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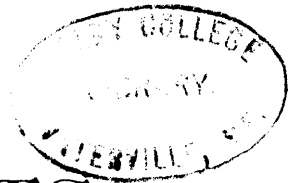

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OUR SCHOOLS IN WAR TIMES.

The school year closing June 30, 1918, is without doubt the most important in the history of education not only in the State of Maine but in the Union. It has fallen to the Great Republic of the new world to lead in the crusade for universal democracy, for universal education, and for the rights of the individual in government. During the year our government raised an army of 4,000,000 men and financed great undertakings besides which it loaned vast sums of money to our co-belligerents.

The schools of state and nation are called upon to participate in the many great movements growing out of the necessities of war, and at the same time to maintain their standing. Simply to maintain standing is not sufficient, the war points out new duties and new responsibilities for the institution which lies at the basis of democracy, and it becomes necessary not only to sustain our standard but to move our ideals ahead and to make substantial provision for reaching them.

I wish at the outset to pay a just tribute to those who have assisted with this great work in the State of Maine. First of all, I wish to mention with profound respect the work of His Excellency, Governor Carl E. Milliken, who not only bore the general burden of the state at war but found time to become vitally interested in the cause of education and back up with steady and reliable hand all progressive and vital movements in the schools; the assistants in the office directly associated with me, Mr. Glenn W. Starkey, Deputy State Superintendent, Mr. Josiah W. Taylor, Agent for Secondary Education, Mr. Harold A. Allan, and Miss Florence Hale, Agents for Rural Education, Mr. A. W. Gordon, Agent for Schools in Unorganized Townships, have all borne heavy burdens. Their loyal support and faithful co-operation with unselfish devotion to the cause cannot be too highly praised, nor should those who have carried the burden of keeping up the vast amount of office

details be forgotten; those who have done the work at the books and at the machines and have been ever ready to accept new burdens no matter how heavy.

Superintendents of schools, principals of high schools, teachers have all sensed and appreciated the responsibility of the hour. They have assisted in carrying out the program with a spirit of patriotism and loyalty which deserves the highest commendation. The pupils in the schools have felt their measure of responsibility in winning the war and in holding up school standards.

KEEPING UP THE STANDARD.

The United States was quick to accept the lessons taught by conditions in other countries in the early days of the war. When the war opened there were those who seemed to be of the opinion that it would not be of long duration. The schools in a measure were of secondary consideration, teachers were taken out of the schoolroom and put into the trenches, mothers were taken from the homes to work in the shops and the children were left to roam the streets and back alleys and juvenile delinquency was greatly on the increase. As soon as the error was discovered drastic measures were taken to remedy these mistakes.

In the United States educators were backed by federal and state governments who sought to hold a taut rein on the situation to keep up the attendance and interest in the educational program. It was recognized that the democracy of the future was at stake and while we were striving to make the world safe for democracy it was just as important that the proper brand of democracy be provided for the world. If the schools were adjourned or in any sense interfered with our obligations to the future could not be fulfilled. We, therefore, undertook with diligence not only to keep our attendance where it was but also to increase it in every grade of the public schools and to induce as many of our young men and young women as we could to go on to college. How well we have succeeded in this effort is indicated by reports in the appendix of this volume. Our attendance increased in both elementary and high schools even under the stress of war.

ON TO COLLEGE.

The school people of the state are the parties most directly responsible for the educational attitude of the state. The teacher of the grammar grade who does not inspire some pupil to continue his education has in large measure failed in her work. The high school teacher who does not create a desire on the part of some of her pupils to enter college has not done her whole duty. These responsibilities seemed to be understood by the teachers of the state who adopted the slogan of "On to College." In this effort we were seconded by Governor Milliken and the Public Safety Committee under Hon. Halbert P. Gardner, Executive Secretary, of Patten, and Hon. Harold M. Sewall, Chairman, of Bath. These gentlemen came strongly to the support of the cause.

If it had not been for the taking over of the colleges by the War Department I am very sure that our campaign would have borne fruit. President Robert Aley of the University, President George C. Chase of Bates College, President Arthur J. Roberts of Colby, President Kenneth C. M. Sills of Bowdoin were active in the campaign.

THE COLLEGE IN THE WAR.

Of all of our educational institutions the colleges were in position to receive the burden of the war more than any other. The college young men were within the age of the draft while the spirit of patriotism and anxiety to get into the war was rife among the younger set. It promised to deplete our colleges especially if the war continued for any great period.

When the selective draft age was lowered the War Department made arrangements to install student army training corps that young men of the draft age could enter with regular army enlistment, they were placed in uniform, their expenses paid and the pay of a soldier given them, they were placed under regular army officers and were in preparation for war service, they could proceed with their regular college course with a definite number of hours in military training. Bates, Bowdoin, Colby and the University of Maine offered such instruction.

THE SUPPLY OF TEACHERS.

There is a tendency to a general breaking down of the teaching staff throughout the Union. In the State of Maine the impending danger was recognized early in the war and active steps were taken to safeguard the schools. The colors called many of our young men teachers mostly out of high schools. War work of various kinds called our young women. Civil Service examinations were held in almost all of the cities and towns of our state. Young women, both students and teachers, could easily pass these examinations, salaries far in excess of the small stipend of the teacher were offered. Teachers who were receiving \$12.00 per week could easily pass the examination and receive a Government salary of \$1,100 per annum with the promise of an increase within a few weeks. The taking out of young men from the banks, stores and offices also opened a new avenue for high school girls and for teachers. Early in the spring our shortage of teachers in the State of Maine was estimated at approximately 1,800, this estimate was made after a careful survey of the situation. In the effort to prevent our teaching force from breaking down Mr. Harold A. Allan and Miss Florence Hale, Agents for Rural Education, were especially valuable.

