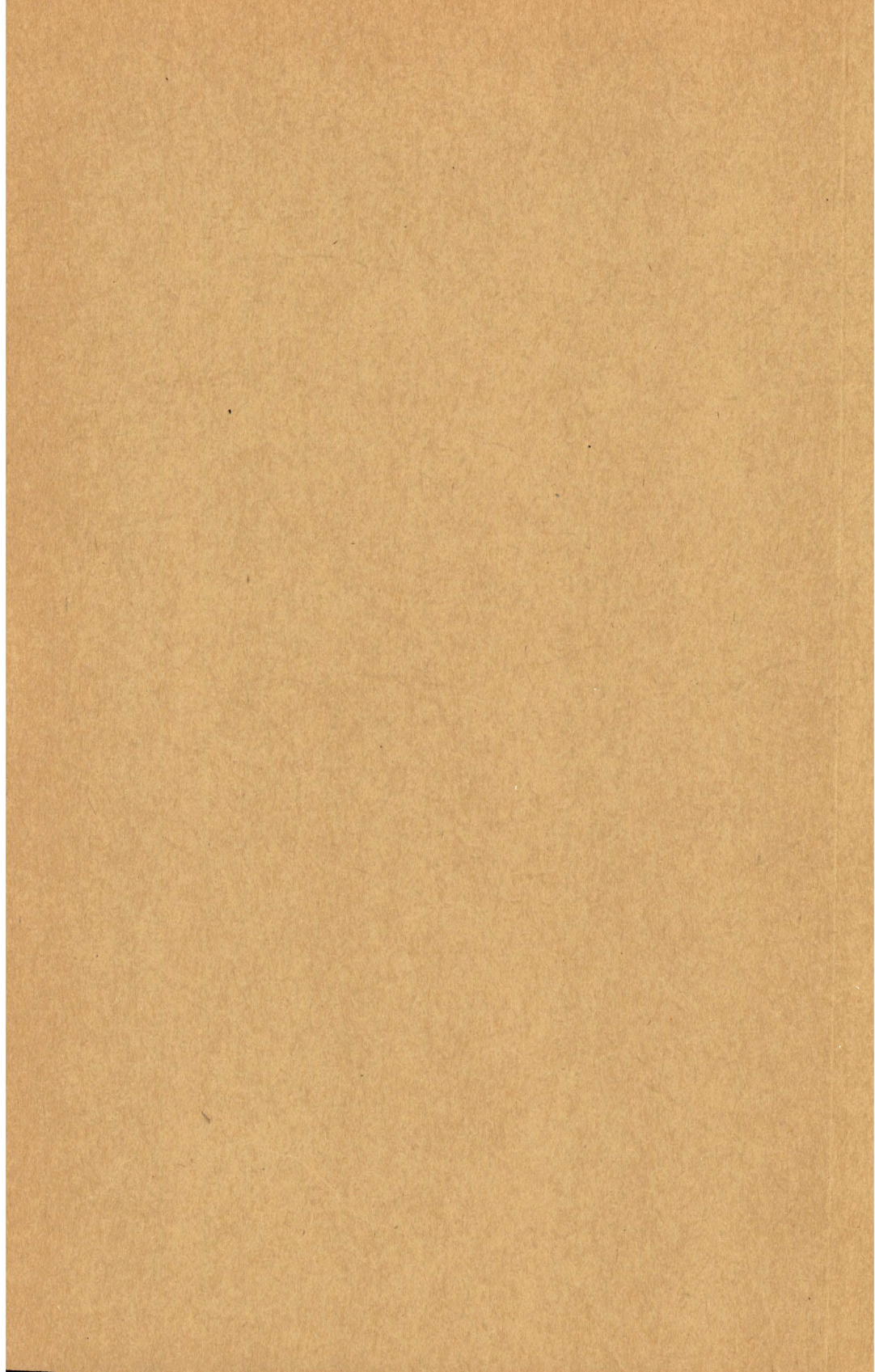

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THE ARMORY PROGRAM

It has been the hope and expectation of The Adjutant General that a full-sized program for the construction and renovation of armories might have been put into effect, but the financial condition of the State and declination of the Legislature to authorize the required funds forced a postponement of the program. Extensive plans with the Federal Government had been set up with a view to providing armories in all those sections where they are so badly needed. A resolve was presented to the 95th Legislature by the Maine Military Defense Commission which would have provided \$150,000 each year of the succeeding bienium. This appropriation would match funds authorized by the Federal Facilities Act of 1950 as passed by the Congress. These funds would be for new construction with the Federal Government providing seventy-five cents for each twenty-five cents matching appropriation by the State government, or for the implementation of work on any existing structures.

TOURS OF FIELD TRAINING

As required by the Department of Defense, Annual Field Training was participated in by all units of the Maine Army and Maine Air National Guard with the exception of the 703rd AAA Gun Battalion and the 354th Signal Radar Maintenance Unit, for both of whom field training was cancelled because of their impending induction into active Federal service. Other units of the Maine Army and Maine Air National Guard held their periods of field training as follows:

The training in all cases was productive of the best results. The men entered upon their duties with enthusiasm and the completion of the field training brought back home a better and more understanding National Guard, both Army and Air.

It is no exaggeration to say that the past year has been strongly reminiscent of the days of April 1917, September 1940 and February 1941. Maine National Guardsmen have been called to the colors, not in as large numbers as on previous occasions, but still the total officers and enlisted men directly placed on active Federal duty was 1314 which is a very sizeable bite into the population of the State.

The transferring of these officers and men to active duty was accomplished easily and free from excitement. This transfer to Federal duty really was performed in two distinct steps: Orders alerting certain units and subsequent orders completing the actual induction. In addition to that sizeable detachments were transferred to active duty several weeks before the main bodies of troops were to go to their assembly points. The information gained by the advance detachments and the duties they were able to perform added much to the smoothness of the transfer to active duty.

ATTENDANCE AT SERVICE SCHOOLS

That the officers and men of the Maine National Guard, both Army and Air, are determined that they will be fully informed as to what their jobs as soldiers mean is evidenced by the large number of Pine Tree State Soldiers who attended service schools throughout the country.

In all, these members of the Maine National Guard attended 26 different service schools in all parts of the country, from the ocean-swept coast of New Jersey to the high altitudes of Colorado. Some as far away as Texas, Wyoming, Oklahoma, and California. Enrolled in these schools were 65 commissioned officers and warrant officers, and 211 enlisted men. This constitutes a sizable representation, especially since these "students" were called upon to take time out of their busy lives to go away for military instruction. The sessions ran all the way from three weeks to nine months. Every conceivable subject was featured, and some forts where the classes were held had several specialities which they stressed.

**ACTIVITIES OF 7C3D AAA GUN BN SINCE INDUCTION
INTO FEDERAL SERVICE ON 14 AUGUST 1950**

1. Pursuant to General Order 54, Headquarters First Army, dated 28 July 1950, the 703d AAA Gun Battalion and attached 354th Signal Radar Maintenance Unit were ordered to active duty effective 14 August 1950 at the home station of the individual units, namely:

Headquarters & Headquarters Battery	South Portland
Medical Detachment	South Portland

2. Units remained at home station until 25 August 1950 at which time they were relieved from assignment to First Army and assigned to the Third Army with station at Camp Gordon, Georgia. The 703d was assigned to the 197th AAA Group of the 51st AAA Brigade.

3. Training at Camp Gordon was conducted in accordance with an interim training program. This consisted chiefly of physical conditioning, and procurement of clothing and equipment for individuals and units, and getting readjusted to Army life. Untrained fillers were received during this period direct from reception centers which brought the Battalion strength well over the authorized reduced strength figure.

4. Departed Camp Gordon 0740, 9 October 1950, and arrived Camp Stewart, Georgia, 1430, 9 October 1950. PCS. Travel by Truck Convoy.

5. Upon arrival at Camp Stewart, the Battalion immediately went under Army Training Program 44-310. This program included review of basic subjects, familiarization with all weapons, four (4) 90 mm service practices, field artillery firing, and anti-mech firing. During the training period, the Battalion was engaged in doing its share in renovating Camp Stewart. At the end of the training period, we received the Army Field Forces training test and upon passing was declared ready for mission assignment.

a. See Commendation attached.

b. The Army Field Forces Test consisted of three phases: tactical, detection, and firing.

6. It might be noted that the first thirteen (13) weeks of the training program is now common to all arms and services.

7. During the training period we were constantly levied for assignments to other units, many of which were scheduled for overseas service. Practically 100 percent of the officers have pursued courses at service schools. We have had as many as fifteen (15) officers on detached service to service schools at one time. This presented considerable difficulty in carrying on our Training Program.

8. As of this writing, we have received notification of only one of our National Guardsmen being killed in action in Korea. Pvt.-2 Robert E.

Hallowell, RA 11 170 872, left this organization as a Medical Corpsman, and it is believed he was performing that duty when killed.

9. Although the Battalion was authorized only 559 enlisted men under the reduced TO&R, additional fillers from Fort Devens, Massachusetts; Fort Dix, New Jersey; Fort Jackson, South Carolina; Fort Custer, Michigan; and Fort Sill, Oklahoma, were received for training which increased our strength to a figure of 905 enlisted men which was maintained until this unit departed for Fort Hancock with a strength of 615 enlisted men. This strength represented the reduced TO&E plus 10 percent overage.

10. A change of orders during the last four (4) weeks of our tour of duty at Camp Stewart directed us to Fort Hancock, New Jersey. The advance party of four (4) officers and fifty (50) enlisted men departed Camp Stewart 6 June 1951 and the main body departed by rail 15 June 1951.

11. In May 1951, the Battalion was honored by a visit from Brigadier General George M. Carter, Adjutant General, State of Maine, who appeared well pleased with the state of training.

