools in company with the superintendent of schools.
- b. County and State teachers' meetings.
- c. Local teachers' meetings.
- d. Individual conferences with teachers and superintendents.

- e. Correspondence with teachers and superintendents
- f. Aids sent out from the office.
- g. Preparation of articles for magazines and newspapers. Preparation of special pamphlets to be issued by the State Department of Education.

NOTE: "Suggestions for Parent Teachers' Associations," "School Improvement League," and "Suggestions for the Play Hour," are three special bulletins prepared by me and issued by State Department of Education.

III. Teacher training instruction in academies:—

- a. With the aim of discussing with instructors and pupils of these courses practical rural school methods and present rural school conditions in Maine.
- b. Assisting in perfecting the organization of such courses in order that they may assist in supplying teachers for the local rural schools.

IV. General activities not covered by the above comprising

- a. Monthly reports issued to the General Education Board and to the State Superintendent of Public Schools
- b. Cooperation with all other agents of the state department in branches of school work not in my particular line.

In carrying out the lines of work indicated by the above outline I have been active according to the following summary:—

Since 1898, one of the principal organizations in the state of Maine in connection with the rural schools has been the School Improvement League. Since my appointment as one of the rural school agents, the School Improvement League work has been in my special charge. I am glad to report that this valuable organization continues to do a very great work in the betterment of rural school conditions and is at present a strong factor in the rural schools of the state. In the past year three thousand membership badges have been issued to school children which means that approximately that number of children have taken up the League work in the year. I have written to the superintendents of schools in connection with this work and have received definite replies from one-hundred-eight. In addition to these letters, I have written one-hundred and sixty-seven personal letters to teachers and children concerning League work, besides the material sent out of a more formal nature.

In submitting this report, I wish to speak especially of the splendid spirit of cooperation which the school superintendents and teachers of the state have shown wherever my work has brought me into their towns. The people of Maine, also, are showing a sincere interest in improving our rural schools and I believe much progress is being made by the schools and citizens working definitely together for the betterment of these schools.

## SCHOOLING IN UNORGANIZED TOWNSHIPS.

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AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1917.

*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:*

DEAR SIR:—The act providing for schooling in the unorganized townships of Maine was passed by the legislature of 1895. This was the first provision made by the state for extending to the children of this extensive territory the privilege of free and open education in accordance with the long established policy of the state. All statutes previous to this date providing for elementary education related to the units of cities, towns and plantations with their machinery for local government and whose school officials were intrusted with and made responsible for the administration of their school affairs in accordance with the provisions of the law. The extension of school privileges to the unorganized townships made necessary a different plan of administration for these distinctive sections of the state with no form of local government or officials. It was, therefore provided that the provisions of this law should be administered directly under the charge of the State Superintendent of Public Schools who was authorized to appoint school agents for the purpose of performing the usual duties of school officials and such special duties as were required by this statute.

This law has now been on our statute books for over twenty years with changes and additions from time to time and it has resulted in providing an opportunity for education to hundreds of boys and girls, most of whom otherwise would have grown up in illiteracy. The privileges offered have been gradually improved and extended and the experience gained by those in charge of this special work has made possible a better and more effective administration of this law from year to year. It has been found, however, that certain limitations in the act and inconsistencies with other statutes have prevented the administration to the needs of this territory as effectively and equitably as desirable or to the ultimate financial interests of the

state. It seems therefore, that the time has arrived when such changes should be made either by a complete revision of this statute or by an entirely new act for the purpose as to remedy these apparent defects. Like many statutes as first drawn it has been found that some of its provisions are not entirely clear and workable, others conflict with related statutes and some limit the benefits of the act in an unjust manner not intended. The following are some of the most important points for consideration.

This act provides that the expense for the schooling of children in any unorganized township shall first be paid from the interest on any lands reserved fund due such township from the state and from per capita taxes, and if this is not sufficient any further expense shall be paid from the appropriation for the schooling of children in unorganized townships. This provision has not been found practicable or at least workable for the reason that the state has never made a sufficiently large appropriation for the payment of interest on lands reserved to cover the expenditure for the schooling of children in townships with such interest due, which in many cases in the past has amounted to thousands of dollars. In any case the expense is borne directly by the state and from whatever appropriation paid the final cost is now the same. Formerly it was an advantage to the state to pay as many bills as possible from the appropriation for the interest on lands reserved as by so doing the amount of the interest due any township, for which bills had been thus paid, was proportionately reduced and left that much less for the state to pay the township should it become organized. However, the law relating to interest on lands reserved was changed by the last legislature so that this interest no longer accumulates to the credit of the townships and becomes payable on their organization, but is instead credited each year to the state school funds. The use of this appropriation for paying bills for the schooling of children in unorganized townships is, therefore, no longer an advantage to the state and as this special provision can in fact only be partially observed and causes considerable extra work in accounting for different departments, its continuance in the law would seem of doubtful value if not objectionable.

