AN ACT to Make Allocations for the Administrative Expenses of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages, Department of Finance, for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 1992 and June 30, 1993.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate until after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and

Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and the State Liquor Commission will become due and payable on or immediately after July 1, 1991; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. Allocation of fund. In order to provide for the necessary expenses of operation and administration of the Bureau of Alcoholic Beverages and the State Liquor Commission, the following amounts, or as much as may be necessary, are allocated from the revenues derived from operations of the Alcoholic Beverages Fund:

Sec. 2. Allotments required. Upon receipt of allotments duly approved by the Governor, based upon work programs submitted to the State Budget Officer, the State Controller shall authorize expenditures from these allocations on the basis of these allotments and not otherwise. Sec. 3. Legislative intent. It is the intent of the Legislature that the allocation of funds by the Legislature, as provided by this Act, shall apply to the administrative expenses only and that these allocations shall be allotted and approved under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5. It is not intended to affect the use of the working capital, provided for by the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 28, or other activities required of the State Liquor Commission by the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 28.

Sec. 4. Adjustments to allocations. Allocations may be increased or adjusted by the State Budget Officer with the approval of the Governor, to specifically cover those adjustments determined to be necessary under any salary plan approved by the Legislature, and those reclassifications or range changes which have been approved by the Department of Administration and submitted for legislative review prior to the effective date of this Act.

Sec. 5. Exclusion. Exclusive of the provisions of sections 1 to 4, up to \$100,000 for Capital Expenditures may be expended in each fiscal year.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect on July 1, 1991.

Sec. 2. Allotments required. Upon receipt of allotments duly approved by the Governor, based upon work programs submitted to the State Budget Officer, the State Controller shall authorize expenditures from these allocations on the basis of these allotments and not otherwise.

Sec. 3. Legislative intent. It is the intent of the Legislature that the allocation of funds by the Legislature, as provided by this Act, shall apply to the administrative expenses only and that these allocations shall be allotted and approved under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5.

Sec. 4. Adjustments to allocations. Allocations may be increased or adjusted by the State Budget Officer with the approval of the Governor, to specifically cover those adjustments determined to be necessary under any salary plan approved by the Legislature and those reclassifications or range changes which have been approved by the Department of Administration and submitted for legislative review prior to the effective date of this Act.

Sec. 5. Exclusion. Excluding sections 1 to 4 of this Act, up to \$90,000 each fiscal year may be expended for Capital Expenditures.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act shall take effect on July 1, 1991.

In order to provide for necessary expenditures of State Government and other purposes for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1992 and June 30, 1993, the following sums, as designated in the following tabulations, are allocated from the revenues derived from federal block grants. Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, all federal block grant allocations included in this Act shall be subject to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1585.

An Act Making Unified Appropriations and Allocations for the Expenditures of State Government, General Fund, and Changing Certain Provisions of the Law Necessary to the Proper Operations of State Government for the Fiscal Years Ending June 30, 1992 and June 30, 1993.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, the 90-day period may not terminate until after the beginning of the next fiscal year; and

Whereas, certain obligations and expenses incident to the operation of state departments and institutions will become due and payable immediately; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore,

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

PART A

Sec. 1. Appropriations and allocations. In order to provide for necessary expenditures of State Government and other purposes for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1992 and June 30, 1993, the following sums as designated in the following tabulations are appropriated or allocated out of any money not otherwise appropriated or allocated.

Sec. 2. Allotments required. Upon receipt of allotments duly approved by the Governor based upon work programs submitted to the State Budget Officer, the State Controller shall authorize expenditures of these funds, together with expenditures for other purposes necessary to the conduct of State Government on the basis of these allotments and not otherwise. Allotments for Personal Services, Capital Expenditures and amounts for All Other departmental expenses shall not exceed the amounts shown in the budget document or as they may be revised by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over these appropriations and allocations, unless recommended by the State Budget Officer and approved by the Governor in accordance with established law.

Sec. 3. Personal Services funding. The amounts provided for Personal Services in the General Fund and Highway Fund are subject to the provision that the total number of permanent positions and the costs thereof in any account shall not, during either year of the biennium, either exceed the authorized position numbers shown in parentheses which are used by the Legislature in computing the total dollars to be made available for Personal Services or deviate from the specific cost components upon which appropriations and allocations are based except as provided for in section 6. The State Budget Officer may require any department or agency to submit information considered necessary to assure compliance with this provision. In other funds, the numbers in parentheses are estimates of full-time equivalents. Savings accrued within appropriations or allocations made for Personal Services may be used for payment of nonrecurring Personal Services costs, such as those relating to: unbudgeted overtime; acting capacity appointments; retroactive compensation for reclassifications or reallocations; retroactive or one-time settlements related to arbitrator or court decisions; and required additional retirement contributions, when recommended by the department or agency head and approved by the State Budget Officer.

The amounts appropriated or allocated for Personal Services include funds for the State's share of state employees' retirement. The State Controller shall transfer the State's share to the Maine State Retirement System as soon as practicable after each payroll is paid.

Sec. 4. Workers' compensation positions. Limited period positions may be established for former regular employees of the State who are presently receiving workers' compensation payments from the State when that action will enable those employees to return to productive employment with the State. These positions may be established, providing funds are available, only until those employees can be returned to regular positions.

Notwithstanding any other restriction on funds appropriated or allocated, the State Budget Officer may, after determining that funds are available, either approve the use of these funds or recommend appropriate action to the Governor when the Governor's approval is required.

Available funds may include amounts appropriated or allocated for Personal Services, including funds in any salary account or special account for state employee salary increases, All Other, Capital Expenditures and unallocated.

Sec. 5. Personal Services policy and review. The Bureau of the Budget, during this biennium, shall continually review with all departments the status of their manpower levels and staffing patterns for the purpose of determining whether funds and positions are being utilized and managed in the most economical and efficient manner to accomplish the intent of the Legislature. Permanent positions for which funds are appropriated or allocated shall be classified positions, unless specifically designated otherwise by the Legislature. It shall be the responsibility of the Director of the Bureau of Human Resources and the State Budget Officer to ensure that classified and unclassified positions are assigned to a proper pay grade within authorized funds.

Sec. 6. Personal Services flexibility. Any classification or reclassification of a position and any allocation or reallocation of a position within the compensation plan made by the Director of Human Resources pursuant to the Civil Service Law and rules shall become effective on the first day of the fiscal year following approval by the State Budget Officer, and the appropriation or allocation of funds therefor, except that the State Budget Officer may, if the officer determines that sufficient funds exist, authorize an effective date prior to the first day of the ensuing fiscal year. Copies of all actions and certifications shall be furnished to the Director of the Legislative Office of Fiscal and Program Review.

Sec. 7. Merit rating required. It is declared to be the policy of the State that, in those instances when annual merit increases are earned and warranted as evidenced by the performance appraisals, they shall be awarded. In those instances when increases are not earned and warranted, they shall be denied.

In furtherance of this policy, the Director of the Bureau of Human Resources, utilizing a form or forms prescribed by the director, is directed to require annual merit ratings on all employees, regardless of whether or not the employee is eligible or recommended for a merit increase. The form or forms prescribed by the director, in addition to a performance appraisal section, shall include a section wherein each probationary employee's supervisor shall indicate the extent to which the employee has been oriented to the duties and responsibilities of the employee's position. Whenever an employee is not awarded a merit increase, a record of the reasons therefor and the actions recommended by the employee's supervisor to correct deficiencies, if any, shall be recorded in the performance appraisal.

The Director of the Bureau of Human Resources is also directed to develop and install a training program for supervisory personnel, including appropriate guides and manuals, which shall ensure that all evaluators charged with the responsibility of doing employee merit ratings shall do so fairly and equitably, one employee to the next and one organizational unit to another.

The Director of the Bureau of Human Resources shall supply to the Policy Review Board all data necessary to monitor and evaluate the performance appraisal system, including data regarding the percentage and distribution of merit increases. The board, pursuant to its powers under the Maine Revised Statutee, Title 5, section 7042, will review the operation of the performance evaluation system and make such recommendations and render such advice to the Director of the Bureau of Human Resources as necessary to carry out the purposes of this Act.

The Director of the Bureau of Human Resources shall forward to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over State Government the findings and recommendations of the Policy Review Board, annually, prior to the legislative session.

Sec. 8. Number of necessary employees. The Governor and the State Budget Officer when next preparing budget proposals for the Legislature, may at their discretion adjust the figures in parentheses, representing numbers of positions, to reflect the number of positions which, in their opinion, are necessary to the proper operation of each department, institution or agency.

Sec. 9. New or expanded programs. No department may establish new programs or expand existing programs beyond the scope of those programs already established, recognized and approved by the Legislature, until the program and the method of financing are submitted to the Bureau of the Budget for evaluation and recommendation to the Legislature and until the funds are made available therefor by the Legislature.

Sec. 10. Federally funded programs. It is the intent of the Legislature that, if federal funds are not available as anticipated for programs in this Act,

.

there is no obligation to provide state funds in excess of those listed in this Act. Positions entirely or partially funded by federal or nonstate sources of funds shall be considered as limited-period positions.

