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
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PREFACE

We are grateful to all employers who responded to the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. This monograph would not be possible without their cooperation.

The OES survey is a federal-state cooperative program funded by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the Employment and Training Administration (ETA). Partial financial support for this report was also provided by the Maine Occupational Information Coordinating Committee (MOICC).

All 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands participate in the OES program. Maine was one of the first states to collect wage rates through OES, having done so since 1991. In 1996 the OES survey became the source of occupational wage rates nationwide. This monograph contains 1997 wage rates for 569 occupations surveyed in Maine at the statewide level. Other monographs are available containing wage rates for the Bangor, Lewiston-Auburn, and Portland Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs). Rates are also available for the Portsmouth-Rochester NH-ME Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA), which includes the Maine towns of Berwick, South Berwick, Eliot, Kittery, and York.

A comparison of Maine wages with those of other states is possible by accessing the Bureau of Labor Statistics Internet site. BLS has posted mean and median wage rates of every state, territory and district of the United States, allowing for wage comparisons based on a standardized methodology. INTRODUCTION

The information contained in this monograph was collected during the 1996 and 1997 Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. Wage rates are provided for every occupation meeting Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) standards for statistical validity and confidentiality. Estimates are provided for the occupational employment, mean, median, and midrange (upper and lower).

The **estimated employment** figure represents the estimated occupational employment across all industries reporting the occupation. In instances where the employment estimate did not meet statistical validity standards, this field was left blank. The **mean** represents the mathematical, weighted average for all workers reported in the subject occupation. The **median** is the actual mid-point, or the point at which half of the workers earn more and half earn less than the posted figure. The **mid-range** represents the 25th and 75th percentiles. Earnings of fifty percent of the workers in a given occupation fall within this range, while twenty five percent earn less than the lower figure and twenty five percent earn more than the upper figure.

Wages collected by the OES program represent straight-time wage rates, which are total earnings before payroll deductions, and exclude tips, premium pay for overtime or for work on weekends, holidays, and late shifts. Also excluded are performance bonuses and lump-sum payments such as profit sharing, attendance bonuses, holiday, year-end bonuses, and other non-production based payments. Payments which are included are cost-of-living allowances, longevity pay, and incentive payments which result from commissions, piecework, or production bonuses.

Most wage rates are published at an hourly rate. Weekly rates may be obtained by multiplying the hourly rate by 40, which is considered to be a standard work week. Annual rates may be obtained by multiplying an hourly rate by 2,080, which represents 40 hours worked per week, 52 weeks per year. Wage rates for some occupations (teachers, performers, and aircraft pilots) are only published at an annual rate. When this occurs only the mean annual salary is available.

The OES survey collects wages based on wage ranges. The upper limit of the survey is \$60.01 per hour (\$124,821 per year). The vast majority of wage rates fall below this upper limit, however any occurrence of a \$60.01 figure should be interpreted as actually representing \$60.01 or greater.

The data provided in this monograph are for informational and research purposes only. These wage rates should not be used for Alien Labor Certification (ALC) purposes.

OCCUPATIONAL DEFINITIONS

Occupations contained in the tables are sorted by occupational code and alphabetically. The sorting by occupational code allows users to easily compare earnings of related occupations. The OES coding structure groups occupations based on related functions or duties, as follows:

10000-19999 Managerial and Administrative Occupations

This division includes top-level managers, administrators, and executives whose primary duties are policy making, planning, staffing, directing, or controlling the activities of industrial, commercial, governmental, or other establishments in which an intermediate level of supervision exists between managers and workers. Only managers and administrators whose salaries are exempt from the minimum wage and overtime provision of the Fair Labor Standards Act are included. EXCLUDED are first-line managers and supervisors with first-line duties.

20000-39999 Professional, Paraprofessional, and Technical Occupations

This division includes workers concerned with the theoretical or practical aspects of such fields as science, art, education, law, and business relations where substantial post-secondary educational preparation, or equivalent on-the-job training or experience is required. This division includes accountants, buyers, cost estimators, engineers, architects, physical and life scientists and technologists, systems analysts and computer programmers, psychologists, lawyers, teachers, instructors, health professionals, veterinarians, writers and editors, announcers, artists, designers, photographers, and others. Unlike the other occupational divisions, first-line managers and supervisors of professionals, paraprofessionals, and technicians are INCLUDED among the workers they supervise.

40000-49999 Sales and Related Occupations

This division includes persons selling goods or services and others directly related to sales. Included in this division are sales agents, travel agents, sales engineers, wholesale representatives for scientific products and services, non-technical sales representatives, retail salespersons, counter and rental clerks, sales floor stock clerks, cashiers, and telemarketing representatives. Managers of smaller establishments are also included in this division. These managers have first-line duties supervising and coordinating the activities of marketing, sales, and related workers. They engage in the same activities as those they supervise, and may also perform management functions (budgeting, accounting, marketing, personnel work) in addition to their supervisory duties.

50000-59999 Clerical and Administrative Support Occupations

Included in this division are persons performing office and plant clerical tasks, such as word processing, filing, bookkeeping, computer operation, record keeping, or mail preparation and distribution. Also included in this category are bank tellers, procurement/purchasing clerks, customer service representatives, hotel desk clerks, data entry clerks, receptionists, messengers, dispatchers, expediting clerks, warehouse stock clerks, and shipping/traffic clerks. Manager/Supervisors of smaller establishments, who are classified as First Line Supervisors, perform management functions but may also engage in the same clerical work as those they supervise.

60000-69999 Service Occupations

The Service Occupations division includes occupations relating to protective service, food service, health assisting service, cleaning and building service, and personal service. Included are police officers, firefighters, security guards, cooks, food servers, dishwashers, nursing aides, maids and janitors, hairdressers and cosmetologists, and child care workers. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both supervisory and management functions, along with performing some of the same functions of those they supervise.

70000-79999 Agricultural, Fishing, Forestry, and Related Occupations

This division includes workers involved with agricultural production, forestry, animal caretaking, and grounds keeping. Coded into this division are loggers, graders and sorters of agricultural products, nursery and greenhouse workers, animal breeders and trainers, lawn maintenance workers, and veterinary assistants. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both management and supervisory functions, and may spend up to 20 percent of their time performing the same functions as those they supervise.

