
Our Mission

The Animal Welfare Program ensures the humane treatment of animals through communication, education, and enforcement of animal welfare laws


What We Do


Animal Welfare Complaints



Types of Complaints








A Dog & Cat Spay/Neuter Program for Low Income Owners

Overview of S/N Program


- Low-Income Program Designed to Assist Potential Clients who are currently receiving:
 - MaineCare (formerly Medicaid)
 - TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families)
 - Food Stamps
 - SSI (Supplemental Security Income)
 - SSD (Social Security Disability)
- If not currently enrolled in one of the above programs, income must be low enough to qualify for one of these programs.
- Income is based on Federal Poverty Guidelines.
- Clients must pay a \$10 (cats) or a \$20 (dog) co-pay

The Goals of the Help Fix me program is to assist responsible pet owners keep their pets and help reduce the numbers of unwanted pets euthanized in the animal shelters.




HFM Animals Per Calendar Year








On Line Dog Licensing Program Created 2003




Animal Welfare Program Funding & Expendures by Fiscal Year







Revenue from Dog Licenses















