Dear Governor Brennan:

In 1981 the 110th Maine Legislature enacted Chapter 468 of the Public Laws of 1980, "An Act to Reform the Statutes Relating to Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicating Liquor or Drugs", popularly known as the 1981 Drunk Driving Law.

Under the 1981 Drunk Driving Law, the Department of Human Services is required to prepare an annual comprehensive written report on the enforcement of Maine's operating under the influence laws.

The Department of Human Services is pleased to submit the second annual report. This report covers the period of January 1, 1983 to December 31, 1983.

The findings indicate a substantial increase in the number of persons arrested for Operating Under the Influence. However, the number of convictions has decreased and the number of dismissals has increased, particularly for civil OUI violations. A summary of additional findings are highlighted on pages vi, vii, and viii.

The results of a review by the OUI Work Group is included in Section V, Issues and Recommendations. The Work Group presented two recommendations. The second of these addressed the need to "postpone implementing any major amendments to the OUI statutes until such time as the State of Maine had sufficient experience, and data, to evaluate the effectiveness of the current OUI laws". This recommendation is moot because of the recent decision of the Maine Supreme Court.

In summary, it appears that the 1981 Drunk Driving Law has had a substantial, beneficial impact on the people of Maine.

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HIGHLIGHTS

OUI ARRESTS, REFUSALS AND BAC

During calendar year 1983, a total of 11,293 OUI arrests were made; 878 more arrests than were made during the first full year under the new law (September 18, 1981 - September 17, 1982).

A slightly lower percentage of drivers apprehended in 1983 refused to submit to a chemical test; in 1982 15.7 percent refused whereas in 1983, 14.3 percent refused.

The average blood alcohol count (BAC) was .19 percent for the 9,670 drivers who submitted to a chemical test in 1983. The average BAC in 1982 was .18 percent.

STATEWIDE OUI CONVICTIONS AND DISMISSALS

The percentage of defendants convicted of an OUI violation decreased from 86.8 percent in 1982 to 83.4 percent in 1983 OUI violations. Dismissals increased from 11.2 percent in 1982 to 15.2 percent in 1983.

STATEWIDE CIVIL OUI CONVICTIONS AND DISMISSALS

The conviction rate for 1983 civil OUI cases was 78.2 percent; the 1982 conviction rate was 87.4 percent. The dismissal rate increased from 10.5 percent in 1982 to 16.0 percent in 1983.

STATEWIDE CRIMINAL OUI CONVICTIONS AND DISMISSALS

The 1983 criminal OUI conviction rate was 91.4 percent; the 1982 conviction rate was 85.6 percent. The dismissal rate decreased from 12.6 percent in 1982 to 7.7 percent in 1983.

CIVIL OUI SENTENCING

Fines were imposed by the courts in a greater percentage of the 1983 convictions (99.8%) than in the 1982 convictions (99.1%). The average fine increased from \$260 in 1982 to \$263 in 1983.

License suspensions were also imposed by the courts in a greater percentage of the 1983 civil OUI convictions (99.9%) than in the 1982 convictions (98.4%). The average license suspension period decreased slightly in 1983 (45 days compared to 46 days in 1982).

CRIMINAL OUI SENTENCING

Fines were imposed by the courts in a greater percentage of the 1983 convictions (99.0%) than in the 1982 convictions (98.8%). The average fine imposed by the courts increased from \$375 in 1982 to \$389 in 1983.

License suspensions occurred in a greater percentage of the 1983 convictions (98.4%) than in 1982 convictions (93.9%). The average license suspension period imposed by the courts increased by 31 days. The 1982 average was 96 days while the 1983 average was 127 days.

Jail sentences were also imposed in a greater percentage of the 1983 convictions. In 96.3 percent of the 1982 convictions, OUI offenders were sentenced to an average of 5 days in jail; in 98.8 percent of the 1983 convictions, offenders were required to serve an average of 9 days in jail.

DEEP COMPLETION

In 1983 and 1984, approximately 14,832 OUI offenders met all DEEP requirements; 23.6 percent were drivers apprehended in calendar year 1983. Of the total 6,931 offenders convicted of a 1983 OUI violation, 50.4 percent (3,495 offenders) had met all DEEP requirements as of January 10, 1985. At the time the 1982 report was prepared (December, 1982) 50.5 percent of the drivers convicted of an OUI offense had met all of the DEEP requirements.

A greater percentage of the 1983 OUI offenders (DEEP participants) had to meet requirements beyond the 10-hour program (34.8%) than was the case during the previous reporting period (31.1%).

STATEWIDE OAS CONVICTIONS AND DISMISSALS

The OAS conviction rate increased from 68.4 percent in 1982 to 74.8 percent in 1983. The dismissal rate decreased from 29.5 percent (1982) to 24.2 percent (1983).

OAS SENTENCING

Fines were imposed by the courts in a smaller percentage of the 1983 convictions (89.4%) than in 1982 convictions (94.9%). The average fine in 1983 was \$91 less than in 1982 (\$127 compared to \$218).

License suspension periods were extended in 3.7 percent of the 1983 convictions compared to 6.5 percent of the 1982 convictions. The average additional license suspension period decreased from 303 days (1982) to 281 days (1983).

Jail sentences were imposed in a smaller percentage of the 1983 OAS convictions, however, jail sentences were longer. In 1982, 18.9 percent of the drivers convicted for OAS served an average of 14 days in jail. In 1983, 14.2 percent of the drivers convicted served an average of 22 days in jail.

STATEWIDE HO CONVICTIONS AND DISMISSALS

The conviction rate in 1983 increased by 21.0 percent; in 1982 it was 55.5 percent while in 1983 it was 76.5 percent. The dismissal rate decreased from 42.0 percent (1982) to 22.4 percent (1983).

HO SENTENCING

Fines were imposed by the courts in a smaller percentage of the 1983 HO convictions; 17.1 percent compared to 29.4 percent. The average fine decreased from \$529 (1982) to \$422 (1983).

