INTRODUCTION

The citizens "Right to Know" and insuring the openess and integrity of the legislative process are the bases of the Lobbyist Disclosure Procedures Law (3 M.R.S.A. Chapter 15 §311-322) which took effect in 1977. Although Maine had a "Lobbyist Law" before 1977, it only required lobbyists to register with the Secretary of State's Office, identify their employers and pay a \$10 registration fee.

The current Lobbyist Disclosure law requires lobbyists and their employers to register with the Secretary of State, file a report every month the Legislature is in session, file a Post Session Report 30 days after the adjournment of each regular or special session, and file an Annual Report which is a cumulative summary of the lobbyists' activities during the calendar year.

The information a lobbyist is required to disclose includes:

- a) the name and address of the lobbyist and his or her employer;
- b) the name of each individual who will be lobbying;
- c) the date lobbying commenced;
- d) how the lobbyist will be paid;
- e) how much the lobbyists is compensated;
- f) the amount of the lobbyist's expenses;
- g) how much money a lobbyist spent on legislators or other officials of the legislative branch and their identities if the amount exceeds \$25.00;
- h) legislation lobbied for or against;

An important amendment was enacted in May of 1977 which required lobbyists to report not only their compensation for the act of lobbying (communicating directly with officials of the Legislative Branch) but also required lobbyists to report compensation for services performed in support of lobbying. This was a significant change in legislative sentiment since while the lobbyists had previously been required to report compensation for time spent actually talking or writing to a legislator, now in addition to that requirement, lobbyists must also report any compensation for time spent in conference with an employer or client and for time spent in preparing, researching and drafting legislation.

This report is the first comprehensive study of the magnitude of lobbyists' activities to influence the legislative process in Maine. It is an overview of the information gathered through an audit of the lobbyists' reports for 1977 and 1978. The following pages reveal that a few lobbyists representing a small percentage of the total number of employers received the majority of the total amount of monies spent to influence legislation.

One key problem encountered in attempting to compile and analyze the data was that many lobbyists were unresponsive and failed to supply a complete account of their activities. Further, a significant number of lobbyists did not file all of their required reports. In these cases the author had no choice but to average in "zero amounts"; thus the total amounts of compensation and expenditures is most likely conservative.

Unlike other laws which carry penalties for submission of late reports or no reports at all, the Lobbyist Disclosure law only carries penalties for "intentionally" failing to comply with the law. If the public's "Right to Know" is to be served, the Legislature should adopt routine fines for late reports, incomplete reports and for failure to file any report at all.

In order to understand the scope and meaning of the law, the reader should be aware of a few definitions:

- 1. Lobbying: to communicate directly with any official in the Legislative Branch for the purpose of influencing any legislative action when compensation or reimbursement for expenses is made for such activities. (Lobbying does not include testifying at Committee Hearings or any communication made by a person in response to an inquiry or request for information by an official of the Legislative Branch.)
- 2. <u>Lobbyist</u>: any person who is specifically employed by another person for the purpose of and who engages in lobbying; or any person who as a regular employee of another person, expends an amount of time in excess of 8 hours in any calendar month in lobbying.
- 3. Employer: a person who agrees to reimburse for expenditures or to compensate a person who in turn agrees to provide services.

If money is any indication of success, then the Lobbyist Disclosure law was a huge success as 141 lobbyists registered in 1977 in order for 209 employers to pay them over three-quarters of a million dollars. (Names and addresses of lobbyists and employers can be found in Appendix A of this report.)

Of the lobbyists' total income of \$759,684.95, \$521,306.37 was collected by 10 lobbyists each making in excess of \$20,000. That is to say, 7% of the total number of registered lobbyists earned 69% of the total income reported in 1977.

The lobbyist who received the largest share of this money was the law firm Pierce, Atwood, Scribner, Allen & McKusick of Portland which garnered \$125,118.13 or 16% of all the money paid to lobbyists in 1977. The Portland law firm Verrill & Dana received the second largest amount - \$117,381.63, representing 15% of the total.

Marden, Dubord, Bernier & Chandler, a Waterville law firm followed with \$78,041.48 or 11% of the total. Together, these 3 law firms earned \$320,541.24 or 42% - nearly half - of all monies spent to influence legislation in 1977.

While most lobbyists only represented one employer, 22 lobbyists represented 2 or more employers with Pierce, Atwood, Scribner, Allen & McKusick being the single lobbyist hired by the most employers - 18.

The number of lobbyists that employers chose to represent their interests at the 108th Legislature varied considerably. Forty-six of the employers or 22% employed 2 or more lobbyists with the Maine State Employees Association having the largest group - 9 lobbyists. (Note: some employers may actually

have had more <u>individuals</u> lobbying for them but because the law does not require individuals of a law firm, for instance, to register separately, the law firm itself is registered as one lobbyist. For example, Marden, Dubord, Bernier, & Chandler had 7 individual lawyers registered to lobby but is considered as only one lobbyist.)

