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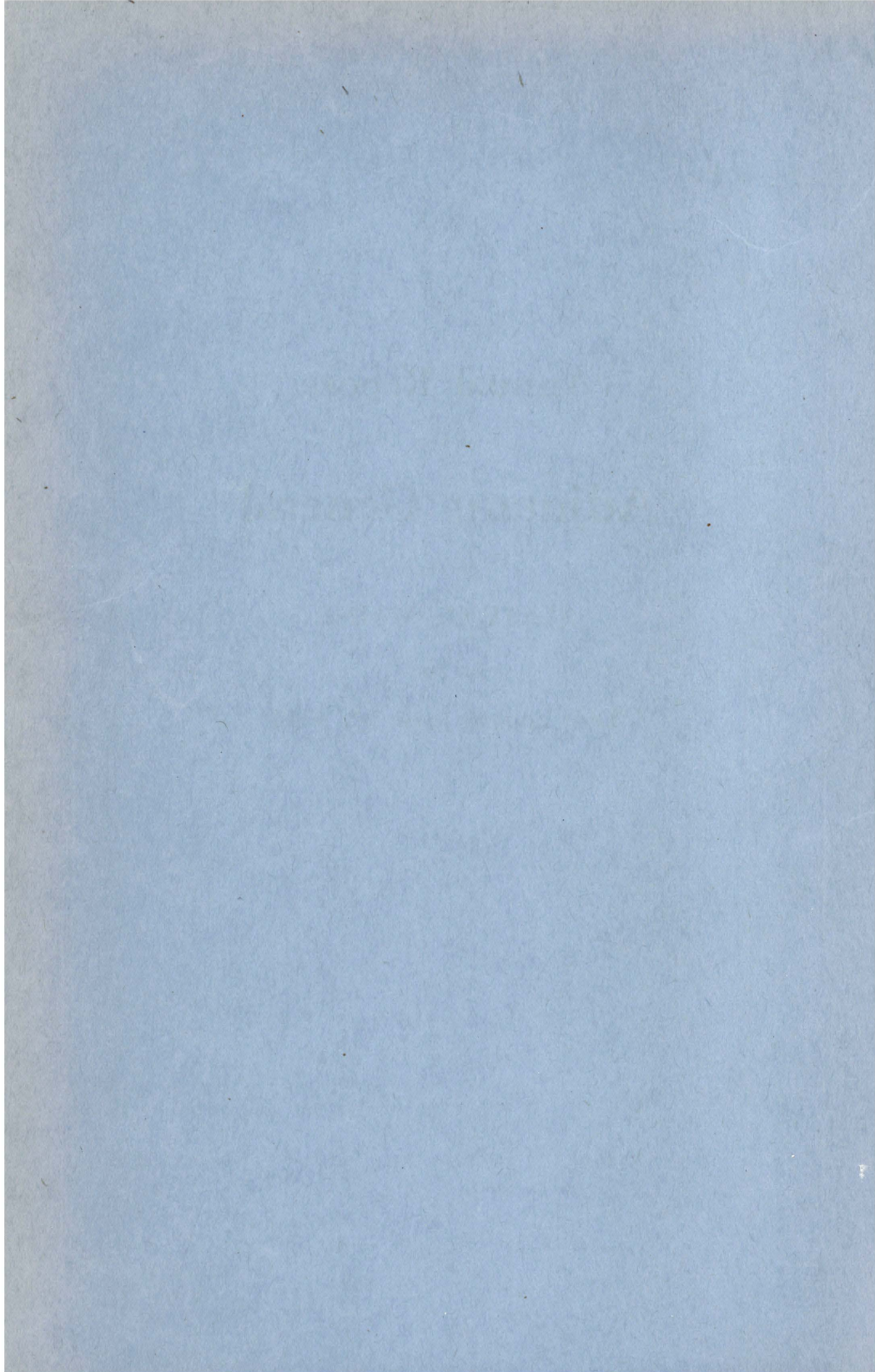

For the Year Ending June 30, 1947

The past year has been a momentous one. It witnessed the passing of the Maine State Guard and the organization of the first units of a New National Guard which, it is hoped, will be better trained, better equipped and more efficient than the Maine National Guard has ever been before.

This re-organization of the National Guard means that hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of property has already or soon will be issued by the Federal Government to the various units. It means, too, that thousands of dollars in payrolls will be distributed to the citizens of the State who have joined the Guard.

NEW LEGISLATION

Though it is hoped that sometime the entire Military Law of the State will be re-written and brought into closer conformity with the regulations of the War Department, successive amendments over the years have improved the law so that practically all contingencies are now covered. Several amendments were adopted by the 93d Legislature at its 1947 session. While not critical changes, these amendments do tighten certain restrictions. One of these amendments provides that "The commanding officer of any camp or armory *MAY* (not shall) prohibit the introduction or sale of, or dealing in, wine or any intoxicating liquor within the limits or extended limits of the camp or within the armory, and he may abate as common nuisances all such sales and introductions." The old law included beer in the list of liquors, but the word "beer" has been stricken out.

Another amendment, that made to Section 50 of Chapter 12, Revised Statutes, deals with prosecutions for illegal wearing of the uniform of the National Guard, or other authorized military force. This amendment reads: "Trial justices and municipal courts within their counties shall have original and concurrent jurisdiction with the superior court in all prosecutions for the violations of the provisions of this section."

It is also believed that the next session of the Maine Legislature should give consideration to a provision of the Military Law, giving an initial uniform allowance to officers commissioned in the National Guard of the State, and also a replacement allowance for each year of active duty with the Guard. Similar legislation has already been passed by a large number of the States.

ARMORIES

The Armory situation in Maine is still critical. With 53 new organizations authorized for the Post-War Maine National Guard, there are only fourteen State owned armories to house these units. One of these buildings, that on Stevens Avenue in Portland, was destroyed by fire on February 24, 1945. This structure will be rebuilt during 1947 and the early months of 1948.

All the State owned armories were constructed to accommodate National Guard units as these organizations were constituted before World War II. The new National Guard requires more numerous personnel per unit and far greater equipment. No armory in the State is capable of storing this equipment so that such items as are not immediately needed for training purposes are kept in a central pool at Camp Keyes in Augusta.

The armory congestion has been relieved somewhat by the acquisition through lease of certain buildings at both the Presque Isle and Houlton Air Base. In those cities and towns where there are no State owned armories armory facilities have been leased.

While there are 53 units authorized for the new Guard it is not expected nor desirable that each unit have a separate building. The Bangor State Armory is supposed to accommodate four companies, the Saco Armory two and the burned Stevens Avenue Armory cared for five. The Lewiston Armory, which is owned by the city, has accommodations for four units based on old-time tables of organization.

The armories owned by the State are located at:

Bangor, Bath, Belfast, Brewer, Brunswick, Gardiner, Millinocket, Newport, Norway, Milk Street Portland, South Portland, Rumford and Saco.

ARMORIES AND THE COMMUNITY

It is very gratifying to note that there is a healthy and growing spirit to have a State Armory erected in those towns that have not one at present. To secure a State armory the town must of course co-operate in providing at the least a suitable lot upon which to erect the building. The State can legally contribute to the expense of the structure only insofar as the requirements of the military establishment are concerned. These towns would like to have armories. They would like to have them a credit to the municipality. But they also feel that the Armory should be used for other than military purposes.

This expressed spirit on the part of the towns is commendable. There is a distinct place in any town for an Armory to serve as a community center. The schools, patriotic societies, agricultural organizations and other bodies may well have occasion when an adequate Armory with a large assembly hall will mean much to the community.

The program of sports and athletic activities in the public schools is increasing in interest and scope each year. Some high schools have gymnasiums that are hardly worthy of the name. A good high school basketball team draws an attendance of thousands yet the facilities in practically every city and town, so far as the schools themselves are concerned, are such that only a small fraction of the prospective audience can be accommodated.

Town officials and citizens as a whole will endorse and assist in the erection of an Armory if it can be made a community center whereas if only military part-time use is to be the purpose of the building they would be luke warm or even hostile. The Adjutant General and the members of the Military Defense Commission under whose care are placed the authorization and construction of the armories commend this communal spirit on the part of the people.

In some sections steps have already been taken to secure a new armory on the basis of a community center. The suggestion has been made, appropriately enough, that these new armories be memorials to the war dead. Such an attitude is in line with the expressed and published position taken by the American Legion and other veterans' organizations. They urge the erection of utilitarian memorials. New armories with the community center idea surely fit into the suggestions urged by these veterans' societies.

NEW NATIONAL GUARD GARAGE

About the biggest structure erected in Augusta for many years is the new National Guard Garage at Camp Keyes, which was completed November 22, 1946. The cost was approximately \$84,000 all of which was furnished by the Federal Government. The contract called for completion of the building in 140 days and the work required just that time. The new garage which is 90 by 312 feet is built mostly of brick, cement and iron. It will house about 80 motor vehicles of all kinds. The rolling stock includes a 2½-ton small arms repair truck, a 2½-ton mobile machine shop and other equipment for serving motor vehicles.

The 3620th Ordnance Maintenance Co. (AA) uses this equipment for training and for regular work. Certain minor service is supposed to be performed by the Federal caretakers stationed with each unit but if there happens to be work that cannot be done at the home armory then it will be sent to Augusta where 27 civilian caretaker-mechanics, painters, welders, and the like, operate the fully equipped machine shop, which forms a part of the new garage. It is interesting to note that to make repairs on the motor vehicles possible, the War Department has supplied 3000 tons of spare parts to service approximately 900 vehicles and 300 pieces of rolling armament in Maine. All this is part of 85 million dollars' worth of material which the Federal Government is sending or has sent into Maine. The figure given does not include any of the equipment for the Air branch of the National Guard.

THE STATE GUARD

During the past year, the last units of the Maine State Guard were mustered out of service. Thus was concluded one of the most interesting and patriotic chapters in the military history of Maine.

The members of the Maine State Guard performed their duties valiantly. In some cases, this service extended over six years. There were both officers and men in some organizations who never missed a regular meeting or special assembly of their organizations. Such conduct on the part of this personnel showed a devotion to duty that it would be hard to surpass or even to duplicate. It is no exaggeration to say that members of the Maine State Guard almost without exception sacrificed time and money to achieve and maintain the highly efficient force into which the Guard developed.

Since the State Guard was authorized by Congress and was raised in accordance with regulations of the War Department to be a force to take the place of the National Guard while the latter was in Federal service, units of the State Guard were gradually disbanded and mustered out of service as companies of the new National Guard came into being. The work of demobilizing these troops extended over many months, so that until the last units were disbanded in April 1947 there was never a time but what the State had a trained military force, even though it was small.

During its existence, the State Guard, fortunately, was never called upon to perform armed duty in defending the State from a foreign foe. Its services were used frequently for other purposes: the fighting of forest fires, the search for lost persons, guarding of property in the case of fire and the granting of aid in the case of natural and other disasters.

The training of the Guard was thorough and covered a range of subjects from the rendering of first aid to the defense of a city by the use of rifles, machine guns and grenades, with all of which the State Guard troops were familiar.

The very last of the State Guard forces to be mustered out of service were members of the State Headquarters Staff. They continued in an advisory and supervisory capacity until all the units had been demobilized. The following is a list of the units that were mustered out of service during the fiscal year 1 July 1946 to 30 June 1947; all other State Guard organizations were de-activated previous to 1 July 1946:

The exercises in connection with the mustering out of the various units conformed to no set pattern. In all cases the orders directing the deactivation were read. Discharge papers were presented and the last formation was dismissed.

Some units made a prepared ceremony of the mustering out process. In Portland all five units then in the 1st Battalion assembled at the Milk Street Armory. There were remarks by the officers and higher officials and refreshments. In Bangor a similar proceeding was followed only the exercises were confined to the units in Bangor. Refreshments or a full dinner were in most cases provided.

The passing of the State Guard as a defense organization of the State of Maine does not mean that the spirit of the Guard has passed, too. Men and boys — yes, there were boys who were permitted to enroll at the age of 16 with their parents' consent — who were members of the State Guard formed many new and lasting friendships. A camaraderie was born that will exist for years to come. More than that, the veterans of some of the units have already formed associations that will carry on the spirit and friendship of the State Guard.

It was a great force — this Maine State Guard and the members performed a service that, while far from spectacular, was one for which the people of the State may well feel deeply grateful.

THE NEW NATIONAL GUARD

Immediately after the defeat of Germany and Japan in World War II, preparations for the activation of the new National Guard were made by the War Department. The objective of this force is:

- a. To provide a reserve component of the Army of the United States, trained, equipped, and capable of immediate expansion to war strength, able to furnish units fit for service anywhere in the World.
- b. To defend critical areas of the United States against land, sea-borne, or airborne invasion.
- c. To assist in covering the mobilization and concentration of the remainder of the reserve forces.
- d. To participate, by units, in all types of operations, including the offensive, either in the United States or overseas.

In addition, the National Guard, of the several States, has a mission to provide sufficient organization in each state, so trained and equipped as to enable them to function efficiently at existing strength in the protection of life and property and preservation of peace, order and public safety, under competent orders of State authorities.

On March 6, 1946, the following allotment of ground and air troops was offered to the State of Maine by the Chief of The National Guard Bureau:

On March 19, 1946, this allotment of troops was tentatively accepted for the State, by Governor Horace A. Hildreth. Formal acceptance was made by Governor Hildreth for the following designated units, on May 21, 1946, as allotted in letter from Chief, National Guard Bureau, dated 15 May 1946:

This allotment of troops to Maine totals 5613 officers and enlisted men: Ground Forces — 4998; Air Forces — 615.

The above revived allotment was accepted by Governor Hildreth on 25 June 1946.

Insofar as possible, new units bearing old names have been assigned to their original localities. In regrouping the new units, this has not been possible in all instances, as a change in arm of service has, in several cases, been necessary.

Colonel John W. Healy and Major Theodore E. Lewin were employed in July 1946 to assist in the activation of the New National Guard. Major Lewin has since been assigned to other duties.

In the activation of new units, officers are chosen who it is believed have the ability to organize and train the units to perform their mission. Officers must have had at least six months satisfactory service in World War II and come within the age requirements as laid down by the War Department.

The qualifications, both physical and mental, for enlisted men in the National Guard, are, in the main, the same as for the Regular Army. There are no requirements concerning previous service for enlisted men between the ages of 18 and 35.

Persons between the ages of 35 and 55 will be enlisted in the National Guard of the United States if they have a total prior service in the National Guard of the United States, the Regular Army, Navy and the Marine Corps as follows:

<i>Age</i>	<i>Prior Service</i>
Between 35 and under 36	No service required
Between 36 and 38	1 year

Between 38 and 41	2 years
41 and under 55	2 years plus the number of years of service applicant is over 40 years

Applicants who have been awarded decorations of the Silver Star or higher will be accepted for enlistment without regard to the requirements of age until their 55th birthday.

The new National Guard is to be armed and equipped with the most modern weapons and its training supervised by competent Regular Army Instructors.

A National Guard unit brings a substantial sum of money to the community in which it is organized. Each member of a unit receives from the Federal Government one-thirtieth (1/30) of a month's pay for each drill of two hours duration. This means that a rifle company, when fully organized, receives about \$35,000 per year in drill pay.

The first Annual Field Training Period for the National Guard will be held at Camp Edwards, Massachusetts, 3-17 August 1947. All units which were Federally recognized as of 15 April 1947 and can muster twenty per cent of their table of organization strength by that date will attend. It is anticipated that approximately 1200 officers and men will receive this field training.

ANNUAL REPORT STATE ORDNANCE OFFICER

The undersigned served during the present fiscal year as State Ordnance officer under provisions of Section 18, Military Laws of the State of Maine, 1943 revision, until 1 November 1946. At that time he was relieved from this office due to an appointment as State Maintenance Officer with the reorganized National Guard.

There have been many widespread changes during this fiscal year. In the first period from July 1, 1946 to September 26, 1946, the Maine State Guard was the only State military force. It had no acquisitions of Federal property beyond that issued and listed in the Report for 1946. This was a period of standing by for members of the State Guard who had contributed freely of their time and money while the National Guard was in Federal service. Both indoor 22 caliber and outdoor 30 caliber rifle practice was carried on to a limited extent and units were kept mobile through the care, maintenance and driving of the issued Federal motor vehicles.

September 26, 1946, however, marked the beginning of a completely new State organization. The first two of the new National Guard units were Federally recognized; State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment and the 3620th Ordnance Maintenance Company (AA) at Augusta.

Since that time, it has been the policy of the War Department at the time of Federal recognition to initiate an automatic issue for new National Guard units consisting of one-half of the total individual equipment and 25% of crew-served weapons. Such issue requires between 60 and 90 days for delivery. Hence our new equipment began to arrive about January 1, 1947 and is being delivered in a constant stream to the new units.

It would be impossible in this report to list the huge quantities of ordnance that will eventually be issued. But it is the policy of the War Department eventually to give full equipment for war strength units so that such material will either be at unit armories or within the State for immediate war use.

In order to provide for the maintenance of Federal equipment, the War Department provided for a Pool Maintenance Shop, which is located at Camp Keyes, whose personnel is responsible for all field maintenance of the equipment. In addition to three supervising officers, the State Maintenance Officer, the Ordnance Supervisor and the Signal Maintenance Supervisor, the personnel presently authorized is as follows:

Each unit of the National Guard is also authorized one or more full-time caretakers who are responsible under the unit commander for the organizational maintenance of equipment of all categories issued to the unit. Of these, there were twenty-five appointed up to the end of this fiscal year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE STATE PROPERTY OFFICER

Under the provisions of the Military Laws, the annual report of the State Property Officer for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1947 is herewith submitted.

SECTION I

In addition to the duties of acting as State Property Officer, the undersigned has been acting as State Property Officer for the Office of Civilian Defense.

During the year, all property loaned to the State of Maine for this purpose has been returned to the Federal Government and the undersigned consummated his duties as Property Officer for OCD with the cancellation of his bond May 23rd, 1947. Property records and other pertinent data relative to this function have been placed in the OCD files now in storage in the Adjutant General's Department.

SECTION II

With the reactivation of the National Guard, Maine State Guard was gradually demobilized throughout the year which made it necessary to pick up all Federal and State property of the several organizations. All units were demobilized and all property picked up as of 28 April 1947.

This property is now being classified as to condition. Federal property which is acceptable to the National Guard has been turned over to the acting USP&DO, the balance to be reported to and disposed of under direction of the First Service Command. The State property which had been purchased for the use of the State Guard is being segregated into two groups, one of which is to be retained for future emergencies and the balance to be reported to State Purchasing Agent for disposition.

It had been hoped that this would have been completed by the end of the fiscal year. However, owing to the fact that Federal property had not been made available to the acting USP&DO for National Guard purposes, certain items were temporarily loaned on memorandum receipt to assist in the training of the several National Guard units.

