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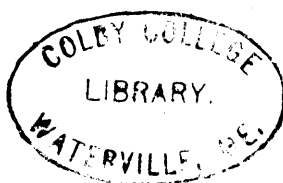

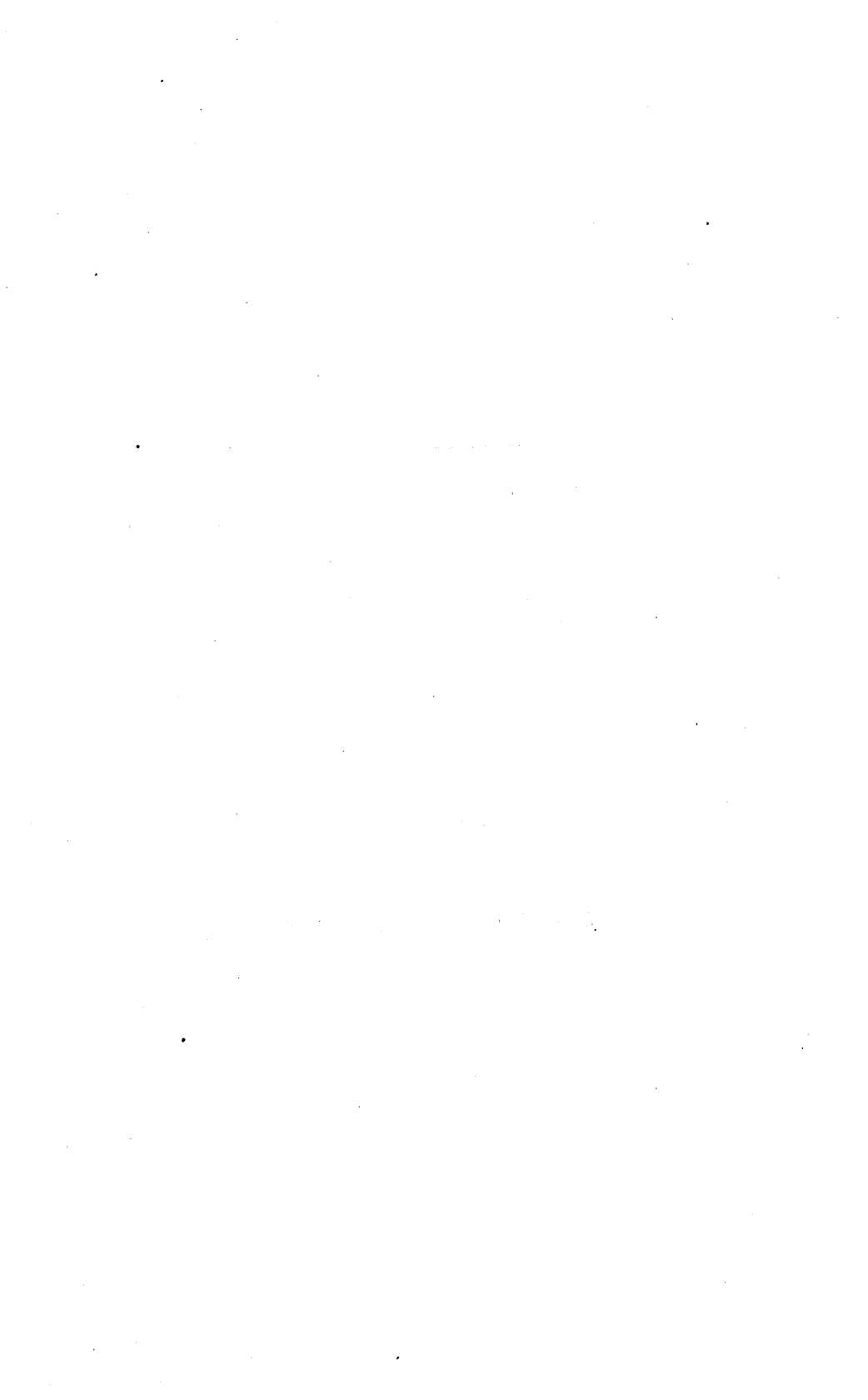

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## CHAPTER I.

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### IMPORTANT LEGISLATION 1919.

The legislature in its 1919 session enacted a number of measures of far reaching importance to the educational affairs of the state. The fact that the war had shown many of the weaknesses of our public schools and made them stand out in the glaring light of a supreme test enabled the legislature to act intelligently upon a large number of subjects calculated to strengthen our system of education and make it conform to the highest standards of efficiency. Among the laws that were passed are the following:

First, provision for rotation agricultural schools. Under this act the State Board for Vocational Education is enabled to provide for "unit courses" of instruction covering four to six weeks in the strictly agricultural towns of the state, and especially where the high school facilities are not sufficient to permit well organized courses. These courses cover one subject each season as, (a) soils and fertilization, (b) animal husbandry, (c) field crops, (d) farm management, (e) horticulture, etc. Each course receives full attention for the period desired. Instructors are equipped with a full list of apparatus which they carry with them for demonstration purposes. The first or trial school was carried on in Lee and Springfield and proved entirely satisfactory.

Second, the legislature amended the industrial education act providing for a program for Americanization. Under this act evening schools are established and persons of foreign birth and foreign tongue are taught not only to read and to write the English language but receive instruction in the responsibilities of citizenship. In many localities groups of persons of foreign birth were given instruction such as would meet the requirements for citizenship. This work will be broadened and extended from year to year.

Third, a bill for an act requiring that the common school subjects in the elementary schools be taught in the English language only. There has been a general cooperation of educational forces in carrying out the provisions of this act as rapidly as possible. The law does not prohibit the teaching of foreign languages as such in public and private schools. Owing to circumstances difficulty has been experienced to secure teachers who are efficient in the use of the English language. In the administration of this law we have endeavored to be sympathetic and to use judgment and justice.

Fourth, an act to provide a specific sum of money for the extension and up-keep of our normal schools. Under this act the state board of trustees is enabled to undertake a definite program in the building of adequate normal school facilities.

Fifth, a bill for an act virtually establishing a rural teaching profession which is said by experts in education to be one of the most direct approaches to the rural school problem yet presented. This plan of training groups of rural helping teachers is being observed with unusual eagerness by educators throughout the nation and some states are already following the plan as closely as their affairs will permit.

Sixth, an act to provide a state-wide compulsory physical education law which is permissive the following year, but becomes compulsory after September 1, 1920. A large number of towns accepted the opportunity and did excellent work in 1919. Under this act of the legislature the plan is to be introduced in elementary form and developed gradually until it meets the full requirements of the state. The program includes instruction in personal hygiene and sanitation. It includes physical exercises, both formal and informal, with recreation and games, also the project plan of living within the knowledge taught. It is the purpose of the law to institute this work in a way which will not bring embarrassment to the people by heavy direct expenses, but by using so far as possible the materials at hand and developing a corps of teachers throughout the state who can perform the work in satisfactory manner.

Seventh, an act to establish the status of the junior high school and to do away with the inefficient C class schools. In order to support this and to see that every child who attends high school within the state shall receive credit for work done



which will pass current in larger high schools and in the university and colleges an equalization fund was set aside.

Eighth, the legislature provided an equalization fund of \$40,000 for the purpose of strengthening the smaller high schools of the state and to assist communities in developing junior high schools in particular.

Ninth, an act for the standardization of the schools of the state and also enabling the state superintendent of schools to make such surveys as are necessary to determine the efficiency of the school systems of the state.

Tenth, an act reorganizing the law affecting schools in unorganized territory. The work has been broadened and extended until it is possible to protect the educational rights of all the children of the state. It enables the state superintendent through his agent to carry out an efficient program of education, the building of school buildings, and the provision of equipment so that the children in sparsely settled sections have an equal opportunity for educational facilities with the more settled sections.

Eleventh, an act to provide part time and evening classes for persons between the ages of fourteen and eighteen years employed in industrial establishments and who have not completed the elementary school.