Sec. 11. Travel limitations. It is the intent of the Legislature that out-of-state travel be limited. Any state employee who travels out of state on state business, such as law enforcement, collecting, bidding, industrial development or loans, may continue to do so. The Legislature directs that department heads limit the cost of all travel when it is not absolutely needed. A state employee shall not be reimbursed for noon meals, unless the expense is incurred while traveling on state business and lodging is required. Any state employee who attends a seminar or other program which includes the cost of a noon meal as part of the tuition or registration fee will not be required to reimburse the State for the meal.

Sec. 12. Equipment to be reviewed. The Commissioner of Finance may choose a designee to conduct a thorough review of all types of equipment owned, leased or otherwise available to the departments and agencies of the State, regardless of the source of supporting funds, and make recommendations via the budgetary process for combining their use, providing centralized facilities or eliminating existing equipment and facilities, as believed to be in the most economical and efficient interests of the State. The Commissioner of Finance may also develop and institute review and control mechanisms considered necessary to ensure that capital equipment purchases authorized by the Legislature are consistent with the intent for which funds were recommended and made available.

Sec. 13. Motor vehicle replacement policy. The State Purchasing Agent is directed to require that requisitions for replacement motor vehicles include the age and total mileage of the motor vehicle being replaced. For the purposes of this section, motor vehicles are defined as passenger cars and panel and pickup trucks, excluding those vehicles authorized and assigned for pursuit purposes. Under no circumstances are any state vehicles to be used primarily for commuting purposes. It is the intent of the Legislature that motor vehicles shall have been in service for at least 5 years or 75,000 miles before they are replaced. This policy shall also be adopted by the State Budget Officer when next preparing a budget document. Exceptions to the established replacement policy shall require the prior approval of the Commissioner of Finance. The Commissioner of Finance may also set appropriate standards with regard to motor vehicle type size and equipment and direct that all motor vehicles be purchased in accordance with a commodity calendar established by the State Purchasing Agent.

Sec. 14. Significant action recommended by the State Budget Officer. The Bureau of the Budget shall inform the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over appropriations and financial affairs, through the Legislative Office of Fiscal and Program Review, of significant action recommended by the bureau in the performance of the budget responsibilities assigned.

Sec. 15. State Cost Allocation Program. The State Cost Allocation Program shall annually identify the kind and cost of central services furnished to each state agency from General Fund appropriations. The non-General Fund portion of each agency shall be assessed for these services as determined by the State Cost

÷.

Allocation Program procedures to the extent that payments are not expressly prohibited by state or federal law or by the terms of a gift or donation made to the State from private sources. These payments shall be credited to the General Fund as undedicated revenue. The State Budget Officer may adjust this assessment to any individual account.

Non-General Fund resources which contribute to funding costs related to general department-wide functions, such as accounting, personnel administration, maintenance of property records and general purchasing, that have been made available to an account by legislative action may be consolidated into one or more administrative accounts, unless such a consolidation is expressly prohibited by state or federal law. All resources and costs affected by such consolidation shall be properly identified and included in the budget process in accordance with the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, chapter 149. When the Legislature is not in session and upon recommendation of the State Budget Officer, the Governor may approve necessary adjustments to these consolidations for a period not to exceed the end of the fiscal year. The Director of the Legislative Office of Fiscal and Program Review shall be notified of any such action. The unencumbered balance of each administrative account established pursuant to this section shall be carried forward at the end of each fiscal year and the budgeted transfers to the administrative account for the ensuing year shall be proportionally reduced by the amount of that carried balance.

Sec. 16. Unified state budget. The Governor, when submitting the budget to the Legislature, shall submit the budget document and the General Fund and Highway Fund bills in a manner that will identify the gross amount of resources for each program. The gross unified budget bills and budget document shall encompass resources from all funds, including, but not limited to: General Fund, Highway Fund, Federal Fund, Federal Block Grant Fund and Other Special Revenue funds. Separate gross unified budget bills shall be submitted for the General Fund and the Highway Fund.

Sec. 17. Line category amounts of General Fund and Highway Fund. The amounts included in the unified state budget by line category are the amounts included immediately under the appropriations and allocations section of the individual pages in the budget document for the General Fund and the Highway Fund. These amounts, as adjusted by the Legislature, will be used when preparing work programs by fund for each fiscal year of the biennium.

Sec. 18. Multiple accounts certification. If any amounts identified to a fund in the source of funds section are to be distributed to more than one account within that fund, the department or agency head responsible for those funds shall certify to the State Budget Officer the amounts included in each account by line category and certify that the sum of the accounts by fund, by line category, equals the approved totals of the program within the Act.

Sec. 19. Year-end closing. The State Controller may close the books as soon as practicable after the close of the fiscal years ending June 30, 1992 and June 30, 1993. Any bills presented after those dates may be paid from appropriations or allocations for the ensuing year on recommendation of the State Controller if within the amounts of approved allotments. Sec. 20. Appropriation and allocation balances at year end. At the end of each fiscal year, all unencumbered appropriation and allocation balances shall lapse into the fund or the account balance and shall not be available unless authorized by law. At the end of each fiscal year, all encumbered balances shall not be carried more than once.

Sec. 21. Reorganization of departments. No department or agency may be allowed to reorganize between accounts in the Part I current services budget. Any such reorganization shall be submitted in the Part II new or expanded services budget or separate legislation.

Sec. 22. Appropriation or allocation of funds. Any funds appearing in this Act which are specifically appropriated or allocated in another Act are included in this Act for informational purposes only, as are general ledger accounts. Governmental funds not specifically appropriated or allocated in another Act are appropriated or allocated in accordance with section 1.

Sec. 23. Other appropriation and allocation measures. It is intended that the language in this Act, except for section 22, shall apply to all other appropriation and allocation measures enacted by the Legislature.

Sec. 24. Allocations. The following allocations and appropriations are made:

Sec. 5. Limit of State's obligation. In the event that the State's continued obligation for any individual program contained within sections F-2 and F-4 of this Part exceeds the level of funding provided for that program, any unexpended balances occurring in other programs may be applied to avoid proration of payments for any individual program. Any unexpended balances from sections F-2 and F-4 may not lapse, but must be carried forward to be used for the same purpose.

Sec. 6. Appropriation. Nothing in sections F-1 to F-5 of this Part may be construed to require the State to provide payments which exceed the appropriation of funds for the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1991 and ending June 30, 1992.

#### [ARTICLE I. GENERAL PROVISIONS]

#### § 13061. Office established

The commissioner shall establish the Office of Economic Development. This office shall encourage the initiation, expansion and location of businesses in Maine which would expand quality employment opportunities for Maine citizens.

The Office of Economic Development shall encourage business by removing barriers to growth, facilitating exploration of opportunities and providing assistance necessary to enhance business consistent with the State's economic development strategy.

#### § 13062. Office of Economic Development

The Deputy Commissioner for Economic Development shall be the Director of the Office of Economic Development and shall administer the office in accordance with the policies of the commissioner and the provisions of this chapter, emphasizing a program of targeted business development designed to attract particular types of businesses which have potential for Maine and businesses which are deemed to be compatible with Maine's environment and interests. The office shall actively seek and encourage firms to expand or locate in Maine. The office shall be responsible for the implementation of programs designed to promote Maine products in national and international markets and to develop markets for industry located in Maine.

The Office of Economic Development shall be responsible for the implementation of a program consisting of 3 primary elements.

1. Business investment. Business investment shall be encouraged consistent with this subsection.

A. The office shall conduct an analysis of the various industrial sectors of the economy. The types of businesses to be targeted for attraction shall be ones which have potential for development in Maine and which will contribute to a healthy business and environmental climate.

B. The office shall report its findings and recommendations to the commissioner. The commissioner, with the advice of the director shall determine the type and extent of the business investment program to be implemented.

C. The director, with the approval of the commissioner, may make grants for market development from appropriations for that purpose to any municipality or group of municipalities which have received a grant of authority from the Federal Government to establish a foreign trade zone.

D. Application for foreign trade zones shall be according to this paragraph. (1) The director, with the approval of the commissioner, on behalf of the State, may make applications to the Foreign Trade Zone Board and establish foreign trade zones that are to be located on state-owned, leased or otherwise controlled property. A municipality, group of municipalities or a public or private corporation may, with the approval of the department, make applications to the Foreign Trade Zone Board and establish foreign trade zones at other locations. Foreign trade zones shall be established in or adjacent to any ports of entry in the State, where personal property in transit shall be exempt from the stock-in-trade tax and such other taxes and customs as are normally levied in a port of entry.

(2) Any development or activity with a foreign trade zone established in the State is subject to the laws which the Department of Environmental Protection, Department of Conservation, Department of Marine Resources, and Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife are responsible for administering, as well as any other law which protects the environment.

(3) For the purpose of the subsection, "personal property in transit" through the areas established under this paragraph means goods, wares, and

merchandise either moving in interstate or international commerce through these zones or consigned to a warehouse, public or private, within these zones, whether specified when transportation begins or afterward. This property shall not be deprived of exemption because, while in the warehouse, the property is assembled, bound, joined, processed, disassembled, divided, cut, broken in bulk, relabeled or repackaged. The exemption granted shall be liberally construed to effect the purposes of this subsection. The warehouse in which these goods, wares or merchandise are stored shall not be owned, in whole or in part, by either the consignee or the consignor. This paragraph does not apply to agricultural products.