Licenses were additionally suspended in 5.1 percent of the 1983 HO convictions compared to 1.0 percent in 1982. The average license suspension was 183 days for both reporting periods.

Jail sentencing occurred in a greater percentage of the 1983 convictions and the average jail sentence was longer. In 1982, 61.0 percent of the drivers convicted served an average of 70 days in jail whereas in 1983, 78.4 percent were sentenced to serve an average of 101 days in jail.

INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND - OUI REPORTING REQUIREMENT

Maine's 110th Legislature enacted Chapter 468 of the Public Laws of 1980 "AN ACT to Reform the Statutes Relating to Driving under the Influence of Intoxicating Liquor or Drugs" (L.D. No. 1681) proposed by Maine's Governor, Joseph E. Brennan. The enactment of the legislation was in response to a general growing concern about the incidence of OUI arrests and the frequent alcohol involvement in highway accidents.

The revised statutes include - an "illegal per se" law, the creation of a civil OUI offense (traffic infraction), tougher penalties including a mandatory 48-hour jail sentence upon conviction under the criminal OUI statutes, and that all persons convicted of OUI complete the Driver Education Evaluation Program (DEEP) prior to license restoration. L.D. No. 1681 also stipulates that a written report be prepared annually concerning the enforcement of laws relating to drinking and driving. The legislation identifies the specific data elements to be contained in the annual report and designated the Office of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Prevention (OADAP) within the Maine Department of Human Services the responsibility of preparing annual reports. In summary, the 1981 OUI legislation not only instituted tougher penalties but also included a built-in mechanism for assessing the enforcement of the OUI statutes through the reporting requirement.

The major obstacle in complying with the reporting requirement has been, and to some extent continues to be, the availability of data. For example, the data for the first 12-month OUI report (Sept. 1981 - Sept. 1982) had to be collected by actually reviewing docket books at each of the 33 District and 16 Superior Courts. Arrest statistics for OAS and HO counts were not obtainable through the court records review - nor were they available in aggregate from any single state agency.

In attempting to identify a more cost-efficient method of data collection, an OUI Policy Direction Committee was formed in July 1982 to advise and assist in addressing the problem. The following individuals were invited to serve on the OUI Committee: Robert McKeagney, Deputy Commissioner, Department of Human Services; Arthur Stilphen, Commissioner, Department of Public Safety; Owen Pollard, Director, Bureau of Rehabilitation; Debra Olkin, Director of Planning and Research and Dana Hagarthy, Regional Court Administrator, Administrative Office of the Courts; John McElwee, Esq. and Alan Kelly, Esq., District Attorney's Office; Yvonne English, Executive Director, Maine Chief of Police

Association; Chief Thomas Landers, Chief of Police, Orono Police Department; Chief Richard Griffen, Chief of Police, Augusta Police Department; Sheriff William Wright, President, Maine Sheriff's Association; and Ben Crites, Programming Services, Division of Motor Vehicles. OADAP staff, Michael Fulton, Director and Richard Clark, Research Analyst also attended meetings, as did consultants from USM, Polina McDonnell and Thomas Frank.

The OUI Policy Direction Committee convened on several occasions to consider various data collection-reporting system options for replacing the court-site visit approach. Ultimately, the consensus of the Committee was that the use of the Uniform Traffic Ticket and Complaint (UTT) as the data collection and reporting tool would be the most cost-efficient and yield most of the data required for the annual OUI report. This option was selected because the UTT was already being utilized by all law enforcement agencies in Maine in citing traffic violations and it was also used by the majority of Maine's court clerks in transmitting information to the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

Although court clerks were already forwarding information to DMV, transmittal of information was required only when a conviction occurred. The OUI annual report statutes required the inclusion of other types of court findings as well. In addition to conviction-related data, the following statistics were also required: the number of OUI, OAS and HO cases that were dismissed, dismissed for a guilty plea to a lesser charge, as well as the number of not guilty findings. Prior to implementing the collection and reporting of these additional statistics, the proposed data collection-reporting system was reviewed and approved by Maine's Trial Court Administrative Group and the State Administrative Office of the Courts. The proposed data collection-reporting system was also presented, for review and comment, to Maine's District and Superior Court Clerks at the 1982 Judicial Conference.

The review process was completed in October, 1982 and the data collection-reporting system was implemented in November, 1982. As of the first of November the 33 District and 16 Superior Court Clerks commenced transmitting to DMV the additional data needed for the annual report: OUI, OAS and HO dismissals; dismissals for a guilty plea to a lesser charge; and findings of not guilty.

Unfortunately, the current data collection-reporting system still does not yield all the information required for the annual report. Since the court clerks do not transmit information to DMV until final adjudication of a case has occurred, a count of the actual number of complaints filed for OUI, OAS and HO offenses is not obtainable through this data collection-reporting system — this is also the situation with OAS and HO complaints. In order to include these statistics in annual reports, a separate data collection-reporting system would be required since, at this time, no single state agency is collecting and tabulating these statistics. The extent to which the exclusion of these statistics

from annual OUI reports hinders an assessment of the enforcement of laws relating to drinking and driving should be the key factor in considering this data gap.

The 1983 statistics contained in this report were provided by DMV on January 10, 1985. All 1983 OUI, OAS and HO statistics included in this report are based on a 1983 violation date and a final court judgment made and reported to DMV prior to January 10, 1985.1

Prior to finalizing the 1983 OUI Annual Report, OADAP convened representatives of several state agencies to consider the 1983 data and their policy implications, as well as to exchange views concerning the drinking and driving problem. The members of this OUI Work Group were: Albert Godfrey, Director, Bureau of Safety; George Storer, Division Chief, Driver Licensing and Control, Division of Motor Vehicles; Linwood Oakes, Director, Division of Driver Education Evaluation Programs; David Finn, Chairperson, OUI Committee, Maine Association of Substance Abuse Programs; Neill Miner, Director, Office of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Prevention; Dorothy Mithee, Policy and Program Analyst, Office of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Prevention; and Polina McDonnell, Consultant, Human Services Development Institute, University of Southern Maine.