12. During the training and firing phases at Camp Stewart, the 703d was always among the leaders. The 703d ranked second amongst fourteen (14) battalions on the all-important AFF test.

EXTENSION OF ENLISTMENT AND REENLISTMENT

DEATH OF BRIGADIER GENERAL JOHN WESTON HEALY, RET.

It is with the deepest regret and sorrow that The Adjutant General announces the death of BRIGADIER GENERAL JOHN WESTON HEALY, RETIRED, which occurred at his home Tuesday night, 2 January 1951. General Healy appeared in the best of health when he left his office in The Adjutant General's Department Tuesday afternoon. He was stricken with a heart attack about midnight and died almost instantly.

General Healy was Plans and Training Officer of The Adjutant General's Department. Few National Guard officers have had the broad and intimate knowledge of military affairs possessed by General Healy, qualities that made him a most valuable member of the State Military Establishment.

General Healy had a long and honorable career both in civil and military life. He had been sheriff of Somerset County, Chief of the State Police and Superintendent of Public Buildings at the State House. He had also served with the State Purchasing Department.

The above authorization will result in a change in the troop basis for the State of Maine Air National Guard from present strength of 146 officers, 1 warrant officer, 844 airmen, aggregate of 991; to 179 officers, 1 warrant officer, 1170 airmen, aggregate of 1350. The new strength reflects the reduction of 9 officers and 276 airmen presently included in the elements of the augmented fighter squadron. DEATH OF BRIGADIER GENERAL GEORGE McL PRESSON, RET.

The Adjutant General of Maine with the deepest sorrow announces the death of BRIGADIER GENERAL GEORGE McL PRESSON, RETIRED, which occurred Tuesday 17 April 1951 in Farmington, Maine. His passing was the culmination of a long and painful illness. General Presson was 85 years of age, and of that long life 37 years was devoted to service with the military department of the State of Maine and the United States. These activities and interest continued even after his retirement. General Presson was placed on the retired list of Maine on 2 July 1938 with the rank of Brigadier General.

II. ATTENDANCE. Criteria for attendance of units for field training, Calendar Year 1951, will be as set forth in Section III, National Guard Regulations No. 45, dated 30 November 1946.

1. No enlisted man will be authorized field training other than with and during the period approved for, his unit, Paragraph 35, National Guard Regulations No. 45 will apply in the case of officers and warrant officers.

2. Officers not federally recognized may attend field training with their unit. Names of such officers will be entered on the Morning Report and on the Field Training Payroll with the following notation "Federal Recognition Not Received. No Pay Claimed At This Time." Upon receipt of Federal recognition, and if recognition date includes any portion of the time that officer attended field training, a supplemental payroll may be processed for such officers and payment made. Travel pay may be claimed only for travel performed on and after date of Federal recognition.

3. Training Authority issued by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau does not authorize any temporary or permanent Federal employee who belongs to the National Guard of the State of Maine and who comes within the provisions of Section 80, National Defense Act, as amended, to participate in field training for a period in excess of 15 days. Federal employees who are members of the Advance and/or Rear Detachments, or Motor Convoy Detachments must take annual leave or leave without pay for such time in excess of 15 days.

4. The provisions of paragraph 3 above will apply to all administrative assistants, caretakers, and accounting clerks who are members of the National Guard of the State of Maine. Such personnel will attend field training in their military capacity and not as civilian employees, unless specifically authorized by this office.

5. Advance, Rear, and Motor Convoy Detachments are authorized. Instructions pertaining to strength, composition, and length of tour of duty will be announced by this Headquarters at a later date.

III. COMMAND

1. By direction of the Governor, COLONEL LESTER E. BROWN, Infantry, O 164 910 is designated Commander of Troops, Maine Army National Guard, PINE CAMP, NEW YORK.

2. By direction of the Governor, LIEUTENANT COLONEL EDWIN W. HEYWOOD, Artillery, O384274, is designated Commander of Troops, Maine Army National Guard, CAMP WELLFLEET, MASSACHUSETTS.

3. Commanders of Advance, Rear and Motor Convoy Detachments will be named in Special Orders at a later date.

IV. MOBILIZATION. Units will mobilize at home armories in accordance with schedules to be published by this Headquarters at a later date.

V. MOVEMENT. Movement from home stations to PINE CAMP, NEW YORK and CAMP WELLFLEET, MASSACHUSETTS, and return to home stations will be performed by Government Motor Vehicle, bus and rail.

1. All personnel of Advance, Rear, and Motor Convoy Detachments will move to and from the field training site by Government Motor Vehicle.

2. Personnel other than that assigned as above will move to and from the field training site by bus and rail.

3. This Headquarters will publish directives governing the movement of units and detachments.

4. The use of private automobiles, with or without reimbursement, for travel to and from field training is not authorized.

5. Travel to and from the field training sites will be conducted as troop movements.

6. Regardless of travel means employed, the amount of equipment and impedimenta transported to and from field training will be limited strictly to **training essentials**, to include athletic equipment but not day room furniture and equipment.

VI. TRAINING

1. The field training program (NGTP Schedule), approved by the Commanding General, New England Subarea and by the Commanding General, First Army, will be published and distributed by this Headquarters. Based thereon, Commanders of Troops will initiate and issue appropriate Training Directives.

2. Pre-Camp Mess Schools of 4-days duration at the field training site for mess personnel, immediately prior to the field training period, are authorized. A maximum of two (2) enlisted men for each company or similar units having Tables of Organization assigned mess personnel, may attend. Mess personnel, other than those assigned in Service Company, 103d Infantry, will not be included in the Advance, Rear, or Motor Convoy Detachments. Travel time is in addition to training time.

VII. MISCELLANEOUS

1. Commanding Officer, 103rd Regimental Combat Team will detail two (2) officers and one (1) enlisted man for duty as follows:

(a) One (1) officer of field grade rank to serve during the period of the Pre-Camp Mess Schools and the period of the encampment at PINE CAMP, NEW YORK, as Food Service Supervisor. Duties will be prescribed in directives to be published by this Headquarters at a later date.

(b) One (1) officer of company grade and one (1) non-commissioned officer to serve during the period of the Pre-Camp Mess School at PINE CAMP, NEW YORK, only, as Pre-Camp Mess School Detachment Administration Personnel.

2. Insofar as practicable, each unit authorized field ranges and mess equipment under Tables of Organization and Equipment, will operate a unit mess. Commanders of Troops are authorized to attached units not authorized such equipment to appropriate unit messes.

3. The United States Property and Disbursing Officer for Maine is designated National Guard CONTRACTING OFFICER and TRANSPORTATION OFFICER for the field training periods.

4. Maximum use of Government Motor Vehicles will be made to transport military equipment and supplies. Essentially, all such property will be transported to and from field training sites by truck. Details will be published by this Headquarters at a later date.

5. Liaison type aircraft will be taken to camp.

OBSERVANCE OF MEMORIAL DAY

The Far East has become the Near East so far as the safety of the United States is concerned. Those who are in high position of government regard the whole situation as explosive. A single incident might very well precipitate the United States and the whole world into a war so devastating the real victory could not rest with either side in the universal conflict.

Leaders in government declare there is no war in Korea. True it is there has been no formal declaration but hostilities are just as bitter as if there had been an open severance of relations. The thousands of American lads who have been killed, wounded or missing speak only too well of the horrible struggle that has see-sawed back and forth since its beginning in June 1950.

Memorial Day has an added significance this year. To the honored memory of the thousands who died in previous wars must be added to the names of those American youths who have given up their lives in the "Korean situation."

Many agree that never has the fate of the United States been so uncertain as it is at present. Tremendous forces across the seas are prepared for a war that some hope may be averted but which many think must embroil the whole world. Working their way into the very fabric of American social, political and economic life are other forces which because of their subversive activities are even more dangerous than the open foe.

Momentous as are the potentialities in the present situation, it is still a duty of all to pay their profound respect to the memory of those who lost their lives in the defense of their country or who though surviving the depredations of war have since passed on. With this tribute to the heroes of the land must go a re-dedication of ourselves that this country and all that for which it stands must be preserved.

As a tribute to those thousands of men and women of Maine who have given their lives that this nation may endure, it is hereby directed that the National Flag be displayed at half staff on all armories from sunrise until midday Wednesday, 30 May 1951, eastern daylight time. At noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the staff and remain there until sunset.

To assist in the proper observance of the day, Commanding Officers of all Maine National Guard units are authorized to place themselves and their commands at the disposal of the various veterans' organizations and societies and local officials on this day and to render every assistance possible. Participation of National Guard troops in appropriate ceremonies may be counted as a regular drill provided all requirements as to attendance and time of service be observed as specified for regular armory drills. All organizations participating in the observance of the day will report the fact to The Adjutant General at least three days before Memorial Day.