2. Business assistance. Business assistance services shall be provided consistent with this subsection.

A. The office shall provide business assistance services that are convenient to businesses throughout the State. The office shall use certified local and regional economic development organizations, educational institutions or certified private sector firms to implement this subsection.

(1) Business assistance services shall include managerial and technical assistance and assistance with applications for loans and the completion of applications for licenses and permits from regulatory agencies.

(2) The office, in conjunction with local and regional organizations and other institutions and firms in the private sector with marketing expertise, may conduct seminars on marketing and marketing-related topics for Maine businesses.

B. In accordance with section 13063-A, the office shall implement a program to assist businesses by referring businesses and persons to the proper agencies designed to provide the business services or assistance requested, and to serve as a central clearing house of information with respect to business assistance programs and services available in the State.

3. Industry-wide assistance and market development. The director shall be responsible for a program of industry-wide assistance and market development.

A. The director shall work with other state agencies which implement marketing programs and strive to coordinate the marketing activities of the department with those of other agencies whenever possible.

B. The director shall be responsible, to the maximum extent possible, for providing assistance to industry sectors and business to identify market opportunities, develop market strategies and to promote industry-wide development.

## [ARTICLE II. BUSINESS ASSISTANCE REFERRAL AND FACILITATION PROGRAM: PROGRAM RESPONSIBILITIES AND DELIVERY]

## § 13063-A. Business Assistance Referral and Facilitation Program

The director shall be responsible for the implementation of the Business Assistance Referral and Facilitation Program.

1. Referral and central clearinghouse service. The director shall maintain and update annually a list of business assistance programs and services and the names, locations and telephone numbers of the organizations providing these programs and services that are available within the State. The director may publish a guide consisting of the business assistance programs and the services available from public or private sector organizations throughout the State. This program shall be designed to:

A. Respond to written and oral reques s for information about business services and assistance programs available throughout the State;

B. Obtain and compile the most current and available information pertaining to business assistance programs and services within the State;

C. Delineate the business assistance programs and services by type of program or service and by agency; and

D. Maintain a list, to be updated annually, of marketing programs of state agencies with a description of each program.

2. Business facilitation service. The director shall implement a business facilitation service which shall be designed to:

A. Resolve problems encountered by business persons with other state agencies and with certified regional and local economic development organizations;

B. Coordinate programs and services for business among agencies and all levels of government;

C. Facilitate responsiveness of State Government to small business needs; and

D. Report to the commissioner any breakdowns in the economic delivery system, including problems encountered by businesses dealing with state agencies.

[ARTICLE III. TOURISM]

§ 13064-A. Findings

Economic and community development in the State is dependent upon the diversity of job opportunities within various sectors of the overall economy. One of the key elements in the health of the State's economy is the tourism and travel industry which is responsible for thousands of jobs and millions of dollars of annual revenues. The maintenance and expansion of tourism as a major component in the State's economic development depends upon the active program of local development coupled with promotion by the State.

## § 13065-A. Tourism Division

1. Tourism Division; establishment. The Division of Tourism is established to carry out the purposes of this article. The Director of the Tourism Division shall administer the division. The Tourism Division includes the Maine Tourism Commission and the Maine Film Office.

## 2. Duties. The division shall:

A. Implement advertising and promotion programs to market the State's travel industry and to attract on-location filming of movies, advertisements and videos in the State;

B. Print, or cause to have printed, alone or in cooperation with other travel promotion agencies and groups, booklets, brochures, pamphlets and other materials as required to fulfill requests for information on the State's travel products and the State's facilities, sites and services for the filming of movies and videos in the State;

C. Encourage the development of travel product facilities and activities by locating potential developers, providing market and feasibility analysis, assisting developers in complying with applicable laws and rules and providing technical assistance to local decision making, including decisions regarding site selection, financing and utilities;

D. Review and comment upon the policies and programs of state agencies that directly affect the achievement of the duties and responsibilities of the division;

E. Provide basic support and discretionary matching grants to local, regional and statewide nonprofit agencies that directly affect the achievement of the duties and responsibilities of the division;

F. Staff or cause to be staffed any information center constructed, owned, leased, acquired or operated by the State;

G. Employ or engage outside technical or professional consultants or organizations

#### as are necessary or appropriate to assist the division in carrying out its functions;

H. Accept fees as the director may designate for the preparation and distribution of books, booklets, brochures, pamphlets, films, photos, maps, exhibits, mailing lists and all similar materials and media advertising. There is established within the division a revolving fund for the use of the division to help offset the preparation and distribution costs of these materials. The division shall retain, without charge, an appropriate number of each publication for complimentary distribution. Income from the sale of publications and other materials charged to the revolving fund is credited to the revolving fund to be used as a continuing carrying account to carry out the purposes of the revolving fund;

I. Subject to the approval of the commissioner, adopt, amend and repeal rules to carry out the purposes of this section; and

J. Undertake other activities that the commissioner considers appropriate and necessary to ensure the successful implementation of this section.

## § 13066-A. Historical marker program

1. Historical markers. The Director of the Tourism Division may erect historical markers or signs on any highway. No more than 10 historical markers may be erected in one year. A marker that would interfere with reasonable use of the highway may not be erected.

2. Review council. The Director of the Tourism Division shall consult with the Maine Historic Preservation Commission of the Department of Cultural Services and the Department of Transportation on the marker program. Before erecting any marker, the director shall secure the Maine Historic Preservation Commission's approval of the marker, the marker's location and working. The Maine Historic Preservation Commission shall investigate as needed to obtain information on the event to be commemorated and on the appropriate location for the marker, including consulting historians and holding public hearings.

3. Permits. Municipal councilors may permit the erection of monuments, tablets and markers by individuals or societies on public highways or other public grounds in places of a character as may be approved by the councilors to indicate the occurrence of historic events and matters of public interest, provided that the marker does not interfere with the reasonable use of the highway or other public places.

4. Cooperative agreements. The Maine Historic Preservation Commission may enter into cooperative agreements with any municipality or historical society to erect a historical marker on any highway. The agreement must provide for reasonable sharing of the initial expense and for the municipality or society to maintain and care for the marker.

5. Damages. If a person's property is damaged by the erection of a monument, tablet or marker, that person may apply to the municipal councilors within 6 months after the erection to assess and recover damages.

6. Change of location. A person whose rights or interests are affected by the location may, within 60 days after the approval of the municipal councilors, petition the municipal councilors for changes in the location and, after notice to parties and hearing, the councilors may alter or revoke the location as justice requires.

7. Petition to court. If the municipal councilors neglect or refuse after 30 days to decide upon any petition addressed to them, or if a party whose interests are affected by the decision is dissatisfied with the decision, the dissatisfied petitioner or party may apply to the Superior Court for relief within 60 days of the decision.

8. Return; record; fees. The municipal councilors shall, within 30 days, decide upon every petition presented to them and upon every location approved under this subsection, and shall cause this information to be recorded by the town clerk. The fees of the councilors and town clerk are paid by the petitioner.

# § 13067-A. Maine Tourism Commission

1. Maine Tourism Commission. The Maine Tourism Commission, established by section 12004-I, subsection 87, shall assist, advise and recommend the operation of the Tourism Division. The commission consists of 9 members of major tourism trade associations and 8 public members who must represent their respective regions and have experience in the field or have demonstrated concern for the travel industry. The terms of the members are for 4 years each, except that, for the members first appointed, 4 for terms of 2 years and 5 members for terms of one year. The members are appointed by the Governor, who shall fill any vacancy in the membership for the unexpired term. The commissioner, director or a designee of the following state departments or offices shall serve as ex officio, nonvoting members of the Commission: Department of Economic and Community Development; State Planning Office; Department of Conservation; Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources; Department of Cultural Services; Bureau of Public Improvements; and Canadian Affairs Coordinator. A chair and vice-chair must be elected annually from the appointed membership.

# 2. Powers and duties. The commission shall:

A. <u>Recommend rules for the implementation of section 13068-A and make</u> recommendations on the award of matching funds to the commissioner and the <u>Director of the Tourism Division</u>;

B. Recommend policy guidelines on marketing, promotion and advertising

## strategies to the Tourism Division;

C. Conduct public hearings necessary to obtain input concerning tourism policy development from a broad cross section of travel interests;

D. Assist the Tourism Division in providing technical assistance to the travel industry and in planning and conducting periodic tourism conferences;

E. Prepare a report for annual submission to the Governor and the Legislature relative to the programs, policies and accomplishments of the Maine Tourism Commission; and

F. Assist the Tourism Division in other areas the commissioner considers appropriate and necessary to ensure the successful implementation of this section.

3. Compensation. Commission members are entitled to compensation as provided by chapter 379.

## § 13068-A. Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program

1. Statement of purpose. The Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program is established to serve the following purposes:

A. To allow the State to provide part of the funds necessary for public and private, nonprofit travel promotional organizations to conduct promotional programs; and

B. To strengthen the State's image by coordinating the promotional efforts of the private sector and the Tourism Division.

2. Eligible organization. Matching funds must be made available to those nonprofit travel promotional organizations that best meet the purposes of this section. An organization may not disburse state matching funds to a private, for-profit business for the purpose of promoting its goods, services, functions or activities.

