

The enrollment at the end of each year was 112.



Dr. Richard D. Small, after nearly thirty years of faithful service as physician for the school, resigned on account of ill health in June, 1937. Every one was grieved to hear of his death which occurred just before school opened in the fall. Dr. Alvin A. Morrison was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Following the resignation in June, 1937, of Miss Mary Elizabeth Taylor, who left to be married, and of Miss Mary Probyn, who is now teaching in the Clarke School for the Deaf at Northampton, Massachusetts, Mrs. Florence C. Tibbetts and Mrs. Florence P



KINDERGARTEN CLASS

Grussing, both experienced teachers, were appointed to fill the positions left vacant.

Mrs. Grace Vinall, who successfully conducted the classes in physical training with the girls for a number of years, resigned in June, 1937, to take up full time work at Nasson Institute. Mrs. Beatrice LaVallee, who had been physical director for the girls at South Portland High School for nine years, was appointed to fill the vacancy in the fall.

In June, 1938, Miss Kate Alcorn, one of our teachers, attended the convention of the American Association to "Promote the Teaching of Speech to the Deaf" at Detroit, to give an address on "Better Speech for the Deaf."

Another teacher took a summer course in New York.

One of our graduates, who received a scholarship to attend Gallaudet College, the national college for the deaf at Washington, D. C., has successfully completed his first year's work there.

We are indebted to Dr. Beach, Dr. McAdams, Dr. Fisher, and Dr. Benjamin Foster for the treatment of pupils in the clinics at the Maine Eye and Ear Infirmary.

We are indebted also to the Red Cross Clinic at the Children's Hospital for dental care given our younger pupils.

In the spring of 1937, Miss McHowell, supervisor of small boys, received treatment at one of the hospitals for a dislocated and fractured shoulder.

During both years, pupils received treatment at the Maine General Hospital.

Mrs. Mary A. Gardner, supervisor of the small girls, fell injuring her back in December, 1937, and received care and treatment at the Maine Eye and Ear Infirmary.

As usual, all entering pupils were given toxoid in the fall each year. Every child was given a physical examination by the school physician.

The health record was unusually good during both years. In January, 1938, one of the housemaids was sent to the Isolation Hospital with diphtheria.

The Board of Health placed the school under quarantine for six weeks. A special nurse was employed during that time. Two pupils, eight and twelve years old, were considered carriers and sent to the Isolation Hospital for a short time. We were fortunate in confining it to only the one case.

A new tumbler dryer purchased in the fall of 1936 made a great improvement in the laundry work. The old motion-picture machine was sold and a new silent projector, 16 m. m., was purchased for the entertainment of the pupils. Electric Telechron clocks were installed in the class rooms and kitchen. A new potato peeler was also installed.

Minor repairs were made to the roof and laundry equipment.

In the Industrial Building, a new tank for hot water was installed, A new dish-washing machine was purchased in the spring of 1938.

Following instructions, we have been as economical as possible and have succeeded in keeping within the allotment, as shown by accompanying financial report for this period.




SMALL GIRLS' SITTING ROOM

PRINTING CLASS

GENERAL INFORMATION.

The Maine School for the Deaf admits children who are totally deaf, or too deaf to make satisfactory progress in the public schools.

Board and tuition are free to pupils whose parents are residents of Maine.

Parents are expected to provide clothing and transportation.

The state law requires that deaf children from six to eighteen years of age must receive regular instruction in the studies usually taught in the public schools.

As this is a school, not a hospital, children must be in good physical condition to enter. Deaf children who are mentally deficient are not eligible.

All clothing should be marked when a child enters school. Money should be left in the office for incidental expenses, such as shoerepairing, stamps, etc.

Pupils are accompanied to trains and buses when they go home for the regular vacations at Christmas time and in June and are met when the pupils return in January and September.

Pupils may go home at other times if called for and brought back to the school by their parents, or other relatives.


