



SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

MR. GEORGE W. LEADBETTER, Commissioner,

Department of Health and Welfare, State House, Augusta, Maine.

The report of the Maine School for the Deaf for the years 1934-35 and 1935-36 is submitted as follows:

In June, 1936, the school completed its thirty-ninth year as a State institution. It was founded sixty years ago.

The State of New Hampshire paid tuition for five pupils for the year 1934-35 and for six pupils in 1935-36.

HEALTH

During the past two years the general health of the pupils has been good. Each year Dr. Small, the school physician, has given toxoid to the new pupils and has vaccinated them. One child was taken home on account of tubercular condition and another for epilepsy.

We are indebted to the Maine Eye and Ear Infirmary for attention

given our pupils at the eye and ear clinics and for blood tests given all the pupils in the fall of 1934. One case of eczema was treated at the hospital and one case for the removal of adenoids.

We are also innebted to the Red Cross clinic at the Children's Hospital for the care of the teeth of pupils under twelve years of age. There were 144 visits during the year 1934-35. Fifty-eight visits were made in the year 1935-6.

The Fairfield Sanitorium gave our pupils tuberculin tests this last year. The reports were very satisfactory.

At the Maine General Hospital in the spring of 1935, a pupil had an operation for appendicitis. There was another case in December. Three boys received treatment for pneumonia in February and March each year.

During the last year seven pupils had tonsils removed at the Maine General Hospital and another received treatment for a broken arm there.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

In June, 1935, three boys and two girls completed the school course. The usual graduation exercises were omitted when the school was unexpectedly closed. One boy in the class had been preparing for entrance examinations at Gallaudet College, the national college for the deaf at Washington, D. C.

In June, 1936, graduation exercises were held for a class of ten pupils, five boys and five girls. A demonstration of school methods and an exhibition of work done in the manual training and domestic science departments was also given. The interest of the public was shown by the large attendance.

A group instrument equipped with oscillators for bone conduction and with receivers for air conduction was bought for the use of the pupils.

In February, 1935, the school was saddened by the death of Mr. George Vinall, physical instructor for the boys for a number of years. In the fall of 1935, Mr. Eric Berg was appointed to succeed Mr Vinall. The work was carried on successfully during the year under his direction.

Physical training for the girls has been under the direction of Mrs. Vinall. A class of small girls from five to ten years old was tried as an experiment under Mrs. Vinall's direction.

Our girls have enjoyed tap dancing given by Miss Kennedy, a nurse at the Children's Hospital, for the experience in teaching.

At the end of this last school year, Miss Harriette Smith resigned to accept a position teaching deaf children of pre-school age in their homes for the Sarah Fuller Home near Boston. Miss Gladys Lamb has left to teach in the School for the Deaf at Beverly, Massachusetts.

Miss Mary Probyn has been granted leave of absence to take the course in the normal training class for teachers of the deaf at the Clarke School, Northampton, Massachusetts. Mr. Horace Stinson has been appointed in her place. Mrs. Helen Furbish Streeter and Miss Mary Elizabeth Taylor were appointed to fill the other vacancies.

HOUSEHOLD DEPARTMENT

The household department has been managed efficiently and economically.

During the Christmas vacation in December, 1934, Mr. Frank Adams Wakefield, who had been the engineer for the school over sixteen years, died suddenly. Mr. Ralph S. Baker was appointed to fill the vacancy left by Mr. Wakefield's death. In December, 1935, Mr. Baker was transferred to another state institution and Mr. Edward Meader took his place as engineer.

INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT

In the Industrial Department the girls have profitted by the course in domestic science. The exhibition of their work last June was a credit to the school.

The boys have shown interest in the manual training, sloyd and printing classes and were proud of their work exhibited when school closed.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS

In 1934 in Brownson Hall, the panelling in the front hall was retouched and the roofs were repaired.

A high pressure water boiler feeder was attached to the gas boiler in the laundry and repairs were made on the mangle and extractor. In all the buildings where necessary, ceilings were cleaned, patched and whitened.

Repairs were made on the iron fence on Spring Street, to the shafting in the Industrial Building and to the telephone system.

A concrete gutter, catch basin and sewer pipe were laid to drain the water from the boys' play ground. A new gas stove was bought for the kitchen. Additional silver was bought for the pupil's dining room.

During the summer vacation in 1935, most of the old plumbing in Brownson Hall and Taylor Hall was replaced with new. A new gas heater was installed in the laundry. A new oil burner range was

bought for the kitchen. Changes were made in the heating apparatus in the school building and a chimney enlarged so the class rooms are now much more comfortable in very cold weather.

The roofs and conductors have been repaired and the painting of the exterior of all five buildings was done in June.


APPROPRIATIONS

From our appropriation of \$48,000 for the year 1934-5 approximately \$5,500 was unexpended. The school received from the State of New Hampshire \$2,200 for board and tuition.

For the year 1935-36 our appropriation was \$54,340 and a balance of about \$6,600 was left at the close of the year.



TO PARENTS OF DEAF CHILDREN


The Maine School for the Deaf was established for the instruction of mentally normal children whose hearing is so seriously impaired as to be incapable of receiving instruction in the public schools.

It is sustained by the State and is open to all deaf children in the State of Maine. The system of instruction includes all known methods of teaching the deaf, special attention being given to speech and lip-reading. The course of instruction includes all the English branches and every pupil is given industrial training while in attendance.


Applicants for admission must be between the ages of five and twenty-one years, and free from any constitutional malady that may render them incapable of receiving instruction.

The school term is from September 10 to June 10 with two weeks intermission at Christmas.
