GENTLEMEN:—As required by section 122, chapter 16 of the Revised Statutes of the state, I have the honor to submit the annual report of the State Superintendent of Public Schools giving a detailed statement of the public schools of Maine for the year ending June 30, 1921. This report shows the school census, school attendance, school receipts and expenditures and the general efficiency of the schools in all the towns of the state.

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CHAPTER I.

The schools of Maine have been making a reasonable progress since the Armistice. The recovery has been rapid owing to the intelligent handling of local situations by superintending school committees and superintendents and to the patriotic service of our teachers. The many points of rapid recovery are found especially in the attendance at our normal schools, in the policy of boards of education and superintendents to employ the best trained teachers they can find, to keep the salaries from slipping back and to furnish funds to the limit of their resources for support of schools, and also in the continued policy to place teachers on the yearly instead of a term basis and to give prepared teachers promise of greater permanency.

RESIGNATION OF MR. STARKEY.

The resignation of Mr. Glenn W. Starkey, Deputy State Superintendent of Schools, is received with deep regret. For ten years he has been a faithful and efficient member of the staff of the state superintendent. For one year he was acting superintendent. In all his work Mr. Starkey has been a source of strength to the department and the educational interests of Maine. His grasp of his job, his fine consideration of others, his quiet forceful manner, his rare good sense and his absolute dependableness have rendered him of unusual service. To say that he will be greatly missed from his accustomed place is a weak way of expressing a great loss. The state superintendent will miss the sturdy, manly, young man who has journeyed side by side with him through four years of the most trying times in education the present generation has experienced and who has borne much of the burden. But it is the same old story of the inability of the profession to properly cope in a financial way with business. Mr. Starkey lays down the deputyship to accept a position which offers a pecuniary remuneration far beyond the compensation he received from the state; yet, education calls for the highest professional ability, and skill is just as prominent a factor in education as in business. Mr. Starkey

has a co-operative give-and-take mind with courage and force to back up a conviction. He should rise easily in business pursuits and our best wishes are with him.

WOMEN ON SCHOOL COMMITTEES.

There are approximately 1500 members of school committees. For some years a few women have held positions on these committees. With the advent of equal rights larger numbers are elected. Since women are generally interested in welfare work and especially in education they lend intelligent enthusiasm to the governing boards to the advancement of education. The fact that the mother is charged more specifically with the care and bringing up of the children makes work of this kind especially fitting. The tendency to place at least one woman on the committee may prove advantageous in many cases.

THE RELATION OF TRAINING TO TEACHERS' COMPENSATION.

To those who hold that discrimination in the pay of non-prepared teachers and prepared teachers is essential in order to induce teachers to prepare themselves the following comparisons will be interesting and gratifying. It shows that school superintendents and committees are discriminating in their employment of teachers and that the people themselves recognize the advantage of a well prepared teacher.

The following tabulation contains a complete survey of the 6232 teachers occupying positions in 1921:

A summer school attendance is worth \$50.90 to each of the 309 teachers. A partial normal course is worth \$76.59 to each of the 980 teachers. A complete normal course is worth \$305.76 annually to the 1846 teachers. Practically all of the teachers with college training are teaching in high schools. A complete college course is worth \$343.62 annually over a partial course.

LENGTH OF THE SCHOOL YEAR.

Throughout the United States there is a strong tendency to increase the length of the school year. By some educators the all-year school is strongly advocated. In a strongly rural state like Maine where the children are able to assist very advantageously around the home in certain seasons of the year our standard year is 36 weeks or 180 days which would seem to meet the present needs of the situation. Few schools now have the minimum of 30 weeks, and wherever expedient these should be brought up to the full standard.

In the Russell Sage ratings Maine stood 21st among the states with an average of 144 days in 1900 and 158 days in 1910. The following table shows the situation in 1921:

In the towns with less than 170 days school conditions are difficult but the general tendency is to increase the year to the

standard. The average number of days schools were kept open in 1921 was 171 days. The average of all secondary schools is 180 days.

SCHOOL MORTALITY.

Because of the fact that the majority of pupils who enter school drop out at or before the 6th grade we are called by some distinguished educators a nation of 6th graders with a sixteen year old mind. This condition did not seem so serious a generation ago when wealth and station were "made while you wait" but today in a more scientific age with competition steadily waxing, with a demand for "higher efficiency," with a definite proof that education increases "human dynamics" and that uneducation is the "pick and shovel" estate of a merciless caste it becomes necessary that the men and women of tomorrow shall be better prepared than those of yesterday and today. It becomes the problem, therefore, to carry along our school attendance to a higher level. The educational "sky line" must be elevated. Maine is struggling with the problem. How well she is meeting it, relatively, is shown in the following comparisons of Maine schools with those of the United States.

In the comparisons it has been necessary to accept only 17 states and for the year 1918 in comparison with our schools for 1921. The comparisons show what per cent each grade is of the whole number enrolled in school.

This comparison shows that Maine schools are holding pupils better and carrying them farther towards completion by a substantial percentage than most of the other states are doing. It is also worthy of note that in 1919 according to Bulletin No. 19 of the United States Bureau of Education Maine stood second among the fifty-two states and territories in the number of her young people up to the age of eighteen who graduate from four year high schools.

AN INDEX OF EFFICIENCY OF THE STATE SCHOOL SYSTEM.

There is generally a strong tendency today to make state departments of education more vital to the progress of education within the states. The office of the Commissioner of Education or State Superintendent of Schools is more and more becoming a promotion enterprise, susceptible of as high art and technical skill as the engineering profession, in fact, the educational field now requires educational engineering. It is necessary that the different phases and departments of education be brought together into a purposeful whole which will bring the system to the most satisfactory level to relieve lost motion and to the elimination of waste.

It is necessary that the chief engineer be able to determine whether his system is progressing or whether it is slipping back from year to year. In Maine we are endeavoring to keep an elementary survey of school conditions at all times as a guide to activities. The information contained is consistently used in comparisons and graphs to show the real status of the system.

In Maine we have set up a definite form with a series of index numbers of a number of the assailant features of successful school systems for comparison year by year. This contains the training of teachers looking to a skilled teacher for every school, to a complete enrollment of the school population, to regularity of attendance, to the reduction of school mortality in completing the grades, in entering high school and in graduating therefrom, also the inducement for successful teachers to continue in the profession through proper salaries and the financial support of schools.

The following rating has been set up and the comparisons drawn covering a period of five years.

It will be observed in the table that while Maine has lost in Items 1 and 2, she has gained consistently in all of the others. The first item, the training of teachers received its slump on account of war conditions when a large number of teachers were leaving the profession for occupations which paid better. In the second item the slump in enrollment comes from the establishing of a number of parochial schools.

In Item 4, high school enrollment, there has been a steady gain from an index number of 44 to an index of 53.3. It will be observed that the method of finding the index is to take one-third of all the pupils enrolled in all the system as high school registrants. It is pre-supposed that if there were no school mortality for various causes one-third of all pupils would be enrolled in the high school, assuming that the pupil has been eight years in elementary and four years in high.

In Item 6, the number completing the elementary school, the index number is found by dividing the number completing the elementary school by eight, assuming that with no loss, one-eighth of all the children enrolled in the elementary schools would be in the eighth or final year. The same method is used in finding the index numbers for those completing the high school.

Under teachers' salaries in No. 8, a salary of \$1200 on an average is considered the standard upon which comparisons are made.

In the support of schools, Items 9, it was assumed that \$70 per capita on an average for all the children of the state would be sufficient to maintain in our state an efficient school system and 70, therefore, is taken as the basic figure.

The final index figure is found by adding together the index figures of each of the items and dividing by nine. It will be observed that Maine has moved steadily forward from an index figure of 51.7 to 63.3. In the support of schools and in teachers' wages the increase has been exceedingly marked. On the whole the system shows a steady increase in efficiency on the important phases of school work.

We have not included the item of buildings and equipment because until the present time our standards of judging have not been uniform from year to year. From now on, however, the comparisons in these items may be made.

CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS.