A new stock record of tangible property owned by the Adjutant General's Department is in the process of being made up. This stock record will show the quantities on hand and the location. The stock record account of Federal property loaned to the State of Maine for National Guard purposes and a stock record account of State Guard property will be closed on the completion of the segregation as mentioned above.

SECTION III

In addition to the above, the undersigned has been charged with the supervision of providing the facilities in the several cities and towns in which armories were being furnished by these cities and towns for National Guard purposes. These armories are none State owned armories. He has also been charged with the responsibility of preparation of facilities owned by the United States and loaned to the State of Maine on revocable permits. Namely, these are the National Guard Target Range, Auburn, Maine, the Air National Guard facilities at Dow Field, Bangor, Maine, and the building to be used by Battery B, 152d FA Bn. at the Houlton Air Base and the buildings to be used by Battery A, 152nd FA Bn. at the Presque Isle Army Air Base.

Because of added security measures required by the Federal Government and because of the doubling and sometimes trebling of the strength of National Guard units, it has been necessary to make extensive changes in already cramped quarters and to add to the number of lockers insofar as available space would permit.

The Sanford Armory, Westbrook Armory, Waterville Armory, Skowhegan Armory, Fort Fairfield Armory, Auburn Armory and Calais Armory have been developed as far as possible in the existing quarters and it will be impossible to house these units in these quarters when their enlisted strength reaches its authorized strength prescribed by the Federal Government. Attempts have been made to secure adequate quarters at Fort Kent for Battery C, 152nd FA Bn. However, to date none have been found. Negotiations are now going on for the preparation of armory facilities at Rockland.

The armory now owned by the city of Lewiston is adequate to house the units allotted that city. However, this armory is also used very extensively by the School Board for use of school students in that vicinity. While under the existing conditions there is no conflict in its use by the School Board and the National Guard, it can be foreseen that when the National Guard reaches its authorized strength, this situation will become changed. It is therefore recommended that the steps be initiated by the State to purchase this armory from the city of Lewiston which would enable that city to provide more suitable accommodations for their students and also provide adequate facilities for the National Guard.

SECTION IV

With the deactivation of Selective Service, the large amount of office furniture was turned over to the department for use in connection with the National Guard. This has materially helped the department because of the larger amounts of this type of property required for the several units.

SECTION V

The requirements for office space, the storage of records and the housing of equipment have become greatly overburdened because of the increased activities. The storage of property is in buildings which are not fireproof, in some instances, in temporary war time barracks, all of which is not satisfactory from security or fire hazards viewpoint. In the storage of records, increasing demands are being made for pertinent records such as OCD, Selective Service and Military. Fireproof space should be provided for these invaluable records. Effort should be made without delay for providing an adequate fireproof consolidated building for the storage of military property both State and Federal.

SECTION VI

It is recommended that a survey be instituted to ascertain the storage requirements of the State for military purposes, that plans and specifications be drawn up to meet this requirement and that steps be taken to procure these storage facilities in proper priorities. It is recommended that a complete survey be made of State owned armories and armories for which the State pays rental to determine what requirements are necessary to properly house the units and their equipment as contemplated by the Federal Government, that plans and specifications be prepared and priorities established for covering these alterations.

In conclusion, I wish to thank you for your continued cooperation which has materially assisted the undersigned in consummating the numerous duties it has been confronted with.

3. No encampment will be held later than 28-29 September 1946.
4. Rations and two days base pay will be allowed those participating except as noted in Par. 5 below.
5. Commanding officers of regiments and their staffs are authorized to attend these battalion maneuvers with pay for a total of two days for each officer. Commanding officers of regiments will arrange the schedule of attendance for themselves and the staff officers so that regimental headquarters will be represented at each encampment.
6. Officers and men will be formally mustered for pay on the second day of the encampments and troops will not break camp until muster is completed.
7. All commanding officers will be held responsible that proper tax withholding certificates are made out for every member of their command who does not now have on file a certificate of this nature in the office of The Adjutant General.
8. The following instructions will be followed in the preparation of payrolls:
 - a. All payrolls will be executed in triplicate.
 - b. The names of all members of an organization will be entered in the payroll.
 - c. A separate line for each rank or grade will be allowed.
 - d. Names of members of organizations will be entered alphabetically under the rank or grade held.
 - e. Only those members of an organization attending the encampments will sign the payroll. The signatures of those attending will be the same as to name as given in column one of the payroll and each person signing will use the same numbered line as that on which his name is written or printed in column one.

2. The numbers given in Par. 1 will be assigned by unit commanders of the Maine National Guard to enlisted men without prior service in the Regular Army or the Army of the United States.

3. Sufficient serial numbers are allotted to a unit to fill its needs adequately for several years. A large portion of the block has been retained in The Adjutant General's Office for allotment to newly authorized and organized units or for supplementing blocks which have been previously assigned to units under this General Order, but which may have become exhausted by the personnel turnover within the unit.

4. Each headquarters assigned a block of serial numbers **will maintain a record of the assigned serial numbers** showing to whom they were assigned and will be able to render a report, at any time, of unassigned serial numbers.

The commanding officer of each unit to whom serial numbers are assigned will record these numbers, serially, in a special bound book kept for the purpose. As each number is assigned, the name of the enlisted man receiving that number will be entered after the number. This book will be furnished by the State.

The number assigned to an enlisted man will be entered upon each copy of his enlistment paper and also upon his service record, **but no number will be assigned until after the oath has been administered.**

5. The use of army serial numbers is provided for in Par 5, AR 615-30 which reads as follows:

- a. The Army serial number assigned to an enlisted man is part of his official designation and, except as indicated in **b** below, will ordinarily appear in every military record in which his name appears, including every letter, telegram, order, report, pay roll, etc., at least once, preferably where the name first occurs.
- b. On morning reports and duty rosters, Army serial numbers are not required unless there are in the company or detachment two or more men with the same surname and initials.
- c. When the Army serial number is used it will ordinarily follow immediately the name of the enlisted man, and will precede the statement, if any, of his grade, organization, and arm or service.
- d. Special care must be taken that the correct Army serial number is used for the reason that certain records are filed and certain accounts are paid by the Army serial number and not by name.

6. Inactivated units which have unassigned serial numbers remaining in their allotted blocks, will report them to The Adjutant General for re-allocation to other units as needed.

7. Enlisted men of the National Guard who have served previously as enlisted men in the Regular Army or the Army of the United States or who were called or ordered into Federal service while members of the National Guard will upon proof be assigned the serial number allotted them while in the Federal service.

8. When an individual who has served both as an officer and as an enlisted man in the Regular Army or the Army of the United States, enters upon active duty as an enlisted man in the National Guard, his enlisted Army serial number will be used. When an individual who has served only as a commissioned officer in the Regular Army or the Army of the United States enters the National Guard as an enlisted man, a number will be assigned to him from the block of serial numbers allocated to the unit for newly enlisted members.

MEMORIAL DAY

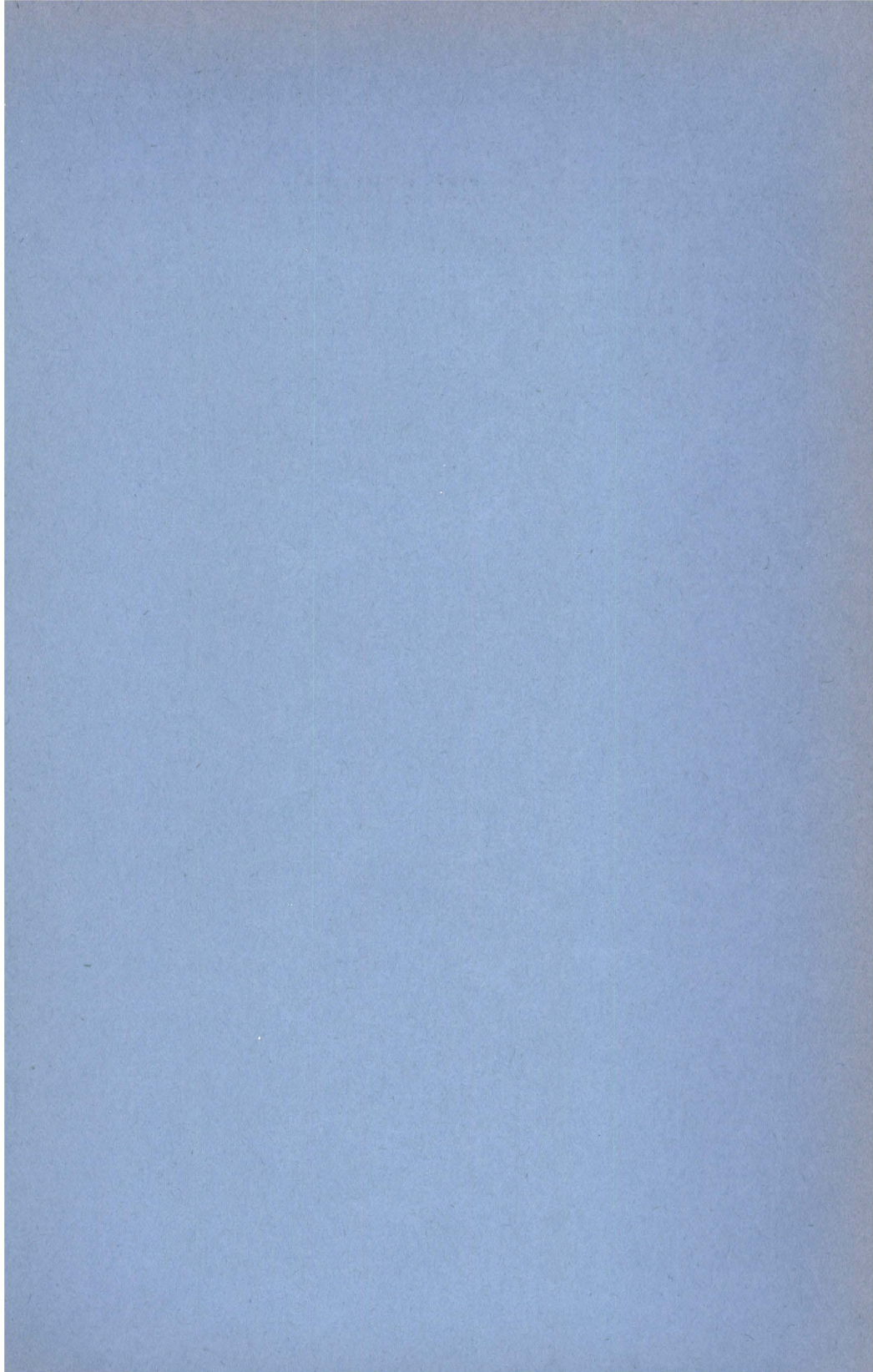

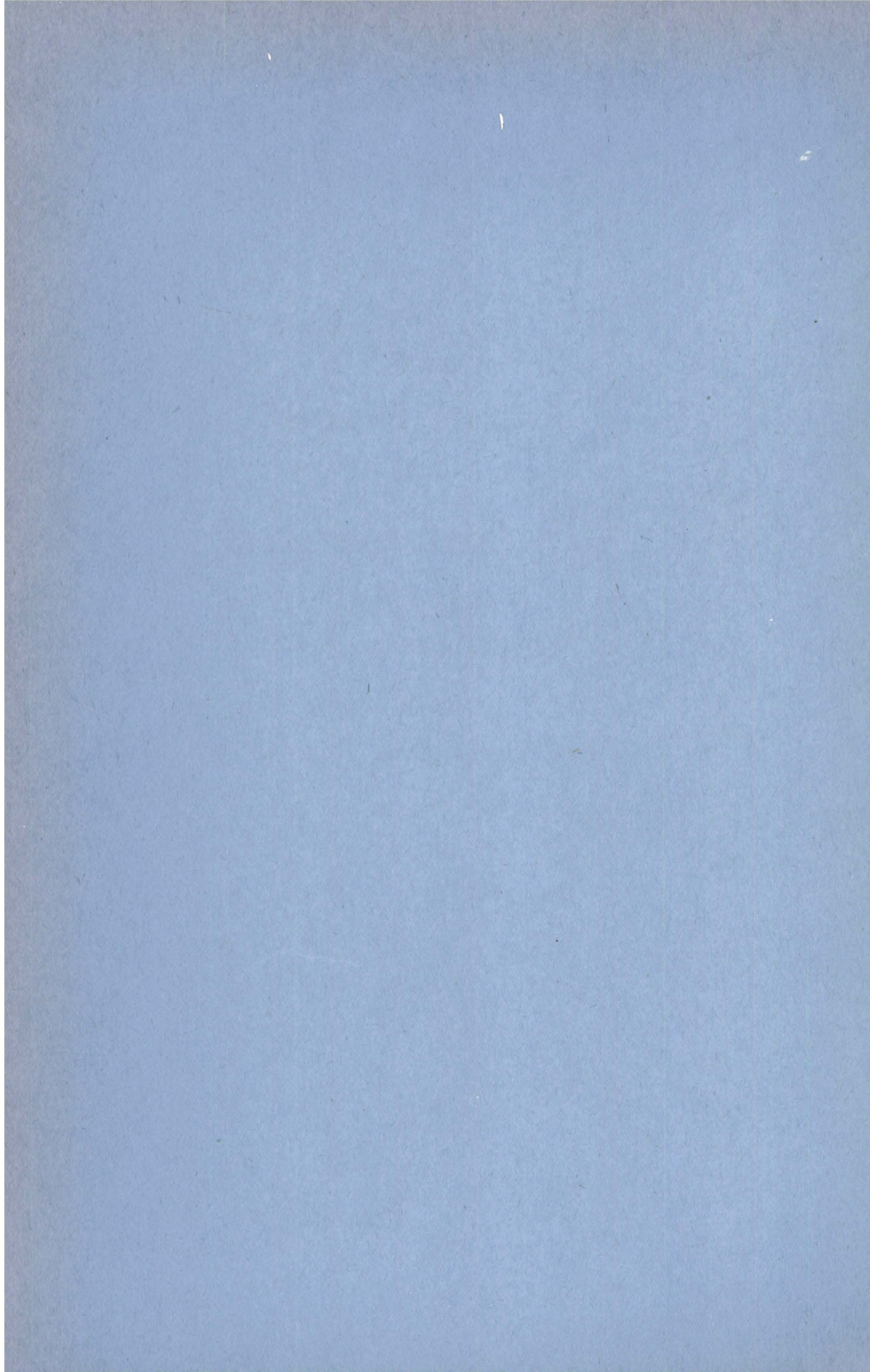

For the Year Ending June 30, 1948

Events vitally affecting the military establishment of the State of Maine and the citizenry of the State as a whole followed each other in too rapid succession during the year ending June 30, 1948.

For the first time since the close of World War II, National Guard troops of the Pine Tree State assembled for 15 days' field training. Ground forces rendezvoused at Camp Edwards, Massachusetts, from 3 to 17 August and the Air Guard of Maine put in 15 days at Dow Field, Bangor, Maine, from 31 August to 14 September 1948.

Officers and men of all units had barely time enough to straighten out property accounts and prepare for the year's armory training before forest fires broke out in nearly all sections of the State. Maine National Guardsmen were called out to assist other forces in the extinguishing of these fires but more particularly for the protection of property and the relief of the hundreds who had been made homeless by the most disastrous fires in the history of the State. Conditions were so hazardous and the results so tragic that the Federal government and the American Red Cross were called on for aid. Both agencies responded whole-heartedly. Fire equipment was furnished by the government wherever needed. The government also provided beds, household furnishings and building materials for refugees from the stricken area. The Red Cross saw to it that everyone who needed shelter and food were furnished these necessities.

During the progress of the semi-annual primary campaign, the charge was made by one of the candidates for Governor that the affairs of The Adjutant General's Department were administered in a way that suggested improper use of Federal and/or State property. This candidate called upon the Governor of the State to order a thorough investigation of these charges.

Two pieces of National legislation were passed in the dying days of the 80th Congress. One of these was a peace-time draft and the other was a law providing retirement pay for members of the National Guard.

INVESTIGATION OF DEPARTMENT

During the primary election campaign of 1948, one of the candidates for the gubernatorial nomination declared that there had been misuse of funds and property in the Adjutant General's Department.

He called upon the Governor Horace Hildreth to investigate the department and bring the facts to light.

The Attorney General of the State, the State Auditor, and officials representing the National Guard Bureau at Washington all conducted investigations. The result was that while there had been laxity in some cases, no evidence of criminality had been discovered. Particularly did the Attorney General Ralph W. Farris and the army officials give the department "a clean bill of health." Mr. Farris, however, suggested that a further investigation be conducted by the Kennebec Grand Jury. This was done under the direction of County Attorney James L. Reed who was very courteous and considerate all through the proceedings. The Grand Jury session lasted about ten days. During the investigation practically every employee of the department was questioned. The results of the investigation are best set forth in the report of the Grand Jury itself which was as follows:

GRAND JURY'S REPORT

At 11:40 o'clock Thursday morning the Kennebec County Grand Jury ended 10 days of examining and deliberating on a far-flung probe of the State Adjutant General's Department and reported to Superior Court Justice William H. Fisher that they had no indictments against members of the department, but did have an eight page, typewritten report that set forth their findings and recommendations.

The complete text of this report — a product of the longest Grand Jury session in Kennebec County history — follows:

Report to the Court by the Grand Jury of the
Kennebec Superior Court

In re

Investigation of the Adjutant General's
Department of the State of Maine

Your Grand Jurors respectfully report to the Court as follows:

Pursuant to a wide-spread belief that irregularities, possibly of a criminal nature, existed within the Adjutant General's Department of the State of Maine with respect to State funds and/or properties, we undertook an exhaustive examination into the affairs of this Department covering the six year period prior to June 1, 1948.

This examination included:

1. The interrogation, under oath, of close to forty witnesses including all officials of the Department, the State Auditor, all employees of the Department having control over, or custody of,

State funds and/or properties within the jurisdiction of the Department, all employees otherwise classified who might have any knowledge of any wrong doing upon the part of any person or persons connected with the Department, contractors and/or their representatives who did business with the Department, and any persons, not connected with the Department, whom we were informed might be able to furnish pertinent information, bank officials, a former State Police Chief, and a candidate for high public office.

2. Under our direction we caused to be interrogated by members of the State Police, at their homes or offices, a number of other persons for any assistance which we felt they might give in aid to the investigation.

3. We also examined a variety of documents, including signed statements, books of account, business records, bank records, checks, etc. In this connection, the State Auditor and his staff also extensively examined records of the Adjutant General's Department and reported to us from time to time. We felt that we were handicapped in the matter of time by the refusal of Federal authorities to turn over to us the contents of a report made pursuant to an F.B.I. investigation commencing early in April of this year. However, it is apparently not the practice of the Federal authorities in question to cooperate to this extent. We wish to point out that charges made against the Adjutant General's Department were of a very general nature and that because of the progress of several political campaigns and a very apparent number of jealousies between personnel in the Department itself, a tremendous variety of rumors of wrong doing came to our attention. At the outset, almost all of the information passed on to us through witnesses consisted of hearsay testimony.