This act provides that a tax of forty cents (\$ .40) shall be assessed upon each of the inhabitants of an unorganized township where school privileges are furnished. The evident purpose of this provision was to cause the people to feel that they were contributing somewhat toward the support of the education of their children the same as in organized places and not for the purpose of raising funds as the tax is much too small to be of any material assistance on this account. It has been found very difficult to collect this tax satisfactorily on account of the many complications which naturally arise in attempting to collect such a small tax of this kind. It is also somewhat doubtful as to any beneficial effects which have resulted from the endeavor to advance in a small way the wholesome principle of contributory support. Taking these facts into consideration it would seem that the wisdom of continuing such a provision in its present form in the statutes might be seriously questioned.

While the intention of this act was evidently to make the provision for school privileges in the state as nearly universal as possible yet one of its clauses defeated that purpose from reaching the ideal. This clause provides that school privileges may be furnished when there are two or more children in any unorganized township between the ages of five and twenty-one years and hence when there is but one child between these ages in a township, this child is not entitled to the benefit of schooling at public expense. Numerous cases have already arisen in which a child has thus been deprived of free educational privileges and it would seem that there should be no technicality in the law by which any child of school age wherever living in the unorganized territory should be denied the benefits of this act.

Usually one of the essential requirements for a school is a suitable school building and this has always been and today is one of the most difficult problems in connection with the unorganized township system. While the law does not clearly limit the use of the various appropriations from which the system is supported to specific items of expenditure, it has always been the policy of the state to require any community desiring a school to first provide a school building. This policy has further been necessary because the available funds would permit the expenditure of but a very small amount, if anything, on this account and at the same time pay the necessary expenses for

the maintenance of the system. The uncertainty also in many cases as to the permanency of a community has made it seem inadvisable to make any expenditure of this nature. The people of the unorganized townships have, therefore, provided their own school buildings usually at the expense of those most directly interested and as there have not been any minimum requirements the result is what might be expected. Many so-called school buildings are entirely unfit for that purpose and the use of these buildings decreases to no small extent the efficiency of the schools maintained therein to say nothing of transgressing upon the recognized rights of pupils to proper conditions for their physical and moral welfare in school buildings in which they are required by law to pass a large part of the time of their childhood. In some cases the communities are amply able to erect a suitable school building, in others the population is largely transient and the people are consequently not interested, in still others the people are too few in numbers or too poor to render any substantial assistance and in all cases there is no local organization through which the necessary steps may be legally taken to assess persons or property for this purpose.

It, therefore, seems that the only solution of the problem lies either under existing statutes in a change of policy by the state together with an adequate increase in the appropriations, or such needed changes or additions to the present laws as to require at least as good school buildings for the unorganized townships as the minimum requirements fixed by the state for towns and plantations together with some provision for providing such buildings. It is not the purpose of this report to make definite suggestions as to what might be the nature of new legislation, but it may be said that in those communities of a permanent nature, which are likely to become organized at some future date, school buildings might be provided with a provision for reimbursement to the state for such buildings whenever the township should become organized; in communities of a temporary nature or whose permanency seems doubtful portable buildings, very satisfactory types of which can now be purchased at reasonable cost, could be provided and moved to other communities whenever necessary.



In any event the providing of suitable school buildings for all of the unorganized townships would not prove burdensome if the expense were properly placed and should not the hundreds of boys and girls of this large section of the state be given the same privileges and the same favorable conditions for education as far as practicable as those of the larger communities? And what could be more convincing evidence of the educational progress and enterprise of our state than to find in each of these communities where a school is maintained an attractive school building of proper construction, well arranged, fully equipped and with the American flag flying aloft proclaiming the spirit of freedom and equality for all children of all the people where ever found in our commonwealth?