Under the laws of the state schools which fall below an average attendance of eight for any one year are automatically closed and provision is made for the children who remain to be conveyed to other available schools. There are in the state 2,200 single teacher schools. Many of these are operated through special vote of the town and have a very small group of children usually housed in poor buildings with meager equipment. These buildings are not suitable for maintaining schools in any particular. Their old toilet buildings in many instances are not separated for the sexes. The children in these schools, of course, may be taught the rudiments of an education but there is little inspiration and no real education can be secured in such institutions.

There is an obstinate prejudice on the part of the people in these communities against the plan of closing these schools and transporting the pupils to others. This prejudice is based upon the poor, unsuitable conveyances usually provided and upon the

fact that the parents are not cognizant of the fact that better schools can be secured and better teaching provided by getting larger groups together and also that a direct saving under proper management can be secured.

To the end that conclusive demonstration might be made a number of suitable transports have been secured by the State Superintendent and placed in towns where most needed. These wagons may be changed to sleds for winter season and have attached small stoves for the purpose of increased comfort for the children. The fresh air is heated as it enters and there are proper ventilators which guarantee that the air in the wagon is always pure and sanitary. In the experiments made with these wagons when the temperature was 25 degrees below zero the thermometer registered 65 above in the transport. The demonstration has proven the usefulness of the improved type. Later we had wagons made at the penitentiary at Thomaston on a plan which seemed a little more suitable to our road conditions. These have been distributed to the towns where conditions made their use of special advantage. It is hoped that in the near future many transportation lines will be furnished with these wagons and the children given comfortable and safe conveyance.

These transports are not only a convenience and aid to the establishing of better schools for country children but they constitute both a physical and a moral safeguard for the children.

Children who tramp even half a mile through slush with wet feet to dry out during the day and get wet again on their way home in the evening are bound to have ills and aches in after years. It is better for children to be gathered at the door of their homes, or near at hand and transported safely and quickly to the school and home again at night rather than to be tramping even a moderate distance. Then again the mother who seeks to bring up her children under proper moral conditions finds herself seriously handicapped in the pernicious associations in secluded lanes. She soon recognizes that a competent driver who has the same jurisdiction over the children as the teacher and who has proper background of character and responsibility lends a moral safeguard to the children for they are under supervision from the time they leave home until they return at night.

In transporting children there should be a definitely laid out route and time schedule giving the hour when the transport will arrive at the house when the children should be ready. This schedule should be carried out as faithfully as possible and with as great precision and regularity as a street car line. In fact, these transports are called the childrens' street cars. Adults live in the suburbs and transact their business in the city. They live in the suburbs as a convenience and as a more desirable place but they are transported in comfortable cars. Children handicapped in securing their education should have just as great care in providing for their comfort as the adults have in getting back and forth from their residence to their place of business.

In considering the question of consolidation a number of items are necessary. First, it is not wise to attempt to transport too far where the roads are not suitable and where they are likely to be blocked by snow during the winter months or when the children are too long on the road. Reasonable distance with reasonable time out should not deter any community from establishing the type of school most advantageous to its welfare. There are many towns in the state where a proper system of consolidated schools could well be established but in remote corners it will be necessary to maintain the single teacher school perhaps for generations but where that is necessary these single teacher schools should be made the very best their type affords and they should have as good teachers as any school in the state. It was never intended that any group of little children should be neglected in their educational opportunities and compelled to put up with poor conditions while other children have the finest advantages that can be attained.

Wherever the question of consolidation is considered a complete survey of the town should be made including the most available location, the topography of the country, the condition of the roads, available transportation, climatic conditions, permanency of residence on the part of the inhabitants and numbers to be transported. These factors should form the background for intelligent consideration and the local problem should be worked out specifically to its own advantages. No definite rule aside from this can be set up for a safe program.

There are in the state at the present 109 towns in which there are no urban communities but which support some type of consolidated school. Many of these consolidations are make-shifts, however, and are not built upon the plan which will best serve the educational interests of the community. A good teacher is the chief essential but good buildings and proper equipment are complements of a good teacher. Where children can be brought in there are many advantages which accrue; among these is the capacity group for instruction so that each teacher will have a full quota not only as a means of providing better instruction but to reduce the per capita cost of education. Then again the teacher may have a division of labor. In the average country school the teacher is teaching all the subjects of the curriculum spreading herself over short periods and long hours not conducive to good instruction and proper progress of the pupil. This gives the teacher a chance to specialize through preparation and instruction and bring to the children the richest purpose of the school. There is also the opportunity for the establishing of the junior high school giving the children a longer period of education at home during their formative years.

An intelligent program of centralizing schools with proper equipment, proper transportation and a trained corps of teachers can revolutionize the situation in many of our more backward communities within a short time.

RURAL SCHOOLS AS GOOD AS URBAN.

To make the rural schools of the state as good as the urban schools is an ambitious program and that state which first carries it out will be made famous in the annals of educational progress. It is not an impossibility. It is a wholly feasible and desirable program. After a careful estimate of conditions in the state of Maine it will require five million dollars to provide a proper school plant equipped with buildings, shops, laboratories, housing facilities and transportation for an ideal farm life school in all towns needing improved opportunity. It is not enough these days that a building be standardized in regard to space per pupil, light, heat, ventilation and general sanitary conditions. A school which serves the people today and the newer process of education must have its assembly room, gymnasium and agricultural museum, its shops and its laboratories. These are

necessary in order to conserve the gifts of the children and to produce for them the kind of education they can receive to greatest advantage. Such money could not be spent intelligently in a year or two years or five but would cover a period of ten or even fifteen years or twenty years. The next generation would feel the vast benefits derived therefrom. Eventually the state will find it worth while to spend this money for the better training of the rising generations. This program should not be forced upon the people but should come gradually as the people are convinced that rural school improvement is necessary not only to the welfare of the community but of the state as well and that a school of this type will be greatly to their advantage. To force any program upon an unwilling people would mean lack of co-operation and consequent failure. It is necessary that the facts of the program be put before the public in such a way that they can intelligently grasp the situation and determine in their own minds the necessities of their communities.

TRoublesome PROBLEMS OF TRANSPORTATION.

At present our laws leave the question of transportation to the good judgment of the superintending school committee. Oftentimes the committee finds itself handicapped, very often patrons are unreasonable in their demands. It is probable that parents who live a mile and a half from school should provide their own means of conveyance. It is also probable that people who live more than two miles and a half should have financial consideration while all persons who live within the zone bounded by a radius of a mile and one-half and a radius of two miles and a half from school should be left to the judgment and consideration of the committee. Such an arrangement would solve many of the problems which confront school committees and work out a reasonable solution for this most perplexing problem.

ILLITERACY IN MAINE.

There has been a reduction of 20% in illiteracy during the last decade. The application of the compulsory education law will keep any new crop from coming on. Our main problem is at the "port of entry" and among those adults who have previously come among us. Our juvenile illiteracy of 1910 was

substantially reduced in 1920. The following abstract will show the present situation:

We should be able to reduce to the lowest possible terms our percentage of illiteracy before the 1930 census. Maine should at least come up into the foremost group of states without difficulty. The fact that the state co-operates liberally financially with local communities will make it comparatively easy to teach in our night schools and evening classes a definite number each year until we have succeeded in our undertaking to teach all of those who are to live among us the use of the English language, to read and write and something of the duties and responsibilities of a republic.

IMPORTANT ACTS CONCERNING SCHOOLS—LEGISLATIVE
SESSION OF 1921.

*An Act for the Improvement of Sanitary Conditions in School
Building Toilets.*

This act is for the purpose of safeguarding the health and morals of the children of the state and requires that all towns through their regular appropriation for school repairs or from special appropriations shall provide and maintain clean and sanitary toilets on the plan approved by the State Superintendent of Schools. Such toilets must be free from obscene marks.

An Act to Provide for the Acceptance of the Benefits of An Act by the Senate and House of Representatives of Congress Assembly Entitled,

“An Act to provide for the promotion of rehabilitation of persons disabled in industry and otherwise and their return to civil employment and to provide for the administration of the same.”