Our real problem was in separating true evidence from rumor and hearsay evidence.

We began at top levels and worked down through to the lowest levels in order that we might feel certain, in our own minds at least, that when we finished with the job we could determine either that there was no wrong doing of a criminal nature, or that if there was, we would know who was guilty and to what extent.

We would like to point out in passing that much confusion exists and has existed for the past six years at Camp Keyes because of the following facts:

1. Just before the war, the National Guard left and took most of its equipment with it.

2. A State Guard was organized for whose benefit the State acquired certain properties but also for whose benefit a tremendous amount of material came from Federal Authorities on loan to the State Guard.

3. When the war was over the Coast Guard and Navy, installed in certain armories during the war, departed these armories, taking some of their property with them and leaving other items to the State.

4. All of the above simply means that millions of dollars of Federal property has come into the State for the use of the National Guard and it is apparently very difficult in many cases to distinguish between what is Federal and what is State property.

5. In addition to the above, over a million dollars worth of properties of all sizes and descriptions belonging to the Federal Government were sent into Maine in connection with the fire disaster of last fall, a great deal of which was airborne. It is our understanding that these properties were divided into two classes:

- (a) Expendable
- (b) Unexpendable

The Federal Government retains title to the unexpendable properties.

Ownership Unsettled

As to the expendable properties, the State of Maine will undoubtedly receipt for and accept them. At the moment, due to the size of the accounting problem involved the matter of who owns what with regard to expendable properties is not yet settled. No blame is attached to anyone for this condition not only because of the tremendous amount of materials and supplies sent in, but especially because of the immediate necessity of getting the materials and supplies into the hands of persons trying to cope with the fires and to relieve distressed persons burned out. It is obvious under these circumstances that a tight inventory control was not possible. It seems to be conceded that no person is under suspicion for misappropriation of properties which came into Maine during the fire disaster. In any event, no evidence was presented to us implicating any one.

The conditions above related made our task difficult because large amounts of properties, both State and Federal, were necessarily exposed to the risks of misappropriations or mishandling by a large number of persons even including persons not connected with the Adjutant General's Department. It must be here said that our investigation did not relate to any Federal properties as it is our understanding that our jurisdiction is limited to State properties.

No Cash Missing

It was determined within a matter of days that no cash or funds for which the Adjutant General's Department was accountable were missing. Indeed, the Department handles a very small amount of cash because it enjoys very small revenues.

The problem was therefore narrowed down to physical, moveable properties acquired by the State for the use of this Department whether by purchase or otherwise and of course, we were not concerned with problems of mismanagement of properties or unauthorized use of properties not amounting to a criminal act. Our concern was the possible existence of larceny, embezzlement, or graft.

Findings

Based upon all of the evidence presented to us, from whatever source, and having probative value, we respectfully present the following findings:

1. The Adjutant General of the State of Maine has conducted his Department with complete honesty. In view of the fact that his Department was under investigation which has occasioned much public comment, we believe it only fair to General Carter to further state that the Maine National Guard ranks ninth among the States and that much credit is due him on this account. The only criticism that we might make of the Adjutant General is that because of conflicting personalities and petty jealousies existing within personnel under his command his efforts to "keep peace in the family" have resulted in a lenient attitude on his part where a rougher attitude might have earlier brought to light many of the things upon which we will later comment.

2. With one exception, so far as any evidence presented to us is concerned, no person or persons connected with the Adjutant General's Department are implicated in any wrong doing of a criminal nature.

3. So far as any evidence presented to us is concerned, no separate item of State properties of any substantial value has been stolen from the State.

4. One employee of the State has admitted the misappropriation of several items of second-hand State properties of the aggregate value of less than \$100. This employee has worked for the State for many years, has had control of a large amount of State properties, has had the opportunity to misappropriate additional items from time to time over a period of years under conditions making detection difficult. As we have before indicated, (and the condition has existed for a long period of years), the inventory controls in this Department are not sufficiently tight to make possible the immediate identification and location, as State property, of items of property in the possession of individuals apparently acquired for private use. The problem, especially with respect to used property, and odds and ends of new property, of finding out in the last detail what State properties are missing, who has them and whether or not they were criminally misappropriated is one which will take further investigation and a great deal more time to solve. Our recommendation as to the procedure

which should be adopted will appear later. From the evidence presented to us we are of the opinion that the State has not suffered any substantial losses, and if any losses from theft have been suffered by the State, they consist of losses resulting from a series of misappropriations extending over a period of years covering items such as lumber, cement, dirt, plumbing fixtures, etc.

Without question this employee on many occasions used State equipment such as trucks, and in particular a beach wagon, on personal business. On at least one occasion this use was authorized. During the period of the construction program there was a considerable amount of excavation work done. The gravel excavated was in itself worthless and for the most part dumped by the contractors doing the excavating. However, both State and Federal vehicles were used to haul some of this gravel to private residences to use as "fill."

5. There also exists the further possibility that a certain employee received substantial gratuities from one or more contractors engaged in the construction program at Camp Keyes during and following the war.

Employee Shot Self

The fact that an employee of the Department shot himself shortly after charges of irregularities were made against the Department naturally gave rise to suspicion of the possibility of wrong doing of great magnitude. We were ourselves mindful of this and for this reason as well as others we made our investigation as exhaustive as we possibly could. We do know that this employee was suffering from poor health, both mentally and physically long before the shooting occurred. In the nature of things as we found them, based upon the evidence presented to us, the extent of his wrong doing cannot be classified as "of great magnitude."

6. We are very definitely of the opinion that other agencies than the Grand Jury of Kennebec County can pursue the investigation where we leave off and solve whatever problems remain to be solved to the end that the taxpayers of Kennebec County will not have to be burdened with the heavy costs of a prolonged Grand Jury investigation. We feel that we have done our duty in undertaking an investigation of the entire department and in delineating the probable scope of possible irregularities.

Recommendations

We recommend that the State Property Officer of the National Guard undertake a complete inventory of State Property under his control and to the last detail, under the supervision of the Adjutant General, that the State Comptroller and the State Auditor assist in this undertaking in so far as their respective services can be of value, and that if and when it be discovered that any

State property of however small value is missing, the Chief of the State Police and the Sheriff's Department of Kennebec County be notified and that they offer the assistance of the State Police and the Sheriff's Department in the effort to locate such missing property and gather evidence to punish for misappropriations if any there be.

We further recommend that the State Police and Sheriff's Department take what evidence we have to offer them and investigate to determine whether or not gratuities or other unlawful benefits have been received by any person or persons not authorized by law so to receive them.

Considering all of the reliable evidence presented to us, we do not feel warranted in returning any indictments against any persons at this time, there not being sufficient evidence to justify an indictment for a felony. Prosecution for misdemeanor can proceed as in the ordinary case via the proper municipal court. If the continued investigation above recommended results in uncovering further misdemeanors or any wrong doing amounting to a felony, prosecution therefore can also be handled as in the ordinary case.

TWO VITAL PIECES OF LEGISLATION

The 80th Congress which adjourned just before the end of the fiscal year passed two pieces of legislation that are of the most vital concern to the National Guard of the country.

One of these laws authorized the drafting of young men between the ages of seventeen and twenty-five. The other provided retirement pay for officers of the National Guard and the Organized Reserve Corps.

Of these two measures, that dealing with the draft was the only one that had any immediate effect upon the military forces of the country. It was agreed and so published that young men within the age brackets mentioned who enlisted in the National Guard before the draft bill became law with the signature of the President would be exempt from service so long as they continued to perform faithfully their duties as National Guardsmen. The draft act became a law as of midnight 24 June 1948. From the time of the announcement of its passage to its becoming effective on the signature of the President, there was such a rush of recruits into the ranks of the National Guard of Maine and the nation as a whole that enlistments had to be stopped on orders from Washington because budgetary restrictions would not support such greatly increased numbers.

Exemptions from service under this law were essentially set forth in the following extract from a telegram from Washington:

Re exemptions under new draft law, honorable active duty for twelve months between 16 September 1940 and date of act or more than 90 days honorable active duty between 7 December 1941 and 2 September 1945, persons who on effective date of act were members of National Guard so long as they continue to be such members, persons under age of 18 years and 6 months enlisted in National Guard when Governor issues proclamation that strength cannot be maintained otherwise, are deferred from training and service under act. Copies of conference report on proposed act sent each Adjutant General. Effective date of act is 24 June 1948.

THE RETIREMENT LAW

The law providing retirement benefits for officers of the National Guard was a lengthy document. The provisions affecting reserve components of the Armed Forces are given below.

Title III of HR 2744 provides retirement pay for National Guard officers.

This article should be read by every member of the Maine National Guard. This bill which has now been enacted into law by the signature of President Truman is one that the National Guard Association has been working hard for the benefit of all members of the Guard. It demonstrates again the wisdom in joining such an organization for surely with the great benefits that will be derived from the new law the National Guard association deserves the support and the enrolled membership of every one eligible to join.

TITLE III

Retirement with pay of officers and enlisted personnel of the National Guard and Reserve Corps of the Army of the United States, the Reserve Components of the Air Force of the United States, the United States Naval and Marine Corps Reserve, and the United States Coast Guard Reserve.

SEC. 301. (a) The Secretary of the Army is authorized to establish the Army of the United States Retired List and the Secretary of the Air Force is authorized to establish the Air Force of the United States Retired List, to be published annually in the official Register of the service concerned, upon which respectively shall be placed the names of all commissioned officers and former commissioned officers of the Army of the United States or the Air Force of the United States, as the case may be, other than those of the Regular Army or the Regular Air Force heretofore or hereafter granted retirement pay under section 5 of the Act of April 3, 1939 (53 Stat. 557, as amended, 10 U.S.C. 456), section 1 of the Act of September 26, 1941 (55 Stat. 733, 10 U.S.C. 456a), and section 302 of this title, or any law hereafter enacted to provide retirement pay for commissioned officers other than those of the Regular Army or the Regular Air Force, and the names of all warrant officers and enlisted men of the Regular Army or the Regular Air Force heretofore or hereafter retired under any provision of law who, by reason of service in temporary commissioned grades in the Army of the United States or the Air Force of the United States, or in any of the respective components thereof, are entitled to be retired with commissioned rank or grade.

(b) The Secretary of the Navy is authorized to establish a United States Naval Reserve Retired List to include the names of all officers and enlisted personnel of the Naval and Marine Corps Reserve who are granted retired pay under the provisions of this title, the provisions of Public Law 305, Seventy-ninth Congress, or any Law hereafter enacted to provide retired pay for such officers and enlisted personnel.

SEC. 302 (a) Any person who, upon attaining or having attained the age of sixty years, has performed satisfactory Federal service as defined in this section in the status of a commissioned officer, warrant officer, flight officer, or enlisted person in the Army of the United States or the Air Force of the United States, including the respective reserve components thereof, and also including the federally recognized National Guard prior to 1933, the United States Navy including the reserve components thereof, the United States Marine Corps, including the reserve components thereof, or the United States Coast Guard, including the reserve components thereof, and has completed an aggregate of twenty or more years of such satisfactory service in any or all of the aforesaid services, shall, upon application therefor, be granted retired pay.

PROVIDED, That for the purposes of this section the last eight years of qualifying service for retirement under this title must have been service as a member of a reserve component except that any member of a reserve component of the Air Force of the United States shall be entitled to include service as a member of a reserve component of the Army of the United States performed on or prior to July 26, 1949:

PROVIDED FURTHER, That for the purposes of this subsection, simultaneous service as a member of a reserve component and as a member of the Regular Army, Navy, Air Force, or Marine Corps, shall not be deemed to be service in a reserve component:

PROVIDED FURTHER, That no person who was a member of a reserve component on or before August 15, 1945, shall be eligible for retirement benefits under this title unless he performed active Federal service during any portion of either of the two periods beginning April 6, 1917, and ending November 11, 1918, and beginning September 9, 1940, and ending December 31, 1946.

(b) Subsequent to the enactment of this Act, a year of satisfactory Federal service, for the purposes of this section only, shall consist of any year in which a person is credited with a minimum of fifty points, which points shall be credited on the following basis:

(1) One point for each day of active Federal service;

(2) One point for each drill or period of equivalent instruction, such drills and periods of equivalent instruction to be restricted to those prescribed and authorized by the Secretary of the respective service for the year concerned, and to conform to the requirements prescribed by other provisions of law;

(3) Fifteen points for membership in a reserve component for each year of Federal service other than active Federal service.

(c) Each year of service as a member of a reserve component prior to the enactment of this Act shall be deemed to be a year of satisfactory Federal service for the purposes of this section, subject to the provisions of subsection (e) of section 306 of this Act.

(d) Application for retirement with pay made pursuant to this section shall be submitted to the Secretary of the service in which the applicant last served or in serving at the time of such submission.

(e) Any person who, upon attaining the age of sixty years, has qualified for retirement with pay pursuant to this title, may, with his consent and by order of the cognizant Secretary, be retained on duty to perform Federal service. Any person so retained shall be credited with equivalent periods of Federal service for the performance of such duties.

SEC. 303. Any person granted retired pay pursuant to the provisions of this title shall receive such pay at an annual rate equal to:

2½ per centum of the active duty annual base and longevity pay which he would receive if serving at, the time granted such pay, on active duty in the highest grade, temporary or permanent, satisfactorily held by him during his entire period of service, multiplied by a number equal number of years and any fraction thereof (on the basis of three hundred and sixty days per year) which shall consist of the sum of the following:

(i) All periods of active Federal service;

(ii) One day for each point credited pursuant to sub paragraphs (2) and (3) of subsection (b) of Section 302 of this Act, but no more than sixty days shall be credited on this basis in any one year for the purposes of this section:

PROVIDED, That no person shall be entitled to receive such retired pay at an annual rate in excess of 75 per centum of said active duty pay: PROVIDED FURTHER, That for each year of Federal service, other than active Federal service, performed as a member of a reserve component prior to the date of enactment of this Act and credited in accordance with subsection (c) of section 302 of this title, such member shall be credited with fifty days for each of such years, for the purposes of this section.

SEC. 304. As soon as may be practicable after the effective date of this title, the Secretary of the Army, the Secretary of the Air Force, and the Secretary of the Navy shall, by regulations not inconsistent with this or any other Act, prescribe:

(a) Appropriate standards and qualifications for the retention or promotion of members of reserve components of the Army of the United States, the Air Force of the United States, and the United States Navy and the Marine Corps, respectively, and (b) appropriate and equitable procedures under which the compliance by each member of each such reserve component with such standards and qualifications shall be determined periodically. Whenever any member of any such reserve component thereafter shall fail to conform to the standards and qualifications shall be determined periodically. Whenever any member of any such reserve component thereafter shall fail to conform to the standards and qualifications so prescribed he shall be transferred to an inactive reserve status if qualified for such status, retired without pay if qualified for such retirement, or his appointment or enlistment shall be terminated. Such action shall effect a termination of such person's right to accrue retirement benefits under this title but shall not affect any rights which have accrued prior to the time that such action shall have been taken with respect to such person: PROVIDED FURTHER, That the Secretary of the Navy will respect to personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps, including the reserve components thereof, shall determine what has constituted, prior to the date of enactment of this title, satisfactory performance of Federal service other than active Federal service.

SEC. 305. The provisions of this title shall not be applicable to any officer or enlisted person of the Regular or reserve components of the Army, Navy, Air Force, or Marine Corps who, prior to or subsequent to the date of enactment of this title is entitled to receive, or is receiving under any other provision of law, retired pay for military or naval service, including retainer pay as a transferred member of the Fleet Reserve. No period of service otherwise creditable in determining the eligibility of any person to receive, or the amount of, any annuity, pension, or old-age benefit payable under any provision of law on account of civilian employment, in the Federal Government or otherwise, shall be excluded in such determination because such period of service may be included, in whole or in part in determining the eligibility of such person to receive, or the amount of, any retired pay payable under this title.

SEC. 306. For the purposes of this title —

(a) The term "Federal service" shall be deemed to include all active Federal service and all service in a reserve component other than active Federal service, or both, except as provided in (e) and (f) below.

(b) Satisfactory Federal service or Federal service satisfactorily performed, as used in this title in referring to Federal service herein mentioned, shall be deemed to mean that the person concerned shall have conformed to such standards and qualifications as may have been required of him.

(c) Service in a reserve component, as used in this title, shall consist of service in the following organizations, and shall be deemed to be Federal service for the purposes of this title —

- (1) the National Guard of the United States;
- (2) the National Guard while in the service of the United States;
- (3) the federally recognized National Guard prior to 1933;
- (4) a federally recognized status in the National Guard prior to 1933;
- (5) the Officers' Reserve Corps and the Enlisted Reserve Corps prior to the enactment of Public Law 460, Eightieth Congress, approved March 25, 1948;
- (6) the Organized Reserve Corps;
- (7) the Army of the United States without component;
- (8) the Naval Reserve and the Naval Reserve Force, excluding those members of the Fleet Reserve and the Fleet Naval Reserve transferred thereto after completion of sixteen or more years of active naval service;

(9) the Marine Corps Reserve and the Marine Corps Reserve Force, excluding those members of the Fleet Marine Corps Reserve transferred thereto after completion of sixteen or more years of active naval service;

(10) the Limited Service Marine Corps Reserve;

(11) the Naval Militia who have conformed to the standards prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy;

(12) the National Naval Volunteers;

(13) the Air National Guard;

(14) the Air Force Reserve (Officers or Enlisted sections);

(15) the Air Force of the United States without component; and

(16) the Coast Guard Reserve.

(d) The term "active Federal service" shall include all periods of annual training duty and all prescribed periods of attendance at such service schools as have been, or may be designated as such by the Secretary of the Army, the Secretary of the Navy, and the Secretary of the Air Force for their respective services, or by law, or any other period of time when ordered to active duty under competent Federal orders.

(e) With respect to personnel of the Army or the Air Force, service in the inactive National Guard or Air National Guard, in a nonfederally recognized status in the National Guard or Air National Guard, or inactive Reserve section of the Officers' Reserve Corps or an inactive officers' section of the Air Force Reserve shall not be deemed to be Federal service.

(f) Subject to the provisions of subsection (d) hereof, service on the Honorary Retired List of the Naval and Marine Corps Reserves shall not be deemed to be Federal Service.

SEC. 307. The Secretary of the Army with respect to personnel of the Army, the Secretary of the Navy with respect to personnel of the Navy and Marine Corps, and the Secretary of the Air Force with respect to personnel of the Air Force, are authorized to prescribe such rules, regulations, and procedures as they may deem necessary to effectuate the provisions of this title.