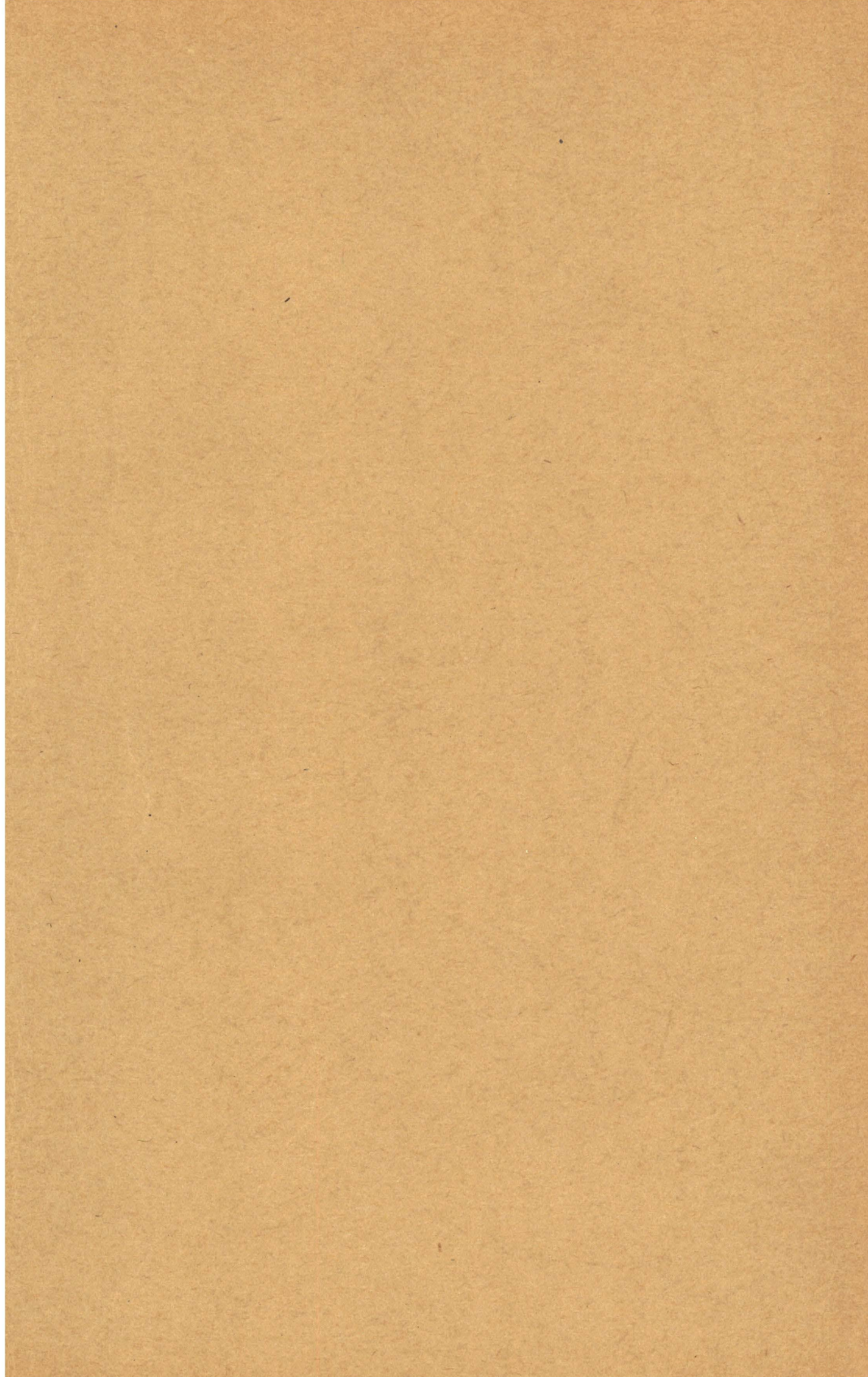

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ADJUTANT GENERAL
FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30 JUNE 1952

For the period of this report it would seem that the Maine Army and Air National Guard were coming back into a full strength unit as far as the authorized number of units is concerned. The following facts are presented:

a. The 703rd AAA Gun Battalion which reported for active service 14 August 1950 had been returned to State control as a unit effective 14 April 1952.

b. Word had been received that the 101st Fighter Interceptor Wing would be reorganized in the State of Maine when the personnel of the 101st Fighter Interceptor Wing were released as individuals to state control effective 1 November 1952.

The 703rd AAA Gun Battalion having moved through the training camps at Camp Stewart, Georgia and Camp Gordon, Georgia, the battalion moved to an assignment in the anti-aircraft defenses of the United States with station at Fort Hancock, New Jersey. Reports received at this office indicated that the efficiency of the unit was of an excellent character. The unit was returned to State of Maine control as a unit for the express purpose of having a nucleus of trained officer and enlisted personnel available in the event of an emergency required with regard to air defense. The unit returned to home stations indicated with the following officer and enlisted strength:

At the time that this report is being prepared the unit is well organized as to administration and training. Equipment will be available in the very near future.

Air Base Flight "E" formed after the units of the 101st Fighter-Interceptor Wing were called to active military service effective 1 February 1951, was attached to Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Maine Army National Guard. Strength of this unit was two (2) officers, and three (3) airmen, station at Dow Field Air Force Base, Bangor, Maine, Lt. Douglas B. Gould, Commanding.

Pursuant to authority contained in letter NGB Subject: "Authorization for Headquarters, Maine Air National Guard," dated 31 August 1951, and with the concurrence of the Governor, State of Maine, Headquarters,

Maine Air National Guard was organized effective 19 March 1952, with station at Camp Keyes, Augusta, Maine (General Orders No. 5). Initial strength of this unit was three (3) officers, seven (7) airmen, Major Raymond A. Fortin, Commanding. Air Base Flight "E" was attached to this unit with no change in station, authorization, or mission.

In anticipation of the return of all units of the 101st Fighter-Interceptor Wing to State Control, the National Guard Bureau authorized the formation of the 8132d Air Base Squadron, with station at Dow Air Force Base, Bangor, Maine, effective 1 May 1952. Concurrent with organization of the 8132nd Air Base Squadron, authorization for Air Base Flight "E" was withdrawn, and personnel and equipment were transferred to the 8132nd Air Base Squadron. Initial strength of this unit was two (2) officers, five (5) airmen, Lt. Douglas B. Gould, Commanding. The assigned mission of the 8132nd Air Base Squadron was as follows:

1. To provide a vehicle for recruiting personnel for assignment to units of the 101st Fighter-Interceptor Wing.
2. To receive, maintain, and store such supplies and equipment as become available for assignment to the Wing units upon their return.
3. To provide continuous military training of personnel assigned.
4. To maintain necessary records and administration.
5. To provide a ready crew to fly aircraft assigned.

Early in May 1952, personnel of the Maine Air National Guard on active military service began to return to state control. Personnel were assigned to either T/O&E position vacancies in the 8132nd Air Base Squadron, or to Headquarters Maine Air National Guard in excess of T/O&E, as authorized by existing Air National Guard Regulations.

The total strength of the Maine Air National Guard as of 30 June 1952 was as follows:

1. By direction of the President, under authority conferred by the Universal Military Training and Service Act, as amended by Public Law 51,

82d Congress (AF Bul 28, 1951), the following unit and members thereof of the Air National Guard of the United States (with the exception of personnel granted delays in reporting by the adjutant general, State of Maine, under the provisions of ANGR 35-83, 8 February 1951, who will be ordered into the active military service individually by the Commanding General, Continental Air Command) are ordered into the active military service of the United States, effective 1 September 1951, to serve therein for a period of twenty-four (24) consecutive months, or such other periods as may be authorized by law, unless sooner relieved:

The unit listed above is assigned to the Continental Air Command, effective 1 September 1951.

2. All persons so ordered into the active military service of the United States, from the effective date indicated above, are relieved from duty in the Air National Guard of Maine, so long as they shall remain in the active military service of the United States, and during such time shall be subject to such laws and regulations for the government of the Air Force of the United States as may be applicable to members of the Air Force whose permanent retention in the active military service is not contemplated by law.

3. By direction of the President, each officer and warrant officer of the Air National Guard, appointed in the Air National Guard, who shall have been federally recognized or examined and found qualified for Federal recognition by a duly constituted board of officers, and shall have been assigned to a unit ordered to active duty under this order prior to the effective date of entry into the active military service, who does not hold an appointment in the Air National Guard of the United States in the same grade in which he has been recently examined and found qualified for Federal recognition by a duly constituted board of officers, is hereby tendered appointment in the Air National Guard of the United States in the same grade in which he shall have been most recently federally recognized or examined and found qualified for Federal recognition. If an officer or warrant officer is tendered an appointment in a higher grade based on examination and board action and such board action subsequently is found to be in error, the officer or warrant officer concerned will revert to his former grade in which Federal Recognition had been granted. The provisions of paragraphs 10b and 49a (3), AFR 45-51, 15 September 1950, will be complied with for each person so appointed.

4. Separate letter requests for assignment of service numbers will be forwarded to Director of Training, Headquarters USAF, ATTENTION: Personnel Procurement Division, Washington 25, D. C., except that if the person is a former officer of the Army or the Air Force, the service number previously assigned to him will be used and entered on all records.

5. Individual and organizational supplies and equipment now on hand will accompany the unit upon entry into the active military service. (See section V, AFR 45-51.)

6. The Commanding General, Continental Air Command, is authorized to order to active duty (not extended active duty) individual members of the above alerted Air National Guard unit, with their consent at any time prior to the effective date their unit is ordered into active military service, provided the concurrence of the unit commander and the State adjutant general is obtained. The period of active duty for the personnel concerned will be terminated on the day preceding the effective date their respective unit is ordered into the active military service.

7. This authority is delegated to Commanding General, Continental Air Command, to expedite the mobilization of the Air National Guard unit by ordering certain key personnel to duty prior to the mobilization date of the unit.

8. Direct communication is authorized between the Commanding General, Continental Air Command, and the Governor of the State of Maine.

9. The provisions of AFR 45-51, and current letters of instruction in connection therewith, will be complied with.

10. The Commanding General, Continental Air Command, will issue the General Orders confirming the ordering into the active military service of the unit listed in paragraph 1.

1. By Direction of the President, under authority conferred by the Universal Military Training and Service Act, as amended by Public Law 51, 82d Congress (AF Bulletin 28, 1951), the following units and members thereof of the Air National Guard of the United States (with the exception

of personnel granted delays in reporting by the Adjutant Generals, States of Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, and Maine, under the provisions of Air National Guard Regulation 35-83, 8 February 1951, who will be ordered into the active military service individually by the Commanding General, Headquarters First Air Force) are ordered into the active military service of the United States, effective 1 September 1951, to serve therein for a period of twenty-four (24) consecutive months or such other period as may be authorized by law, unless sooner relieved.