3. Limitations. It is not the intent of this section to reduce any organizations' financial participation in any ongoing project, but rather to increase or develop new programs. The grant program must be geared to specific promotional efforts and costs and is not intended to match any administrative costs, including any form of personal services.

4. Administration. The Tourism Division shall administer the Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program with such flexibility as to bring about the most effective and economical travel promotion program possible. Applications from all regions of the State must be equally considered. The Maine Vacation-travel Commission shall recommend rules and procedures necessary and appropriate to the proper operation of the Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program. These rules must establish eligibility requirements, allocation formulas, application procedures and criteria subject to the final approval of the commissioner. The commission shall establish a schedule for review of grant applications and make timely recommendations of grant awards to the Tourism Division. Grants recommended by the commission to the division must be approved by the Director of the Tourism Division prior to any disbursement of funds.

5. Bookkeeping systems. The department and all tourist promotional organizations qualifying for matching funds under this section shall keep accurate records of any applications, transactions, payment receipts and correspondence relating to the implementation of the Travel Promotion Matching Fund Program.

A. The department shall establish a standard accounting procedure to be used by any organization receiving money under this section; and

B. The records of any organization pertaining to account and contracts funded with money under this section must be open to audit by the State or by any firm employed by the State to audit these records.

No additional matching funds may be awarded to an organization until the provision of this subsection have been met.

§ 13069-A. Maine State Film Commission

1. Maine State Film Commission established. The Maine State Film Commission, as established by section 12004-I, subsection 88, is within the Tourism Division and shall advise and assist the division as necessary. The commission shall advise the commissioner and the Director of the Tourism Division with respect to the operation of the Maine State Film Office.

A. The commission consists of 11 members appointed by the Governor. (1) The members appointed must be involved in a related business field or possess experience or familiarity with media marketing or public relations. The Governor shall ensure an equitable regional representation from the State.

(2) The Executive Director of the Maine Arts Commission and the commissioner shall serve as ex officio nonvoting members of the commission.

B. The terms of office are as follows:

(1) All members are appointed for 3-year terms. Of those first appointed, 3 are appointed for 3-year terms, 4 are appointed for 2-year terms and 4 are appointed for one-year terms. The Governor shall designate the terms

of office of those first appointed at the time of appointment.

(2) Members shall serve until their successors are appointed and take office. The Governor may terminate the membership of any appointee for just cause and the reason for the termination must be communicated in writing to each member whose term is so terminated.

(3) Vacancies must be filled in the same manner as original appointments, except that any person appointed to fill a vacancy shall serve only for the unexpired term of the vacancy.

C. The chair and vice-chair are appointed by the Governor annually at the first meeting of the commission and serve for one-year terms. (1) The chair shall call meetings of the board.

D. Members are compensated for expenses only in accordance with chapter 379.

E. Financing of promotional and development materials and expenses pursuant to this section and section 13069-B, must be made with funds within the limit of the budget of the department for the Tourism Division.

§ 13069-B. Powers and duties

The Maine Film Commission has the following powers and duties:

1. Recommend rules. To recommend rules for the implementation of the provisions relating to the promotion of filming activities in the State;

2. Advise and assist the directors. To advise and assist the Director of the Maine State Film Office and the Director of the Tourism Division with respect to this section and section 13070-A.

3. Raise and accept funds. To raise and accept funds from public and private sources to be used to promote filming activities in the State; and

4. Promote Maine for filming activities. To promote Maine to attract in-state onlocation filming of movies, advertisements, and videos in the State.

§ 13070-A. Director of the Maine State Film Office.

The commissioner shall appoint a full-time Director of the Maine State Film Office who shall serve at the pleasure of the commissioner. The director is responsible for undertaking a program of film promotion and implementing the recommendations and policies of the commissioner.

# [ARTICLE IV. INTERNATIONAL COMMERCE DIVISION]

#### business conditions;

# § 13071. International Commerce Division; established

<u>1. Created. The commissioner shall create the International Commerce Division</u> within the Office of Economic Development.

2. International commerce. The division shall ensure that international commerce development is grounded in thorough, accurate and timely economic information coupled with careful analysis in order to make the maximum use of the limited resources available for international commerce development activities.

<u>3. Required knowledge. Members of the division must have knowledge of international commerce, economic trends, international business activities of Maine businesses, patterns within the labor market, natural resource availability, infrastructure, buildings and sites for development and activities in major international financial markets. Such knowledge is required to make intelligent assessments to target resources and assist international commerce.</u>

<u>4. Informed program and policy choices. The division shall use all available information to make informed program and policy choices, as well as to provide the best possible information to businesses considering international investment option. In addition, by the constant evaluation of program initiatives, the division shall enhance the delivery of services and the use of limited resources.</u>

5. Ability to develop demonstration program initiatives. The division shall maintain the ability to develop demonstration international commerce program initiatives that complement evaluation and research activities of the division.

§ 13071-B. International Commerce Division; duties

<u>The International Commerce Division shall provide the necessary support to the</u> <u>department in the areas of information collection, data compilation and analysis on</u> <u>international commerce matters. The Deputy Director of the International Commerce</u> <u>Division shall administer the division in accordance with the policies of the commissioner</u> and provision of this subchapter. The International Commerce Division shall:

1. Maintain an international commerce data base. Collect, from sources in both the public and private sectors, information regarding the economy, businesses, labor force, building and business sites, infrastructure, natural resources and other elements necessary to international commerce market and program decision;

2. Provide information. Provide information, as requested, to businesses engaged in international commerce, local and regional community and economic development organizations and other state agencies regarding international commerce market and <u>3. Conduct evaluations. Conduct periodic evaluations of the effectiveness of the department's international commerce development programs in meeting the goals of those programs:</u>

4. Develop programs. Develop demonstration programs and program concepts in response to international commerce economic conditions and the evaluation of existing program activities; and

5. Cooperate with State Planning Office. Provide information to and cooperate with the State Planning Office in its macroeconomic forecasting activities which remain the responsibility of the State Planning Office.

## [ARTICLE V. COMMISSION ON INVESTMENT CAPITAL]

§ 13072. Commission on Investment Calital

The Commission on Investment Capital is established and is composed of 17 members. The membership includes the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development, the Director of the Maine State Housing Authority, the Chief Executive Officer of the Finance Authority of Maine, the Executive Director of the Maine State Retirement System, the Director of the Maine Municipal Bond Bank, 2 Senators, 3 members of the House of Representatives, 6 members of the public appointed by the Governor and one member of the public appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

1. Appointment. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint the 2 Senators, the 3 members of the House of Representatives and one member of the public. The Governor shall appoint 6 members of the public who are able to provide expertise in the area of capital investment.

2. Terms of office. Members appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives serve at the pleasure of these appointing authorities. The appointees of the Governor serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

3. Cochairs. There are 2 cochairs of the commission. The public member appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives is a cochair. The Commissioner of Economic and Community Development is a cochair of the commission.

4. Compensation. Members of the commission are entitled to compensation in accordance with chapter 379.

5. Meetings. The commission shall meet at least 4 times each year at the call of

## the cochairs.

6. Quorum. A quorum consists of 7 members. A quorum is necessary for the commission to conduct its business at any commission meeting.

# § 13072-A. Duties and responsibilities of the commission

The commission shall undertake a comprehensive evaluation of the capital investment needs of the State, including an analysis of the sources and magnitude of current capital investments in all sectors of the State's economy, an analysis of the obstacles to capital investments in the State, the identification of sources of funds in the State that may be used to leverage new capital investments and a review of the impact and opportunities resulting from foreign investment in the State.

The commission shall report its activities and findings to the Governor and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over housing and economic development no later than July 1st following each first regular session of the Legislature. The commission may initiate reports to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over housing and economic development matters at any time during its deliberations.

#### § 13072-B. Agency cooperation

All agencies of State Government shall cooperate with the commission during its deliberations by responding to requests for information and technical support in a timely manner.

#### § 13072-C. Sunset

Authorization for the commission expires on July 1, 1993. In its final report, the commission shall provide its recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature concerning the need for extending authorization for the commission.

#### [ARTICLE I. GENERAL PROVISIONS]

### § 13073-A. Findings

The Legislature finds that the strength of the State's economy is based on the strength of the local economies of the municipalities and their ability to adjust to the dramatic changes in the national and international economies. The Legislature also recognizes the need for the coordination of the state, regional and local efforts and resources to produce solid economic growth and development for the State.

Economic growth and development is not limited exclusively to the generation of new businesses and business expansions. It requires sufficient housing and infrastructure facilities, planning and availability of an educated and well-trained labor force which are necessary to the prosperity of municipalities.

It is necessary to coordinate the development and delivery of community programs. By coordinating and focusing various community development programs, the impact of these programs can be far more effective. The existence of a central community development agency can improve and facilitate communication and assistance between the State and its municipalities.

By working together, coordinating resources and developing policies which are mutually consistent and consistent with an overall state strategy, the State and its municipalities can realize their potential and prosperity in the future.

## § 13074-A. Office of Community Development and Planning established

The commissioner shall establish the Office of Community Development and Planning. This office shall assist municipalities in planning for and achieving economic growth and development while, at the same time, preserving and protecting their resources and assets. To achieve this purpose, the department, through the office, shall strive to remove barriers to balanced economic growth and provide planning, technical and financial resources to the municipalities to enhance economic development. The Office also shall assist communities in local and regional land use planning activities.