80000-99999 Production, Construction, Operating, Maintenance, and Material Handling Occupations

This division includes all skilled, semiskilled, and unskilled workers performing machine, hand working, and manual tasks involving the above operations. Because this is the largest and most diverse OES division, we have provided a more detailed description of the ten major occupational groups, organized by function.

81000-81099 First-Line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors

These workers directly supervise and coordinate the activities of their subordinates and are identified by the function of the employees they supervise, such as mechanics, installers, and repairers; construction trades and extractive workers; production and operating workers; transportation and material moving machine and vehicle occupations; helpers, laborers, and manual material movers.

83000-83099 Inspectors and Related Occupations

Workers such as quality control technicians and those who perform precision and production testing, grading, sampling, or weighing of nonagricultural raw materials, parts, products, or equipment before, during, or after processing, are included in this group.

85000-85999 Mechanics, Installers, Repairers

Workers coded into this group maintain, repair, and adjust motor vehicles, equipment, machines and tools, either on or off premises. They install equipment and machinery and perform routine machinery maintenance. Included are millwrights, general utility maintenance repairers, automotive mechanics, small engine specialists, data processing equipment repairers, locksmiths, furnace installers, and garment and linen menders.

87000-87999 Construction Trades and Extractive Occupations

This occupational group includes workers who construct, alter, and maintain buildings and other structures. Included would be carpenters, masons, concrete and terrazzo finishers, electricians, painters, plumbers, septic tank servicers, carpet installers, roofers, paving equipment operators, highway maintenance workers, quarry rock splitters, blasters and explosives workers, and drillers.

89000-89999 Precision Production Occupations

Workers in this group are those whose work requires a high degree of precision and usually the ability to interpret detailed specifications and instructions along with the independent use of judgement and knowledge gained through experience and training. The work may be performed by hand, hand-held tools, or by using various types of machinery. Normally classroom or on-the-job training of six months to several years or more is required to reach the "journey" level. Some examples of precision production occupations are tool and die makers, machinists, silversmiths, model makers, cabinetmakers, custom tailors, paste-up workers, photoengravers, bookbinders, manufacturing bakers, or food batch makers.

91000-92998 Machine Setters, Set-up Operators, Operators, and Tenders

These workers set up, operate, or tend machinery (usually large production machinery). Those who set up or set up and operate machines are grouped separately from operators and tenders. Occupations are defined by the material being processed; metal and plastic, wood, printing and binding, textiles, and a miscellaneous category that includes other materials (film, tires, food) and their processing.

93000-93999 Hand Working Occupations, Including Assemblers and Fabricators

This category of worker performs hand assembly, fabrication, finishing, and a wide variety of handwork, such as welding, cutting, molding, painting, grinding, and sewing, in production of goods. Precision assemblers, whose work normally requires training as indicated in the previous precision production section, are reported among these hand workers.

95000-95099 Plant and System Occupations

Plant and systems workers control or operate systems of machines or entire processes through the use of control panels or centralized controls, such as chemical or water treatment systems.

97000-97999 Transportation and Material Moving Machine and Vehicle Operators

These workers operate or control vehicles used to transport people or materials, as well as transportation related workers. They operate trucks, buses, water vessels, aircraft, construction and excavating equipment, and machinery such as hoists and winches, cranes and towers, industrial trucks (fork lifts) and tractors, conveyors, and pumps. Also included are driver/sales workers, service station attendants, and parking lot attendants.

98000-98999 Helpers, Laborers, and Hand Material Movers

These workers perform non-machine tasks generally of a routine nature and requiring minimal training. This category of worker helps production, construction, operating and maintenance workers, but are not involved directly in the making of a product. They assist by machine feeding and off bearing, moving materials manually, loading or unloading, hand packing or packaging, and may also clean and wash vehicles and equipment.

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
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
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PREFACE

We are grateful to all employers who responded to the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. This monograph would not be possible without their cooperation.

The OES survey is a federal-state cooperative program funded by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the Employment and Training Administration (ETA). Partial financial support for this report was also provided by the Maine Occupational Information Coordinating Committee (MOICC).

All 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands participate in the OES program. Maine was one of the first states to collect wage rates through OES, having done so since 1991. In 1996 the OES survey became the source of occupational wage rates nationwide. This monograph contains 1997 wage rates for 242 occupations reported in the Bangor Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA). Other monographs are available containing wage rates for Maine (statewide), and for the Lewiston-Auburn and Portland MSAs. Rates are also available for the Portsmouth-Rochester NH-ME Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA), which includes the Maine towns of Berwick, South Berwick, Eliot, Kittery, and York.

A comparison of Maine wages with those of other states is possible by accessing the Bureau of Labor Statistics Internet site. BLS has posted mean and median wage rates of every state, territory and district of the United States, allowing for wage comparisons based on a standardized methodology. INTRODUCTION

The information contained in this monograph was collected during the 1996 and 1997 Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. Wage rates are provided for every occupation meeting Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) standards for statistical validity and confidentiality. Estimates are provided for the occupational employment, mean, median, and midrange (upper and lower).

The **estimated employment** figure represents the estimated occupational employment across all industries reporting the occupation. In instances where the employment estimate did not meet statistical validity standards, this field was left blank. The **mean** represents the mathematical, weighted average for all workers reported in the subject occupation. The **median** is the actual mid-point, or the point at which half of the workers earn more and half earn less than the posted figure. The **mid-range** represents the 25th and 75th percentiles. Earnings of fifty percent of the workers in a given occupation fall within this range, while twenty five percent earn less than the lower figure and twenty five percent earn more than the upper figure.

Wages collected by the OES program represent straight-time wage rates, which are total earnings before payroll deductions, and exclude tips, premium pay for overtime or for work on weekends, holidays, and late shifts. Also excluded are performance bonuses and lump-sum payments such as profit sharing, attendance bonuses, holiday, year-end bonuses, and other non-production based payments. Payments which are included are cost-of-living allowances, longevity pay, and incentive payments which result from commissions, piecework, or production bonuses.

Most wage rates are published at an hourly rate. Weekly rates may be obtained by multiplying the hourly rate by 40, which is considered to be a standard work week. Annual rates may be obtained by multiplying an hourly rate by 2,080, which represents 40 hours worked per week, 52 weeks per year. Wage rates for some occupations (teachers, performers, and aircraft pilots) are only published at an annual rate. When this occurs only the mean annual salary is available.

