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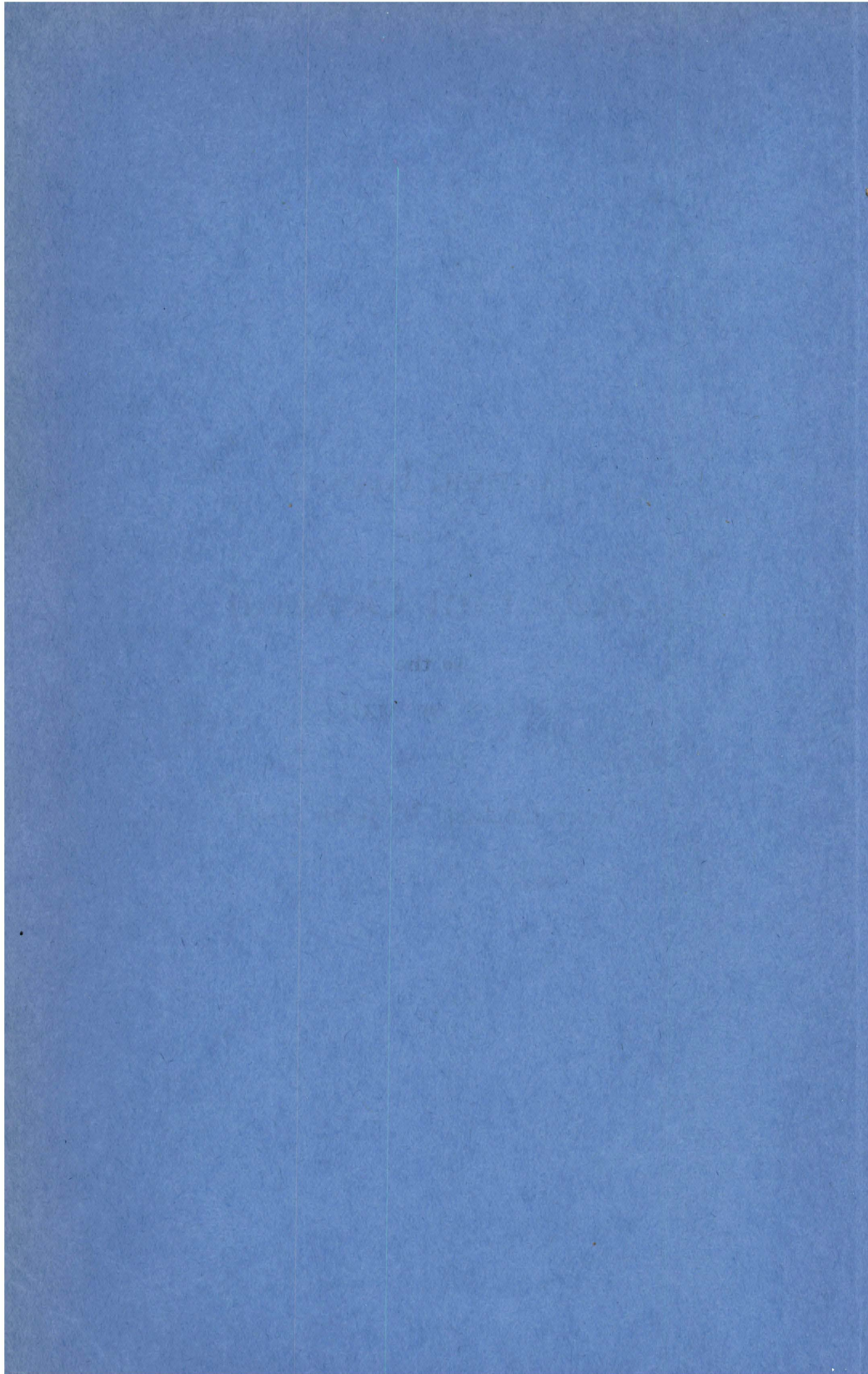

## **TWO NEW COMBINATION ARMORIES AND COMMUNITY CENTERS**

A closer cooperation and a better mutual understanding all around between the Military Department of the State and the general public is at last to be realized, it is hoped, in at least two large communities of the State.

By action of the 94th Legislature two appropriations of \$100,000 each were made for new armories in Waterville and Fort Fairfield, places that have sorely needed those buildings. The sum of \$100,000 set aside by the State is to be matched in each case by the city or town concerned.

The liberal attitude on the part of the citizens of Waterville and Fort Fairfield is the direct result of an appreciation of the great value, a building which may be regarded as a community center can be to a town. The new armories when constructed will serve this purpose insofar as community activities can be staged without interference with the military commitments of the building. Particularly will the use of the armories by high schools be a feature while the armory in each case will be a most desirable place for the holding of conventions, special services and other community activities.

It has long been felt by The Adjutant General that anything that could be done to promote a closer relationship between the Military Department of the State and the city or town where an armory is located should always be the aim in the construction of an Armory. This feeling is quite general throughout the State and this attitude by the citizens is concretely evidenced by the willingness of Waterville and Fort Fairfield to match the State funds dollar for dollar in order that both military and community enterprises may flourish with the greatest benefit to all concerned.

## **FEDERAL BUILDING PROJECTS for the MAINE NATIONAL GUARD**

Uncle Sam very generously dug down into his pockets during the fiscal year ending 30 June 1949 to help out in the construction and modernization of certain buildings and grounds of the Maine National Guard.

Explicitly the money spent or to be spent under contracts that have not yet been completed approached the \$300,000 mark, or, in actual figures, \$287,673.00. The expenditures covered projects from Portland to Caribou.

The greatest single bit of construction was the erection of the first of five warehouses at Camp E.D. Keyes, Augusta. This building, 52

by 182 feet, cost \$47,600. Three others like it will eventually be erected with a head house of the same style.