Such changes as already mentioned together with others of perhaps equal or greater importance would do much toward making possible a great improvement in the unorganized township school system while at the same time better protecting the financial interests of the state. The proposing of such changes has often been considered and it would seem that there could be no advantage in delaying action longer. It means much to many children who will be numbered among future citizens of the state and its importance can perhaps be best emphasized by calling attention to the size and extent of this distinct part of the state school system.

The unorganized territory of Maine covers between fourteen and fifteen thousand square miles or about forty-seven per cent of the area of the state and extends into eleven of the sixteen counties. Included within its boundaries as distinct units are 354 full sized townships, 7 gores, 7 strips, 2 tracts, 2 surpluses, 2 points, 1 patent, 1 peninsular and 145 islands. This territory is somewhat larger in extent than the states of Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut combined. It contains much of the most valuable natural resources of the state and supports some of our largest and most important industries. Its valuation as fixed by the last report of the state assessors was \$53,649,062. As a unit of direct school administration it is probably one of the largest in area in the country.

The number of townships in which school privileges are provided of course varies from year to year but this number is usually about eighty. The past year 54 schools were maintained in 48 townships and in 25 other townships children were other-

wise provided with schooling, either by transportation or boarding in adjoining townships. The schools vary in size from two pupils to an enrollment of forty or sometimes even fifty. A minimum school year of thirty weeks is maintained. Every endeavor is made to engage the best teachers possible and salaries considerably higher than usually offered in rural schools are paid. Many of the teachers are normal graduates and continue in the unorganized townships from year to year. The expense for maintaining this system is between \$25,000 and \$30,000 a year. The principal items of expenditure are for teachers' salaries which includes board and frequently traveling expenses; conveyance, board and tuition of common school pupils; tuition of secondary school students; fuel and janitor service; textbooks, school apparatus and supplies; and agents' services and expenses. Detailed statistical information will be found in the table for unorganized townships in the appendix of this report.

It is the duty of the General Agent for Unorganized Townships to exercise a general supervision over this system. His position is somewhat in the nature of that of a superintendent of schools although a part of his duties are more as business agent of the state. An endeavor is made by him to visit every unorganized township where school privileges are being provided at least once a year and the more accessible places at more frequent intervals, not only to inspect schools but also for the purpose of becoming thoroughly familiar through first hand knowledge of all conditions affecting the schooling of children in these places. Usually a local school agent for each township is appointed each year by the state superintendent upon the recommendation of the general agent but occasionally one local agent serves for several townships. There are usually about sixty of these local agents and they attend to certain details in their respective townships such as the making of the annual returns relative to the number of inhabitants, school population and general school conditions, assessing and collecting the per capita taxes and approving bills, but practically everything is done under directions from the state office from which all school matters of this territory are administered.

My recommendation of the past two years that the Household Arts work could be better done in the two years of the regular course with an additional year of study, called the Advanced Course, is still confirmed in my mind as the best preparation for teachers of Domestic Science. Its practical operation, however, seems to be delayed by the failure of graduates of Maine normal schools to take up the third year. Only five presented themselves this year and only three finished the work. On the other hand, we have to limit registration in the two-year course to an entrance class of twenty in order to prevent more students entering upon that training than openings to teach these subjects will warrant.

The urgent demand of a year ago was additional dormitory room. You gentlemen of the board of trustees recognized the demand and urged the legislature to make appropriation for a new dormitory. The appropriation, however, was so small (\$20,000) as to make it impracticable to attempt anything until more funds are provided. I regret that the legislature should consider our request for appropriation in excess of our actual needs.

The appropriation for the upkeep of this property has been hardly sufficient to preserve it at highest efficiency. Our request of the legislature for about \$3,500 was pared down to \$1,000, which makes necessary in these two years the strictest economy and some sacrifice.

The teaching staff suffered but one loss at the expiration of this year. Miss Gladys E. Smith, B. S., teacher in the Household Arts department, has accepted an important position in Cornell University.

During the year the large attendance made necessary the employment of extra help, and Miss Doris Wilder of Augusta was employed as part-time assistant in gymnasium instruction. The prospect is, the school continuing as large as at present, another full time teacher will have to be employed.

Agnes P. Mantor has resigned and accepted a position in Skowhegan, her home town. She has been a very efficient and valuable teacher, and we are all sorry to have her leave. Miss Bessie S. Clark of the class of 1916 has been elected to fill this vacancy.

Marion D. Russell has also resigned and Minnie Mabel Harding of the Class of 1917 takes her place. Miss Russell has done excellent work and given universal satisfaction.