It is estimated by the Industrial Accident Commission that approximately 17,000 accidents in industry occur each year. From 50 to 100 of these are of such serious nature that the unfortunate must be trained to some other occupation. A definite agreement of co-operation to this end is established between the State Board for Vocational Education, the Industrial Accident Commission and the Department of Labor.

An Act to Provide for Temperance Day in the Schools of the State of Maine.

This act sets apart a 45 minute period the first Friday in March of each year of the school day in each year nearest to that date, the same to be designated Temperance Day. The purpose of this act is to teach obedience to the law and to develop a spirit and a morale which will be more conducive to that type of citizenship which will observe faithfully the laws of the land.

An Act Relating to the Employment of Children making it necessary for children to pass the 6th grade as provided by the State Course of Study or require attendance to the age of 16 before children are allowed to participate in gainful occupation.

An Act to Establish a State School Fund and to Provide for the Apportionment of the Same.

This act is for the purpose of equalizing the burden of education and placing responsibility in a measure upon the entire state of bringing all schools up to a higher standard. It recognizes in the distribution that each teaching position should have financial foundation, that each day's attendance should be recognized in financial reward. It also provides for a distribution of \$3 per pupil on school census. Provision is made for the payment of tuition of non-resident pupils of towns not support-

ing free high schools, and establishes a substantial equalization fund and a special amount which may be used to encourage progressive educational measures.

AIMS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

The constant aims of education in Maine may be summarized in the following program. It should be understood that the State Department of Education is a great promotion bureau seeking to advance the welfare of the state and bring the schools to conserve the educational needs of the state in the most satisfactory manner. We are seeking to promote the course of education to meet the necessities of both the present and the future as an integral part of the United States realizing that widespread opportunity is essential to the stability of a government like ours.

1. Equal educational opportunities for all the children of all the people—rural as well as urban.

2. A professional staff of teachers with proper background of personality, adequate training in the professional elements of teaching and with unmistakable American ideals.

3. Adequate buildings and equipment such as will safeguard the health, intellectual development and the moral well-being of all the children.

4. A proper system of physical education such as will make the coming generation physically fit for whatever emergencies the future may present.

5. A close well knit system of local supervision with a group of professionally trained men and women in charge.

6. Adequate compensation for teachers and directors of education such as will call into the profession and hold the best talent the country affords.

7. Equal pay for equal preparation, ability and service.

8. A greater concentration and consequently a greater thoroughness in teaching to the end that a mastering of many subjects may give place to a definite, thorough mastery of essential studies.

9. A proper adjustment as to time allotted, effort sustained and funds disbursed for liberal and industrial subjects such as will enable our young people to secure those forms of education which best serve their gifts and life ambitions.

10. The more rapid development of the principles of vocational guidance coupled with vocational education.

11. The development of our rural schools along the proper lines to conserve a high standard of rural life; to make the farm a safe and desirable place in which to live.

12. A proper correlation of the home and school with such a systematic comradeship between parent and teacher as will safeguard the abilities, virtues and ambitions of our young people.

13. To connect our schools with life in such a manner that our young people may recognize in education a proper functioning with life's necessities. In other words, to enable the youth to do better the desirable things of life which he will do anyway.

14. A proper distribution of the financial burden between all communities and a great efficiency in expenditure to the end that there may be no waste in our financial resources.

NEEDED LEGISLATION.

Laws are for the purpose of facilitating the various phases of human endeavor. There are some things which can be done under existing laws and without special enactment but certain fundamental laws are essential. Maine is well supplied with fundamental laws which cover almost every necessary phase of school work. However, a few additional laws are necessary to carry out specific policies and increase the efficiency of the system. It is not always expedient to cover all necessities of the laws at once. After the law is enacted it is necessary to consolidate the ground gained before pushing farther to the front. There is a necessity for laws covering the following elements:

A CONTRIBUTORY PENSION ACT FOR TEACHERS.

At present the state provides the entire pension by direct appropriation for all teachers who meet certain requirements but this pension is entirely inadequate to be of service to those teachers especially who have taught during the years when salaries were too low even to support a teacher when teaching. The pension should be substantially increased or a contributory pension law enacted. A contributory act in which both state

and teacher contribute will be less burdensome and will give teachers an opportunity to contribute to their own foundation, develop the spirit of thrift and provide an adequate annuity upon retirement without burdening either the teacher or the state.

TENURE OF SERVICE ACT.

This is a phase of educational work which should be dealt with only after very close analysis. We have not in the past paid a sufficient attention to the conservation of the teachers' interests to make the profession attractive as a life work. Teachers who are thoroughly prepared on the right standards and who have demonstrated their ability to teach and willingness to co-operate and who have the proper professional spirit should have some protection such as would make the profession less shifting and more desirable for well prepared teachers.

A STATE ATTENDANCE OFFICER.

There should be connected with the State Superintendent's office a special attendance officer whose duty it should be to co-operate with school superintendents, committees and local attendance officers to the end that all children between the ages of seven and fifteen may give regular attendance at school. This is necessary if the full spirit of the law is observed. There are in our state even yet a large number of children growing up in ignorance without educational opportunity not realizing the necessity of school attendance which will give us another crop of illiterates for the coming generation. We should see to it that every child who grows up in this country and who has mental and physical ability should have a "minimum of education." If we do this and check the adult at the port of entry we shall safeguard our free institutions and America as the land of equality and opportunity. Otherwise we shall be struggling with desperate situations throughout the life of the nation.

A DIRECTOR OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

Maine has undertaken a program of state wide physical education such as will not only make our men fit for war and for

peace but our women fit to be the mothers of succeeding generations. In order to carry on this work to advantage it is necessary to have an assistant in the State Superintendent's office, who will unify the work, encourage local communities and safeguard the integrity of the program.

A HIGHER STANDARD OF QUALIFICATIONS FOR SUPERINTENDENTS OF SCHOOLS.

At present a person with two years of experience in any kind of a school and with two years of work above the high school or the equivalent thereof is eligible to take the examination and to be elected to the important office of superintendent of a school system in a union of towns or of a city system. Under the law we pre-suppose professional supervision. The other states of New England have a higher qualification which makes it difficult for Maine to retain a successful corps. A person who is qualified to direct a system of education such as comprises a school union or city should have higher educational qualifications, special professional study and longer successful teaching experience.

IMPROVED TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES.

In many towns the rural population has steadily decreased. The people have found the type of school provided inadequate for their needs. This coupled with the "hurdles" set before the farmer has decreased attendance in many schools to such an extent that the schools cannot be profitably maintained and it is found necessary to transport children to other schools. During the current year we conveyed 9,220 pupils to elementary schools and 468 to secondary schools at a cost of \$341,988 or an annual per capita cost of \$31.11. At present there is a great prejudice among the people concerning transportation. This is occasioned by the fact that proper provision has not been made to conserve the comfort and the safety of the children transported. Special conveyances should be provided which are comfortable and safe, adjusted to the season and heated during the winter portion of the year. The transport should be driven by a bonded driver who is of desirable character and proper

responsibility. The transportation route should be carefully laid out and scheduled so that parents may know exactly the hour when the children shall be required to meet the transport and when they should be delivered at home.

IMPROVEMENT OF COUNTRY SCHOOLS.

The newer type of farm life school should be provided. Adequate buildings, adequate equipment, adequate transportation facilities and high grade of instruction should be guaranteed. This is not an impossibility and would not entail an inordinate expenditure of public funds.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION ANNOUNCEMENT.

On September 2, current, at the State House, occurred a conference, the purpose of which was to determine ways and means of putting into practice the theories of the physical education program, including subject matter, method, time elements and the qualifications of directors and supervisors. At this conference were present Dr. F. N. Whittier of Bowdoin, Director Carl S. Smith of Bates, Director James Baldwin of the University, Nellie Jordan of the Aroostook State Normal School, Aroline H. Clark of the Western State Normal School, Carolyn Stone of the Farmington Normal School, Principal W. D. Hall and Bessie Clark of the Eastern State Normal School, together with representatives of the public schools, the Y. M. C. A., the American Red Cross, the State Commissioner of Health and other interested persons.