2. **Assignment:** Concurrent with action directed above, units are assigned to First Air Force. The operational control of the above units is visited in Headquarters Tactical Air Command. Effective 1 September 1951, the 101st Radar Calibration Detachment is relieved from assignment to the 151st Aircraft Control and Warning Group, and is subsequently attached to the 151st Aircraft Control and Warning Group for administration and logistical support.

3. **Appointments:** By Direction of the President, each officer and warrant officer of the Air National Guard, appointed in the Air National Guard, who shall have been federally recognized or examined and found qualified for Federal recognition by a duly constituted board of officers, and who shall have been assigned to a unit ordered to active duty under

this order prior to the effective date of entry into the active military service, who does not hold an appointment in the Air National Guard of the United States in the same grade in which he has been most recently examined and found qualified for Federal recognition by a duly constituted board of officers, is hereby tendered appointment in the Air National Guard of the United States in the same grade in which he shall have been most recently federally recognized or examined and found qualified for Federal recognition. If an officer or warrant officer is tendered an appointment in a higher grade based on examination and board action, and such board action subsequently is found to be in error, the officer or warrant officer concerned will revert to his former grade in which Federal recognition had been granted. The provisions of paragraphs 10b and 49a (3), Air Force Regulation 45-51, 15 September 1950, as amended, will be complied with for each person so appointed.

4. **Equipment:** Units are ordered to active military service under Tables of Organization and Equipment listed above as currently modified by orders of the State Adjutant Generals concerned under authority granted by the Department of the Army and Air Force, National Guard Bureau, and as further implemented by instructions from the recipient command. Instructions for supply of radar equipment for Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons is contained in letter, NG-AFNC, subject: "Supply of Radar Equipment for Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons," 20 March 1951, which was furnished the State Adjutant Generals by the National Guard Bureau. Individual and organizational supplies and equipment now on hand, or in storage for the units, will accompany units upon entry into the active military service. The provisions of Sections IV and V, Air Force Regulation 45-51, 15 September 1950, as amended, will apply.

5. **Funding:** Available funds as required will be obligated in accordance with Air Force Manual 17 2 - 1, June 1949, as amended, and/or Section VII, Air Force Regulation 45-51, as amended.

6. **Morning Reports:** By Direction of the President, authority has been delegated to this headquarters, and by this headquarters to certain units of this command, to order into active duty (not extended active duty) such individual members of the above alerted Air National Guard units with their consent at any time within sixty (60) days prior to 1 September 1951, provided that the concurrence of the unit commander and the Adjutant General of the states concerned is obtained. The period of active duty for the personnel concerned will be terminated on the day preceding the effective date their representative units are ordered into the active military service. The provisions of paragraphs 3, 6 and 7 of this directive are applicable to individuals so ordered. The Air Force morning reports (AF Form 183) **will not** be prepared for those individual members ordered to active duty in advance of the alerted Air National Guard units. These individual members will be gained initially on the Air Force morning report prepared on the effective date of active military service of the alerted Air National Guard unit. Initial morning report will be accomplished in accordance with the provisions of Air Force Manual 171-6, June 1950, as amended.

7. **Orders:** Upon entry into active military service, unit commander will publish Special Orders announcing the entry of individual members of the units into active military service in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 1, above. The provisions of Air Force Regulation 45-51, 15 September 1950, as amended, and such other administrative directives as may be issued by competent authority apply.

8. **Personnel:** All persons so ordered into the active military service of the United States, from the effective date indicated above, are relieved from duty in the Air National Guard of the states concerned, so long as they shall remain in the active military service of the United States, and during such time shall be subject to such laws and regulations for the government of the Air Force of the United States as may be applicable to members of the Air Force whose permanent retention in the active military service is not contemplated by law. (Separate letter requests for assignment of service numbers will be forwarded to Director of Training, Headquarters USAF, Attention: Personnel Procurement Division, Washington 25, D. C., except that if the person is a former officer of the Army or the Air Force, the service number previously assigned to him will be used and entered on all records.)

9. **Publicity:** After official orders are received, the individual unit commander is authorized to make an announcement that his unit has been ordered into active military service. However, information released at local level should be confined to a reply to query basis whenever practicable. The following restrictions apply:

- (3) Equipment Involved

- (1) Designation of Unit
- (2) Date of Entry into Active Military Service

10. **Reports:** Upon completion of action directed by paragraph 1, above, a report showing effective date and type of action will be forwarded to this headquarters, Attention: Director of Statistical Services, to arrive within twenty-four (24) hours after effective date. Format of this notification will be in accordance with Continental Air Command Letter 15-10, 13 May 1949, (RCS: AF-SC-02).

104TH AIRCRAFT CONTROL AND WARNING SQUADRON

The 104th AC & W Squadron, Maine Air National Guard, with situation at Fort Preble, Maine, was ordered into active military service of the United States, effective 1 September 1951, to serve for a period of twenty-four executive months. The unit was assigned to the Continental Air Command, effective upon its date of entry into active military service. There were 16 officers and 156 airmen in the unit at the time of induction. Brigadier General George M. Carter, The Adjutant General, and Lt. Col. Edwin W. Heywood, Commanding Officer, 240th AAA Group, attended ceremonies in connection with mobilization of the 104th AC & W Squadron at Fort Preble on 1 September 1951.

Preceded by an advanced detachment, this unit departed Fort Preble on 25 September 1951 and reported to Camp Edwards, Massachusetts, where it became a part of the AC & W Group.

While at Camp Edwards the unit went through the several phases of basic and advanced training applicable to a unit of this type. In February of 1952 the 104th AC & W Squadron was merged with the 102nd AC & W Squadron (Rhode Island) and the majority of the 104th personnel, both officers and airmen were absorbed into the 102nd.

In April of 1952, the 102nd AC & W Squadron was alerted and moved to an overseas destination where it has set up equipment in connection with their assigned mission.

Moral of officers and men, according to reports received at this office is very high.

ATTENDANCE AT SERVICE SCHOOLS

The following report reflects the attendance of officers and enlisted men, Maine Army and Air National Guard for the Fiscal Year 1952 and the type of schools attended.

In all, these members of the Maine National Guard attended twenty-one (21) service and area schools in nearly all parts of the United States. Enrolled in these schools, highly technical, were twenty-four (24) officers and one-hundred eighty-three (183) enlisted men. This constitutes a sizeable representation from the State of Maine. However, a much larger attendance would have been reported but for the reason of school funds in the National Guard Bureau, being frozen on one January 1952 with the result that approximately fifty applications were returned without action. The course at these schools varied in length from thirty (30) days to courses extended to nine (9) months. These schools stressed every phase of all types of weapons and equipment used in modern warfare, operations, maintenance and care.

PART I

RETIREMENT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL

COLONEL LESTER M. HART

Having attained the maximum age for State service and having been placed on the Retired List of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Section 6-A, Maine State Retirement System, Chapter 60 — Revised Statutes 1944 as amended, the following officer is relieved of his duties as Assistant Adjutant General, effective 31 October 1951:

COLONEL LESTER MELCHER HART

Colonel Lester Melcher Hart has enjoyed a fruitful life. To his regular profession he has devoted long and conscientious attention. But this has not prevented him from engaging in worth-while avocations that have enabled him to be prominent in the affairs of his church, fraternal organizations and the city of Augusta.

Born in Portland, Maine on October 2, 1881, Colonel Hart was the youngest son of William G. and Helen Marr Kemp Hart. He continued to reside in the Forest City until his removal to Augusta. He attended the public schools of Portland and graduated from the Portland High School in June, 1901, as an honor student. He was one of the winners of the Brown Memorial Scholarship Medals.

After some minor work, Colonel Hart on September 16, 1901, began newspaper work as a cub reporter on the old Portland Evening Advertiser, then the oldest daily in the city. His wages were five dollars a week. He became editor of the paper in 1907 and continued in that capacity until December, 1909, when the paper was sold. Colonel Hart was transferred to the Portland Daily Press as special writer, reporter and political writer. He left active newspaper work in December 1916 and became private secretary to Governor Carl E. Milliken, a position he held until January, 1921, when he became advertising manager of the Daily Kennebec Journal. He continued in this position until appointed Assistant Adjutant General of the State in October 1940.

Colonel Hart began his military career during World War I. At that time, Maine was authorized to raise an additional National Guard regiment. The Third Maine Infantry came into being and Colonel Hart enlisted as a Private in Company H, Third Maine on April 22, 1918, and was appointed a Captain in the Maine Quartermaster Corps on May 1, 1918, a position in which he was Federally Recognized on March 10, 1919. During this time he recruited, organized and trained the Maine Quartermaster Detachment. In the fall of 1922 the Quartermaster Detachment was disbanded and the members were transferred to a new unit: Headquarters Company, 86th Infantry Brigade, Maine National Guard. Colonel Hart recruited and trained this company until May 1925 when he was appointed Captain, Infantry and was assigned as Aide to the Commanding General of the then-being formed 43d Division. Promoted to Lieutenant Colonel in January 1930, he became Adjutant General of the 43d Division and continued to serve as such until formally placed on the retired list in February 1940 following his appointment as Assistant Adjutant General of Maine.