At Camp E. D. Keyes, too, over half a mile of chain link fence was installed. This encloses all the buildings at the training ground wherein are stored military equipment of every kind as well as the offices and service buildings. The cost of these 2700 liner feet of fencing was \$5,960.

Next to the money expended in Augusta, the outlay at Dow Air Force Base in Bangor is already made or contracted for, called for an expenditure of \$45,000. The project at Dow Field covered: Preparation and operation expenses for the annual field training air units 1949, including alterations to mess halls, preparation of sanitary facilities, preparation of living sites, paving and street repair and painting.

In the construction of the building for storage, the National Guard Bureau, through whom the funds have been made available, sees to it that the material and workmanship are of the finest. This was true of the big motor vehicle storage building erected at Camp E. D. Keyes three years ago, the new warehouse already mentioned and the following motor vehicle structures already completed or authorized by fiscal year funds:

Since the start of the re-organization of the Maine National Guard in 1946, the Federal Government, through the National Guard Bureau and Col. Elliott C. Goodwin, acting United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, has expended or let contracts for a grand total of: \$685,817.

## OFFICER PROCUREMENT FOR THE NATIONAL GUARD

The authorized officer strength of the Maine National Guard is 322 Army and 118 Air.

The present officer procurement policy of the National Guard Bureau is from the following sources:

- a. Officers with wartime experience.
- b. Warrant officers and enlisted men who attained one of the first three grades while in Federal service during the period 7 Dec 1941 to 30 June 1947.
- c. Graduates from ROTC colleges who received a commission upon graduation.

d. Former enlisted men with a minimum of 6 months of active service in the Army of the United States between 7 Dec 1941 and 30 June 1947 who are graduates of accredited colleges who meet the age requirement, who have not passed their 28th birthday at time of appointment, and who have attended an institution where ROTC advanced training was non-existent.

e. Officers of the Organized Reserve Corps.

f. Enlisted men qualified as to physical condition and age and who are of good moral character may qualify as second lieutenants by completing extension courses of the 10 series.

Specialist from other sources:

a. Wartime service or previous military training are not required for appointment and Federal Recognition in the National Guard of clergymen as chaplains, doctors as medical officers, and dentists as dental officers.

b. If a candidate for appointment has had such wartime service or previous military training, the record of that service and training will be considered in determining general suitability for the position to which appointed.

c. All candidates must meet the age-in-grade requirements prescribed by the National Guard Bureau and also the physical requirements prescribed for General Duty officers.

All officers, except second lieutenants, appointed in an arm of the service other than the arm in which commissioned are appointed subject to waiver in professional subjects not common to both arms.

These waivers must be retired in one year and may be accomplished by attending service schools or by taking extension courses.

It is hoped that Officer Candidate Schools will eventually be opened to candidates for commission in the National Guard.

## **RESTORATION OF INACTIVE NATIONAL GUARD**

The National Guard of Maine as well as of other states now has again an inactive component. A valuable and potent force before World War II, the Inactive National Guard went out of existence as such when the Guardsmen were mustered into Federal Service. As certain officers and enlisted men were relieved from active duty during the war and returned home many were ordered to be attached to the State Headquarters Detachment for record purposes and for possible call for duty. At one time, there were over 300 on this list but all enlisted men who were placed in this category were either called back to service or discharged as of 31 December 1942. The officers have in a great majority of cases continued in an inactive status but some have been recalled

to active duty in the Army of the United States or the National Guard while some have been honorably discharged or placed on the State Retired List.

Cognizant of the fact that there are many cases when an enlisted man cannot attend the ordered assemblies of his unit without undue hardship and realizing these men would be very valuable in case of man emergency, the National Guard Bureau revived the Inactive National Guard by the enactment of National Guard Regulation No. 30, dated 16 September 1948.

As of 30 June 1949, there were on the inactive list of the Maine National Guard 52 officers and 159 enlisted men. The officers were all with one exception those who had been returned home during or following the war and ordered to be placed in an inactive status.

The Inactive National Guard is a potent force. It provides a reserve roster of men who may be called back to active duty should the occasion require. They would normally be returned to the organization with which they had served previous to being transferred to the inactive list or they could be assigned to another unit. Incompatible occupation, change of residence or attendance at school either in the State or out of the State have been the principal reasons for the transfer to the inactive list.

It is interesting to note that when the Maine National Guard was inducted into the Federal service at the start of World War II, 400 men were on the inactive list at the time and were called upon to be restored to an active status. They proved of immense help in taking the places of men who were rejected for one cause or another as well as of great help in building up the strength of the various units that needed more men. Of the 400 who were recalled from an inactive status and placed on the active list, 247 were for the 103d Infantry, 112 for the 152d Field Artillery and 41 for the 240th Coast Artillery.

Unless transferred back to an active status, enlisted men on the inactive list are regularly discharged upon the completion of their terms of enlistment.

**STEADY GROWTH OF THE NATIONAL GUARD**

The past year saw appreciable gains in the strength of the Maine National Guard. During the year, too, a number of units were re-organized in accordance with new tables of organization and equipment. Notable among these changes were the formation of the Heavy Motar Company of the 103d Infantry, with headquarters at Portland, which had previously been designated as Cannon Company but which had never been recruited. The old Anti-Tank Company became the Heavy Tank Company. Instead of a Medical Detachment for the headquarters, 103d Infantry, a new Medical Company was authorized and formed. By this move, all medical personnel of the regiment is now controlled directly from Regimental Headquarters. Medical Sections of the 1st and 2nd Battalions became the 1st and 2nd Battalion Medical Platoon while the section of the 3d Battalion was retained in Waterville as the 3d Battalion Medical Platoon, and is an integral part of the Medical Company.