The time was when the school concerned itself almost wholly with the intellectual welfare of the child. For too long have we accepted this theory. We are now aware that the school, the great forming and shaping agency of both individual and national life, must deal with the whole child, intellectual, moral and physical, and we must lose no time in retrieving our lost opportunity.

PROGRAM.

The 1919 session of the legislature provided that after September, 1920, the public schools of the state should incorporate as a part of their regular instruction such courses in physical

education as the state superintendent of public schools shall prescribe. The program for the present year is elementary but forward looking, contains features for immediate emphasis and also portions later to be attained. In the elementary schools at least 60 minutes a week and in the high school 80 minutes shall be required. This time includes the several phases herein set up, including recreational plays and games, story plays, rhythm games, formal gymnastics, instruction in hygiene and the practical application through "health projects."

1. *Instruction.* In the elementary schools the outlines and time element stated in the state course of study relative to hygiene and home, school, and community sanitation should be followed. In the high school a definite period once or twice each week, covering more advanced work, should be given in freshmen and sophomore years.
2. *Relaxation Through Exercise.* Two three-minute periods devoted to story plays and gymnastics should be given, such work to be planned for the longest sitting periods so that fatigue may be relieved. In schools where the grades are segregated the first three grades should have the rhythmical story plays. In the fourth grade simple formal gymnastics should be introduced but continuing the rhythmic and story plays. In the upper grammar grades the boys and girls should be separated if possible, giving to the girls more rhythmic work and to the boys games and athletics.
In the high school formal setting-up exercises and athletics, differentiating the work for boys and girls.
3. *The Health Project.* Knowledge is of value only as it is applied. During the last year this form of practical application was introduced by the Modern Health Crusaders, and about 25,000 children undertook to perform the health "chores" while 20,000 successfully completed them. This form is especially designed for the children of the elementary schools. See special outlines. If the health project is well developed in the grades the health habit will be formed to such an extent that pupils in secondary schools will "carry on" of their own accord.

SCHOOL SANITATION.

This is a vital part of the health program and should not be neglected. Buildings should be kept clean and well disinfected. Special attention should be given by superintendents and school committees to the toilets, which should be as clean as the school-room itself, and proper attention be paid to the walls as the moral ideal affects the physical. Care should be taken that there are no obscene marks in evidence. Standardization of buildings in regard to light, heat and ventilation will become an important factor and while it is a question of time it is hoped that before many years it can be said that wherever it is necessary for American citizens to go to earn an honest living and wherever there is a group of young citizens to be educated there shall be such facilities as will safeguard their physical welfare.

TESTS OF SIGHT AND HEARING.

Every child in the public schools shall be separately tested and examined at least once in every school year to ascertain whether he is suffering from defective sight or hearing, or from any other defect or disability tending to prevent his receiving the full benefit of his school work. Special blanks and directions for making the tests are provided by state superintendent of public schools. Such examinations may be made by school physicians when provided, by the public health commissioner, or by the teacher, director or supervisor of physical education. Such examinations should include teeth, adenoids, malnutrition, etc.

SCHOOL PHYSICIANS.

The law provides that towns may employ physicians for medical inspection in schools. When this is done a complete record should be made and also a follow-up system provided. At present, although desirable, this is not a compulsory part of the physical education program. Much of the work may be performed, however, by a school nurse or physical director. A number of towns have already established medical and dental inspection.

QUALIFICATIONS OF DIRECTORS, SUPERVISORS
AND TEACHERS OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

FOR 1920-21.

Directors.

At least two years of college with two summer terms in normal school of physical education or an equivalent. An equivalent is a secondary education plus the completion of one year of theory and practice in a normal school of physical education. Experience in teaching may be given such evaluation as the state superintendent of schools may determine in individual cases.

Supervisors.

High school graduation with one summer at a normal school of physical education or the equivalent. Graduates of the state normal schools with special work in theory and practice. A graduate nurse who has a summer term of theory and practice in physical education may be certified upon the interpretation of an equivalent training and a specification of duties by the state superintendent of public schools.

Teachers.

Regular school or classroom teachers may be prepared quickly and easily to carry on health instruction, the health project, dramatic exercises (story plays) and formal gymnastics.

QUALIFICATIONS OF DIRECTORS AND SUPERVISORS OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

FOR 1922 AND AFTER.

Directors.

College degree with required athletic and gymnasium work with at least a summer in a normal school of physical education. Experience in teaching physical education may be accepted for course in summer school or graduation from normal school of physical education of approved standing.

Supervisors.

At least two years of college, of normal school with one summer at normal school of physical education, including both theory and practice. A registered nurse may act as supervisor of physical education under a director.

CHAPTER II.

REPORT ON SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1921.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

I herewith submit my report as Agent for Secondary Education.

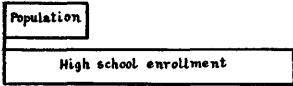
A survey of the schools of secondary grade based on the annual returns and other sources reveals a good measure of progress. The number of high schools increased from 196 to 202. The number of pupils attending shows a gain of 522. The number of academies reporting to the state fell short by three of the number in 1920, 55, but the number of pupils shows an increase of 207. The increase in enrollment so steadily maintained for several years has been continued. The consistent gain becomes more significant when compared with the small increases in the school census or the registration in the elementary schools.

ENROLLMENT.

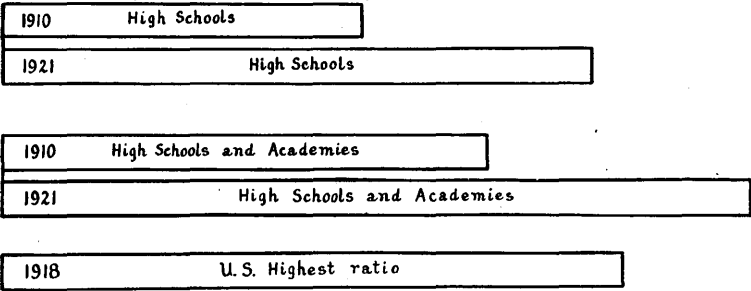
The number attending secondary schools shows 137 for each thousand of the census of persons between 5 and 18. This is fully fifty per cent of a theoretical first grade found by dividing the 5 to 18 year census by 13, which fairly represents the grades included. A similar comparison shows that for each thousand of the total population of the state 32.5 were attending high school or academy. The accompanying graph shows the increases based on the ratio of the enrollment to the population.

ing fact shown by these figures is the rapid increase in the proportion of persons receiving some high school education. Their

contribution to the development of the state will compensate many times the cost of their training for citizenship.

(a) More boys are attending school.

In this connection the influence of the high school on the boys as compared with the girls is of interest. Of the total school census 50.26 per cent are boys. In the sixth grade for each one hundred enrolled there were 51 boys to 49 girls. In the seventh grade the division was equal but in the eighth and ninth grades the boys had lost two per cent so that the ratio was 48 boys to 52 girls. In the high school the ratio for the four classes are shown in comparison with those of the country as a whole for 1918.

A comparison of the ratio of boys to girls over a period of years shows a very marked gain by the former. In 1910, the boys were 40.1 per cent of the total enrollment, in 1920 they represented 44.7 per cent of the total. The improvement is very gratifying but offers a new problem in adjustment of courses to meet the needs of boys especially in vocational lines.

ATTENDANCE.

(a) Pupils are staying through.

Reference has been made to the persistency of pupils in high school. The accompanying graph shows the life history of the class of 1921. It is hardly a typical class as it entered high school under the strain of war conditions and has undoubtedly been influenced by the after-war adjustments. It is worthy of serious study and local application. The entering class would seem to have included a very high percentage of the elementary school graduates.

