Summary of the activities related to accomplishing the mission of the board in 2014: BOV Initial Report 2014

The Board of Visitors welcomed three new members in December of 2013, and we currently have a total of four members. The search is underway for another applicant with a mental health background. All current members continue to participate in board meetings, informal gatherings, and activities in support of the Long Creek Youth Development Center.

In the first few months of 2014, the Board of Visitors worked to support LCYDC while they faced significant safety challenges, crisis; and ultimately begin to identify and correct failing systemic issues. Due to the significance of these issues presented in the early winter of 2014; the BOV will address these concerns, corrective measures to date, and recommendations in a detailed report to be completed by the BOV in January 2015.

The BOV met for four quarterly meetings: April 2nd, 2014 June 26th, 2014 September 25th, 2014 December 11th, 2014

In addition to the formal board meetings, the BOV met frequently last spring to address the immediate safety issues facing residents and staff. The BOV met with LCYDC Administration, Gould School staff and teachers, LCYDC Unit staff, and residents. Additionally the BOV met with the Associate Commissioner of the Department of Corrections and the Commissioner of the Department of Corrections to discuss safety issues and corrective measures, and ongoing concerns. Further details and recommendations based on these meetings will be examined in the report compiled by the BOV in January of 2015.

The Board of Visitors looks forward to the opportunity to discuss concerns, and challenges.

Summary of the activities related to accomplishing the mission of the board in 2014: There are three active deorganizations: the Town of Bancroft, the Town of Atkinson, and Oxbow Plantation.

Voters in the Town of Bancroft approved the deorganization of the town in November's general election. The deorganization will be effective July 1, 2015. The State Tax Assessor, and LUPC will be working with municipal officers until all the financial obligations and land use planning maps are complete for Bancroft Township.

The Town of Atkinson is conducting its 4th deorganization effort. The deorganization procedure for Atkinson is being written by the State Commission, because the Town did not submit one. Atkinson's road inventory is not complete. There are substantial infrastructure issues with the roads and one bridge. In addition, there is a priority three open salt pile that is leeching salt into an open aquifer. A salt shed needs to be built and the site needs to be cleaned. The Town must also withdraw from MSAD 41 and pay its obligations for teacher retirement funds.

Oxford Plantation filed a petition for deorganization, and like, Atkinson, it did not submit a deorganization procedure within 90 days. The State Commission is writing the deorganization procedure. Oxbow is also a founding member of its RSU/MSAD in Ashland, so it must withdraw from that RSU. Oxbow owes its share of debt for the new high school, and of funding teacher retirement costs.

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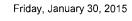