Perhaps no state in the union safeguarded its educational institutions and supplied its teachers so quickly and so efficiently as did the State of Maine. Salaries at the time were unusually low, the average salary for the previous year being but \$11.42 per week. This made the task more difficult and we could not have overcome the call of the war and its work had it not been for the people themselves. Our campaign was started before the town meetings were held which gave the various towns of the state an opportunity to do their share. Additional funds were voted and local school officers came quickly to the rescue. In all probability when the reckoning is made it will be discovered that provision for approximately a 25% increase was made. It was a heroic effort and well worthy the sturdy citizens of the State of Maine.

WAR ACTIVITIES.

The superintendents and principals of the state rallied to the call of the Government and placed upon their schools the burden of carrying on the campaign for food production and conservation. The children were especially useful in distributing pledge cards, as well as in accepting the pledges. During the second campaign the children of the state distributed practically all of the cards. Provision was made for an organization to be known as the Junior Volunteers. It was one of the first movements of the kind in the United States, and under the direction of a committee appointed by Governor Milliken and consisting of the State Superintendent of Schools, at that time Mr. Glenn W. Starkey, and Mr. Jefferson C. Smith. These Volunteers were mostly from the upper grammar grades and from the high schools and academies of the state. They were taken into a central camp, placed in uniform and given some preliminary training, they were distributed among the farmers of the state where they rendered splendid service. During the first year of the war about 600 Volunteers were sent out. So successful was the movement that it was continued and enlarged during the past year to about 2,000 Volunteers. The movement was beneficial not only to the boys themselves who received many valuable lessons and who learned to bear responsibilities but to the farmers in general who were greatly pleased with their work and the shortage of farm labor was in a measure overcome.

THE THRIFT STAMP CAMPAIGN.

One of the important campaigns affecting the schools during the war was the Thrift Stamp Campaign. Mr. Glenn W. Starkey, Deputy Superintendent, took charge of the Thrift campaign in the schools. Mr. Starkey planned the campaign, went about into the various schools of the state in the promotion of the movement. He was given large responsibility and succeeded in putting over the top a large number of schools in the sale of stamps. In the schools approximately five hundred thousand dollars of Thrift Stamps were taken by the children. During the time Mr. Starkey was engaged in this campaign Mr. A. W. Gordon, Agent for Schools in Unorganized Townships, was Acting Deputy.

JUNIOR RED CROSS.

In order that the children of the state might bear a part in the great work of mercy and in order that they might find a fruitful field for their activities the Junior Red Cross was given a place in the schools. Mr. Josiah W. Taylor was detailed to this service. He arranged his campaign in conjunction with the New England officers and through his efforts assisted by local teachers about forty thousand members were secured. In practically all of the schools of the state under the direction of the Junior Red Cross large contributions of various articles needed by the soldiers in the field were made.

WAR MODIFIED WORK.

The schools of the State of Maine were quick to respond to the need of modified work to fit the demands of the times. In the manual training departments of the high schools and academies and also in the elementary schools many articles needed by the soldiers in camp were made, and the household economics department took up food substitutes, food conservation and such modification of household arts as war economy and war emergency required.

PATRIOTIC INSTRUCTION.

Under the laws of the state the flag was found in the school-room or floating from the school buildings everywhere. In lessons in current history the cause of the war and the various stages of its progress were carefully followed until pupils became familiar, not only with the passing events but were inspired with a spirit of responsibility and filled with a new enthusiasm for the institutions of liberty for which our country stands. It was recommended by the State Superintendent that all of the schools take up lessons of this sort touching on the points of American history bearing upon the development of our Republic, that no school be without a flag, that the difference between an autocracy and a democracy be exemplified, that Edward Everett Hale's "Man Without a Country" be read and that our patriotic songs be sung in every school. There are those who would criticize the schools for a lack of instruction in patriotism, but wholly without justice. Our

teachers have faithfully taught patriotism for generations, and the response of our young men to the call of the colors is an eloquent testimony of the service rendered to our state and nation. In this particular, however, it is safe to say that much emphasis has been placed upon this phase of instruction during the war which will be beneficial to future generations.

HELPING WITH THE REGISTRATION.

During the various drafts teachers in many centers volunteered assistance making out registration cards of conscripted men and splendid service was rendered in this particular.

SCHOOLS FOR CONSCRIPTED MEN.

Responding to the call of the Federal Government for the training of conscripted men for the more than eighty war occupations arrangements were made to open in various centers night schools which would accommodate conscripted men who were subject to call but who desired to fit themselves for war occupations. At various centers radio and buzzer schools were opened and more than 400 men were trained for this branch of the service. At Auburn a shoe and leather school was opened and 24 men were given instruction, at Bath a large number of men engaged in ship building were given instruction in the night school, at Belfast and Portland automobile schools were opened and unit instruction in automobile repair and for truck and motor drivers was given.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION.