For the class graduating June, 1921, the graph shows that 756 out of each 1000 entering were enrolled in the second year class. In other words the class lost one-fourth of its number. In the succeeding years the losses are not nearly as great as shown by

survivals of 653 per 1000 in the third and 556 per 1000 in the fourth. 521 of the original 1000 graduated. This record is much better than that for the country as a whole for the class of 1918 of which the survivors were 721, 532, 440 with 407 graduating for each 1000 enrolled.

(b) Losses still a matter of concern.

It must be a matter of concern, however, if only 52.1 per cent of the entrants remain to graduate and of still greater importance that the largest elimination occurs between the first and second years. Boys and girls are not ready at the end of their first year of high school or even the second year to take their places in the industries and to become after a few years participants in the government of the commonwealth and in its social and industrial development.

The losses between the seventh and eighth grades and the first and second grades of the high school emphasize the necessity of attention on this period. Courses, subject matter, methods of teaching and organization must be examined with especial care to see if any of the educational factors are responsible for the failure of pupils to continue. The period is directly affected by the junior high school. The experience where the reorganization on these lines has been well carried out points to a much

stronger persistence to remain in school during the years served and a marked tendency to completion of the senior high school.

(c) Influence of the length of school year.

How far the length of the school year and number of grades in elementary schools may affect the success of pupils who enter high school is a matter of conjecture largely. The movement toward an eight grade system has been strong as shown by the decrease in the number of pupils enrolled in ninth grades which has fallen from 5324 in 1910 to 2790 in 1921. During the past year 172 cities and towns maintained a nine grade system and 313 were offering eight grades, the remainder were irregularly reported. Against this condition is the fact that the median length of the school year was 170 days and that 166 towns had only 150 days and 65 more had 160 or less.

Where the eight grade system and the short school year are coincident there is a loss of from one to six weeks a year which in the eight years may amount to a full year or more of elementary schooling. The result must be superficial and incomplete work in the grades with pupils going on to high school lacking the content of subject matter and training for independent work. The recommendation of the State Department that where the short year is maintained nine years be required, will prove advantageous.

COSTS OF SCHOOLS.

The rising costs of schools are naturally arresting the attention of both taxpayers and educators. The high schools show a large increase over a ten year period. For convenience of comparisons the period from 1912 to 1921 has been used for the following study.

The cost of instruction has risen from \$388,126 to \$1,102,213, but at least two elements appear as factors in the increase. The number of teaching positions has increased from 575 to 951. Without increase in salary the new positions alone would require an additional \$303,396. But an average annual salary for women in 1912 of \$533 was hardly compensation for four years of college training nor with the increase of living expenses is the average salary of \$1108 in 1921 more than a living wage. Furthermore, the increase in the number of teaching positions

coincide exactly with the increase in the enrollment for the same period showing no extravagance in this respect.

Other items in the budget give similar results when analyzed. Fuel and janitor service, items of cost determined by conditions outside the control of school authorities, show an increase from \$43,166 to \$199,900. Conveyance of pupils advanced from \$5,371 to \$17,568, but twice as many pupils were conveyed and the cost of the service was affected by the local conditions.

Tuition expenditures rose from \$34,647 to \$129,288 but here again the number of pupils has doubled and the individual cost is necessarily affected by the increase in cost of maintenance of schools. In addition it might be cited that twenty new high schools have been established with consequent enlarging of opportunities and a large number of courses added to the programs of those in operation.

Items of expense such as textbooks, supplies, equipment, buildings and repairs reflect the increased cost in corresponding lines but not in excess as a further comparison might show.

It is possible that economies may be made in the administration of the high schools but they must be made without loss of efficiency. That the plant and equipment must be adequate for the work undertaken is a fundamental principle applying in education as well as in the industries. Excellence of product and quantity is determined by the skill of the workmen plus the facilities for work. The training of teachers must be more, rather than less, to cope with the complex problem of the education of boys and girls in the most critical period of their lives. The tools with which they work should be of the best. Working conditions must be favorable and contributing to efficient teaching. If economies are made it must be done without impairing the effectiveness of these essential factors.

FIELD WORK.

The field work of this division has increased materially in the past few years. The number of high schools and academies has increased. The number of teaching positions has kept pace with the increase of schools and pupils enrolled. With 258 schools in practically as many towns it is evident that in a school year of 180 days at most only a part of the schools can be reached

during the period in which they are in session. In matter of fact your agent was able to visit about one-half the schools during the year. The field work has been affected by increased office work due to the larger number of schools and their attendant problems and by new duties relative to the equalization fund for secondary schools, the teachers' registration service especially in the high school field, co-operation with other members of the Department in the checking of plans for high school buildings and other activities. Your agent assisted in the high school sections of practically all of the county teachers' conventions as well as a number of local teachers' meetings. The work of the year included a number of speaking engagements at grange and educational meetings.

There is need of assistance to secure a closer supervision of the actual work of the schools. Many of the teachers and principals would benefit by the help that can be given through a visit of some length in their classes and schools. Conferences with superintendents and committees and with teachers are very profitable in getting at local problems and for guidance in formulating plans for work and the management of the schools. Perhaps the most valuable part of such supervision would be co-operation with classroom teachers in improvement of instruction, classroom management, application of scientific methods to measurements of product, organization of subject matter and the like. The time at the disposal of the supervisor must be sufficient to observe work at some length and to go over in detail the results. With so large a number of our teachers and principals inexperienced and with little professional training the need of expert guidance is highly essential. The efficiency of instruction could be considerably increased through closer supervision by field agents of the Department. To render effective service two full time assistants are needed whose work would deal directly with supervision in the secondary school field.

SCHOOLING IN UNORGANIZED TERRITORY.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1921.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

DEAR SIR:—I submit herewith my report as general agent for the schools of the unorganized territory of the state for the past year.

The second year of administering the school affairs of the unorganized territory under the new law has proved it to be a most satisfactory measure. Its provisions have served the educational needs of the unorganized territory thus far so well that it was found necessary to ask for but one minor amendment at the 1921 session of the legislature. That was to make this law conform to a change in the statutes by the same legislature increasing the amount of the secondary school tuition paid by towns. It now appears that this new statute will adequately provide for proper educational privileges for the children of the unorganized territory for a long period to come, with of course such amendments from time to time as will make it conform to changes in related statutes.

One feature of the new law should perhaps be given special mention. This is the provision for a school tax of \$3.00 upon all male residents twenty-one years of age and over of unorganized places where school privileges are provided, as a substitute for the former per capita tax of \$0.40. This has been found a much more satisfactory and equitable tax. It is collected with no greater difficulty and provides a revenue over double that of the old tax.

The rural helping teacher plan was continued the same as in the previous year, with two such teachers, one being located at Norcross and the other at Rockwood. These are centrally located places and cover the schools along the line of

the Bangor & Aroostook Railroad and around Moosehead Lake respectively. This plan is particularly well adapted to most sections of the unorganized territory. Two additional teachers, one located in the Madawaska territory and the other in northern Washington county, would make it possible to include a large proportion of the unorganized territory schools under this plan of helping teacher supervision.

But one lighthouse teacher was employed the past year owing to the fact that there was a smaller number of stations to visit and the difficulty of finding another teacher with the peculiar qualifications for this special and difficult work. Regular teachers were provided for a term or more at three different light stations where the number of pupils was large enough to make this profitable. The United States Government co-operated in maintaining these schools.

The plan of employing one or more traveling lighthouse teachers, so-called, which in the beginning was considered but a temporary expedient, has been continued for six years. It is now felt that the time has come for a change by which some more adequate provision for the schooling of lighthouse children can be made. Various plans have been considered and it is hoped not later than another year it will be possible to make some satisfactory arrangements through which this difficult problem will be solved.

No new buildings were erected last year but substantial repairs and improvements, including attached toilets, were made in several places. New school furniture was provided for a few schools where most needed. A gradual improvement in the school building conditions from year to year is being made and already this improvement is quite marked, when conditions are compared with those of a few years ago. The future of many unorganized places is so uncertain that progress in this direction must of necessity be slow and doubtless there will always be places where temporary and improvised school buildings must be used.