The OES survey collects wages based on wage ranges. The upper limit of the survey is \$60.01 per hour (\$124,821 per year). The vast majority of wage rates fall below this upper limit, however any occurrence of a \$60.01 figure should be interpreted as actually representing \$60.01 or greater.

The data provided in this monograph are for informational and research purposes only. These wage rates should not be used for Alien Labor Certification (ALC) purposes.

OCCUPATIONAL DEFINITIONS

Occupations contained in the tables are sorted by occupational code and alphabetically. The sorting by occupational code allows users to easily compare earnings of related occupations. The OES coding structure groups occupations based on related functions or duties, as follows:

10000-19999 Managerial and Administrative Occupations

This division includes top-level managers, administrators, and executives whose primary duties are policy making, planning, staffing, directing, or controlling the activities of industrial, commercial, governmental, or other establishments in which an intermediate level of supervision exists between managers and workers. Only managers and administrators whose salaries are exempt from the minimum wage and overtime provision of the Fair Labor Standards Act are included. EXCLUDED are first-line managers and supervisors with first-line duties.

20000-39999 Professional, Paraprofessional, and Technical Occupations

This division includes workers concerned with the theoretical or practical aspects of such fields as science, art, education, law, and business relations where substantial post-secondary educational preparation, or equivalent on-the-job training or experience is required. This division includes accountants, buyers, cost estimators, engineers, architects, physical and life scientists and technologists, systems analysts and computer programmers, psychologists, lawyers, teachers, instructors, health professionals, veterinarians, writers and editors, announcers, artists, designers, photographers, and others. Unlike the other occupational divisions, first-line managers and supervisors of professionals, paraprofessionals, and technicians are INCLUDED among the workers they supervise.

40000-49999 Sales and Related Occupations

This division includes persons selling goods or services and others directly related to sales. Included in this division are sales agents, travel agents, sales engineers, wholesale representatives for scientific products and services, non-technical sales representatives, retail salespersons, counter and rental clerks, sales floor stock clerks, cashiers, and telemarketing representatives. Managers of smaller establishments are also included in this division. These managers have first-line duties supervising and coordinating the activities of marketing, sales, and related workers. They engage in the same activities as those they supervise, and may also perform management functions (budgeting, accounting, marketing, personnel work) in addition to their supervisory duties.

50000-59999 Clerical and Administrative Support Occupations

Included in this division are persons performing office and plant clerical tasks, such as word processing, filing, bookkeeping, computer operation, record keeping, or mail preparation and distribution. Also included in this category are bank tellers, procurement/purchasing clerks, customer service representatives, hotel desk clerks, data entry clerks, receptionists, messengers, dispatchers, expediting clerks, warehouse stock clerks, and shipping/traffic clerks. Manager/Supervisors of smaller establishments, who are classified as First Line Supervisors, perform management functions but may also engage in the same clerical work as those they supervise.

60000-69999 Service Occupations

The Service Occupations division includes occupations relating to protective service, food service, health assisting service, cleaning and building service, and personal service. Included are police officers, firefighters, security guards, cooks, food servers, dishwashers, nursing aides, maids and janitors, hairdressers and cosmetologists, and child care workers. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both supervisory and management functions, along with performing some of the same functions of those they supervise.

70000-79999 Agricultural, Fishing, Forestry, and Related Occupations

This division includes workers involved with agricultural production, forestry, animal caretaking, and grounds keeping. Coded into this division are loggers, graders and sorters of agricultural products, nursery and greenhouse workers, animal breeders and trainers, lawn maintenance workers, and veterinary assistants. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both management and supervisory functions, and may spend up to 20 percent of their time performing the same functions as those they supervise.

80000-99999 Production, Construction, Operating, Maintenance, and Material Handling Occupations

This division includes all skilled, semiskilled, and unskilled workers performing machine, hand working, and manual tasks involving the above operations. Because this is the largest and most diverse OES division, we have provided a more detailed description of the ten major occupational groups, organized by function.

81000-81099 First-Line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors

These workers directly supervise and coordinate the activities of their subordinates and are identified by the function of the employees they supervise, such as mechanics, installers, and repairers; construction trades and extractive workers; production and operating workers; transportation and material moving machine and vehicle occupations; helpers, laborers, and manual material movers.

83000-83099 Inspectors and Related Occupations

Workers such as quality control technicians and those who perform precision and production testing, grading, sampling, or weighing of nonagricultural raw materials, parts, products, or equipment before, during, or after processing, are included in this group.

85000-85999 Mechanics, Installers, Repairers

Workers coded into this group maintain, repair, and adjust motor vehicles, equipment, machines and tools, either on or off premises. They install equipment and machinery and perform routine machinery maintenance. Included are millwrights, general utility maintenance repairers, automotive mechanics, small engine specialists, data processing equipment repairers, locksmiths, furnace installers, and garment and linen menders.

87000-87999 Construction Trades and Extractive Occupations

This occupational group includes workers who construct, alter, and maintain buildings and other structures. Included would be carpenters, masons, concrete and terrazzo finishers, electricians, painters, plumbers, septic tank servicers, carpet installers, roofers, paving equipment operators, highway maintenance workers, quarry rock splitters, blasters and explosives workers, and drillers.

89000-89999 Precision Production Occupations

Workers in this group are those whose work requires a high degree of precision and usually the ability to interpret detailed specifications and instructions along with the independent use of judgement and knowledge gained through experience and training. The work may be performed by hand, hand-held tools, or by using various types of machinery. Normally classroom or on-the-job training of six months to several years or more is required to reach the "journey" level. Some examples of precision production occupations are tool and die makers, machinists, silversmiths, model makers, cabinetmakers, custom tailors, paste-up workers, photoengravers, bookbinders, manufacturing bakers, or food batch makers.

91000-92998 Machine Setters, Set-up Operators, Operators, and Tenders

These workers set up, operate, or tend machinery (usually large production machinery). Those who set up or set up and operate machines are grouped separately from operators and tenders. Occupations are defined by the material being processed; metal and plastic, wood, printing and binding, textiles, and a miscellaneous category that includes other materials (film, tires, food) and their processing.