In October, 1917, state plans were presented to the Federal Board of Education for carrying out the provisions of the Smith-Hughes Act providing for vocational education in the schools of the state. Only a small amount of Federal funds were available for the year and extensive work could not be undertaken as we were unable to extend aid to a large number of schools. Herewith is given a summary of the accomplishments of the year. The results gave a proper foundation for future procedure.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION IN THE STATE OF MAINE.

1917-1918.

FEDERAL FUNDS.

The State of Maine did not receive sufficient funds during the first year to permit of an active promotion of vocational education. The state, however, was allowed \$5,000 for the training of teachers in the trades and industries, home economics and agriculture; \$5,000 for the salaries of teachers and supervisors of agriculture and \$5,000 for the salaries of teachers of trades and industries and home economics. It was necessary to match this money with public funds provided by the local community, the state, or both.

TRAINING OF TEACHERS.

The plan for the training of teachers was distributed as follows: Agriculture at the State College of Agriculture connected with the University; teachers of home economics at the State Normal School at Farmington and the University of Maine and the trades and industries at the State Normal School at Gorham. In all instances full equipment was provided and teachers employed to carry on the work. The war in large measure depleted the classes in agriculture and the trades and industries. Four teachers completed the work in agriculture and received certificates enabling them to teach in agriculture schools provided by the Federal Board for Vocational Education. Ten students completed the four years' course required for teachers of home economics and became available for positions in approved schools for the year 1918-19. The draft took all the men out of the teacher training course for the trades and industries at the State Normal School at Gorham. It became necessary to take men from the trades and industries who had sufficient education and who were skilled in their trades and coach them sufficiently to enable them to take up the work of instruction in the evening schools established.

APPROVED SCHOOLS.

Many schools took up the work of the various phases of vocational education with the understanding that they would qualify

for funds the second year, but accepted the opportunity of the first year to get in line, revise their courses, strengthen their courses, their equipment and arrange other details to meet the full requirements. Below is given a full list of the work done in the state during the first year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

In addition to the above outlined work we have 443 conscripted men in radio and buzzer work qualifying for the work in the various branches of the signal service of the war. We have also conducted classes in shoe repair work at Auburn for conscripted men in which 24 men have been prepared. These men are all in the service and included in the work similar to that carried on in the school.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

UNIONS OF TOWNS.

The legislation of 1917 directing the State Superintendent of Schools to combine the several towns of the state into unions for the purpose of employing professional superintendents who should give their whole time to their profession was complied with and announcement of this consolidation was made January 1, 1918, to take effect as provided by law July 1, 1918. In order to clear away an idea of the use of arbitrary authority a series of conferences, eighteen in all, was announced. A general invitation was extended to superintendents of schools, superintending school committees and interested citizens to be present and discuss the proposed arrangement. All conferences were well attended and those who participated in the conferences showed a disposition to co-operate for the success of the plan. Herewith is given the preliminary announcement.

ANNOUNCEMENT.

Acting upon the authorization given to me through the provisions of Section 55 of Chapter 16 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by Chapter 188 of the Public Laws of 1917, the cities, towns and plantations of the State of Maine, as hereinafter listed, are combined into unions for the employment of superintendents of schools. Said unions are to be organized, maintained and governed in accordance with the provisions of Sections 55 to 62, inclusive, of said Chapter 16 of the Revised Statutes, as amended by said Chapter 188 of the Public Laws of 1917 and are to be effective July 1, 1918.

The cities of Auburn, Augusta, Bangor, Biddeford, Lewiston, Portland and Waterville, each reporting an aggregate of more than fifty schools, are not so combined. (Par. 2, Sect. 57, Chap. 16, R. S., as amended.)

EQUALIZATION FUND.

The Common School Equalization Fund of \$50,000, deducted from the School Mill Fund, was distributed for the year covered by this report and shown in Table IX of the Appendix to 172 towns and plantations for purposes specified in the law to the amount of \$48,165, the remainder being available in accordance with the statute for overhead expenses and investigation. The rates on the basis of which towns became eligible to share in an apportionment from this fund were found to be .00353 as an average of the rates of taxation for common school purposes of all the towns, cities and plantations in the state, while the

average municipal tax rate for the same year was .02953. No town having a rate of taxation for either of the above purposes below the average stated could be considered as eligible to receive anything from this fund and distribution was therefore made to the above number of towns representing about one-third of the total number in the state.

TEACHERS' PENSIONS.

Twenty-three pensions were granted to teachers retiring under the general pension law during the year ending July 1, 1918. This makes a total of 242 pensions issued up to that date. Nine of those holding pensions died during the year and the number of those holding pensions on the above date was 202, a net increase of fourteen as compared with the same date for the year preceding. A detailed list of names and amounts appears in Table XXXIII of the Appendix.

COUNTY CONVENTIONS.

Meetings of county teachers' associations were held during the year 1918 in all the counties of the state with the exception of Sagadahoc and York, seventeen meetings being arranged. The total attendance at these meetings was 4,506.

STATE MEETING.

The sixteenth annual meeting of the Maine Teachers' Association was held in Bangor on Thursday and Friday, October 25 and 26, 1917. The attendance was 2,951 made up of 455 men and 2,496 women.

Among the principal speakers were Joe Mitchell Chapple upon the subject "Flashlights of Patriots," and Mrs. Maud Ballington Booth upon the subject "Twenty Years of Service in Human Salvage." Other speakers from outside the state included Mr. Frank W. Wright, Deputy Commissioner of Education of Massachusetts, and Superintendent S. R. Shear of Poughkeepsie, New York.

CASTINE CONFERENCE.