SEC. 308. Any person who has not attained the age of sixty years but is eligible in all other respects to receive retired pay under the provisions of this title may, at his own request, and by the direction of the Secretary of the cognizant service, be transferred to such inactive status list as has been, or may be established by law or regulation for the reserve components of the Army of the United States, Navy, Air Force of the United States, or Marine Corps. After the effective date of such transfer he shall not be required to participate in any training or other program prescribed for said reserve components, and he shall not be entitled to be credited with either additional active Federal service or additional Federal service in a reserve component other than active Federal service, or both for the performance of such duty.

SEC. 309. Service as a member of a reserve component shall be subject to the requirements of the military services and appropriations available therefor from time to time. No person shall be ordered to active Federal Service for the sole purpose of qualifying for retirement benefits under this title.

SEC. 310. No back pay or allowances for any period prior to the date of enactment thereof shall accrue to any person by reason of enactment of this title.

SEC. 311. The provisions of this title, except as may be necessary to adapt the same thereto shall apply to personnel of the Coast Guard Reserve in relationship to the Coast Guard Reserve in relationship to the Coast Guard in the same manner and to the same extent as they apply to personnel of the Naval and Marine Corps Reserve in relationship to the Navy: PROVIDED, That wherever authority is given to the Secretary of the Navy, similar authority shall be deemed to be given to the Secretary of the Treasury to be exercised with respect to the Coast Guard except at such time or times as the Coast Guard may be operating under the Secretary of the Navy.

SEC. 312. The provisions of this title shall become effective for each of the services concerned when directed by the cognizant Secretary, but not later than the first day of the seventh month following the date of enactment.

SEC. 313. There are hereby authorized to be appropriated such funds as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act.

THE MAINE NATIONAL GUARD

Although there were numerous losses in personnel during the past year, the Maine National Guard showed a steady increase.

Much of this increase was due to a nation-wide recruiting campaign. This was officially known as "Operation 88888" because that was the required number needed throughout the country to bring the National Guard as a whole to its authorized strength of approximately 200,000 officers and men. Maine's quota under the plan was 735, a number that was greatly exceeded. The campaign began on 16 September 1947 and continued until 16 November 1947.

The campaign was immensely successful so far as Maine was concerned. The actual number of men enlisted during the eight weeks was 1269 which was 172.65 per cent of the quota. In achieving this result, Maine stood fifth in the whole nation and was exceeded only by Wyoming, Oklahoma, Porto Rico and Tennessee in the order named. There were, of course, some losses in this campaign but the actual net gain was 1148 which was 155.65 per cent of the quota.

In accomplishing this very desirable result, unit commanders staged all kinds of recruiting activities. There were special window displays, rallies in the armories, ordnance demonstrations, exhibitions of equipment, newspaper advertisements and addresses before local service and other organizations.

Official returns from Washington for "Operation 88,888" as received by The Adjutant General of Maine were to the effect that Maine finished in fifth place in the country. The states that led her were Wyoming, Oklahoma, Puerto Rico, and Tennessee. Officially, from the figures compiled by The Adjutant General, Maine enlisted 1269 men. The quota assigned the State was 735 so that Maine secured 172.65 per cent of this quota.

The "Champ" received the grand prize of a four-day trip to Washington with attendance at the Army-Navy Football game, a luncheon given by the Secretary of the Army and other festivities. The first and second runners-up received handsome table radios and the third runner-up a fine piece of luggage.

Headquarters and Headquarters Co., 103d Infantry RCT because of their energetic efforts and carrying out of suggested promotional plans was adjudged the outstanding recruiting unit.

Another recruiting campaign, conducted by The Adjutant General's Department was staged in the spring of 1948. Prizes were in cash but the actual results were rather disappointing and the high goal set was far from reached. The National Guard organizations were divided into groups for enlistment purposes and the time of recruiting was split into periods. The name of the campaign was appropriately selected — "Dirigo." Prizes were awarded on a point basis.

1. Report to cover annual tour of duty at Dow Air Force Base, Bangor, Maine, from 31 August to 14 September 1947, incl.

Pursuant to General Order Number 30, AGO Maine, dated 25 August 1947, the 101st Fighter Group, Headquarters, departed Camp Keyes, Augusta, Maine, at 0915 hours, 31 August 1947, and arrived at Dow Air Force Base, Bangor, Maine, at 1245 hours, same date, to participate in fifteen (15) days annual field training.

Immediately upon arrival, an assembly of all units participating was held to include roll call, orientation, welcome by the Group CO, and assignment to tents and areas.

The following Units of this Group reported for duty:

Hq Det, 201st Air Svc Gp, Dow AF Base, Bangor, Maine

Training commenced on Monday, 1 September 1947. An elaborate basic training for those having no prior service was carried on through out the two weeks. This was carried on from 0800 to 1000 hours daily and included a total of 24 hours for the two weeks period.

The basic subjects included the following:

1. Articles of War.
2. Organization of the Army and National Guard.
3. Military discipline, customs and courtesies.
4. Military sanitation and sex hygiene (Including malaria control and personal adjustment)
5. First aid.
6. Close Order drill.
7. Assembly, adjustment and care of clothing and equipment.
8. Safeguarding Military information.
9. Interior guard instructions.
10. Marksmanship and familiarization of carbine.
11. Individual security, camouflage, and defense against air attacks, including night problems on this subject.
12. Use of protective equipment and defense against chemical attack.
13. Marches and bivouac.
14. Night operations to include convoy operations.
15. Elementary map and aerial photographic reading.

Instructions for those with prior service was carried on through on-the-job-training. The basics upon being relieved at 1000 hours were sent to their respective stations to participate in OJT with the Prior Service personnel.

On-the-job-training included the following:

1. Airplane and Engine mechanic training.
2. Airplane armorer work.
3. Automotive equipment and engine mechanic training.
4. Cooking.
5. Medical aid work.

6. Administrative, Group Headquarters (Including typing, filing, & message center operating.)
7. Photographic Lab work.
8. Radio Mechanic training.
9. Supply operations.
10. Weather observing and forecasting.
11. Intelligence work.
12. Operations and training section work.

The units were favored with excellent flying weather, and in spite of some delay in gasoline shipments, the flying program was pushed to the limit.

THE FOREST FIRE DISASTER

The worst disaster in the history of Maine occurred during the fall of 1947. Forest fires were rampant in most sections of the State. Property loss was stupendous and has been estimated as from \$3,000,000 to \$15,000,000.

Maine's woodland and forests were tinder dry. So rapidly did the flames spread that in some sections whole communities were wiped out. Paradoxical as it may seem the most devastating of the fires were in those sections well removed from what are generally regarded as forest lands. From the Kennebunks on the west to Jonesport on the east there were few sections of the coastal area that were not affected. Inland, portions of Oxford, Kennebec, and Sagadahoc counties were burned over. The loss sustained in the Brownfield area was particularly tragic.

The summer of 1947 was unprecedentedly dry. A few fires such as are seasonally prevalent were reported but because of the condition of the woods, these spread with great rapidity. Started from a carelessly thrown cigarette butt, ill advised burning of slash and other careless acts, and, in some cases, deliberately set by a pyromaniac, these at first incipient fires soon became conflagrations. Fanned by high winds, the flames jumped roads and devastated settlements. Greatest of all the losses were those in York County and in Bar Harbor. Hundreds of moderately priced summer homes as well as the palatial summer residences of millionaires were food for the flames.

So widely scattered were the fires and so rapidly did they spread that local officials and personnel of the Forestry Department were unable to cope with the situation. The National Guard of Maine was summoned into service. Help came from other states and the National Government; the Red Cross appeared on the scene and did most commendable work in caring for refugees from the stricken areas. So prevalent and so sudden in their origin were the fires that the populace of the State were on the verge of hysteria.

The Maine Guardsmen were not all called out at the start of the emergency. The first fire to attain conflagration proportions was in York County and the Maine National Guard units in York and Cumberland Counties were the first to be summoned. Then as fires and more fires developed, other units were called. The need of man power not only for fighting the flames but also for guarding property, handling traffic and transporting refugees was so pressing that it became necessary to mobilize other units. The service performed by National Guardsmen extended from 23 October to 9 November. The greatest number of Guardsmen on duty at any one time was 85 officers and 1146 men. Some units were not called at all but they were on a "stand-by" basis and would have been available had the situation needed more men.

On the rolls of the various National Guard units were many men who had seen service in both World War I and World War II. But there were hundreds of others who had never before been in military service. All of them, veterans and non-veterans alike performed heroically.

Fire-fighting equipment in huge quantities poured into the State from the War Assets Administration. This was distributed to needed localities by trucks of the National Guard. Signal communication systems were set up, road patrols established, guards posted and a thousand and one other duties were performed by the Maine Guardsmen. Co-operation between the military and civilian forces was with a few rare exceptions most comprehensive and commendable.

At the time the troops were called to active duty, the Maine National Guard was engaged in a big recruiting drive. The fires helped swell the ranks of the guardsmen but active recruiting was suspended so that every necessary step might be taken to stem the progress of the fires and the alleviation of the suffering of refugees.

While the loss from the conflagration mounted into the millions of dollars, the actual cost to the State, so far as the services of the Guardsmen were concerned was very moderate. Payroll expenditures amounted to \$47,055.29 while miscellaneous expenses which included feeding the troops were \$17,551.35. Other minor accounts were approximately \$1000 so that the estimated total expenses borne by the military establishment of the State was \$65,606.64. The value of actual services performed however could never be estimated in dollars and cents.

THE GRUELLING BATTLE IN WESTERN MAINE

Informative and dramatic is the account of the work done by the National Guardsmen of western Maine as detailed by Major Nunzi Casavola of Portland, S-a of the 103rd Infantry Combat Team and special writer for the Portland Sunday Telegram. The following is the over-all picture as painted by him:

The Guardsmen, initially forced to fight fires until civilian agencies could be mustered to meet the disaster, came into their own as a peace-time emergency force, moving into the fire zone as the only organized group suitably equipped for centralized control along the far-flung fire front during its first two days.

On active emergency duty for ten days, the First Battalion of the 103rd Infantry Combat Team, its Headquarters and Service Companies, Anti-Tank Company, and Company H of the Second Battalion, mustered 42 officers and 702 men for fire duty.

Contributing its communications, personnel and equipment to fire departments in the devastated zone, the Guard was instrumental in setting up the first communications net covering the area, while its SCR-300's and their operators provided the only direct communication between fire fighters on the ground and fire control headquarters until Regular Army and Navy, and amateur civilian agencies could muster their communications equipment and relieve the Guardsmen for their normal duties of patrolling, traffic direction and riot control.

Commanded by Colonel Lester E. Brown, also commander of the regiment during part of its war-time career in the Pacific, the regiment received warm commendation from chiefs of widely separated disaster areas in two counties. Fire Chief Clifford Mailing of Kennebunkport, upon relief of the Headquarters Company detachment from his area, said: "were it not for the 24 hour duty of these Guardsmen, and the unfailing communications net they threw around this township by which we were able to control every new outbreak of fire, the forest fires in the township of Kennebunkport would have been completely out of control and swept it clean."

The town of Cape Porpoise and the summer settlement of Goose Rocks Beach suffered about 70% destruction in Chief Mailing's area, and Headquarters Company personnel, assigned to the area, were mustered on less than an hour's notice to go to his aid.

Working with Mailing throughout the Kennebunkport disaster were Warrant Officer, Jg Russell L. Foss and T/Sgt Norman E. Linnel with a six man section that, for the first 36 hours, worked without relief.

The mill town of Biddeford, threatened four different times by new outbreaks of forest fires, was constantly patrolled by Headquarters Company, First Battalion, and Company A. The Battalion, commanded by Major Edward I. Chappell of Biddeford, encompassed the

entire York County Fire zone, and controlled areas reaching from the coast at Fortune's Rock, where the settlement was wiped out, to the northern extremity of the county, in Limerick and Newfield.

The First Battalion was mobilized at 1730, 21 October 47, after Major Chappell had conferred with Mayor Louis B. Lausier, Biddeford, and Mayor Myron Savage, Saco, and within 45 minutes from the time of mobilization, components of the First Battalion were combatting severe fires raging on the Guinea Road, Oak Ridge and Proctor Roads. Of a total strength of 61 enlisted men, 52 men and 5 officers of Headquarters Company answered the first mobilization call. During the next 32 hours, during which the units went without relief or sleep, the Battalion grew to full actual strength, and was instrumental in swinging the fires away from the heavily populated mill town.

When the full force of the fire had abated, and the threat removed from Biddeford, units of the Battalion were removed from the actual fire fighting phase to assume the vital task of coordination of control, maintenance and communications.

Deserving of special commendation during this period was the Medical Detachment and evacuation section under Sgt. Richard Doe of Old Orchard Beach, whose hastily improvised, but efficient aid station at the junction of Pool Road and Guinea Road treated all, civilians and guardsmen alike, for injuries, burns, and eye irritations, and evacuated the more seriously injured.

Of vital aid to stricken families in the fire zone was Service Company of Portland, commanded by 1st Lt. Francis E. Newbegin. Trucks, 2½ ton, some of them Maine National Guard vehicles, and others contributed by the 43rd Division which sent them from Connecticut, streamed continually along the roads, evacuating personnel and furniture from the threatened homes, moving them to places of safety. During the height of the disaster, National Guardsmen and vehicles not occupied in actual fire fighting, were unsung heroes of the mass evacuation of the Fortune's Rock area, where dozens of families were cut off. Sections of the First Battalion, led by Lieutenant Lawrence Coburn and Laurence Dyer, moved in and out of the isolated zone with jeeps and 2½ ton trucks until every family had been evacuated.

At least four cases of individual heroism were eye-witnessed by the writer in the case of Lt. Norman O. Racine of Company A of Biddeford. Lt. Racine, in a radio-equipped ¼ ton, four different times risked his own life in order to move behind a wall of flames in Dayton to remove cut-off families to a place of safety when no other escape was possible for them.

The L-5 liaison plane, piloted by 1st Lt. Robert W. Britt and equipped with an SCR 300 also contributed invaluable service during the crisis, touring the zone daily and reporting the moving front of the fire. Britt had received authorization to fly the plane only at the last moment, and considerable red tape was cut in order to make the plane available for fire duty.

Other individuals reported by commanding officers as having performed exceptional service during the disaster included 1st Lt. Edward Simonds, S/Sgt Arthur Linnell, S/Sgt Merle Bancroft, S/Sgt Joseph LaBrecque, Sgt. Carleton A. Landry, 1st Sgt. John Casavola, S/Sgt. Frederick White.

Complete and accurate intelligence reports of the progress of the fire, from one end of the county to the other, were turned in by Sgt. Ralph Pierce of Headquarters Company, whose complete coverage of the area contributed greatly to the fire fighting efforts, in that he maintained constant touch with the fast-moving front, and by radio assisted in organizing fire defense at strategic points.

Although all units of the 103rd Infantry were still in the midst of organization, with few of the specialized sections broken down, commanding officers of all units displayed remarkable initiative in setting up communications, intelligence and transportation sections on the spur of the moment. Captain James E. Knudsen, regimental communications officer, 1st Lt. William G. Bell, assistant communications officer, and Lt. Laurence Dyer, First Battalion communications officer, had a full, war-time complement of communications equipment and personnel in action in less than 12 hours after the first call to duty.

Captain Earl F. Bagley, Headquarters Company commander, whose unit patrolled and fought fires in the devastated Brownfield area, was commended by Fire Control leader, Jack Mansur of Fryeburg who directly attributed the saving of Fryeburg to the unceasing efforts of Captain Bagley and his unit.

Immediate arrivals at the critical scenes of disaster by Guardsmen cut to a minimum looting, arson, potential riots and disastrous traffic jams along the main exits from the fire zones.

Of special comment is the fact that only four official cases of injury among Guardsmen were reported, indicating an exceptional quality of leadership and control under extremely hazardous conditions.

Units engaged in fighting and controlling the York County fires included: Regimental Headquarters Company, commanded by Captain Earl F. Bagley; Service Company, commanded by 1st Lt. Francis N. Newbegin; Anti-Tank Company, commanded by 1st Lt. William Callahan; Company A, commanded by 1st Lt. Roland A. Hubert; Company B, commanded by Captain Blaine E. Davis; Company C, commanded by 1st Lt. George I. Simpson; Company D, commanded by 1st Lt. Richard M. North; Company H., commanded by Captain Edward P. Phillips, and Headquarters Company, First Battalion, commanded by 1st Lt. J. C. Barrett.

Just as the State of Maine had never before been faced with such a series of disastrous fires, so the National Guard of the State, except when actually engaged in war, had never before been called upon for such heavy, exacting and wearing-down duty.

The impression that all the Maine National Guard units made on the populace was in every case very superior. Reports that have been received at The Adjutant General's Department came from all sources: from town officials, police officials, chiefs of fire departments, industrialists, lumber operators — every profession and every business walk in life. Without a single unfavorable criticism, these reports praised the officers and men of the Maine National Guard in the highest possible terms. The tough assignment they fulfilled as actual fighters of the fires; the truly marvelous system of communications set up, the splendid patrol duty, the heroic aid given in the evacuation of trapped families all have come in for their share of commendation. The deportment of the men themselves was on a par with the high-grade duty performed. In the great majority of cases, local officials and others had never before required the services of the National Guard. Now that they have seen the Guard, have watched it operate, have learned its efficiency, they are ready to declare with unanimity that the Maine Guardsmen, both ground and air, have lived up to their State motto of "I Lead."

THE FIGHT IN EASTERN MAINE

While the force used was not great and did not exceed 150 officers and men, the fight against the fires and the duties performed by the Maine Guardsmen in eastern Maine were just as rugged and efficient as in other parts of the State. The following is a general report of these activities:

Just a handful of men — less than 250, in fact — but every one of them a member of the Maine National Guard, did Horatian duty at the recent destructive fire which virtually wiped out the town of Bar Harbor and did untold damage to other communities on Mt. Desert Island, Maine.

These National Guardsmen, never more than 19 officers and 222 enlisted men in any one day, were members of the anti-aircraft artillery units of the Guard. They consisted of Hq. & Hq. Btry., Btry. A, and Btry. C, 314th AAA Bn AW(SM). Attached to them was Btry. B of the 703rd AAA Bn. Btry. C, whose home station is Calais, was called for other duty, and Btry. D was too far away from the scene of action for immediate service, but was held in reserve should its presence be required in the thickly wooded areas near its home station.

The story of the terrific conflagration on Mount Desert Island, the destruction of Bar Harbor and other towns and villages in the neighborhood, the evacuation of residents by water when they were hemmed in by flames and retreat was cut off, has been told in newspapers from coast to coast.

But the story of the fewer than 250 Guardsmen is one that has not been told.