The Deputy Commissioner for Community Development and Planning shall be the director of the Office of Community Development and Planning and shall administer the office in accordance with the policies of the commissioner and the provisions of this chapter.

## § 13075-A. Powers and duties

The director shall have the following powers and duties:

<u>1. Establish communication network. The director shall establish a</u> <u>communication network by which information, resources and assistance are transferred</u> between State Government and the municipalities.

A. The director shall work with municipalities and regional community and economic development organizations. The director shall work closely with persons or organizations representing municipalities and with regional community and economic development organizations to address the development needs, problems and opportunities of municipalities and regions.

2. Designate local and regional community and economic development organizations. The director shall monitor the activities of designated public and private, local and regional community and economic development organizations. In order to receive financial assistance and resources from the department, an agency must demonstrate the effective administration of programs and services and the effectiveness of these programs.

<u>3. Development grants. The director, with the approval of the commissioner, may provide grants to municipalities and regional development organizations for the purpose of creating economic and community development strategies and policies.</u>

4. Provide information. The director shall provide municipalities with information about the department's programs and services and shall refer municipalities to the offices and programs within the State than can best assist them. The director shall organize and make available to municipalities and regional planning agencies existing information from state agencies to be used in the development of comprehensive plans and land use ordinances as required under Title 30, Chapter 239, subchapter VI.

5. Work with state agencies. The director shall work with other state agencies that administer community and economic development programs and services used by municipalities. The director shall strive to coordinate department programs and services with the programs and services of these agencies.

6. Administer Community Industrial Buildings Program. The director shall administer the Community Industrial Buildings Fund as set out in Article II-A.

7. Oversee community development resources and programs. The director shall oversee the implementation of community development programs to include at a minimum:

A. The Community Development Block Grant Program.

8. Provide technical assistance. The director shall oversee delivery of:

A. technical assistance and resources to municipalities and regional community

and economic development organizations for the purpose of encouraging economic growth while maintaining the quality of life;

B. technical assistance to municipalities and regional planning organizations in the development and implementation of local comprehensive land use plans as required under Title 30, chapter 239, subchapter VI.

9. Financial assistance. The director shall administer a program to provide financial assistance to local communities and regional planning agencies in the development, implementation and enforcement of comprehensive land use plans and ordinances as required under Title 30, chapter 239, subchapter VI.

10. Coastal zone management. The director shall administer a coastal zone management local grants program.

<u>11. Regional planning grants program. The director shall administer a regional planning grants program for regional planning commissions and councils of government established under Title 30, chapter 119, subchapter I.</u>

12. Staff assistance. The director shall provide staff assistance for the planning advisory council as established under Title 30, chapter 239, subchapter VI.

13. Provide technical assistance and resources for local parks and recreation development. The director shall oversee delivery of technical assistance and resources to municipalities for the purpose of enhancing and expanding parks, open spaces and recreational opportunities as part of comprehensive community development.

14. Encumbered balances at year-end. At the end of each fiscal year, all encumbered balances in accounts for financial assistance and regional planning grants may be carried twice.

§ 13076-A. Community Development Block Grant Program

The director shall implement the Community Development Block Grant Program pursuant to the United States Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, Title 1, and its subsequent amendments. For purposes of this section, "program" means the Community Development Block Grant Program, and "fund" means the Community Development Revolving Loan Fund.

1. Revolving loan fund. The Community Development Block Grant Program shall includes the Community Development Revolving Loan Fund which shall be a nonlapsing revolving fund.

2. Repayments to fund. To this fund shall be credited all repayments of grants made to municipalities that elect not to retain those funds under the fund part of the

program, including interest, penalties and other fees and charges related to fund grants.

3. Investment of fund money. Money in the fund not needed to meet the current obligations of the program shall be deposited with the Treasurer of the State to the credit of the fund and may be invested in such manner as is provided by law. Interest received on that investment shall be credited to the fund.

4. Legislative allocation of fund required. The Department of Economic and Community development shall submit to the Legislature, through the budget process as required by chapter 149, its recommendations for disbursement from the fund.

5. Expenditures from fund. Upon approval of the allocation by the Legislature and approval of the allotment by the Governor, the State Controller shall authorize expenditures from the fund as approved by the department for the following purposes:

A. Administrative expenses related to the fund;

B. Grants to cities and towns under the fund; and

C. Grants related to the fund and to other public and private organizations.

§ 13077-A. Economic Corridor Action Grant Program

The director of the Office of Community Development and Planning shall implement a program to assist municipalities in the planning and implementation of capital improvements in public service infrastructure in municipalities within designated economic corridors.

1. Purpose. The purpose of the program is to enable municipalities within economic growth corridors to plan for growth and development and to develop the public service infrastructure to encourage and manage balanced growth.

2. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings:

A. "Economic growth corridor" means an economic corridor designated by the Commissioner of Transportation in consultation with the Commissioner of Economic and Community Development and which is included in the Department of Transportation's Highway and Bridge Improvement Program that is presented to the Legislature during the first year of each biennium of the Legislature. An economic growth corridor shall contain the following:

(1) Economic activity and good potential for continued economic activity;

(2) Connections between commercial or population centers;

(3) Connections among state municipalities with significant markets in other states and countries;

(4) Connections between natural resource areas and value-added processors;

(5) Connections between markets and tourist destinations.

B. "Public service infrastructure" means those facilities which are essential for public health, welfare and safety. These facilities include, without limitation, sewage treatment facilities, municipal water facilities, solid waste facilities, fire protection facilities, roads and traffic control devices, parks and other open space or recreational areas and any other public facility which benefits the public.

3. Municipal eligibility. The Department of Economic and Community Development may make grants to eligible municipalities within economic growth corridors in support of capital investments in public service facilities or projects which support economic growth and development. Any municipality is eligible to apply for grants under this article when it has adopted a comprehensive plan pursuant to the requirements of Title 30, chapter 239, subchapter VI. Such a comprehensive plan shall include a capital investment plan comprised of the following elements:

A. An assessment of all public facilities and services, including, but not limited to, roads, sewers, schools, parks and open space, fire and police;

B. A capital investment plan for the replacement and expansion of existing public facilities or the construction of such new facilities as are required to meet expected growth and economic development. The capital investment plan shall include projections of when and where such facilities will be required; and

C. An assessment of the anticipated costs for replacement, expansion or construction of public facilities, an identification of revenue sources available to meet these costs and recommendations for meeting costs required to implement the plan.

4. Grants criteria. The department shall develop criteria and conditions for the award of grants to eligible municipalities after holding hearing pursuant to the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 375, for the purpose of developing these criteria and conditions.

A. The department shall establish a preference for those municipalities which demonstrate a strong commitment and effort to the development and improvement of infrastructure.

B. The department shall give priorities to those projects which, in comparison to other proposed projects, will have the greatest impact on the economic growth

corridors.

C. The department shall condition any grants under this article on consistency with the municipality's comprehensive plan, including its capital investment plan.

D. The department shall establish a preference for capital investment projects undertaken jointly by 2 or more municipalities or which provide substantial regional benefits.

E. The department shall adopt other criteria as it determines necessary to ensure that grants made under this article maximize the ability of municipalities to accommodate planned growth and economic development.

5. Adoption of rules. In addition to the criteria defined in subsections 3 and 4, the department may adopt rules pursuant to chapter 375 to develop additional criteria for the selection of recipients of economic growth corridor action grants. These rules shall consider the following:

A. The degree of needs for grants;

B. The degree of matching funds to be provided by a municipality or region whenever applicable;

C. The priority of projects for the area; and

D. The priority of the area with respect to other corridors.

6. Coordination. The department shall coordinate the grants made under this article with all other community assistance grants administered by the department and with other state assistance programs designed to accomplish similar objectives, including those administered by the Department of Education, the Department of Transportation and the Department of Environmental Protection.

7. Funds. All grants provided pursuant to this section shall be made from any funds available for the purpose of the program to include federal funds, bond proceeds, General Fund appropriations, private money and any other available funds.

8. Report to the Legislature. The department shall annually report in writing and in person to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over economic development no later than the 2nd Wednesday in February with respect to the implementation of this section. This report, at a minimum shall include:

A. The economic growth corridors that have been awarded grants;

B. The projects and costs of the projects for which the grants have been awarded;

C. The estimated impact of the projects on the municipality and the corridor;

D. Applications for grants that were denied including the projects proposed in these applications and the reason for the denial; and

E. A summary of the hearings held pursuant to subsection 4, including a copy of the final rules.

[ARTICLE II-A. COMMUNITY INDUSTRIAL BUILDING AUTHORITY]

<u>§ 13081-A.</u> Definitions

As used in this article, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings:

1. Carrying costs. "Carrying costs" means reasonable costs incurred for the maintenance, protection and security of a community industrial building prior to occupancy, including, but not limited to, insurance, taxes and interest.

2. Community industrial building. "Community industrial building" means a building of flexible design which construction or carrying costs, or both, are financing through this subchapter for the purpose of creating new jobs in a municipality resulting from the sale or lease of the building.

3. Industrial park. "Industrial park" means an area of land that is planned and designed for one or more industrial buildings.