The tenth annual session of superintendents of schools was held at Casine during the week of July 8-12, 1918. Practically all the professional superintendents of schools of the state were in attendance. The program was built about the general topics of Physical Training, Supervision Standards, Vocational Education, Co-operation in School Administration, Teacher Training and School Standardization. In addition to the speakers from within the state Mr. Andrew W. Edson, Association Superintendent of Schools of New York City, and Hon. Walter E. Ranger, Commissioner of Education for Rhode Island, were present and addressed the superintendents.

REPORT OF STATISTICAL SURVEY.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1918.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

DEAR SIR:—From the returns made by superintendents of schools for the year ending July 1, 1918, are taken the following statistics showing the increase or decrease in the several items relating to the schools of Maine together with a brief analysis of the development of the school system as shown by the figures submitted.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

The number of persons between five and twenty-one years of age included in the school census for April 1, 1918, was 228,956 as compared with 228,426 on April 1, 1917. This slight increase in the number of persons eligible under the law to attend the public schools of the state is reflected in a correspondingly increased enrollment over the preceding year. A study of the registration figures giving the divisions between the pupils enrolled in rural schools and those in the village and city schools continues to offer a basis for some rather significant conclusions. In ten years the number of children registered in the rural schools has dropped from 52,946 to 47,923, a difference of 5,023, while the number registered in village schools has in the same period risen from 43,834 to 49,581, a change of 5,747, and a gain of slightly more than the loss in the rural schools. The city school registration has remained more nearly uniform and shows an increase in the ten year period of 1815, which is certainly no more than would be expected as a natural result of the growth of these cities.

Thus it appears that for one reason or another the school population of the rural districts is either decreasing at a fairly steady rate, while the reverse is true of the villages, or that there is a decided trend toward consolidation of schools through

conveyance of pupils from the rural communities to the villages for school instruction. That the latter is one factor at least in the change noted is a well known fact and while we have no statistics to show definitely that there has been an actual decrease in the number of children in rural sections of the state during the last few years, yet there is a strong disposition on the part of those engaged in a study of the situation to conclude that such is the case. The reasons for this condition, if it actually exists, are more deep seated than the limits of this report permit of discussing at length, but it is doubtless due in part at least to unsatisfactory rural school facilities combined with industrial decadence which cannot be denied in a considerable number of instances.

Still another important deduction must be made from the fact that the figures indicate a decrease of nearly one million school days in the aggregate attendance of pupils in our public schools during the past two years. This represents a loss of approximately six per cent or one-seventeenth of the educational opportunity offered to elementary school children between the year 1916 and the year 1918. Whatever may be the cause of this decline it is a matter which deserves most careful consideration. To a slight extent it results from the decrease in the average length of the school year from 170 to 169 days, but this can account for only a very small part of the difference. It would seem that irregularity of attendance is responsible for the most of this great loss and while the exigencies of war in a measure serve to extenuate and excuse disregard for regularity in this most important business of youth, yet even these can scarcely serve as valid reasons for so great a deficiency.

The number of men engaged in teaching in elementary schools is becoming so small as to be almost at the vanishing point. In 1916 there was a total of 371 men in elementary school teaching positions. This number was reduced to 341 in 1917, while in 1918 a still further reduction occurred and the number of teaching positions in which men were employed is indicated as only 227. The number of women teachers showed a corresponding increase, but the fact that 5953 different women teachers were employed in 1918 as compared with 5683 in 1917 demonstrates the fact that they were more transient in the positions occupied.

and that more changes in schools were made during the year than had been true for several years preceding.

The one really bright spot in the teacher situation is the increase of 175 in the number of teachers employed who were graduates of normal or training schools. This gain is both actual and relative since the increase in the number of such trained teachers was greater in proportion than the total increase in the number of teachers. That such a record could be attained is evidence that those who have received special training for the work are much more inclined to remain in it in spite of the temptations of commercial life than those who have taken up teaching without professional preparation for it.

The matter of salaries is one which must be touched upon with little idea of presenting an encouraging situation. The figures show an increase in the average annual salaries of male teachers from \$531.07 in 1917 to \$617.53 in 1918, while salaries of female teachers show an increase from \$395.09 to \$419.89. Such a salary schedule can be characterized in no other way than woefully inadequate compensation. In the face of all the advances in living costs to which teachers, like those in other occupations, are subjected it is a foregone conclusion that salaries for teachers must be placed upon a decidedly higher plane, and that promptly, or the educational opportunities of the rising generation will be sharply and adversely affected.

Local school support as represented by the amount of money raised by towns for common school purposes shows an increase from \$829,356.00 in 1917 to \$973,365.00 in 1918, while the amount available through distribution of state funds remains practically at the same level. Were all of this increase in the amount available from local funds diverted to the payment of teachers' salaries, there would still be altogether too small a gain, but we must remember that a considerable part of the amount goes for the payment of fuel, conveyance and janitor service, all of which items are constantly increasing in cost.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

The figures for attendance in secondary schools continue to show an increase in the number of students enrolled and one which is extremely gratifying. In 1917 the total number was

20,828 while in 1918 it had risen to 21,622. Going back two years we find that in 1916 the enrollment was 19,645, showing an increase of 1977 in the two years. It indicates a most encouraging growth, one which is entirely normal, not the result of methods intended to develop the secondary schools along any particular line, but the result of a real awakening in the minds of our people to the advantages of more advanced training. It is a recognition of the fact that the problems of the present day require an educated citizenry if they are to be met and solved in the way which will bring to the people of our country a permanent position of pre-eminence.