In addition to the acts above mentioned the legislature made adequate provision for funds to carry on the various activities of the state through the office of the state superintendent of schools.

## THE 1920 EMERGENCY IN EDUCATION.

The close of the great war did not settle our problems. It seemed to accentuate them. While the war was on the people were wrought up to the highest pitch and were willing to accept conditions as they found them, saying "It is the war." The people were willing to do their utmost to shoulder tremendous financial burdens in order to win. Now we are trying to settle back into pre-war conditions when there are no pre-war conditions. People talk about normal times. The conditions existing at the breaking out of hostilities are rolled up as a scroll and laid away forever. No power on earth can restore them.

Behold! All things are new. It is said by many in consideration of the wage scale for teachers that we shall be back to the old basis before long and then wages will be too high. Let me say in this connection, that the wages which are now proposed would scarcely be too high even under old conditions. Certainly not under new conditions. They have always been too low, but we shall not come into stable times until Europe is restored. The man power of Europe is literally shot to pieces. The financial system is in a nervous collapse, and the digestive system sorely lacks food. At the least calculation it will require ten years to readjust Europe and during this time we cannot hope for a very great reduction in the present prices in America.

The system of education throughout the United States is breaking down. It is estimated that practically half of the children in the schools of America are under inexperienced and novice teachers, that 100,000 teaching positions are either vacant or filled with teachers below grade; 143,000 out of 650,000 are reported as leaving the profession last year. Normal school attendance and graduation has shrunk from 30% to 50% since 1915. Young people are not going into our normal schools and colleges to prepare for teaching as they once did and as they should now. There is little inducement for a young person, bright and active, to spend four years in a high school and two years in normal school or four years in college for the purpose of entering a profession which brings little more than a third of the compensation of workers in mills and factories, and so long as this condition prevails we shall have a waning profession.

In November, 1919, there was a shortage of 81 teachers in Maine. In September, 1788 teachers entered the profession, not over 200 of these having any training for the kind of work they are doing. During the present year 4281 teachers are teaching for the first time in their present position. This shows that the profession is a shifting one. The large number entering the profession bears out the statement. The life of the teacher as such in the state of Maine is three and six-tenths years.

## SALARIES OF HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS.

The salaries of high school teachers are little better when it is understood that higher educational qualifications are required. Under the laws of the state no teacher can teach in a high school department with less than two years of college work or its equivalent. The standard requires a full college graduate. The following tabulation shows the group of salaries of the 57 male teachers and the 352 female teachers in our high schools:

### SOME PRINCIPLES OF SALARY SCHEDULES.

Any program of wage advancement in order to be of service to the profession must recognize preparedness and successful experience. When teachers call for a flat rate of increase it is the position which secures it and not the individual teacher who may occupy the position at the time. To meet the situation when a schedule of wages is adopted a standard of qualifications should accompany the schedule. Those teachers who do not fit the higher standards will necessarily fall into the lower schedule or give the superintendent privilege of replacement.



An arrangement of salaries is not a schedule unless it provides for an annual increment. It is especially important that this be provided now. In all probability few towns will be able to pay as much this year as professional services demand. Where it is impossible a just living wage should be provided immediately and a scale of wages adopted, which with the annual increment will provide at least within two years a thrift wage, that is, a wage which will permit of savings, and within three years a cultural wage, that is, a wage which will not only provide for a reasonable saving but for attendance at school also. In order to keep abreast of the times and the rapid advance in material and method a teacher must spend one summer in three in study in a school which has for its purpose teaching of advanced professional ideals.

1. A teacher prepared for elementary service is a graduate of a standard normal school or an equal amount of college work with observation, practice teaching, special methods of instruction and management. No amount of experience without instruction in education can be reckoned as a full equivalent, but for the purpose of classification in a wage schedule a satisfactory teacher now in service who has five years of experience may be eligible.

2. A high school teacher in order to meet the requirements must be a graduate of a college with at least 14 hours in education. Two years of college or normal school graduation is the minimum qualification defined in the law. Teachers who have not completed college courses should be content to accept the lower wage unless in the judgment of the superintendent and school committee, successful experience is a reasonable offset.

3. Recognition of complete preparation is essential in both instances in order to safeguard the future of the schools. The annual increment should be sufficient to enable teachers to attend summer schools. Boards of education establishing a schedule of qualification and wage will do well to reward attendance at summer sessions and special schools especially where teachers become eligible to tenure of service.

4. In any schedule which may be arranged it should be understood that teachers who have actually proved their worth should be differentiated from those of little or no experience. The

discretionary privilege of school officials to reward teachers of unusual ability must in all cases be conserved.

5. Owing to the superior financial ability of centers of population over the more strictly rural towns it will be impossible for the country schools to meet for the present the wage schedule of the larger villages and cities, and the country school will continue to lose its most successful teachers. However, a minimum wage of \$720 for prepared teachers in the country towns will do much to restore the equilibrium. Superintendents and school committees in all towns should seek to supply their schools with well qualified teachers and differentiate their pay from those who have done nothing in a professional way. There is no reason why a country town may not establish minimum wages and minimum qualifications with an annual advancement by the same method employed in cities. It should be understood also that teachers who are satisfactory may continue in service and receive the benefit of the advance in wages. Thus is successful experience and preparation recognized.

6. In order to provide teachers a living wage it will become necessary for an advancement from 25% to 50% for all classes of educational workers. It is not only a question of retaining our teachers in elementary and secondary schools but the higher wages offered in business positions are drawing away from supervisory positions those upon whom reliance for leadership should be placed.

7. In these days when the very future of present day civilization is at stake, and when the future of our Republic demands an educated sovereignty the paramount duty of us all is to see that the schools of state and nation be maintained at their full efficiency.

8. It would not seem wise under the situation confronting us relative to the supply of prepared teachers to attempt many extensions during the coming year. It is necessary not alone for the present but for the future that the financial ability be conserved. It becomes the duty of every citizen at the coming annual meetings to accept the responsibility of a sovereign in a democracy who loves his country well enough to make a present-day sacrifice for its future.

It must be understood that we are in competition with Massachusetts and New Hampshire, both of which pay much higher

salaries and seek to secure our best prepared and most successful superintendents as they are able to locate them and as vacancies in their own corps occur. This seriously militates against our attempt to raise the standard of our superintending force. The amount it would require from each of the towns making up the union is so small that it is advisable for joint committees to meet the situation squarely and provide a suitable wage. The states about us have a minimum of \$2,000 and a median of \$2,500 to \$2,700, a great disparity in our own salaries for professional superintendents. The unions as composed at the present time were made as large as seemed compatible with good service in order that a reasonable salary may be paid without undue burden to the towns.

#### EQUALIZATION FUND.

The equalization fund has proven of great value to a large number of towns which are struggling under a high rate of taxation. This fund is made up of a direct appropriation of \$50,000, deducted from the common school funds, and the interest on reserve lands fund of unorganized townships maintaining no schools. During the current year this amounted to \$4,621.24, making a total of \$54,621.24 available for distribution among the towns of the state having their tax rates for municipal purposes and for common school purposes in excess of the averages of these rates for all the towns of the state.

There will appear some discrepancy between these figures and the tabulation of funds found in Table 9 for 1920, on account of the fact that it is necessary to use the rates for the year preceding that in which the funds are distributed. The following table gives the tax rates upon which distribution was made and the number of towns sharing.

#### CRISIS IN EDUCATION.

During the winter of the year 1919-1920 it became evident that the teaching force of the state was breaking down owing to the small salaries paid to school teachers and to the high cost of living. Business interests were able to pay high wages and were glad to attract the intelligence of the schoolroom. Many experienced and well trained teachers, therefore, took up other lines of work as a matter of self protection. They could earn in the mills, even as novices, two and three times as much per week as they received for teaching. They accepted business opportunities, joined the Red Cross, community service work, and besides this a large number were called to other states where larger salaries were in vogue. One hundred thirty-two migrated to Massachusetts. Superintendents of schools from other states made Maine the recruiting ground for teachers and always sought those of the best repute. The best teachers were in constant demand in other states.