Colonel Hart has been active in fraternal circles, particularly in the Masonic bodies. He joined Ligonja Lodge No. 5, Independent Order of Odd Fellows (now united with Maine Lodge No. 1) in 1902 and became Noble Grand and Deputy Grand Master in that organization. He became a Master Mason in Deering Lodge, No. 183, F & AM on June 8, 1908. Night work prevented him from being active in Lodge work while in Portland but having decided to make Augusta his permanent home, Colonel Hart transferred his membership to Augusta Lodge, No. 141, F & AM in 1918 and became worshipful master of this organization in 1923. In the York Rite bodies, he served as high priest of Cushnoc Chapter No. 43, Royal Arch Masons in 1936, was prominent in ritualistic work of Alpha Council, No. 3, Royal and Select Masters and for fourteen years was prelate of Trinity Commandery, No. 7, Knight Templar. In the Scottish Rite bodies, Colonel Hart became a member of Kennebec Valley Lodge of Perfection, Augusta Council, Princes of Jerusalem, Emeth Chapter of Rose Croix and Maine Consistory, all in 1920, in the last of which he received his 32nd degree. He was honored with the 32nd degree at Boston on September 26, 1945. In the Scottish Rite bodies, he was for three years Thrice Potent Master of Kennebec Valley Lodge of Perfection and has been Grand Master of ceremonies of Maine Council of Deliberation since 1944.

In addition to the organizations mentioned above, Colonel Hart is a member of the Maine Order of High Priesthood and was for three years worthy patron of Rose of Sharon, Chapter No. 13, Order of the Eastern Star.

During the political campaigns of 1914 and 1916, Colonel Hart was loaned by the Portland Press to the Republican State committee. He had charge of the speakers and publicity on those occasions. He was legislative reporter for the Portland Press during the turbulent sessions of the Maine Legislature in 1913 and 1915.

Colonel Hart has found time to dabble in the writing of verse. Of the poems he has penned, "Maine" is the most popular and because of its wide distribution, especially as a "lesson" in the public schools, has gained much merited commendation.

As a member of the Winthrop Street Universalist Church in Augusta, this officer has been President of the Men's Club and was a number of years superintendent of the Sunday School.

Colonel Hart was a member of the Augusta City Council from Ward 6 in 1919-1920 and for six years a member of the Augusta Board of Education from June 1927 to June 1933. He was also President of the Cony Parent-Teacher Association.

On October 2, 1907, Colonel Hart married Marion Laura Matthews of Portland, the daughter of Captain Elbridge and Mrs. Florence Hodgdon Matthews. They have three sons: Elbridge Matthews, Byron Richard of Augusta and Wallace Kemp of Dixfield and five grandchildren: Roberta Kingsley, Gregory Matthews, Wayne Richard and Dwight Nathan, all of Augusta, and Carol Kingsley of Dixfield. Colonel and Mrs. Hart reside at 99 Stone Street, Augusta, Maine.

PART II

APPOINTMENT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL LIEUTENANT COLONEL EDWIN WESTON HEYWOOD

In accordance with the provisions of paragraph 10 of Section 12, Chapter 12, the Revised Statutes of Maine, the appointment of the following commissioned officer is hereby announced, effective 1 November 1951:

LIEUTENANT COLONEL EDWIN WESTON HEYWOOD

as

ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL

By authority of the Governor and Executive Council as enacted by Council Order Number 433, passed in regular session on September 19, 1951. Lieutenant Colonel Heywood is ordered to report for active duty as Assistant Adjutant General on October 1, 1951 and will participate in a month's training under the direction of the present incumbent.

Lieutenant Colonel Edwin Weston Heywood has had a most comprehensive and commendable career. Although but 34 years of age, he has credit for 17 years of military service.

This officer first enlisted as a Private in Headquarters Battery, 240th Coast Artillery, Maine National Guard, on January 12, 1934 and was made a private first class on June 26, 1937, a rating he held until appointed a Second Lieutenant, Coast Artillery Corps, July 19, 1939. He was successively made a First Lieutenant, Battery A, 240th Coast Artillery Corps September 29, 1940. Was inducted into Federal Service, World War II, on September 16, 1940. Promoted Captain, Battery C, 240th Coast Artillery Corps, December 9, 1942, Major, Headquarters, 120th Anti-Aircraft Artillery, while on duty in New Guinea, July 26, 1940. He was appointed Lieutenant Colonel on October 28, 1945. When the Maine Army National Guard was being reorganized, Lieutenant Colonel Heywood took a prominent part in the recruiting and assumed command of the 240th Anti-aircraft Artillery Group with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, Maine Army National Guard, on November 18, 1947.

Lieutenant Colonel Heywood left the United States for service overseas in World War II on October 27, 1943 and returned to the United States on December 6, 1945. He saw service in New Guinea, Australia and the Philippines during which time he participated in the landings at Finschafen, New Guinea, Leyte, in the Philippine Islands and Subic Bay in the Philippines. He was Supply Officer for Anti-aircraft Group for the greater period while overseas. He had one tour of duty of two months service with the 14th AAA Command as Assistant AA-4 and as a result of this service he was assigned to the AAA Section of the Far East Air Forces when this section was organized.

It is most worthy of note that in efficiency reports rendered by this officer's superiors, Lieutenant Colonel Heywood was always given the rating of either "Superior" or "Excellent."

That he might become more efficient in his military education, Lieutenant Colonel Heywood has graduated from the Seacoast Artillery School at Fort Monroe in 1942, Camp Davis Anti-aircraft Artillery School at Camp Davis, North Carolina, in 1942 and the Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, in 1950.

Born in Bingham, Maine, on March 12, 1917, the son of Roy Edwin Heywood and Barbara Weston Heywood, Lieutenant Colonel Heywood as a youth moved with his family to Portland, Maine, where he was graduated from the Deering High School in 1935. He was graduated from Stanton Academy, Cornwall, New York in 1937 and from West Point Preparatory School at Fort Williams, Maine in 1938. While at this preparatory school he was a member of the 5th Infantry, USA from June 1937 to June 1938.

Lieutenant Colonel Heywood married Virginia Elizabeth Llewellyn, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George O. Llewellyn of Portland, Maine on June 7, 1940. They have two daughters, Dianne Lorraine and Suzanne. He has for 13 years, since August 28, 1938, been Circulation District Manager of the Guy P. Gannett Newspapers. He is a member of the 5th Infantry Association and has held numerous offices in the American Newspaper Guild, Press Herald-Express unit.

Lieutenant Colonel Heywood is entitled to wear the American Defense Ribbon, the Asiatic Pacific Ribbon with three stars, and the Philippine Liberation Ribbon.

DEATH OF COLONEL EARLE STANLEY BARTON, RETIRED

It is with a great deal of regret that The Adjutant General of Maine announces the death of COLONEL EARLE STANLEY BARTON, DENTAL CORPS, RETIRED, in Houlton, Maine, Wednesday 19 December 1951 after a long illness. DEATH OF BRIGADIER GENERAL ELLIOTT C. DILL, RETIRED

The death of BRIGADIER GENERAL ELLIOTT C. DILL, RETIRED, on 16 February 1952 at Roselle Park, New Jersey is announced with deep regret. General Dill was Adjutant General of the State of Maine from 3 July 1909 to 1 November 1913. His service as Adjutant General of the Maine National Guard contributed largely to the outstanding success of the Maine National Guard units prior to World War I

General Dill was a war correspondent with the Second Maine Regiment during the Spanish-American War.

On 30 July 1900, he was appointed First Lieutenant, Inspector of Rifle Practice, Hqrs. First Regiment of Infantry, Maine National Guard.

On 3 January 1901 he was appointed Colonel, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, Staff of Commander-in-Chief, Headquarters, First Regiment of Infantry, Maine National Guard.

On 1 January 1908 he was appointed Colonel, Chief of Ordnance, Headquarters, First Regiment of Infantry, Maine National Guard.

On 1 May 1909 he was appointed Major General, Adjutant General, Headquarters, First Regiment of Infantry, Maine National Guard.

On 3 July 1909 he was appointed Brigadier General, The Adjutant General of the State of Maine, and took office as Adjutant General on the same date. General Dill retired on 1 November 1913.

DEATH OF LIEUTENANT COLONEL FRED W. ROWELL

It is with deep regret that this department announces the death of Lt. Col. Fred W. Rowell former Maine State Guard Officer. Colonel Rowell died 22 February 1952 at the Central Maine General Hospital, Lewiston, Maine.

Colonel Rowell had long been identified with the Veterans Affairs Division in the State of Maine. Born in South Thomaston on 3 September 1890, he received his preliminary education in Rockland High School, Rockland, Maine, and was graduated from Business College, Seattle, Washington. REORGANIZATION OF UNITS

1. Army National Guard units while in the active military service have undergone reorganizations under different criteria than that employed while the units were in National Guard status. In order to reestablish these units in the Army National Guard program, upon their return to State control, it is necessary to reorganize them, without delay, under strength criteria authorized by the Secretary of the Army.

2. Pursuant to authority granted by the Secretary of the Army and to comply with the provisions of the National Defense Act, as amended, and letter Chief, National Guard Bureau, NG-AROTO 325.4 Gen. dtd 14 April 1952, reorganization of the Army National Guard units listed below, under Tables of Organization and Equipment as listed in inclosure 1, is directed effective on the date indicated:

3. a. The maximum total organizational strengths authorized Army National Guard units are as indicated in column 7 of the appropriate T/O&E for officers and warrant officers, and column 8 for enlisted men (see inclosure).

b. Although total enlisted strengths will not exceed column 8, the number of grades for each MOS as shown in column 16 through 21 inclusive (Section II Organization) of all tables are authorized provided the total enlisted strength does not exceed the total shown in column 8. Promotions to higher grades E-7, E-6 and E-5 are hereby authorized provided individuals are fully qualified and meet the requirements outlined in the Three Year Training Program. As a minimum requirement for all units grade positions listed in column 22 (enlisted cadre) are prescribed for the initial selection for grades E-7, E-6 and E-5.

c. Personnel rendered surplus by this reorganization will be governed by the provisions of paragraph 6, NGR 15.