Unlike the situation in elementary schools we find that the number of men employed as teachers in the secondary schools has suffered no great diminution but the same tendency is evident from the fact that an increase of 110 in the total number of teaching positions has been entirely met by the employing of women teachers.

The salary schedule for high schools shows an increase from \$612.05 to \$646.53 for women teachers and from \$762.22 to \$796.94 for men teachers. This is, of course, a very slight increase yet it represents for all the high schools of the state an increase in expenditures by the towns of \$40,000 while the total expenditures for all high school purposes increased \$77,000.

REPORTS OF STATE AGENTS AND PRINCIPALS
OF STATE NORMAL AND TRAINING SCHOOLS.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1918.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

DEAR SIR:—The secondary schools of the state in spite of the strain of war conditions made practically normal growth and progress during the year covered by this report. This part of the school system, though taking its part in war activities and feeling the influence of the war in many ways, came through with very slight adverse results. In fact it might be said that the secondary schools of the state gained rather than lost ground during this year. The unusual activities furnished a training hitherto unknown. The opportunity for linking these activities to school work and making them a part of school life was not allowed to slip. New interests were awakened in ordinary school subjects through the attention which the events of the day brought to history, science and so on. A new emphasis was given to service, co-operation, and hard work for a common cause. These and other factors rising from the extraordinary conditions have had a wholesome influence upon the secondary schools. The fact remains, moreover, that in actual growth, holding power and general progress conditions in these schools were practically normal. This is in sharp contrast to similar reports from other states. The returns to this office furnish the basis for this general statement.

Comparing the increase in enrollment in secondary schools with that of previous years we find that while there was a sharp rise from 1915 to 1916 there was a gain of practically one thousand pupils in each of the succeeding years. The actual falling off for 1918 from the normal increase was very slight. The entering class showed a normal gain over that of preceding years. In average attendance the figures for 1918 are very

satisfactory. The falling off on a percentage basis is slightly less than three per cent from that of 1915, which was practically a normal year. This fact alone would indicate that for the most part schools were "as usual" for the year. The holding powers of the high schools and academies were fully maintained during the year. The graduating class was the largest in the history of the schools. This class was one of those which showed substantial advance over preceding classes upon entering but the figures reported show that the number graduating was fifty-three per cent of the number who entered,—a splendid showing for any year and exceptionally gratifying for the years in which the class was in school.

The number of schools remained practically the same as for the year preceding. Four were advanced to the A class and five were added to the class B group. Practically all of these changes came from the schools already maintained.

The financial returns show an advance in expenditures, but not excessive as might be supposed. The total expenditure for maintenance of high schools for 1918 gives a slightly smaller per cent of increase than that for 1917. The significance of this increase is shown when the cost of instruction is considered apart from other expenditures for high schools. The increase was but 10.3 per cent on a total expenditure of \$625,969. Nor does this represent wholly an advance in wages for nearly one hundred teaching positions were added. It can hardly be said that the secondary school costs have kept pace with those of business operations in general. Of the total cost of maintenance teachers' wages represent by far the largest item, about 75 per cent, fuel, janitor service and general upkeep represent 15 per cent of the total, text-books and supplies called for 9 per cent and conveyance about 1 per cent of the expenditure for high schools.

The teaching force of the schools was seriously affected by war conditions. While it was noteworthy that there was an increase in the number of teaching positions of nearly one hundred, it is significant that exactly one hundred more positions were filled by women than in the preceding year. From this it would appear that in face of a general shortage of teachers the schools were able to add to the teaching force in a good number of instances. In normal years this increase would

doubtless have included a number of men yet it is apparent that there was not a serious falling off in the men employed as compared with other years. In the above items the case would appear feasible. To those who know the schools it is obvious that there were an unusual number of changes in the personnel, that many teachers took up new work with limited preparation, that the difficulty of securing teachers who qualified was a serious one. These facts do not show in the statistics but they had no slight influence upon the schools. Besides a shortage of qualified teachers these difficulties were further complicated by the fact that the public was not fully awake to the necessity of advancing wages for teachers in proportion to wages in other activities. That this was not done is evident. The average annual wages for men for 1918 was \$1122, an increase of 10 per cent over the year preceding, and for women \$646, an increase of 7.7 per cent. To the teachers of the state is due the sincere thanks for this loyalty and faithfulness to their tasks

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES.

War Time Graduation.

At the close of the school year a large number of schools were granted a certificate of meritorious service issued over the signature of His Excellency, Governor Milliken. These certificates were granted to schools whose plans for graduation were in harmony with the spirit of the time and whose activities comprised various phases of war work. The proposal to grant such a certificate was made by Governor Milliken through the state superintendent. The schools responded with a spirit characteristic of the interest and effort which was being put into the activities of the schools as a whole. The result was all that could have been expected in the teaching of thrift, patriotism and service.

Field Work.

Field work of the agent for secondary schools included visits for general inspectory purposes in one hundred and ten schools. The schools visited were for the most part those not included in the list of the preceding year. A special effort was made to reach the new schools and those which had changed classi-

fications at the beginning of the year. The plan of arranging visits so as to secure time for conference with teachers was carried out whenever possible. Greater attention was paid to the smaller schools with the purpose of assisting as far as possible the many teachers entering the service or taking new positions.