Under the leadership of Major Paul L. Pooler of Brewer, Maine, the commanding officer of the 314th AAA Bn, these citizen-soldiers did all that mere man could be expected to do. And they did more. Some of them, due to the 17-year-old enlistments, might be regarded as boys, but they took their places beside the older men and performed every task assigned to them.

There were hundreds of civilians engaged in the actual fighting of the forest fires. The small force of Guardsmen did, at first, however, engage in some forest fire fighting. This was at the beginning of the ten-day tour of duty. As homes were evacuated, household goods were piled up in the street and terror hit the townspeople, the Guardsmen were given duties more in keeping with their training: the protection of property and lives.

While the danger of looting was uppermost in the minds of all, the fact that thousands of sight-seers might descend upon the scene augmented the difficulties that town, State and military officials were forced to combat. Suffice it to say that no person not entitled to be there was permitted to go on Mount Desert Island. By the excellent manner in which guards were posted, patrols organized and traffic handled, Major Pooler and his men won the unstinted praise of everyone.

Btry. C was called for duty in the vicinity of Machias where a very dangerous rolling forest fire was in progress. The members of the battery not only fought fires, but evacuated citizens, manned fire trucks and did admirable patrol duty.

So efficiently did Major Pooler and his officers and men do their work that, while martial law cannot exist in Maine, the military was asked in most cases to take over the control of the situation. All during the critical hours, Maine National Guardsmen, State Police and civilian officials worked in absolute harmony.

1. In accordance with Memo #118, AGO Maine, dated 31 October 1947, the following pertinent facts regarding the duty performed by this unit during the Fire Emergency are submitted:
 - a. Unit designation, Hq & Hq Company 103d Infantry, RCT MeNG
 - b. Located at Portland, Maine
 - c. This company performed duty in the Fryeburg, Hiram, Denmark, and Brownfield areas.

Detachments were assigned to the Service Company with duty at Portland, Maine, and the Biddeford and Kennebunkport areas, and the Communication Section, with Lt. Bell as Officer in Charge, was attached to Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion for duty in the Biddeford and Kennebunkport areas.

Regimental Headquarters was established in the Milk Street Armory, Portland, with S-2 covering the entire western Maine area by vehicle.

The Aircraft Section was attached to the 1st Battalion Headquarters and operated a National Guard Type L-5 airplane over the entire western Maine Fire area for the purpose of spotting outbreaks of the fire and as a means of transporting the S-1, S-2, S-3, and S-4 to the various fire fronts.

- d. A total of ten (10) officers and ninety-eight (98) enlisted men reported for duty.
- e. Troops in the Fryeburg-Brownfield area were furnished mess by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Fryeburg American Legion Post. As this unit functioned in reliefs, meals were obtainable at any hour day or night. The mess was superior.
- f. Excellent quarters were furnished in the gymnasium of the Fryeburg Academy. Cots and mattresses being furnished by the owners of summer camps in the Fryeburg area.
- g. A dispensary was organized by Capt. John T. Konecki and five enlisted men of the 703d AAA Group from South Portland in the basement of the Academy Gymnasium, where all personnel requiring medical aid were treated. The health of the troops was excellent, with the exception of five enlisted men who were evacuated by reason of illnesses.
- h. No accidents either vehicular or to individuals occurred.
- i. No individual lives were lost or saved nor was it necessary to render any First Aid.
- j. The duty performed by the Detachments is incorporated in the reports of the units they performed duty with. The Communication Section was used to supplement the communication sections of the First Battalion line companies, and in correlating radio communications.

The main body of Headquarters Company left the Milk Street Armory at 1730 hours, 24 October 1947 by motor transportation and upon arrival at Fryeburg, had Mess, were quartered and were actually engaged in fire fighting by 2200 hours, 24 October 1947.

This unit was organized in three reliefs and performed fire fighting and fire patrol duty from 2200 hours 24 October 1947 until 0600 hours 27 October 1947, at which time they operated as road guards and road blocks under the direction of 1st Lt. Edward F. Simonds.

Captain James F. Knudsen, Communications Officer, oriented sufficient enlisted men in the operation of the Walkie-Talkie SCR 300 Radio so that an efficient radio net was in operation during the entire tour of duty at Fryeburg. One radio being located on a high elevation whereby using the method of relaying messages, contact could be had with Denmark, Maine, a distance of over twelve miles.

All members of this unit performed duty to an excellent degree regardless of the fact that a large percentage of them were in their "teens" and had never been in a wooded area in the night-time, and although on occasions they did come face to face with black bear and deer, not once did they fail in their duties.

The Selectmen's office, the Fire Department, and the various civic organizations were exceptionally well organized and worked in complete harmony and accord with this unit, messing facilities and quarters being completely arranged prior to the arrival of the troops. The assignment of local townsmen fully acquainted with the fire area to each fire fighting patrol, furnished by this unit, helped immensely.

There were no outstanding individuals during this tour of duty, but all performed admirably to a degree commensurate with their grade and deserve a "Well Done."

At one time the company was called to actually take part in the fire fighting. Our radio equipment and patrols helped the local authorities in controlling all fire fighting units both civilian and military in the area.
 1. This unit was commended by Dr. Richard H. Wallace, Hollis Center, Maine, the local coordinator in this area for the willing and helpful service rendered his office by the men of this company. The selectmen of Hollis Center also at a meeting expressed their appreciation to me for the work done by this company. Mr. Cecil Clark of Clark Mills voiced the opinion that one National Guardsman was worth fifty of any other group due to our organization, and he also expressed admiration for the work there. The company has many young members who have never been in the Army before and they carried out every duty and mission assigned to them as though they were veterans. Because of their work and that of the veterans, the unit was regarded as a well trained unit which, of course, at the present time it isn't. The company served in this area for six days from October 26 to October 31, 1947. The local authorities in this area showed every consideration to this company in quartering and feeding the troops.

I. The following information is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947:

1. This unit was mobilized 31 October 47 at 1730 by order of Major Edward I. Chappell, Commanding Officer of the First Battalion, 103d Infantry RCT, after conference with Mayor Louis B. Lausier, Biddeford, and May or Myron Savage, Saco, Maine. Within 45 minutes of the time of mobilization, components of this unit were in the field, combatting the severe fires raging on the Guinea Road, Oak Ridge, and the Proctor Road. Of a total strength of 61 enlisted men and 6 officers, 52 men and five officers answered our first mobilization call. For over 32 hours, without relief or sleep, these men fought the flames bearing down on the populated sections of this area. Many of the key personnel of this company were on duty over 48 hours without relief, i.e., the communications and transport sections. In this regard, these specialists deserve extra commendation, as they transported men to the active areas within 10 minutes of the time the men reported to the armory, and set up an efficient radio communications net which resulted in the much-needed coordination of the fire-fighting units.
2. Hq. Co., and Co. A bore the brunt of the initial contact with the flames. These units were the first troops to enter the area, and were not relieved until Friday, as other First Battalion units were called to duty, when some rest was afforded the men of Hq. Co., and Co. A.
3. Working in close coordination with the fire-fighting units of all surrounding communities of the fire area, the American Legion and the American Red Cross had set up stations and were taking care of evacuees, belongings, etc. Deserving of special commendation in this place is the Medical Detachment and Evacuation Section under the direction of T/4 Richard Doe of Old Orchard Beach, whose hastily improvised first aid station established at the junction of Pool Road and Guinea Road treated all for injuries, burns, eye irritations, etc.
4. With a raging fire driven by a 30 MPH wind from the northwest approaching and crossing Newtown Road approximately two miles east of the Guinea Road and West Street Junction, elements of this unit, through close coordination of all sections, split forces and by-passed the fire area by going through the Fortunes Rocks area, succeeded in getting evacuation equipment into the threatened section at Newtown to remove evacuees, with an utter disregard for their own personal safety. This hazardous mission was accomplished under the direction of Lt. Lawrence Dyer and Lt. Lawrence Coburn, Communications Officer.

At this point, special commendation must be afforded the assistant communications chief, Sgt. Herman Richardson, who, acting in the absence of our regular communications chief, S/Sgt. Frederick White, personally supervised the establishment of radio communications between elements of this unit and the civilian fire-fighting departments. Similarly, Sgt. William C. McIntyre, motor transport non-com, instituted and maintained transportation for troops and evacuees for the fire areas, remaining on duty for nearly 48 hours.

Upon return to the armory, the tremendous task of coordinating the efforts of both civilian and National Guard units into one concerted organization was begun by the plans and operations section of the battalion headquarters. This function was superbly accomplished by the S-3 officer, Lt. Francis Nason, and his assistant, Sgt. Carleton Landry. Under supervision was the entire York County area, with fires raging in every quarter, frantic appeals for assistance and protection from citizens from Newfield to Kennebunkport and Biddeford, reports of looting, arson, fires, etc., each of which were either investigated by this department or referred to the proper civilian authorities. In consideration of the above, and the wide variety of assignments, the S-3 section of the First Battalion is to be highly commended for a most difficult task splendidly achieved.

In the absence of our regular battalion executive officer, Capt. Walter Alexander, this position was filled by Major Robert Jensen, who also acted as Bn. S-4 or Supply Officer. A most difficult problem confronted us in feeding of troops both in the field and at the armory. At one time more than 500 men were fed each meal, more than half of which was fed in the field by mobile kitchens. Aably supervising the actual preparation of mess and the feeding of troops was S/Sgt. Joseph Labrecque of Old Orchard Beach, Maine. Peculiarly enough, griping about the chow, usually a bone of contention among military personnel was noticeably absent.

On the evening of 23 October 47, all Officers and Enlisted Men of Company B were notified to report immediately to the Milk Street Armory in Portland for duty with the National Guard in helping to combat the forest fires which were ravaging the state woodlands.

Four officers and thirty eight enlisted men were mobilized at 2213 and after a briefing by Captain Blaine E. Davis, departed for Kennebunkport on orders from First Battalion Commander. The company arrived at 2330 on that date in Kennebunkport and were immediately quartered in the Olympian Club, relieving Company C, 103d Infantry. Six two-man guard posts were established throughout the Cape Porpoise, Kennebunkport and Goose Rock areas, which were in the middle of the fire danger areas. Constant contact was maintained by radio jeep patrols with the guards, many of whom had to stand their posts wearing gas masks due to the intense smoke blanketing the entire area. The radio network was controlled by a base set installed in the Kennebunkport Central Fire Station. Messing arrangements were made with the local Red Cross and other civilian organizations set up for forest fire workers and victims. At the time fires were raging out of control in the Goose Rock, Biddeford, Cape Porpoise and Kennebunkport areas. Regular contact was maintained with Battalion Headquarters in Saco, and immediate liaison was established with civilian fire authorities as to any further help Company B might render.

At 0830 24 October orders were received for departure to Sanford and arrived at that point at 1030. Upon arrival the Battalion Commander issued new orders for departure to Kennebunk after breakfast, which was served to the company in the Sanford Elks Club. Upon arrival in Kennebunk arrangements were made to quarter the company in the Kennebunk High School. Messing facilities were also taken care of through local civilian groups at the high school. Contact was immediately made with fire fighting authorities in charge at the Kennebunk fire station, from where all fire fighting operations were directed. The civilian director asked for and received immediately radio patrols in jeeps to maintain a constant roving tour of the burning areas and report all changes and requirements of crews of workers. Nine guard outposts were established to maintain and control direction of traffic and to prevent the entry of unlawful vehicles into the fire zone. Guard posts and radio patrols were in operation twenty-four hours daily. One officer maintained constant control of guards and radio jeeps by touring the area constantly in a jeep with radio and fire fighting equipment. The officer assisted in the investigation of a report of the looting of three hundred bags of potatoes from a burned out farmhouse — less than one hour after receiving the report a truck driver was taken into custody by Lt. L. F. Moore and Staff Sergeant Samuel Romano. The truck and driver were found under suspicious circumstances in the fire zone with a truck load of potatoes and unable to give a suitable explanation. He was turned over to State Police after his apprehension. Exceptionally meritorious performance of duty was displayed by many other members of the company in stopping motor vehicles and persons wanted for questioning by local civil authorities. One highly pleasing note was the extremely high morale and cheerfulness of the enlisted men during the entire tour of duty. A cadre of non coms most of whom were combat veterans helped smooth over the little difficulties of army life for the younger men.

On 25 October the entire company moved out by truck at 0345 for Saco. During the trip it was necessary to go through a State Police road block and travel through dense smoke for ten miles to reach Saco. Speed maintained during the trip was approximately one mile per hour. On arrival at Saco the company was immediately committed to aid in the fighting of the fire along Pool road in Biddeford which was threatening to engulf the entire city. Armed with brooms, shovels, hoses and other fire fighting equipment the men moved into the fire and stayed on the job assisting the fire apparatus and firemen until the danger was over. The

company was recalled to the Armory after ten hours of battling the blaze. The company moved out again for Kennebunk, reestablishing headquarters at the Kennebunk High School. There the personnel were given six uninterrupted hours of sleep, the first that they had in more than forty-eight hours.

At 1700 26 October, nine guard posts and the radio jeep patrols were reestablished and kept in operation continuously until 1515 on the 29th of October. At that time the company entrucked for North Berwick, arriving at 1600 hours, where orders were received for an immediate return to the Saco Armory. The company arrived in Saco at 1730 hours. After a night's rest in the Armory, Company B was ordered to return to the Milk Street Armory in Portland to be demobilized as the emergency in the southwestern Maine area was declared to be over. At 2200 hours on October 31, Company B was demobilized with a small group of men and one officer remaining on duty one extra day to check in equipment and bring records up to date.

It is to be noted here that throughout the entire tour of duty of Company B, all civilian police and fire officials with whom the Company had been in contact highly commended the unit for work and the intelligent manner in which its personnel performed their duties.

- I. The following information is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947.
- II. As Company "C" actually participated in two separate operations under different town officials and fire chiefs, this report will be divided and listed as "Emergency Operations One and Two."

EMERGENCY OPERATION NO. ONE

1. Upon request of the Board of Selectmen, Kennebunkport, Company "C" 103rd Inf, was alerted VOCO 1st Bn., 0100 hours 22 Oct 47. Two Officers, 73 Enlisted Men (9 attached from Hq. 1st Bn), left Sanford by motor convoy, 22 miles, arriving Kennebunkport 0230 hours. Relieved Company "A" and assumed operational duties.
 - a. Established radio communications between fire station at Kennebunkport and fire areas. This was made possible by two mobile radio sets in Jeeps and a permanent set at the fire station. The Jeeps patrolled the fire fronts reporting the progress, direction and relaying messages for the firemen. All assistance possible was given to the officers in charge of the fire fighting.
 - b. Road blocks were set up over an area of twenty miles in the towns of Kennebunkport, Kennebunk, North Kennebunkport, Goose Neck Rocks and Biddeford. These were to re-route any traffic not concerned with fire fighting. Also checking license numbers for the State Police.
 - c. One detail of six men under the supervision of a Sgt relieved a detachment of Coast Guardsmen who had been fighting fire for several hours. This detail manned the hose lines in an excellent manner.
 - d. Two squads of EM with shovels patrolled the firelines thru the woods where it was impossible for vehicles to go.
 - e. For the first six hours every member of the Company was occupied being on these details mentioned above. As soon as there were voluntary firemen enough the men were relieved and the supply and mess sections were set up. The supply section thru the cooperation of the local Red Cross procured mattresses which were placed in the Auditorium of the Olympian Club, where the headquarters were set. Arrangements were made for two hot meals per day for the men at Jones's Diner at Kennebunk, temporarily.
 - f. The Company was divided into two reliefs, six hours on and six off.
 - g. Company "C" was relieved by Company "B" at 0200 hours 23 Oct and returned to Sanford, ending Emergency Operation No. One.

EMERGENCY OPERATION NO. TWO

1. Upon request of the Board of Selectmen, Sanford, thru CO, 1st Bn., Company "C" returned to Sanford, 23 Oct 1947 at 0320 hours by motor convoy. Headquarters established in the Company Armory, 69 Enlisted Men, 2 Officers, Two Jeeps, Two 2 and one-half ton trucks.
 - a. Cots and mattresses were drawn from the Sanford Lodge of Elks, and placed in the Auditorium of the Sanford Town Hall for sleeping quarters by the supply section.
 - b. Temporary Mess arrangements were made with the Elks, who were operating a twenty-four hour dining hall service.

- c. CO, contacted Sanford Fire Chief and explained our system of operation at Kennebunkport, which he requested to be set up at once. The areas, however, were extended and were to include the towns of Sanford, Springvale, Shapleigh, North Shapleigh, Alfred, Waterboro and the North boundary of Kennebunk.
- d. Two additional Jeeps were added, donated by local civilians to aid in patrolling. These were used as soon as two radios arrived from Hq, 1st Bn., and installed in the Jeeps, increasing the Radio Patrols to four in order to cover the extensive fire areas.
- e. Road blocks were again set up at vital points. Patrols against looters in the burning areas established and fire guards against new fires were located upon surrounding hills.
- f. Three EM were placed in sick quarters with colds.
- g. Three EM were placed in sick quarters from a shaken condition when a truck in which they were riding left the road.
- h. Several humane acts were performed by members of the Company, such as, shooting dogs and pigs which had been burned.
- i. An evacuation detail was posted and they evacuated several families from the fire areas.
- j. One EM who went AWOL 22 Oct. was taken into custody and held in confinement.
2. Emergency Operation No. Two ended 31 Oct 1947 when the local Fire Chiefs considered the situation under control. A cleanup detail of seven men was kept on duty one extra day.
3. Letters of appreciation has been received by this Headquarters from all town officials in which this Company had operated.

COMPANY "D"
103RD INFANTRY
WESTBROOK, MAINE

- I. The following information is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947.
1. Company "D" 103rd Inf., received the call to muster at approximately 1700 hours 23 Oct 1947.

The Company assembled at 1900 hours and 68 men were moved out with only late arrivals to follow. Upon arrival at the Saco Armory 20 men were immediately assigned as intersection and traffic control guards, and the remainder of the company moved into the Biddeford Pool area.

During the night Company "D" fought fires that sprang up due to the strong wind, and as a direct result saved two homes. One particular section had to handle over 2000 feet of fire hose in among deep gullies to subdue the fire. Men were posted as traffic guards and as guards for fire hose where it crossed the road. Roving patrols were maintained and in one instance took over another patrol's territory when they ran out of gas. Both territories were patrolled continuously. The Company was relieved in mid morning 24 Oct and returned to the Saco Armory where late arrivals joined the company.

At 1800 hours the Company was alerted, and then orders were changed as Company "A" had put in an emergency call for help. Company "D" was rushed to the Goodwin's Mills area to give Company "A" additional help. Close in fire fighting and extensive back firing was carried on all night in this area by Company "D", and from this a house was saved by a great deal of hard work. Also Company "D" materially helped prevent the fire from jumping a road, as it was out of control and being carried along by a strong wind. The men moved along the road backfiring and bringing the fire under control by a magnificent display of devotion to duty and extreme hard work.