*Agriculture.* This department has been in charge of William D. Hall who has created much interest in the study. A large school garden has been cultivated which has been self sustaining. The material has been of such a nature that it could be used in the dormitory. We regard this as one of the most important branches of our school work.

*Manual Training.* All the students of the normal school have had work in this department and the village grammar school pupils have also had the advantage of the course, as well as the children in the training schools, making in all about 250 different pupils. The work has been very satisfactory.

There can be no doubt but what the establishment of the manual training course has been of great advantage to the school.

*Household Arts.* It is seldom that a school has the advantage of so efficient a teacher as Mary S. Coombs and we all felt keenly the loss when she resigned. She was a college graduate, a fine scholar, and thoroughly familiar with the work in household arts.

Miss E. Lucile Royal, who obtained her training at the University of Maine was elected to fill this vacancy, and her work has been very satisfactory. She was highly recommended by her teachers in the college and by others who knew her, and has shown that she was not recommended too highly.

*The Library.* There are about 2,500 books in the school library, and they are in constant use by the students. There should be money appropriated to constantly increase the numbers. There is no other factor connected with the school of greater advantage. The books are catalogued in a modern manner and the students are taught how to use a library. A course of twelve lessons in Children's Literature is given and grades III to VI come for a few simple lessons in the care and treatment of books.

*Training Department.* As to this department, I think I can not do better than to repeat what I said two years ago. Every year for the past ten years the amount of work the students have been required to do has been increased until now each student spends twelve weeks of the senior year in the training schools. During this time the student acts as an assistant teacher, assisting in all the work of the room. This is a very satisfactory plan.

*Dormitory.* If there is any one else who can manage a dormitory in a more economical and efficient manner than William D. Hall, I do not know where to find him. I thought my management for the two years I had charge of it was fine but it was far behind the success of the past two years. Board has been low—only \$3.75 at present, and the cost of living very high, but the boarders are all in good health and spirits, and there are resources on hand amounting to over \$400.00. We have had an ideal cook and an efficient matron.

*The Special Class.* This class numbers 57. Their teaching experience averages 10 years. There are 31 who are graduates of academies and 26 who are graduates of high schools.

They have taught in 172 different towns, and in six different states.

Their work has been fine, and their attitude toward the teachers and other pupils has been remarkable.



They voted unanimously that the class parts should all be given by the other members of the class.

They were already successful teachers when they entered, and therefore well prepared to take the normal course in one year.

*Discipline.* The utmost harmony has prevailed among teachers and pupils during the year, and there has been no occasion to correct pupils in discipline.

*The School Grounds.* Miss Jellison and her students have kept the school grounds in fine shape this year as last.

I recommend for graduation the 84 persons named below, the largest class ever graduating from this school.

IV. Our school library is extensively used by the teachers and students. The number of bound volumes reported last year was 1,683. The present number is 1,785. Many of these books are so badly worn that they ought to be replaced, and many more new books should be added than the funds available at the present time make possible.

V. From the Industrial Arts course eleven young men were graduated. This number was too small to fill all the calls that came to the Normal School for Industrial Arts teachers. The number available for teaching was lessened by the enlistment of three of them for service in the army.

VI. According to the last report of the United States Commissioner of Education, Maine graduated one student from the normal schools for every 2,604 inhabitants. According to that same report few other states in the Union had so large a pro rata number of graduates. However, this proportionately large number of graduates falls far short of supplying the number of trained teachers this state needs. A more intense campaign for new students sustained by a more nearly adequate remuneration for teaching is necessary before Maine can hope to have a trained teacher for every school. Nothing less than this should be the goal of our state educational forces.

*The Grounds.* Some definite plans for laying out the grounds should be made before any more construction work is done. The roads to both buildings, like the historic streets of Boston, have followed cow paths, and it is not possible to drive to the front door of the O'Brien House, the dormitory, or the school building. During the time of deep snow it is impossible to enter the front door of any one of these buildings from a team without a long walk through snow.

To obviate the above difficulties, the sidewalk on O'Brien Avenue should be changed to the other side of the street, the street in front of the dormitory should be re-opened, and it should pass out to Dublin Street in front of the school building. The present driveway back of the dormitory should be discontinued as a public street.

The small building now used for an ice house and store room should be moved back to the corner of the lot, placed on a good foundation, and painted. Some repairs will be needed on the outside before the painting is done.