In line with aircraft development, the 132d Fighter Squadron of the Maine Air National Guard was equipped with jet fighters in place of the single-engine ships they had previously been using.

On 30 June 1949, the strength of the Maine National Guard was the greatest in the history of this security force. According to returns received from the various units, this strength was as follows:

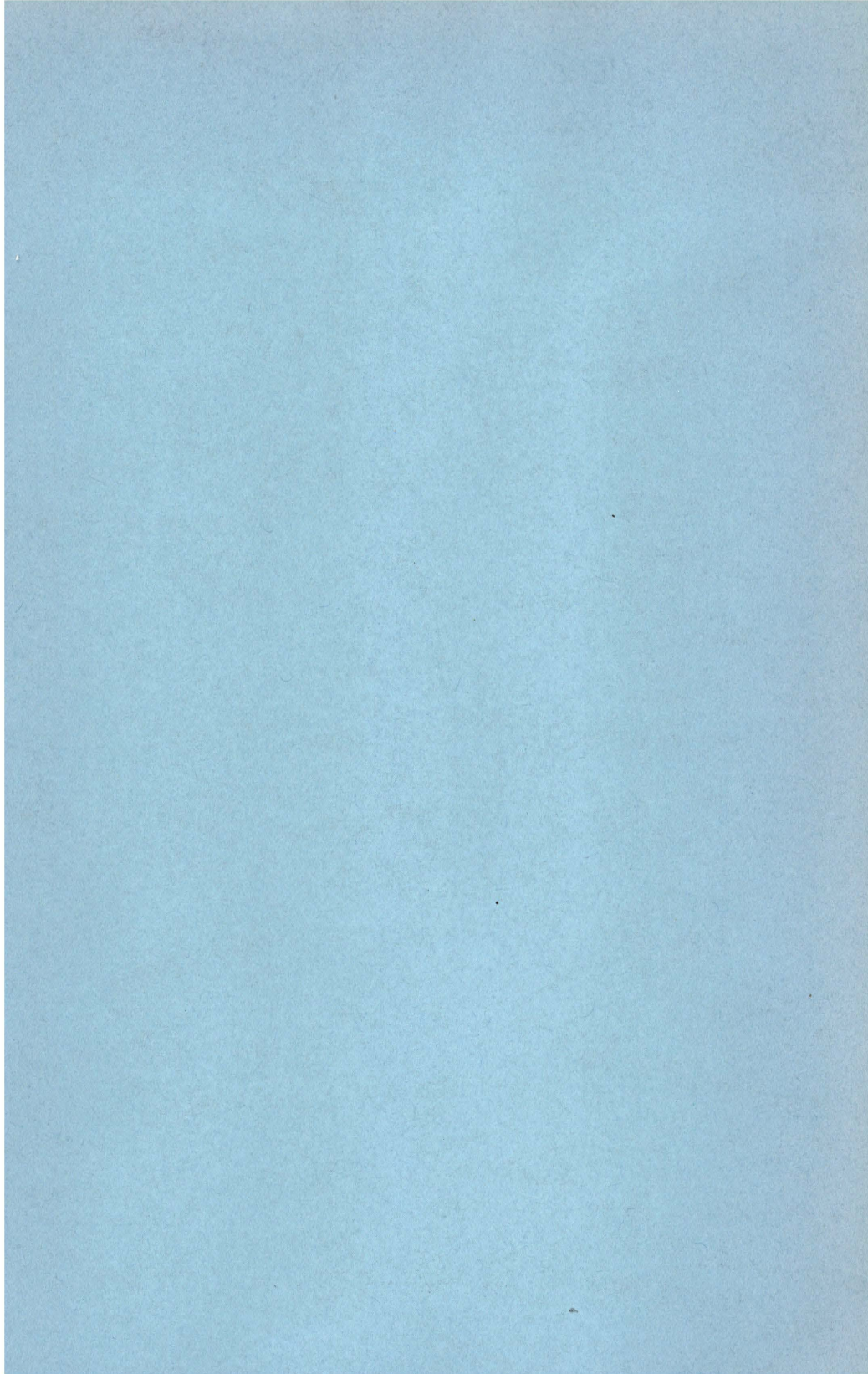

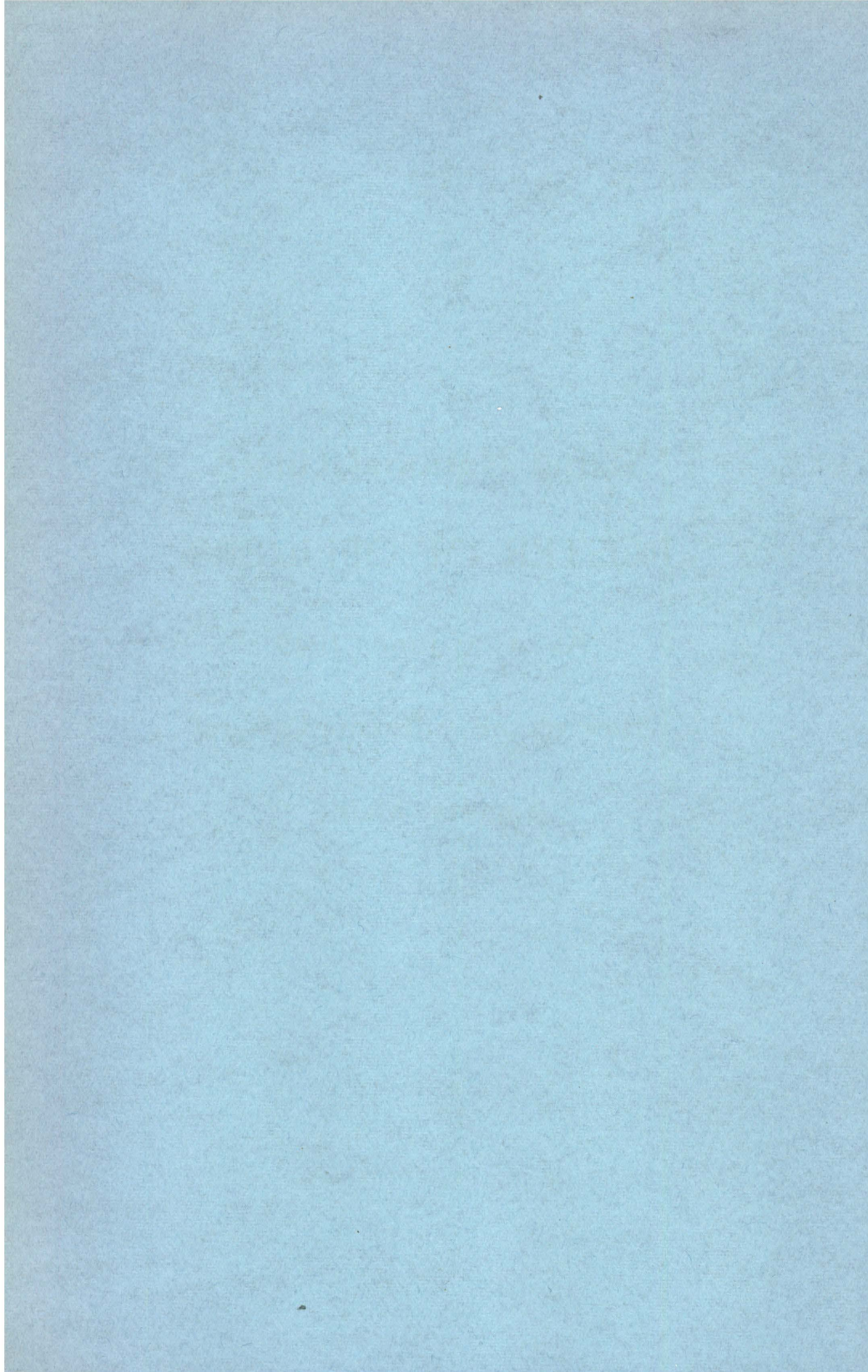

## REPORT OF INSPECTION MAINE TROOPS FIELD TRAINING

31 July 49 — 14 August 48

### 1. Police

a. Police of unit areas was generally good after the first few days of encampment, however, training areas and areas between blocks were littered with papers, bottles and other rubbish throughout the entire period.

### 2. Barracks

a. Many units had to be reminded several times that cleanliness of latrines was not up to standard. It is recommended that preparations for future encampments should include the stocking of extra cleaning materials by each unit prior to departure for camp.

b. Sleeping quarters were well policed and scrubbed.

c. During the first week of the training period, there was no uniform arrangement of clothing and individual equipment; this condition had improved to a marked degree during the last few days of encampment.

### 3. Mess Halls

a. There was an ample supply of food which was well prepared. During the first week of the training period kitchens, and especially refrigerators, were very untidy, however daily inspections helped to improve this condition considerably. In several instances day rooms were being used as kitchens. This practice proved to be very unsatisfactory, since no hot running water was available it was necessary to ground outside of the buildings. Under those circumstances, it was impossible to maintain the high standards of cleanliness required of a unit in barracks.

### 4. Unit Funds

All company commanders were contacted for inspection of their council books and vouchers. Many irregularities were observed which are noted in a separate report attached hereto.

### 5. Military Courtesy and Discipline

It was found that during the course of daily visits to unit areas that more instruction in military courtesy and discipline is necessary. Enlisted men were lax in saluting and in some instances they were observed saluting while smoking and in a sitting position.

### OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY

Not a single Maine member of the Grand Army of the Republic is now living. All of the more than seventy thousand from this state who engaged in that memorable struggle between the states have passed on. The duty of observing that day originally created for the heroic Union dead has now passed into other hands. The sons and daughters of those old soldiers and sailors, the members of newer patriotic organizations made up of younger veterans, those who have also done their share in preserving the Union, not from a struggle between its political sub-divisions but wars with maniacal seekers after world-conquest.

Security for the United States from internal and external foes must continue to be the purpose of all citizens. Complacency is criminal; preparedness is paramount. It is a duty of all citizens to see that this Country will continue to be a "land of the free" as it has for so many years. Only by being prepared for any eventuality may Americans, individually and as a nation, honor those thousands who gave their lives to preserve that for which the country has stood so long. All must join in this great endeavor: America must be prepared; America must continue.

As a tribute to those thousands of men and women of Maine who have given their lives that this nation may endure, it is hereby directed that the National Flag be displayed at half staff on all armories from sunrise until midday Monday, 30 May 1949, eastern daylight time. At noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the staff and remain there until sunset.

To assist in the proper observance of the day, Commanding Officers of all Maine National Guard units are authorized to place themselves and their commands at the disposal of the various veterans' organizations and societies and local officials on this day and to render every assistance possible. Participation of National Guard troops in appropriate ceremonies may be counted as a regular drill provided all requirements as to attendance and time of service be observed as specified for regular Armory drills. Split assemblies are not authorized. All organizations participating in the observance of the day will report that fact to The Adjutant General at least three days before Memorial Day.

