

It is an honor and a privilege for me to transmit the 13th Annual Report of the Judicial Department covering activities over an 18 month period between January 1, 1988 and June 30, 1989.

As has been a consistent trend of these annual reports, case filings again reached historic heights. Over 344,000 cases were filed for fiscal year 1989 as compared with 312,000 cases for calendar year 1987, the period covered in our 12th Annual Report.

Once again, the Maine District Court accounted for the great majority of these cases. For the first time in the state's history, this court alone received and disposed of well over 300,000 cases.

Workload is unrelenting in all our state courts. This report is a tribute to the men and women in our courts - both on the bench and behind the counter - whose continued productivity makes our justice system work.

The compilation of this report is a collaborative effort involving court clerks and their staff across the state. It was complicated this year by the conversion of the report to a fiscal year basis to be more consistent with our financial data. Debra Olken served as editor in chief; Sherry Reed compiled and edited the data; Fran Norton ably assisted. Many thanks.

I last stood at this podium at this same hour exactly 52 weeks ago. As the head of the Judicial Department, I always welcome your annual invitation to report on the state of the Third branch. I propose this morning to provide you with a Review of the Year in the courts since my last report. Then I'll comment on where we are and where we should be going.

The past year has in general been a good one in the courts thanks in no small part to the working together of the three great branches of State Government in the spirit of the Three C's comity, communication, and cooperation. That is not to say that the courts do not nave serious problems or that the courts do not have substantial needs, but the good news is that we are identifying and addressing those problems and needs. I will have more to say about that side of things later.

In the last year, the Supreme Judicial Court in its appellate work has kept on top of its heavy caseload. Last year the Law Court set a record in the average number of opinions issued by each justice - nearly 50, for a total of 348 opinions. The Law Court also had to review some 70 petitions for discretionary review in workers' compensation and post-conviction cases. During 1988 the Law Court continued its "road show" by sitting in Knox, Androscoggin, and Sagadahoc Counties for the first time ever and in Franklin County for the first time since 1851. We look forward to sitting in Ellsworth in May to help celebrate the 200th Anniversary of the incorporation of Hancock County.

In the last year, the trial courts - particularly the District Court -

have again experienced an extraordinary increase in their already heavy caseloads. I am proud the judges and clerks and other personnel of our trial courts have met that demanding challenge as well as they have, but we must get help for them. I will have more to say about their need in a moment.

In the last year, with legislative support, the trial courts have broadened and strengthened existing innovative programs for improving their service to society.

1. Only three months before his death in October, Lincoln Clark, Director of the Court Mediation Service, issued an impressive 10-year report. That program started in 1977 with a small group of volunteers mediating 61 small claims cases in Portland. By 1988 a statewide network of paid mediators were handling mandatory mediation of contested divorces involving minor children and providing voluntary mediation of small claims and other civil cases - in all, well over 4,000 cases a year. The Court Mediation Service stands as a distinguished memorial to Lincoln Clark, the Father of Maine Mediation.

2. 1988 was a year of commendable growth in the CASA program - the Court Appointed Special Advocates program. In this one year CASA volunteers have been appointed guardians ad litem for children at risk in 263 new child protection cases in 16 District Courts all across the state. One hundred sixty-two dedicated and specially trained volunteers from the local communities continue to perform this immensely valuable, long-term service to our children.

3. The Medical Malpractice Screening Panels, created by statute and placed under the administrative direction of Chief Justice Brody of the Superior Court, have completed a second year of operation. Those panels have proved themselves a success. They have disposed finally of nearly half of the 200-plus malpractice cases filed in 1987 and 1988.

The last year has also seen other innovative programs newly instituted in the trial courts:

1. The indigency screening program with legislative funding, became operative in Portland in January 1988 and in seven other locations in July. Both the Maine and the U.S. Constitutions require the State to pay for counsel for indigent criminal defendants. For the protection of the public treasury, however, we must assure that only a criminal defendant in financial need gets a free attorney. Figures already show that the indigency screening program is working, as it should, to identify unqualified applicants and to deter others from even applying. You will have before you a proposal to extend that worthwhile program statewide.

2. With legislative funding the Superior Court on September 1st started a pilot Alternative Dispute Resolution Program in York and Knox Counties. By this program, specially selected and trained attorney mediators, working under the supervision and control of the court, will seek to resolve substantial civil cases in order to avoid the delays and costs of full pretrial and trial proceedings. This program results from a study sponsored by the Maine State Bar Association, which was headed last year by your colleague, Representative Francis Marsano.

3. A grant from the Maine Bar Foundation has provided the Superior Court with a juror orientation video. This video, running about 13 minutes, is being shown to jurors to supplement the preliminary instructions given by the presiding justice. It saves time for the justice and it assures uniformity in the basic instruction. The video program gives a good view of how a case proceeds in court. We have copies available to lend to civic organizations and schools. We are studying the possible use of similar videos for instructions for the grand jury and for basic information on arraignments in the District Court.

As of last July 1, the Legislature increased the funds for paying court-appointed counsel for indigent criminal defendants, thus alleviating a serious problem, particularly in rural counties. As I earlier noted, we have had a constitutional obligation to provide

defense counsel to indigent defendants on their request. The Supreme Judicial Court is issuing fee schedules reflecting the increased funding. I point out that the fees still fall short of the full "market value" of the services rendered. The lawyers of Maine have always done a fine job of discharging their professional responsibility to help the courts in providing representation to the indigent. They cannot, however, be expected to carry the full financial load. I congratulate the Legislature for recognizing and addressing the past problem of underfunding of indigent criminal defense.

In the last year, with your help, we continued to upgrade or replace overcrowded and inefficient court facilities. The District Courts in Bridgton and Calais are moving into new quarters, and the grossly inadequate Kittery District Court facility has been replaced by a new court building adjacent to Turnpike Exit 1 in York. With the opening of the new Bridgton District Court by mid-March, all 49 trial court locations, with the sole exception of Presque Isle, are fully accessible to handicapped persons - and a new Presque Isle District Court is right now in the planning stage. Thus, with your support we have nearly finished the handicapped-access program started in 1985. We also have made good progress in planning a new District Court building to serve the fast-growing Bath-Brunswick area. Chief Judge Devine and I have given top priority to that facility, which we expect will be located at the West Bath Exit from U.S. Route 1.

One event in 1988 was of particular long-term significance for housing the courts of this state. Last summer the legislatively created Maine Court Facilities Authority became operational under the chairmanship of Colin Hampton, former President of UNUM Corporation. One big advantage of using the Authority for financing court buildings by revenue bonds is that the State will own the facilities after 20 years rather than paying rent forever. The Authority has already raised the moneys for a portion of the addition to the Cumberland County Courthouse. Groundbreaking on that project has been delayed by the fact the bids came in substantially above the architect's estimates, but I am confident that redesign and rebidding will permit us to break ground this year on that urgently needed facility.

In further regard to court facilities, you last year created and funded the Supreme Judicial Court Plan and Design Commission. That Commission under the chairmanship of your colleague Representative Ruth Foster is now engaged in the second phase of the planning necessary to bring the Supreme Judicial Court to Augusta, to join the other two branches of State Government. I again remind you that Article IX, section 16 of the Maine Constitution reads: "Augusta is hereby declared to be the seat of government of this state."

In the last year we have made steady progress on the very large and the very difficult job of computerizing the trial courts. All 32 District Court locations now have their criminal cases and traffic infractions on computer, and work is under way to program and install computers to handle the criminal cases at the 17 Superior Court locations across the state. All of us, including our highly competent computer officer, Ben Crites, wish that computerization could be completed faster. It's a very big job. It is made so by the location of our 49 trial courts all across the state and by the complexity of court operations. But I can say with confidence that our computer system is of high quality. We are getting the most for our dollar. We are also fully supporting the work of the commission to computerize criminal history records that is chaired by Senator Joseph Brannigan. The proposed computer system will interconnect the courts with the State Bureau of Identification, the Motor Vehicles Division, and law enforcement agencies at all levels. The Senator for some reason calls it the "MCJUSTIS Program."

In concluding this "Review of the Year," I proudly report that the joint Annual Meeting of the National Conferences of Chief Justices and of State Court Administrators, held at the Samoset at Rockport the first week of August, was a huge success. The midsummer beauty of the Maine coast drew the largest gathering of top state court officials ever to be assembled anywhere. The Maine State Bar Association sponsored an opening reception for our guests. No public appropriation was required to bring these major national conferences to Maine. The same is true of the American Bar Association Appellate Judges Seminar that drew many judges from all over the country to Portland in late September.

I now want to discuss with you where the courts of Maine find themselves today and where they should be going - I want to discuss some of the problems and needs of the Maine courts.

The number one need of the Maine courts right now is for additional personnel in the clerks' offices of our 49 different trial court locations. I hope you will give favorable consideration to our request to add 50 new people in our clerks' offices in three steps over the next year and a half. We have kept our request to a bare minimum. The total number 50 may seem large at first blush; but, remember, these new people will be assigned according to need across the State at 49 different locations.

This urgent need for help in our clerks' offices is driven by the dramatic increase in trial court caseloads. Each year now, starting with 1985, I have reported from this podium that a record number of cases has been filed in the courts of Maine. 1988 was no different, with more than 340,000 cases filed statewide.

Let me put that 340,000 figure in perspective. It took our courts from statehood in 1820 to 1977 - over one hundred and fifty years - to reach 200,000 cases annually. Then up to 1984 our trial courts had reached less than 240,000 cases, an average yearly increase of about 5,000 cases per year. In adding more than 100,000 cases in the last four years, we have witnessed a five-fold jump in the annual growth rate of our caseload.

There are many reasons for this explosion in the use of the courts of Maine. The reasons include, I believe, accelerated economic activity; increased criminal law enforcement; heightened concern of our children and others needing protection against neglect or sexual or other abuse; increased land use regulation in the face of an expanded rate of real estate development; and growing highway traffic.

The increase of 100,000 cases in only four years can be put in perspective another way. In terms of workload, it is as if we added in these last four years four new courts of equal size to the four District Courts now operating in Biddeford, Lewiston, Augusta, and Bangor - while maintaining business as usual in those communities and elsewhere across the State! If we had duplicated those four courts, we would have needed 8 new courtrooms, about 8 additional judges, and 50 additional clerks, not to mention mediation rooms, waiting areas, and so on. In fact, in the last four years we have added only two new District Court judges and virtually no additional clerks.

The tremendous workload thrown upon the people in our clerks' offices is quantified dramatically in another way. This fiscal year our clerks will collect in cash and checks over \$21 million at 49 different court locations. Those collections are almost double the \$11.2 million collected only four years ago. As an aside, I would note that the \$21 million collected in fines and fees and turned over to the State Treasury will this year as usual cover about 75 percent of all the state costs of running the courts.

I must point out that it is not only increased numbers of cases and increased dollars to be collected that multiplies work for our clerks. Increased workload also comes along with every one of the valuable innovative programs we have instituted for improving the courts' service to the public. Mandatory mediation for divorce, the CASA program, the medical malpractice screening panels, the Superior Court's expedited caseflow system, and so on - every one of these commendable programs places additional administrative and scheduling burdens on our clerks. Better service to the public comes only at the price of more work for the clerks' offices.

We are most fortunate to have highly dedicated and competent court clerks - and I mean all those who work in the offices of the clerks of court. They are the front-line soldiers of the Judicial Department, and they are "good soldiers." Every day they undertake a variety of roles and responsibilities in operating the courts and in dealing with the public that rivals Superman and Superwoman. I am proud of the way they have responded to the deluge of new cases in the past four years, but we cannot expect them to continue to carry their steadily increasing load without help. Getting for our hard-pressed court clerks the additional help they urgently need I consider simply a matter of common fairness to them.

For all these reasons I urgently request 50 additional clerical personnel over the next year and a half. I repeat, our request is the minimum to meet our needs. It is modest in light of our exploding caseloads and considering the size of our statewide operations at 49 different trial court locations.

We are also asking for two additional judges for the District Court and two for the Superior Court. The increased number of cases in our trial courts is not the only reason for needing more judges. Cases are becoming more complex and are taking longer to try. For example, trials of several hours and even days have become commonplace in the District Court - for example, in divorce and parental rights termination cases. Maine has only 49 active judges, putting it at the bottom of the scale in number of judges per 100,000 population when compared with either the other New England states or with other rural states across the country.

In this coming year we will continue to work on our needs for more adequate court facilities at several locations around the state. We hope very much to see groundbreaking this year for the new District Court facilities I have already mentioned at Bath-Brunswick and at Presque Isle. We also are studying facilities problems in the District Courts in Dover-Foxcroft and Machias. Capital funds to meet those needs we propose to raise through the Maine Court Facilities Authority.

We are also giving special study to the facilities needs of both the District Court and the Superior Court in York County. All the courts there have experienced a particularly dramatic increase in caseload. The Biddeford District Court is simply running out of room to perform its basic functions. The Superior Court in Alfred has only one adequate jury courtroom and could use at least two more. I hope my report next year will be able to suggest a solution to the York County facilities problem. The Superior Court also has serious space problems in Androscoggin and Kennebec, as well as most other counties. We will be addressing these needs on a priority basis.

You have before you the final report of the Joint Select Committee on Corrections now chaired by your colleagues, Senator Beverly Bustin and Representative Rita Melendy. L.D. 44, proposed by the Committee, would create a system for enhanced review of criminal sentences by the Law Court. My colleague Justice Wathen, after studying the long-time experience in Great Britain with sentence appeals, has suggested in a recent Maine Law Review article¹ that a thorough review of sentences by the Law Court with written opinions could develop sentencing standards - or guidelines, if you like through a case-by-case evolutionary process. These standards would of course be controlled by the maximums or any minimums set by the statutes for particular crimes. The guidelines thus developed by case law could prove a helpful tool for trial judges in discharging their difficult sentencing responsibility. They also could assist in reducing sentencing disparity and in realizing greater fairness in the system. The enhanced sentence review would place an additional burden on the Law Court, but that burden is one my colleagues and I are prepared to assume and that on balance we believe is worthwhile to make a place for.

Three years ago the Legislature created the Maine Commission to Commemorate the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution. That Commission, under the leadership originally of former University of Maine President Arthur M. Johnson and now of attorney Hugh Calkins of Dover-Foxcroft, has done, and continues to do, a splendid job of reminding us of our constitutional heritage. The Commission is distributing to each of you today a copy of the volume entitled "A Rising Sun," collecting speeches made under its auspices. I am please to recognize its editor, Professor Neal W. Allen, in the gallery. Continuing in this bicentennial year 1989, our Nation commemorates the convening of the First Congress and the inauguration of the first President of the United States. In September we should take special note of two events 200 years ago that carry great significance for all state courts, including the Maine courts. On September 24, 1789, Congress enacted the Judiciary Act of 1789 setting up the federal court system. The very next day. Congress voted to submit the Bill of Rights to the States for ratification. Every working day the courts of Maine are called upon to apply and enforce the guarantees of individual rights contained in the Federal Bill of Rights - freedom of speech and religion, and protection against unreasonable searches and seizures, for example. Without courts to enforce the guarantees of the Bill of Rights - and the similar provisions of our Maine Constitution - those noble declarations would remain only aspirational and hortatory.

The significance for state courts of the Judiciary Act of 1789 and its progeny lies in what those federal statutes do not authorize the federal courts to do. The big reservoir of judicial power - as well as responsibility - remains with the States and the state courts. Over 95% of all litigation takes place in the state courts. Under Article III of the U.S. Constitution and the Judiciary Act of 1789 and its progeny, federal court are specialized courts of limited jurisdiction. In general, they can hear only civil cases involving questions of federal law or citizens of different states and criminal prosecutions for specific federal crimes. The bicentennial of the federal court system teaches us anew one clear lesson: However much federal law intrudes more and more into American life, the state courts still carry most of the burden for resolving disputes between citizens and between citizens and their governments, even to the extent of applying and enforcing much of the federal civil law. State courts have as their

standard fodder <u>civil</u> cases running the whole gamut from contract and tort disputes, workers' compensation appeals, land use and other economic regulation, divorce and other family and inheritance matters, and so on; and <u>criminal</u> prosecutions ranging from murder to burglary to consumer fraud.

The quality of justice in this country depends overwhelmingly on the quality of our state courts. You in the Maine Legislature and we who work in the Maine courts are constantly faced with the joint challenge of maintaining and enhancing the quality of our courts. We have together accomplished much in recent years in steadily improving the administration of justice in our state. On behalf of all of us in the Third Branch, I renew our pledge to continue to work closely with you in discharging our joint responsibilities for the courts of Maine.

FISCAL INFORMATION

The Judicial Department operates from the State general funds which are appropriated by the Legislature. It also administers several grants from public sources. The expenditure and revenue data are presented for the State fiscal year ended June 30, 1989.

Expenditures

Judicial Department expenditures for FY'89 totaled \$27,598,373, an increase of 14.2% over the previous year. The following is a summary of expenditures by Department subdivision:

- Court Officers: Payments to county sheriffs to provide security in Superior Court and payments to county sheriffs and municipal police departments to serve as court complaint officers in District Court.
- Medical Services: Psychiatric examinations and testimony under the following circumstances: involuntary hospitalization of mentally ill and mentally retarded individuals; periodic review of mentally ill individuals and re-certification of mentally retarded individuals; indigent criminal defendants, and any other criminal defendants upon the order of the judge, in Superior Court and District Court cases.
 - Witness Fees: Payments to municipal police departments, county sheriffs, state police and the State Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife for their officers to serve as witnesses for the prosecution in District Court cases, and for indigent defendants in Superior Court and District Court cases, and to private citizens serving as witnesses in any case.
 - Ballifts: Payments to county sheriffs and municipal police departments to provide security in the District Court.
- Transcript Costs: Transcript costs for indigent defendants, and for judicial review in sentencing.

Investigators: Investigators in indigent defense cases.

- Other: Data processing, casual labor, complaint justices, research services, analysis and lab services, out of state travel, utilities, rent and repairs to equipment, subscriptions, dues, janitorial services, clothing, miscellaneous and minor equipment, training, and disability compensation.
- ** Does not include special projects administered with federal monies.

Revenue

Judicial Department gross revenue for FY'89 totaled \$20,557,230. Table F-3 below identifies a source breakdown of that revenue for FY'82 through FY'89. Revenue for Superior Court locations is shown on Table F-4. for the District Court locations, including the Administrative Court, is shown on Table F-5.

All funds collected by the Judicial Department, except project grants, go into the State general fund. A relatively small proportion of these funds consists of fines for specific violations of law which are dedicated to certain agencies. A comparative summary of dedicated fines by fiscal year is also shown below.

DISTRICT COURT BUILDING FUND

Pursuant to 4 MRSA §163(3), \$3,000 per month is transferred from the District Court appropriations to the District Court Building Fund. This fund is "to be used solely for the building, remodeling and furnishing of quarters for the District Court.....". Monies in this fund are carried from year to year.

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The balance forward from fiscal year 1988 was \$86,543. The addition of \$36,000 from the appropriation for fiscal year 1987 brought the total available fund to \$122,543. Of this amount, \$113,998 was spent during the year to purchase land rights in the Bath/Brunswick area, as well as for renovations in the Bath, Biddeford, Bridgton, Dover-Foxcroft, Lewiston, Machias, Pontiand, Presque Isle, Springvale, and York court locations, leaving a year-end balance of \$8,545.

COURT_STRUCTURE

<u>History</u>

Until separation in 1820, Maine was a part of Massachusetts and therefore included in the Massachusetts court system. However, in 1820, Article VI, Section I of the new Maine Constitution established the judicial branch of government stating: "The judicial power of the State shall be vested in a Supreme Judicial Court, and such other courts as the Legislature shall from time to time establish". From the start of statehood, the Supreme Judicial Court was both a trial court and an appellate court or "Law Court". The new State of Maine also adopted the same lower court structure as existed in Massachusetts, and the court system remained unchanged until 1852. The Court Reorganization Act of 1852 increased the jurisdiction of the Supreme Judicial Court to encompass virtually every type of case, increased the number of justices and authorized the justices to travel in circuits. The Probate Courts were created in 1820 as county-based courts and have remained so to date.

The next major change in the system came in 1929, when the Legislature created the statewide Superior Court to relieve the overburdened Supreme Judicial Court. Meanwhile, the lower courts continued to operate much as they always had until 1961 when the municipal courts and the trial justices system were abolished and the new District Court created. The most recent change to the Maine Judicial System occurred in 1978 with the addition of the Administrative Court.

Supreme Judicial Court (Law Court)

The Supreme Judicial Court is the governing body of the Judicial Department and, sitting as the Law Court, it is the court of final appeal. The Law Court hears appeals of civil and criminal cases from the Superior Court; appeals from final judgments, orders and decrees of the Probate Court; appeals of decisions of the Public Utilities Commission and the Workers Compensation Commission's Appellate Division; appeals from the District Court in parental rights termination and foreclosure cases; interlocutory criminal appeals from the District and Superior Courts; and appeals of decisions of a single justice of the Supreme Judicial Court. A justice of the Supreme Judicial Court has jurisdiction to hear, with his consent, non-jury civil actions, except divorce or annulment of marriage, and can be assigned by the chief justice to sit in the Superior Court to hear cases of any type, including post-conviction matters and jury trials. In addition, the Supreme Judicial Court defines and regulates the practice of law and the conduct of attorneys in Maine by the promulgation of the Maine Bar Rules, published in the annual Maine Rules of Court. It is also the ultimate authority for admitting lawyers to the bar, and for administering lawyer discipline including disbarment. The justices of the Supreme Judicial Court make decisions regarding legislative apportionment and render advisory opinions concerning important questions of law on solemn occasions when requested by the governor. Senate or House of Representatives. Three members of the Supreme Judicial Court, appointed by the chief justice, serve as the Appellate Division for the review of criminal sentences of one year or more.

By statute, the chief justice is head of the Judicial Department, and the Supreme Judicial Court has general administrative and supervisory authority over the Judicial Department.

The Supreme Judicial Court has seven members: the chief justice and six associate justices. The justices are appointed by the governor for seven-year terms, with the consent of the Legislature. The court determines the number, time and place of its terms depending on the volume of cases. The court sits in Portland four times a year and in Bangor twice a year. Each term runs from two to three weeks and handles from 50 to 60 cases.

Upon retirement, a Supreme Judicial Court justice may be appointed an active retired justice by the governor for a sevenyear term, with the consent of the Legislature. On assignment by the chief justice, an active retired justice has the same authority as an active justice, and may sit in either the Supreme Judicial Court or the Superior Court. As of the end of Fiscal Year 1989. there were three active retired justices of the Supreme Judicial Court.

Superior Court

The Superior Court was created by the Legislature in 1929 as Maine's trial court of general jurisdiction. The court has original jurisdiction over all matters (either exclusively or concurrently with other courts) that are not within the exclusive jurisdiction of the District Court. This is the only court in which civil and criminal jury trials are held. In addition, justices of this court hear appeals on questions of law from the District Court and from the Administrative Court.

There are 16 justices of the Superior Court who hold sessions of the Court in each of the 16 counties. The justices are appointed by the governor for seven-year terms, with the consent of the Legislature. A single justice is designated by the chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court to serve as the chief justice of the Superior Court.

Upon retirement, a Superior Court Justice may be appointed an active retired justice by the governor for a seven-year term, with the consent of the Legislature. On assignment by the Superior Court chief justice, an active retired justice has the same authority as an active justice. As of the end of Fiscal Year 1989, there were two active retired justices of the Superior Court.

District Court

The District Court was created by the Legislature in 1961 as Maine's court of limited jurisdiction. The court has original jurisdiction in non-felony criminal cases, traffic infractions and civil violations, can accept guilty pleas in felony cases and conducts probable cause hearings in felony cases. The court has concurrent jurisdiction with the Superior Court in divorce, nonequitable civil cases involving not more than \$30,000, and also may grant equitable relief in cases of unfair trade practices and in cases involving local land use violations. In practice, the District Court hears virtually all child abuse and neglect cases, termination of parental rights cases, protection from abuse cases and cases involving local land use violations. The District Court is the small claims court (for cases involving not more than \$1400) and the juvenile court. In addition, the court hears mental health, forcible entry and detainer, quiet title and foreclosure cases. It is the only court available for the enforcement of money judgments.

There are 24 judges in the District Court; the chief judge, who is designated by the chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, 9 judges-at-large who serve throughout the state, and 15 resident judges (including the chief judge) who sit principally within the districts where they live. The judges are appointed by the governor for seven-year terms, with the consent of the Legislature. On assignment by the chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, District Court judges may also sit in the Superior Court. Upon retirement, a District Court judge may be appointed an active retired judge by the governor for a seven-year term, with the consent of the Legislature. On assignment by the chief judge, an active retired judge has the same authority as an active judge. As of the end of Fiscal Year 1989, there were eight active retired judges of the District Court.

Administrative Court

The Administrative Court was created by the Legislature in 1973 and became a part of the Judicial Department in 1978. Prior thereto, the Administrative Court had jurisdiction over suspension and revocation of licenses issued by a specific list of executive agencies. Effective July 1, 1978, the Legislature substantially expanded the jurisdiction of the Administrative Court. Other than in emergency situations, the Administrative Court was granted exclusive jurisdiction upon complaint of an agency (or, if the licensing agency fails or refuses to act within a reasonable time, upon complaint of the Attorney General), to revoke or suspend licenses issued by the agency, and original jurisdiction upon complaint of a licensing agency to determine whether renewal or issuance of a license of that agency may be refused. Effective in 1983, the Administrative Court also was granted exclusive jurisdiction to hear appeals from disciplinary decisions of the Real Estate Commission.

There are two judges of the Administrative Court; the Administrative Court judge and the Associate Administrative Court judge. The judges must be lawyers and are appointed by the governor for seven-year terms, with the consent of the Legislature. On assignment by the chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, Administrative Court judges regularly sit in the District Court and in the Superior Court, almost exclusively in Portland.

Judicial Scheduling

In the District Court, 15 resident judges serve in the one of thirteen districts to which they are appointed by the governor, although occasionally they may assist in other districts in emergency instances. There are nine at-large judges who are scheduled by the deputy chief judge on a monthly basis. Seven District Court locations require the services of an at-large judge every month, leaving only one judge available to cover special assignments and vacancies due to illness, vacations, and educational conferences, and to assist courts experiencing particular backlog problems.

The chief justice of the Superior Court assigns Superior Court justices to serve throughout the state, although justices serve primarily in a few courts close to their homes for most of the year. On a monthly or bi-monthly basis, the court administrators, in coordination with justices, clerks and attorneys, prepare schedules detailing the daily work of justices and court reporters, for approval by the chief justice.

The Supreme Judicial Court has seven members: the chief justice and six associate justices. The justices are appointed by the governor for seven-year terms, with the consent of the Legislature. The court determines the number, time and place of its terms depending on the volume of cases. The court sits in Portland four times a year and in Bangor twice a year. Each term runs from two to three weeks and handles from 50 to 60 cases.

Use of Active Retired Justices and Judges

Upon retirement, any justice of the Supreme Judicial Court or Superior Court, or any judge of the District Court or Administrative Court, may be appointed by the governor to active retired status. These members of the judiciary render invaluable service by their availability to serve throughout the state assisting overburdened courts. During Fiscal Year '89, three active retired Supreme Judicial Court justices, two active retired Superior Court justices, and nine active retired District Court judges served a total of 1,113 days, equivalent to the work of nearly five full-time judges.

Expenditures for days served in FY'89 totaled \$101,031 (\$84,330 per diem at \$75 per day and \$45 per half day; and \$16,701 in other expenses such as mileage, lodging and meals.) These expenditures yielded an average cost of \$90.73 per day of service, or \$21,594 per annum per full time equivalent judge.

STATE COURT CASELOAD SUMMARY

Caseloads throughout Maine's state system have undergone significant changes during the past several years. There are characteristic differences in the 1980's court caseload compared to that of the 1970's, but these changes are difficult to quantify. For instance, statistics cannot demonstrate the degree to which civil litigation has become increasingly complex, and it is often impossible to document the actual impact of new legislation each year. Nonetheless, the statistics summarized on the following page and detailed in the appendices to this report should provide a basic understanding of state court caseload.

In the Law Court, 1988 filings decreased by -6.5% compared to calendar year 1987. There were 528 cases filed and 507 cases disposed of in calendar year 1988. In cases for which opinions were written, the average time from notice of appeal to final disposition by the Law Court was nine months. The Court wrote 142 opinions in criminal cases and 204 opinions in civil cases. It took an average of 58 days for a case to proceed from oral argument to disposition, considerably less than the time required in 1980.

The Superior Court is the state's court of general jurisdiction. There were 17,905 cases filed in FY'89, of which 6,020 (33%) were civil cases. The average civil case required 453 days to reach disposition, a 11.4% decrease from 1987. Of the 5,671 civil dispositions during FY'89, almost one-half were dismissed upon agreement of the parties. The 229 civil jury trials accounted for 4.0% of all dispositions.

The number of criminal filings in the Superior Court rose to an all-time high of 11,885 in FY'89, a 1.7% increase over the record previously set in 1987. Although dispositions rose by 1.3%, the 11,565 dispositions still fell short of incoming filings, resulting in a pending caseload of over 7,507 cases. It should be noted, however, that 28% of all pending criminal cases are pending as a result of outstanding warrants of arrest. One-half of all criminal case filings were transfers from the District Court involving Class D and Class E proceedings. Cases involving murder, Class A, Class B and Class C crimes (formerly classified as felonies) constituted 30% of the state's criminal caseload. A total of 79% of all dispositions were convictions, while dismissals by either the court or the District Attorney accounted for 27%. Of the 6,598 convictions, 92% were by a plea of guilty. The 527 criminal jury trials accounted for 4% of all criminal dispositions.

The state's major court of limited jurisdiction is the District Court. The Court has witnessed a large increase in caseload during the past year, reaching an all-time high of 325,560 filings in FY'89, nearly an 11% increase over calendar year 1987. Civil violations and traffic infractions, the case category responsible for 45% of the Court's caseload, totaled 149,359, 8% more than the number filed in 1987.

The Administrative Court has jurisdiction over the suspension and revocation of administrative agency licenses. Almost all of this Court's caseload originates from the Bureau of Liquor Enforcement. In FY'89, there was a total of 357 filings in the Administrative Court, a 4.7% increase over the level reported in 1987.



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COURT ADMINISTRATION

The administrative structure of the Maine Judicial Department is similar to that of a corporation. The Supreme Judicial Court serves as the Department's "board of directors" and by statute has general administrative and supervisory authority over the Department. This authority is exercised by promulgating rules, issuing administrative orders, establishing policies and procedures, and generally advising the chief justice. The chief justice is designated as head of the Judicial Department and is assisted by the state court administrator. Each of the four operating courts has a single administrative head, responsible to the chief justice, who also heads the Law Court. The chief justice in the Superior Court and the chief judge in the District Court are each assisted by two court administrators. All three chiefs, together with the state court administrator, the trial court administrators, and some members of the Administrative Office of the Courts, meet at least every other month to address administrative and policy issues, although each court's chief meets with his respective administrators on a more frequent basis.

STATUTORY RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE COURTS

The Administrative Office of the Courts was created in 1975. The office is directed by the state court administrator who is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the chief justice. The Administrative Office staff is appointed by the state court administrator with the approval of the chief justice, and includes the following positions: Budget and Fiscal Officer, Policy and Analysis Officer, Employee Relations Officer, Court Computer Services Officer, Chief Court Security Officer, Public Information Officer, State Court Library Supervisor, Deputy Budget and Fiscal Officer, three Court programmer/analysts, Purchasing Manager/Accountant, two secretaries, and three accounting clerks.

The state court administrator's responsibilities are detailed in 4 M.R.S.A. §17, as follows:

I. Continuous survey and study. Carry on a continuous survey and study of the organization, operation, condition of business, practice and procedure of the Judicial Department and make recommendations to the Chief Justice concerning the number of judges and other judicial personnel required for the efficient administration of justice. Assist in long and short range planning;

2. Examine the status of dockets. Examine the status of dockets of all courts so as to determine cases and other judicial business that have been unduly delayed. From such reports, the administrator shall indicate which courts are in need of additional judicial personnel and make recommendations to the Chief Justice, to the Chief Justice of the Superior Court and to the Chief Judge of the District Court concerning the assignment or reassignment of personnel to courts that are in need of such personnel. The administrator shall also carry out the directives of the Chief Justice as to the assignment of personnel in these instances;

3. Investigate complaints. Investigate complaints with respect to the operation of the courts;

4. Examine statistical systems. Examine the statistical systems of the courts and make recommendations for a uniform system of judicial statistics. The administrator shall also collect and analyze statistical and other data relating to the business of the courts;

5. Prescribe uniform administrative and business methods, etc. Prescribe uniform administrative and business methods, systems, forms, docketing and records to be used in the Supreme Judicial Court, in the Superior Court and in the District Court;

6. Implement standards and policies set by the Chief Justice. Implement standards and policies set by the Chief Justice regarding hours of court, the assignment of term parts and justices;

7. Act as fiscal officer. Act as fiscal officer of the courts and in so doing:

a. Maintain fiscal controls and accounts of funds appropriated for the Judicial Department;

b. Prepare all requisitions for the payment of state moneys appropriated for the maintenance and operation of the Judicial Department;

c. Prepare budget estimates of state appropriations necessary for the maintenance and operation of the Judicial Department and make recommendations with respect thereto;

d. Collect statistical and other data and make reports to the Chief Justice, to the Chief Justice of the Superior Court and to the Chief Judge of the District Court relating to the expenditures of public moneys for the maintenance and operation of the Judicial Department;

e. Develop a uniform set of accounting and budgetary accounts for the Supreme Judicial Court, for the Superior Court and for the District Court and serve as auditor of the Judicial Department;

8. Examine arrangements for use and maintenance of court facilities. Examine the arrangements for the use and maintenance of court facilities and supervise the purchase, distribution, exchange and transfer of judicial equipment and supplies thereof;

9. Act as secretary. Act as secretary to the Judicial Conference;

10. Submit an annual report. Submit an annual report to the Chief Justice, Legislature and Governor of the activities and accomplishments of the office for the preceding calendar year;

II. Maintain Ilaison. Maintain liaison with executive and legislative branches and other public and private agencies whose activities impact the Judicial Department;

12. Prepare and plan clerical offices. Prepare and plan for the organization and operation of clerical offices serving the Superior Court and the District Court;

13. Implement preservice and Inservice educational and training programs. Develop and implement preservice and inservice educational and training programs for nonjudicial personnel of the Judicial Department;

14. Perform duties and attend other matters. Perform such other duties and attend to such other matters consistent with the powers delegated herein assigned to him by the Chief Justice and the Supreme Judicial Court; and,

Provide for court security. Plan and implement 15. arrangements for safe and secure court premises to ensure the orderly conduct of judicial proceedings. This includes the authority to contract for the services of gualified deputy sheriffs as needed on a per diem basis to perform court security-related functions and services. "Qualified deputy sheriffs" means those individuals who hold valid certification as law enforcement officers, as defined by the Maine Criminal Justice Academy, pursuant to Title 25, chapter 341, to include successful completion of such additional training in court security as provided by the academy. When under such contract and then only for the assignment specifically contracted for, the gualified deputy sheriffs shall have the same duties and powers throughout the counties of the State as sheriffs have in their respective counties. The persons performing such contractual services shall not be considered employees of the State for any purpose. They shall be paid a reasonable per diem fee plus reimbursement of their actual, necessary and reasonable expenses incurred in the performance of their duties, consistent with policies established by the State Court Administrator.

ACTIVITIES AND PROJECTS JANUARY 1988 - JUNE 30, 1989

Court Facilities

Leased Court Facilities

A new District Court leased facility in Calais was completed and the court opened in January, 1988; likewise, a new District Court leased facility in Bridgton, part of a new municipal building project, opened in early 1988.

A new leased facility for the Southern Division of the Tenth District Court in York also opened in the early months of 1988.

Maine Court Facility Authority Projects

The Maine Court Facility Authority became operational on February 29, 1988 when an organizational meeting was held in Augusta. Legislation to establish the Authority was enacted in 1987. The purpose of the Authority is to raise funds to finance the construction, renovation and alteration of courthouses for use by the state courts. Acting as an instrumentality of the state, the MCFA eventually turns title of properties it finances over to the State of Maine but in any event, provides an alternative method of constructing courthouses in addition to private developer or municipal/county government involvement.

Bids on the Cumberland County courthouse addition, a joint project financed both by a Cumberland County bond issue and a \$6.5 million MCFA bond issue, came in substantially above construction estimates when opened on November 22, 1988. A substantial redesign of the project ensued which was about to be advertised for new bids as the report period came to a close.

A second bond issue, also contemplated to be \$6.5 million, was authorized by the 114th Legislature and signed by the Governor on June 30, 1989. The projects involve new courthouses in West Bath and Presque Isle and other projects in Dover-Foxcroft, Machias and York Counties.

Site selection for the new Presque Isle District Court was completed early in 1988 in contemplation of the bond issue. A site for a District Court facility in West Bath, to accommodate both the Eastern Cumberland Division (Brunswick) and the Sagadahoc Division (Bath) of the Sixth District Court, underwent lengthy and detailed review by the West Bath zoning board before eventually being approved.

Handicapped Access

All Superior Court facilities are located in handicapped accessible courthouses with the completion in 1988 of renovations in Kennebec County and Washington County.

New District Court facilities Bridgton and Calais nearing completion are fully handicapped accessible, unlike the facilities they replace. Minor renovations to court facilities at Bar Harbor and Machias achieved handicap accessibility at these locations.

Presque Isle's District Court must be relocated to become handicap accessible. A proposed new municipal complex to accommodate the District Court and other offices was turned down at a municipal referendum by local voters there in November 1988. As noted above, District Court officials now contemplate construction by a MCFA bond issue of a state-owned facility as the most desirable alternative. Planning of such a facility got underway in 1988.

Proposed Supreme Judicial Court Facility in Augusta

Chapter 107, Resolves of 1987, was passed by the 113th Legislature and approved by the Governor on April 28, 1988. It provided that "at the earliest possible time a building of prestige and dignity" shall be constructed in Augusta for the Supreme Judicial Court and the Administrative Office of the Courts. The Resolve authorized work on a project program by a nationally recognized planner to begin as soon as possible for the purpose of advising the 114th Legislature of a cost estimate for such a facility. The Resolve established a 15-member Supreme Judicial Court Plan and Design Commission to oversee the planning work. The Commission held its first meeting on September 21, 1988.

In the Fall of 1988, the Commission advertised its interest in receiving proposals from court facility planning authorities. Interviews with the leading candidates were held in January, 1989. The firm Space Management, Inc., of Seattle, Washington was selected. The principal consultant was in the process of preparing a preliminary report to the Commission as Fiscal Year 1989 came to a close.

Court Computerization

There has been significant progress in the automation of trial court case processing over the past 18 months. Since January 1, 1988, criminal and traffic case processing in all District Court locations statewide has been automated, and some programming was completed to prepare for the eventual automation of the Superior Court criminal court caseload. In addition, two new positions were funded with federal funds under the Justice Assistance Act to augment the staff of four State funded positions.

Juror Orlentation Project

During 1987, the Administrative Office of the Courts, on behalf of the Superior Court, applied to the Maine Bar Foundation for a grant to develop a videotaped juror orientation presentation. A grant was awarded in the fall, and by the end of the year, plans were underway to hire a video consultant to develop such a program.

After work during the summer of 1988, the 13-minute videotape entitled "Deciding Right or Wrong: Maine's Jury System" was unveiled at the Judicial Conference in September and was formally announced to the public at a press conference shortly thereafter. The program is shown to jurors on their first day of service to orient them to the court system and address some of their concerns about jury service. The videotapes are available for sale, and a lending library is operated through the office of a Cumberland Superior Court secretary. By June 1989, all Superior Court locations had been equipped with video equipment on which to show the program.

Indigency Screening Project

Legislation creating the Indigency Screening Project was enacted in 1987 during the first regular session of the 113th Legislature (34 MRSA § 5405), effective September 29, 1987. Under the auspices of the Department of Corrections' Division of Probation and Parole, the legislation provided that two indigency screening units be established as pilot programs to operate for a two-year period, an advisory committee be appointed, and the Supreme Judicial Court promulgate appropriate guidelines.

The advisory committee met frequently throughout the fall to set up the program. The Committee established Cumberland County and York County as the pilot sites and developed standardized forms and guidelines for program operation. The Division of Probation and Parole assigned two of its probation officers to serve as the project's full-time indigency investigators. By July 1988, the two investigators were covering all of the District Court and Superior Court locations in York and Cumberland counties.

Personnel/Employee Relations

From February through June, 1989, the Judicial Department bargaining team met with the employee's collective bargaining team and their MSEA staff representatives, representing Department employees in the three bargaining units - Administrative, Professional and Supervisory Services. These negotiations concluded successfully in two-year agreements (all expiring on June 30, 1991) providing terms and conditions similar to those in the Executive branch and other public sector settlements of that period.

During the 18 months from 1/1/89 through 6/30/89, two new Supreme Court justices were appointed, replacing two who retired during that same period. Four District Court judges were appointed replacing four who retired (three of whom were appointed to active retired judgeships) and one active retired judge, the Hon. Roland Poulin, passed away on April 19, 1989.

Judicial Education

The annual Judicial Conference was held September 18-20, 1988 at Sugarloaf U.S.A. In addition to the collegial meetings held by the justices/judges, subjects such as sanctions and contempt, interviewing children, and the Bail Reform Act were covered in depth through forums including guest speakers and judicial panel members. At the opening of the conference, Governor John R. McKernan, Jr. addressed the judiciary.

One Supreme Judicial Court justice, one Superior Court justice and five District Court judges attended the National Judicial College in Nevada. Other members of the judiciary attended various professional and specialty programs throughout the year.

County Law Libraries

Legislation enacted in 1981 (4 M.R.S.A. sec. 191 et seq.) regionalized the 18 law libraries located in Maine's country courthouses and created the State Court Library Committee with seven members appointed by the chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court. The libraries are assigned to one of four tiers (based on collection size and potential use), and the state court library supervisor is charged with the general supervision of their professional functions.

Visits to each library included collection appraisals; meetings with local library committees on a variety of concerns; and working with those clerks of court and judicial secretaries responsible for the day to day operation of the libraries.

The beginning of a basic treatise collection for the smaller libraries and the purchase of several major publications for the larger ones was made possible this year by a generous grant from the Maine Bar Foundation.

The conversion of briefs submitted to the Supreme Judicial Court to microfiche is an on-going project which has been extended to records as well. Fiche copies of the briefs are distributed to Cleaves

Law Library (Portland), Penobscot County Law Library (Bangor), the Donald L. Garbracht Law Library at the University of Maine School of Law and the Maine State Law and Legislative Library (Augusta). Masters are on file at the Administrative Office of the Courts.

Maine Hosts National Conferences of State Chief Justices and State Court Administrators

Several staff members of the Administrative Office of the Courts handled local arrangements for the 1988 National Conferences of State Chief Justices and State Court Administrators, held jointly at the Samoset Resort at Rockport, July 31st through August 4, 1988. No taxpayer funds subsidized the event. The meeting featured a keynote address by the Chief Justice of the United States, William Reinquest, and an opening ceremony involving Governor John R. McKernan, Jr., Chief Justice Vincent L. McKusick and State Court Administrator Dana R. Baggett.

During the Conference of Chief Justices, Maine's own Chief Justice, Vincent L. McKusick, was elected first vice president, which will lead to his becoming president of the national organization in 1990.

Maine Commission to Commemorate the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution

In 1987, the Legislature extended the life of the Maine Commission to Commemorate the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution to encompass the full 5 years of the Bicentennial celebration, which ends following the celebration in 1991 of the Bicentennial of the Bill of Rights. The celebration of the Bicentennial of the Constitution itself culminated in the publication by the Commission of the book <u>A</u> <u>Rising Sun</u>, a collection of the addresses given by noted jurists and public figures at Commission sponsored events.

The Commission continued its emphasis on educational projects and events. It provided the initial grant to launch a statewide law-related education program and has continued to support the program, now called Maine LREsources, with which it works closely on educational projects for schools. The Commission supported a statewide Jefferson Meeting held at the University of Maine at Orono and organized by the Orono and University Bicentennial Committees. The Commission participated in a ceremony commemorating the 200th anniversary of the Judiciary Act of 1789, for which it prepared a brief history of the Act and of the Federal District Court for the District of Maine. The Commission obtained from the National Archives a poster display on the Judiciary Act and the federal courts, which it made available for general distribution through Exchange Programs of Maine. It created a set of curriculum materials on the federal and state court systems for distribution to teachers, for use independently or in conjunction with a visit to the federal District Court. Planning began for a dramatization in the summer of 1990 of the trial of Thomas Bird, and the Commission began discussions and planning for activities it will undertake during the Bill of Rights year.

Lealslative Highlights

<u>Overview</u>: During the legislative sessions, the Judicial Department Legislation Committee met regularly and continued to monitor legislation of interest to the courts. Administrative Office of the Courts' staff reviewed all proposed legislation and prepared fiscal and programmatic impact statements. The following listing portrays the legislation enacted in both 1988 and 1989 which is deemed to have a significant impact on the Judicial Department.

Second Regular Session of the 113th Maine Legislature (1988)

The chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court may assign justices and active retired justices of the Superior Court to sit temporarily in District Court if certain conditions are met (P.L. 1987, ch. 577).

Clerks of court are now required to deliver copies of docket entries, along with other previously required information, to the Department of Corrections within 10 days (P.L. 1987, ch. 616).

"An Act to Reform Provisions of the Civil Justice System" included numerous revisions to the entry of final judgment process as well as the extension of immunity to persons engaged in a wide variety of peer review activities. It also modified the method of calculating interest on judgments (P.L. 1987, ch. 646).

Revision of certain procedures in District Court judicial administration, including the handling of installment payments on fines and how a creditor may obtain a civil order of arrest (P.L. 1987, ch. 708).

Establishment, in the District Court, of new commitment (to treatment programs) proceedings for persons deemed to be victims of substance abuse (P.L. 1987, ch. 735).

Recodification of the laws of municipalities and counties (P.L. 1987, ch. 737).

Requirement that a special license be required for the transportation of hazardous materials. Violations may be either Class D or Class E crimes, with all fines accruing to the Maine Hazardous Waste Fund (P.L. 1987, ch. 750).

Enactment of the new Maine Bail Code (P.L. 1987, ch. 758).

Allowance that a newly confirmed Superior Court justice, upon assignment by the chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, to sit in the District Court in order to finish any cases which she/he had presided over as a judge of the District Court (P.L. 1987, ch. 769).

Requirement that judges, at the time of sentencing for "Operating Under the Influence", provide the defendant with written instructions prepared by the Division of Driver Education Evaluation (P.L. 1987, ch. 773).

Authorization for the court security program and establishment of the confidentiality of court security files (P.L. 1987, ch.776).

Authorization for forfeiture of motor vehicles in certain "Operating Under the Influence" cases, and reduction (to .08) in the bloodalcohol level (P.L. 1987, ch. 791).

Revision of certain sentencing provisions. Establishes the maximum sentence for Class A crime at 40 years. Allows for the consideration

of the impact of automatic "good" time deductions when imposing sentences (P.L. 1987, ch. 808).

Amendment to 4 M.R.S.A. § 1057 (2) governing surcharges imposed on fines, forfeitures, and penalties. The amended provision provides that the 10% surcharge shall be considered a part of the fine, forfeiture or penalty for purposes of collection and collection procedures (P.L. 1987, ch. 861).

First Regular Session of the 114th Maine Legislature (1989)

Transfer of jurisdiction of Wells from Eastern York (Biddeford) to Southern York (York) (P.L. 1989, ch. 98).

Transfer of jurisdiction of Raymond and Standish from Southern Cumberland (Portland) to Northern Cumberland (Bridgton) (P.L. 1989, ch. 184).

Allowance for defendants convicted of offenses and sentenced to prison terms of one year or more to apply to the Supreme Judicial Court for review of the sentence (P.L. 1989, ch. 218).

Allowance for a fee to be charged for the filing of a petition of harassment (P.L. 1989, ch. 371).

Changes to the forcible entry and detainer actions and appeals statute, including the appeal to Superior Court of issues triable by a trial <u>de novo</u> (P.L. 1989, ch. 377).

Expansion of the District Court's jurisdiction by enabling the District Court to grant equitable relief (P.L. 1989, ch. 392).

Approval of eleven new Judicial Department positions, including one District Court judge. Bail monies must now be deposited daily into an interest-bearing account. The court now retains 5% of the total proceeds of special escrow accounts when such accounts are closed (P.L. 1989, ch. 501).

In addition, approximately 50 pieces of legislation were

enacted which created new civil or criminal violations. While each law affects the Judicial Department in only a limited way, the laws in aggregate significantly impact court workload. (All are P.L. 1989).

Committee on Judicial Responsibility and Disability

The Committee on Judicial Responsibility and Disability was created by the Supreme Judicial Court by court order dated June 26, 1978, effective July 5, 1978. The Committee is empowered to receive and investigate complaints of judicial misconduct and disability. Judicial misconduct is defined by the Maine Code of Judicial Conduct, which was promulgated by the Supreme Judicial Court. By order of the Court, the Code of Judicial Conduct is binding on all state judges, except in the case of judges of probate (only the first three canons apply because of the part-time and elective nature of their positions).

The Committee on Judicial Responsibility and Disability consists of seven members appointed by the Supreme Judicial Court. Two members are either active or active retired justices of the Superior Court, active or active retired judges of the District Court, or active judges of probate. Two members are attorneys at law admitted to practice in the State of Maine, and three members are representatives of the general public of the State of Maine. The public and attorney members are appointed by the Supreme Judicial Court upon the recommendation of the Governor. Four alternate members are also appointed to serve with respect to any matter from which a regular member is excused or otherwise unavailable.

Proceedings before the Committee are typically begun upon receipt of a complaint concerning the conduct of a judge. If the Committee members decide that the facts involved in the complaint appear to come within its authority, a copy of the complaint is submitted to the judge for his response, and an investigation is conducted appropriate to the circumstances. Based upon its investigation and the judge's response, the Committee determines whether the complaint should be dismissed or if an evidentiary hearing is necessary. The Committee itself cannot impose disciplinary sanctions. Its findings and conclusions, together with recommendations, are reported to the Supreme Judicial Court. Thereafter, the matter is in the hands of the Court. The Committee may also seek informal correction of any judicial conduct or practice that may create an appearance of judicial misconduct.

Upon written request of the Governor or the Legislature's Joint Standing Committee on the Judiciary, in connection with consideration of the appointment of a person who is or has been a judge, the Committee is directed to provide information on any complaints made against that person and the Committee's disposition thereof. The Committee annually provides a summary of each year's activities to the Supreme Judicial Court.

Maine Judicial Council

As set forth in 4 M.R.S.A. § 451, the purpose of the Judicial Council is to "make a continuous study of the organization, rules, and methods of procedures and practices of the judicial system of the State, the work accomplished, and the results produced by that system and its various parts."

The Council consists of the following members: the chief justice of the Supreme Judicial Court (chair, ex officio), the attorney general, the chief justice of the Superior Court, the chief judge of the District Court, the dean of the University of Maine Law School, an active or retired justice of the Supreme Judicial Court, one justice of the Superior Court, one judge of the District Court, one judge of a Probate Court, one clerk of courts, two lawyers, and six laypersons, the latter to be appointed by the governor for such periods not exceeding four years, as he may determine. The executive secretary, a part time contract employee, provides all executive services to the Council.

The full council met on three occasions during 1988.

The Council created an <u>Alternative Dispute Resolution</u> (ADR) Committee, chaired by Council member Perry Hudson, to oversee a pilot program to introduce mediation techniques for the resolution of civil actions. The program, which received a special \$40,500 appropriation from the Legislature, commenced its activities in September in York and Knox Counties. It will continue to operate in those counties until early in 1990, when the Council will report to the Legislature regarding the desirability of expanding mediation to all civil actions in the Superior Courts.

The Council continued to press for the development of law-related education programs for Maine school teachers in cooperation with the Department of Education, the University of Maine School of Law and the University of Southern Maine's Department of Education.

The Consortium for the Study of the Future of the Maine Legal Profession, of which the Council is a sponsor, released its longawaited report based on the first survey ever conducted of the Maine bar.

The Council was also involved in efforts to facilitate communications among the county sheriffs, the Maine State Police and municipal police departments regarding the procedures for the custody, processing and service of outstanding arrest warrants.

Court Security Services

As in other states, Maine has found that incidents of courtroom disorder are on the increase, and a greater number of individuals has sought to influence the judicial process by threatening the judge, jurors, and/or witnesses. The figures presented in Table CS-1 illustrate this trend.

The Judicial Department reimburses the county for all reasonable expenses associated with providing court security services. The provision of these services is now subject to formal contract relationships. However, the costs are essentially determined by the county, which has authority to recruit and select the deputies assigned to the court security function as approved by the Court.

Local labor agreements and personnel policies control the pay rates and fringe benefits of these contractual employees. During fiscal year 1989, the judicial department paid \$1,298,522 to Maine counties for security services in both the District Courts and Superior Courts. This cost has increased each year by at least 10%.

The Court Security Services section of the Administrative Office of the Courts continues to work with the Maine Sheriff's Association and the Maine Criminal Justice Academy to provide certified training for deputy sheriffs and others assigned to the court security function.

Federal funds through a grant from the (national) State Justice Institute (\$26,700) have supported a project for court security, from

October 1988 thru June 1990. The grant has enabled a program through which the Court Security office creates and coordinates a "pool" of trained court security officers to be assigned as needed to participating counties. This plan holds great promise, particularly for the smaller counties, where the recruitment and retention of qualified persons to serve as court security officers can be difficult. The Sheriffs of Sagadahoc and Lincoln have demonstrated their willingness to participate in this effort. The "pool" personnel have also served at court locations in at least six other counties as well. Although the project will end in 1990, its impact on the proper management of the court security function will continue for much longer.

This table presents Law Court caseload information, including filings, dispositions and pending caseload since 1976. The "end pending" category includes four distinct sub-groups: cases not yet at issue (awaiting completion of the record on appeal or completion of briefing); cases at issue awaiting oral argument (cases fully briefed as of the end of the previous year); cases orally argued awaiting opinion; and cases remanded to the Superior Court prior to oral argument for correction of procedural defects. The comparison of filings and dispositions on this table indicates the degree to which dispositions have risen to meet the demand of incoming filings. Although filings increased by 96% from 1976 to 1988, the number of cases disposed of rose by 115%. Written opinions during 1988 totaled 343, 58% of which involved civil cases. Total caseload information is not available on a fiscal year basis.

Table LC-2

This table details the type and outcome of Law Court dispositions during 1988 and FY'89. Several categories require some explanation. "Other Administrative Proceedings" are cases seeking review of action (or refusal to act) by agencies of the Executive Department governed by the Maine Administrative Procedure Act and M.R.Civ.P.80C, or by agencies of local government such as planning boards pursuant to M.R.Civ.P.80B. Since the creation of the Appellate Division of the Workers Compensation Division in September 1981, most workers compensation cases are now disposed of by denial of petition for appellate review and do not involve full briefing, argument and opinion. "Discretionary Appeals" are requests for certificates of probable cause in post-conviction review (15 M.R.S.A. §2131) and review of extradition (15 M.R.S.A. §210-A) cases. "Change in Results" means a reversal, vacation, or substantive modification of the trial court's judgment.

Table LC-3

The average time required from notice of appeal to disposition for cases in which written opinions were issued is presented for 1981 through FY'89 on Table LC-3. Since most non-opinion disposition cases do not complete all of the steps of an opinion disposition, the inclusion of these cases in this table would skew the results, particularly in the early stages. The four sections correspond to (a) work done primarily by trial court clerks and court reporters; (b) work done by the parties' attorneys; (c) pre-argument study by justices and law clerks and scheduling lag; and (d) the actual decision making process and preparation of the opinion. The fifth section traces the cases through the entire Law Court process, from notice of appeal to final disposition. FY'89 saw a dramatic speed-up in the justices' work; only 51 days were required for a case to proceed from oral argument to disposition, a marked decrease from the 110.7 day average in 1981.

More complete timeframe data for only FY'89 are included on this table, detailing the actual number of cases during each stage of case processing.



SUPERIOR COURT NARRATIVE SUMMARY OF CASELOAD STATISTICS

The data tables contained in this section are organized into four segments, detailing the composition and flow of Superior Court caseload for the past eight years. These data are derived from the Superior Court Statistical Reporting System established in 1977. Statistical sheets for each case are prepared manually by Superior Court clerks; these sheets are subsequently entered for computerized editing and updating on a monthly basis. Numerous reporting programs provide caseload information for management purposes throughout the year and serve as the source of the data presented in this Annual Report. Definitions of types of cases and dispositions for civil and criminal cases appear at the end of their respective sections.

In order to determine trends over a period of time, many tables in this FY'89 report include information for the years1980 through 1988 and FY'89. As a result of periodic auditing, however, some of these figures may not match those which appeared in previous Annual Report publications, although the variations in most instances are minimal. All figures are presented by calendar year.

It should also be noted that all figures reflecting filings also include refilings. Refilings are cases which were previously disposed, but have returned to the Superior Court for substantial further action. The specific circumstances under which a civil or criminal action is considered a refiling appear at the end of their respective sections. Refilings constitute from one to two percent of the total caseload.

MEDICAL MALPRACTICE CLAIMS: Effective January 1, 1986, 24 M.R.S.A. §2851-2859 went into effect. The legislation established mandatory prelitigation screening and mediation panels for claims of professional negligence brought pursuant to §2903 to be administered by the Superior Court, and delineated guidelines for the formation of the panels and the procedures to be followed for the presentation of claims. Data relating to caseload pursuant to this law are presented at right.

Cases in Which Venue is Changed

Venue changes affect caseload in several ways: 1) the court receiving a case via venue change is handling cases not originating within its jurisdiction, thereby inflating that county's litigation rate; 2) the court disposing of a case via venue change disposes of it sooner than if the case had remained with that court for its ultimate disposition; 3) statewide, cases are being counted twice; once by the court in which the case was originally filed, and a second time when the case is filed in the court to which venue has been changed. Venue changes of significant volume are listed below:

<u>CIVIL</u>:

- In 1983, there were 51 civil cases in which venue was changed TO Lincoln FROM Cumberland.

- In 1986, there were 14 civil cases in which venue was changed TO Lincoln FROM Sagadahoc.

There were also 24 civil cases in which venue was changed TO Lincoln FROM Cumberland.

CRIMINAL:

- In 1986, there were 222 criminal cases in which venue was changed TO Lincoln FROM Sagadahoc.

- In 1987, there were 171 criminal cases in which venue was changed TO Lincoln FROM Sagadahoc.

Explanation of Selected Tables

Civil Timeframe Tables

The average time required for a case to reach jury trial is presented on Table SC-10. It took an average of 2.2 years for a civil case to reach jury trial during 1988, the lowest timeframe since 1980, and a 12.5% decrease from 1987. It should be noted that the average number of days from filing to pretrial memorandum, a period over which the courts have little control, alone consumed over one year. Table SC-11 summarizes the average number of days required from filing to

disposition for civil cases during the last nine years. In FY'89, the statewide average was 453 days, a 11.4% decrease over 1987. When reviewing this table for individual courts, the detailed figures on Table SC-12 should also be consulted, since smaller courts may have had few cases from which to calculate an average. Table SC-12 traces the total time required for civil cases to move from filing to disposition, and reflects the total number of cases disposed during 1988. Of the 5,569 cases disposed, 1,294 (23%) took in excess of two years to reach disposition.

Civil Caseflow Expedition Project

In late 1984, the Supreme Judicial Court issued an administrative order establishing the civil caseflow expedition project in Aroostook, Cumberland, Kennebec and Oxford Counties on a pilot basis, upon the recommendation of the Advisory Committee on Rules of Civil Procedure. The project involves the use of an expedited pretrial list with fixed discovery deadlines and no pretrial memoranda or conference. A Superior Court justice periodically reviews all incoming cases and determines which cases are not complex and can be placed on the expedited trial list. In January 1986, the project was expanded to every Superior Court location. The operation of this project affected the timeframe figures presented in this report, but specific data are not available.

Counting Criminal Cases

Criminal caseload in the Superior Court may be counted by either docket number or defendant number. When counted by docket number, the actual number of cases assigned a docket number is reflected. Some courts report multiple-defendant cases more frequently than others, due to differing District Attorney practices, resulting in docket numbers which contain more than one defendant. Additionally, a single defendant may be listed on a multiple number of dockets. Hence, the number of individual defendants cannot be determined. In this report, the core analysis of filings, dispositions and pending caseloads are counted by docket number, as are the types of cases, such as appeals, transfers, indictments, etc. However, classes of charges are counted by defendant, as are type of dispositions and trials. The latter two items are counted by defendant because of the likelihood for the multiple defendants included in a single docket number to be tried and/or disposed in different manners.

Boundovers

Boundovers from the District Court create a difficult situation with regard to the counting of cases for statistical purposes. When a boundover is filed in the Superior Court, it statistically remains a "boundover" type of case even if an indictment results. When a boundover results in an information being filed, however, the District Attorney dismisses the boundover, and a new docket number is assigned for the information. Under such circumstances, the case is actually being counted twice, and the number of District Attorney dismissals is slightly inflated.

Outstanding Warrants of Arrest

Table SC-21 was prepared in order to document the effect of outstanding warrants of arrest upon criminal pending caseload. In general, the assumption has been made that pending caseload serves as an indication of a court's ability or inability to efficiently dispose of cases in relationship to incoming workload. In reality, cases may be pending in the Superior Court that cannot be processed because a warrant issued for the defendant is not or cannot be served. Thus, it may be unfair to hold the courts solely responsible for increases in pending caseload which in fact may be beyond their control. Certainly the effect of outstanding warrants upon pending caseload varies considerably throughout the state. Statewide, 28% of all criminal pending caseload appears to be a result of outstanding warrants.

Criminal Timeframe Tables

Table SC-27 portrays the average time required for indictments and transfers to reach a jury trial in FY'89. Both indictments and transfers took an average of approximately seven months to reach a jury trial. Table SC-28 includes the average time required to reach final

disposition for indictments and transfers. These figures reflect all cases reaching disposition, including those which may have been quickly terminated via dismissal, so the average time is less than for the previous table where all cases culminated in jury trial. When reviewing averages for individual courts, Table SC-29 which refers to the actual number of cases should also be consulted, since smaller courts may have had few cases from which to calculate an average.

CUREDIOR COURT -- CIVIL JURY TRIALS

Prior to 1984, there were some discrepancies in calculating the number of jury trial days which may have affected the accuracy of these figures. The problem occurred when cases scheduled for trial underwent multiple voir dire (the justice conducted voir dire for several cases on one day, instead of limiting it to the one case facing imminent trial). Since the clerks were instructed to calculate the nearest .5 day, each of four cases voir dired on one day, for example, would have .5 days added to their total trial time, resulting in a total of 2 trial days being reported for only 1 day of trial activity.

Due to construction, Sagadahoc held no jury trials from June 1986 through September 1987; most cases were transferred to Lincoln for trial. Androscoggin held no jury trials from May through August 1987.

CIVIL DEFINITIONS

REFILING:

These are matters which have been previously disposed and which have been brought before the Superior Court for further action. For statistical purposes, such matters are limited to the following circumstances:

1. When a case remanded to the District Court returns to the Superior Court for further action.

2. When a case appealed to the Law Court returns to the Superior Court for further action.

3. When a mistrial occurs and a second trial is required; when a motion for a new trial is granted; or when a case, for any other reason, requires a trial after its original disposition.

4. When a motion for relief from judgment is granted, or a case is reinstated on the docket after judgment has been entered (Rule 60(b)).

TYPE OF CASE:

I. <u>Damages</u>: An action in which claim for relief is based on physical damage to property or reputation. Includes automobile accidents not involving person injury. If a complaint involves damages as well as personal injury issues, it is recorded as a "personal injury" case.

2. <u>Personal Injury</u>: An action in which claim for relief is based on physical or mental injury. Examples include medical malpractice, products liability, automobile accidents involving personal injury, and other cases involving personal injury.

3. <u>Contract</u>: An action in which claim for relief arises out of alleged violation of an agreement. Includes cases referred to as agreements, promissory notes, liens, account annexed, etc.

4. <u>URESA</u>: An action resulting from non-payment of support by an individual ordered to pay support by a court.

5. Divorce: An action brought in order to dissolve a marriage.

6. <u>Rule 80B/80C Appeal</u>: A complaint brought under Rule 80B (review of governmental actions) or Rule 80C (review of final agency actions) of the Maine Rules of Court.

7. <u>Appeal from Lower Court</u>: Any case appealed from the District Court (small claims, traffic infractions, etc.) or Administrative Court.

8. <u>Real Property Action</u>: Includes such cases as foreclosure, quiet title, boundary disputes and partitions.

9. Equitable Action/Injunctive Relief: Includes such cases as temporary restraining orders and preliminary injunctions (Rule 65) and declaratory judgments (Rule 57).

10. <u>Other</u>: All actions that do not fall in one of the above categories. Examples include, but are not limited to: protection from abuse, foreign deposition, foreign judgment, forfeiture of motor vehicles, minor's settlement.

TYPE OF DISPOSITION:

1. <u>Default Judgment</u>: The justice or clerk of court enters a judgment resulting from the failure of the defendant to take a necessary step under the civil rules.

2. <u>Rule 41(a)</u>: A voluntary dismissal of the plaintiff or stipulation of all the parties.

3. <u>Rule 41(b)</u>: A dismissal on court order for failure to take significant action in a case for two years.

4. <u>Dismissal</u>: A judicial determination of dismissal after a motion and hearing.

5. <u>Summary Judgment</u>: A judgment rendered on the basis of the pleadings.

6. <u>Final Order</u>: An order entered to dispose of such cases as injunctions, temporary restraining orders, minor's settlement, Proforma Decrees, or for a case handled by a referee.

7. Divorce Decree: A court decree issued to dissolve a marriage.

8. <u>Appeal Sustained</u>: A judicial decision reversing the judgment entered in the District Court.

9. <u>Appeal Denied</u>: A judicial decision upholding the judgment entered in the District Court.

10. <u>URESA Order</u>: An order to dispose of a URESA case.

11. <u>Court Judgment</u>: A judgment entered by a justice in a court (non-jury) trial.

12. Jury Verdict: A disposition rendered by a jury.

13. <u>Directed Verdict</u>: A direction by the justice to the jury to make a specific finding.

14. <u>Multiple Judgments</u>: Cases consolidated for jury or non-jury thal.

15. <u>Change of Venue</u>: Venue changed from one Superior Court to another.

16. <u>Other</u>: A disposition which is not included in any of the above categories (e.g., removals to District Court or to the U.S. District Court, withdrawais, etc.)

-Boundovers from the District Court create a difficult situation with regard to the counting of cases for statistical purposes. When a boundover is filed in the Superior Court, it remains a "boundover" type of case even if an indictment results. When a boundover results in an information being filed, the boundover is dismissed and a new docket number is assigned for the information.

-The decline in the number of appeals was due to the implementation of the "Single Trial Law". Effective January 1, 1982, this law provided that in Class D and E proceedings, the defendant may waive his right to jury trial and elect to be tried in the District Court, but that an appeal to the Superior Court following trial and conviction in the District Court may be only on questions of law. If the defendant demands a trial by jury, the case is then transferred to the Superior Court for trial. This new law resulted in an increased number of transfers and a reduced rate of appeal to the Superior Court.

CRIMINAL DEFINITIONS

REFILING:

These are matters which have been previously disposed and which have been brought before the Superior Court for further action. For statistical purposes, such matters are limited to the following circumstances:

1. When a case remanded to the District Court returns to the Superior Court for further action.

2. When a case appealed to the Law Court returns to the Superior Court for further action.

3. When a mistrial occurs and a second trial is required; when a motion for a new trial is granted; or when a case, for any other reason, requires a trial after its original disposition.

4. When a probation revocation is filed.

TYPE OF CASE:

1. <u>Bail Review</u>: Review and hearing of bail set in the District Court by a justice of the Superior Court.

2. <u>Transfer</u>: A criminal matter removed from the District Court to the Superior Court after the defendant has been arraigned and entered a plea of not guilty in the District Court.

3. <u>Appeal</u>: A criminal matter removed from the District Court to the Superior Court after judgment has been entered in the District Court.

4.<u>Boundover</u>: An action filed in the Superior Court after probable cause has been found in the District Court, even if an indictment is filed subsequently.

5. <u>Indictment</u>: An action brought to the Superior Court for determination after the Grand Jury has found that the prosecutor has sufficient evidence to bring the case to trial.

6. <u>Information</u>: An action brought to the Superior Court for trial after the defendant has waived his right to be indicted by the Grand Jury and allows the prosecutor to proceed on a complaint describing the alleged offense.

7. <u>Juvenile Appeal</u>: A juvenile case removed to the Superior Court for review after judgment has been entered in the juvenile court.

8. <u>Other</u>: An action which is not included in any of the above categories, (e.g., motions to suppress in a District Court case, reviews of indigency determination, post-conviction reviews).

9. Refiling-Probation Revocation: A petition to revoke probation.

10. Refiling-New Trial: A previously tried matter requiring retrial.

TYPE OF DISPOSITION:

1. <u>District Court Bail Revised</u>: Bail set by the District Court is changed by a justice of the Superior Court.

2. <u>District Court Bail Affirmed</u>: Bail set by the District Court is maintained at the same level by a justice of the Superior Court.

3. <u>Dismissed By Court</u>: Dismissed by a justice of the Superior Court.

4. <u>Dismissed by D.A. Rule 48(a)</u>: Dismissed by the District Attorney.

5. <u>Filed Case</u>: Upon consent of the defendant and District Attorney, the case is terminated without final judgment of guilt or innocence.

6. <u>Juvenile Appeal Dispositions</u>: A Superior Court justice affirms the order of adjudication of a juvenile crime and any other orders, or reverses the juvenile order and remands the matter for further proceedings.

7. <u>Not Guilty. Reason Of Insanity</u>: The judgment reflects a finding of insanity by either the court or a jury.

8. <u>Probation Revoked</u>: A justice finds that probation conditions have been violated and probation is revoked.

9. <u>Convicted</u>: There is a finding of guilty by either the court or a jury.

10. <u>Acquitted</u>: There is a finding of not guilty by either the court or a jury.

11. <u>Mistrial</u>: A justice rules that an erroneous or invalid trial has occurred.


12. <u>Other</u>: A disposition which is not included in any of the above categories (e.g., change of venue).



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DISTRICT COURT NARRATIVE SUMMARY OF CASELOAD STATISTICS

The District Court Statistical Reporting System was established in July 1978 to collect information concerning filings, dispositions and various caseload activities by type of case, although the reporting of gross filings and dispositions began in fiscal year 1975. Beginning in 1982, only those statistics relating to filings, dispositions and waivers have been collected. Monthly statistical forms are manually completed by each District Court clerk and submitted to the Administrative Office of the Courts for manual compilation and analysis on a quarterly and annual basis. Some discrepancies have arisen during the past several years, primarily due to the enormous volume of cases being manually tallied. While the statistics may be less than 100% accurate, they do nevertheless indicate gross trends since 1980.

It should be noted that much judge and clerk activity occurs after judgment is entered and the case is reported as disposed which is not reflected in these figures. For instance, many divorce cases may require the processing and hearing of numerous motions which are not reported in the caseload statistics. Similarly, when judgment is entered in a small claims case, a disclosure (money judgment) is often filed, requiring a separate filing fee and considerable judge and clerk time. Since the disclosure is filed under the original small claims case docket number, it is never included as a distinct case in the caseload statistics. Consequently, actual judge and clerk workload is considerably higher than may be indicated simply from the statistical figures. As District Court operations become computerized, the collection of more detailed caseload statistics will be facilitated.

The following tables present statistics relating to District Court filings and dispositions for 16 case type categories, waivers and electronic recordings. Footnotes and case type definitions for these tables appear at the end of this section.

Two tables may need clarification. Table DC-3 (Filings, Excluding

"Civil Violations and Traffic Infractions") was prepared because civil violations and traffic infractions constitute such a significant portion of the District Court's caseload and generally require less than average judge-time and clerk time than other types of cases. The "waivers" detailed in Table DC-6 are disposed cases in which the defendant waives court appearance in favor of paying a fine. The bulk of these waivers are for civil violations and traffic infraction cases, but some sea and shore, and fish and game waivers are also included.

Statistical Analysis

During FY'89, there were more cases filed in the District Court than in any previous 12-month period. The 325,560 filings amounted to a 10.8% increase over 1987 levels. The courts located at Bar Harbor, Brunswick and Bridgton experienced increases greater than 20% between calendar years 1987 and 1988.

The case type entitled "civil violations and traffic infractions" accounts for the largest single type of case handled by the District Court. In FY'89 there were 149,359 such filings, an 8% increase over 1987. There were 126,489 waivers in FY'89.

<u>GENERAL CIVIL</u>: Includes all civil cases not separated out below, including reciprocal cases. Does not include civil violations which were formerly considered criminal cases.

FORCIBLE ENTRY: Includes all forcible entry and detainer cases.

LAND USE: Includes all land use cases under M.R.Civ.P.80K; applications for administrative inspection warrants under M.R.Civ.P.80E; and applications for survey and test warrants under M.R.Civ.P.80J.

MONEY JUDGMENTS: Includes disclosure cases involving the collection of civil judgments, but does not include small claims disclosures.

SMALL CLAIMS: Includes only small claims cases.

PROTECTION FROM ABUSE: Includes protection from abuse cases under 19 M.R.S.A., Chapter 14.

DIVORCE: Includes all divorce cases, including foreign divorce judgments filed under the Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction Act (19 M.R.S.A. §816) and under the Uniform Enforcement of Foreign Judgments Act (14 M.R.S.A. §8003, 8004).

PROTECTION FROM HARASSMENT: Includes all protection from harassment cases under 5 M.R.S.A., Chapter 337-A.

OTHER FAMILY MATTERS: Includes child support (19 M.R.S.A. §214), judicial separation (19 M.R.S.A. §581), annulment (19 M.R.S.A. §632), settlement of claims of infant plaintiffs (M.R.Civ.P.17A), paternity, marriage waivers, emancipation and URESA cases.

<u>PROTECTIVE CUSTODY</u>: Includes all protective custody cases and medical treatment proceedings under Title 22.

MENTAL HEALTH: Includes all mental health cases under Title 34-B such as petitions for commitment to a mental hospital, commitment to a mental retardation facility and sterilization applications.

JUVENILE: Includes all offenses committed by juveniles.

<u>CRIMINAL A.B.C</u>: Includes all crimes classified as murder, A, B, or C. (Such offenses committed by juveniles are included in the "juvenile" category).

<u>CRIMINAL D.E</u>: Includes all Title 17A crimes classified as D or E, plus all other non-traffic criminal offenses such as Fish and Game, and Marine Resources. Does not include Title 29 violations. Does not include civil drug violations. (Such offenses committed by juveniles are included in the "juvenile" category).

TRAFFIC CRIMINAL: Includes all Title 28 and 29 Class D or E non-infraction traffic offenses such as Criminal OUI, Driving After Suspension, and Reckless Driving. Also includes PUC cases. (Such offenses committed by juveniles are included in the "juvenile" category).

CIVIL VIOLATIONS AND TRAFFIC INFRACTIONS:

Includes all traffic infractions and those civil violations which have received a criminal docket number and which are punishable by fine, such as municipal ordinances, possession of a usable amount of marijuana, possession or transportation of liquor by minors, and dogs running at large. (Such offenses committed by juveniles are included in the "juvenile" category).

DISTRICT COURT FOOTNOTES

(a) In **Van Buren** District Court, estimates were provided for 1980-1981 filings and 1980-1982 dispositions.

(b) Family abuse filings and dispositions were counted as "civil" cases during 1981.

Table AC-1 portrays Administrative Court caseload since 1981. While filings have fluctuated markedly over these years from a low of 285 to a high of 422, FY'89's filings of 357 are 11% higher than the 1981 level. The vast majority of this court's caseload originates from the Bureau of Liquor Enforcement.

Table AC-2 indicates the considerable amount of time contributed by Administrative Court judges and staff to the hearing of cases for the Superior Court and the District Court. During 1988, the judges spent at least one and one-half weeks each month handling such cases. Secretaries acted as courtroom clerks when the judge heard Superior Court cases and spent 149 hours recording District Court cases.

COURT MEDIATION

During 1988 the Court Mediation Service concluded a decade of work with the courts of the State of Maine. Mediation is provided as a supplementary method of dispute resolution for court cases and was used during 1988 for civil cases in domestic relations, small claims and civil litigation matters in the District and Superior Courts.

The Court Mediation Service is overseen by the Court Mediation Committee, pursuant to 4 M.R.S.A. § 18. Jane Orbeton was named Director during 1988, following the death of the service's first director, Lincoln H. Clark, and Paul Charbonneau was named Deputy Director.

The Court Mediation Service is divided into seven regions, each headed by a regional coordinator. The District Court provides clerical assistance for the Court Mediation Service office and arranges for appropriate facilities in which to hold mediations. Court mediators are independent contractors, receiving per diem fees and travel expenses. Mediations held during FY'89 were conducted by 58 mediators. There were a total of 4682 cases mediated, requiring 5288 mediation sessions. Tables CM-1 through CM-5 detail information by case, while CM-6 presents session data.

During the years 1986, 1987, 1988, and FY'89, there have been significant increases in the numbers of cases mediated. Statewide, including both District and Superior Courts, the total number of cases sent to mediation rose from 3178 to 4682, an increase of 47.3%.

Of the 4682 cases mediated during FY'89, 3296 (70%) were domestic relations cases, 1350 (28%) were non-domestic cases. Over half (52%) of all cases mediated were resolved. Referrals to trial accounted for 28% of the total cases.

COURT APPOINTED SPECIAL ADVOCATE PROGRAM (CASA)

The CASA Program was established in 1985 to address the needs of abused and neglected children by using trained volunteers to advocate for these children. The volunteers are paid only for their travel and out-of-pocket expenses, and largely replace state-paid attorneys who had routinely served as guardians ad litem for the children prior to the program's development. Mary-Gay Kennedy, Esq. serves as program director and District Court Judge John B. Beliveau is the judicial liaison.

Prior to becoming an active CASA, all volunteers must submit an extensive application, provide three references who are asked to provide detailed information in answer to specific questions and undergo intensive training. The training is provided by the Office of the Attorney General, the judiciary, the Department of Human Services, private attorneys, the program director, a child development psychologist and by some of the experienced volunteers themselves. In addition to the training, the volunteers receive a 200-page CASA manual which contains all of the above information as well as forms, selected articles, examples of reports, etc. The volunteers meet every eight to ten weeks as a group for support and continuing education, and the program director speaks individually with volunteers anywhere from once a day to once a month depending on the status of their experience and case activity.

The CASA volunteer, as the child's guardian ad litem, is a party to all judicial and administrative proceedings. While each case is different, the CASA volunteer spends approximately 10 to 15 hours doing research and conducting interviews <u>prior</u> to the first court appearance. More complicated cases take longer. Once initiated into the system, volunteers work about ten to fifteen hours per month for approximately 24 months on each case they are assigned.

The year FY'89 was one of tremendous growth and expansion

for the CASA program. Three hundred six (306) new cases, which represent 42% of the program's overall case load, were assigned to CASA volunteers from 16 District Court locations. This brings the total number of cases, in which volunteers have served as lay guardians ad litem, to 730 since the program's inception in June of 1985. Of those 730 cases, 203 have reached final dispositions and are no longer a part of the court's current docket. One hundred ninety-five (195) dedicated and specially trained citizens from Maine's community are actively representing the needs of children in the remaining 527 cases.

Tabe CS-1 summarizes cumulative information from July 1, 1985 through June 30, 1989, giving the total program activity for its four years of operation.
