#### To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the Eighty-fifth Legislature:

The Budget Committee formed according to law has held public hearings at Presque Isle, Bangor, Portland, Lewiston and Augusta. Members-elect of the Legislature were invited to attend these meetings and in their deliberations the Committee has consulted various senators and representatives.

While the law is not explicit regarding the form of a budget, it has seemed advisable to the Committee to depart from the past custom and to submit a comprehensive budget covering the entire receipts and disbursements for the two fiscal years under consideration. It is hoped that this will be more informative to the members of the Legislature and to the citizens of the State. The Committee employed William H. Deering as clerk and his services have been most valuable.

During the last year and a half the building program has been provided for by the setting aside of \$420,694.39. The State Auditor reports a balance in the Sinking Fund Reserve on December 31, 1930 of \$517,024.58, a necessary amount for a working balance. In addition there is \$260,105.23 in the State Contingent Fund which is reserved for emergencies that may occur within the next six months, some of which can already be foreseen. It is believed that this will be sufficient. Two years ago it was found necessary for the Legislature to pass a current deficiency bill of \$169,000. Such action for a somewhat smaller amount seems necessary this year, and there will be the customary deficiency act covering delayed bills for which funds previously available have lapsed. This will amount to about \$15,000 and is not shown in the budget as the act should be passed as an emergency, funds coming from lapsed balances already in the treasury.

The last two Legislatures have followed the policy of setting up a building program specifying certain construction to be authorized by the Governor and Council as surplus funds should appear in the general revenues. We believe that this policy filled a useful purpose but should no longer be carried on. In the past it enabled badly needed construction to be undertaken at various institutions which otherwise might not have been possible. A continuance of the plan would effect a sustained drain on the treasury that we believe would be bad financial policy. Some of the most pressing of the construction needs having been met, it seems wise to forego further expansion at this time.

The building program set up by the 1929 Legislature is now in effect terminated. Eight items have been authorized or completed, a minor item of construction at the State Prison having been eliminated as unnecessary. We have recommended under the appropriation for the Superintendent of Buildings the inclusion of sufficient money to put the heating plant of the State House in first-class condition and adapted to serve future as well as present needs. We have included also a sum which would be available for the lease of space outside the State House or the adaptation of space in the present buildings which might be made available for present day needs. There are listed in the Budget the items of new construction requested at various institutions together with a list of recent additions.

We recommend no appropriation for the Board of Commissioners of Pharmacy. Out of the eleven examining boards this has been the only one in recent years to receive a legislative appropriation. There seems no justification for an exception in this case and we believe this board, like the others, should be self-supporting.

There has been included in this Budget a summary of the Budget suggested by the Highway Department.

In order that construction and reconstruction may be carried on as rapidly as possible, we recommend that the Legislature consider the passage of an emergency law authorizing the Governor and Council to issue as required for road construction in the calendar year 1931, three million dollars of the bonds authorized by constitutional amendment in 1929. The present plan of the Highway Commission would be to use the balance of the bonds over the calendar years 1932 and 1933 in order to finish the 4-year program. Only by this method can Maine take advantage of all available Federal aid funds.

It has been obvious for some time that unless some change should be made in the provisions for the distribution of road moneys, or increased provision for road expenditures, there would be a serious deficit in the fund for State aid and maintenance. It does not appear feasible at the present time to provide for additional revenues for highway purposes. The Highway Commission has made some alternative suggestions and we believe that the plan best adapted 'to meet the situation would be as follows:

1. For the Legislature to pass an emergency bill providing that for the calendar year 1931 the law regarding the distribution of auto registration fees should be modified so that the balance after fixed charges would be applicable to maintenance purposes.

2. That for the calendar year beginning January 1, 1932 the law should be so modified that money from all sources available for maintenance and State aid, Third-class and Special Resolve construction should go into a general fund for maintenance and secondary highway construction to be apportioned in accordance with a plan to be devised, better to coordinate and complete the secondary highway system.

We believe that the adoption of some such policy would simplify not only the handling of highway finances but the understanding of the same and enable a more definite and better balanced program to be carried out. It seems of the greatest importance that adequate provision should be insured for the maintenance of roads after they are built. The financial details of these plans are shown in the budget.

The Committee views with concern the rising cost of government and the accompanying increase in taxation. At the same time it must be realized that when the State has assumed definite responsibilities these must be carried on well if they are to be carried on at all. All possible steps have been taken to reduce budget proposals to figures within our means and yet which would permit the carrying on of the State's business in a proper manner.