The O'Brien house needs a cellar drain and painting, as well as new floors. This house was built in 1814 and needs only a little work to make it very comfortable.

*The Wing.* The last Legislature appropriated \$20,000, available in 1918, for building a wing on our school building. This wing will contain an assembly and study room on the first floor. Such a room is much needed at the present time, for



there is no study room large enough to seat the entire school. A part of the basement will be needed for a physical laboratory. By changing the position of the physical laboratory from the place it now occupies and by using the present laboratory for a coal room, it will be possible to fill the coal room from the back of the building. The present coal bin can be filled only from the front side of the building and is too small to hold a year's supply, but will do for an ash-bin; under the present arrangements it is necessary to deposit these ashes outside the building and they become very unsightly before the winter is over.

*Manual Training and Domestic Science.* No departments of the school work offer greater worth than manual training and domestic science. The domestic science is now housed in a beautiful room with everything new, clean, and sanitary, and up-to-date. Accommodations for twenty students working at once enable the work to be done expeditiously and thoroughly. We need the removal of partition between two rooms on second floor to make an adequate room for sewing classes, tables for sewing room, storage and exhibition case for same, chairs for same, umbrella racks and strapping with hooks for hanging garments in back hall on second floor of dormitory for use of classes in domestic science, refrigerator, buffet or side board for dining room, additional linen (one cloth, one dozen napkins) for dining room.

The manual training room is not large enough to accommodate the classes, as there is chance for only fifteen students to work at once. We need a manual training room large enough for twenty-five benches, a separate room, a band saw, and a lathe. The room occupied at present was marked "Kindergarten" on the architect's plans and has not enough floor space, wall space, nor blackboard space. A lathe and band saw are urgently needed and would add to the efficiency of the department.

*Music.* The various musical organizations of the school aid much in the school work. The male quintet, the girls' glee club, the orchestra, and the mixed chorus of the whole school furnish many entertainments for the school, for our visitors, and for the town people in general. The school orchestra was maintained at its usual high standard of work during the year. The male quintet deserves more than a passing notice. The

boys' work compared favorably with that of college glee clubs. With the assistance of Mr. Hayford, the reader, the boys have furnished entertainment for many local gatherings, besides going out of town several times in the interest of the school.

*Library.* The school library which was established in 1912 has been of greatest use and profit to the students, and while there are about 400 volumes on the shelves yet there is not a sufficient and complete number of reference books. We need more works on literature, supplementary reading, children's literature, poems and novels, lives of statesmen and literary men, English history, and folklore. We need also books on painting, drawing, and music. If a certain sum could be set aside for supplying our reading table with a small but choice selection of current literature, the work of all the classes would be made more interesting and vital.

*Gymnasium.* A gymnasium is greatly needed. At present, the assembly room is used, but it is not suitable for many forms of exercise. Moreover, the recitation rooms are under the assembly room, and the noise makes it very hard to conduct classes below.

For the physical training of the normal school and model school students a real gymnasium is essential, preferably in the basement,—certainly not on the second floor. It should be equipped with ladders, rings, Swedish boom, horizontal bar, parallel bars, horse, Indian clubs, wands, dumb-bells, basket ball goals, and the apparatus for taking physical tests at the beginning and at the close of the year. It should be fitted with lockers and showers. This room should have a couch, first aid material, and conveniences for making students comfortable when suffering from accident or sickness.

Students need a chance to exercise in doors during inclement weather and in the winter months, but in the spring and fall the exercise should be taken out of doors. This would be done spontaneously by the pupils if two good tennis courts could be provided. For the model school children we should have a certain amount of playground apparatus, the kind and quantity to be determined by the amount of playground supervision possible. There should be swings, teeters, toboggan slides, parallel bars, and vaulting bars.

*Recitation Room.* A recitation room is sadly needed for the use of model school teachers and pupils. If a suitable manual training room could be provided elsewhere, the present manual training room would make an ideal recitation room for this purpose. It is in the model school end of the building and is well heated and lighted. It would facilitate the work of the model school and would furnish additional training for the normal school students.

*Apparatus.* A picture machine is needed in the Washington Normal school for illustrating natural scenery, architecture, manufactures, and vocational pursuits.