4. a. Organizational equipment allowances as now authorized by T/O&E's with changes thereto, and as amended by the National Guard Reduction Tables, remain in effect.

b. Equipment allowances will be determined on the basis of the lesser amount when differences occur between appropriate T/O&E's, with changes thereto and the National Guard Reduction Tables except:

(1) For items where total allowances are determined by issue to or for the individual, the appropriate remarks in the basis of distribution and remarks column, Section III (Equipment) will govern.

(2) Transfer of property responsibility from one technical service to another is automatic and requires no further implementing instructions from the National Guard Bureau.

5. The provisions of NGB Circular No. 22, dated 24 September 1948, apply and give in detail the procedure for effecting these reorganizations.

An important part of that strength is in the strong conviction that the members of the Armed Forces, both Regular and Reserve, are not merely doing a necessary job, but that they are a part of a large crusade for a lasting peace based on freedom and justice and for the type of a world that those living and those yet to be born will want to live in.

3. As a tribute to those thousands of men and women of Maine who have given their lives that this nation may endure, it is hereby directed that the National Flag be displayed at half mast on all armories from sunrise until midday Friday, 30 May 1952 EDST. At noon the flag will be hoisted to the top of the mast where it will remain until sunset.

4. To assist in the proper observance of Memorial Day, Commanding Officers of all Maine National Guard units are authorized to place themselves and their commands at the disposal of the various veteran's organizations and societies and local officials on this day and to render every proper assistance possible. Participation of Maine National Guard units in appropriate ceremonies may be counted as a regular drill provided all requirements as to attendance and time of service be observed as specified for regular armory drills. All units will report change of drills to the Adjutant at least three (3) days before Memorial Day.

SECTION II
ATTENDANCE

2. Criteria for attendance of units for field training Calendar year 1952 will be as set forth in Section III NGR 45, 30 November 1946, as amended:

a. General: No enlisted man will be authorized field training other than with, and during the period approved for, his unit. No departure from this general policy will be authorized unless it can be clearly shown that the Federal Government will benefit there by para 35, NGR 45 will apply in the case of officers and warrant officers. Members of a camp supply detachment will be considered as a special case.

b. The Adjutant General: The Adjutant General of the State of Maine is authorized, in lieu of other training, to attend the training of the troops of the State of Maine participating in training in the State of Massachusetts and New York provided that the total time, including travel time, does not exceed that authorized for the State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment.

c. Non Recognized Officers: Officers not Federally recognized may attend field training with their unit. Names of such officers will be entered on the Morning Report (DA AGO Form 1, dtd 1 Aug 51) and on the field training payroll with the following notation, "Federal Recognition Not Received. No Pay Claimed at This Time." Upon receipt of Federal Recognition, and if recognition date includes any portion of the time that such officers attend field training, a supplemental payroll may be processed for these officers and payment made. Travel Pay may be claimed only for the travel performed AFTER date of Federal recognition.

d. Reserve Officers: Reserve officers may attend field training with National Guard units at their own request if concurred in by the Adjutant General and the Army Commander. Orders will be issued by the Army Commander when such training is authorized and all costs involved will be charged to funds available for the training of the Organized Reserve Corps and not against appropriated National Guard funds.

3. Training authorities issued by the Chief, National Guard Bureau do not authorize any temporary or permanent Federal Employee who belongs to the National Guard of the State of Maine and who comes within the provisions of Section 80, National Defense Act, as amended, to participate in field training for a period in excess of 15 days. Federal employees who are members of the Advance and/or Rear Detachments or the Motor Convoy Detachments must take annual leave or leave without pay for such time in excess of 15 days. The provisions of this paragraph apply to all administrative assistants, caretakers, and accounting clerks who are members of the Maine (Army) National Guard. Such personnel will attend field training in their military capacity and not as civilian employees, unless specifically authorized by this office.

4. Advance, Rear, and Motor Convoy Detachments are authorized. Instruction pertaining to strength, composition, and length of tour of duty will be announced by this Headquarters at a later date.

SECTION III

COMMAND

5. By direction of the Governor, COLONEL LESTER E. BROWN, INFANTRY, O 164 910 is designated commander of troops, Maine Army National Guard, CAMP DRUM, NEW YORK.

6. By direction of the Governor, LIEUTENANT COLONEL HAROLD M. LAWRENCE, ARTILLERY, O 404 626, is designated commander of troops, Maine Army National Guard, CAMP EDWARDS, MASSACHUSETTS.

7. Commanders of Advance, Rear and Motor Convoy Detachments will be named in Special Orders at a later date.

SECTION IV

MOBILIZATION

8. Units will mobilize at home armories in accordance with schedules to be published by this Headquarters at a later date.

SECTION V

MOVEMENT

9. Movement from home stations to CAMP DRUM, NEW YORK and CAMP EDWARDS, MASSACHUSETTS and return to home stations will be performed by Government motor Vehicle, bus, and rail.

a. All personnel of the Advance, Rear and Motor Convoy Detachments will move to and from the field training site by Government Motor Vehicle.

b. Personnel other than that assigned above will move to and from the field training site by bus and rail.

c. Movement orders will be published by this Headquarters at a later date.

d. The use of private automobiles, with or without reimbursement, for travel to and from the field training site is not authorized. Unit commanders are charged with the responsibility for the enforcement of the provisions of this requirement. Private conveyances noticed in the field training area and bearing State of Maine license plates will be checked to assure that they do not belong to members of the Maine Army National Guard on training duty.

e. Training en route to and from the field training site will be conducted as troop movements.

f. The amount of property and equipment moved to the field training site will be limited to training essentials, to include athletic equipment. No day room furniture or equipment will be transported to field training sites.

SECTION VI

TRAINING

10. The field training program (NGTP Schedule) for 240th AAA Gp and 103d Inf RCT, Maine Army National Guard will be prepared and forwarded thru this Headquarters to the Senior Army Instructor, to the Commanding General, New England Subarea, Army Base, Boston, 10, Massachusetts at least forty (40) days prior to field training period.

11. Pre-Camp Mess Schools of two (2) days duration at the field training site for mess personnel, immediately prior to the field training period are authorized. A maximum of two (2) enlisted men for each company or similar unit having Table of Organization assigned mess personnel, may attend. Mess personnel, other than those assigned in Service Company, 103d Inf, will not be included in the Advance, Rear, or Motor Detachments. Travel time to this school is in addition to training time.

SECTION VII

MISCELLANEOUS

12. The Commanding Officer, 103d Regimental Combat Team will detail two (2) officers and one (1) enlisted man for duty as follows:

a. One officer of field grade rank to serve during the period of the Pre-Camp Mess Schools and the period of the encampment at CAMP DRUM, NEW YORK as Food Service Supervisor. Duties will be prescribed by this Headquarters at a later date.

b. One (1) Officer of company grade and one (1) enlisted man to serve during the period of the Pre-Camp Mess School at CAMP DRUM, NEW YORK only as Pre-Camp Mess School Detachment Administrative Personnel.

13. In order that maximum training benefits may be derived, it is desired, as far as possible, that unit messes be operated by all units whose T/E includes mess equipment, and that the M 1937 field ranges be used to the maximum extent possible. Army National Guard funds will not be authorized for coal or gas ranges located at the field training site. Each unit will operate in bivouac for at least one ration cycle (three (3) consecutive meals) when all cooking will be accomplished with the M1937 field ranges.

14. The UNITED STATES PROPERTY AND DISBURSING OFFICER for Maine is designated National Guard CONTRACTING OFFICER and TRANSPORTATION OFFICER for the field training period.

15. Military equipment and supplies will be transported to field training sites by Government Motor Vehicle. Details will be published by this Headquarters at a later date

16. Liaison aircraft will be taken to field training site.

MEMORANDUM NO. 24

25 June 1952

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SECTION I

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. References: General Order Number 13, Office of The Adjutant General, State of Maine, 17 June 1952.

2. Instructions found in Section I will apply to all Army National Guard units attending field training.

3. TRAVEL TIME — Travel time from the home station to camp is considered to start at the hour which the unit assembles at its armory, provided that assembly does not precede the actual time of departure by more than two hours, and will terminate at the hour of arrival in camp. Travel time from camp to home station will begin at the time of departure from camp, and terminate at time of dismissal at the armory; provided such time is not later than two hours subsequent to actual arrival at home station. The number of travel rations or meals authorized will be determined as follows:

(1) A meal is authorized for troops assembled or traveling during any one of the following periods:

Assembly or departure before 0800 — Arrival before 1100 — 1 meal
 Assembly or departure before 0800 — Arrival between 1100-1800 — 2 meals
 Assembly or departure before 0800 — Arrival after 1800 — 3 meals
 Assembly or departure after 1801 — Arrival before 1100 — 0 meals
 Assembly or departure after 1801 — Arrival between 1100-1800 — 1 meal
 Assembly or departure after 1801 — Arrival after 1800 — 2 meals
 Assembly or departure after 1301 — Arrival after 1800 — 1 meal
 On return journey, arrival time refers to dismissal time at home armory.