4. Lease. "Lease" means a contract providing for the use of a project or portions of a project for a term of years for a designated or determinable rent. A lease may include an installment sales contract.

5. Lessee. "Lessee" means a tenant under lease and may include an installment purchaser.

6. Local development corporation. "Local development corporation" means any nonprofit organization created by a municipality; incorporated under Title 13, chapter 81; incorporated under Title 13-B or otherwise chartered by the State; and designed to foster, encourage and assist the settlement or resettlement of industrial, manufacturing, fishing, agricultural, recreational and other business enterprises within the State. A majority vote of the municipal officers is sufficient to form a local development corporation, notwithstanding Title 13, chapter 81. Notwithstanding this subsection, a "local development corporated under Title 13. chapter 81; incorporated under Title 13-B or otherwise chartered by the State; and designed to foster, encourage and assist the settlement or resettlement of industrial, manufacturing, fishing, agricultural, recreational and other business enterprises within the State that applied for financial assistance for a project under this article, as long as that application is formally endorsed by a vote of the governing body of the municipality in which the project is to be located.

7. Municipality. "Municipality" means any county, city or town in the State.

8. Rural area. "Rural area" means any area that is not an urban area.

9. Urban area. "Urban area" means any municipality with a population greater than 10,000 persons.

§ 13082-A. Community Industrial Buildings Fund

.

1. Creation. The Community Industrial Buildings Fund is created as a nonlapsing revolving fund to be used by the department only for the purposes of this article. There is created within the fund separate accounts for rural and urban areas, called the "rural account" or "urban account", which shall be separately charged and credited, as provided under this section, according to the locatio of each community industrial building in a rural or urban area.

A. Money in the fund which is not obligated on the effective date of this Act shall be distributed between the 2 accounts, with 2/3 allocated to the rural account and 1/3 allocated to the urban account.

2. Items charged or credited. Operating expenses of the department incurred under this article shall be charged to the fund and all payments required by this article shall be credited to it. All department expenses that arise out of assistance to local development corporations under this article shall be charged solely against the proceeds of the sale or rental of community industrial buildings or all or part of an industrial park assisted under this article.

3. Deposited funds. Money in the fund not currently needed to meet the obligations of the department under this article shall be deposited with the Treasurer of the State to the credit of the fund with all interest earned by the deposit credited to the fund.

4. Successor to fund. The department shall be the successor to the State Development Office for the purposes of this article. All properties, rights in the land, buildings and equipment and any funds, money, revenues and receipts or assets of the State Development Office as they apply to the Community Industrial Buildings Fund, shall belong to the department as successor to the State Development Office. All liabilities of the State Development Office with respect to the Community Industrial Buildings Fund shall become liabilities of the department. Any action taken by the State Development Office with respect to assisting a local development corporation to create community industrial buildings shall be an action taken by the Department of Economic and Community Development.

§ 13083-A. Assistance to development corporations

1 .

The department may assist a local development corporation to construct a community industrial building by loaning it money, for construction or carrying costs, or both, for the project, subject to subsection 1.

1. Project. The following conditions apply to the project:

A. The project shall be within the scope of this article, shall be of public use and benefit and shall reasonably be expected to create new employment opportunities;

B. Within the separate rural and urban accounts, preference shall be given to projects in economically deprived areas within labor market areas declared to be in need of economic development assistance by the Department of Labor;

C. Not more than one unoccupied community industrial building project may be financed in a labor market area at any one time, except as provided in paragraph D;

D. If a community industrial building remains unoccupied for 3 or more years immediately following completion of the building, the labor market area in which the building is located may be authorized one new community industrial building provided that:

(1) No more than 2 unoccupied community industrial buildings are financed under this article in a labor market area in which a community industrial building remains unoccupied for 3 or more years; and

(2) No more than one unoccupied community industrial building is financed at any one time under this article in a municipality.

E. The Department of Economic and Community Development shall charge interest on loans or funds provided under this article to the local development corporation for a community industrial building that remains unoccupied for 3 or more years following completion of the building. The department shall adopt rules under the Maine Administrative Procedures Act, Title 5, chapter 375, with respect to rates of interest, the duration of interest payments and any other terms to which local development corporations shall be subject under this paragraph.

2. Local development corporation. The local development corporation shall comply with the following.

A. The local development corporation shall own, or hold on long-term lease, the

site for the project.

B. The local development corporation, in the opinion of the department, shall be responsible for and shall present evidence of its ability to carry out the project as planned.

C. The site owned or leased by the local development corporation shall not be less than 4 times the size of the community industrial building.

D. The local development corporation shall provide and maintain, with funds other than those provided by the department, an adequate access road from a public highway to the proposed site and provide and maintain water, sewer and power facilities. The local development corporation shall be responsible for plowing out the plant site at all times and for landscaping the building in an attractive fashion until the building is occupied by an industrial tenant.

E. The local development corporation's project plans shall comply with applicable zoning, planning and sanitary regulations in the municipality where it is to be located. No loan may be approved and no certificate of approval for the project or for any subsequent enlargement or addition to the project may be issued until the Department of Environmental Protection has certified to the department that all licenses required from the department have been issued or that none are required.

F. The local development corporation shall make adequate provisions for insurance and fire protection and maintenance of the building while it is unoccupied.

3. Loan terms. Terms for a loan are as follows.

A. The department may prescribe the terms and conditions of the loan.

B. Loans shall be repaid in full, including interest and other charges, within 90 days after the building is occupied.

C. The building financed by a department loan may not be sold or leased without the express approval of the purchaser or lessee by the department. If the local development corporation and the department agree that a community industrial building is unlikely to be sold in the near future despite a marketing effort, the department may permit an interim lease upon terms it deems appropriate for the protection of the fund. Occupation of the premises under an interim lease shall not require payment in full of the entire loan within 90 days, as provided in paragraph B.

4. Promotion and development. The department shall undertake promotional and publicity activities on behalf of community industrial buildings to properly market them

to prospective purchasers or tenants. The department shall maintain a constant and continual effort to secure suitable tenants or purchasers for these buildings and shall prepare necessary advertising and promotional materials.

5. Taxes. While the community industrial building remains unoccupied and a first mortgage is held by the department, it is declared to be property held for a legitimate public use and benefit and shall be exempt from all taxes and special assessments of the State or any of its political subdivisions. This section does not apply to any community industrial building which construction is not financed under this article.

6. Municipality. A municipality may raise or appropriate money supporting and guaranteeing the obligation of a chamber of commerce, board of trade or local development corporation for the purpose of constructing a community industrial building subject to the provisions of this article.

[ARTICLE III. MUNICIPAL GROWTH MANAGEMENT AND CAPITAL INVESTMENT FUND]

§ 13084. Municipal Growth Management and Capital Investment Fund

1. Creation. The Municipal Growth Management and Capital Investment Fund is created as a nonlapsing fund to be used by the department only for the purposes of this article.

2. Deposited funds. Money in the fund not currently needed to meet the obligations of the department under this article must be deposited with the Treasurer of the State to the credit of the fund with all interest earned by the deposit credited to the fund.

§ 13085. Assistance to municipalities

· ...

The department may make grants to eligible municipalities in support of capital investments in public service infrastructure as provided in this article.

1. Definitions. As used in this article, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

A. "Public service infrastructure" means those facilities that are essential for public health, welfare and safety. These facilities include, but are not limited to, sewage treatment facilities, municipal water facilities, solid waste facilities, fire protection facilities, roads and traffic control devices, parks and other open space or recreational areas and any other public facility that benefits the public.

2. Eligibility. Any municipality is eligible to apply for grants under this article when it has adopted and implemented a certified local growth management program

under the requirements of Title 30-A, chapter 187, subchapter II. The program must include a capital investment plan comprised of the following elements:

A. An assessment of all public facilities and services, including, but not limited to, roads, sewers, schools, parks and open space, fire and police;

B. A 10-year plan for any needed replacement and expansion of existing public facilities or the construction of any new facilities required to meet expected growth and economic development or to satisfy state or federal government mandates. The capital investment plan shall include projections of when and where these facilities will be required; and

C. An assessment of the anticipated costs for replacement, expansion or construction of public facilities, an identification of revenue sources available to meet these costs and recommendations for meeting costs required to implement the plan.

3. Eligibility for municipalities without certified local growth management programs. Prior to 2 years after the applicable deadline date established under Title 30-A, section 4343, subsection 1, any municipality is eligible for a grant under this article when the department determines that the proposed project is consistent with the grant criteria established under subsection 4 and that the project is to undertaken as part of a local capital investment plan which includes the elements specified under subsection 2, paragraphs A to C.

4. Grants criteria. The department shall develop, by rule, criteria for the award of grants to eligible municipalities after consultation with the Planning Advisory Council, established under Title 30-A, section 4341, and subject to the requirements of this article.

A. The department shall give priority to those municipalities that are experiencing rapid growth and that possess a public service infrastructure inadequate to accommodate that growth.

B. The department shall give priority to those municipalities that have adopted and implemented a certified local growth management program.

C. The department shall establish a preference for those municipalities with higher local property tax burdens.

D. The department shall establish a preference for capital investment projects undertaken jointly by 2 or more municipalities or that provide substantial regional benefits.

