Year in Review: Maine Courts Respond to the **COVID-19 Pandemic**



Remote proceedings became the new normal during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The work of the Judicial Branch is essential and never more so than during the COVID-19 pandemic. Throughout the pandemic, the Judicial Branch has tried to balance two goals:

- · Providing access to justice, and
- · Ensuring the safety of the public and employees that enter Judicial Branch facilities.


Beginning in March 2020, the Supreme Judicial Court issued a series of Pandemic Management Orders to limit community transmission of COVID-19, while ensuring access to justice for those who seek protection from personal violence and whose liberty interests are at stake. This was no small task, as court proceedings tend to bring many people together often in small courtrooms. Much of our business is still conducted by paper. And although we have been diligently working to automate operations, digitize court records, and implement electronic filing, we are at least two years away from statewide implementation.

In May 2020, the Judicial Branch developed a Phased Management Plan (revised many times since), which laid out steps to resume full operations by November. Working groups were convened to reinvent almost all aspects of Judicial Branch operations. Unfortunately, worsening pandemic conditions in late fall required that we maintain very limited capacity restrictions in our facilities, which interrupted our progress toward resuming most in-person proceedings.

Undaunted, the Judicial Branch adapted to these challenging circumstances by turning to broader technology solutions. The expanded use of video conferencing and virtual hearings is a major historical shift in Judicial Branch operations. Video conferencing has become an important tool as the Supreme Judicial Court has directed that hearings, trials, and conferences be conducted remotely where possible. With the move to remote events, we have worked hard to address public and media access to court proceedings. And it turns out that one of our ongoing initiatives — the Maine eCourts case management and eFiling system — is, perhaps, among the most effective tools to address

the challenges caused by the pandemic. The automated case management system was implemented for Violations Bureau cases in 2018 and eFiling went live in Bangor for most civil and family matters last fall. We are continuing to expand to other case types, courts, and regions. Court systems around the country that implemented electronic filing prior to the pandemic have reported far less disruption to their operations and have been able to shift to remote court proceedings more easily.

Unfortunately, video conferencing is not an ideal solution for all court proceedings especially jury trials. Despite challenges, we were able to hold a handful of jury trials this fall in larger courthouses in Augusta and Bangor by managing traffic flow, using technology and multiple courtrooms to distance litigants and attorneys, judges and court staff, juries, and the public. But the extreme demand on resources is not sustainable.

The Judicial Branch has taken several steps to ensure that our facilities are safe for our employees and the public. All persons entering a courthouse must wear face coverings or masks, answer screening questions, and have their temperatures checked. This entry screening for COVID-19, which is an important component of the Judicial Branch's pandemic response and has been implemented at every open courthouse, has been limited by the short supply of Judicial Marshals to conduct the screening. As a result, we have had to temporarily close some courthouses to the public. Although we have worked diligently to ensure that such closures have not affected access to justice, the need for pandemic-related screening reinforces the longstanding Judicial Branch request for additional marshals so that we can provide entry screening at every courthouse every day.

We know that people have been adversely affected by the courts' limited ability to hear cases during the pandemic. Priority cases involving life and liberty interests currently fill our dockets. As of February 2021, we cannot predict when other cases may be heard. Despite all the work we have done to implement new processes, technology solutions, and safety measures, we recognize that we cannot get back to business as usual while the pandemic threat continues. The Judicial Branch is working on plans to address the backlog of cases that has accumulated since the beginning of the pandemic. We acknowledge the need to get cases resolved fairly, effectively, and efficiently, and will continue to pursue additional innovations and every possible technology and human resource to meet that demand.



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

FY20 REVENUE







REVENUE DISTRIBUTED BY THE JUDICIAL BRANCH