The campaign in support of our schools was, therefore, made directly with the people, based upon the belief that the court of the people is a court of justice and when this court has the facts its decision will be just. There was no legislative session to which we could appeal. The New England democracy was, therefore, to be tested and tested in a very thorough manner. It was to be determined now whether or not democracy is equal to an emergency. It is needless to say that democracy in the hands of an intelligent people was vindicated in the annual March meetings throughout Maine. The people themselves almost unanimously increased their appropriations for common schools by 56.4%, many towns raising their rates 100% to 300%. The action of the people encouraged superintendents and teachers in all parts of the state and enabled us not only to maintain our standard but to raise it.

## SPECIAL EQUALIZATION.

His Excellency, Governor Carl E. Milliken, and the Honorable Council, Edward F. Gowell, George W. Norton, Walter E. Plummer, Willis E. Swift, Elmer S. Bird, George W. Stearns, and Clarence A. Powers, recognized the emergency in education and made a special appropriation of \$100,000 which was placed in the equalization fund to be distributed for use in 1920 and 1921. This was a great encouragement and was the real force which encouraged the people to break from their long standing economy and to establish a new record in their appreciation of the value of education.

## RECRUITING THE PROFESSION VIA NORMAL SCHOOL AND COLLEGE.

During the war we found that we were confronted not alone with fleeing teachers from the profession, but with the fact that we could not induce the young people to enter the training schools for preparation. Our attendance in the normal schools of the state fell below 50% of former enrollment, but after the action of the people in the town meetings and the substantial increases in salaries, the situation looked better. A state-wide campaign was made to recruit the profession, not directly from the graduating class to the schoolroom, but through the normal school and college. Lists of all graduates from four year high schools and academies were received in the office and special letters were sent to the students. Principals of schools were asked to check the names of those students who in their judgment would make good teachers and who might be induced to enter the profession. The state superintendent sent a special letter of invitation to all of these young people. Governor Carl E. Milliken sent a personal letter also. Superintendents, principals and teachers joined in the campaign to such an extent that an added interest became noticeable. Mr. Glenn W. Starkey, deputy state superintendent of schools, was placed in direct charge of this campaign by the state superintendent, and the effectiveness of the work is demonstrated by the results. In the summer schools of the normals and colleges of the state together with a few of the outstanding institutions of nationwide reputation about one thousand Maine teachers pursued

their studies for the purpose of improving themselves in the art of teaching. This is the most hopeful sign of the season.

#### AMERICANIZATION.

The legislative session for 1919 made funds available for carrying on evening schools and classes for adults who wished to learn the English language and the foundations of government. The work of promoting these schools was placed in the division of vocational education and a large number of evening schools and classes were organized during the winter; especially were classes organized among those who wish to become citizens of the state. Maine's problem in this particular while very important, does not hold the insurmountable obstacles presented by many states of the union.

#### INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION.

Industrial education while not coming by leaps and bounds is having a steady and wholesome growth. The idea is being taken up by the people and when introduced is beneficial. There are at the present time twenty-six agricultural high schools, eighty-seven schools teaching home economics, forty-three schools are teaching industrial education of a pre-vocational type, six vocational schools, ninety-three with departments of business and commerce, and fifteen Americanization schools.

#### PRESQUE ISLE NORMAL SCHOOL.

The Presque Isle Normal School has been conducted since its beginning in a building not suitable to normal school activities. It was originally intended for a private school and a small one; it was not only unsuitable in its arrangement, but it was impossible to keep the buildings heated. The lack of comfort materially militated against attendance in school and hindered the classes. The legislature of 1919 passed a special enactment providing for a definite sum of money to be appropriated annually for normal school extensions. It also provided that in case of an emergency the Governor and Council should use from funds not otherwise appropriated such amounts as would be necessary to build a building at Presque Isle. The legislature of 1917 had appropriated funds for several additions to normal

schools, but during the war it was impossible to carry on the plans of these buildings and the funds appropriated reverted to the contingent fund. This money having been appropriated to normal school extensions it seemed just that it should be restored. The Governor and Council, therefore, after careful investigation declared an emergency and made an appropriation of approximately \$116,000 for a new building at Presque Isle Normal School. Plans and specifications were drawn and the contract awarded to Page and Sons of Caribou on the cost plus basis, with a definite limit in the contract price. When this building is completed it will be one of the best arranged and most modern normal school buildings in the country and will accommodate about two hundred and fifty students. It will contain all the equipment necessary for first-class normal school instruction.

#### MEDICAL INSPECTION IN SCHOOLS.

While the law in regard to medical inspection in schools is optional with the town and requires the vote of the people the number of towns in which inspection in schools is carried on is constantly increasing. In those towns where school physicians have been employed for a period of years the physical deficiencies are gradually being overcome and the showing is of such a creditable nature that all towns should undertake it. The following items for the year just closed are of interest.

### CLASSIFICATION OF COMMUNITIES AS RURAL AND URBAN.

In order to make a more careful comparison of school conditions in rural and urban communities and to permit such comparison to be extended to conditions in other states, a classification of urban and rural communities in Maine has been made, and the school statistics for the year ending July 1, 1920, have been gathered on that basis.

In general, the definition of the United States Census Bureau has held in determining the classification of the towns. By this definition, any community having a population of less than 2,500 is classified as rural. Under the township form of organization as it exists in Maine, the census figures have included the population for the entire township and have classified townships having population in excess of 2,500 as urban regardless of the fact that great differences in conditions may exist in the various communities within those townships.

To meet these difficulties, the classification of communities has been more or less arbitrary, and recognition has been made of economical or industrial conditions as well as population alone.

Following is a list of the communities classified as urban communities. Schools located within the sections so classified are reported as urban schools while all other schools located in any villages and towns not listed below are reported as rural schools.

## CHAPTER II.

## REPORT ON SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1920.

*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:*

DEAR SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith my report as Agent for Secondary Education.

The composite returns for high schools and academies for the year ending June 30, 1920, show very complete recovery from the period of war depression, and in practically every item creditable progress. Since the schools were reclassified in 1910 there has been an increase of 64.4 per cent in enrollment. This gain has been made upon a high school system which in 1910 showed a larger enrollment in high school as compared with all pupils in elementary and high school than did the country as a whole in 1918. The teaching staff has increased during the same period 60 per cent, having kept pace with the enrollment in spite of the scarcity of teachers and increase in wages. The cost of the high school shows increases as must be expected, but in no degree comparable with that in other activities.

## I. CLASSIFICATION.

By legislative enactment in 1919 the Class C school was replaced by the junior high school. This amendment also standardized the school year for all high schools and gave the junior high school proper recognition. For the current year the schools have been classified as follows:

Class A .....	219
Class B .....	39
Junior High, without senior.....	4

The number of Class A schools was increased by five over that of 1919 and Class B schools by fourteen. The junior high schools listed are those in towns which do not have senior schools. In addition there are twelve towns which have junior schools as a part of the high school system.

The junior high school for the small town offers a solution of the high school and upper grade problems. The consolidation

of the last two elementary grades with the first two years of high school forms a larger and stronger unit. It justifies the employment of two or more competent teachers and guarantees a broader program of studies. Only a few towns are thus far taking up the plan but there is promise that it will find larger acceptance as it is better understood.

## II. STANDARDS FOR APPROVAL.

A revision in requirements for approval of secondary schools was issued during the year to become effective after July 1, 1920. These requirements are aimed at improvement of conditions by fixing the standards for length of recitation periods, the size of classes, the teaching force, the school building and the income for the science department and library. The requirements for the junior high school were standardized. Tentative proposals in practically the present form had been before the school officials of the state for discussion for some time. The present standards reflect the judgment of the school men of the state as well as the present trend of standard requirements throughout the country. Many schools are already meeting the new requirements in all particulars. In others, excellent progress is being made with evidence of improvement in the work of the school.