E. The department shall establish local cost-sharing requirements to ensure adequate local commitment to projects receiving grants under this article and to

## ensure efficient use of public funds.

F. The department shall adopt other criteria as it determines necessary to ensure that grants made under this article maximize the ability of municipalities to accommodate planned growth and economic development.

5. Consistency. The department shall condition any grants under this article on consistency with the municipality's certified local growth management program or, in the case of grants made on the basis of the eligibility criteria of subsection 3, on consistency with the local capital investment plan.

6. Coordination. The department shall coordinate the grants made under this article with all other community assistance grants administered by the department and with other state assistance programs designed to accomplish similar objectives, including those administered by the Department of Education, the Department of Transportation, the Maine Municipal Bond Bank and the Department of Environmental Protection.

## § 13086. Report to the Legislature

As part of its biennial progress report under Title 30-A, section 4341, subsection 2, the department shall report on the grants program. The department may make any recommendations it finds necessary to achieve more effectively the purposes of this article, including the appropriation of any necessary additional funds.

If the Residential Conservation Service, as established by the United States Natural Energy Conservation Policy Act, Public Law 95-619, November 9, 1978, as amended by the United States Energy Security Act, Public Law 96-294, June 30, 1980, 42 United States Code, Section 8211 et seq., is repealed or amended so as to have the effect of removing requirements for providing energy conservation information and energy audits and arranging financing for energy conservation improvements for residential customers, the director may promulgate rules pursuant to the Maine Administrative Procedure Act to continue these services. In establishing these rules, the director shall simplify federal regulations, insofar as possible, without preventing fulfillment of the program objectives and the director may not impose rules containing additional requirements

# §3307-F. State standards for appliance energy efficiency

1. Definitions. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

A. "ASHRAE standard" means a standard established by the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air Conditioning Engineers.

<u>B. "Freezer" means a cabinet designed as a unit for the storage of food at temperatures of about 0° Fahrenheit, having the ability to freeze food and having a source of refrigeration requiring an energy input.</u>

C. "Manufacturer" means any person or business entity engaged in the original production or assembly of an appliance.

<u>D.</u> "New appliance" means an appliance that is sold, offered for sale or installed the first time and specifically includes floor models and demonstration units.

E. "Refrigerator" means a cabinet designed for the refrigerated storage of food at temperatures above 32° Fahrenheit and having a source of refrigeration requiring an energy input. A refrigerator may include a cabinet with a compartment for the freezing and storage of food at temperatures below 32° Fahrenheit, but that does not provide a separate low temperature compartment designed for the freezing of and the long-term storage of food at temperatures below 8° Fahrenheit. A refrigerator has only one exterior door and may have interior doors or compartments.

F. "Refrigerator-freezer" means a cabinet that consists of 2 or more compartments with at least one of the compartments designed for the refrigerated storage of foods at temperatures above 32° Fahrenheit and with at least one of the compartments designed for the freezing of and the storage of frozen foods at temperatures of 8° Fahrenheit or below. The source of refrigeration requires an energy input.

G. "Storage-type water heater" means a water heater that heats and stores water within the appliance at a thermostatically controlled temperature for delivery on demand.

2. Efficiency standards. Efficiency standards are as follows.

A. In the following minimum energy efficiency standards, "V" is the total refrigerated volume in cubic feet and "EC" is the energy consumption in kilowatt hours per year.

A. This section applies to the following residential appliances:

(2) Gas furnaces and boilers; and

(3) Refrigerators, refrigerator-freezers and freezers that can be operated by alternating current electricity, excluding the following types:

(a) Those with total refrigerated volume exceeding 39 cubic feet;

(b) Those designed to be used without doors;

(c) Those that do not include compressor and condenser units as an integral part of the cabinet assembly; and

(d) Those with "through the door" features.

B. This section does not apply to:

(1) New residential appliances manufactured in the State and sold outside the State;

(2) New appliances manufactured outside the State and sold at wholesale in the State for final retail sale and installation outside the State:

(3) Appliances installed in mobile homes at the time of construction;

(4) Appliances designed expressly for installation and use in recreational vehicles or other equipment designed for regular mobile use; and

(5) Appliances purchased outside of the State by state residents when the appliances are installed for use by the purchasers or installed in single-family, detached structures.

4. Prohibitions. A new appliance may not be sold, offered for sale or installed in the State on or after the effective date of this subsection, unless it is certified by the manufacturer to be in compliance with the standards adopted under subsection 2 or unless there is no state standard adopted for that type of appliance.

5. Test methods. The manufacturer shall cause the testing of samples of each model of each residential appliance covered by this section. The director shall use test methods approved by the United States Department of Energy or, in the absence of those test methods, other appropriate nationally recognized test methods applicable to the respective appliances.

**5.** Conservation. To reduce the wasteful, uneconomic, inefficient or unnecessary consumption of energy, the director;

A. Is responsible for the administration and enforcement of the appliance standards established by this section; and

B. Shall apply to the United States Department of Energy or its successor for an exemption from federal preemption, pursuant to the United States Energy Conservation Policy Act, Section 327(b),(3), 7. Forfeiture. Any person who violates this section either personally or through an agent or employee commits a civil violation for which a forfeiture of not more than \$500 may be adjudged for each violation. For purposes of this section, the sale, installation or offer for sale of any new appliance that fails to meet the standards prescribed in subsection 2 constitutes a violation.

Any individual applying for or receiving assistance due to a disability must make a good faith effort to make use of any medical and rehabilitative resources that may be recommended by a physician which \_ are available without financial burden and which-would <u>do</u> not constitute further physical risk to the individual.

Any applicant who refuses to utilize potential resources without just cause, after receiving a written 7-day notice, shall be is disqualified from receiving assistance until he the applicant has made a good faith effort to secure the resource. Eligibility requirements of charities may not violate the applicant's constitutional rights by imposing limits on freedom of speech, religion, assembly or similar freedoms. Assistance provided by those charities must meet the applicant's needs appropriately. If assistance provided by charities is insufficient to met the needs of the applicant as defined by the municipality's ordinance, the municipality is obligated to provide additional assistance, if the applicant is otherwise eligible. A municipality that intends to refer general assistance applicants to publicly or privately administered charities shall enter into an agreement with each charity to facilitate referrals and determine, at a minimum, the charities' hours of operation, the scope of services or commodities available through the charity and conditions, if any, imposed upon receipt of assistance.

Upon making an initial or subsequent application, any person may be required to utilize any potential resources upon receipt of written notice from the responsible municipality. If the person fails to make a good faith effort to secure the resource without just cause, the municipality shall disqualify the person from receipt of general assistance until the person has made a good faith effort.

Available resources are to be utilized when appropriate. including providing assistance for first-time applicants. Available resources include, but are not limited to, cash on hand, bank accounts, credit, public or private charities, bank or credit cards, shelters and food banks.

Any applicant who forfeits receipt of or causes reduction in benefits from another public assistance program because of fraud, misrepresentation or a knowing or intentional violation of program rules committed by the applicant within the 60 days prior to his the applicant's application for assistance, is not eligible to receive general assistance to replace the forfeited assistance for a period of 60 days from the date of application for general assistance, except as provided for initial applications.

#### §4318. Recovery of expenses

A municipality or the State, which has incurred general assistance program costs for the support of any eligible person, may recover the full amount expended for that support either from the person relieved or from any person liable for the recipient's support, their executors or administrators, in a civil action. In no case may a municipality or the State be authorized to recover through a civil action, the full or part of, the amount expended for the support of a previously eligible person, if, as a result of the repayment of that amount, this person would, in all probability, again become eligible for general assistance.

The department shall enter into an agreement with the Social Security Administration to institute an interim assistance reimbursement for the purpose of the repayment of state and local funds expended for providing assistance to Supplemental Security Income applicants or recipients while the Supplemental Security Income payments are pending or suspended. Written authorization must be given by the recipients and must be voluntary in nature.

We <u>A</u> municipality may <u>not</u> recover from any recipient who has been injured while performing work under section 4316-A, subsection 2, any portion of any medical or rehabilitative expenses associated with that injury or any portion of any other general assistance benefits associated with that injury.

Nothing in this section may be construed as limiting or affecting in any way the right of any individual to file an action under the Maine Tort Claims Act, Title 14, chapter 741, except that a municipality that provides general assistance to a minor is absolutely immune from suit on any tort claims seeking recovery of damages by or on behalf of the minor recipient in connection with the provision of general assistance.

§4454. Definitions

As used in this subchapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.

 Dam. "Dam" means any man-made artificial barrier, including appurtenant works, that impounds or diverts a river, stream or great pond.

2. Littoral proprietor, "Littoral proprietor" means an owner or lessee of property on the shore of a lake impounded by a particular dam.

3. Municipal reviewing authority, "Municipal reviewing authority" means the municipal planning board, agency or office, or if none, the municipal officers.

 Riparian proprietor. "Riparian proprietor" means an owner or lessee of property on the bank of a river or stream or shore of a pond or other small body of water impounded by a particular dam.