The charge to the 1983 OUI Work Group was: 1) to review and analyze the indicators of performance tracked under the law by the Division of Motor Vehicles and reported by the Department of Human Services in the 1983 OUI Report; 2) to develop recommendations and identify issues for inclusion in the report; and 3) to determine the need for the establishment of an ongoing OUI review Work Group and, if appropriate, the goals and membership of the group. The 1983 OUI Work Group convened twice (December 20, 1984 and January 3, 1985) to address the three areas.

This report is organized into four major sections. Chapters II, III, and IV present 1983 OUI, OAS and HO statistics, respectively. Each of these three chapters examines the 1983 data statewide, by county, by district and by superior court and, where appropriate, 1983 statistics are compared to 1982 data. (The 1983 statistics cover calendar year 1983 while the 1982 statistics cover September 18, 1981 through September 17, 1982 — the first twelve months under the tougher OUI laws.) Chapter V identifies issues and questions (and recommendations). The final section of the report (Appendices) contains statistical tables which are referenced in the narrative.

In February, 1985, DMV identified an additional 904 OUI cases with violation dates of 1983; unfortunately, the 1983 data provided by DMV in January, 1985 had already been analyzed and this report was being finalized. The additional OUI cases, however, do not significantly change the overall pattern of court findings and sentencing as related to 1983 OUI violations. Figures 0-1 and 0-2 in Appendix O show the court findings and sentencing for civil and criminal OUI cases based on the two sets of statistics.

• Of the 6,931 persons convicted of a 1983 OUI offense, 3,495 met all the DEEP requirements for license restoration as of January 10, 1985 (50.4% completion rate).

ARRESTS, REVOCATION OF IMPLIED CONSENT AND BLOOD-ALCOHOL TEST RESULTS

Maine law enforcement officers made 11,293 OUI arrests in 1983; 878 more arrests than were made in 1982 (10,415 arrests). The 1983 arrest statistic represents an 8.4 percent increase over 1982 and a 42.6 percent increase over 1978 (7,918 arrests).

At the time of arrest or summons for OUI and upon request by the law enforcement officer, refusal to submit to a chemical test to ascertain the blood-alcohol level (by blood or breath analysis) results in an automatic 180-day license or permit suspension imposed by the Secretary of State.

In 1983, refusal to submit to a chemical test occurred in 14.3 percent of the arrests — a slightly lower percentage than in 1982 (15.7%). Knox County had the highest 1983 refusal rate (27.6%) while Piscataquis County had the lowest refusal rate (9.3%). (Figure 1)



In comparing 1982 with 1983 refusal statistics, refusals increased in Franklin County (4.2%), Knox County (2.3%), Waldo County (1.7%) and Aroostook County (0.9%). Refusals decreased in the remaining 12 counties ranging from a percentage difference of 0.2 percent (Oxford and Sagadahoc Counties) to 5.2 percent (Androscoggin County). (Additional statistics are contained in Figure A-1 of the Appendix.)

The average blood alcohol count (BAC) in 1983 was .19 percent (9,670 tests taken). The average BAC in 1982 was .18 percent, in 1981 it was also .19 percent, and in 1980 it was .16 percent.

More than one-third (35.3%) of the 1983 test results showed a BAC of .15 to .19 percent (Figure 2). Twenty-four percent of the test results showed a blood-alcohol level equal to .20 percent or greater (2,339 BAC tests). Distribution of test results by the six BAC levels by county are contained in Figure A-2 in Appendix A.



To facilitate a comparison of 1983 statistics with 1982 statistics, it was necessary to re-calculate some of the percentages contained in the 1982 OUI Report to ensure that similar data were being compared. For example, in abstracting OUI data from the court dockets for the 1982 OUI Report, pending cases were identified. It was not always possible, however, to determine from the dockets whether an OUI complaint involved a civil or a criminal charge — these complaints were counted and reported as civil-criminal, not specified. For this report, a count of

pending OUI complaints was not available; however, all OUI counts reported by DMV are identified as criminal or civil. For comparative purposes, then, only similar 1982 and 1983 statistics were considered. Percentages are based on the total count (cases); the total count is comprised of cases resulting in a court finding of: 1) guilty, 2) not guilty, 3) dismissed, and 4) dismissed for a plea of guilty to a lesser charge.

The following section of this report presents disposition and sentencing data for the 8,312 OUI cases having a 1983 violation date and adjudicated by the courts as of January 10, 1985. Statewide statistics are presented first, followed by county statistics, and district and superior court statistics.

Case Dispositions (Civil and Criminal OUI Combined)


As of January 10, 1985 (12 to 24 months after the 1983 violations occurred), 8,312 OUI cases had been adjudicated by the courts; representing 74.6 percent of the 1983 arrests (11,293). A slightly greater percentage (77.6%) of the 1981-82 violations had been adjudicated (8,092) at the time data were collected in the courts for the first OUI report. (Data were collected in November and December 1982 -- 1-1/2 to 15 months after the violation occurred.)

The overall conviction rate in 1983 OUI cases (civil and criminal combined) declined slightly (3.4%) as did, to a lesser extent, findings of not guilty (0.5%). The 1983 dismissal rate increased slightly (4.0%). (Figures 3 and 4)



1982 AND 1983 DISPOSITION OF OUI CASES (Civil and Criminal Combined)



The 1983 criminal OUI conviction rate increased by 5.6 percent. The civil OUI conviction rate, however, decreased by 9.2 percent, thereby reducing the overall conviction rate for OUI. The percentage of 1983 criminal OUI cases which resulted in a dismissal decreased (4.9%) whereas dismissals in civil cases increased (9.3%). (Figures 5 and 6)





Sentences Imposed by the Courts

<u>Civil OUI Cases</u>. As shown in Figure 7, courts imposed fines and suspended licenses more frequently in 1983 civil OUI convictions than they did during the previous reporting period. The percentage of convictions resulting in a fine increased from 99.1 percent to 99.8 percent and license suspensions increased from 98.4 percent to 99.9 percent.

The average fine imposed by the courts increased from \$260 to \$263. No change occurred in the minimum and maximum fines imposed by the courts (\$50-\$500) during the two reporting periods.

The average license suspension period was slightly lower in 1983 than in 1982; 45 days compared to 46 days. The minimum license suspension period imposed by the courts remained the same, 30 days; the maximum, however, increased from 183 in 1982 to 365 days in 1983.

Criminal OUI Cases. As shown in Figure 8, the frequency with which courts imposed all three mandatory penalties upon conviction for criminal OUI was substantially greater in 1983 convictions than was the case during the first twelve months under the tougher OUI statutes. The greatest change occurred in license suspensions; the percentage of convictions in which licenses were suspended increased from 93.9 percent to 98.4 percent. Jail sentencing increased from 96.3 percent to 98.8 percent and fines increased from 98.8 percent to 99.0 percent of the convictions.

Not only did Maine's courts impose all three mandatory penalties more frequently, the data indicate that the sanctions they imposed were more severe. The average fine increased from \$375 to \$389 (the mandatory minimum is \$350). The average license suspension period increased from 96 days to 127 days (the mandatory minimum is 90 days). The average jail sentence also increased -- from 5 to 9 days (the mandatory minimum is a 2-day jail sentence).

As depicted in Figure 8, some sanctions imposed by the courts during both reporting periods were less than the mandatory minimum required by statute.

Civil OUI

Case Dispositions. As noted previously, the overall 1983 civil OUI conviction rate decreased and dismissal rates increased. Whereas in 1982 the county conviction rates ranged from 75.0 percent in York County to 96.0 percent in Kennebec County, the 1983 conviction rates ranged from 62.7 percent in York County to 98.6 percent in Franklin County.

Dismissal rates in 1983 ranged from a low of 1.3 percent in Franklin County to a high of 21.9 in York County. In 1982, county dismissal rates ranged from 2.0 percent (Kennebec County) to 12.0 percent (York and Franklin Counties).

Dismissals for a plea of guilty to a lesser charge ranged from zero in four counties in 1983 (Androscoggin, Aroostook, Franklin and Somerset Counties) to a high of 15.9 percent in one county (Cumberland). In 1982, seven counties did not have any civil OUI cases dismissed for a plea of guilty to a lesser charge (Hancock, Kennebec, Lincoln, Piscataquis, Sagadahoc, Somerset, and Waldo Counties) while the highest rate was in Cumberland County (10.0%).

In absolute numbers, in 1983 a total of 1011 civil OUI cases were dismissed (including dismissals for a guilty plea to a lesser charge) compared to 526 such dismissals during the prior reporting period.

Sentencing. In 1983, the average fine ranged from \$250 in Washington County to \$329 in Franklin County. Although all county averages were above the mandatory minimum (\$250), courts in five counties imposed fines of less than the mandatory minimum. The five counties were: Waldo (\$50), York (\$100), Cumberland (\$150), and Lincoln and Kennebec (\$200). In 1982, fines of less than the mandatory minimum were imposed by courts in five counties: Washington (\$50), York (\$75), Penobscot (\$150), and Androscoggin and Waldo Counties (\$200).

Average license suspension periods in 1983 ranged from 44 days in Waldo County (less than the mandatory minimum of 45 days) to 48 days in Piscataquis and Waldo Counties. In 1982, county averages ranged from 45 days in 10 counties to 54 days in Franklin County. Whereas in 1982, the data indicated that courts in six counties had imposed license suspension periods of 30 days, the 1983 data indicate that only two counties had 30-day license suspension periods. (In 1982, the counties were: Androscoggin, Cumberland, Kennebec, Lincoln, Penobscot and York; and in 1983, the counties were Cumberland and Waldo.)

Criminal OUI

Case Dispositions. County conviction rates increased in criminal OUI cases in 1983 as compared to 1982. In 1983, county conviction rates ranged from a low of 87.2 percent (York County) to a high of 98.2 percent (Piscataquis County) -- a range of 11.0 percent. The range in 1982 cases was 21.0 percent with the conviction rates ranging from 74.0 percent (Franklin County) to 95.0 percent (Hancock County).

The lowest dismissal rate in 1983 was in Somerset County (1.1%) and the highest was in Hancock County (14.2%). In 1982, the lowest dismissal rate was in Waldo County (1.0%) and the highest was in Franklin County (26.0%).

A substantially smaller percentage of the criminal OUI cases were dismissed for a plea of guilty to a lesser charge in 1983. In absolute numbers, 158 cases were dismissed for a plea to a lesser charge in 1982 whereas in 1983 only 50 cases resulted in such outcome. The data indicate that in 1982, three counties did not have any criminal OUI cases dismissed for a plea to a lesser charge and in 1983, 10 counties did not have any.

Sentencing. Upon conviction, fines were imposed in 99.0 percent of the criminal OUI cases in 1983; in 1982 fines were imposed by the courts in 98.8 percent of the convictions. The 1983 county averages were all above the mandatory minimum of \$350 ranging from an average of \$356 in Piscataquis County to \$454 in Somerset County. However, in terms of the individual fines imposed by the courts, 10 counties showed fines of less than the mandatory minimum -- as low as \$100 in Lincoln and Washington Counties.

The 1983 county averages for license suspension periods were substantially above the mandatory minimum of 90 days and were substantially greater than in 1982. The average license suspension period in 1983 ranged from a low of 107 days (Sagadahoc County) to a high of 149 days (Washington County). In 1982, the low was 89 days (Piscataquis and York Counties) and the high was 115 days (Franklin County). Individual license suspension periods imposed by the courts in 1983, however, were less than the mandatory minimum in several counties. Licenses were suspended for 30 days in one county (York), for 45 days in four counties (Franklin, Hancock, Kennebec and Lincoln), and for 60 days in two counties (Androscoggin and Piscataquis).

Jail sentences in 1983 ranged from an average of 4 days (Washington County) to 26 days (Somerset County). County averages in 1982 ranged from 3 days in five counties to 7 days in two counties. In terms of the individual jail sentences, less than the mandatory minimum jail sentence was imposed in Androscoggin and Piscataquis Counties (1-day jail sentence).

Additional county statistics pertaining to 1983 criminal OUI dispositions and penalties imposed by the courts are presented in Figure 10.



Civil OUI

Case Dispositions. The civil OUI conviction rate in Maine District Courts decreased from 87.4 percent in 1982 to 78.3 percent in 1983. The percentage of cases dismissed (straight dismissals and dismissals for a plea to a lesser charge) almost doubled in 1983. The combined dismissal rate increased from 10.4 percent in 1982 to 19.7 percent in 1983. (Figure 11)



The range in District Court conviction rates increased from 30.0 percent to 44.8 percent in 1983. In 1982, the lowest District Court conviction rate was 70.0 percent (Biddeford) and the highest was 100.0 percent (Bar Harbor). In 1983, however, the lowest conviction rate was 55.2 percent (Biddeford) and the highest was 100.0 percent in three District Courts (Lewiston, South Paris and Van Buren).

In 1982, the highest dismissal rate for a plea to a lesser charge was 10.0 percent in three District Courts (Bridgton, Brunswick and Portland) and in 1983, the highest dismissal rate was 19.3 percent (Brunswick). Interms of straight dismissals, the highest rate in 1982 was 19.0 percent (Livermore) and in 1983 it was 35.0 percent (Biddeford).

Sentencing. Fines were imposed by District Courts in 99.9 percent of the convictions (1983 civil OUI violations); fines were also imposed in 99.9 percent of the convictions during the previous reporting period. In 1983 civil OUI cases, fines were not imposed in 100.0 percent of the convictions in four District Courts (Lewiston, Bangor, Millinocket and Portland); in 1982, three District Courts did not impose fines in all convictions (Lewiston, Bangor and Skowhegan). The average fine increased from \$260 (1982 convictions) to \$263 (1983 convictions). During both reporting periods the lowest fine imposed by the courts was \$50 and the greatest fine was \$500. In 1983, four District Courts imposed fines of less than the mandatory minimum of \$250; they were Augusta, Biddeford, Portland and Wiscasset. In 1982, fines of less than \$250 were imposed by five courts: Bangor, Belfast, Biddeford, Calais and Lewiston.


District Courts suspended licenses with greater frequency in 1983 (99.9%) OUI convictions than in 1982 (98.4%). The average license suspension period, however, decreased slightly. The average in 1982 was 46 days whereas in 1983 it was 45 days.

The 1983 individual District Court averages were all 45 days or greater with one exception; the Belfast District Court imposed an average license suspension period of 44 days. Fewer District Courts suspended licenses for less than 45 days in 1983 than in 1982. In 1982, licenses were suspended for as low as 30 days in six District Courts (Augusta, Bangor, Biddeford, Lewiston, Portland and Wiscasset). In 1983, however, the data indicate that only two District Courts suspended licenses for 30 days (Belfast and Portland).

Additional civil OUI statistics by District Court are contained in Appendix A, Figure A-3.

Criminal OUI

Case Dispositions. The criminal OUI conviction rate increased from 86.1 percent in 1982 to 94.9 percent in 1983 in Maine District Courts. The dismissal rate (dismissals for a plea to a lesser charge and straight dismissals) decreased in 1983 by about 7.6 percent. (Figure 13)



Eight District Courts had criminal OUI conviction rates of 100.0 percent in 1983: Bridgton, Farmington, Fort Kent, Lewiston, Madawaska, Saco, Van Buren and Waterville. In 1982, only four District Courts had conviction rates of 100.0 percent: Fort Kent, Madawaska, South Paris and Van Buren.

The highest dismissal rate in 1983 was 13.3 percent (Bar Harbor) while in 1982 it was 31.0 percent (Livermore Falls). In 1982, the highest rate of dismissals for a plea to a lesser charge was 13.0 percent (Biddeford) and in 1983 the highest dismissal rate was 19.0 percent (Lincoln).

Sentencing. Fines in 1983 were imposed by District Courts in 99.3 percent of the criminal OUI convictions — the same as in 1982 convictions. The average fine imposed in 1983 (\$384) by the District Courts was greater than the average fine in 1982 (\$372).

In 1983, 26 District Courts imposed fines in 100.0 percent of the criminal OUI convictions. In addition, the 1983 court averages (fines) were all equal to or greater than the mandatory minimum fine of \$350. However, the data indicate that 11 of the 33 District Courts imposed individual fines of less than the mandatory minimum ranging from \$100 to \$300. (In 1982, 13 District Courts imposed fines of less than the mandatory minimum.) During both reporting periods (1982 and 1983), the maximum fine imposed was \$1000.

As depicted in Figure 14, licenses were suspended more frequently in 1983 by the District Courts and, in addition, the license suspension periods tended to be longer. In 1983, licenses were suspended in 99.2 percent of the convictions whereas in 1982 they were suspended in 96.3 percent of the convictions. The average license suspension period increased from 95 days (1982) to 130 days (1983). However, the 1983 data indicate that less than the mandatory minimum of 90 days was imposed by six courts: Augusta, Biddeford, Ellsworth, Farmington, Lewiston, and Wiscasset.

IMPOSED BY THE DISTRICT COURTS



As also depicted in Figure 14, District Courts imposed jail sentences with greater frequency in 1983 than they did in 1982; and, the jail sentences tended to be greater. Jail sentences were imposed in 98.6 percent of the 1983 convictions whereas in 1982 they were imposed in 95.9 percent of the convictions. The average jail sentence increased from 4 days in 1982 to 6 days in 1983 criminal OUI convictions. Only two District Courts imposed less than the mandatory minimum of a 2-day jail sentence in 1983; they were Dover-Foxcroft and Lewiston. The longest jail sentence in 1983, however, was also imposed by Dover-Foxcroft (364 days). The longest jail sentence imposed in 1982 was 243 days (Presque Isle).

Figure A-4 in Appendix A contains individual court statistics pertaining to court findings and sentencing related to 1983 criminal OUI violations.

Civil OUI

Case Dispositions. A total of 20 civil OUI cases with violation dates of 1983 were adjudicated by Maine Superior Courts as of January 10, 1985 — the date statistics were generated for this report. The 1983 conviction rate was 40.0 percent (8 cases) and the dismissal rate was 55.0 percent (11 cases). As shown in Figure 15, the conviction rate in 1982 was substantially greater. (It should be noted, however, that at the time 1981-82 data were collected in the courts, of the 32 civil OUI cases identified in the 16 Superior Courts all but 5 were still pending — the 5 cases that had been adjudicated all resulted in convictions.)



Sentencing. Fines were imposed by the Superior Courts in 7 of the 8 convictions (87.5%). The average fine imposed in 1983 was \$278 compared to \$250 in 1982 — the highest fine in 1983 was \$450.

As shown in Figure 16, licenses were suspended in 7 of the 8 civil OUI 1983 convictions (87.5%). The average license suspension period imposed by Superior Courts in 1983 was the same as in 1982 — 45 days.



Criminal OUI

Case Disposition. As shown in Figure 17, the criminal OUI conviction rate in Maine Superior Courts decreased from 84.6 percent in 1982 to 83.8 percent in 1983. Findings of not guilty decreased slightly in 1983 as did dismissals for a guilty plea to a lesser charge. Straight dismissals, however, increased from 9.6 percent in 1982 to 14.2 percent in 1983.



<u>Sentencing</u>. The frequency with which Superior Courts imposed fines, jail sentences and suspended licenses increased in 1983. In addition, the penalties imposed by Superior Courts in 1983 violations were more severe than those imposed during the previous reporting period.

In 1983, fines were imposed in 98.5 percent of the convictions compared to 98.1 in 1982. The average fine increased from \$389 to \$403, however, data indicate that fines of less than the mandatory minimum were imposed in 1983.

The frequency with which Superior Courts imposed jail sentences increased from 98.3 percent of the convictions in 1982 to 99.3 percent in 1983. The average jail sentence also increased from 9 days (1982) to 17 days (1983). (Figure 18)

Figure A-6 in Appendix A of this report contains additional Superior Court disposition and sentencing statistics for 1983.

MRSA 29 §1312-D(2) states that "following the expiration of 2/3 of the total period of suspension imposed pursuant to . . . §1312-B or §1312-C . . ., the Secretary of State may issue a license or permit to the person if he receives written notice that the person has satisfactorily completed the alcohol education program of the Department of Human Services and, when required, has satisfactorily completed an alcohol treatment or rehabilitation program approved by the Department."

Additionally, Maine's Secretary of State, in a memo issued August 12, 1981, stated that "all people (convicted under \$1312-B and \$1312-C) must have completed such alcohol counseling and education as the Department of Human Services shall have prescribed, prior to the restoration of any type of license whatsoever."

In 1983 and 1984, about 14,832 OUI offenders participated in and met all DEEP requirements; 3,495 (23.6%) of whom had a 1983 OUI violation date.

As previously noted, 6,931 drivers with a 1983 OUI violation had been convicted as of January 10, 1985 and, as of that same date, 50.4 percent (3,495 drivers) had met all DEEP requirements. Sixty-five percent of the DEEP participants (2,279) met the DEEP requirement by completing the 10-hour Department of Human Services, Driver Education Evaluation Program. A total of 1,216 (34.8%) of the DEEP participants met the requirement by completing both the 10-hour program, as well as additional evaluation/rehabilitation.

At the time the 1982 OUI Report was prepared (December 1982) 50.5 percent of the OUI offenders (with a violation and conviction date of September 18, 1981 - September 17, 1982) had met all the DEEP requirements necessary for license restoration. Of the 3,793 who met all the requirements, 31.1 percent (1,180 drivers) were required to have an additional evaluation conducted and, if indicated, they also had to participate in and complete treatment/rehabilitation.

As shown in Table 19 on the following page, 38 of the DEEP completors were convicted of a subsequent OUI violation and 20 were convicted for OAS. Subsequent violations and convictions had to occur during calendar year 1983 for inclusion in this report which may explain the relatively low recidivism rate.



STATEWIDE OAS STATISTICS

Case Dispositions

The OAS conviction rate increased from 68.4 percent in 1982 to 74.8 percent in 1983. As depicted in Figure 20, the dismissal rate increased slightly in 1983 and the dismissals for a plea of guilty to a lesser charge decreased somewhat.



Sentencing

As shown in Figure 21, fines were imposed by the courts in 89.4 percent of the OAS convictions in 1983 compared to 94.9 percent in 1982. The average fine imposed by the courts in 1983 was \$131 while in 1982 it was \$218.

Additional license suspension periods were imposed in 3.7 percent of the 1983 OAS convictions; in 1982 license suspension periods were extended in 6.5 percent of the convictions. The average additional suspension period imposed by the courts in 1983 was shorter than in 1982; 281 days compared to 303 days. In 1983, the additional license suspension periods ranged from 30 to 365 days whereas in 1982 they ranged from 7 to 1096 days.

Courts imposed fewer jail sentences in 1983 than in 1982. In 1982, jail sentences were imposed in 18.9 percent of the convictions compared to 14.2 percent in 1983. The average jail sentence in 1983, however, was longer -- 22 days as compared to 14 days in 1982.

Case Dispositions

OAS county conviction rates in 1983 ranged from 63.7 percent (York) to 92.3 percent (Androscoggin) and 91.8 percent (Kennebec). [In 1982, York County had the lowest OAS conviction rate (49.0%) and Knox County had the highest rate (79.0%).]

The 1983 OAS dismissal rate was highest in Lincoln County (30.3%) and lowest in Androscoggin County (5.6%). Cumberland County had the lowest dismissal rate in 1982 (13.0%) while Waldo had the highest rate (30.0%). In 1983, four counties did not have any OAS cases dismissed for a plea to lesser charge. Those counties were: Franklin, Knox, Lincoln and Waldo. York County had the highest dismissal rate (plea to lesser charge) in 1983 (6.6%)

Sentencing

In 1983, fines were imposed in 89.4 percent of the OAS convictions ranging from an average of \$101 (Washington) to \$216 (Somerset). In 1982 the fines ranged from an average of \$158 (Washington) to \$320 (Somerset). The average fine in 1983 was \$127.


Additional license suspension periods were imposed by the courts in 3.7 percent of the convictions in 1983. These additional license suspension periods ranged from an average of 90 days (Waldo) to 365 days (Knox and York Counties). Individual additional license suspension periods imposed by the courts ranged from 30 to 365 days.

Jail sentences were imposed by the courts in 16.0 percent of the 2,951 OAS convictions (419 cases). The average jail sentence was 22 days and the county averages ranged from 7 days (Hancock, Lincoln and Sagadahoc) to 41 days (Kennebec). The individual jail sentences ranged from 1 day to 364 days. (Additional OAS county statistics are presented in Figure 22.)

Case Disposition

As shown in Figure 23, the OAS conviction rate in Maine District Courts increased from 68.7 percent in 1982 to 75.8 percent in 1983 and dismissal rates decreased somewhat.



In 1983, seven District Courts had OAS conviction rates of 100.0 percent. The lowest OAS conviction rate in 1983 was in the Biddeford District Court (52.5%) -- Biddeford also had the highest dismissal rate (46.1%).

Sentencing. Fines, license suspensions, and jail sentences were not imposed by the courts as frequently in 1983 as in 1982. The average fine imposed by District Courts was \$120 in 1983 compared to \$214 in 1982. The fines ranged from \$25 to \$1000 during both reporting periods.

License suspension periods were extended in only 3.5 percent of the convictions in 1983 ranging from one day to 365 days. The average license suspension period was 284 days in 1983 whereas in 1982 it was 301 days.

Of the 2,708 OAS convictions in 1983, jail sentences were imposed in only 320 cases (11.8%). The average jail sentence, however, increased from 11 days in 1982 to 18 days in 1983. (Figure 24)



Disposition

The OAS conviction rate in Superior Courts increased from 64.1 percent in 1982 to 65.4 percent in 1983 and the dismissal rate increased in 1983. (Figure 25)



The highest 1983 OAS conviction rate (100.0%) was in Piscataquis County Superior Court — the lowest conviction rate was in Cumberland County Superior Court (45.0%). Cumberland County Superior Court experienced the highest dismissal rate (55.0%). Only one Superior Court (York) dismissed OAS cases for a plea to a lesser charge.

Sentencing

Superior Courts imposed fewer fines, additional license suspension periods and jail sentences in 1983 OAS convictions. In 1982, Superior Courts imposed fines in 79.3 percent of the convictions compared to 72.4 percent in 1983. The average OAS fine in 1982 was also greater — \$296 compared to \$223 in 1983. The 1983 fines ranged from \$50 in 7 Superior Courts to \$750 in one Court (Oxford). The Superior Court average fine ranged from a low of \$137 in Penobscot Superior Court to a high of \$375 in Oxford County Superior Court.

Additional license suspension periods were not imposed by 7 of the 16 Superior Courts. The remaining 9 Superior Courts imposed an average additional license suspension period of 220 days, ranging from 30 to 365 days (18 cases). (Figure 26)

All but one Superior Court (Hancock) imposed jail sentences upon conviction for an OAS offense. The average jail sentence imposed in 99 convictions was 36 days, ranging from 2 to 364 days. The Superior Court average jail sentence ranged from 8 days in Lincoln and York County Superior Courts to an average of 91 days in Penobscot County Superior Court.



STATEWIDE HO STATISTICS

Case Dispositions

The 1983, the HO conviction rate increased 21.0 percent over 1982—the conviction rate was 55.5 percent in 1982 and 76.5 percent in 1983. The dismissal rate decreased from 37.4 in 1982 to 12.9 percent in 1983. Dismissals for a plea of guilty to a lesser charge increased from 4.6 percent in 1982 to 9.5 percent in 1983. (Figure 27)



Sentencing

As depicted in Figure 28, the percentage of 1983 HO convictions which resulted in a fine decreased from 29.4 percent (1982) to 17.1 percent (1983). The average fine imposed by the courts also decreased -- from \$529 (1982) to \$422 (1983).

The extension of license suspension periods increased in frequency in 1983 but the average additional license period remained the same (183 days). In 1982 an average extended license suspension period of 183 days was imposed in 1.1 percent (1 case) of the 95 HO convictions whereas in 1983 additional suspensions were imposed in 5.1 percent of the 473 HO convictions.

Jail sentences were imposed more frequently in 1983 than in 1982. In 1982, jail sentences were imposed in 61.0 percent of the HO convictions whereas in 1983 they were imposed in 78.4 percent of the convictions. The average jail sentence in 1983 was longer --101 days compared to 70 days in 1982.