## III. TEACHERS: QUALIFICATIONS AND SALARIES.

The shortage of teachers has been felt in the high school as keenly as in any part of the school system. This situation has been met slowly by increases in salaries so that only a very few high schools have lacked the number of teachers actually needed. The shortage has been reflected in the qualifications of teachers. A study of the preparation of 621 principals and teachers of academic subjects in high schools showed that 418 or 67.1 per cent held a college degree. Of the remainder, 88 had two or more years of college work, 40 had completed normal school courses and the remaining 75 had less than two years of college or normal school training. The survey, while not complete for the state, shows a good percentage of qualified teachers. However, with one-third of our teachers of academic subjects having less than a college course, the scholarship standards of our teachers leave much to be desired.

An increasing number of teachers are attending summer schools of college grade. Of the 70 students enrolled at the first session of the Bates College summer school, 1919, at least 60 had had teaching experience. More and more of our teachers are going out of the state for summer courses. The influence of professional ideals and training is being felt wherever these teachers are working.

The salary advance, not only for the year past but for the period since 1915, is noteworthy. For the latter period the increase was 42 per cent in the case of men and 53 per cent for women. The salaries for this year were greater than for 1919 by 17 per cent for men and 25 per cent for women. Both comparisons reflect the seriousness of the effort of the state to pay its teachers at least a living wage.

#### IV. CONDITION OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

The school building used in whole or in part for high school was made the topic of a limited study to determine the general condition of such buildings. No attempt was made to inspect buildings as a whole nor to rate according to detailed standards. Hence the classification below is approximate only. It shows however the general conditions for the state.

With the promise of lower costs for materials and labor there should be a strong movement toward the bringing fully up to

standard the 143 buildings classified as poor, fair and good, either by replacement with new buildings or by remodeling.

#### V. SPECIAL AID TO SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

The fund corresponding to the equalization fund for elementary schools has proven of very material aid to towns struggling under the burdens of increasing costs for high school maintenance. In the apportionment of this fund the same basis as is required by law for the elementary fund has served as a starting point. The apportionment was made after a study of the conditions of support, the budget for the year and the needs of each school. The larger part of the fund was used for teachers' wages. Many of the apportionments for library and equipment were made on condition that the town expend a certain sum for the same purpose. A few towns were aided in repairs to insure better accommodations, improvements in ventilation, special equipment and other similar purposes.

In all, eighty-three towns and seven academies benefited by special aid. The general purposes for which the apportionments were made and the total amount in each case are as follows:

NOTE:—The total exceeds that given in the statistical tables as later payments applying on the 1920 school year are here included.

Thus far the fund has been used very largely to meet the emergency conditions of the past two years. In the future it should be applied more and more to improvement in special fields such as the securing of professional teachers, improvement in housing conditions and the encouragement of special types of school work.

#### VI. ACADEMIES.

The academies of the state have shown a very marked increase in total enrollment over 1919. This is clearly due to the general

readjustment that has been coming about and corresponds with a large increase in the number of pupils who are going to secondary schools from towns not maintaining high schools. Increasing attendance with a larger tuition rate has relieved the financial strain to some degree. No changes of importance have occurred in the academy administration. There seems to be evidence that more towns are recognizing the contractual arrangement as a means of supporting a high school through the agency of the academy. This plan deserves encouragement, as an opportunity is afforded to towns to maintain satisfactory high school facilities through the cooperation with an institution that has in itself considerable strength. In the instances of contract it would seem entirely proper that the school committee of the town should have some voice in the general management of the school and that the superintendent as agent of the committee should be given general supervisory powers. The plan tends to bring stronger support on the part of the town and a more vital interest in the success of the academy. So far as we can determine, the academy does not suffer in any respect from this cooperative arrangement.

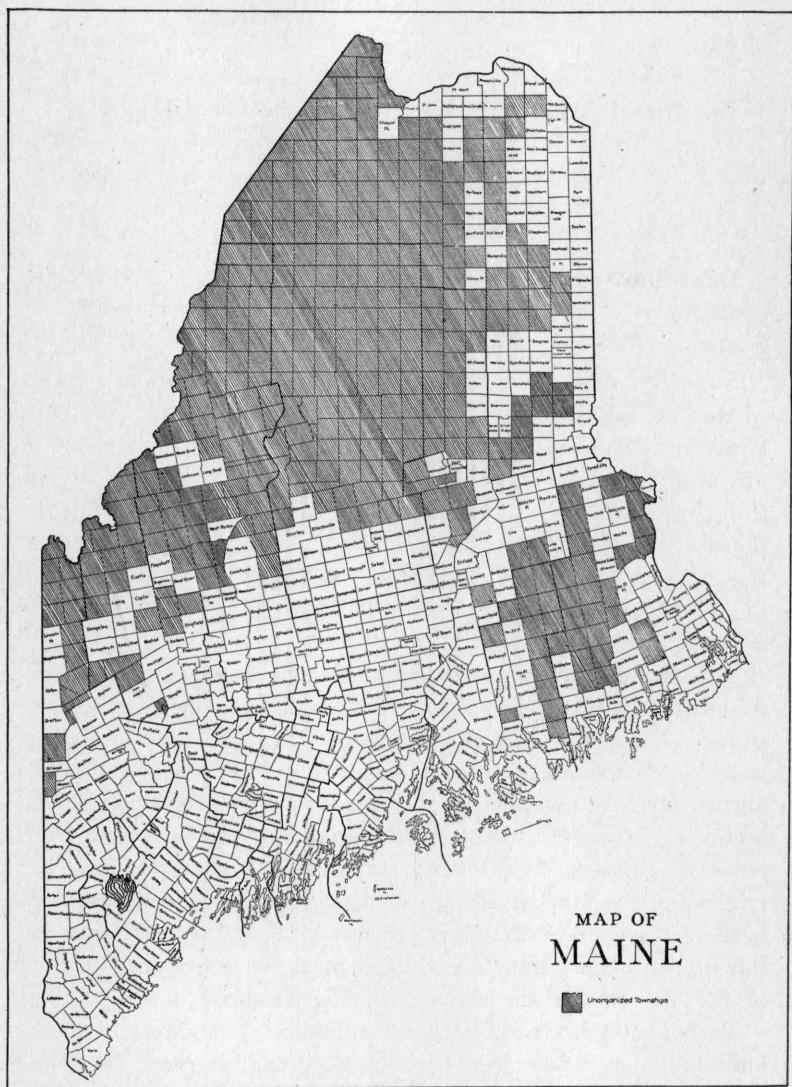
#### VII. TUITION PUPILS IN SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

The number of pupils attending secondary schools from towns which do not support schools of standard grade has grown rapidly. In 1920 there were 1,000 more pupils of this group than in 1917, with 234 towns reporting tuition pupils. These figures give evidence that the high school system of the state is sufficiently extended to serve a very large proportion of the pupils who are eligible for such schools.

The increase in the tuition rate provided by the amendment to the law passed by the legislature of 1919 raised very considerably the amount expended by the towns. However, so far as can be determined, the actual cost per pupil for towns that do not maintain high schools is considerably lower than for the towns that are maintaining schools of standard grade. Hence, the higher rate of tuition has not become a serious burden upon the towns directly.

## SCHOOLING IN UNORGANIZED TERRITORY.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1920.

*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:*

DEAR SIR:—I submit herewith a report of the progress and conditions for the past year in the Unorganized Territory School System.

*New School Law for Unorganized Territory.* The passage of the Act for Schooling in Unorganized Territory by the Legislature of 1919 was without doubt of the greatest importance as affecting education in unorganized sections of the state of anything occurring since the first provision made for schooling therein over twenty years ago. For a long time the need of this new law was felt. It took the place of the Act for Schooling of Children in Unorganized Townships passed in 1897 and amended thereafter from time to time.