4. SUPPLY

a. Authorized allowances of clothing will be issued by the USP&DO until 11 July 1952; thereafter, emergency requirements only until 11 August 1952.

b. Janitorial supplies will be issued in bulk to Advance Detachment Commanders. A breakdown table will be furnished by USP&DO to facilitate issue to unit S-4's and separate units.

c. Oil and grease, cleaning and preserving materials will be taken to camp by each unit. Amount to be taken must be sufficient for all needs, as none will be available for issue at field training sites. Except in emergency, courtesy cards will not be used for purchases during the field training period.

d. Repair and maintenance supplies, spare parts for motor vehicles stationary engines, weapons, field ranges, dry batteries for radio sets and telephones, medical supplies etc., required for the field training periods will be taken to camp by appropriate units and services. Otherwise, none will be available.

e. The requisition, receipt for, and turn-in of post, camp, and station property is a command responsibility and will be coordinated by representatives of this headquarters.

f. Upon arrival at the field training site, separate commands will prepare and submit their Ration Strength Return to the State Headquarters for consolidation. The quantity of rations requisitioned will be based upon actual daily strength, (head count system). Ration allowances will not be overdrawn under any circumstances.

g. Instructions pertaining to the local purchase of rations for consumption on trains (prepared in kitchen cars) will be published separately at a later date.

h. The USP&DO will furnish necessary blocking material for freight shipments and the State Maintenance Officer will provide technical assistance in loading heavy equipment. This office will coordinate freight movements with the public carriers.

i. The following laundry service is authorized at the lowest prevailing local rates and must be accomplished by bid within 30 calendar days after return to home stations:

Sheets and pillowcases used in dispensaries.

Three (3) each uniforms, white, per cook or medical attendant per week.

j. The ice allowance is 4 pounds per trainee per day.

5. EVACUATION AND HOSPITALIZATION

a. Enroute — Insofar as practicable, sickness, accident, and injury cases will be evacuated to hospitals under control of the Department of Defense or to Veterans Administration Facilities. Emergency services of civilian physicians and ambulances may be procured when Federal Medical facilities are not available. TAG-ME and USP&DO must be notified when such cases occur.

b. Camp — Whenever it is necessary to transfer a patient from Camp to a military hospital, such transfer will be authorized by Special Orders of the State Headquarters (State) concerned.

c. Initial hospitalization will be at the field training site Station Hospital.

d. Case histories will be prepared for all cases treated, regardless of where, to include LINE OF DUTY INVESTIGATION reports. See NGR No. 28, 1 August 1950.

e. Line of Duty Investigating Officers will be appointed from the State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment to cover ALL LOD investigations during the field training period.

f. All concerned, but more particularly unit commanders and medical officers are enjoined to familiarize themselves with the provisions of National Guard Regulations 24, 28, 62 and 63, and National Guard Circular No.10 1 August 1950.

6. TRANSPORTATION

a. With the exception of personnel detailed for duty with Advance, Rear and MOTOR CONVOY DETACHMENTS, all personnel will move to and from the field training cities by RAIL. Annex No. 15 covering RAIL schedules will be published at an early date.

b. The distribution and assignment of trucks, together with detail of motor convoy personnel, is covered in Annexes hereto.

c. Units having ¼ and/or 1½-ton trailers should trail them to camp.

d. Special instructions pertaining to the issue and use of Government Transportation Requests and Bills of Lading will be published by the USP&DO.

e. Bus schedules are published, as Annex Nos 8 and 13.

7. DETACHMENTS. Authorized detachments fall into four (4) categories, viz: PRE-CAMP MESS SCHOOL — ADVANCE — REAR — and MOTOR CONVOY. The latter is divided into GOING and RETURN. Special instructions will be found in PARTS II AND III hereinafter.

8. SUBSISTENCE

a. Requirements.—Emphasis must be placed on the accurate calculation of all ration requirements so that excesses will be held to a minimum. Generation of excesses of perishables is of particular importance as Quartermaster Market Centers will not accept a return of this type of subsistence. (Disposition of broken packaged rations is governed by paragraphs 7a (4) and 7d (4) of SR 130-470-1).

b. MESSES. In order that maximum training benefits may be derived, unit messes will be operated by all units whose T/E includes mess equipment, and that the M1937 field ranges will be used to the maximum extent. Each unit will operate in bivouac for at least one ration cycle (3 consecutive meals), and all cooking will be accomplished with the M1937 field range.

c. FIELD RATIONS. A special menu has been prepared as a guide for the feeding of all National Guard units during field training, calendar year 1952. The Special Menu is published by Hq First Army as "Standard Menu Guide For Civilian Component (NG, ORC & ROTC)." This standard Menu Guide will be made available to all units at the field training site. The value of the field ration is estimated at \$1.33. The "C" ration will be used for one ration cycle (3 consecutive meals) during the training period in camp.

d. TRAVEL RATION

(1) General — The travel ration will be authorized only for periods of travel as defined in paragraph 2, above.

(2) Value — Maximum cost for travel ration during any one 24-hour period will not exceed \$2.50. For less than 3 consecutive meals, \$1.00 per meal is authorized. Procurement of box lunches and prepared meals from restaurants will be arranged for by the USP&DO.

e. MONETARY ALLOWANCE. A monetary allowance of \$2.25 will be authorized for enlisted men in lieu of subsistence, where rations are not furnished in kind.

f. OFFICERS SUBSISTENCE

(1) An officer messing at enlisted men's mess at camp, or with enlisted men during the period of travel to and from camp will be charged (regardless of the type of rations furnished), as follows:

one meal	two meals	three meals
\$0.45	\$1.35	\$1.35

(2) When separate officer's messes are established, rations may be procured in accordance with SR 130-470-1 and AR 35-6660, or from civilian sources.

(3) The employment of civilians (not paid from Federal funds) by officer's messes is considered preferable to the use of military personnel. However, enlisted men may be employed (with commensurate pay over and above military pay) in the officer's mess, with their consent, provided such employment does not interfere with their regularly assigned T/O duties, and is approved by the commander of troops at the training site.

9. MEDICAL SERVICE

a. Medical companies and detachments will establish and operate dispensary service throughout the field training period. Hospitalization enroute to field training site will be at nearest available facility following emergency procedures.

b. Medical care will be obtained in accordance with the provisions of par 9, NGR 62, through the agencies shown below in order of the priority of listing. When any Government medical treatment facilities are utilized, a letter of authorization signed by the responsible officer and giving full name, service number, rank, organization, National Guard status and other necessary information with respect to the patient, must accompany the patient at time of admission:

- (1) Army Medical treatment facilities.
- (2) Medical treatment facilities of the Air Force or Navy where Army medical treatment facilities are not readily available or accessible.
- (3) Medical Treatment facilities of Governmental Agencies outside the Department of Defense (i.e., Veterans Administration, Public Health Service) where facilities in (1) and (2) above are not readily available or accessible.
- (4) Civilian medical treatment facilities including civilian physicians where facilities listed (1), (2), and (3) above are not available. Civilian agencies should be fully informed of the proper procedure and use of forms at the time National Guard personnel are committed to their care.

c. Payment for medical care will be effected in accordance with par 10, NGR 62.

10 CLAIMS — Processing of claims for loss of or damage to private property incident to field training activities is covered in NGB Circular No. 18, 15 November 1949, as amended, subject: "Processing of Certain Claims for Damage Involving the Army National Guard."

11. PAY AND ALLOWANCES — Separate instructions will be issued by the USP&DO regarding preparation and submission of field training payrolls.

12. GENERAL

a. Automotive maintenance support for all motor movements to and from Camp Drum, N. Y., and Camp Edwards, Massachusetts, will be provided by the 142d Ord (M) Maint Co. Commanding Officer, 142d Ord (M) Maint Co will furnish this Headquarters, not later than 1 July 1952, a detailed plan of the proposed maintenance support.

b. Uniform for rail, motor movements and Pre-Camp Mess School Detachment as follows:

- (1) Rail move: Uniform will be shirt and trousers wool, light shade; boots, svc, combat; helmet liner; sidearms.
- (2) Drivers, assistant drivers and automotive maintenance personnel will wear jacket and trousers, HBT, boots, svc, combat; helmet liner and sidearms. All other personnel traveling by motor will wear uniform prescribed for rail move.
- (3) Pre-Camp Mess School Detachment: Uniform will be shirts and trousers, cotton khaki, with necktie; service cap; low, quarter shoes.

c. The Commanding Officer, 103d RCT and 240th AA Group will detail a commissioned officer to precede motor convoys to toll roads and bridges to coordinate movements of government vehicles. Toll roads in Maine and N. H. are toll free. Bridge at Rouses Point, N. Y. is a toll charge and convoy officer will furnish a list of vehicles crossing the bridge to USP&DO after completion of each trip (Going and Return). This list will indicate number and type of vehicles ($\frac{1}{4}$ -ton, $\frac{3}{4}$ -ton, etc). A copy of toll bill will be presented to the convoy officer by toll attendant. This bill will accompany the list of vehicles submitted to the USP&DO.

d. All motor convoy vehicles will carry gas cans to be filled at gas refueling points. Refueling points for motor movements will be announced in each march order.