93000-93999 Hand Working Occupations, Including Assemblers and Fabricators

This category of worker performs hand assembly, fabrication, finishing, and a wide variety of handwork, such as welding, cutting, molding, painting, grinding, and sewing, in production of goods. Precision assemblers, whose work normally requires training as indicated in the previous precision production section, are reported among these hand workers.

95000-95099 Plant and System Occupations

Plant and systems workers control or operate systems of machines or entire processes through the use of control panels or centralized controls, such as chemical or water treatment systems.

97000-97999 Transportation and Material Moving Machine and Vehicle Operators

These workers operate or control vehicles used to transport people or materials, as well as transportation related workers. They operate trucks, buses, water vessels, aircraft, construction and excavating equipment, and machinery such as hoists and winches, cranes and towers, industrial trucks (fork lifts) and tractors, conveyors, and pumps. Also included are driver/sales workers, service station attendants, and parking lot attendants.

98000-98999 Helpers, Laborers, and Hand Material Movers

These workers perform non-machine tasks generally of a routine nature and requiring minimal training. This category of worker helps production, construction, operating and maintenance workers, but are not involved directly in the making of a product. They assist by machine feeding and off bearing, moving materials manually, loading or unloading, hand packing or packaging, and may also clean and wash vehicles and equipment.

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
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
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PREFACE

We are grateful to all employers who responded to the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. This monograph would not be possible without their cooperation.

The OES survey is a federal-state cooperative program funded by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the Employment and Training Administration (ETA). Partial financial support for this report was also provided by the Maine Occupational Information Coordinating Committee (MOICC).

All 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands participate in the OES program. Maine was one of the first states to collect wage rates through OES, having done so since 1991. In 1996 the OES survey became the source of occupational wage rates nationwide. This monograph contains 1997 wage rates for 203 occupations reported in the Lewiston-Auburn Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA). Other monographs are available containing wage rates for Maine (statewide), and for the Bangor and Portland MSAs. Rates are also available for the Portsmouth-Rochester NH-ME Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA), which includes the Maine towns of Berwick, South Berwick, Eliot, Kittery, and York.

A comparison of Maine wages with those of other states is possible by accessing the Bureau of Labor Statistics Internet site. BLS has posted mean and median wage rates of every state, territory and district of the United States, allowing for wage comparisons based on a standardized methodology. INTRODUCTION

The information contained in this monograph was collected during the 1996 and 1997 Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. Wage rates are provided for every occupation meeting Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) standards for statistical validity and confidentiality. Estimates are provided for the occupational employment, mean, median, and midrange (upper and lower).

The **estimated employment** figure represents the estimated occupational employment across all industries reporting the occupation. In instances where the employment estimate did not meet statistical validity standards, this field was left blank. The **mean** represents the mathematical, weighted average for all workers reported in the subject occupation. The **median** is the actual mid-point, or the point at which half of the workers earn more and half earn less than the posted figure. The **mid-range** represents the 25th and 75th percentiles. Earnings of fifty percent of the workers in a given occupation fall within this range, while twenty five percent earn less than the lower figure and twenty five percent earn more than the upper figure.

Wages collected by the OES program represent straight-time wage rates, which are total earnings before payroll deductions, and exclude tips, premium pay for overtime or for work on weekends, holidays, and late shifts. Also excluded are performance bonuses and lump-sum payments such as profit sharing, attendance bonuses, holiday, year-end bonuses, and other non-production based payments. Payments which are included are cost-of-living allowances, longevity pay, and incentive payments which result from commissions, piecework, or production bonuses.

Most wage rates are published at an hourly rate. Weekly rates may be obtained by multiplying the hourly rate by 40, which is considered to be a standard work week. Annual rates may be obtained by multiplying an hourly rate by 2,080, which represents 40 hours worked per week, 52 weeks per year. Wage rates for some occupations (teachers, performers, and aircraft pilots) are only published at an annual rate. When this occurs only the mean annual salary is available.

The OES survey collects wages based on wage ranges. The upper limit of the survey is \$60.01 per hour (\$124,821 per year). The vast majority of wage rates fall below this upper limit, however any occurrence of a \$60.01 figure should be interpreted as actually representing \$60.01 or greater.

The data provided in this monograph are for informational and research purposes only. These wage rates should not be used for Alien Labor Certification (ALC) purposes.

OCCUPATIONAL DEFINITIONS

Occupations contained in the tables are sorted by occupational code and alphabetically. The sorting by occupational code allows users to easily compare earnings of related occupations. The OES coding structure groups occupations based on related functions or duties, as follows:

10000-19999 Managerial and Administrative Occupations

This division includes top-level managers, administrators, and executives whose primary duties are policy making, planning, staffing, directing, or controlling the activities of industrial, commercial, governmental, or other establishments in which an intermediate level of supervision exists between managers and workers. Only managers and administrators whose salaries are exempt from the minimum wage and overtime provision of the Fair Labor Standards Act are included. EXCLUDED are first-line managers and supervisors with first-line duties.

20000-39999 Professional, Paraprofessional, and Technical Occupations

This division includes workers concerned with the theoretical or practical aspects of such fields as science, art, education, law, and business relations where substantial post-secondary educational preparation, or equivalent on-the-job training or experience is required. This division includes accountants, buyers, cost estimators, engineers, architects, physical and life scientists and technologists, systems analysts and computer programmers, psychologists, lawyers, teachers, instructors, health professionals, veterinarians, writers and editors, announcers, artists, designers, photographers, and others. Unlike the other occupational divisions, first-line managers and supervisors of professionals, paraprofessionals, and technicians are INCLUDED among the workers they supervise.

40000-49999 Sales and Related Occupations

This division includes persons selling goods or services and others directly related to sales. Included in this division are sales agents, travel agents, sales engineers, wholesale representatives for scientific products and services, non-technical sales representatives, retail salespersons, counter and rental clerks, sales floor stock clerks, cashiers, and telemarketing representatives. Managers of smaller establishments are also included in this division. These managers have first-line duties supervising and coordinating the activities of marketing, sales, and related workers. They engage in the same activities as those they supervise, and may also perform management functions (budgeting, accounting, marketing, personnel work) in addition to their supervisory duties.