*Model School.* The model school has an attendance of 150 children divided into 8 grades. This is the number of pupils that the state agreed to educate free of all charge to the town of Machias. This model school serves a two-fold purpose; one purpose is the educating of 150 children by the best, most up-to-date, and modern methods of teaching; the other purpose is the use of this school by normal school students for observation and practice. In order that the model school may serve this two-fold purpose, it is necessary that only the best teachers be employed. The increased cost of living and the consequent increase in teachers' wages throughout the state necessitate an advance in the salary of our model school teachers. It will be necessary to pay more, if we are to secure the best instructors.

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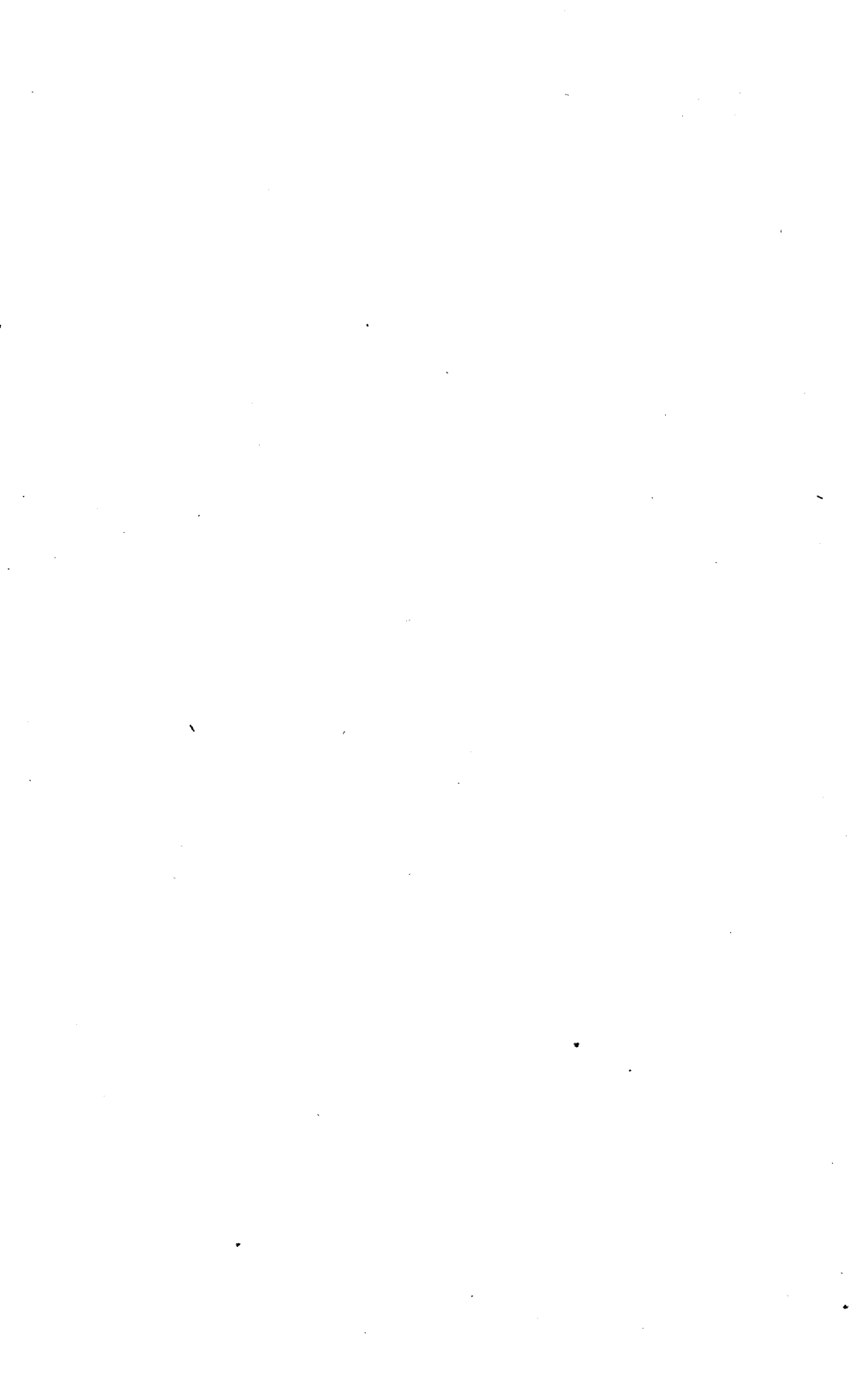
**CASTINE CONFERENCE.**