The new law is comprehensive. It gives sufficient authority, it is believed, to provide properly for all the educational needs of this distinctive part of the state educational system. It is based upon the experience gained in administering the old law and permits the adoption of modern ideas for education in rural sections. It contains all of the satisfactory provisions of the old law, changes or eliminates undesirable ones, broadens and extends others, and makes many new provisions. We have now been working under this law for one year and already substantial improvements have been made in many directions, mention of the most important of which follows somewhat in detail.

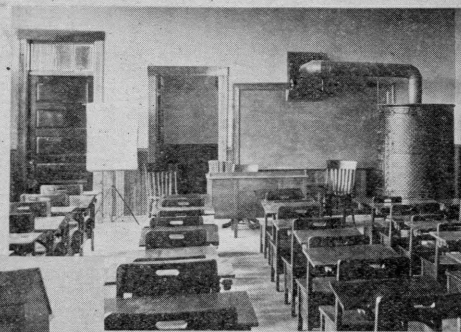
*School Buildings.* A rather complete program of school building improvement has been outlined and this will doubtless take a period of several years to fully carry out. It is felt that eventually school buildings which will compare favorably with those of the most favored rural communities will be provided for all unorganized places with a permanent population and a school of any size. It is planned to erect each year several

model school buildings beginning in those places where buildings are most needed. It is also planned to repair and remode. each year a number of buildings where this can be done with satisfactory results.

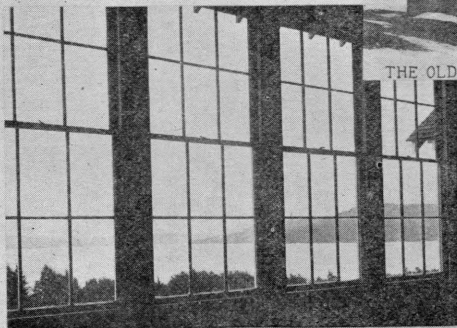
During the past year model rural school buildings have been erected at Sinclair, Township 17, R. 4, W. E. L. S., Aroostook County, and in the Blaine District in Rockwood Township, Somerset County, while a portable building was provided for Holeb, Township 6, R. 1, N. B. K. P., Somerset County. In addition new school lots have been purchased in two other townships where it is planned to erect new buildings in the near future. Substantial repairs have been made to a number of buildings in other places. The new buildings seem worthy of at least brief description.

At Sinclair a small, rudely constructed, unattractive school building, in no way suited for this purpose, has been replaced by a new building located on a fine lot of one acre overlooking Long Lake. This building is very attractive both in exterior and interior appearance. The schoolroom accommodates forty pupils. There is a stage in this room and it may be easily arranged for community use, movable chair desks being used. There are two coat rooms, a small work room and an attached outbuilding with toilets and wood room. The building is heated by a sanitary room furnace with ventilating attachment and is especially well furnished and equipped. The change in one step from the primitive old building to this new model building was a most unusual and complete one. This building in addition to providing a fine school home for the children of this community is also serving as a most effective object lesson in the way of a model rural school to the people of the Madawaska territory. The cuts show the striking contrast between the old and new buildings.

At the Blaine District, Rockwood Township, an improvement even greater has been made. Here an old, dilapidated log building has been replaced by a new model schoolhouse which would be a credit to any rural community. Local interests added substantially to the state appropriation and a more pretentious building than was first planned was thus made possible. This building has a very attractive schoolroom for thirty or more pupils and this is also adapted for community use with stage

and movable chair desks. There is a well arranged coat room, a good sized boys' work room, a girls' work room of the same size, toilets, and a wood room, all under one roof. The building is provided with a ventilating heater of the best type and with chemical toilets. The equipment is very complete. The lot is one acre in size and located on Moose River a short distance from Moosenead Lake. Probably no rural community in Maine ever experienced a greater improvement of this nature.

At Holeb a model portable building to accommodate fifteen pupils has been provided in place of the old, primitive log building. This has been placed on a leased lot much better located than the old lot which was not owned by the state. As the future of this place is uncertain and the school small it seemed a proper place in which to try this type of building. The building is well arranged, properly heated, lighted and ventilated. It has proven to be very satisfactory thus far.

On account of unfavorable building conditions it will probably be advisable to discontinue the building program for a time but when it is resumed new buildings should be erected at Guerette and Ouellette located, respectively, in Townships 17, R. 4, W. E. L. S. and 17, R. 5, W. E. L. S., Aroostook County. Both places are farming communities of French people and each school enrolls nearly forty pupils. The present school building in each case is primitive and could not be built over or remodeled advantageously. These two places are about five miles apart and probably a saving could be made by erecting the two buildings under one contract.

*Helping Teachers.* Two helping teachers have been employed the past year, Mrs. Ethel Brown and Mrs. Veda Madden. Both are normal graduates and took the special course for helping teachers given at Castine. Mrs. Brown was located at Norcross. Her school was maintained during the last five days of the week and on Mondays she visited the unorganized territory schools located on the line of the Bangor and Aroostook Railroad including the schools at West Sebocis, Grindstone, Davidson and Harvey. Mrs. Madden taught the school at Howe Brook. She devoted most of her time to community work but made a few visits to the schools located at Griswold and Squa Pan Lake. In both cases the plan proved very successful, so much so that it is recommended four or more such teachers be

employed for another year. By this plan proper supervision can be given the work of teachers of most of the unorganized territory schools which otherwise would be impossible.

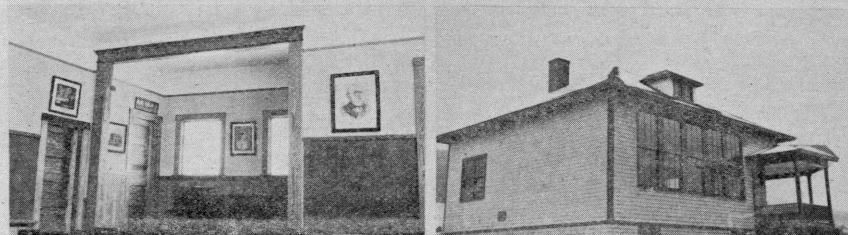
*School Year.* A larger appropriation has made possible a longer school year in such places as this is practicable. Accordingly a school year of thirty-six weeks has been maintained in a number of places while in others the school year has been increased to thirty-four weeks. When new buildings are provided the school year can be lengthened in a number of places where at present thirty weeks is about as long as a school can be maintained profitably.

*Course of Study and Textbooks.* A new course of study based on the State Course of Study and especially adapted for the unorganized territory has been prepared and placed in the hands of teachers the past year. This course is on the nine grade plan but can be adapted for the eight grade plan which the school year of thirty-six weeks will make possible in a number of places. In connection with the new course of study a complete system of textbooks has been adopted and it is planned to make this system uniform eventually in all of the unorganized territory schools. In the matter of textbooks and supplies these schools can be as well provided for, even though at a disadvantage in some other respects, as the schools of any other system. It is felt that this advantage should not be lost sight of and every proper and reasonable provision made for these schools in this respect.

*Lighthouse Teachers.* An additional lighthouse teacher has been employed the past year. Miss Lilla Severance, who has carried on this work alone, with the exception of a few months, since its beginning in 1915, was assigned a year ago to the western coast of the state and the new teacher, Mrs. Velma Sargent, to the eastern coast. Each teacher has had an average of four light stations to visit. The work has been carried out under the same plan of visits from station to station with the exception that the visits were increased in length from one to two weeks. This has been a great improvement and given the pupils over twice the amount of time under a regular teacher, less time being used going from one station to another. It may seem advisable in the future to increase the number of lighthouse teachers to three or four but recently there has been such

a constant change at the light stations caused by the removal and transferring of families that the employment of additional teachers at present seems inadvisable.

