Summary of the activities related to accomplishing the mission of the board in 2016: Oxbow Plantation's Board Public Hearing Costs deorganization procedure was approved by the legislature in the 2nd session of the 127th session, and received the final approval of Oxbow's voters in the 2016 general election. The effective date of Oxbow's De-organization is 7-1-2016.

The Town of Atkinson is conducting its 4th de-organization effort. The de-organization procedure is now complete. There are substantial infrastructure issues with the roads and one bridge, and there is an open salt pile that is leeching salt into an open aquifer /wetland/bog. The wetland contains significant tree kill within it. A salt shed needs to be built and the site needs to be cleaned. The Town must also withdraw from MSAD 41. In 2016, the Piscataquis County Commissioners voted to hold an Advisory Referendum of the Piscataquis UT voters. Voter lists were obtained from SOS and 655 absentee ballots were mailed to voters in a process that was recommended by SOS. During the UT advisory referendum 2 public hearings were held in Greenville and in Milo, and another public hearing on Atkinson's de-organization procedure followed in the Atkinson's Town Hall. The Atkinson deorganization procedure was printed by Adams Graphics, and the cost was reported for the Atkinson public hearing on 7-19-2016. The report was made available to attendees of the public hearings in Greenville, Milo, and Atkinson. Atkinson voters approved the de-organization procedure and a bill for the de-organization has been submitted for consideration during the 1st session of the 128th legislature. Cary Plantation's de-organization bill was denied by a 11-0 vote of the State and Local Government Committee during the 2nd session of the 127th Legislature. The bill was place in the dead file. Residents in Seboeis Plantation circulated a petition to discuss de-organization, and a public hearing was held on 10-5-2016. Seboeis voters did not approve any further deorg activity and the process for Seboeis ended.

The mission is being accomplished with the monitoring and oversight of nine operating charter schools which include school visits and annual reports, regular Business Meetings and other meetings/conference calls as needed. RFP issued May 31, 2016 provided three Letters of Intent to file an application and subsequently one complete application for a public charter school. The sole applicant was Wayfinder Academy who after a Public Interview with the Review Team decided to withdraw their application. Currently, there are nine public charter schools operating: ACADIA Academy, Baxter Academy for Technology and Sciences, Cornville Regional Charter School, Fiddlehead School of Arts and Science, Harpswell Coastal Academy, Maine Academy of Natural Sciences, Maine Connections Academy, Maine virtual Academy, and Snow Pond Arts Academy. Two of Maine's public charter schools — Maine Academy of Natural Sciences and Cornville Regional Charter School — were in renewal in 2016, both of whom were renewed for an additional five years in November 2016. New programs in both of schools were also approved for the start of the 2017/2018 school year.

TASK FORCE

Summary of the activities related to accomplishing the mission of the board in 2016: The State Education and Employment Outcomes (SEEO) Task Force met three times in 2014, fulfilling all its statutory duties and issuing a report with recommendations for the Department of Labor and Department of Education, which included draft legislation suggested for implementing those recommendations. During its meetings, the group reviewed the Department of Labors education and employment outcomes website, which links Maine public post-secondary education programs with graduates resulting first-year wages. This website draws on a database maintained jointly by the Department of Education and the Department of Labor. The group primarily focused on ways to expand this database and the publicly accessible website, as well as identifying potential funding sources to support the maintenance and expansion of the project. The group also explored options relating to improving outreach, educating the public about the website, including options for improved outreach by the Department of Education. The group voted by consensus and made a number of recommendations related to the groups duties and reporting requirements in statute. For more information, please see the State Education and Employment Outcomes Task Force 2014 annual report, filed with the Legislature in December 2014.