We believe that legislative procedure and records could be simplified and economies effected by the introduction of a general appropriation act covering all the appropriations to be made by the Legislature which are included in the Budget. Such an act would cover all the regular expenses of the departments and institutions. Hearings would be assigned on the separate items in the act and any figures amended as readily as if there were a large number of separate resolves. It has been the practice for separate resolves for the different items to be introduced and these are finally gathered together by the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs into an appropriation act reported at the close of the session.

The plan recommended would require a much earlier report from the Committee of the general appropriation act, and it would be necessary to consider at the end of the session a supplementary act covering final matters.

While the Budget Committee is not directly concerned with the study of administrative reorganization, the work of this Committee has given the members an opportunity to note the possibility for more efficient and economical conduct of the State's business. We believe that a closer control of some of the departmental and institutional work of the State would be desirable and that the establishment of a better system of financial control is most desirable. We believe that budgetary methods may be greatly improved and that such small additional expense as might be incurred in providing for Budget control and for more time in the preparation of the next Budget would be well justified.

If legislation is passed adopting any of the suggestions contained in the recent Survey of the State Government this present budget can readily be regrouped in accordance with any rearrangement of the State's business.

Service on the Budget Committee has not been an easy task and the experience has brought very forcibly to our minds the need for the most careful scrutiny of State expenditures. We have prepared the accompanying budget after much deliberation and are pleased to report a financial plan permitting a reduction of the State tax of one-half mill for the biennium. The summary of estimates shows a tax rate of 7 mills for the first year and  $7\frac{1}{2}$  mills for the second. The difference is due to the fact that the large expense of a legislative session and large bond maturities fall in the second period.

(1) An amount not exceeding the fees collected may be expended in the current year and in the two following years. This is provided for by a continuing statute and does not need to be appropriated.

The Commissioner of Agriculture, through the division of plant industry, has in the past year certified 600,000 barrel of seed potatoes, most of which is sold beyond the limits of the State, and has supervised moth pests and inspected nursery stock. The division of inspections analyzes food, animal feeds, fertilizers and inspected nursery stock. The division of inspects the packing of blueberries, clams and sardines. The division of markets is charged with the duty of protecting the shipper of farm products, there being 5,968 lots inspected last year. The division of animal industry deals with dairy herds and milk supply. Largely as a result of this work tuberculosis in cattle has been practically eradicated in Maine, only one-half of one per cent of the herds of the state now reacting to this disease, with the result that this state is accredited as one or the few states free from this disease.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT The statutes provide that the Executive Department shall administer the aid to certain State beneficiaries. In 1915 the law was enacted providing for a pension for blind persons. The maximum rate by the statute is \$300.00 but none are paid more than \$180.00. The average is slightly under \$170.00 a year. About 65% of the pensioners are more than 60 years of age. The death rate is between eight and nine per cent. There are at present 696 on the roll. The indigent poor having no settlement, i.e., five year continuous residence in a city or town, are cared for by the town if they fall into distress, and upon due proof the State reimburses the town. Blind children are educated at the Perkins Institute for the Blind, at Watertown, Massachusetts, the tuition being \$400.00 each per year. At present 35 are so being educated. The State is at present pensioning 23 retired employees under an act passed in 1919. The maximum rate is one-half the average pay for five years prior to retirement. An older law provides for retirement pensions of Civil War veterans in the employ of the State for 25 years. Two veterans are still receiving the benefits of this law.

The Forest Commissioner is now engaged in the control of the white pine blister rust, in co-operation with the United States Department of Agriculture, various cities and towns and owners of stands of white pine growth. In addition to the state appropriation for this purpose the Federal Government contributes each year \$21,500; the municipalities, \$10,000; and pine owners \$9,000. The department also administers the Maine Forestry District, including a large part of the northern section of the state. An annual tax of two and a half mills on the dollar is assessed upon all the property in this district, the amount so assessed being \$168,984.20 in 1929. The district employs approximately 190 men and owns equipment valued at \$350,000.00, including lookout towers, camps, boats, trucks and fire tools to equip 10,000 men. The Federal Government contributes \$52,000.00 annually, \$42,000.00 of which is used in the district and the balance in organized towns. This organization is unique in that the owners pay for the protection of their lands, relieving the State of this work.

The Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Game has general supervision of the administration and enforcement of the inland fish and game laws. Recently additions to the extent of nearly 96,000 square feet of feeding pools for fish have been built with an approximate capacity of 4,000,000 fish. One hatchery with a capacity of nearly 500,000 fish is nearly finished. New feeding stations are under construction at Appleton, Rangeley, Cherryfield and Caratunk. These will have a total of 90 pools with an added capacity of 900,000 fish. Plans are now in process for a hatchery at Litleton and feeding stations at Norridgework and in northern Hancock and northern Oxford counties. These will have an approximate capacity of 2,000,000 fish. It is confidently expected that in 1931 the department will place in the hatcheries 14,000,000 trout and salmon eggs. All fish and game wardens are now furnished with a distinctive uniform with the result that there is a much better feeling between the sportsmen and the wardens. The establishment of camps for wardens in unorganized districts and equipping them with cars, cances and outboard motors has resulted in better protection for remote districts. There are constant calls for lectures on fish and game matters, but many of these southern counties of the state has proven of great value in stocking the depleted areas. The cash income in the foregoing estimate is on the basis that the present Legislature will make the resident fishing license an annual license.

The Librarian reports that the people of Maine are reading more and better books every year, the library sending out about 12,500 books a year; also some 1,500 traveling libraries. There are purchased annually some 2,000 books and there are about 3,000 gifts and exchanges. The legislative reference department is increasing in importance and efficiency. An important activity is indexing items containing valuable information about Maine history, its industries and people. All public documents and reports printed by the State as well as the session laws and town histories are sent out from the library. A library bulletin is issued quarterly. A library course for local librarians is also conducted, of which 3 are now taking advantage. A survey is now being made of the library resources of the State.

A number of important surveys are being prepared or have been completed. The flood hazard survey has been completed and printed, as well as the cotton textile and pulp and paper survey. The potato survey is now in its second year in markets outside Maine. The milk survey, in co-operation with the University of Maine, is progressing. The recreational survey, to determine the value of Maine's recreational property, has progressed along the Maine seacoast from Kittery to Bangor. When this is completed the inland recreational survey will be started. In the two coming years special emphasis will be placed on advertising the mining and quarrying possibilities of the State, also fisheries and the larger industrial developments. It is hoped that the advertising may increase the length of the tourist season, bringing people here earlier in the year and keeping them through the beautiful fall months. The demand for publications constantly increases.

The efforts of the Commission to impress upon those engaged in the industry of sea fishing that the protection of fish and lobsters means more money for them in the future if they co-operate with the department, have been producing good results. Maine heads all the states in the production of lobsters. Cod, hake, haddock and pollock, also materially add to the wholesome food supply. The Commission recommends the enactment of laws to protect the spawning beds of the cod. The herring fishery is very important as well as the clam industry. The duties of the secretary of State and his force are as follows: Attending as secretary the meetings of the Governor and Council and preserving records of all their official acts; preparing, recording and delivering commissions to all persons appointed by the governor; engrossing all acts and resolves of the legislature including the preservation and filing of the original papers and signed copies of all laws; publication of the official copies of the acts and resolves of each succeeding legislature; recording of the acts of incorporation of Maine formed corporations together with the annual return, sending out notices of the same; preparation and distribution of all ballots used in state, county and national elections and primaries and the filing of the returns of votes of such elections.

The duties of this office have greatly increased, due not only to the expanding business of the State, but also to recent enactments placing additional duties upon the department. In 1923 an act was passed requiring the State Auditor, when requested, to conduct audits of the accounts of any municipality or to install therein uniform systems of accounts. About 50 cities and towns have availed themselves of the benefits of this law. The auditor is now also required to collect the gasoline tax of nearly \$4,000,000.00 a year, and more recently to see to the inspection of gasoline and oil. His force is required to audit the books of 130 distributors of gasoline in the State and have analysis made of gasoline and oil samples. The cost is about three quarters of one per cent of the gasoline tax receipts.

There were committed to the Board of Children's Guardians in 1930, 158 children, as compared to 302 for There were committed to the Board of Children's Guardians in 1930, 158 children, as compared to 302 for the previous year. The daily average of children being cared for in 1930 was 2,252 as compared to 2,301 for the previous year. The reimbursement of the State by municipalities for amounts due for board and care of children for the year ended June 30, 1930, was \$154,576.11. The per capita cost for board per child per year in 1930 was \$212.89 as against \$218.08 in 1929. There are at present 14 field workers, there being no increase since 1228. On the Mothers' Aid work the municipalities contribute a like amount with the State. For the period 1929– 1930 some \$94,000.00 was received from the towns on this account. This fund is made up by \$150,000 from the State and contributions from some towns amounting to \$15,000 a year.