50000-59999 Clerical and Administrative Support Occupations

Included in this division are persons performing office and plant clerical tasks, such as word processing, filing, bookkeeping, computer operation, record keeping, or mail preparation and distribution. Also included in this category are bank tellers, procurement/purchasing clerks, customer service representatives, hotel desk clerks, data entry clerks, receptionists, messengers, dispatchers, expediting clerks, warehouse stock clerks, and shipping/traffic clerks. Manager/Supervisors of smaller establishments, who are classified as First Line Supervisors, perform management functions but may also engage in the same clerical work as those they supervise.

60000-69999 Service Occupations

The Service Occupations division includes occupations relating to protective service, food service, health assisting service, cleaning and building service, and personal service. Included are police officers, firefighters, security guards, cooks, food servers, dishwashers, nursing aides, maids and janitors, hairdressers and cosmetologists, and child care workers. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both supervisory and management functions, along with performing some of the same functions of those they supervise.

70000-79999 Agricultural, Fishing, Forestry, and Related Occupations

This division includes workers involved with agricultural production, forestry, animal caretaking, and grounds keeping. Coded into this division are loggers, graders and sorters of agricultural products, nursery and greenhouse workers, animal breeders and trainers, lawn maintenance workers, and veterinary assistants. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both management and supervisory functions, and may spend up to 20 percent of their time performing the same functions as those they supervise.

80000-99999 Production, Construction, Operating, Maintenance, and Material Handling Occupations

This division includes all skilled, semiskilled, and unskilled workers performing machine, hand working, and manual tasks involving the above operations. Because this is the largest and most diverse OES division, we have provided a more detailed description of the ten major occupational groups, organized by function.

81000-81099 First-Line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors

These workers directly supervise and coordinate the activities of their subordinates and are identified by the function of the employees they supervise, such as mechanics, installers, and repairers; construction trades and extractive workers; production and operating workers; transportation and material moving machine and vehicle occupations; helpers, laborers, and manual material movers.

83000-83099 Inspectors and Related Occupations

Workers such as quality control technicians and those who perform precision and production testing, grading, sampling, or weighing of nonagricultural raw materials, parts, products, or equipment before, during, or after processing, are included in this group.

85000-85999 Mechanics, Installers, Repairers

Workers coded into this group maintain, repair, and adjust motor vehicles, equipment, machines and tools, either on or off premises. They install equipment and machinery and perform routine machinery maintenance. Included are millwrights, general utility maintenance repairers, automotive mechanics, small engine specialists, data processing equipment repairers, locksmiths, furnace installers, and garment and linen menders.

87000-87999 Construction Trades and Extractive Occupations

This occupational group includes workers who construct, alter, and maintain buildings and other structures. Included would be carpenters, masons, concrete and terrazzo finishers, electricians, painters, plumbers, septic tank servicers, carpet installers, roofers, paving equipment operators, highway maintenance workers, quarry rock splitters, blasters and explosives workers, and drillers.

89000-89999 Precision Production Occupations

Workers in this group are those whose work requires a high degree of precision and usually the ability to interpret detailed specifications and instructions along with the independent use of judgement and knowledge gained through experience and training. The work may be performed by hand, hand-held tools, or by using various types of machinery. Normally classroom or on-the-job training of six months to several years or more is required to reach the "journey" level. Some examples of precision production occupations are tool and die makers, machinists, silversmiths, model makers, cabinetmakers, custom tailors, paste-up workers, photoengravers, bookbinders, manufacturing bakers, or food batch makers.

91000-92998 Machine Setters, Set-up Operators, Operators, and Tenders

These workers set up, operate, or tend machinery (usually large production machinery). Those who set up or set up and operate machines are grouped separately from operators and tenders. Occupations are defined by the material being processed; metal and plastic, wood, printing and binding, textiles, and a miscellaneous category that includes other materials (film, tires, food) and their processing.

93000-93999 Hand Working Occupations, Including Assemblers and Fabricators

This category of worker performs hand assembly, fabrication, finishing, and a wide variety of handwork, such as welding, cutting, molding, painting, grinding, and sewing, in production of goods. Precision assemblers, whose work normally requires training as indicated in the previous precision production section, are reported among these hand workers.

95000-95099 Plant and System Occupations

Plant and systems workers control or operate systems of machines or entire processes through the use of control panels or centralized controls, such as chemical or water treatment systems.

97000-97999 Transportation and Material Moving Machine and Vehicle Operators

These workers operate or control vehicles used to transport people or materials, as well as transportation related workers. They operate trucks, buses, water vessels, aircraft, construction and excavating equipment, and machinery such as hoists and winches, cranes and towers, industrial trucks (fork lifts) and tractors, conveyors, and pumps. Also included are driver/sales workers, service station attendants, and parking lot attendants.

98000-98999 Helpers, Laborers, and Hand Material Movers

These workers perform non-machine tasks generally of a routine nature and requiring minimal training. This category of worker helps production, construction, operating and maintenance workers, but are not involved directly in the making of a product. They assist by machine feeding and off bearing, moving materials manually, loading or unloading, hand packing or packaging, and may also clean and wash vehicles and equipment.

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
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
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PREFACE

We are grateful to all employers who responded to the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. This monograph would not be possible without their cooperation.

The OES survey is a federal-state cooperative program funded by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the Employment and Training Administration (ETA). Partial financial support for this report was also provided by the Maine Occupational Information Coordinating Committee (MOICC).

All 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands participate in the OES program. Maine was one of the first states to collect wage rates through OES, having done so since 1991. In 1996 the OES survey became the source of occupational wage rates nationwide. This monograph contains 1997 wage rates for 366 occupations reported in the Portland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA). Other monographs are available containing wage rates for Maine (statewide), and for the Bangor and Lewiston-Auburn MSAs. Rates are also available for the Portsmouth-Rochester NH-ME Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA), which includes the Maine towns of Berwick, South Berwick, Eliot, Kittery, and York.

A comparison of Maine wages with those of other states is possible by accessing the Bureau of Labor Statistics Internet site. BLS has posted mean and median wage rates of every state, territory and district of the United States, allowing for wage comparisons based on a standardized methodology. INTRODUCTION

The information contained in this monograph was collected during the 1996 and 1997 Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. Wage rates are provided for every occupation meeting Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) standards for statistical validity and confidentiality. Estimates are provided for the occupational employment, mean, median, and midrange (upper and lower).