The agent for secondary schools participated in nine of the county convention programs. At several of these meetings he conducted a Round Table for the upper grade and high school teachers. The topic of physical education for secondary schools was presented several times before group section meetings composed of teachers in these schools.

During the latter part of the year the agent assisted in arranging the Junior Red Cross work in the state, serving as state director for the organization. In this connection several brief talks on the purpose and work of the Junior society were given at county teachers' meetings and other occasions. The response on the part of the schools was excellent, not far from twenty thousand pupils in the elementary and secondary schools were engaged in some kind of Red Cross work.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1918.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

DEAR SIR:—I submit herewith a summarized report of progress in the rural school field for the year ending July 1, 1918.

Supervision. Under the provisions of legislation enacted at the 1917 session all work necessary for the reorganization of school supervision has been completed. Beginning July 1, 1918, full time professional supervision will be provided for every city, town and plantation in the state. The distinct advantage of the state-wide plan is to the rural town which under the voluntary union law often was unable to secure admission to supervisory unions. All towns and all schools without the service of professional superintendents under the voluntary plan were of the rural or village type.

Within the year covered by this report local conditions have been studied, conferences have been held, special investigations have been made and all of the towns have been rearranged into supervisory unions.

The following are comparative statistics of unions as organized under the voluntary plan and as arranged under the terms of the new state-wide union law:

Improvement of physical conditions. War conditions did much to discourage school building extension. Most of the towns previously undertaking definite programs of rural school building improvement continued these programs, however. Special emphasis has been placed on improvement of hygienic conditions including sanitary and protected toilets, ventilating room heaters and jacketed stoves. To assist towns in carrying on such improvements sketches have been prepared, buildings examined and special aid paid out of the equalization fund. A law enacted in 1917, extending the provisions of the act requiring State approval of plans for new buildings to plans for remodeled buildings, has served to encourage and improve plans for reconstruction.

Equalization Fund. This fund, distributed almost entirely for the benefit of rural towns, has accomplished many definite improvements or has been used to continue improved conditions secured through previous apportionments. The towns generally sharing in this apportionment are comparatively small, hence the additional state aid payable from this fund often goes far to secure needed improvements.

The amount of \$47,375 was distributed to 160 towns having rates of taxation for common school purposes above the average of .00334 and for municipal purposes above the average of .02604. The largest amount apportioned to any town was \$575; the smallest amount was \$90. For increasing or sustaining increases in the length of the school year or teachers' wages the amount of \$27,490 was apportioned to 122 towns; for the employment of special teachers in rural schools, improvement of teachers in service and encouragement of model school and visiting teacher plan the amount of \$3,355 was paid to 18 towns; for the improvement of physical conditions including assistance in building programs, improvement of hygienic conditions, purchase of equipment, etc., the sum of \$16,530 was distributed to 123 towns.

It should be noted that the above figures relate to the apportionment of the equalization fund made within the year ending July 1, 1918, for use within that year by the towns receiving it. This summary does not parallel that given in a preceding chapter which covers the make-up of the fund and rates governing the distribution for the year to follow as included in table IX.

Efforts to Meet the Teacher Shortage. Organized efforts have been made to meet the shortage of teachers already felt for the current year and seriously impending for the year to come. Campaigns for attendance at normal schools and summer schools have been carried on with definite success so far as the latter are concerned. Suggestions were given to school officers outlining various ways in which the shortage might be met. A special course for rural teachers was offered at the Castine summer school and special work was outlined for members of the graduating classes in several high schools and academies. So far as reports have been received very few schools, necessary to be maintained, failed to be operated in the year.

Teachers' Meetings. County teachers' meetings have added their part toward the improvement of teaching service. An increasing number of union teachers' meetings shows an encouraging tendency on the part of superintendents of smaller towns to interest their teachers in self-improvement.

FIELD WORK.

Visits have been made to 110 towns within the year. These visits have been for a wide variety of purposes and have often combined several errands. A general summarization of the purposes of visits may be made as follows:

For general visitation of schools and incidental conferences with teachers and school officers—27 towns.

For special visitation of schools combined with special investigations of conditions of buildings, organization, attendance, supervision or investigation of controversies—32 towns.

For complete study or survey of some special feature of school organization—2 towns.

For conferences with superintendents and committee members sometimes combined with school visitation—26 towns.

For county, union and local teachers' meetings—14 towns.

For public meetings, generally combined with school visitation—10 towns.

In addition to the above, I have taken part in a school of instruction for superintendents, a superintendents' conference and a summer school for teachers and have attended or taken part in four meetings held outside the state.

CONCLUSION.

From the point of view of increased community interest and local effort the rural school situation in Maine is altogether encouraging. A willingness to recognize the fact that the rural school demands a well paid teacher and that it must be well housed is more and more evident. Many communities, however, cannot meet greatly improved standards in these respects without largely increased financial support. To assist in the burdens that will come from such increased support additional state aid or federal aid is required. Every effort must be made to make clear that this problem is not one of a town or of a community but one of state-wide and nation-wide interest in the support of which all must participate.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

DEAR SIR:—My work has divided itself into two general lines: first, community interest and support; second, professional work with superintendents and teachers for the improvement of physical conditions, methods of instruction and improved standards along all lines.