School privileges were provided in seventy-one unorganized places last year, this being an increase of seven over the previous year. The school population was eight hundred ninety-five, an increase of fifteen. Forty-six schools were maintained, while the average attendance was seven hundred ninety-six in elemen-

tary schools and twenty-nine in secondary schools. The total expenditures for the year amounted to \$41,831.12. Detailed statistics will be found in table No. 20 in the appendix.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1921.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

DEAR SIR:—One of the most important duties of my office as one of the State Agents for Rural Education is the promoting of all agencies which tend to bring about greater interest in and support of rural schools by the community. It is believed that close co-operation between the home and the school is the surest method of improving school conditions. Two distinct organizations to promote such co-operation now exist in Maine. These are the School Improvement League and the Parent-Teacher Association.

THE SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT LEAGUE.

The School Improvement League is an organization directly connected with rural schools. Its activities are one of my chief interests. In 1920-1921 there were over six hundred active School Improvement Leagues in Maine as compared to about one hundred active leagues reported in the year 1916. Supplies necessary to carry on the work of the league have been sent out from this office and a constant correspondence is carried on with the individual leagues in order to pass on valuable suggestions from one league to another and to give help in arranging programs, etc. During this year a very attractive new league button, designed by Glenn W. Starkey, has been adopted—a miniature pine tree upon a white background with the words, "School Improvement League," printed in small green letters. Reports of the work accomplished in all leagues are sent by each league to the state office. To illustrate the scope of the work above described and to show how the league becomes a real factor in

school betterment, a quotation from a report of the town of Paris, sent in by the superintendent, A. B. Garcelon, is given below.

TOWN OF PARIS.

“ In order to give an impetus to the work done by the School Improvement Leagues in the town of Paris, an article was placed in the Town Warrant last year (Feb., 1920) that read as follows:

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise fifteen dollars (\$15.00) for each teacher in town, the same to be expended for school equipment of betterment by such teachers as raise and expend a similar amount for school betterment; provided all expenditures shall be subject to approval by the school committee or superintendent; and further provided that each school shall receive aid from this fund, dollar for dollar, and up to the limit of fifteen dollars (\$15.00).

This was passed at Town Meeting, and during the year the schools of Paris have raised the magnificent sum of \$732.98 by their own efforts.

This sum added to the \$500.00 raised by the town brings the sum total up to twelve hundred thirty-two dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$1,232.98).

This money has been spent in various and sundry ways, according to the special needs of the individual schools.

Among the improvements may be mentioned phonographs and records, dishes and cupboards for noon-day lunch, curtains for windows, books for school libraries, pencil sharpeners, framed pictures, book cases, electric lights, stove jackets, improvement of school grounds, blackboards, general repairs, etc., etc.

PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION.

The parent-teacher association is a community organization intended more especially for the larger community than for the one-teacher school, but it may also be adapted to the needs of village schools and, therefore, comes under the general line of community work. The state office is not directly responsible for the work of this organization as it has always been officially directed by an independent state society. The rural agent, however, in following up her special line of community work, has co-operated on all occasions with the State Parent-Teacher Association. In 1921 this organization had become somewhat inactive and the National Parent-Teacher Association in February sent a special organizer to Maine to push this work. The assistance of the State Department of Education was solicited. Acting under directions of the State Superintendent of Schools, therefore, the rural agent took the matter up with each local superintendent of schools and support was given Miss Nettie Bauer, the organizer, in every possible way. As a result, a state organization was formed with the following as officers: President, Mrs. Frederic Abbott, Saco; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Lydia Rideout, Saco; Recording Secretary, Mr. R. J. Libby, Westbrook; Treasurer, Mr. J. H. Winchester, Corinna. At the present time, there are active associations in the following towns and cities: Bangor (four associations), Bath (three), Calais Corinna, Cumberland (two) Dunstan Village, Freeport, Gardiner, Gorham, Harrington, Kittery (three), Lee, Lewiston, Litchfield, Machias, Mapleton, Monmouth, New Gloucester, Oxford, Saco, Skowhegan, Springfield, Washburn, Westbrook, West Gardiner, York Village.

THE NOON HOUR.

Constant emphasis is being placed upon the proper supervision of the noon hour in rural schools and upon the serving of at least one hot dish at the lunch time. This is one of the activities of the rural department which requires constant pushing. All over the country today, rural leaders are of the opinion that this proper arrangement of the noon hour is one of the most essential matters of the rural school organization,

both from a physical and a moral standpoint. The results achieved in Maine compare favorably with those reported from other states. In 1921, about 1720 schools out of approximately 2500 rural schools in the state required the teacher to remain in the school house during the noon hour when children bring their dinners, while 350 served hot dishes regularly and ninety others served one hot dish during the winter months, though not during the whole year. To further stimulate interest in this matter, a pamphlet entitled, "The Noon Hour and the Noon Luncheon" was prepared for circulation among the rural supervisors and teachers. This pamphlet is designed especially for the untrained teacher to give her all the essential information regarding how to start and carry on the noon hour project.

MUSIC.

During this year, especial effort has been made to secure more knowledge and appreciation of the study of music in rural schools. In this connection, the talking machine is of the greatest possible value since at least two of the talking machine companies have educational departments wholly devoted to making the machine of definite educational value. The services of an expert in this line were secured and, under the direction of the rural agent, he spent two months in the state instructing groups both of pupils and teachers in the use of the talking machine in the study of music. Since 463 rural schools were reported in 1920 as owning talking machines, this work was especially timely and practical.

GENERAL.

In addition to pursuing the distinct lines of work enumerated above, I have attended and taken part in all the state and county teachers' conventions and have assisted in carrying on the special School for Rural Leaders at Castine during the summer of 1920. I have given 47 addresses to teachers' meetings and have also addressed 39 grange and community meetings. In addition to my own distinctive lines of work, I have continued to co-operate with the State Agent for Secondary Schools in the work of the teacher-training courses in the thirteen academies which

still maintain such courses for the purpose of training young teachers for the small rural schools which must still depend for their teachers upon secondary school graduates. Upon call of the local superintendents, I have gone to many of the rural towns of the state visiting the local rural schools, studying the individual problems and rendering all the assistance possible to the teacher and superintendent—then holding a teachers' meeting in the town to take up general problems and to answer questions. Such a visit to teachers is usually followed by a community meeting to put before the citizens the needs of their local schools as seen by the rural agent.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

DEAR SIR:—I herewith submit a report of my work for the year ending June 30, 1921.

My duties, under your direction, have included both office and field work. The general aim has been to render assistance to local school officers in problems relating to their school organizations and to the State Superintendent of Public Schools in his administration of the department activities.

A summary of administrative work is presented. In addition to the items listed, work of a more general nature has been carried on, this including the preparation of material for publication, preparation and revision of various printed forms, studies of results of instruction, reports on problems of local school administration, with special emphasis on the encouragement of consolidation and improvement of conditions of conveyance of pupils.

ADMINISTRATIVE WORK.

The School for Rural Leaders. Assistance to the State Superintendent was given in the conduct of the School for Rural Leaders, held at Castine in July-August, 1920, and in preparation for a similar school to be held in the summer of 1921. This work has included administration, lectures, class leadership and advising in the selection of candidates for the school.

Service of Teachers Attending School for Rural Leaders. The following summary shows the type of work carried on by teachers receiving special training in the 1919 and 1920 groups during the school year 1920-21.

A large majority of the rural leaders are employed as active helping teachers. Those employed in rural and village schools, even though not doing helping teacher work, are giving improved service in those schools; the groups serving as model teachers in state normal schools and in the teacher training courses in secondary schools have influences fully as great as those of the helping teachers. The losses to city schools are small and the losses outside the state are not surprising in view

of the attractive salaries offered to such superior teachers. Most of the losses because of leaving the work of teaching are caused by marriages.

Activities of rural helping teachers. A schedule showing the activities of the rural helping teachers during the school year 1920-21 is appended. There is also given a schedule of salaries paid, and a map showing the towns in which they are employed.

During the year reported 112 helping teachers, doing such work as entitled them to receive the state bonus payments, served in 102 towns, seven of these towns employing two or more such teachers.