*U. S. Government Reservations.* A school was opened at the U. S. government reservation of Fort McKinley last fall for primary children and continued through the school year with very satisfactory results. This school should be continued as long as conditions remain the same. Arrangements were made also the past year for payment of the tuition of children living on the government reservation at Togus. Several other cases were investigated but these two places appeared to be the only ones where the provisions of the new law applied and were needed.

*Statistical Information.* Attention is called to the Table of Statistics for Unorganized Territory in the appendix of this report. Therein will be found detailed information relative to the number and location of unorganized townships and other units where school privileges have been provided; school population thereof; schools maintained with enrollment and attendance; transportation, board and tuition of pupils; teachers employed, and classified expenditures.

The only item in the table in which there is a marked change is that of the total expenditure. This is accounted for in the greater part by the expenditure of \$8,865.64 for new school buildings and repairs, this being a new item of expenditure. The total expenditure is affected in a lesser degree by higher teachers' salaries and the increase in the cost of all other items of expense necessary in the maintenance of a school system of this kind. The annual appropriation of \$35,000.00 supplemented by the school tax of something over \$2,000.00 and other small credits will probably be sufficient for the ensuing year.

## RURAL SCHOOLS.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1920.

*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:*

DEAR SIR:—Since the last report of my work as State Agent for Rural Education, I have worked especially for progress along those lines which come under my special charge and am glad to report that some very definite results have been observed. Three distinct matters are of interest—"Community Interest and Support," "Noon Supervision" and the "Improvement of Teaching as a Profession." Under Community Interest and Support comes the work of our State School Improvement League. I act as state secretary of this organization, representing the state department of education, and considerable time is spent in furthering the interests of this valuable society. In June, 1920, a survey of the rural schools of the state, made to ascertain certain facts along rural school lines, showed the following data in regard to the league work.

Number of superintendents in state.....	142

Reports have been received from nearly all of these leagues and all sorts of material has been supplied to the different organizations. Extracts from some of these reports give an idea of what we are trying to accomplish through the leagues. One teacher writes, "Our Thomas School Improvement League has also worked up a great interest on the part of our homes, to such an extent that eight men with teams have promised to come and haul gravel to fix up the school yard."

Another reports, "The following things have been done for the physical improvement of our school this term, some altogether through our efforts—some were paid for by the town and others. We have purchased a victrola and records, having



raised the money at a social. We have procured a clock, organ, window shades, curtain for book case, oiled the floor, had shelves put up for plants, had a large sand box made for the playground, our superintendent made arrangements for having our room papered and it was through her efforts that the town paid for our organ. She also had another window put in, thus making better lighting. The teacher purchased dishes for serving hot lunches and the bill for these was sent in to the town.

"We had a Christmas tree the last night of the term. People for miles around came and what is said to be the largest crowd of people ever in the schoolhouse was present. We thought this a splendid manifestation of their interest in us and our doings. Certainly a big spirit of good will was shown in every way, and we are sure we did not disappoint them in our exhibition of what we have done and can do."

A teacher writes concerning one of our new leagues—"This is the first league in this school and great interest is being shown. The parents were willing to help us and we have an enrollment of 34 members. We have given a social and cleared \$16.50 which we are to invest in books for the library. We are planning to spend our meetings during the spring in taking up nature study and in making our building and grounds much more attractive."

The Parent-Teacher Association is another line of this community service, though since there is a state organization outside of the state office, the work here in its behalf is only of a cooperative type. In the June survey were found forty-two parent-teacher associations not reported under the School Improvement League head. Cooperation also has been given to the women's clubs and granges of the state. I have served as secretary of the Maine Federation of Women's Clubs and also as secretary of the Maine State Grange Scholarship Fund, and during the period covered by this report have given twenty-six addresses at community meetings.

Noon supervision, including the hot noon lunch, has been an important part of the year's work. Circular letters and pamphlets have been sent out and many articles have been written for the Maine School Bulletin and the newspapers in the endeavor to interest the teachers and citizens in the matter of having adequate supervision during the noon hour in every school.

where children bring their dinners. At the same time, the matter of the hot noon lunch in such schools has been agitated, and the serving of at least one hot dish to supplement the lunch brought from home has been strongly advised.

As a part of the survey mentioned before, out of the 2,479 schools sending returns, it was found that 1,620 teachers remained at noon and properly supervised that period. Of these schools 318 reported that they served at least one hot dish regularly during the entire year, while another seventy-five are reported as serving a hot dish during the winter months only.

Along the line of "Improvement of Teaching as a Profession," I have endeavored to help all of our rural teachers in every possible way and, wherever possible, to acquaint them with the best methods and devices available. In this connection, an attempt has been made to further the study and appreciation of good music in our rural schools. There has been great effort to increase the number of talking machines in our country schools, since it is believed that they are of great assistance to our teachers in enabling them to present the best types of music to their pupils. Where teachers have themselves had very little training in teaching music, the educational aids offered by our talking machine companies are of much value in the actual technical teaching of school music. Through the courtesy of one of these companies, during the spring months the services of a teacher of music were secured to go about with the rural agent and demonstrate the possibilities of this work. In the June survey, it was found that out of the 2,470 schools, there were 463 who reported that they own and use talking machines as a part of their school work.

During this year school visitation has been carried on as usual in company with the local superintendents, as described in preceding reports; teachers' meetings have been held, bulletins prepared along such lines as "Suggestions for the Play Hour" and teachers assisted in making daily programs, securing material for special days and calls for advice or material along all lines connected with rural school teaching have been promptly answered. I have attended and taken part in all the state and county teachers' conventions, and have given forty-four addresses to teachers during the year on these different occasions.

In addition to the above, I visited four of the state normal schools and have attended and taken part in a conference of state normal school teachers at Gorham, have attended a conference of all of the superintendents and supervisors of New England and attended and had a part on the program of the N. E. A.

Besides my duties along my own distinct lines of work, assistance when requested has been given to our State Agent for Secondary Schools in the arranging and carrying on of the teacher training courses in 13 academies of the state.

This work is of importance to our rural schools as in our present shortage of teachers, we are obliged to employ the graduates of these courses for our smaller one-room schools. Visits have been made to as many of these courses as time would permit, correspondence has been carried on with nearly all the directors of such courses and, in two of the best academies, a model rural school has been established solely for demonstration and practice purposes in connection with the training courses in each academy.

*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:*

DEAR SIR:—I herewith submit a report of my activities for the year ending June 30, 1920.

My duties, in general, have included such administrative work as has assisted the state superintendent of public schools in his execution of the laws relating to schools and local school officers in problems relating to their school systems. Combined with this has been such field work as has permitted a closer knowledge of the conditions under consideration. My work has extended to all types of communities without special effort to confine it to those classified as rural.

A summary of administrative work includes the following:

*Administrative Work:* Equalization fund—including completion of all details in reference to the apportionment of this fund for the year 1919 and preliminary details with reference to the apportionment for 1920 with reports and recommendations to the state superintendent of schools.

Teachers' Meetings—Assistance to officers of teachers' organizations in the arrangement of programs for county, union and local teachers' meetings.

Financial Studies and Reports—Assistance to the state superintendent in the study and report with reference to salaries of superintendents and the distribution of funds for the equalization of expense of supervision; studies and reports with reference to teachers' salaries and terms of employment and local problems in regard to the same; studies and reports of local financial support of common schools.

Miscellaneous Studies and Reports—Assistance given to school officers and citizens in special problems of organization, buildings and administration with detailed reports on the same.

Building Improvements—Examination and criticism of plans for new buildings and remodeled buildings and the preparation of suggestive sketches and plans for the use of committees.

School for Rural Leaders—Assistance to the state superintendent in the conduct of the school for rural leaders held at Castine in July-August, 1919, and in preparation for a similar

school to be held in the summer of 1920. This has included lectures and class leadership and advising in the selection of candidates for the school.