The **estimated employment** figure represents the estimated occupational employment across all industries reporting the occupation. In instances where the employment estimate did not meet statistical validity standards, this field was left blank. The **mean** represents the mathematical, weighted average for all workers reported in the subject occupation. The **median** is the actual mid-point, or the point at which half of the workers earn more and half earn less than the posted figure. The **mid-range** represents the 25th and 75th percentiles. Earnings of fifty percent of the workers in a given occupation fall within this range, while twenty five percent earn less than the lower figure and twenty five percent earn more than the upper figure.

Wages collected by the OES program represent straight-time wage rates, which are total earnings before payroll deductions, and exclude tips, premium pay for overtime or for work on weekends, holidays, and late shifts. Also excluded are performance bonuses and lump-sum payments such as profit sharing, attendance bonuses, holiday, year-end bonuses, and other non-production based payments. Payments which are included are cost-of-living allowances, longevity pay, and incentive payments which result from commissions, piecework, or production bonuses.

Most wage rates are published at an hourly rate. Weekly rates may be obtained by multiplying the hourly rate by 40, which is considered to be a standard work week. Annual rates may be obtained by multiplying an hourly rate by 2,080, which represents 40 hours worked per week, 52 weeks per year. Wage rates for some occupations (teachers, performers, and aircraft pilots) are only published at an annual rate. When this occurs only the mean annual salary is available.

The OES survey collects wages based on wage ranges. The upper limit of the survey is \$60.01 per hour (\$124,821 per year). The vast majority of wage rates fall below this upper limit, however any occurrence of a \$60.01 figure should be interpreted as actually representing \$60.01 or greater.

The data provided in this monograph are for informational and research purposes only. These wage rates should not be used for Alien Labor Certification (ALC) purposes.

OCCUPATIONAL DEFINITIONS

Occupations contained in the tables are sorted by occupational code and alphabetically. The sorting by occupational code allows users to easily compare earnings of related occupations. The OES coding structure groups occupations based on related functions or duties, as follows:

10000-19999 Managerial and Administrative Occupations

This division includes top-level managers, administrators, and executives whose primary duties are policy making, planning, staffing, directing, or controlling the activities of industrial, commercial, governmental, or other establishments in which an intermediate level of supervision exists between managers and workers. Only managers and administrators whose salaries are exempt from the minimum wage and overtime provision of the Fair Labor Standards Act are included. EXCLUDED are first-line managers and supervisors with first-line duties.

20000-39999 Professional, Paraprofessional, and Technical Occupations

This division includes workers concerned with the theoretical or practical aspects of such fields as science, art, education, law, and business relations where substantial post-secondary educational preparation, or equivalent on-the-job training or experience is required. This division includes accountants, buyers, cost estimators, engineers, architects, physical and life scientists and technologists, systems analysts and computer programmers, psychologists, lawyers, teachers, instructors, health professionals, veterinarians, writers and editors, announcers, artists, designers, photographers, and others. Unlike the other occupational divisions, first-line managers and supervisors of professionals, paraprofessionals, and technicians are INCLUDED among the workers they supervise.

40000-49999 Sales and Related Occupations

This division includes persons selling goods or services and others directly related to sales. Included in this division are sales agents, travel agents, sales engineers, wholesale representatives for scientific products and services, non-technical sales representatives, retail salespersons, counter and rental clerks, sales floor stock clerks, cashiers, and telemarketing representatives. Managers of smaller establishments are also included in this division. These managers have first-line duties supervising and coordinating the activities of marketing, sales, and related workers. They engage in the same activities as those they supervise, and may also perform management functions (budgeting, accounting, marketing, personnel work) in addition to their supervisory duties.

50000-59999 Clerical and Administrative Support Occupations

Included in this division are persons performing office and plant clerical tasks, such as word processing, filing, bookkeeping, computer operation, record keeping, or mail preparation and distribution. Also included in this category are bank tellers, procurement/purchasing clerks, customer service representatives, hotel desk clerks, data entry clerks, receptionists, messengers, dispatchers, expediting clerks, warehouse stock clerks, and shipping/traffic clerks. Manager/Supervisors of smaller establishments, who are classified as First Line Supervisors, perform management functions but may also engage in the same clerical work as those they supervise.

60000-69999 Service Occupations

The Service Occupations division includes occupations relating to protective service, food service, health assisting service, cleaning and building service, and personal service. Included are police officers, firefighters, security guards, cooks, food servers, dishwashers, nursing aides, maids and janitors, hairdressers and cosmetologists, and child care workers. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both supervisory and management functions, along with performing some of the same functions of those they supervise.

70000-79999 Agricultural, Fishing, Forestry, and Related Occupations

This division includes workers involved with agricultural production, forestry, animal caretaking, and grounds keeping. Coded into this division are loggers, graders and sorters of agricultural products, nursery and greenhouse workers, animal breeders and trainers, lawn maintenance workers, and veterinary assistants. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both management and supervisory functions, and may spend up to 20 percent of their time performing the same functions as those they supervise.

80000-99999 Production, Construction, Operating, Maintenance, and Material Handling Occupations

This division includes all skilled, semiskilled, and unskilled workers performing machine, hand working, and manual tasks involving the above operations. Because this is the largest and most diverse OES division, we have provided a more detailed description of the ten major occupational groups, organized by function.

81000-81099 First-Line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors

These workers directly supervise and coordinate the activities of their subordinates and are identified by the function of the employees they supervise, such as mechanics, installers, and repairers; construction trades and extractive workers; production and operating workers; transportation and material moving machine and vehicle occupations; helpers, laborers, and manual material movers.

83000-83099 Inspectors and Related Occupations

Workers such as quality control technicians and those who perform precision and production testing, grading, sampling, or weighing of nonagricultural raw materials, parts, products, or equipment before, during, or after processing, are included in this group.

85000-85999 Mechanics, Installers, Repairers

Workers coded into this group maintain, repair, and adjust motor vehicles, equipment, machines and tools, either on or off premises. They install equipment and machinery and perform routine machinery maintenance. Included are millwrights, general utility maintenance repairers, automotive mechanics, small engine specialists, data processing equipment repairers, locksmiths, furnace installers, and garment and linen menders.