In these cases, regardless of the type of school in which the teacher is employed, the helping teacher activities extend to the small rural schools.

Salaries of helping teachers. The schedule of salaries includes both the amounts paid locally and the bonus provided from state funds. While the range is extensive and the average lower than what we would wish for, it should be understood that most of these teachers are employed in small communities and that the amounts paid represent considerable advances which, with the moderate living prices, make the positions attractive financially.

Teachers' Meetings. Assistance has been given to officers of county and local teachers' organizations in the arrangement of programs. Within the year the plan was tried of having all county meetings held during the fall term. The following figures show the increase in attendance and interest at county meetings over those held within the same counties during the preceding year.

These figures show a gain in total attendance of 44%.

Building improvements. Plans for new and remodeled buildings have been examined and checked. In several cases suggestive sketches and plans have been prepared. Plans for twenty-two new school buildings with estimated cost of \$458,592 and for eleven remodeled buildings at a cost of slightly under \$100,000 have been examined.

State school fund legislation. A detailed study has been made of the problem of state aid to schools. This has included the preparation of schedules and estimates, graphs, charts and plans indicating the effect of various proposals for changes in school fund legislation. Comment on the Act to Establish the State School Fund and to Provide for the Apportionment of the same will be found elsewhere in this report.

Rural school legislation. Legislation especially encouraging to rural school conditions has included acts providing for the improvement of conveyance conditions, requiring that toilet conditions shall meet satisfactory standards on or before September 1, 1924, and extending the provisions of the law relating to the approval of school building plans.

Below are given two tables, one dealing with the ratio of rural and urban children attending school and the other with the growth of conveyance showing the necessity of very careful consideration and the plan covering these subjects.

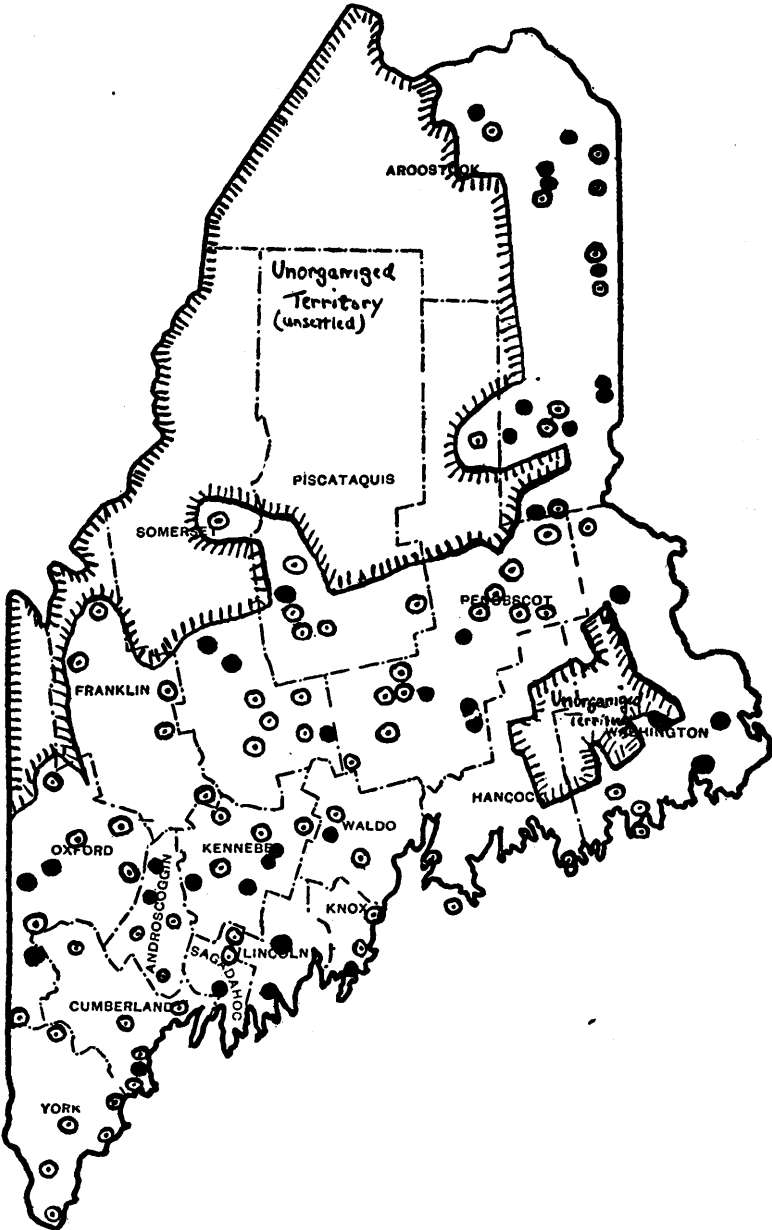

INDUSTRIAL AND VOCATIONAL EDUCATION.

AUGUSTA, MAINE, July 1, 1921.

To the State Superintendent of Public Schools:

I respectfully submit herewith my report on Vocational, Adult and General Industrial Education for the year ending June 30, 1921.

Mr. H. S. Hill, assisted by Roy F. Thomas, supervised teacher training and the agricultural work in the eighteen vocational agricultural schools.

The results which have been accomplished in this branch have been most gratifying as indicated in the fifth annual report to Congress of the Federal Board for Vocational Education. Maine has a return of \$3.82 for every dollar expended for instruction. This is 79 cents better than any other state in the Union.

In Industrial Education there has not been any change in day and part-time classes. The number of approved evening schools increased from 2 with 250 pupils and 13 instructors to 5 with 698 pupils and 28 teachers. Instructor training has been done during the year by the State Department at Dexter, Bangor and Rumford. A joint conference of all the vocational teachers and representatives from different industries was held in the high school at Portland. All who attended this meeting spoke very highly of the value of such conferences. Mr. J. F. Parker, Director of Vocational Education in Portland, was an earnest and faithful worker in making this meeting such a success.

Promotional work has been done by the Vocational Division with some of the leading industries and resulted in important developments in promoting foremanship training and a more comprehensive evening school program.

Miss Frances R. Freeman has been in charge of home economics teacher training at the University of Maine and has had an enrollment of 64 young women.

Miss Bernardine Cooney has been devoting half time to the supervision of home economics departments.

During the year \$30,416.25 was received from the Federal Government to be used as reimbursement for Smith-Hughes classes and teacher training. In 1926 and annually thereafter, Maine will receive \$54,022.31. About 50% of this amount will be spent in reimbursements to agricultural schools.

STATE AID COURSES.

So many applications have been received for manual training, home economics and general evening schools that our funds are entirely exhausted and many towns are waiting to be assured that they will be reimbursed.

Over 20,000 men, women and children have been enabled to receive special training in the day and evening schools and the state has been called upon to contribute less than \$4.50 per student. During the year nearly 18,000 boys and girls have been enrolled in our special courses.

Superintendent Packard and Director MacKay have been unusually successful in promoting a textile course for the seniors in Sanford High School. This course should prove to be valuable and practical as the textile mills are the biggest local industry and Mr. MacKay has enlisted the interest and co-operation of the mill people.

In spite of the business depression our evening schools have had a large enrollment. During the year we received returns showing an enrollment of 2,500 men and women. Some principals reported that a few of the men walked six miles per night to attend the classes in reading and writing.

Arrangements have been made for the Department to conduct a summer course for Americanization teachers at Castine Normal School and fully fifty teachers have registered for this course.

Two facts of special importance seem to characterize the work in this school during the past year: First, the increase in registration. As work in the various industries has slackened, young people have turned toward teaching as a profession and toward more thorough preparation through the normal school for that work. Interest in teaching and in preparation for teaching has been greatly enhanced during the year by the effective efforts of the State Department of Education, to which efforts the Governor of the State has given unusual interest and support. It is anticipated that the coming school year will give more abundant evidence of the teacher recruiting which the State Department has so actively carried on.