In addition to the above has been combined work of a general nature including preparation of material for publication, preparation and assistance in revision of report forms, suggestions on various details of local school administration, grouping of communities into classification as rural or urban, general assistance in looking toward consolidation of schools, improvement of conveyance, improvement of methods of instruction, etc., and work related to the administration of the Department of Rural Education of the National Education Association.

*Equalization Fund:* A study of rates of taxation for the support of schools and all other municipal activities as well as other conditions relating to the eligibility of towns to share in the equalization fund was made and reported upon to the state superintendent of schools. Apportionments were made to 183 towns under such general conditions of eligibility as are described in preceding pages of this report.

Following is a summary of the amounts paid to the towns and the purposes for which funds were apportioned. These amounts were paid in November and December, 1919, and were in addition to other moneys paid out of the state school funds.

*Comment on comparative statistics for schools in rural and urban communities:* Reference to the tables in the appendix relating to elementary schools will indicate the figures of enrollment of pupils, teaching positions, and other basal facts relating both to rural and urban schools. It will be noted that 59% of the pupils registered attend rural schools and that 68% of the elementary teaching positions are in rural schools.

An analysis of the figures relating to the teachers employed in rural school and urban school positions indicates a marked disparity in the points of training, experience and continuity of service. In order to fill the 2,364 rural school positions 4,311 different persons were employed within the year while to fill 1,515 urban school positions, only 1,631 different persons were employed. Only 2,237 rural school teachers (52%) continued in the same school for the entire year, while 1,322 urban school teachers (81%) so continued.

On the point of experience, it appears that 22% of those employed in rural schools were entering upon their first year of service, while only 8% of those employed in urban schools were novices.

In the matter of training, an analysis of the returns shows that 37% of all teachers were graduates of standard normal schools but that 35% of all teachers in addition had received the advantages of partial normal training or had completed academy or sub-standard teacher training courses, thus giving 74% of the teaching staff with full or partial professional training. In the cases of teachers of rural schools, however, only 24% were reported as having complete normal training, 16% partial normal training and 22% as having completed sub-standard courses, resulting in only 63% of the entire rural teaching force with any professional work. In the urban schools 97% of all teachers have had the advantage of at least partial professional training with 72% graduates of standard normal schools.

The degree of inexperience and lack of training is further emphasized by the fact that nearly all of the teaching permits issued have been for persons employed in rural schools and that 19% of the teachers in those schools are holding such permits.

An encouraging feature is the fact that in attending teachers' meetings and summer schools, the interest of teachers in rural schools is apparently as keen as that of teachers of the other group. This is especially noticeable in figures relating to summer school attendance wherein it appears that out of the 495 teachers reported as attending summer schools within the year, 398 were teachers in rural schools.

Reference to the statistics will show that 69% of the schools of the state are rural and that most of these (71%) are one-teacher schools. The actual number of one-teacher rural schools reported is 1,261. Forty-eight such schools are located in urban communities but this number includes small buildings used for primary schools, portables, etc. 435 rural schools are located in two-room buildings and 489 rural schools are maintained in school buildings having more than two class rooms in use. 90% of the urban schools are maintained in buildings having more than two rooms.

Of the 3,050 public school buildings in use, 2,697 are located in rural communities. Of this number 2,505 are used for elementary school purposes, 132 are used for both elementary and secondary school purposes and 39 are used for secondary school purposes only. In urban communities there are 353 school buildings in use, of which 297 are elementary, 30 secondary and 24 used for both purposes.

So far as the condition of school buildings is concerned, it is quite apparent that those in rural communities are far inferior. Only 76% of these are reported to be "in good condition" while over 90% of the urban buildings are so reported.

In the matter of satisfactory arrangement, the rural school buildings again show inferiority. Only 27% (735) are reported to meet the standards of arrangement in heating and ventilation, 29% (793) in lighting, 28% (778) in sanitation and 17% (449) in all of the three standards mentioned. In urban schools 79% (263) are reported as meeting standards in heating and ventilation, 64% (226) in lighting, 82% (289) in sanitation and 58% (204) in all three.

This analysis reaffirms statements that have been made relative to inequalities of educational opportunity in Maine communities. It is encouraging to note, however, that such inequalities are fast being removed. The substantial increases in financial support, wise leadership of union superintendents and the activities of the rural helping teachers are doing much for marked improvements in the school organization.

*Programs of improvement of school buildings:* Although retarded by high prices for labor and material, many towns have carried on programs which are resulting in the placement of all buildings in standard condition. Improvements of one-teacher school buildings are most numerous and with very satisfactory results. In most cases these include the correction of lighting, the installation of jacketed ventilating stoves and the improvement of toilets by the installation of chemical closets or the construction of satisfactorily arranged dirt closets connected with the school-room by well ventilated passageways. In the cases of one-teacher school-buildings, for which proposals are made for improvement, it has been the policy of this department to advise that this be undertaken only for those buildings not likely to be included in any consolidation program.



Country and village school buildings, in general inferior to those of larger communities, are being improved at so rapid a rate that the degree of inferiority becomes much less marked. At the present rate of improvement, a decade should see uniformly satisfactory conditions. Conditions becoming favorable to building operations and a well planned survey and campaign undertaken would result in the attainment of such satisfactory conditions in six or seven years. Legislation compelling satisfactory toilet arrangements would be productive of great improvements in what generally is the least satisfactory arrangement of the country school building.

*Field work:* Visitations to 103 towns have been made for various purposes divided as follows:

For general visitation of schools, and incidental conferences with teachers and school officers.....	14

*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:*

DEAR SIR:—The report for this division has been compiled from statistics left by Mr. Monohon and has been divided into two parts (I) Vocational and (II) State Aided Courses.

I. Vocational.

a. *Administration and Supervision.*

With the exception of a few weeks last fall, there has been no director and no supervisor of trades and industries, the many duties of these positions being cared for by the state superintendent. On February 1 the new director was appointed and had the following duties:

Director of Vocational Education.

Director of State Aided Courses.

Director of Americanization and Evening Schools.

Acting Supervisor of Trades and Industries.

Agriculture and home economics have been fortunate in having efficient supervisors for each department.

b. *Teacher Training.*

1. Teacher training for agriculture has been done at the University of Maine under the supervision of H. S. Hill assisted by Roy Thomas.

2. Teacher training in home economics has been done at the University of Maine by Miss Frances R. Freeman.

3. Teacher training in trades and industries was not carried on owing to the pressure of other work. Preliminary efforts and arrangements were made for carrying on extension courses in four centers.

c. *Kinds of Classes.*

The following kinds of classes have been subsidized from Smith-Hughes funds:

1. *Agriculture*, day and short winter courses. Nineteen towns are maintaining all day high school courses as shown in table 29.

The work in the schools of the state has been very gratifying and the Smith-Hughes requirements have insured a strong relationship of this work to the

community. Teachers have been employed twelve months and visited the boys regularly, supervising the farm project.

As some of the farming districts could not be reached by existing high schools, short intensive winter courses were started which were open to men and women, boys and girls, both afternoons and evenings, and proved profitable for sixty-eight farm residents who carried on a home project paralleling the course of study.

2. *Home Economics*, day, evening and part-time courses. The work in this department has been under the supervision of Miss Bernardine Cooney of Farmington Normal School with five day courses and seven evening courses.
3. *Trade and Industries*, day, evening and part-time courses. Three day classes and two evening classes have been in operation throughout the year as shown in table 29.

d. *Work Planned.*

1. Supervisor of Trade and Industrial Education. A supervisor of trade and industrial education to be in charge of the field work for vocational and state industrial courses was elected at the close of the year.
2. Analysis of the Pulp and Paper Industry. Preliminary arrangements for the analysis of the pulp and paper industry were made with the Oxford Paper Company at Rumford. This work will be carried out during this summer.
3. Investigation of Textile and Machine Shop Industry. The greater part of this summer will be spent in establishing co-operative relationships between the various plants and this department, hoping in this way to become acquainted with the various leaders and gain their confidence by acquainting them with the work which is being done.