87000-87999 Construction Trades and Extractive Occupations

This occupational group includes workers who construct, alter, and maintain buildings and other structures. Included would be carpenters, masons, concrete and terrazzo finishers, electricians, painters, plumbers, septic tank servicers, carpet installers, roofers, paving equipment operators, highway maintenance workers, quarry rock splitters, blasters and explosives workers, and drillers.

89000-89999 Precision Production Occupations

Workers in this group are those whose work requires a high degree of precision and usually the ability to interpret detailed specifications and instructions along with the independent use of judgement and knowledge gained through experience and training. The work may be performed by hand, hand-held tools, or by using various types of machinery. Normally classroom or on-the-job training of six months to several years or more is required to reach the "journey" level. Some examples of precision production occupations are tool and die makers, machinists, silversmiths, model makers, cabinetmakers, custom tailors, paste-up workers, photoengravers, bookbinders, manufacturing bakers, or food batch makers.

91000-92998 Machine Setters, Set-up Operators, Operators, and Tenders

These workers set up, operate, or tend machinery (usually large production machinery). Those who set up or set up and operate machines are grouped separately from operators and tenders. Occupations are defined by the material being processed; metal and plastic, wood, printing and binding, textiles, and a miscellaneous category that includes other materials (film, tires, food) and their processing.

93000-93999 Hand Working Occupations, Including Assemblers and Fabricators

This category of worker performs hand assembly, fabrication, finishing, and a wide variety of handwork, such as welding, cutting, molding, painting, grinding, and sewing, in production of goods. Precision assemblers, whose work normally requires training as indicated in the previous precision production section, are reported among these hand workers.

95000-95099 Plant and System Occupations

Plant and systems workers control or operate systems of machines or entire processes through the use of control panels or centralized controls, such as chemical or water treatment systems.

97000-97999 Transportation and Material Moving Machine and Vehicle Operators

These workers operate or control vehicles used to transport people or materials, as well as transportation related workers. They operate trucks, buses, water vessels, aircraft, construction and excavating equipment, and machinery such as hoists and winches, cranes and towers, industrial trucks (fork lifts) and tractors, conveyors, and pumps. Also included are driver/sales workers, service station attendants, and parking lot attendants.

98000-98999 Helpers, Laborers, and Hand Material Movers

These workers perform non-machine tasks generally of a routine nature and requiring minimal training. This category of worker helps production, construction, operating and maintenance workers, but are not involved directly in the making of a product. They assist by machine feeding and off bearing, moving materials manually, loading or unloading, hand packing or packaging, and may also clean and wash vehicles and equipment.

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
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
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PREFACE

We are grateful to all employers who responded to the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. This monograph would not be possible without their cooperation.

The OES survey is a federal-state cooperative program funded by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) and the Employment and Training Administration (ETA). Partial financial support for this report was also provided by the Maine Occupational Information Coordinating Committee (MOICC).

All 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands participate in the OES program. Maine was one of the first states to collect wage rates through OES, having done so since 1991. In 1996 the OES survey became the source of occupational wage rates nationwide. This monograph contains 1997 wage rates for 313 occupations reported in the Portsmouth Rochester NH-ME Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA). Included in this area are the Maine towns of Berwick, South Berwick, Eliot, Kittery, and York. Other monographs are available containing wage rates for Maine (statewide), and for the Bangor, Lewiston-Auburn, and Portland areas.

A comparison of Maine wages with those of other states is possible by accessing the Bureau of Labor Statistics Internet site. BLS has posted mean and median wage rates of every state, territory and district of the United States, allowing for wage comparisons based on a standardized methodology. INTRODUCTION

The information contained in this monograph was collected during the 1996 and 1997 Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey. Wage rates are provided for every occupation meeting Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) standards for statistical validity and confidentiality. Estimates are provided for the occupational employment, mean, median, and midrange (upper and lower).

The **estimated employment** figure represents the estimated occupational employment across all industries reporting the occupation. In instances where the employment estimate did not meet statistical validity standards, this field was left blank. The **mean** represents the mathematical, weighted average for all workers reported in the subject occupation. The **median** is the actual mid-point, or the point at which half of the workers earn more and half earn less than the posted figure. The **mid-range** represents the 25th and 75th percentiles. Earnings of fifty percent of the workers in a given occupation fall within this range, while twenty five percent earn less than the lower figure and twenty five percent earn more than the upper figure.

Wages collected by the OES program represent straight-time wage rates, which are total earnings before payroll deductions, and exclude tips, premium pay for overtime or for work on weekends, holidays, and late shifts. Also excluded are performance bonuses and lump-sum payments such as profit sharing, attendance bonuses, holiday, year-end bonuses, and other non-production based payments. Payments which are included are cost-of-living allowances, longevity pay, and incentive payments which result from commissions, piecework, or production bonuses.

Most wage rates are published at an hourly rate. Weekly rates may be obtained by multiplying the hourly rate by 40, which is considered to be a standard work week. Annual rates may be obtained by multiplying an hourly rate by 2,080, which represents 40 hours worked per week, 52 weeks per year. Wage rates for some occupations (teachers, performers, and aircraft pilots) are only published at an annual rate. When this occurs only the mean annual salary is available.

The OES survey collects wages based on wage ranges. The upper limit of the survey is \$60.01 per hour (\$124,821 per year). The vast majority of wage rates fall below this upper limit, however any occurrence of a \$60.01 figure should be interpreted as actually representing \$60.01 or greater.

The data provided in this monograph are for informational and research purposes only. These wage rates should not be used for Alien Labor Certification (ALC) purposes.

OCCUPATIONAL DEFINITIONS

Occupations contained in the tables are sorted by occupational code and alphabetically. The sorting by occupational code allows users to easily compare earnings of related occupations. The OES coding structure groups occupations based on related functions or duties, as follows:

10000-19999 Managerial and Administrative Occupations

This division includes top-level managers, administrators, and executives whose primary duties are policy making, planning, staffing, directing, or controlling the activities of industrial, commercial, governmental, or other establishments in which an intermediate level of supervision exists between managers and workers. Only managers and administrators whose salaries are exempt from the minimum wage and overtime provision of the Fair Labor Standards Act are included. EXCLUDED are first-line managers and supervisors with first-line duties.

20000-39999 Professional, Paraprofessional, and Technical Occupations

This division includes workers concerned with the theoretical or practical aspects of such fields as science, art, education, law, and business relations where substantial post-secondary educational preparation, or equivalent on-the-job training or experience is required. This division includes accountants, buyers, cost estimators, engineers, architects, physical and life scientists and technologists, systems analysts and computer programmers, psychologists, lawyers, teachers, instructors, health professionals, veterinarians, writers and editors, announcers, artists, designers, photographers, and others. Unlike the other occupational divisions, first-line managers and supervisors of professionals, paraprofessionals, and technicians are INCLUDED among the workers they supervise.

40000-49999 Sales and Related Occupations

This division includes persons selling goods or services and others directly related to sales. Included in this division are sales agents, travel agents, sales engineers, wholesale representatives for scientific products and services, non-technical sales representatives, retail salespersons, counter and rental clerks, sales floor stock clerks, cashiers, and telemarketing representatives. Managers of smaller establishments are also included in this division. These managers have first-line duties supervising and coordinating the activities of marketing, sales, and related workers. They engage in the same activities as those they supervise, and may also perform management functions (budgeting, accounting, marketing, personnel work) in addition to their supervisory duties.

50000-59999 Clerical and Administrative Support Occupations

Included in this division are persons performing office and plant clerical tasks, such as word processing, filing, bookkeeping, computer operation, record keeping, or mail preparation and distribution. Also included in this category are bank tellers, procurement/purchasing clerks, customer service representatives, hotel desk clerks, data entry clerks, receptionists, messengers, dispatchers, expediting clerks, warehouse stock clerks, and shipping/traffic clerks. Manager/Supervisors of smaller establishments, who are classified as First Line Supervisors, perform management functions but may also engage in the same clerical work as those they supervise.

60000-69999 Service Occupations

The Service Occupations division includes occupations relating to protective service, food service, health assisting service, cleaning and building service, and personal service. Included are police officers, firefighters, security guards, cooks, food servers, dishwashers, nursing aides, maids and janitors, hairdressers and cosmetologists, and child care workers. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both supervisory and management functions, along with performing some of the same functions of those they supervise.

70000-79999 Agricultural, Fishing, Forestry, and Related Occupations

This division includes workers involved with agricultural production, forestry, animal caretaking, and grounds keeping. Coded into this division are loggers, graders and sorters of agricultural products, nursery and greenhouse workers, animal breeders and trainers, lawn maintenance workers, and veterinary assistants. First-line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors in smaller establishments perform both management and supervisory functions, and may spend up to 20 percent of their time performing the same functions as those they supervise.

80000-99999 Production, Construction, Operating, Maintenance, and Material Handling Occupations

This division includes all skilled, semiskilled, and unskilled workers performing machine, hand working, and manual tasks involving the above operations. Because this is the largest and most diverse OES division, we have provided a more detailed description of the ten major occupational groups, organized by function.

81000-81099 First-Line Supervisors and Manager/Supervisors

These workers directly supervise and coordinate the activities of their subordinates and are identified by the function of the employees they supervise, such as mechanics, installers, and repairers; construction trades and extractive workers; production and operating workers; transportation and material moving machine and vehicle occupations; helpers, laborers, and manual material movers.

83000-83099 Inspectors and Related Occupations

Workers such as quality control technicians and those who perform precision and production testing, grading, sampling, or weighing of nonagricultural raw materials, parts, products, or equipment before, during, or after processing, are included in this group.

85000-85999 Mechanics, Installers, Repairers

Workers coded into this group maintain, repair, and adjust motor vehicles, equipment, machines and tools, either on or off premises. They install equipment and machinery and perform routine machinery maintenance. Included are millwrights, general utility maintenance repairers, automotive mechanics, small engine specialists, data processing equipment repairers, locksmiths, furnace installers, and garment and linen menders.

87000-87999 Construction Trades and Extractive Occupations

This occupational group includes workers who construct, alter, and maintain buildings and other structures. Included would be carpenters, masons, concrete and terrazzo finishers, electricians, painters, plumbers, septic tank servicers, carpet installers, roofers, paving equipment operators, highway maintenance workers, quarry rock splitters, blasters and explosives workers, and drillers.

89000-89999 Precision Production Occupations

Workers in this group are those whose work requires a high degree of precision and usually the ability to interpret detailed specifications and instructions along with the independent use of judgement and knowledge gained through experience and training. The work may be performed by hand, hand-held tools, or by using various types of machinery. Normally classroom or on-the-job training of six months to several years or more is required to reach the "journey" level. Some examples of precision production occupations are tool and die makers, machinists, silversmiths, model makers, cabinetmakers, custom tailors, paste-up workers, photoengravers, bookbinders, manufacturing bakers, or food batch makers.

91000-92998 Machine Setters, Set-up Operators, Operators, and Tenders

These workers set up, operate, or tend machinery (usually large production machinery). Those who set up or set up and operate machines are grouped separately from operators and tenders. Occupations are defined by the material being processed; metal and plastic, wood, printing and binding, textiles, and a miscellaneous category that includes other materials (film, tires, food) and their processing.

93000-93999 Hand Working Occupations, Including Assemblers and Fabricators

This category of worker performs hand assembly, fabrication, finishing, and a wide variety of handwork, such as welding, cutting, molding, painting, grinding, and sewing, in production of goods. Precision assemblers, whose work normally requires training as indicated in the previous precision production section, are reported among these hand workers.

95000-95099 Plant and System Occupations

Plant and systems workers control or operate systems of machines or entire processes through the use of control panels or centralized controls, such as chemical or water treatment systems.

97000-97999 Transportation and Material Moving Machine and Vehicle Operators

These workers operate or control vehicles used to transport people or materials, as well as transportation related workers. They operate trucks, buses, water vessels, aircraft, construction and excavating equipment, and machinery such as hoists and winches, cranes and towers, industrial trucks (fork lifts) and tractors, conveyors, and pumps. Also included are driver/sales workers, service station attendants, and parking lot attendants.

98000-98999 Helpers, Laborers, and Hand Material Movers

These workers perform non-machine tasks generally of a routine nature and requiring minimal training. This category of worker helps production, construction, operating and maintenance workers, but are not involved directly in the making of a product. They assist by machine feeding and off bearing, moving materials manually, loading or unloading, hand packing or packaging, and may also clean and wash vehicles and equipment.