Eleven lobbyists reported that they had been compensated \$1,000 or more to lobby for or against 30 different bills up for legislative consideration. For working on these 30 bills, the lobbyists received a total of \$111,207.26, which is 14.6% of the total amount of compensation received for the year. Sewall & White, a Portland law firm received the single largest amount from an employer for working on one bill: 3M paid \$13,688.12.

International Paper Company paid their lobbyists \$26,885.36, the largest amount spent by any employer in 1977. Central Maine Power Company followed with \$23,464.62 paid to their lobbyists. Ten other employers spent \$10,000 or more for lobbying efforts in 1977. Together these 12 employers spent \$178,197.36 on lobbying. Thus 5.7% of the 209 employers expended nearly 24% of the total amount paid for lobbying in 1977.

Seventeen different types of interest groups were represented by lobbyists. The largest interest group in terms of the number of employers and the monies spent was Business. Twenty-three percent of the total number of the registered employers are components of this category. Business also outspent the other interest groups by paying their lobbyists \$121,159.96 or 16% of the total. Pulp, Paper & Forestry interests (\$85,865.44) and Insurance interests followed.

Of the total number of disclosure reports that lobbyists and employers must file with the Secretary of State, 61% were filed on time, 24% were filed

late and 15% were never filed. However, the lobbyists are not as diligent as these figures seem to indicate since over 37% did not file Annual Reports.

Thirteen lobbyists reported that they had spent a total of \$1004.60 directly to or on behalf of one or more officials of the Legislative Branch. Of these 13, nine lobbyists spent more than \$25 (although they are required by law to identify these officials, no lobbyist did so).

1978 - AN ANALYSIS

1978 did not prove as active a year as 1977 in terms of the number of lobbyists registered or money spent to influence legislation. By the end of 1978, 95 lobbyists had registered. (See Appendix B).

The total amount of income for 1978 was \$377,253.72. Seven Lobbyists received \$221,993.74 of the year's total. In other words, 7% of the lobbyists earned nearly 60% of the total amount of money paid in 1978.

As in 1977, the highest paid lobbyist was the Portland law firm, Pierce, Atwood, Scribner, Allen, Smith & Lancaster receiving \$60,535.82 or 16% of the lobbyist income in 1978. Marden, Dubord, Bernier & Chandler of Waterville followed with \$58,496.85 or 15.5%. Verrill & Dana placed third with reported compensation and expenses of \$55,406.32 or 14.7%. Although comprising only 3% of all the registered lobbyists, these 3 law firms earned approximately 46% of the total amount of money paid to lobbyist during 1978.

A total of 17 lobbyists represented 2 or more employers. Again Pierce,

Atwood, Scribner, Allen, Smith & Lancaster headed this category by representing

14 employers.

Twenty-eight of the employers engaged or retained 2 or more lobbyists to represent their interests to Maine legislators. The Maine State Employees Association again headed this list with 6 lobbyists. (Note: some employers may actually have had more <u>individuals</u> lobbying for them but because the law doesn't require individual members of a law firm, for instance, to register separately, the law firm is the lobbyist. For example, Pierce, Atwood, Scribner, Allen, Smith & Lancaster with its 5 individual lawyers

lobbying is listed as one lobbyist.)

International Paper Company again had the distinction of being the single employer which spent the most money on its lobbying goals — a total of \$15,423.67. The Maine Tax Limitation Committee paid its lobbyists \$11,167.15 thus making it the second largest spender. Twelve other employers paid \$5,000 or more to their lobbyists. Although comprising slightly more than 10% of the employers, these 14 spent nearly 32% of the total \$336,412.84 paid to lobbyists in 1978.

Seven lobbyists reported that they had been compensated in excess of \$1,000 to lobby on each of 13 different bills. These 7 lobbyists were paid a total of \$51,662.67 which is 14% of the total paid in 1978. The largest single amount paid by an employer to a lobbyist for work on one bill was \$8,171.40 paid to Verrill & Dana by the Maine Tax Limitation Committee.

Ten lobbyists reported that they had expended a total of \$1151.72 directly to or on behalf of one or more officials of the Legislative Branch.

Of these, 6 reported spending \$25 or more.

Again, Business topped the list of interest groups represented by lobbyists. Twenty percent of the total number of employers belonged to this category. Although Business was comprised of the most number of employers, it was outspent by the Pulp, Paper & Forestry interests. The Pulp, Paper & Forestry interests included 8% of the total number of employers, but spent the largest share of all money expended to influence legislation - \$63,030.77 - nearly 17%.

Lobbyists continued to be negligent in filing their periodic disclosure reports. Of all the reports due, 43.1% were timely filed, 21.3% were late but 35.1% were never filed. A small consolation, there was only a 9% dilinquency rate in filing the 1978 Annual Reports.