SECTION II
INSTRUCTIONS FOR CAMP DRUM, NEW YORK

1. The provisions of Section II apply to units attending field training at Camp Drum, N. Y., only.

2. Movement schedules for detachments.

a. **ADVANCE DETACHMENT.** For composition and vehicle assignment, see Annex No. 3. Elements of the 152d FA Bn depart home stations 22 July 1952 and bivouac at the Skowhegan Armory. Box lunches will be provided by Commanding Officer, 152d FA Bn for noon meal. Supper meal 22 July and breakfast 23 July will be at restaurant, Skowhegan, to be arranged by the USP&DO, Maine. This element will join other advance detachment elements at Bethel, Maine following directive to be issued by the CO, 103d RCT. Noon meal, 23 July, will be by box lunch to be picked up in Portland, Maine, by the Advance Detachment Commander. Supper meal and breakfast 24 July will be at bivouac point, Fort Ethan Allen, Vt. utilizing mess hall facilities of the 75th Air Base Squadron. Noon meal 24 July will be by box lunch carried in dry ice containers from Portland, Me. by Advance Detachment Commander. Advance detachment Commander will detail a Commissioned Officer and mess personnel to precede the convoy to Camp Drum for the purpose of drawing rations and preparing evening meal. Commanding Officer, 103d RCT will designate the Advance Detachment Commander.

b. **MOTOR CONVOY DETACHMENT.** For composition and vehicle assignment see Annex No. 4. Convoy elements of the 152d FA Bn depart home stations 24 July and bivouac at Skowhegan Armory. Box lunches for noon meal 24 July will be provided by CO, 152d FA Bn. Supper meal and breakfast 25 July will be restaurant Skowhegan to be arranged by USP&DO. This element will proceed on 25 July 1952 as march unit No. 2, of Convoy Serial No. 2, to Bethel, Maine, and will join remaining elements of the convoy serial. March units 1 and 3 of serial No. 2 will proceed from home stations on 25 July and will join at Bethel, Maine. All elements of serial No. 1 will proceed to Bethel, Maine on 25 July 1952. Convoy Commander, serial No. 1, will be pick up box lunches at Portland, Maine for entire Detachment. Box lunches for serial No. 2 will be turned over to those elements at Bethel. Box lunches will be provided for noon meal 25 July and noon meal 26 July. Supper meal 25 July and breakfast 26 July will be at bivouac point; Fort Ethan Allen, Vermont, utilizing mess hall facilities of the 75th Air Base Squadron.

c. **PRE-CAMP MESS SCHOOL DETACHMENT.** Detachment comes into being as such at Portland, Maine, 22 July 1952. Personnel from the 152d FA Bn will travel by rail from home stations on 21 July 1952 to arrive in Portland, Maine, approximately 1700 hours same day. They will be billeted at the Stevens Avenue Armory night of 21 July 1952. Evening meal 21 July and breakfast 22 July will be at restaurant, Portland to be arranged by USP&DO. Remaining units will utilize local train service 22 July to Portland to insure connections with schedule in Annex No. 15. Meals enroute from Portland to Watertown, N. Y. will be in dining car on train. Breakfast, 23 July, will be at Camp Drum, N. Y. Transportation from Watertown, N. Y. to Camp Drum, N. Y. will be provided by Fitzgerald Brothers Bus Lines to be arranged by USP&DO.

d. **REAR DETACHMENTS.** For composition and vehicle assignment see Annex No. 3. Detachment departs Camp Drum, N. Y., 9 August 1952 and takes box lunch for noon meal that day. Supper, 9 August, and breakfast, 10 August, will be at bivouac point, Fort Ethan Allen, Vermont, utilizing mess hall facilities of the 75th Air Base Squadron. Box lunches will be furnished for the noon meal, 10 August, to be delivered to the convoy enroute, arrangements to be made by USP&DO. Elements of the 152d FA Bn will bivouac 10 August at the Skowhegan Armory. Supper, 10 August, and breakfast, 11 August, will be restaurant meal, and box lunch for noon meal will be arranged by the USP&DO. All elements of the Rear Detachment will proceed to home station following march order prepared by Commanding Officer, 103d RCT.

3. **MOTOR CONVOY DETACHMENT — RETURN.** For composition and vehicle assignment see Annex No. 5. Convoy departs Camp Drum, N. Y., 9 August 1952. Noon meal will be box lunch taken from camp. Supper, 9 August, and breakfast, 10 August, will be at bivouac point, Fort Ethan Allan, Vt., utilizing mess hall facilities of the 75th Air Base Squadron. Box lunch for noon meal, 10 August, will be delivered to the convoy enroute to be arranged by the USP&DO. Elements of the 152d FA Bn will bivouac, 10 August at the Skowhegan Armory. Supper, 10 August, and breakfast, 11 August will be restaurant meals, and noon meal, 11 August — box lunch, arranged by the USP&DO.

4. **OVERLAND ROUTINGS.** See Annex 6.

5. **TRAIN MESS DETAILS.** See Annex 7 for train composition and kitchen car assignments. Separate instructions regarding procurement of rations for the trains and preparation of kitchen cars will be furnished at a later date by the USP&DO.

6. **TRAIN COMMANDERS AND TRANSPORTATION OFFICERS.** The CO, 103d RCT will designate one each Train Commander and Transportation Officer for each train and advise names, rank and unit to USP&DO not later than 1 July 1952. Train Commanders will be responsible for all arrangements for preparation of kitchen cars, procurement of subsistence, detail of mess personnel, providing additional water for each train for cooking and drinking purposes, sufficient GI cans on each train for rubbish and garbage disposal. Train Commanders will be responsible for troops loading and assignment of cars and will maintain strict discipline over all personnel on the train for the entire journey to and from training site.

SECTION III

INSTRUCTIONS FOR CAMP EDWARDS, MASSACHUSETTS

1. The provisions of Section III apply to units attending field training at Camp Edwards, Massachusetts only.

2. Movement schedules for Detachment.

a. **ADVANCED DETACHMENT.** For composition and vehicle assignment see Annex No. 11. Hq & Hq Btry, 314th AAA (AW) Bn departs home station 22 July 1952 and will bivouac at State Armory, So. Portland. Box lunch will be provided for noon meal. Supper, 22 July, and breakfast, 23 July, will be restaurant meals to be arranged by USP&DO. Advance Detachment elements of the 142nd Ord Det and State Hq & Hq Det depart home stations 23 July 1952 and join Advance Detachment convoy at Stevens Avenue Armory. Portland, CO, 240th AAA Group will issue detailed instructions for movement of all elements of this detachment to Camp Edwards, Mass. Box lunches will be provided for noon meal 23 July by USP&DO and will be delivered to Advance Detachment Commander at Stevens Avenue Armory. All vehicles will gas up at the Service Center, Stevens Avenue Armory, 23 July 1952. Commanding Officer, 240th AAA Group will designate Advance Detachment Commander.

b. **MOTOR CONVOY DETACHMENT — GOING.** For composition and vehicle assignment, see Annex No. 14. Elements of the 314th AAA (AW) Bn, 181st SRMU, 207th AAA Det (RCAT) and 195th Army Band depart from home stations, 24 July 1952 following march order issued by CO, 314th AAA (AW) Bn. These elements bivouac at State Armory, So. Portland, Maine. Box lunch for noon meal, 24 July, will be provided by USP&DO. Breakfast, 25 July, will be restaurant meal arranged by USP&DO. Motor convoy element of the 142d Ord Det will depart home station 25 July and join Detachment Convoy at Stevens Avenue Armory. All elements will form at Stevens Avenue Armory, 25 July. Box lunches will be delivered to the Advance Detachment Commander for noon meal. All vehicles will gas at Service Center, Stevens Avenue Armory.

c. **PRE-CAMP MESS SCHOOL DETACHMENT.** Batteries C and D, 314th AAA (AW) Bn depart home stations 22 July 1952 utilizing local train service and bivouac at State Armory, Bangor. Breakfast, 23 July, to be restaurant meal to be

arranged by USP&DO. All units depart Bangor, 23 July following schedule in Annex No. 15. Personnel of Battery B, join Detachment at Burnham Junction. Transportation from North Station to South Station, Boston will be MTA Bus service to be arranged by USP&DO. Transportation Officer, Camp Edwards, Massachusetts will provide bus transportation for Detachment from Buzzards Bay to Camp. Meals on train from Portland will be in dining car.

d. **MOTOR CONVOY DETACHMENT — RETURN.** For composition and vehicle assignment see Annex No. 14. Convoy departs Camp, 9 August 1952 and bivouacs at South Portland, Maine. Box lunches for noon meal will be taken from Camp. Supper and breakfast, 10 August, will be restaurant meal, arranged by USP&DO. Elements of convoy from Hq & Hq Btry, 240th Group and 142d Ord Det proceed to home stations, 9 August 1952. Box lunches will be provided for noon meal, 10 August 1952.

3. **OVERLAND ROUTINGS.** See Annex 12.

4. **RAIL MOVE — SUBSISTENCE.** Box lunches will be placed aboard Train ME-1 at Portland for noon meal, 26 July 1952.

5. **BUS MOVEMENTS.** See Annex No. 13. Commanding Officer, 314th AAA (AW) Bn will arrange for feeding units of Battery B, C and D, 314th, 181st SRMU breakfast, 25 July 1952 at Bangor.

6. **TRAIN COMMANDER — TRANSPORTATION OFFICER.** Commanding Officer, 314th AAA (AW) Bn will designate one each Train Commander and Transportation Officer for trains and advise name, rank and unit to USP&DO not later than 1 July 1952. Train Commander will be responsible for troop loading and assignment of cars and will maintain strict discipline over all personnel on the train for the entire journey to and from field training site.

7. **PRE-CAMP COOK SCHOOL**

a. A pre-cook school will be established at Camp Drum, N. Y. and Camp Edwards, Mass. The pre-camp cook schools will provide training for National Guard Mess Personnel in the methods and procedures of approved mess supervision and mess operations. The two (2) day familiarization course will be introductory to the two weeks practical training in Unit Messes.

- (1) The establishment and conduct of the pre-camp cook school is a responsibility of the Post Commander. Suitable class rooms, facilities and equipment will be provided.
- (2) The pre-camp cook school at Camp Drum and Camp Edwards will be of two (2) days duration, classes to be held on the Thursday and Friday immediately preceding each summer field training period.

b. Post Commanders will be responsible for quarters, rations and administration of the NG personnel attending the pre-camp cook school.

c. The authorized students attending the pre-camp cook school will be provided with pencils and notebooks prior to reporting to the school.

d. **Medical Certificates.**

Unit commanders will be responsible that all students reporting for attendance at the pre-camp cook school and all mess personnel prior to assignment as food handlers will have in their possession the required medical certificate which is required in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 4, SR 410-30-1, dated 27 November 1950.

e. **Publications.**

Each unit commander charged with the responsibility of mess operations will insure that the following publications are on hand:
