- The State of Maine faced many challenges in 2008. During the fiscal crisis, many great ideas for increased efficiency and conservation of taxpayer dollars were created or implemented within the Judicial Branch. For example,
 - The Business and Consumer Docket completed its first year, with very positive results;
 - The use of video conferencing was expanded throughout the state to save time and travel costs;
 - Library costs were substantially reduced through electronic research capacity and local publishing;
 - Plans for an increase in security personnel continued but were not fully realized because of lack of funding;
 - The Family Drug Treatment Courts, with an emphasis on reunifying families, succeeded in child protection cases. The program is credited with supporting 6 mothers who gave birth to drug free babies in 2008.
 - Twenty-two of forty-one clerks' offices have been consolidated into eleven streamlined offices;
 - Renovation of the courthouse in Houlton provided the foundation for a consolidation of the courts into one building in mid-2009;



new courthouse will meet Maine Energy Conservation Building Standards and will open on time and on
budget before the end of 2009.

THE COURTS OF MAINE



The Supreme Judicial Court is the governing body of the Judicial Branch. Sitting as the Law Court, it is the court of final appeal.

The justices of the Superior Court serve the entire State, hearing both civil and criminal cases,	
including jury trials.	

The District Court hears both civil and criminal cases, in addition to excersing exclusive jurisdiction over family, juvenile, child protective, small claims, and traffic violation cases.



The Family Division has oversight of family matters in the District Court. There are 8 Family Law Magistrates who work in the Family Division.


TIME TO RESOLUTION OF CASES REDUCED SIGNIFICANTLY

Coordinated regional scheduling, implemented in the trial courts in 2004, has greatly reduced the time it takes to dispose of the most urgent cases - those dealing with violence, children, and families. For example, as illustrated by this graph, the average age of pending family cases has decreased significantly, from 303 days in 2004 to 149 days in 2008. Data provided in this graph reports the average number of days from filing date, for all cases that are open on June 30 each year.


GENERAL FUND AND JUDICIAL BRANCH EXPENDITURES



REVENUE COLLECTED BY THE JUDICIAL BRANCH

FY'08 revenue collection exceeded \$50 million and was 29% higher than 5 years ago and more than 6% greater than in FY '07.

Throughout FY'08, the Judicial Branch conducted an assertive COLLECTION PROGRAM to collect unpaid fines.