The Company was recalled at 0530 hours to stand by as the outskirts of Biddeford were threatened and men were needed. The wind died down and the company was allowed to rest.

At 1800 hours on 25 Oct the Company was moved to positions along the Biddeford Pool road. The entire area was in a turmoil and Company "D" immediately set up traffic control guards and distributed men along the fire fighting front. They fought the fire close in and aided in saving several homes and in preventing the fire from crossing the road. Roving patrols were in close contact with headquarters and the fire areas. The patrols also spotted several fires and saved several homes by quick action. Twice during the night the traffic control guards were nearly run down and escaped serious injury only by jumping out of the way. The cars were travelling at a high rate of speed and made no attempt to slow down at the guard's signals.

At 1000 hours the Company returned to the Armory and was allowed to rest the rest of the day and 27 Oct under alert.

At 1700 hours 28 Oct, approximately two thirds of the Company were ordered to the Limerick, Waterboro and Newfield areas to set up a command post and establish road blocks and fire patrols. There were not enough men for relieving those on duty, so they stayed at their posts 24 hours a day, watching in shifts. In one case the men had to sleep in a ditch when it was their turn to rest.

The remainder of the Company was ordered to North Berwick to establish a command post and also maintained road blocks and fire patrols.

The following day the men in the North Berwick area were ordered to join the remainder of the company at Limerick. This was done and the company was able to operate efficiently.

The next day, 30 Oct the Company was ordered back to the Saco Armory and the company was ordered to remain overnight and the payroll was made up during this time. On 31 Oct the entire Company returned to the home Armory in Westbrook and was disbanded.

COMPANY "H"
103RD INFANTRY

I. The following information is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947.

a. Company "H" 103rd Inf Regt., located at Norway, Maine, was called by request of the Selectmen of the town of Norway on 23 Oct 47 at 1845 hours. Fifty-four men and three officers were furnished.

b. Messing:

Breakfast was served and prepared by Mess section in the Armory every morning. Dinner and supper were eaten in a local restaurant.

c. Sleeping Arrangements:

Men were billeted in the Armory at Norway. Beds received from Augusta and loaned by the townspeople of Norway were used to accommodate the men.

d. Health:

The health of the personnel was excellent. Daily sick call was held. There were no accidents, first aid performed or lives saved.

e. General Information:

The situation in the area surrounding Norway-Paris was quite different than the situation in the rest of the State. In this area there was no fire at the time Company "H" was called to duty and no fires broke out during the period the unit was on duty, however, because of the threat of fire and the condition of the woods in and around the Norway-Paris area, plus the fact that there was the threat of the renewed activity of the arsonist who has been active in this area, it was deemed advisable by the Selectmen of the town to request that the National Guard Unit be called to patrol the town and surrounding area, protect vital installations such as the pumping station, and be ready to lend any assistance to the local law enforcement agency if the case might arise that a fire did break out or the arsonist be located. After a conference with the County Sheriff and the Town Selectmen in which they requested that the above duties be performed, a plan was put into action. This plan called for the establishment of three observation posts on high points of vantage around the towns and surrounding territory. All posts were in contact by radio with the CP in the Armory. They reported twice every hour regardless of activity, and could contact the CP at any time in case of an emergency. A fourth post was set up as a mobile post in the Jeep. The duty of this post was to investigate any reports of fire or disturbance. During the daylight hours the vehicle was at the CP or, if away, always in contact by radio with the CP. At night the jeep was used as a mobile patrol through the towns and over the traveled secondary roads, checking motorists who might become careless with cigarettes and the like. At all times the radio was kept open and a constant contact was kept with the CP. A guard was kept at night at the pumping station of the town of Norway, and one post was established at night in a vital industrial area where numerous attempts at arson had been discovered.

The tour of duty was uneventful. Many reports of prowlers and fires in the area were investigated. Every report was proven false. The investigations of the reported fires aided the local fire dept. and saved them many a useless trip. The Unit aided the local police in the patrolling of the secondary roads and investigation of many suspicious characters.

Because of the numerous duties of the Company, the men were required to be on call twenty-four hours a day. The men were on a post three hours and off duty for six hours. Since they were subject to call at all times very few passes were issued. There were no passes issued at night.

Special Commendation should go to Lt. Albert Ellsworth, Lt. James Johnson, 1st Sgt. Wesley LaSalle, Tech. Sgt. Freeman Smith, S/Sgt. Hiram Gatchell, S/Sgt. Francis Gammon, T/Sgt. Albert Belanger, T/Sgt. Benjamin Twitchell, T/5 Keith Wing and S/Sgt. Maurice Pierce for their devotion to duty and tireless effort in making the tour of duty a success. Their work with the civilian and their efforts with the young untrained men in the command enabled Company "H" to carry out the mission successfully.

The unit was complimented and commended by the townspeople and town authorities for the good behavior and excellent manner in which the required duty was performed. This experience has increased the confidence of the townspeople in the Unit and has proven that it is a definite asset to the community.

It was further requested that three enlisted men be furnished to operate the permanent radio station located in the armory at South Portland. These requests were fulfilled.

On 24 October, the Sanford Lodge of Elks was furnished with 143 blankets, shipped to Sanford by Amoco station wagon. Twenty stretchers were procured from the City of South Portland.

All requests for men and equipment were confirmed by proper authority from Augusta.

The three enlisted men from this unit alternated with the three enlisted men from the 703rd AAA Gun Bn, as operators both in the field and in the Armory on a nine day tour of duty.

- I. The following information is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947.
1. Battery B, 703rd AAA Gun Bn., located at Bath, Maine was called out for road patrol duty on 24 October 1947 at 1500 hours per VO The Adjutant General of Maine. Upon request of the Mayor of the city of Bath, the Battery whose strength was at the time of mobilization, four (4) Officers, forty-three (43) Enlisted Men and increased to fifty-five (55) Enlisted men during the emergency, formed road blocks at points in the outlying areas in Bath.
 2. It was first contemplated to have mess in a local restaurant, but when the gas stove located in the Armory was adjusted so as to facilitate feeding at the Armory plans were changed for the purpose of training Mess Personnel. The food was of an excellent variety and was well prepared.
 3. Personnel were quartered at the Armory at all times from 24 October to 2 November 1947.
 4. Two (2) men were listed as sick in quarters during the emergency.
 5. There were no accidents during the period.
 6. a. On 24 October 1947 the Battery set up five (5) road blocks manned by its personnel and five (5) more were partially manned by its personnel. A roving patrol conducted by Officers and a 1st Sgt. was also conducted in which the city and outlying areas were completely covered.
b. The Unit Commander issued passes for the purpose of identifying travelers on back roads in the farm districts. These passes were issued with the full permission of the Mayor of Bath.
c. Beginning on the 23d October there was a serious fire which started in The Lambert Park Area and burned one dwelling. On 24 October there was another fire in a barn used as a bicycle shop on Marshall Avenue. From that time till the time when the Unit was demobilized there was no serious fire, thus showing the effectiveness of the patrol and road block. All fires during this period are of undetermined origin judged by the opinion of the Mayor (Donald Small), City Marshall and Fire Chief to be Arson.
 7. The Fire Patrol (mobile and fixed) located and extinguished five (5) fires before they (the fires) could get dangerous or out of control. In addition, the Coordinating Headquarters, food and clothing collection center, the Mobile Volunteer Fire Units that included, all National Guard Vehicles, two (2) 1000 gal water tanks, trucks borrowed and outfitted by the local National Guard Unit, five (5) personnel and cargo trucks loaned to the Battery by the Olsen Motor Co., and a fire corps of one hundred seventy-five (175) men (not including National Guard personnel). In addition to the before mentioned fact that only one serious fire took place during the entire time the Battery was on duty.

1. Battery D, 703rd AAA Gun Bn., MeNG, was called out at about 2000 hours 23 October 1947 at the request of Rockland Fire Chief to patrol areas at Ash Point, Owls Head, and along the Old County Road in Rockland.
2. At 0600 hours 24 October 1947, were relieved of patrol duty on Old County Road. At 1600 hours 24 October 1947, received orders to report immediately to Major Pooler at Bar Harbor.
3. The battery left Rockland at 1630 hours 24 October 1947 in convoy consisting of one jeep and two 6 x 6 trucks arriving at Bar Harbor at 2100 hours and were assigned quarters at the Casino. 5. 25 October 1947, Lt. Gipson and S/Sgt Ellingwood were dispatched to Rockland in one 6 x 6 truck for more men.
6. 26 October 1947, Lt. Gipson and S/Sgt Ellingwood reported at Bar Harbor with seventeen (17) men. Battery carried out assigned duties.
7. 27 October 1947, were assigned guard duty at two (2) road blocks as follows:
Post No. 3 — Phil Hamlins Corner in the Town Hill area.
Post No. 4 — Norwoods Corner at Read Junction at the head of Somes Sound.
8. 27 October 1947, Lt. Leon White reported for duty at Bar Harbor. Battery carried out assigned duties.
9. 20 October 1947, Lt. White and S/Sgt Robertson were dispatched to Rockland for clothing and supplies, returning same day. Battery assigned one clerk for duty at Bn. Hqrs. Battery carried out assigned duties.
10. 29 October 1947, battery carried out assigned duties.
11. 30 October 1947, battery carried out assigned duties.
12. 31 October 1947, battery relieved from duty 0900 hours. Left for Rockland in convoy consisting of one jeep and two 6 x 6 trucks, arriving Rockland about 1300 hours. Men discharged after inspection of clothing and equipment.

Btry D, 703d messed with Btry B, 314th AAA AW BN (SM) and the detachment from 3620th Ord Maint Co., messed with Hqs Btry, 314th AAA AW BN (SM). Hqs Btry, used army field ranges, had access to an electric refrigerator of about 20 cubic feet space, had hot and cold water. Btry A, 314th AAA AW BN (SM) had a gas range that the Odd Fellows Organization let them use. Also had an electric refrigerator, housefold size, hot and cold running water and a very desirable space to work in. Btry B, 314th AAA AW BN (SM) and Btry D, 703d AAA Bn, similar to the above mentioned units, only in addition they had mess tables.
 - f. Sleeping Arrangements: Btry B, 314th AAA AW BN (SM) and Btry D, 703d AAA Bn, had ideal quarters in the Bar Harbor Playhouse. Hqs Btry and Btry A, 314th AAA AW Bn (SM) were a little crowded and spread out, but nothing to state that it was not a good set up.
 - g. Health of Personnel: Excellent with exception of two members hospitalized and returned to home stations and a few minor colds. Dr. Morrison of Bar Harbor, Maine, visited units each morning on his own and administered all possible aid that he could. His services were most outstanding and highly commendable.
 - h. Accidents: There were two accidents. One between an Army Vehicle and a truck owned by the Addison Packing Co., Southwest Harbor, Maine in which no claim is being made. One other concerns a jeep stolen by two Dow Field soldiers. Both accidents are still under investigation and full reports were or will be rendered.
 - i. Lives saved: None
 - j. First Aid Performed: Only members of our units. Red Cross handled civilians.
 - k. Other Duties: Units did actual fire fighting, constant patrolling and guarding of property until relieved by Police Department.
 - l. Other information: Battalion worked directly with all town officials and in most cases all Departments or the Town Government gave us full authority to organize control. Chief of Police, Mr. Seth Libby and Selectmen and Chief of Fire Department were more than pleased with the manner this Battalion reorganized things so quickly and effectively and worked hand in hand with us on all matters. The State Police rendered service that was outstanding and most commendable and it was a great privilege to work with them. May suggest that in the event of another such emergency that the National Guard be equipped with at least two radios on the frequency that the State Police have and in that way, the two organizations would be hand in hand at a minutes notice.

I. The following is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947.

1. On 23 October 1947, at 1630 hours, Battery A, 314th AAA AW Bn., was called out to form at the Brewer State Armory by the usual Whistle Call.

Upon arrival at the Armory the enlisted personnel was issued equipment and were called to stand by upon further receipt of orders. We received orders from Hdqrs Btry, 314th AAA AW BN, at 1730 hours to report to the Bangor State Armory, which we did and were told to stand by until further orders.

At 2345 hours we received orders from Major Pooler to ready and move out to Bar Harbor, Maine. We left the Bangor Armory at 2400 hours on the 23rd of October 1947 with fifty-three (53) enlisted men and 3 officers. We arrived in Bar Harbor at approximately 0230 hours the 24th of October 1947 where we were billeted and were again told to await orders.

At about 0300 hours on the same date we were ordered to post a guard on eight posts in the business district of Bar Harbor. Guard duty was set up on a two hour on and four hours off.

The following morning were moved upstairs in the Town Hall of Bar Harbor where we were issued bedding and formed into different platoons for the purpose of guard duty.

At this time the guard duty was and posts were changed from interior guard duty to a roving guard covering the business district of town and we set up four road blocks to keep in-coming traffic and personnel not authorized from entering town.

This guard duty was performed twenty-four (24) hours a day until we received orders to remove guards from duty and prepare to return to our home station. These orders were received and guards were relieved from duty at 0600 hours the 3rd of November 1947.

The guard which was on duty consisted of one Sergeant of the Guard, who rode with the driver of our roving Jeep, and two men on each of the four posts. At 0800 hours the 3rd of November 1947 we left Bar Harbor to return to our home station. We arrived at said station at 1020 hours on the same date. The enlisted men then turned in their equipment and cleaned equipment until such time as the Commanding Officer saw fit to dismiss the enlisted men, this time being 1700 hours on the 3rd of November 1947.

I. The following information is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947.

1. Battery B, 314th AAA AW Bn (SM) MeNG was alerted at 0700 hours 24 October 1947, for fire duty at Bar Harbor. The battery was mobilized rapidly and left the Belfast Armory in trucks at 0930 hours. It marched sixty-two (62) miles and arrived in Bar Harbor at 1230 hours. The battery checked in with Bn Hqrs, was furnished its noon meal by the Red Cross Canteen in the Fire House and was assigned billets in the basement of the Bar Harbor Playhouse. The battery's generator was set up to supply lights and power for the electrical appliances in the billets. Battery kitchen was set up and fed the evening meal. Guard Roster was made up and the guard went on duty at 1800 hours. Communications section set up field phones and ran wire to Hqrs Bn.
2. Road blocks were set up 25 October 1947 to regulate traffic on the island. From this date to 3 November the chief duty of the battery was traffic control and guard duty. Lt. Thayer and Sgt. L. M. Shields were assigned to duty with Hq & Hq Battery in Ellsworth to assist in the issuing of passes.
3. A detail was sent back to Belfast 27 October to recruit men and pick up supplies. This detail returned to Bar Harbor 28 October with 13 recruits.
4. The battery was relieved from duty at 0600 hours 3 November. The billets were policed and inspected by the Bn CO. The battery entrucked at 0830 hours, marched sixty-two (62) miles and arrived at Belfast Armory. Property was checked and the men were dismissed at 1200 hours. A special detail was on duty 4 November to care for the property and clean up final administrative details.

CALAIS, MAINE

I. The following information is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947.

1. At 2045 hours, 24 October 1947, the Battery Commander of Battery C, 314th AAA AW Bn., received a telephone message from Colonel Choate of the Adjutant General's Department, ordering the unit to mobilize the morning of 25 October 1947 and proceed to the Machias area and work with the authorities there.

The unit was mobilized at 0600 hours, 25 October 1947 with one (1) officer and thirty-nine (39) enlisted men present. Individual equipment on hand was issued to all personnel. At 0730 hours the battery proceeded to Machias by army vehicles, a truck sent from a lumber company in Machias and privately owned cars arriving at 0930 hours. Adequate quarters were furnished the unit at the Machias Grange Hall. The kitchen in the hall was satisfactory for preparing meals. The mess personnel were authorized by the Red Cross to purchase all food necessary for the battery. Arrangements for taking showers were made at Washington State Normal School.

The Battery Commander made a general reconnaissance of the fire area in the afternoon and before evening two sections of the unit were on the fire line. The battery was grouped into three sections for fire fighting duty but as this arrangement proved to be impractical it was reorganized into two sections working six hours on and six hours off. The duties were to fight fire and patrol the fire lines to see that no new fires broke out. One or two jeeps were used constantly in the woods carrying water to the men with back pumps. The roads were almost impassible and when the unit first moved in we had to build a bridge over a brook to get the vehicles to the fire line. That bridge was rebuilt three times the first night. As the days progressed the roads in the woods had to be corduroyed practically all the way (about three miles). This work was performed until Friday 31 October 1947. On that date the men were given a day off from fighting fire. Clothing was washed in the morning and in the afternoon a check of all clothing and equipment was made. On Saturday 10 November 1947, two sections fought fire in the vicinity of Route 1 toward Kennebec. Previously they had been in the area between Route 1 and Route 1A west of Machias. Sunday, 2 November 1947, the two sections were on the fire line three miles north of Whitneyville and west of the Machias River. Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday morning the unit stood by as requested by the authorities in charge of the fire fighting. A training schedule was carried out including dismounted drill, physical training, manual of arms, care of clothing and equipment, disassembling and assembling the U.S. Rifle Cal. 30 M1, organization of the army and short marches. At 1230 Wednesday 5 November 1947, Major Pooler, Battalion Commander, arrived at battery headquarters and found out that the unit had not been fighting fire for two and one half days. He called the Adjutant General's Office in Augusta and stated he wanted this battery demobilized this date. The battery commander received verbal orders to return the unit to its home station as soon as possible. All vehicles cleared Machias at 1510 hours and arrived at Calais Armory at 1650 hours. The battery was then demobilized. On 6 November 1947 the battery commander and five enlisted men were retained to prepare payroll, check clothing and equipment, etc.

- Transportation:** 1 jeep and 2½ Ton SWB plus 1 civilian truck and privately owned cars were used to transport men to Machias. 2½ Ton SWB was returned to Augusta and 1 2½ Ton LWB left in its place. A jeep and trailer sent from Augusta for emergency to be returned as soon as possible.
- Mess:** Food furnished by Red Cross — prepared by our own mess personnel — adequate and well cooked.
- Quarters:** Grange Hall, Machias, Maine — well heated and lighted — limited toilet facilities — beds and mattresses from Jacksonville Boys' Camp.
- Clothing and Equipment:** As this unit had just recently been federally recognized very little equipment was on hand and no clothing was available. The men were issued a helmet, helmet liner, cartridge belt, canteen, canteen cover, cup, mess gear, duffle bag and three blankets. As soon as possible, with excellent cooperation from the AG section in Augusta, all men fighting fire were equipped with coveralls, combat boots, sweaters, gloves, field jackets, winter underwear and socks.
- Training:** Two and one-half days of unit training were carried on while the unit was on standby status. Training according to attached schedule.
- Recreation:** Two small dances were held in the Grange Hall — both well chaperoned. Passes were available for the men in an amount consistent with number necessary to stand by for an emergency call.
- Morale:** Excellent throughout the period of mobilization.