Under "Community Interest and Support," I have given many talks throughout the state at Granges, Women's clubs, and Parents' Associations trying to acquaint the people of the state in this way with our State Superintendent's program for the state in education and to bring to them a knowledge of their particular ways of getting the best things for their own schools. In this connection I have served as Secretary of the Maine Federation of Women's Clubs which has given me unusual opportunity to get closely in touch with these organizations and to give emphasis to the things that I am trying to urge. I am also a member of the Maine State Grange and have brought our program before that body and its subordinate branches.

Under "Professional Improvement," I have visited rural schools all over the state and in company with the superintendent have given suggestions to the individual teachers and at the same time acquainted the superintendent with the details of rural school work in such cases as were found desirable, as in the case of young superintendents or those whose training has been mostly along the line of secondary school work or grade schools—a condition often met. I have held many all day meetings and as many half day meetings with teachers to take up definitely the details of their work—taking devices with me, giving demonstration lessons and in all ways making the meeting a definite "school instruction." I have sent out many letters of suggestion, outlines, samples of seat work, etc. to those teachers who have written the office for help and to very many who, in my visitation, I have found needing such help.

The work of The School Improvement League has been my especial charge. I have actively pushed this work and my records show in this year somewhat over a thousand new members and the reports of the actual work accomplished show new equipment purchased, and interest of parents in the individual

schools greatly increased. I have sent out over a thousand certificates of membership and badges during this year.

My general plan of procedure has been as follows: I visit all the rural and village schools of a town as far as my allotted time of from two to three days will permit, always in company with the superintendent. I then, wherever possible, hold a day or a half day (as the superintendent deems wise) teachers' meeting taking up the lines indicated above in this report. In the evening I hold a parents' or citizens' meeting, seeking to arouse interest and action along the lines where the responsibility rests on the citizens—as in the matter of physical improvements, teachers' salaries, etc.

SCHOOLING IN UNORGANIZED TOWNSHIPS.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1918.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

DEAR SIR:—I submit herewith my annual report as General Agent for Schooling of Children in Unorganized Townships.

An analysis of the statistical report of the past year for the schooling of children in unorganized townships brings out no facts of particular significance as compared with similar reports for years immediately preceding. The same general conditions are found as have existed since this system became well established. There is, of course, more or less variation in the totals of the different items reported upon from year to year, but nothing to indicate any changes of great importance.

The most important conclusion that may be reached from a study of the statistical reports for some years past is that this is a well established school system, peculiar unto itself, whose growth and extension during twenty odd years show that it must continue for many years to come as a distinct part of the Maine school system. With nearly one-half the state still unorganized it is clearly apparent that included in this system there will always be a certain number of temporary settlements of considerable size, numerous small settlements of an apparently permanent nature some of which will gradually increase in size and eventually become organized places, and a great variety of small communities scattered from the islands on the coast to the deep forest sections of the state, all of which must come under this system as the only practicable means by which school privileges can be provided.

The urgent need of new legislation to make possible better school privileges for the children of all the people of this vast unorganized portion of the state in the widely divergent conditions under which they live is becoming more and more apparent each year. The present law written over twenty years ago, without precedent or practical experience in any similar propo-

sition as a guide, is now found altogether inadequate and generally unsatisfactory. While there has been a great deal of school legislation for improving and extending educational privileges for the youth of the cities, towns and plantations, the only law making any provision for education in unorganized places of the state, except for a few changes most obviously needed, has remained practically the same all of these years.

A change in the present law should be made at the first opportunity and when such a change is made it should be by an entirely new law, full and complete, giving as far as practicable to the boys and girls of the unorganized territory, wherever living, equal opportunities for education with those of organized places. The experience gained in administering the present law has proven the possibilities and practicability of providing educational privileges for the children of unorganized places in this state and there remains no question but such privileges can be made for all such places equally as good, without excessive cost, as those provided in small organized places. The only thing needed to make this possible is proper legislation.

Such legislation should be made to cover the whole unorganized territory of the state including all government reservations and with provisions for schooling in towns or plantations whose civil organizations have become defunct. Proper school buildings should be provided for, a longer school year should be made possible, the allowance for secondary school tuition should be increased, the regular truancy and child labor laws should be adapted to the unorganized territory, a substitute for the present unsatisfactory per capita tax should be made, a great many of the minor provisions of the present law which are vague and unsatisfactory should be changed, and the appropriation should be largely increased. In general, a new statute is needed, based upon the practical experience of administering the present law, with full provision for all the educational needs of the unorganized territory of the state, clear and workable in all its provisions.

The entry of the country into war has had its effect upon the attendance the past year. All the young men have gone, either to the colors or to some other form of work. Many young women in the state are taking up teaching without special preparation, or are going into some industrial work. The students who are in attendance have entered into every demand of the government, and of the great government aids like Red Cross and War Work activities, with splendid patriotism and zeal. The war has given us an opportunity to connect up the school with community and national work which has been utilized to the full value. The school formed a branch of the Franklin county chapter, American Red Cross, and have raised and ex-

pended over \$1,000 for the work of that organization alone, and this in addition to the large amount of knitting and sewing done. I esteem this a valuable educational activity.

Our new dormitory for which the legislature provided a beginning was not begun because of the war. The need is not so imperative now with decreased attendance, but it will be needed as soon as the war is over and normal registration comes back.

The Home Economics work is constantly increasing in value and educational importance. We have begun in that department a course in housekeeping by Senior students living in the Cottage which promises to be of great importance. The Federal aid to vocational education through the Smith-Hughes act is being utilized in this department by the acceptance of certain Federal standards. This links our work up with work of a similar character throughout the country and gives us the help of its aims and purposes.