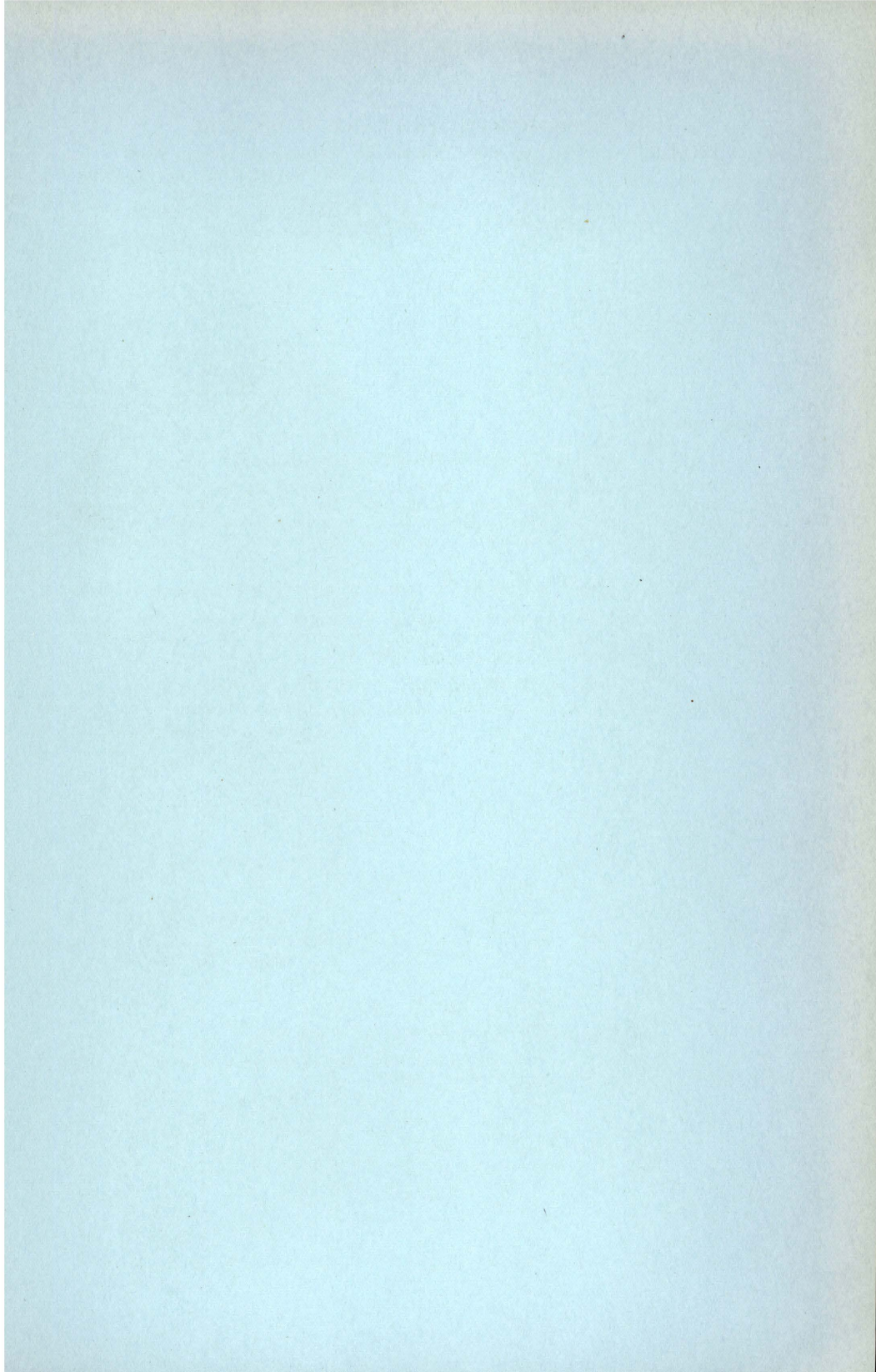

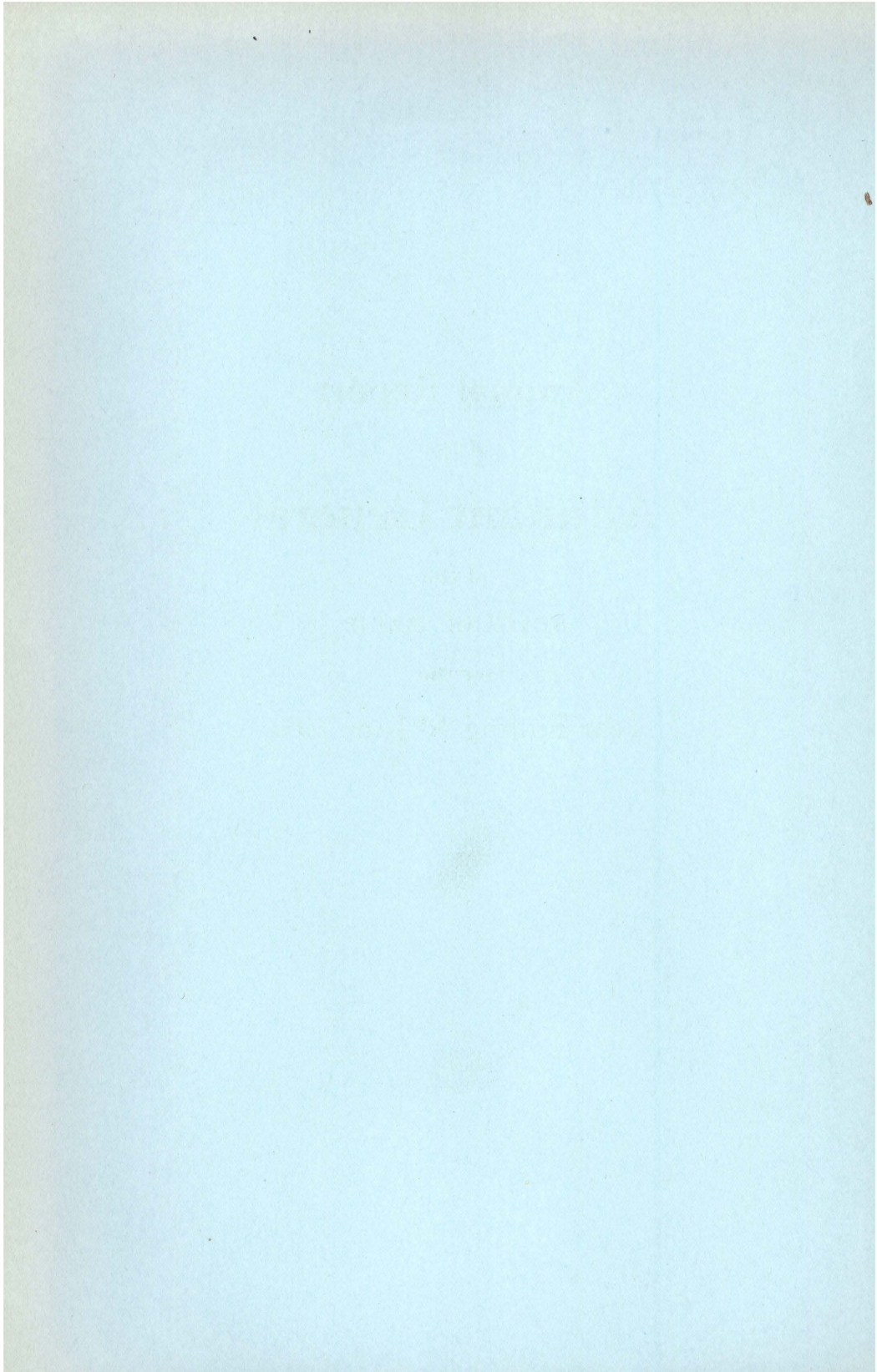

## ALL AUTHORIZED UNITS NOW FORMED

All units of the Maine Army and Air National Guard authorized for the State of Maine have now been organized and Federally recognized. The last to come into the fold was the Medical Detachment of the 152nd Field Artillery Battalion. Formation and recognition of this unit had been under way a long time. Had it been possible to secure the proper personnel at the time other units were being enrolled Maine could have completed its quota of units many months ago.

The past year also saw the re-organization and re-designation of several units. The Medical Company, 103d Infantry, RCT., was re-organized and redesignated. Instead of having separate detachments stationed at various places throughout the State, all medical troops are now located in Portland with the first, second and third medical platoons definitely assigned for duty with the three battalions of the 103d Infantry. In addition to these, there is a collecting platoon.

Two other notable re-designations were made. Company I, 103d Infantry, with headquarters at Newport was re-designated Headquarters Company, 3rd Battalion, 103d Infantry, and the Headquarters Company which had been in Waterville was re-designated Company I, 103d Infantry.

## ARMORIES

The past year has been characterized by really notable progress in meeting the modern requirements for National Guard Armories. The whole armory program is one of the most important problems that have ever faced the Military Department of the State. There is still a great deal to be done before Maine is fully in step with other states in the erection and maintenance of Armories. Much of the armory program depends upon the attitude of the National Guard Bureau at Washington and the amount of money that will be available from the Federal Government.

## AT WATERVILLE

For years the municipally owned building in Waterville that has been used by National Guard companies has fallen far short of military requirements. This deficiency existed previous to World War II. The building used, located on Front Street, has been condemned several times.

The State Military department has long been cognizant of the unhappy situation in Waterville, so have the municipal authorities and the members of patriotic and civic organizations. It has been clearly evident that something must be done.

Now something really has been done. Perhaps the results have not brought a perfect solution of the problem, but they have been so much worth while that it may be said Waterville at last has a good armory.

The removal of the entire Colby College establishment to Mayflower Hill made it possible to secure much of the property that was formerly