I. The following information is herewith submitted in accordance with Memorandum AGO No. 118, dated 31 October 1947.

1. At 1800 hours on 23 October 1947, the 3620th Ordnance Maintenance Company (AA), Maine National Guard, was called out on emergency fire duty by The Adjutant General. Orders were to evacuate personnel and belongings of families in the path of a forest fire in the vicinity of Richmond, Maine, which was out of control due to high winds. Twelve trucks with about fifty (50) men were rushed to the scene, started evacuation, and continued until all families and personal property in the path of the flames had been removed. Patrols and fire guards were set up. Trucks were used to transport fire fighters to and from critical areas throughout the night. A bulldozer from the National Guard Pool at Camp Keyes was operated very effectively by 3620th men.
2. On the afternoon of 24 October 1947, with the fire under control, the 3620th Ordnance Maint Co., moved to Camp Keyes and organized a Headquarters and mess with a strength of 110 men.
3. In the days that followed, eight (8) trucks, with drivers, were sent to Bar Harbor, where they were attached to the 314th AAA AW Bn, to transport personnel, fight fire and maintain fire guards. Ten (10) drivers were sent out with fire trucks from Schenectady, New York, to various critical areas throughout the State, to remain until the emergency ended. These men were relieved by fresh men at frequent intervals.
4. Thirty (30) men were flown to Connecticut where thirty (30) 2½ ton trucks were picked up from the Connecticut National Guard and convoyed to Camp Keyes for use by the State of Maine wherever needed, These trucks and men were sent to all fire areas in the State, including an Automotive Maintenance Team to the Biddeford section.
5. At Camp Keyes, two unloading details were alerted so that any fire fighting equipment or relief materials flown here from all over the United States were unloaded immediately upon landing. Other crews unloaded and loaded trucks, keeping the equipment and materials moving to the stricken areas of the State, day and night.
6. A transient barracks was set up for pilots, drivers and other personnel coming and going from Camp Keyes and the 3620th Ordnance Maint Co., mess hall served hot meals twenty-four (24) hours a day.
7. When the fires were brought under control, the thirty (30) trucks from Connecticut were convoyed back and the drivers picked up by plane and flown back to Camp Keyes. On 3 November 1947, the bulk of the Company was released from duty with the exception of eight (8) men who remained on duty with fire trucks in critical areas until 11 November 1947.

1. The 101st Fighter Group and its Units were requested to commence operations at 0800 hours, 26 October 1947, and necessary personnel were ordered to duty.
 2. Specific duties were as follows:
 - a. Maintained 24 hour alert.
 - b. Set up Air-to-ground communications.
 - c. Set up communication net between fixed ground stations and mobile units.
 - d. Alert crews and planes to fly cargo.
 - e. Set up fighter planes for reconnaissance flights.
 - f. Coordinate requests for supplies and distribution of same.
 - g. Supervise clearances of aircraft.
 - h. Transport personnel.
 3. Two (2) C-47's; eight (8) P-47's; two (2) AT-6's; one (1) L-5 were used during the period by Maine National Air Guard Units. Crews were assigned from Headquarters 101st Fighter Group at Augusta and 132nd Fighter Squadron based at Dow Field, Bangor, Maine.
 4. Cargo was flown here by planes of the Maine Air National Guard Units; Massachusetts Air National Guard; First Air Force, Mitchel Field, New York and Air-Sea Rescue based at Westover Field, Massachusetts.
 5. Operations was set up at Camp Keyes, Augusta, Maine. The following is a summary of activities:
 - a. Cargo flown in; Approximately 150,000 lbs.
 - b. Number of flights: 45
 - c. Types of planes used: C-82, C-47, B-25, A-26, AT-6, L-5 and P-47.
 - d. Missions: Administrative; transportation of personnel; cargo and reconnaissance.
 - e. Types of Cargo: Hose, steel cots, blankets, batteries, Indian pumps, fire chemicals.
 6. The 101st Fighter Group Operations worked in close cooperation with the 3620th Ordnance Maintenance Company, which furnished men and equipment to unload cargo; with the emergency board appointed by the Governor; and with Maine Forestry Department. Truck drivers were transported by National Guard plane to Connecticut to bring back to Maine certain vehicles that had been lent by the State of Connecticut for emergency purposes.
 7. Activities were supervised by General Carter and his Staff.
 8. The 101st Fighter Group Headquarters ceased operations on 3 November 1947.

I. ANNUAL FIELD TRAINING

1. Pursuant to instructions contained in NGB Training Authority 17-1 dated 30 June 1947, and under the provisions of Section 94, National Defense Act, the Secretary of War authorizes field training for units of the Maine National Guard as follows:

2. The above units will participate in field training at Camp Edwards, Massachusetts, during the period 3-17 August 1947. Attendance at the encampment will be limited to officers and enlisted men recognized by the War Department as members of the National Guard. Officers or enlisted men who have not received Federal Recognition are not permitted to attend, unless express authority is granted by this office.

3. A minimum of twenty per cent (20%) of aggregate T/O strength is required for attendance at camp. This applies to combat teams, separate battalions and separate companies.

4. In accordance with Training Directive, Headquarters Army Ground Forces, Fort Monroe, Virginia, 28 May 1947, the following directive for Field Training of the Maine National Guard is published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

II. COMMAND

1. COLONEL LESTER E. BROWN, Commanding Officer, 103rd Infantry, Maine National Guard, is designated Commanding Officer of all troops of the Maine National Guard attending the Field Training period.

2. Effective 0001 hours, 3 August 1947, the units listed in Par. 1, Section I, above, which are not organically assigned to the 103rd Infantry are attached to the 103rd Infantry for the purpose of command, administration and training. This attachment will terminate effective at 2400 hours on the day of arrival at home station.

3. Direct correspondence between the Commanding Officer, 103rd Infantry and the Commanding Officers of attached units prior to the effective date of the attachment is authorized.

4. The Commanding Officer of Maine troops will coordinate with the Acting U.S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine, all matters relating to supply and troop movement prior to and during the Field Training period. Direct correspondence is authorized.

III. MOBILIZATION AND MOVEMENT

Units will mobilize at home armories and proceed to Camp Edwards in accordance with schedules initiated by the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine and the Commanding Officer of Troops.

IV. ADMINISTRATION

1. The Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine, is designated the National Guard Contracting and Transportation Officer for Maine.

2. The Commanding Officer of Troops will publish and distribute to all concerned, an administrative order covering period 31 July 1947 to 19 August 1947, incorporating all necessary administrative details.

3. On the last day of the Field Training period, The Commanding Officer of Troops will submit a written report to The Adjutant General, showing the number of Officers, Warrant Officers, and Enlisted Men who trained with his organization, either during the whole or any part of the training period. This report will include recommendations which may be utilized in the conduct of future camps.

4. The Commanding Officer of each Company, Battery or Detachment will determine before leaving home stations the cause of absence of any member of his command; and upon arrival at camp, will submit to the mustering officer assigned to duty with his unit, a list of absentees showing the cause of absence of each member of his command carried thereon.

5. Prior to departure from home stations, and on arrival at camp, the provisions of Paragraphs 4 and 5, NGR 62 will be complied with.

6. All cases of sickness or injury to any member of the Maine National Guard while in attendance at, or travelling to and from a camp of instruction, which requires hospitalization or medical attention other than that furnished in the camp itself, will be handled strictly in accordance with NGR 62.

7. Commanding Officers of organizations and all medical officers will carefully study the above quoted regulations and instructions, as a failure to comply therewith will result in the non-payment of hospital charges from either Federal or State Funds.

8. The Commanding Officer of Troops will be held responsible for the convening and forwarding of reports of boards as required by Section II, NGR 62. Boards should be composed, if possible, of officers living in the same locality as the injured person.

9. Camp Surgeons will report, upon conclusion of camp, all cases hospitalized and left in hospitals, giving the name, rank and organization of each individual.

10. Unit Commanders, upon arrival at home station, will report on forms furnished by this office, any cases of sickness or injury enroute to home station, to The Adjutant General, through channels. In case of accident or injury before final dismissal of command, an immediate telegraphic report will be made direct to The Adjutant General.

11. The U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, as Transportation Officer for Maine, will make all necessary arrangements for the transportation of troops and baggage to camp and return to home stations. Troop movements will be performed on Government Transportation Requests and by motor transportation. All requests for transportation must be forwarded to the U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer at least five (5) days before the date of departure for camp.

12. Travel by privately owned conveyance will be strictly in accordance with regulations and in all cases must have prior authority from The Adjutant General. No privately owned conveyance will be permitted to travel with motor convoys.

13. Organizations will take from their home stations only such organizational and individual equipment as is authorized.

14. Commanding Officers entrusted with Government Bills of Lading for the purpose of transporting material authorized by regulations, will be held strictly responsible for the proper execution of such Bills of Lading and the immediate return of two copies to the U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, signed by the proper railroad official.

15. No officer of the Maine National Guard other than the Contracting Officer will contract for or purchase any supplies of any nature, or contract for any service involving the obligation of Federal or State Funds.

16. All officers are cautioned against contracting any unauthorized bills including bills for subsistence. Officers contracting such bills will be held responsible for their payment.

17. Each officer and enlisted man in attendance at a camp of instruction will receive the same pay and allowances as an officer or enlisted man of the same grade in the United States Army.

18. Payrolls will be prepared in accordance with such instructions as may be issued by The Finance Officer, First Army, to whom organization commanders will furnish such assistance as may be required.

19. Employment of Civilian Cooks will not be authorized except as provided in Section 31, Chapter 12, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1944, and no civilian cook will be recognized or paid by the State unless the provisions of the above Section have been fully complied with by unit commanders employing same.

20. Regimental, Separate Unit Commanders, and The Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, will issue such orders as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this order and provide for the mobilization, conduct and training of their respective commands.

V. TRAINING

Training will be conducted in accordance with training program, this Headquarters, approved by Commanding General, First Service Command and with Training Directive initiated by Commanding Officer of Troops.

1. The annual audit for 1947 of Federal property in the hands of individuals and organizational commanders of the Army Ground Forces and Army Air Forces, Maine National Guard, will be made at local armories by Colonel ELLIOTT C. GOODWIN, INFANTRY, Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, or his representative. See paragraph 49, TM 38-275, November 1946. The audit will include a physical count of all Federal property, expendable and non-expendable, to determine amounts on hand, shortages from applicable Tables of Organization and Equipment and Tables of Allowances, and the condition of the property. The audit will also include fiscal records, reports and returns. Colonel GOODWIN will give ten days notification by letter to each responsible officer concerned as to the date of the audit in order that the property will be in readiness and Armory heated if weather conditions warrant. Unit caretakers will assist the Auditor in his inventory and audit. Unit Commanders (responsible officer) will be present for the full period of the inventory and the audit. Due to the fact that all responsible officers are now authorized an allowance for care of property and administration functions under Section 48, The Military Law, no additional pay or allowances are authorized. In order that a complete and accurate inventory may be conducted, the following will be strictly adhered to:

a. Property will be so arranged as to facilitate accurate checking. For example: clothing habitually kept in lockers will be hung or arranged neatly and uniformly with respect to all lockers; contents of tool sets, kits, chests, etc., will be displayed and articles will be arranged in alphabetical sequence, tools pertaining to trucks, weapons, radio sets, etc., will be displayed in the same manner as for tool sets and in the proximity of the equipment to which they pertain. Where this is not done, the Auditor is authorized to refuse a recheck, or he may cause property to be properly segregated before resumption of the inventory. In extreme cases, the Auditor is authorized to postpone the audit. If this becomes necessary, all expenses accruing subsequently will be borne by the responsible officer.

b. Unserviceable property of all classes will be isolated, but not in packing cases anticipating shipping instructions. The Auditor will give the necessary instructions for disposition of unserviceable property after the audit has been completed. To facilitate final disposition action on unserviceable property, Unit Commanders will list all articles on Property Turn-In Slips, WD-AGO Form No. 447. Quantities will not be entered until after the inventory has been taken. See paragraph 59, TM 38-275.

c. Upon receipt of notification of date of audit, all responsible officers will cease requisitioning and shipping property to the State Arsenal at Augusta and will be prepared to show memorandum receipts (Property Turn-In Slips) for any property which has been turned in to the U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer but which has not been received for.

d. Typewriters should be available and serviceable.

e. Latest available bank statement with proper vouchers brought up to date should be on file with the Company Council Book to facilitate the audit of the Company Fund Account.

f. Serviceable blank forms pertaining to unit administration will be counted and labeled by the caretaker prior to the arrival of the Auditor. The completeness of files of Army Regulations, Training Regulations, Circulars, Bulletins, General Orders, Special Orders, Memorandums, etc., will be noted by the Auditor.

g. Unit Commanders (responsible officers) will prepare in duplicate a consolidated memorandum receipt. Property Issue Slip, WD-AGO Form No. 446 will be used for this purpose (see Fig 1, page 6, TM 38-275). Clothing and other sized

items will not be listed by sizes. Totals entered in column "On hand and due in" will be those taken from the Company (Unit) Property Record (WD-AGO Form No. 14-110). In this instance, the words "and due in" will be obliterated from the title of the column. Typing will be done neatly and nomenclature, including stock number and unit of measure, will be an exact reproduction of that carried in the Company (Unit) Property Record.

h. Unit Commanders will present to the Auditor, Property Issue Slips in duplicate, covering replenishment requirements for expendable supplies. Quantities requested will represent differences between total allowances and amounts on hand.

2. Only such property as may be actually displayed to the Auditor will be included in the final settlement. All property not actually included in the inventory will be considered as lost and, unless proper accounting vouchers are submitted prior to or at the time of the audit, the property will be paid for by the responsible officer concerned. Memorandum receipts for any property issued to a commissioned officer or an enlisted man will not be honored, except where the individual is under proper orders away from his home station under the authority of this office.

3. In all cases final settlement will be made with each responsible officer and the Auditor will render a report to the Adjutant General at the close of the audit setting forth statements respecting amounts of property lost, destroyed or stolen, and other information deemed advisable. For the purpose of rendering collections for lost property, the Auditor will employ National Guard Bureau Form No. 18, "Statement of Property Lost, Damaged or Destroyed."

4. Unit Commanders are cautioned to give provisions of these General Orders their personal attention. Unit Commanders will be held responsible for their functions as provided herein. Failure of Unit Commanders to comply with these General Orders will be reported by the Auditor in writing direct to The Adjutant General.

5. Auditors will be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred by reason of these General Orders. Expense accounts will reflect total expenditures and per diem to be deducted therefrom, thus establishing net reimbursement claim.

6. The travel directed is necessary in the Military Service.

I. ANNUAL FIELD TRAINING, MAINE AIR NATIONAL GUARD

1. Pursuant to instructions contained in NGB Training Authority 17-2, and under the provisions of Section 94, National Defense Act, the Secretary of War authorizes field training for the Air Units of the Maine National Guard as follows:

101st Fighter Group Headquarters
132nd Fighter Squadron, SE
Utility Flight, 132nd Fighter Squadron, SE
Weather Station, 132nd Fighter Squadron, SE
Detachment A, 201st Air Service Group (Fighter)
Headquarters Detachment, 201st Air Service Group (Fighter)

2. The above air units will participate in field training at Dow Field, Bangor, Maine, during the period 31 August — 14 September 1947, inclusive. Attendance at the encampment will be limited to officers and enlisted men recognized by the War Department as members of the Air National Guard. Officers or enlisted men who have not received Federal Recognition are not permitted to attend, unless express authority is granted by this office.

3. A minimum of twenty per cent (20%) of aggregate T/O strength is required for attendance at camp. To qualify for pay, units must muster sixty per cent (60%) of actual aggregate strength.

II. COMMAND

1. COLONEL PHILIP E. TUKEY, JR., Commanding Officer, Headquarters, 101st Fighter Group, MeAirNG, is designated Commanding Officer of all troops of the Maine Air National Guard attending the field training period.

2. The Commanding Officer of troops, MeAirNG, will coordinate with the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine, all matters relating to supply and troop movement prior to and during the field training period. Direct correspondence is authorized.

III. MOBILIZATION

Units will mobilize at home armories and proceed at Dow Field, Bangor, Maine, in accordance with schedules initiated by the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine, and the Commanding Officer of troops, MeAirNG.

IV. ADMINISTRATION

1. The Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine, is designated the National Guard Contracting and Transportation Officer for Maine.

2. The Commanding Officer of troops, MeAirNG, will publish and distribute to all concerned, an administrative order covering period 28 August 1947 to 16 September 1947, incorporating all necessary administrative details.

3. On the last day of the field training period, The Commanding Officer of troops, MeAirNG, will submit a written report to The Adjutant General, showing the number of Officers, Warrant Officers, and Enlisted Men who trained with his organization, either during the whole or any part of the training period. This report will include recommendations which may be utilized in the conduct of future camps.

4. Each Group, Squadron, Flight, Unit and Detachment will determine before leaving home stations the cause of absence of any member of his command; and upon arrival at camp, will submit to the mustering officer assigned to duty with his

unit, a list of absentees showing the cause of absence of each member of his command carried thereon.

5. Prior to departure from home stations, and on arrival at camp, the provisions of Paragraphs 4 and 5, NGR 62, will be complied with.

6. All cases of sickness or injury to any member of the Maine Air National Guard while in attendance at, or travelling to and from a camp of instruction, which requires hospitalization or medical attention other than that furnished in the camp itself, will be handled strictly in accordance with NGR 62.

7. Commanding Officers of organizations and all medical officers will carefully study the above quoted regulations and instructions, as a failure to comply therewith will result in the non-payment of hospital charges from either Federal or State funds.

8. The Commanding Officer of troops will be held responsible for the convening and forwarding of reports of boards as required by Section II, NGR 62. Boards should be composed, if possible, of officers living in the same locality as the injured person.

1. The provisions of G.O. No. 29, AGO Maine dated 22 July 1947 are set aside and orders contained in subsequent paragraphs herein are operative, effective this date.

2. The annual inventory and settlement of property accounts prescribed by paragraph 49a, WD TM 38-275 (November 1946) have been waived by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau for the fiscal year 1948.

3. By direction of the Governor, the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine and the State Maintenance Officer, together with their representatives, will informally inspect all Federal property held on memorandum receipt by responsible officers of the Maine National Guard. Each of the above-named officers will issue explicit instructions pertaining to this inspection, including schedules of visits to local armories. Insofar as possible, responsible officers will be present on the day of inspection.

