UNIFIED CRIMINAL DOCKET IS A SUCCESS IN CUMBERLAND COUNTY



The Cumberland County Unified Criminal Docket (UCD) was developed to replace the traditional two-tiered system with a single efficient method for

processing or minal actions. The project has met its primary goals to promote the prompt and fair resolution of cases through early information sharing, to provide early access to appointed counsel for indigent defendants and to direct sufficient judicial resources for expedited case processing, it has increased efficiency by eliminating the duplicative clerical workload created by case transfers between the District and Superior Courts and by reducing the number of court appearances required to process individual cases. This successful model will be expanded to other counties; Penobscot County has already begun to use a similar process.

PENOBSCOT JUDICIAL CENTER OPENS DOORS TO COMMUNITY



The Penobscot Judicial Center opened in December 2009, ahead of schedule and under budget. Located at 78 Exchange St. in Bangor, the environmentally responsible facility meets the Maine Energy Conservation Building Standards. It serves as home to a consolidated clerks' office and the Penobscot County Superior and the Bangor District Courts. It offers full-time entry screening as well as security cameras in every courtroom.

FORECLOSURE DIVERSION PROGRAM CREATED TO HELP EASE CRISIS



The Foreclosure Diversion Program was established as a result of legislation that became effective in June 2009. The purpose is to assist homeowners and lenders in achieving mutually agreeable resolutions to mortgage foreclosure actions through the diversion process. The Supreme Judicial Court created a pilot project, which began in York County in August 2009, making mediation sessions available to the parties involved in residential foreclosures. The Foreclosure Diversion Program became available statewide on January 1, 2010. THE COURTS OF MAINE



The Supreme Judicial Court is the governing body of the Judicial Branch. Sitting as the Law Court, it is the court of final appeal.



The Justices of the Superior Court serve the entire State, hearing both civil and criminal cases, including jury trials.



The District Court hears both civil and criminal cases, in addition to exercising exclusive jurisdiction over family, juvenile, child protective, protection from abuse, small claims, and traffic violation cases.



There are eight Family Law Magistrates serving the entire State.



Coordinated regional scheduling, mplemented in the trial courts in 2004, has greatly reduced the time it takes to dispose of the most urgent cases — those dealing with violence, children, and families. For example, as illustrated by this graph, the average age of pending family cases has decreased sign ficantly, from 303 days in 2004 to 145 days in 2009.

Data provided in this graph reports the average number of days from filing date, for all cases that are open on June 30 each year.


GENERAL FUND AND JUDICIAL BRANCH EXPENDITURES




REVENUE COLLECTED BY THE JUDICIAL BRANCH


REVENUE DISTRIBUTED BY THE JUDICIAL BRANCH