occupied by this institution. The Adjutant General, members of the Maine Military Defense Commission, Mayor Russell M. Squire of Waterville and others interested held frequent and productive conferences on the subject. The co-operation shown by Mayor Squire was actually out-standing.

As a result of the negotiations, the State now has control over the former field house of the college, the gymnasium, the stadium and a certain amount of surrounding land. The State has actual title to the gymnasium and a ninety-nine year lease of all the other property mentioned above. Priority in the use of the buildings and grounds is given to the military establishment and in case of emergency the National Guard will have full-time use.

At the conclusion of the successful series of conferences, work in re-modelling and re-habilitating the former college property was begun. The work on the gymnasium has been completed. Principal changes have seen the iron barring of all windows, changing of all locks and armoring of all doors.

A great amount of work is being done to the field house. This will be completed for the use of Company I in the fall. The alterations and remodelling of the field house include the laying of a new wooden floor for drill purposes. This is approximately 100x65 feet. The rest of the floor of the field house is being covered with cement. The area of the whole building is 155 feet square.

Although but one unit, Company I of the 3d Battalion, 103d Infantry Regimental Combat Team, will for the present make its home in the new quarters, facilities are such that several more outfits could be accommodated there. The approximate cost of the alterations has been on the part of the City of Waterville and by the Defence Commission.

## **FORT FAIRFIELD**

It had been hoped that construction of a badly needed Armory in Fort Fairfield would be started during the year. The bids submitted by various contractors, however, were so far above the estimated cost that all bids were thrown out. It is hoped that the plans of the armory may be redrawn and revised so that the actual construction may come well within the estimated outlay.

## **OTHER ARMORIES**

During the past year a storage and motor vehicle building has been erected in Calais. This is similar to buildings erected at Gardiner, Westbrook, Caribou and Millinocket. These were all built from Federal funds.

In the case of other armories throughout the State, minor repairs have been made to meet the requirements of current regulations.

## ARMED FORCES DAY

For the first time in history, the Nation was called upon by its Chief Executive to pay tribute to all branches of the Armed Forces at the same time. This was a continuing observance beginning on 13 May and extending through 20 May 1950. For the first time, Army, Navy, Marine and the Air Force demonstrated to the people of the Nation the advantages of unification. "Teamed for Defense" became the theme of the several forces.