4. The purposes of the inspection are to:

- a. Examine all property records to insure accuracy of accounts currently maintained by responsible officers.
- b. Take all necessary action consistent with Federal and State regulations for immediate disposition of unserviceable property. In this connection, the Senior Instructor, Army Ground Forces and the Senior Instructor, Air Forces, will render assistance by assigning inspectors to meet with the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer or his representative at local armories on scheduled dates of inspection.
- c. Assist unit responsible officers in clearing their property accounts of all incumbrances such as overages, losses, and damages requiring survey action.
- d. Perform such unit and field maintenance at unit level as time, material and capabilities will permit.

5. The following policy will be adhered to by all concerned:

- a. Each unit responsible officer will list in triplicate on Property Issue Slips (WD AGO Form No. 446) the exact amount of Federal property held by him on memorandum receipt. Copy No. 1 will be signed by the responsible officer, and, together with Copy No. 2, will be delivered to the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer at the time of the inspection. Copy No. 3 will be retained for the responsible officer's jacket file. Clothing and other sized items will not be listed by sizes. Totals entered in column "On Hand and Due In" will be those taken from the Company (Unit) property record (WD AGO Form No. 14-110). In this instance, the words "and Due In" will be obliterated from the title of the column. Typing will be done neatly and nomenclature, including stock number and unit of measure, will be an exact reproduction of that carried in the Company (Unit) Property Record. If the quantity of property on hand is more or less than the quantity called for by the memorandum receipt account, procedure will be as follows:

(1) For overages, an Inventory and Adjustment Report (WD AGO Form No. 444) will be prepared in triplicate. Separate reports will be prepared for property of each technical service.

(2) For shortages, the provisions of Section III, WD TM 38-275 will apply. Replacement of shortages is the responsibility of the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer.

- b. As a separate action, each unit responsible officer will prepare Property Issue Slip in duplicate, listing by Technical service all expendable supplies consumed to date by this unit. The original will be signed and tendered the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer at the time of the inspection.

- c. Unserviceable property will be separated from the serviceable and arranged in such manner as will insure rapid examination by the instructor-inspector. All unserviceable property will be listed by technical service on Property Turn-In Slip (WD AGO Form No. 447). Property Turn-in Slips will be prepared in quintuplicate. Copies 1, 2, 3, and 4 will be delivered to the instructor-inspector at the time of the inspection, and Copy No. 5 will be retained for the unit jacket file.

6. Inspectors will submit expense accounts to this office. Federal per diem received will be shown on the expense account as a deduction from amounts claimed for reimbursement.

7. The travel directed is necessary in the Military Service.

I. COMMENDATION OF ACTIVATED NATIONAL GUARD UNITS DURING FOREST FIRE EMERGENCY — This headquarters is immensely gratified at the very superior manner in which troops of the Maine National Guard performed their duties during the recent forest fire emergency. Never before in its history has the State suffered such a catastrophe. Never before has the National Guard of Maine — except when ordered into Federal service for war-time duty — been faced with such a task as was theirs when unit after unit was called to active duty. Had it not been for these Guardsmen, many communities now returning to normal life would be but a mass of blackened ruins.

Maine Guardsmen during these trying days not only won the commendations of their own officers, but received encomiums from civic officials, from police heads and from citizens in general. Tireless in the performance of their duties, many a young man went thirty-six hours and longer without sleep. All through the trying hours, their individual conduct, almost without exception, was most exemplary.

These Guardsmen fought forest fires; they evacuated residents in areas destroyed; they administered first aid when the occasion demanded; they patrolled highways, established road blocks, protected property, distributed supplies and equipment from one end of the State to the other. There were many times when their own lives were in danger. The services performed were far beyond the ordinary calls of duty.

Through all the trying hours of the emergency, tired, sleepless, disheveled, these men, some of whom were mere youth, contributed another chapter of heroism that will long live in the history of Maine.

II. COMMENDATION FOR UNITS NOT SUMMONED TO ACTIVE DUTY — There were other Maine National Guardsmen who justly must be praised for their services. They were those who "stood by" ready for any and every emergency. All units of the Maine National Guard were not called out to fight the forest fires and to perform related duties. The situation was so explosive that complete mobilization of the Guard would not only have been unsound but would also have been tempting fate.

Personnel of these units in some cases could not understand why they had not been summoned for special duty as had their fellow Guardsmen. Like the war horse of old "they chafed at the bit and smelt the smoke of battle from afar." Members of these non-activated units were on a quasi-alert basis. Commanding officers kept in touch with the situation and with this headquarters. Should occasion have demanded such action, these units could have been mobilized for duty in parts of the State not covered by those organizations that had been activated. Had their services been needed, this headquarters is confident that these services would have been performed with the same completeness, enthusiasm and attendance to duty that characterized those men who were at the fire front. Only words of praise can be given those officers and men who stood by as an added emergency force.

III. COMMENDATION BY THE COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF — Governor Horace A. Hildreth, not only as Chief Executive of the State, but also as Commander-in-Chief of the Military Forces of Maine, has taken official cognizance of the amazingly efficient manner in which the Guardsmen performed their duties. His commendation is contained in the enclosed letter.

In constant touch with developments in all sections of the State, Governor Hildreth personally observed the manner in which the Guardsmen carried out their assignments. His commendation is the result of knowledge he himself gained through his own day and night service.

IV. COMMENDATION TO BE READ TO ALL TROOPS — It is hereby directed that this General Order and the letter of commendation from the Commander-in-Chief be read in full at the next assembly of every National Guard unit after its receipt.

The Adjutant General of Maine with the deepest sorrow announces the death on Wednesday, 17 March 1948, of LT. COL. WILLIAM CLIFFORD GOODWIN, RET. His passing was the culmination of a long and painful illness. He was 86 years old and of that long life 58 years were devoted to service with the military department of the State of Maine. Col. Goodwin was placed on the retired list of State employees on 14 May 1941.

The funeral of Col. Goodwin will be held at the Plummer Funeral Home in Augusta on Saturday afternoon, 20 March 1948 and in accordance with the wishes of the deceased, the services will be simple including that of the Free and Accepted Masons. Burial will be in the family lot in Riverside Cemetery, Brunswick, Maine, in the spring.

Probably never in the history of the State of Maine has there been such a record of service as that shown by Col. Goodwin. As an active officer, he retired on 7 September 1925, at the age of 64. But he had since then and until his final retirement continued his connection with the military establishment as State Quartermaster, the title he held when he became a retired officer.

Col. Goodwin was born in Lynn, Massachusetts, 7 September 1861, but the greater part of his life has been spent in the State of Maine. While living in Brunswick he enlisted on 3 July 1883, as a Private in the Chamberlain Light Artillery. He became Quartermaster Sergeant on 3 July 1884, and when the unit was changed to a Gun Company of the 2nd Maine Regiment, he continued as Quartermaster Sergeant from 26 June 1890, until he became Second Lieutenant on 22 January 1892. The following year he was commissioned Second Lieutenant in Company K, of the First Maine Infantry, and became First Lieutenant on 6 May 1897. He became Captain on 6 August 1897, and continued in that rank until 15 December 1906. when he was honorably discharged and placed on the retired list as a Major. During the Spanish American War he commanded Company K of the 1st Maine Infantry and served with distinction during the tour of duty in the South.

While not an active officer from 1906 to 1910, Col. Goodwin was called on frequently as a retired Major for military duty. In 1910, he came to Augusta as State Quartermaster, was commissioned such on 2 August 1917, and became a Major, Quartermaster Corps, 1 May 1918, a rank in which he was federally recognized on 11 March 1919. He continued in this capacity until 7 September 1925 when he was formally retired from the active military service with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. From his retirement to 14 May 1941 he continued to be State Quartermaster.

Standing out as a noteworthy service was Colonel Goodwin's duty with the State of Maine relief unit that went to Halifax, N.S., at the time of the terrible explosion in the harbor of that city in December 1917. There in the building of the Women's College which was badly damaged by the explosion, repairs were made and a hospital set up with five wards, two dressing stations, a dispensary and a reception room. The Maine unit continued for three weeks in Halifax and the assistance given was highly commended by the Canadian government.

Not only in length of service, but in faithfulness in attending to his duties had Colonel Goodwin won distinction. His counsel had always been sought by junior officers and those senior to him profited much by his advice. At the time of his retirement in 1925, the following entry was made on his military record: "Major William C. Goodwin has rendered efficient service in the Maine National Guard for forty-two years. During a large part of that time he has been charged with the care and maintenance of the Federal and National Guard property within the State. The excellent condition of that property and the systematic manner in which it is stored and handled speak for his efficiency as a property officer."

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I. PARTICIPATING UNITS. 1. Pursuant to instructions issued by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau and under the provisions of Section 94, National Defense Act, as amended, the Secretary of the Army authorizes field training for units of the Maine National Guard Field Forces as follows:

2. The above units will participate in field training at CAMP EDWARDS, MASSACHUSETTS, during the period 31 July 1948 to 14 August 1948.

3. The strength, composition and length of tour of the advance and rear detachments will be announced by this headquarters at a later date. See par. 4, Section VI for information regarding preparation of detachment payrolls.

4. No enlisted man will be authorized field training other than with, and during the period prescribed for, his unit. Paragraph 35, NGR 45 will apply in the case of officers and warrant officers.

5. Officers not federally recognized may attend field training with their unit. Names of such officers will be entered on NGB Form 100 and on the Field Training Payroll with the following notation, "Federal Recognition Not Received. No Pay Claimed At This Time." Upon receipt of Federal recognition, and if recognition date includes any portion of this time that officers attended field training, a supplementary payroll may be processed for such officers and payment made. Travel pay may be claimed only for travel performed after date of Federal recognition.

6. Training authority issued by the National Guard Bureau does not authorize any temporary or permanent Federal employees who belong to the National Guard and who comes within the provisions of Section 80, National Defense Act, as amended, to participate in field training for a period in excess of 15 days. Federal employees who are members of the advance and/or rear detachments must take annual leave or leave without pay for such time in excess of 15 days.

7. The provisions of paragraph 6, above, will apply to caretakers and accounting clerks who are members of the National Guard. Such accounting clerks and caretakers will attend field training in their military capacity and not as civilian employees unless specifically authorized by this office.

II. COMMAND — COLONEL JOHN F. CHOATE, 0-174426, State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Maine National Guard, is designated Commanding Officer of Troops for the field training period. Acting in such capacity, the Commanding Officer of Troops will coordinate with the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, all matters relating to supply, movement, hospitalization and evacuation prior to and during the field training period. Direct correspondence is authorized.

III. MOBILIZATION. Units will mobilize at home armories in accordance with schedules published by the Commanding Officer of troops.

IV. MOVEMENT. 1. Movement from home stations to CAMP EDWARDS and from CAMP EDWARDS to home stations will be performed by Government Motor Vehicle, bus and rail, as follows:

2. The United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine will publish directive governing movement of above organizations.

3. The use of private automobiles for travel to and from field training will be held to a minimum. In general, this mode of travel will be authorized by this office only when *it is clearly shown* that it is impracticable for individuals to travel with assigned units.

4. Regardless of travel means employed, the amount of equipment and impediments transported to and from field training will be strictly limited to *training essentials*, to include athletic equipment but not day room furniture and equipment.

5. Travel to and from field training site will be conducted as a troop movement.

V. ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS. 1. The United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine is designated National Guard Contracting Officer and Transportation Officer for the field training period.

2. Prior to 1 June 1948, the Commanding Officer of Troops will publish and distribute to all concerned an administrative order covering the period 28 July 1948 to 15 August 1948, incorporating therein all necessary administrative details.

3. On 15 August 1948, the Commanding Officer of Troops will submit a written report to The Adjutant General, Maine, showing the number of Officers, Warrant Officers, and Enlisted Men who trained under his command, either during the whole or any part of the field training period. This report will include recommendations which may be utilized in the conduct of future field training camps.

4. NO officer, Warrant Officer or Enlisted Man will be excused from field training except under the gravest circumstances. In any such case, express authority must be granted by The Adjutant General, Maine. Such application will be forwarded through channels accompanied by a complete sworn statement of circumstances, affidavit or medical certificate in order to be considered and must be submitted sufficiently in advance for any necessary action.

5. Prior to departure from home stations, and upon arrival at Camp, the provisions of paragraph 5 and 4, NGR 62, will be complied with.

6. All cases of sickness or injury to any member of the Maine National Guard while in attendance at, or traveling to and from Camp Edwards, Massachusetts, which requires hospitalization or medical treatment other than that furnished in the training camp itself, will be handled strictly in accordance with NGR 62. Commanding Officers and all Medical Officers will study carefully above cited regulations and instructions, as a failure to comply therewith will result in the non-payment of hospital and/or medical charges from either Federal or State funds.

7. The Commanding Officer of Troops will be held responsible for the convening of Boards and forwarding of reports pertaining to their official acts, as required by Section II, NGR 62. Boards should be composed, if possible, of officers living in the same locality as the sick or injured trainee.

8. Upon conclusion of the field training period, the Camp Surgeon will report direct to The Adjutant General, Maine, all cases hospitalized and left in hospitals, Federal and civilian, giving the name, rank, serial number and organization of each individual.

9. Upon return to home stations, Unit Commanders will report direct to The Adjutant General, Maine, on forms furnished by this Office, any cases of sickness or injury suffered while en route from Camp Edwards. An information copy of such report will be transmitted to the appropriate regimental or separate battalion commander. In case of accident or injury before final dismissal of command, an immediate telegraphic report will be made direct to The Adjutant General, Maine.

10. NO officer, warrant officer or enlisted man of the Maine National Guard, other than the Contracting Officer designated in these General Orders, will contract for or purchase any supplies of any nature, or contract for any service involving the obligation of Federal or State funds. Individuals violating these instructions will be held responsible.

VI. PAY AND ALLOWANCES. 1. Each officer, warrant officer and enlisted man in attendance during the field training period will receive the same pay and allowances as an officer, warrant officer or enlisted man of the same grade in the United States Army.

2. Finance Officer, United States Army, Army Base, Boston, Massachusetts, has been designated by the Chief of Finance to compute payrolls and pay unit commanders.

3. Units will prepare field training payrolls *prior* to departure for field training. Every officer, warrant officer and enlisted man assigned to the unit will be listed in the payroll. One *extra* copy will be prepared, and *all copies* will be submitted to the United States Property and Disbursing Officer, for Maine, at Camp Edwards, prior to 1000 hours, 2 August 1948 for editing. Payroll blank forms will be furnished all units automatically, hence requisition therefor will not be required.

4. A detachment payroll will be prepared covering the period authorized for the advance detachment. A similar payroll will be prepared for the rear detachment. In the case of the former, it will be prepared immediately upon arrival at the field training site by the detachment commander and will be submitted to the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine prior to 1200 hours, 29 August 1948. For the latter, it will be prepared by the detachment commander immediately prior to departure for home stations and will be submitted to the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine at that time. The rear detachment payroll will list the home residence address of each individual listed therein and payment will be made by FOUSA, Boston, Mass., by check, direct to trainee. The unit to which each individual belongs will be clearly shown in the body of these payrolls. Attention is especially invited to the fact that personnel of these detachments will be paid for the period of the encampment proper on the regular payrolls of their units. The detachment payrolls cover only the period of additional duty as member of the advance or rear detachments.

5. All National Guard Officers, with or without dependents, receive rental and subsistence allowances for the field training period. Enlisted men of the first three grades who are married, or who have authorized dependents, receive quarters allowance. Rental and quarters allowances are payable from the time of departure for and until arrival at home from training camp, regardless of travel time.

6. Per diem is not payable to members of the National Guard during field training period, regardless of time of travel or other factors.

VII. SUBSISTENCE. 1. The provisions of NGR Circular No. 10, dated 18 March 1948, will apply.

2. The United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, Contracting Officer, will purchase all subsistence and will coordinate all matters pertaining thereto.

VIII. TRAINING. 1. The Field Training Program, approved by the Commanding General, First Service Command, First Army, will be published and distributed by this headquarters. Based thereon, the Commanding Officer of Troops will initiate and issue appropriate Training Directives.

2. Pre-Camp Schools at the field training site for mess personnel, immediately prior to the field training period, are authorized. A maximum of two (2) enlisted men from each company or similar unit having Tables of Organization assigned mess personnel, may be included in this detachment. *Mess personnel will not be included in the advance detachment.*

3. Unit commanders will submit names of candidates to attend the Pre-camp Mess School, direct to the Adjutant General of Maine, not later than 1 July 1948. A maximum of four (4) days, including travel time, is authorized. Travel in all cases will be by rail. A detachment payroll will be prepared by the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine and payment will be effected as outlined in Section VI, herein.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS. 1. Each unit authorized field ranges and mess equipment under Tables of Organization and Equipment, except Company G, 103d Infantry, will operate a unit mess. Units not authorized such equipment including Company G, 103d Infantry, will be attached to unit messes by written orders of appropriate commanders. A copy of such orders will be furnished the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, Contracting Officer.

2. Not later than 1 July 1948, each unit commander required by paragraph 1, above, to operate a unit mess will report to its headquarters the sufficiency of mess personnel available to him for that purpose.

3. Instructions of the Chief of the National Guard Bureau provide that maximum use will be made of all Government-owned vehicles to transport personnel, equipment and impedimenta to and from field training. For this reason, it will be necessary to pool transportation. Instructions pertaining to this subject will be published at a later date by the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, Transportation Officer.

4. Liaison type aircraft will be taken to camp. Liaison aircraft pilots will be briefed on this subject by the Senior Instructor, Maine Air National Guard, prior to 15 July 1948.

5. The following regulations should be on file in each unit. If not, requisition for missing copies will be submitted to the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, at this headquarters:

OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY

1. Memorial Day has lost none of its significance. It should be observed this year with all the sincerity, devotion and homage that have characterized it in the past. Superficially, the United States is at peace. But the seeds of war are sprouting in all quarters of the globe. Hundreds of thousands of men and women have during the past two years been released from active duty in the armed forces of the country. The need for an adequate defensive force was never greater than it is at the present time. A house divided unto itself is lost. Only in union are there strength and safety. Only in a re-dedication of ourselves to the continuance of those principles of Democracy for which this country has stood for nearly a century and three quarters can safety be assured. That re-dedication must be accompanied by a united effort to provide the United States with an armed force that can cope with every situation that may threaten the life of the Nation.

2. As a tribute to the thousands of men and women of Maine who have given their lives that this nation may endure, it is hereby directed that since Memorial Day will be observed on Monday the National Flag be displayed at half staff on all armories from sunrise until midday Monday, 31 May 1948, eastern daylight time. At noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the staff and remain there until sunset.

3. To assist in the proper observance of the day, Commanding Officers of all Maine National Guard units are authorized to place themselves and their commands at the disposal of the various veterans' organizations and societies and local officials on this day and to render every assistance possible. Participation of National Guard troops in appropriate ceremonies may be counted as a regular drill provided all requirements as to attendance and time of service be observed as specified for regular Armory drills. Split assemblies are not authorized. All organizations participating in the observance of the day will report that fact to The Adjutant General at least three days before Memorial Day.