The Home Economics department has suffered the loss of two valuable teachers. Miss Marion C. Ricker who started the department was released at the mid-year to complete work at Columbia University. She possesses a fine enthusiasm which made her work and courses attractive and popular. Her organization of the department is a worthy memorial of her term of service. Miss Frances H. Butler, first assistant in the same department, was promoted to the head of that class of work in Castine Normal School. Miss Butler is an exceptionally able and successful teacher.

Miss Bernardine Cooney of St. Louis is now at the head of the department and Miss Margaret R. Gill, B. S., Chattanooga, has occupied Miss Butler's position for the remainder of the year.

Agriculture:

This class has been in charge of William D. Hall, and is becoming more profitable each year. A large school garden is planted and used for the dormitory. It is no longer an expense to the State but a source of revenue reducing as it does the bills at the dormitory.

Manual Training:

As usual all the pupils in the school have had work in this department, and all enjoy it. The pupils in the training schools, except the two lowest grades, have had the privileges of this work as also have the students in the grammar school, giving the students of the village advantages they could have obtained in no other way.

Household Arts:

This work has been of great value and pleasure to the students, and here too the pupils of the grammar and training schools have had the advantages of instruction and practice in this very important subject without expense. Miss E. Lucile Royal had charge in the fall term, but was called to a position in the employ of the United States Government, and Frances H. Butler was elected in her place. Both are fine teachers but under present conditions it is difficult to keep such teachers. We cannot compete with the United States Government.

The Library:

The library, since being scientifically catalogued, has been constantly used by the students. We now have nearly 3,000 bound volumes not including text-books. These books have been carefully selected, giving us a fine working library suited to the needs of a normal school.

Training Schools:

At the close of the fall term, Mary L. Hastings resigned as critic teacher on account of ill health, and Mary B. Bills was elected to this position. Both are very efficient teachers. We are very sorry to have Miss Hastings leave, but fortunate to be able to secure the services of Miss Bills.

The normal students are devoting a whole term to practice teaching besides the work done in class recitations.

The Dormitory:

Under the splendid management of Mr. Hall, assisted by an efficient matron, an excellent cook and the best of help in the kitchen, students have been able to board here at a low rate, and I am sure they have been very happy.

The School Grounds:

The school grounds are in good condition, and the lawns are now looking finely, chiefly through the efforts of Miss Jellison and her pupils in grades V and VI. They seem to enjoy using the lawn mower.

The Special Class:

Through the kindness of the trustees this course has been continued the third year, which is understood to be the last.

This has enabled some who had begun the course previously to finish. They are all fine teachers of long experience. Many of them go back to their former positions, having been given leave of absence for a year to come here.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit to you the eighth annual report of the Washington State Normal School.

Our sub-principal, Earle D. Merrill, offered his services to the Y. M. C. A. for war work and went to Fort Terry, N. Y. in November. From November until May he acted as Y. M. C. A. secretary in a camp of 2000 men. In May he was drafted

into the army and entered Camp Devens as a regular soldier in the 303rd Battalion of Infantry on Decoration Day. July 4th was his last day at Camp Devens. On the morning of July 5th he started for France.

Miss Luce, teacher of domestic science, was called home at the beginning of the spring term by the sickness of her mother and sister. She has asked for a leave of absence for next year. Miss Duffy, teacher of manual training and drawing, finds it necessary to ask for a leave of absence for next year. These three teachers are capable, efficient, and loyal; it will be hard to find others to fill the positions.

Under present arrangements permanent teachers are engaged for model teachers in each of the four rooms of our model school. During the past year these rooms have been supplied with teachers who had had experience in other schools before returning to the model school. They have come back to our school with the knowledge which comes from experience and the model school has benefited thereby.

Each member of the graduating class in the normal school is required to teach twelve weeks in the model school under the supervision of the critic teacher and under the constant observation of the model teacher. With an older and experienced person, a trained teacher, constantly in the room while the normal school students are in training, no blunders and mistakes are allowed to continue, and as each person who graduates is required to teach in all the grades, each graduate of the Washington Normal School is qualified to handle whatever grades may be entrusted to her care.

A departure from the previous order of exercises for graduation was made this year. In place of teaching exercises the members of the graduating class put on the Greek play, *Alcestis*. A stage was erected out of doors on the campus in front of the school building. The gently sloping ground afforded the audience a splendid view of what was taking place upon the stage. The weather was perfect and the very large audience thoroughly enjoyed the play and its teaching.

Last winter was very severe in Washington county. An abundance of snow fell, the winds blew continually, and the roads and walks about the campus were blocked much of the time. No roads have been provided for the front of either

the dormitory or school building and it is necessary to make a wide detour around each building to reach the front doors. One short straight street reaching from the Jonesboro road in front of the school building to the front door of the dormitory, thence turning north and down the hill to Walter Sawyer's would greatly reduce the labor of shoveling snow and give easy approach to the front door of either building in any kind of weather.

In place of a matron to take charge of the dormitory, we now have a dean. The dean is a college graduate with several years' teaching experience in one of the best high schools in New England. To make her influence more effective throughout the school, certain classes have been assigned to the dean. This recitation work brings her into direct and constant communication with the faculty and with the students, thus giving her a wider knowledge of the school and for what it stands. She is thus the better qualified to act as preceptress in the dormitory.