## 4. Publication.

A general bulletin on vocational education in Maine has been written. Material has been received from the Federal Board to assist in publishing the results of the Rumford survey.

## II. State Aided Courses.

- a. There has been a marked growth in home economics and industrial courses. We now have 13,135 boys and girls registered in these courses.
- b. A great deal of interest has been shown in the seventy-three evening schools with an average attendance of 1,822 men and women.
- c. Americanization. There are so many inquiries in regard to organization and class outlines that we have conservatively estimated an enrollment of two thousand men and women for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE MODERN  
HEALTH CRUSADE.

*To the State Superintendent of Public Schools, Augusta, Maine:*

DEAR SIR:—The Modern Health Crusade is a nation-wide and rapidly becoming a world-wide campaign to interest children, their families and the community in the pursuit of health. The movement was founded by the National Tuberculosis Association in 1917 and about four million children have been enrolled as health crusaders in all parts of the world.

Eligibility to membership in the Modern Health Crusade requires the daily performance and the recording of practical hygienic duties called health chores. By performing seventy-five per cent of the chores weekly the child earns the title of Page, Squire, Knight and Knight Banneret in health knighthood receiving membership in the national as well as in the state club of crusaders. Insignia are awarded with the titles and the opportunity to take part in national contests, competing for prizes offered by various organizations, appeals to the child.

In this way the Modern Health Crusade with its elements of play and romance brought into the practice of hygiene furnishes a practical system not merely for teaching health truths, but what is more essential, for forming health habits. The results of faithfully carrying out this plan are physical improvement and prevention of disease for the crusaders and their families; also the awakening of community responsibility. Even less efficiently carried out, it cannot fail to be a great factor in carrying health truths from the school to the home, thus awakening the community to the knowledge and practice of more sanitary methods of living.

In 1919 Miss Frances Mosher and Miss Winifred E. Taylor were selected by the Maine Anti-Tuberculosis Association to start the Modern Health Crusade in this state. They solicited the aid of club women and teachers and in September with the approval of the state superintendent of schools visited rural schools remote from large centers giving talks on personal

hygiene and school sanitation and organizing Modern Health Crusade clubs. Many schools completed the course and deserve great credit for doing so under adverse conditions.

In February, 1920, the success and value of the work being assured, the plan was recognized as a part of the regular course of study for the public schools and Maine always ready to accept and carry on the best methods in educational progress became, we believe, the third state in the Union to make this system a part of the regular school work.

During the year nearly one thousand schools in thirty-five unions were visited and twenty-five thousand children were enrolled from the first grade through the high school, but the number completing the course were for the greater part in grades from three to eight inclusive, numbering about twenty thousand. If a showing of numbers had been sought it would have been very easy to obtain had the directors spent an equal amount of time and effort in the large towns and cities.

The result of the first year's work was quite satisfactory: approximately twenty thousand received the first title and the certificate enrolling them as members of the Modern Health Crusade; fifteen thousand received the second title; nearly ten thousand the third and about five thousand the highest rank. But while these numbers represent the pupils who attained the highest titles in health knighthood, on an average all the pupils were performing the chores but not attaining the required number each week necessary to gain the title.

This year the work has been a contribution from the Maine Public Health Association to the public schools being for the greater part financed by this body which was formerly the Maine Anti-Tuberculosis Association. The teachers and pupils were enthusiastic from the start and the splendid co-operation of superintendents, principals, teachers, school nurses, and health officers has been very helpful in making possible the results obtained.

An increase the past year of fifteen per cent in the number entering this school encourages us to believe that the curve of low attendance has reached its low mark and begun to rise. The compensation for small attendance is found in part in the high quality of those who choose teacher preparation in a time of increased cost of everything, as well as a time of high wages in industrial life.

The work of this school is greatly enhanced in value by the tenure of position of the teachers. A large nucleus of our teaching staff has been so long identified with the school that they give to it a character and an excellence which no shifting faculty, however able, could give. This is as much proven by the instability of the Home Economics positions as by the permanence of the regular course staff. We have not yet secured

for the Home Economics department anything like a permanent condition. This is wholly because of salaries. It is earnestly hoped that we may soon find Maine-bred teachers who will be contented with Maine climate and held by a salary which will be made sufficiently high to remove the lure of other states and to sustain self-respect in an able teacher in her own native state.

The social life of the school the past year has been led and enriched by the Christian Association which has never before been so useful and influential.

Student government in a modified form has now been in operation for a little more than a year. It has been successful in operation as it is right in principle.

Your attention is called to our conditions for the housing of the school. The appropriation of three years ago for a new dormitory was set aside by the Governor and Council because the country became involved in the World War. Registration in normal schools is again increasing and our facilities are too small. Purington Hall, our only dormitory, takes care of one hundred students. Before this report will be made public we shall have twice that number applying for rooms. I urge that this fact be presented to the legislature of 1921 for its early consideration.

### *Manual Training.*

Miss Wiggin does much helpful work outside of manual training.

### *Household Arts.*

Miss Mary E. Huston has had charge of this department. The work here has been practical and very beneficial to the students. They have made dresses, skirts, waists, guest towels, etc. Miss Huston is a very efficient teacher.

### *The Model Training Schools .*

Mary B. Bills has been critic teacher, Edna C. Harquail has had charge of the village grammar school, Beth M. Jellison of grades V and VI, Ruth E. Dority of grades III and IV, and Wilda M. Davis of grades I and II. Miss Jellison and her students have, as in previous years, kept the grounds looking finely. The boys enjoy using the lawn mower.

### *The School Garden.*

This has been in charge of William D. Hall. It has, as usual, been an important feature in the school work. It has furnished to the class in agriculture a practical illustration of the way such work ought to be done, and has helped greatly in keeping down the expenses of the dormitory. It is one of the very best gardens in this vicinity.

### *Aside from teachers.*

The graduation this year differed from what had been offered before. In 1918 and 1919 out-door pageants were presented, but this year it seemed wise not to attempt anything that would require a great amount of preparation on the part of the pupils, for much time had been lost on account of the influenza epidemic. A speaker, Rev. Roy E. Myers, of Chelsea, Mass., delivered an oration on the subject "Teaching, a Trade or a Profession."

In September, 1919, a course in the training of teachers to occupy positions in junior high schools was introduced. Students in this course take the professional work given in the other course. This professional work includes one term of psychology, one term of school management, one term of "Present Day Tendencies in Education," one term of school law and history of education, and one term of practice teaching and the study of methods. In place of the primary school subjects the students for junior high school work will have one year in elementary French, one year of work in junior high school mathematics, (arithmetic, algebra, geometry and trigonometry,) two terms of history and government, two terms of elementary Latin, and one term of practice teaching. Eleven took up the work in September and have now completed the first year.

Two other changes have been incorporated into the curriculum, viz., class instruction in piano and violin teaching, and the correlation of industrial arts with the other subjects of study. The work in industrial arts as given the past year was taken under the following heads—how man has provided himself with food, shelter, clothing, utensils, weapons, and how he has put his story on record.

#### SUMMER SCHOOL, 1919.

One hundred and four registered for our summer school courses. The pupils came from a much wider area than ever before, some coming from New Brunswick, some from Massachusetts, and some from York, Cumberland, Kennebec, Piscataquis, Penobscot, Aroostook, and Washington counties. Two courses were featured this year—the course in history of Maine and the course in Physical Education. The latter is to be required as a part of the elementary work in Maine schools in the future, and all who attend the summer school were expected to take the work; if unable to do the physical exercises, they were obliged to observe the others at work and make notes thereon. Practically the entire school took the work in history of Maine.

Three courses in nature study, (one in ornithology, one in botany, and one in entomology,) were offered again this year and 25 pupils elected these subjects.