Maine participated in the observance of Armed Forces Day which really was Armed Forces week. It was impossible for Maine troops to conduct an observance even approaching that in some other states because neither Regular, National Guard nor Organized Reserve had the personnel for any elaborate programs, but the Maine Army and Air National Guard did do a mighty fine job in those localities where proper observance of the day was in order. Civic organizations joined with

the Armed Forces, an appreciated cooperation and evidence that all walks of life realize the necessity of an adequate security force if the nation and the principles for which it stands are to endure.

Maine observance consisted of parades, window displays, open house at the various armories and demonstrations of armament operations. But large or small these various demonstrations left their imprint on the Maine populace as a whole and brought home particularly to all the great work the Maine Army and Maine Air Guard are doing.

ANNUAL FIELD TRAINING  
 MAINE AIR NATIONAL GUARD  
 CALENDAR YEAR 1950

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SECTION I

1. AUTHORITY; PARTICIPATING UNITS. Pursuant to National Guard Training Authority 17-1-AIR-50, dated 19 April 1950, and under the provisions of Section 94, National Defense Act, as amended, the following units of the Maine Air National Guard will take field training at DOW FIELD, BANGOR, MAINE, during the period 29 July 1950 to 12 August 1950.

2. No airman will be authorized field training other than with, and during the period prescribed for, his unit. No departure from this general policy will be authorized unless it is clearly shown that the Federal Government will benefit thereby. Paragraph 35, NGR 45, will apply in the case of officers and warrant officers. For the special case of members of a Camp Supply Detachment see paragraph 6 below.

3. Officers not Federally recognized may attend field training with their unit, but such attendance does not authorize them to receive Federal pay. Names of such officers will be entered on NGB Form 100 and on the Field Training Payroll with the following notation: "Federal recognition not received. No pay claimed at this time". Upon receipt of Federal recognition, and if the recognition date precedes any portion of the time that officers attended field training, a supplementary payroll may be processed for such officers and payment made. Travel pay may be claimed only for travel performed after date of Federal recognition.

4. The above cited Training Authority will not be construed to authorize any temporary or permanent Federal employee who belongs to the Maine Air National Guard and who comes under the provisions of Section 80, National Defense Act, as amended, to participate in field training for a period in excess of 15 days. Federal employees who serve as members of detachments authorized training periods in excess of 15 days, must take annual leave or leave without pay for the time in excess of 15 days.

5. The provisions of the above paragraph will apply to Air Technicians and Accounting Clerks who are members of the Maine Air National Guard. Such accounting clerks and air technicians will attend field training in their military status and not as civilian employees unless specifically authorized by the Chief, National Guard Bureau. Military leave of these employees will be computed on the basis of 15 consecutive days except: Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays will not be counted unless they are preceded and followed by a normal working day chargeable to military leave.

## SECTION II

6. DETACHMENTS. The following Detachments are authorized:

a. CAMP SUPPLY. A Camp Supply Detachment consisting of one officer and five enlisted men is authorized for not to exceed 21 days, i. e., five days in advance, 15 days duty with main body and one day in rear. Camp Supply Detachment will be paid on a detachment payroll for the *entire period of service as such*. On unit payrolls, the names of the personnel assigned to the camp supply detachment will be shown in the proper place on the rolls, and opposite each absentee's name the notation, "Paid on payroll of Camp Supply Detachment," will be entered in column of remarks.

b. ADVANCE. An advance detachment consisting of two officers and seven enlisted men is authorized for not to exceed four days. Personnel will be paid on an advance detachment payroll. The unit to which each individual belongs will be clearly shown in the body of the roll. Attention is specifically invited to the fact that the personnel of this detachment will be paid for the period of the encampment proper in the *regular rolls of their units*. The detachment roll covers only the period of additional duty as members of the advance detachment.

c. PRE-CAMP TRAINING DETACHMENT. *Food Service Personnel*. A school at the field training site for food service personnel, immediately prior to the field training period, is authorized for not to exceed four days. Two (2) Unit Food Service Supervisors and four (4) airmen each from Hq., Detachment 201st Fighter Group, 132 Fighter Squadron, Headquarters Detachment 201st Air Service Group and Detachment A, 201st Air Service Group are authorized to attend. Only airmen assigned to T/O & E positions as food service personnel will be detailed for this school. The detachment will be paid on a detachment roll in the same manner as for the advance detachment.

d. Rear Detachments and Motor Convoy Detachments are *not* authorized.

## SECTION III

7. COMMAND. COLONEL PHILIP E. TUKEY, JR., O 393 591, 101st Fighter Group, Headquarters, Maine Air National Guard, is designated Commanding Officer of Troops for the field training period. Acting in such capacity, the Commanding Officer of Troops will coordinate with the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine; all matter relating to supply, hospitalization and evacuation prior to and during the field training period. Direct correspondence is authorized.

## SECTION IV

8. MOBILIZATION. Units will mobilize at home armories in accordance with schedules published by the Commanding Officer of Troops.

## SECTION V

9. MOVEMENT. Movement from home stations to DOW FIELD, Bangor, Maine, will be made by motor vehicle and government aircraft, in accordance with instructions published by the Commanding Officer of Troops, after coordination with the U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine.