§4455. Jurisdiction

A municipality may elect under its home rule authority to regulate water level regimes and minimum flow reguirements for any body of water impounded by a dam that is located wholly or in part within its corporate boundaries and is not:

1. Federal license. Licensed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission;

2. Federal authorization. Authorized under the Federal Power Act, Section 23;

3. Upstream storage. Used to store water for a downstream facility licensed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission or authorized under the Federal Power Act. Section 23, provided that the owner of the downstream facility possessed a majority ownership of the upstream dam as of January 1, 1983;

4. Level by permit. Operating with a permit setting water levels issued under the land use regulation laws, Title 12, sections 681 to 689; the protection of natural resources laws, Title 38, sections 480-A to 480-T; the site location of development laws, Title 38, sections 481 to 490; the Maine Waterway Development and Conservation Act, Title 38, sections 630 to 640; or any other law regulating the construction or operation of dans; or

5. Level by district. Operating in accordance with a water level regime set by the Cobbossee Watershed District or by any lake watershed district approved under the watershed district enabling laws, Title 38, sections 2001 to 2011.

<u>All municipal regulation of water levels and minimum flows</u> is governed by this chapter.

#### §4456. Hearing; order

1. Petition. The municipal reviewing authority shall conduct a public hearing to establish a water level regime and, if appropriate, minimum flow requirements for a body of water impounded by a dam within its jurisdiction whenever it is petitioned to do so by:

A. The municipal officers of any municipality in which the dam or the body of water it impounds is located;

B. The owner, lessee or person in control of the dam;

C. The Commissioner of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife;

D. The Commissioner of Marine Resources;

E. At least 25% or 50 of the littoral or riparian proprietors; or

F. A water utility having the right to withdraw water from the body of water for which a water level regime is sought. 2. Bearing: notice. All hearings must be held at a time that is generally convenient for a majority of the affected littoral or riparian proprietors. The municipal reviewing authority shall provide written notice of the date, time and place of any hearing held pursuant to this subchapter to the municipal officiers of any municipality in which the dam or the body of water it impounds is located, to any petitioner who has petitioned for a hearing with respect to the body of water, and to the owner, lessee or person in control, if known, of any dam on the body of water. The municipal reviewing authority shall also cause notice of the hearing to be published at least 2 times in a newspaper having general circulation in any municipality in which the dam or the body of water impounded by the dam is located, the date of the first publication to be at least 7 days prior to the hearing.

3. Evidence. At the hearing, the municipal reviewing authority shall solicit and receive testimony for the purpose of establishing a water level regime and, if applicable, minimum flow reguirements for the body of water. The testimony is limited to:

A. The water levels necessary to maintain the public rights of access to and use of the water for navigation, fishing, fowling, recreation and other lawful public uses;

B. The water levels necessary to protect the safety of the littoral or riparian proprietors and the public;

C. The water levels and minimum flow requirements necessary for the maintenance of fish and wildlife habitat and water guality;

D. The water levels necessary to prevent excessive erosion of shorelines;

E. The water levels necessary to accommodate precipitation and runoff of waters;

<u>F.</u> The water levels necessary to maintain public and private water supplies:

G. The water levels and flows necessary for any ongoing use of the dam to generate or to enhance the downstream generation of hydroelectric or hydromechanical power; and

H. The water levels necessary to provide flows from any dam on the body of water to maintain public access and use, fish propagation and fish passage facilities, fish and wildlife habitat and water quality downstream of the body of water.

4. Order. Based on the evidence solicited at the hearing, the municipal reviewing authority shall make written findings and issue an order to the owner, lessee or person in control of the dam establishing a water level regime for the body of water impounded by the dam and, if applicable, minimum flow requirements for the dam. The order must, to the extent practical, require the maintenance of a stable water level, but must include provisions for variations in water level to permit sufficient drawdown of the body of water to accommodate precipitation and runoff of surface waters and minimum flow requirements, and to otherwise permit seasonal and other necessary fluctuations in the water level in order to protect public health, safety and welfare and the public and private resources identified in subsection 3. The municipal reviewing authority shall deliver a copy of the order to the municipal officers of any municipality in which the dam or the body of water it impounds is located, to any petitioner who has petitioned for a hearing with respect to the body of water and to the owner, lessee or person in control of the dam. The municipal reviewing authority shall also file a copy of the order in the registry of deeds in the county in which the dam is located.

#### §4457. Compliance

1. Prohibition. After issuance of an order under section 4456, subsection 4. establishing a water level regime and, if applicable, minimum flow reguirements for any body of water, no owner, lessee or person in control of any dam impounding the body of water, nor any subsequent transferee, may operate or maintain the dam or cause or permit the dam to be operated or maintained in any manner that will cause the level of water to be higher or lower than that permitted by the order of the municipal reviewing authority or to otherwise violate the terms of the order.

2. Exception. No owner lessee or person in control of a dam violates subsection 1, if, what would otherwise constitute a violation is:

A. Caused by meteorological conditions:

B. A result of unforeseeable operating failures of the dam or any associated equipment:

C. By valid order of federal, state or local authorities; or

D. Caused by a fluctuation that was not avoidable by promptly undertaking all reasonably available steps to regulate water flow through or over any dam under the person's control.

The burden of proof is on the owner, lessee or person in control of the dam to demonstrate the applicability of this subsection. 3. Enforcement. The Attorney General, the municipality, or any littoral or riparian proprietor may institute proceedings to enioin a violation of this subchapter. A municipality may enforce any order issued under this subchapter in accordance with section 4452 and by any other appropriate remedy, including, but not limited to, entering the dam premises to carry out the terms of the order. Any person who operates or maintains a dam or causes or permits a dam to be operated or maintained in any manner that violates the terms of any order issued under this subchapter is liable for the penalties set forth in section 4452.

## §4458. Construction; immunity

 Other laws. Except as specifically provided in this subchapter, this subchapter may not be construed as relieving any person from duties, responsibilities or liabilities imposed by another law, rule or municipal ordinance.

2. Rights of others. Except as specifically provided in this subchapter, nothing in this subchapter may be construed as denying any person any rights that person may have under any other law, rule or municipal ordinance.

3. Other powers. This subchapter may not be construed as limiting the powers of the Maine Emergency Management Agency under Title 37-B, sections 1051 to 1059.

4. Immunity. Action may not be brought against a municipality or its agents or employees for the recovery of damages caused by any order of the municipality, by the partial or total failure of any dam or by the operation of any dam on the grounds that the municipality or its agents or employees are liable by virtue of any order of the municipality.

A municipality actually levying and collecting municipal property taxes and within whose boundaries this acreage lies is entitled to annual payments from money so appropriated by the Legislature provided it submits an annual return in accordance with section 383 and it achieves the appropriate minimum assessment ratio described in section 327. Municipalities disgualified for reimbursement for the 1990 property tax year because of failure to meet either or both of these requirements may qualify for supplemental reimbursement on the following terms: The municipality must meet the requirements for reimbursement under this section for the 1991 property tax year and the supplemental reimbursement must be added to the 1991 property tax year reimbursement payment and be an amount equal to 1/2 the amount that the municipality would have been entitled to for reimbursement for the 1990 property tax year except for its disqualification under this subsection. For the property tax year based on the status of property on April 1, 1988, the per acre reimbursement amount increases from 15¢ to 24¢. For property tax years based on the status of property on April 1, 1989, or thereafter, the per acre reimbursement is 90% of the per acre tax revenue lost as a result of this subchapter. For purposes of this section, the tax lost is the tax that would have been assessed, but for this subchapter, on the classified forest lands if they were assessed according to the undeveloped acreage valuations used in the state valuation then in effect, or according to the current local valuation on undeveloped acreage, whichever is less, minus the tax that was actually assessed on the same lands in accordance with this subchapter.

No municipality may receive a reimbursement payment under this section that would exceed an amount determined by calculating the tree growth tax loss less the municipal savings in educational costs attributable to reduced state valuation.

A. The tree growth tax loss is the adjusted tax that would have been assessed, but for this subchapter, on the classified forest lands if they were assessed according to the undeveloped acreage valuations used in the state valuation then in effect minus the tax that was actually assessed on the same lands in accordance with this subchapter.

In determining the adjusted tax that would have been assessed, the tax rate to be used is computed by adding the additional school support required by the modified state valuation attributable to the increased valuation of forest land to the original tax committed and dividing this sum by the modified total municipal valuation. The adjusted tax rate is then applied to the valuation of forest land based on the undeveloped acreage valuations, adjusted by the certified ratio, to determine the adjusted tax.

B. The municipal savings in educational costs is determined by multiplying the school subsidy index by the change in state valuation attributable to the use of the valuations determined in accordance with this subchapter on classified forest lands rather than their valuation using the undeveloped acreage valuations used in the state valuation then in effect.

In general, the amounts referred to as improvements include amounts paid which add to the value, improve or substantially prolong the useful life of the race track utilized by the licensee for the conduct of its racing meeting. Amounts paid or incurred for repairs and maintenance of property, interest expense or lease payments in connection with the capital improvements are not improvements within the meaning of this section. In addition, 9% of the revenue credited to the General Fund under this section attributable to the excess shall be distributed to the stipend fund provided by Title 7, section 62. Further, 9% of the revenue credited to the General Fund under this section attributable to this excess shall be paid to the commission to be credited to the Sire Stakes Fund provided in section 281. A sum equal to 1.550% of the total contributions on exotic wagers and .185% of the total contributions on regular wagers on all pari-mutuel pools conducted or made at any race or race meet licensed under this chapter shall be retained by the licensee and added to purse money.