Case Dispositions

The highest 1983 HO conviction rate in 1983 was in Kennebec County (96.6%) and the lowest was in York County (50.0%). The highest dismissal rate in HO cases was in Lincoln County (50.0%) and York County had the highest dismissal rate (for a plea to a lesser charge) in 1983 (34.2%).

Sentencing

Fines were imposed in only 17.1 percent of the HO convictions (473). The lowest fine imposed in 1983 was in Penobscot County (\$50) and the greatest fine imposed was in Aroostook, Penobscot and York Counties (\$1000).

Of the total 473 convictions, license suspension periods were extended in 17.1 percent of the convictions. The shortest additional suspension period imposed was 60 days (Hancock County) and the longest suspension period was imposed in Aroostook, Kennebec and Somerset Counties (365 days).

Jail sentences were imposed by the courts in 78.4 percent of the 1983 convictions. The shortest jail sentence was imposed in Somerset County (1 day) and the longest jail sentence was imposed in Penobscot County (5 years). The average jail sentence was 101 days. (Figure 29 contains case disposition and sentencing statistics for 1983 HO violations.)



Case Dispositions

The overall 1983 HO conviction rate in the District Courts increased 24.0 percent — in 1982 it was 18.4 percent and in 1983 it was 42.4 percent. The dismissal rate decreased from 1982 to 1983 by 41.8 percent while dismissals for a plea of guilty to a lesser charge increased in 1983 by 17.6 percent. (Figure 30)



District HO conviction rates in 1983 ranged from 100.0 percent in 8 District Courts to 8.3 percent in Biddeford. Two District courts experienced 100.0 percent dismissal rates in 1983 (Livermore and Wiscasset) and two courts had 100.0 percent dismissals for a plea to a lesser charge (Brunswick and Rumford).

Sentencing

In 1982, fines were imposed by the District Courts in 71.4 percent of the HO convictions while in 1983 a substantially smaller percentage of convictions resulted in a fine being imposed (33.1%). The average fine

imposed by the courts in 1983, however, was greater -- \$496 (1983) compared to \$415 (1982). The fines ranged from \$100 in Houlton to \$1000 in Lincoln.

Of the 45 total convictions in the District Courts, an additional license suspension period was imposed in only one case. This occurred in the Lincoln District Court where the license suspension period was extended by 90 days.

In 33 convictions (73.3%), the District Courts imposed jail sentences. (In 1982, jail sentences were imposed by the courts in 57.1 percent of the convictions.) The 1983 jail sentences ranged from 7 days (Waterville) to 548 days (Bangor). The average jail sentence in 1982 was 42 days — in 1983, however, it was 101 days.



Case Disposition

The overall HO conviction rate in Superior Courts decreased from 85.2 percent in 1982 to 83.5 percent in 1983 and dismissals for a plea to a lesser charge increased by 4.1% in 1983. (Figure 32)



The 1983 HO conviction rates ranged from 100.0 percent in 4 Superior Courts (Hancock, Somerset, Waldo, and Washington) to 50.0 percent in one Superior Court (Piscataquis). The highest dismissal rate was 22.9 percent (Cumberland) and the highest dismissal rate for a plea to a lesser charge was 50.0 percent (Piscataquis).

Sentencing

Fines were imposed by the courts in 15.4 percent of the total HO convictions (66 out of 428) in 1983. In 1982, fines were imposed in 22.2 percent of the total HO convictions. The 1983 fines ranged from \$50 (Penobscot) to \$1000 (Aroostook, Penobscot, and York) and the average fine was \$405. The average fine in 1982 was \$592.

Additional license suspension periods were imposed by Superior Courts in 5.4 percent of the 1983 convictions (23 cases). The additional suspensions ranged from 60 days (Hancock) to 365 days (Aroostook, Kennebec and Somerset).

As also shown in Figure 33, in 79.0 percent of the 1983 HO convictions (338 cases), Superior Courts imposed jail sentences ranging from one (1) day (Somerset) to 5 years (Penobscot). The average jail sentence in 1983 was 101 days. (In 1982, jail sentences were imposed by the courts in 98.8 percent of the convictions ranging from 2 to 365 days; the average jail sentence was 73 days.)

ISSUES AND RECOMMENDATIONS

After reviewing and discussing the 1983 statistics, and the 1982 data contained in the report, the OUI Work Group focused essentially on two key issues:

Issue #1: The need to establish an on-going OUI committee representing State and other agencies and organizations that have an interest in the drinking-driving problem.

The consensus of the Work Group was that an OUI on-going committee should be established to: 1) review and analyze OUI-related statistics contained in the annual OUI report; 2) share other OUI-related information and/or statistics, e.g. alcohol-related highway accidents/fatalities; 3) address data gaps and determine what, if any, action should be taken to collect data to enhance the evaluation of the effectiveness of the OUI law; and 4) develop recommendations to amend program strategies, public policy and/or legislation, if indicated.

Issue #2: The need to postpone implementing major amendments to the OUI statutes until such time as the State of Maine had sufficient experience, and data, to evaluate the effectiveness of the current OUI laws.

The consensus of the Work Group was that, other than amending statutes pertaining to repeat offenders, the OUI laws should not be otherwise revised substantially until sufficient statistics are available to evaluate the extent to which the existing public policies are ameliorating the drinking and driving problem on Maine highways.

To evaluate the impact of the new OUI laws based only on statistics for a two-year timeframe was, in the opinion of the Work Group, premature and could lead to inaccurate conclusions. In addition, the Work Group expressed some concern as related to comparing 1982 and 1983 data given that two different data collection methodologies were used during the two reporting periods for which reports have been written.

Furthermore, judgment concerning implementation, as well as effectiveness, should be reserved until the additional 904, 1983 OUI violations (inadvertently omitted from the statistics provided by DMV for this report) are examined and merged with the OUI data contained in this report.