The State Highway Commission has completed the construction of about one hundred miles of first-class highways in the calendar year just closed. It recommends that there be legislation authorizing the Governor and Council to issue the remaining \$8,000,000.00 of highway bonds heretofore authorized, as required, to properly carry out the four year program. It is now believed that \$3,000,000.00 should be made available for the fiscal year 1931-1932 and \$2,500,000.00 for the year 1932-1933. The Commission recommends and the Committee on Budget concurs in the recommendation, that the Legislature give this matter early attention, as much of the proposed construction for 1931-1932 includes Federal aid projects requiring action by the State before Federal aid agreements can be entered into.

of the proposed construction for 1931-1932 includes Federal aid projects requiring action by the State before Federal aid agreements can be entered into. STATE ATD HIGHWAYS The demand for State Aid for construction of second-class highways has increased from \$498,000.00 in 1924 to \$3,069,000.00 in 1930. In 1927 and 1928 \$797,000.00 was provided from surplus funds of the State so that the requisitions of the towns could be met in full. In 1929 the Legislature authorized the re-issue of bonds heretofore matured and paid in the amount of \$775,000.00, thus releasing some of the gasoline tax receipts for State Aid construction. The Legislature of 1929 also provided that the fees received for automobile registrations, after caring for certain fixed charges, be used for State Aid construction, and \$1,100,000.00 has so been transferred in the calendar year 1930. In 1930 cities and towns to the number of 544 have applied for State Aid funds. Of this number 207 applied under the so-called "five times" provision and 195 under the "three town act." The total State apportionments were as follows:

The cities and towns matched this with appropriations totaling \$1,226,460.99. It is estimated that 375 miles of State Aid highway were built in the season just closed. THIRD CLASS HIGHWAYS

The Committee on Budget suggests that Third Class highway construction may be fixed at \$500,000.00 a year for the second year. In the past year 465 towns were entitled to apportionments from this fund, the amounts totaling \$815,133.53. It is estimated that 100 miles have been completed in the season just closed. MAINTENANCE

MAINTENANCE THIS work has included patrol maintenance on about 5,000 miles of road; bituminous surface treatment of approximately 1,500 miles; calcium chloride treatment of approximately 900 miles; a great deal of gravel and bituminous macadam resurfacing; construction and painting of new guard rail and replacement and painting of old guard rail. Considerable work has been done in widening the road by the construction of bituminous macadam shoulders. The Commission is greatly concerned about the future provisions for maintenance. The State has a large investment in completed roads and new mileage is being added each year. It is not good busi-ness to allow such an investment to depreciate through lack of maintenance. Under the present law, effective in 1929, the maintenance fund now receives no benefit from automobile registration fees. The fund requires \$3,265,000.00 and \$3,735,000.00, respectively, for the two coming years, with \$2,225,000.00 and \$2,425,000.00 to accomplish it, or \$1,040,000.00 less than is necessary for the first period and \$1,310,000.00 is the second period. Therefore, if adequate funds are provided for maintenance, it appears necessary to either curtail on some other division or provide additional funds. division or provide additional funds.

#### BRIDGE CONSTRUCTION

BRIDGE CONSTRUCTION Under the general bridge law, work has been undertaken on the construction of about sixty bridges, which is about the number that can be built each year, the cost being \$1,600,000.00, of which the State furnishes \$1,000,000.00 and the counties, cities and towns \$600,000.00. Considering the funds now available, it is im-possible for the Commission to build the number of bridges required. To more nearly come up to the requirements at least ninety bridges should be built each year. This would require an increase of fifty percent in the appro-priation. There are now on file three hundred and sixty active petitions for bridge construction, on which no construction has been done.

#### SNOW REMOVAL

During the last winter towns applied for approval of snow removal routes which included approximately 5,500 miles. The State's obligation on this account is provided for by the reservation for this purpose of the income from the tax on gasoline for the months of December, January, February and March.

The State is required by the law to retire 45% of the bridge debt and the railroad company 55%. The surplus earnings are accumulating, against period where bond retirement begins, which is July 1, 1931, at which time there begins to mature bonds to the amount of \$50,000.00 a year. There has been set aside in a fund to pay such bonds \$102,124.58, as of date June 30, 1930. The earnings are also being set aside against the time when extraordinary repairs will be required, such as painting the bridge.