## SECTION VI

### 10. ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTIONS.

a. The United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine is designated National Guard Contracting Officer and Transportation Officer for the field training period.

b. Prior to 17 July 1950, the Commanding Officer of Troops will publish and distribute to all concerned an administrative order covering the period 25 July to 12 August 1950, incorporating therein all necessary administrative details.

c. On 21 August 1950, the Commanding Officer of Troops will submit a written report to The Adjutant General, Maine, showing the number of Officers, Warrant Officers, and Airman who trained under his command, either during the whole or any part of the field training period. This report will include recommendations which may be utilized in the conduct of future field training camps.

d. No officer, Warrant Officer or Airman will be excused from field training except under the gravest circumstances. In any such case, express authority must be granted by The Adjutant General, Maine. Such application will be forwarded through channels accompanied by a complete sworn statement of circumstances, affidavit or medical certificate in order to be considered and must be submitted sufficiently in advance for any necessary action.

e. Prior to departure from home stations, and upon arrival at camp, the provisions of paragraph 4 and 5, NGR 62, will be complied with.

f. No officer, warrant officer or airman of the Maine Air National Guard, other than the Contracting Officer designated in these General Orders, will contract for or purchase any supplies of any nature, or contract for any service involving the obligation of Federal or State funds. Individuals violating these instructions will be held responsible.

## SECTION VII

### 11. PAY AND ALLOWANCES.

a. Each officer, warrant officer and airman in attendance during the field training period will receive the same pay and allowances as an officer, warrant officer or airman of the same grade in the United States Air Force.

b. Finance Officer, U. S. Air Force, Otis Air Force Base, Falmouth, Massachusetts has been designated by the Chief of Finance to compute payrolls and pay unit commanders.

c. Units will prepare field training payrolls prior to departure for field training. Every officer, warrant officer and airman assigned to the unit will be listed in the payroll. One *extra* copy will be prepared, and *all copies* will be submitted to the United States Property and Disbursing Officer, for Maine, at Dow Air Force Base, prior to 1000 hours 30 July 1950 for editing. Payroll blank forms will be furnished all units automatically, hence requisition therefor will not be required.

d. Immediately upon arrival at the field training site each detachment will prepare its payroll and submit same in quadruplicate to the Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine, or his representative at the camp.

e. All National Guard Officers, with or without dependents, receive rental and subsistence allowances for the field training period. Airman of grades E4 (7 or more years of service), E-5, E-6, or E-7 who are married, or who have authorized dependents, receive quarters allowances. Rental and quarters allowances are payable from the time of departure for and until arrival at home from training camp, regardless of travel time.

f. Per diem is not payable to members of the Maine Air National Guard during the scheduled field training period except that per diem is authorized for Air National Guard personnel when ordered to a TDY location from encampment when authorized by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau and ordered by the Commanding Officer of Troops.

## SECTION VIII

12. SUBSISTENCE. The provisions of AFR 67-27 dated 19 August 1949 will apply in obtaining subsistence. The following rations are prescribed and the actual cost is allowable, not to exceed the figure indicated below

Camp Ration	\$1.00
Travel Ration	2.25
Hospital Ration (See AR 40-590)	

- a. The commanding Officer of Troops is authorized to operate a consolidated mess.
- b. Reimbursement procedures will be as prescribed in NGB Circular No. 10 (18 March 1948), *as amended*. Collections from members of the National Guard will be by pay roll deductions.
- c. Officers will be charged \$1.10 per day. On a day during which an officer consumes only one meal he will be required to pay only one-third of \$1.10 or \$0.37. However, when two meals or more are consumed, he will be required to pay the full price of \$1.10.
- d. Special orders authorizing the movement will include the following statement "Messing facilities not being available, enlisted personnel covered by this order are authorized to procure meals on a credit basis at not to exceed seventy-five cents (\$0.75) per meal."
- e. The Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine, will purchase all subsistence and will coordinate all matters pertaining thereto.

## SECTION IX

### 13. TRAINING

- a. Based upon the Field Training Program approved by the Commanding General First Air Force, the Commanding Officer of Troops will initiate and issue appropriate training directives.
- b. The Commanding Officer of Troops will advise this headquarters not later than 17 July 1950 as to the sufficiency of mess personnel available for the camp period.
- c. Instructions of the Chief of the National Guard Bureau provide that maximum use will be made of all Government-owned vehicles to transport personnel, equipment and impedimenta to and from field training. For this reason, it will be necessary to pool transportation. Commanding Officer of Troops will issue appropriate regulations to enforce this directive.
- d. The following regulations should be on file in each unit. If not, requisition for missing copies will be submitted to the United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine, at this headquarters:

- e. Processing of claims for loss of or damage to private property incident to field training activities will be as prescribed in NGB Circular No. 12 (17 April 1950).

## SECTION X

### 14. MISCELLANEOUS

a. Travel to and from camp will be conducted as a troop movement insofar as practicable through the use of Government motor vehicles and aircraft.

b. Motor fuel allowances for training purposes will be determined by the number of authorized vehicles actually used in training, and not by the number of vehicles authorized by T/O & E for units.

c. Unit commanders are authorized to prescribe a total of 30 flying hours for each T/O & E pilot who will participate in field training. Non-T/O & E pilots may be authorized to fly on appropriate percent of their authorized flying time provided this does not interfere with the training of T/O & E pilots.

b. **MEDICAL SERVICE.** The Commanding Officer of Troops will charge the Senior Air Surgeon of the field training camp with responsibility for preparation and execution of a plan for the medical care of personnel attending the camp. Subject plan will be submitted to this Headquarters on 10 July 1950 for approval. That portion of the plan pertaining to Line of Duty Investigations will conform to the provisions of paragraphs 13 and 14, AGO-ME, MEMORANDUM NO. 62, dated 14 June 1950.

c. The Acting U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Maine, will perform all necessary contracting in connection with field training requirements for commercial communication service.

f. **SPECIAL SERVICE ACTIVITIES.** The Commanding Officer of Troops, acting for the Adjutant General, Maine, will arrange for post exchange service. Funds allotted by the National Guard Bureau will not be utilized for special service activities of any kind.