The second impressive feature of the year has been the increased interest in summer school work. We have tried the experiment in this school, for some time the practice in the Aroostook Normal School, of offering a six weeks' summer school course with credit toward the normal school diploma for those who desire to take the prescribed work for the full time. The result has fully justified the experiment. Although the announcement to the teachers of the state was late in reaching them and probably was not understood at all by a great majority of the teachers, the registration numbered ninety-nine, forty per cent of whom asked for credit toward the normal school diploma.

The registration for the coming summer term is more than double that of last year. It is proposed to offer the first year of normal school work only for credit toward the normal school diploma. It is believed the second year work should be taken during the regular school year while the practice schools are in session. The work offered at summer school, however, is much wider in scope than the first year of normal school work, because it is desired to offer to teachers of experience and normal school graduates the new features in education.

The great need of the school continues to be additional housing facilities. We shall be obliged to turn away applicants for admission the coming year because our dormitories and our rooming facilities in private houses cannot take care of all who wish to come.

It is fitting at this time to recognize the retirement of Miss Hortense M. Merrill, who, for thirty-six years, has been dean

of the women upon the teaching staff of the school. Her service has been of so high a character and so unselfishly performed during this period of time that, when considered in all its aspects, I know of no superior service performed by any individual either in the military, political or educational work of the state.

Observation work in the practice schools of the home building and in the rural school at West Gorham was carried on throughout the year. This work was supplemented by nine weeks of full time practice teaching by each member of the graduating class. Because of the relatively small senior class most of the practice teaching was done in the elementary school directly under the control of the normal school but for a part of the year we used three rooms in Westbrook.

III.

Division of expenses. The state as usual provided the financial support for the regular normal school work, and helped largely in the support of the practice schools. The town paid \$1,800 for the practice schools conducted in the normal school building and provided much of the material used in the schools. The town also paid \$650 towards the salary of the teacher in the rural school. For the practice school work done at Westbrook the state paid a bonus at the rate of fifty dollars per year for the teachers of each room used by the state and refunded the carfare between Gorham and Westbrook for such practice teachers as had to go back and forth each day.

V.

While the attendance of no other normal school in the state was so badly affected by the war as was that of the Gorham Normal School the tide is now turned with an attendance for the past year nearly 30% larger than that of the year before with the evidences pointing strongly towards a very much larger increase for the coming year. This turn in the tide appears to be due to two factors; one, the return to a business situation more nearly like that existing prior to the war; and the other, the more nearly adequate pay now being offered to trained teachers. When school superintendents can offer to teachers an income approximately equal to that offered to persons of equal personality and training in other occupations than teaching, the young people of the state will be able and willing to prepare themselves thoroughly for the work of teaching.

The average attendance increased 36% over the average attendance of the previous year. This fact is very gratifying to all who are interested in the school. The morale of the members of the faculty and students has been very high, even during and immediately following the war period when our attendance in common with normal schools all over the country decreased materially.

Former Principal Albert F. Richardson resigned July 1, 1920, after 32 years of very faithful and efficient service. He failed in health very rapidly and died in October of the same year. His prominence as an educator and administrator is too well known to require comment from me here. My five years with him, as his first assistant, were very pleasant and profitable for me, for he treated me more like a son than a subordinate.

During this, my first year as principal, I have received very cordial and harmonious support from the members of the faculty. The maintenance of the high standing of the school, and whatever improvement we have made, is due very largely to their efforts and attitude.

At the beginning of the school year, a rural training school was established at North Castine with Miss H. Marie Osgood as teacher, who after two years' experience as a teacher, entered the Castine Normal School and graduated in 1920. Miss Osgood also graduated from the School of Helping Teachers and Rural Leaders, in the summer of the same year. She has rendered valuable service, not only in improving the equipment and character of the school itself, but has materially assisted in making it a very important part of our training school.

APPENDIX.

During the year the strain on the schools became tremendous. Teachers were leaving their work and going into the mills and factories where they could earn the funds necessary for their support. In the emergency, the Governor and Council added to the equalization fund \$100,000, which was to be distributed to those towns whose high tax rates made it impossible for them to bring the necessary relief. This additional amount, distributed in the regular form prescribed by law for the equalization fund, saved the situation in a large number of towns. I am giving herewith a statement of its distribution and of the tax rates of towns which shared in the fund.

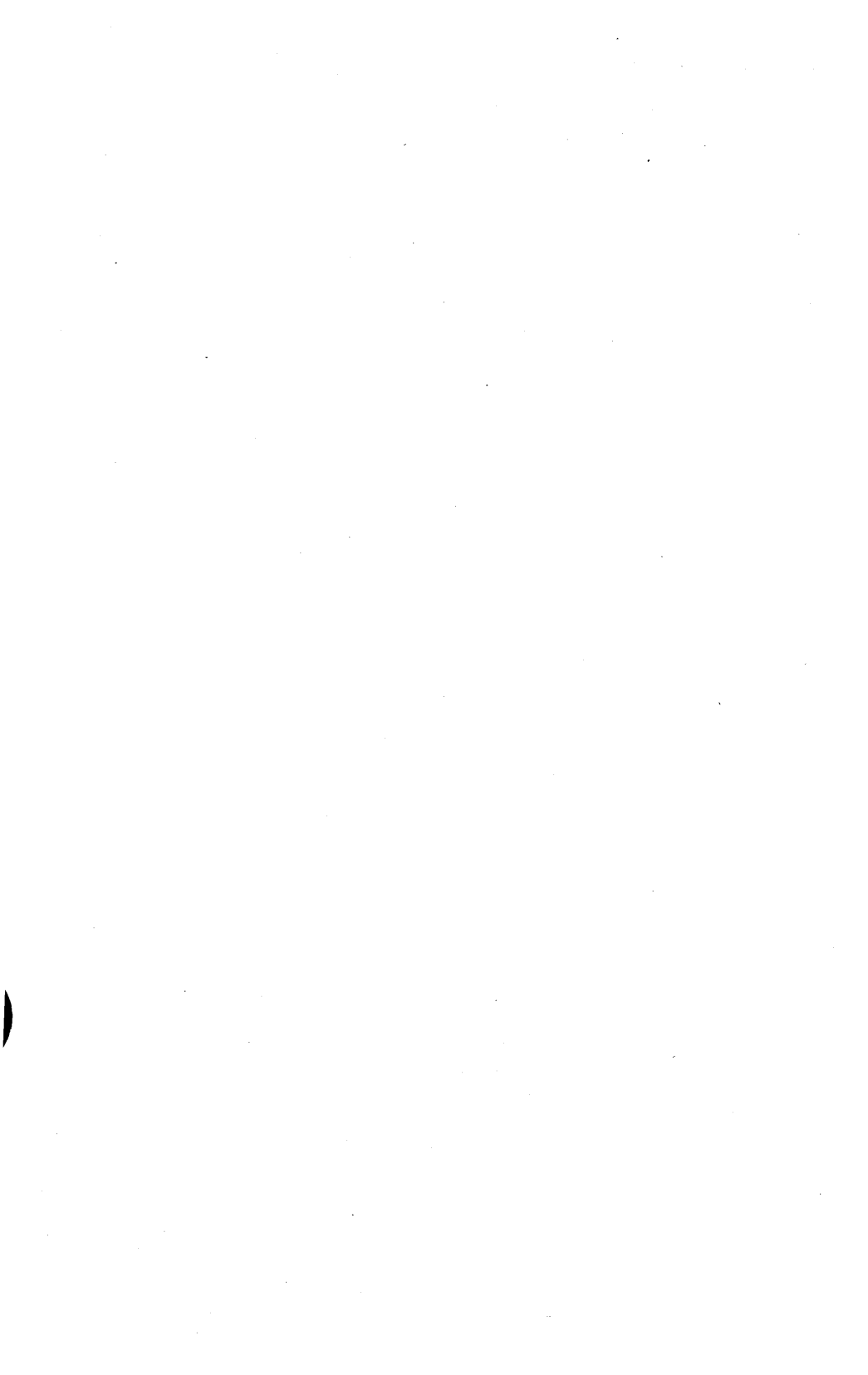
