

We would be remiss if we didn't note Ted Glessner's retirement at the end of 2021, after 29 years of service to the people of Maine as State Court Administrator. Ted's dedication to the continuous improvement of the court system continues to inspire.

2021 in Review: Pandemic Challenges & the Judicial Branch's Response

Two years into the COVID-19 pandemic, the needs of Maine people for access to justice together with the operational and budgetary pressures on the Judicial Branch have never been greater. Throughout 2021, we continued to keep courthouse doors open with the assistance of new processes, technologies, and the expanded use of remote proceedings. However, court proceedings conducted during a pandemic, whether remote or in person, take more time and resources. As a result, cases are backlogged in many, though not all, dockets.

As pandemic conditions eased in the summer and early fall of 2021, we began to return to full pre-pandemic operations. After a short reprieve, COVID-19 cases began to surge last fall. Thanks to high vaccination rates in many areas, courts continued in-person proceedings, including jury trials in many locations. Remote proceedings made possible with new technology and procedures helped move the caseload. While we made progress in 2021, cases took longer to resolve. Reasons were varied, including limited court resources, slowed processes, delays involving litigants, unreliable internet connections, attorneys' conflicting schedules, and overwhelming caseloads. We worry that justice delayed is truly justice denied.

Despite applying all available resources, technologies, and revamped processes, we continue to have an enormous backlog of cases. We are making small inroads, but the pandemic has exposed the uncomfortable reality that we simply lack the capacity to just "catch up" or to schedule and hear more cases with our existing workforce. We are looking for additional, targeted resources to add capacity to schedule and hear more cases.

Accepting the challenge to innovate

The pandemic upended longstanding court processes, but it also presented an opportunity to seek and implement new solutions. In 2021 we:

Expanded remote proceedings in all case types. The widespread use of remote technologies can result in great savings to court users in time, expenses, fees, and travel.

Enhanced courthouse safety and security for our employees and the public. Thanks to the Governor and the Legislature, we added 10 new marshal positions in 2021. These new positions have helped keep courthouses open to the public and move the courts closer to providing appropriate security at our courthouses statewide.

Increased collaboration with system partners to improve processes. Throughout 2021, we re-energized our outreach to the

bar associations, the Prosecutor's Association, and the Maine Commission on Indigent Legal Services (MCILS) to problem solve and identify new possibilities in the areas of scheduling, and the use of remote technologies for contested traffic trials, small claims cases, and jury selection in civil cases.

Continued offering eFiling in select courts and worked toward the next phase of implementation. The Judicial Branch continued to offer eFiling for most civil and family matters cases in the Bangor courts and the statewide Business & Consumer Docket (BCD). We also began a review of project goals, the work accomplished to date, and the necessary next steps to increase the likelihood of project success in the future. Where the new system is not yet available, the courts developed an informal new process to allow filing using a web-based platform instead of having to go to a courthouse. The pilot launched in York County Courts in January 2022 and will be expanded.

Continued work to create safe and dignified courthouses. Construction on the new York Judicial Center (YJC) continued. The project remains on budget at just over 50% completion and occupancy is expected in the spring of 2023. The building will provide ample space for court proceedings and related meetings and will take advantage of the latest solar and geothermal energy sources and technology.

Innovative referee pilot program to address the backlog in family and non-jury cases. In a newly created program, recently retired judges will be appointed as referees to handle civil and family cases remotely. The program will be launched as a pilot with family cases in which both sides have an attorney, but we hope to expand it to cases with unrepresented parties as well as other civil non-jury cases. The goal is to add capacity in the short-term to allow us to address the backlog without adding work to existing personnel.

Much has changed since the beginning of the pandemic. Like so many organizations, the Judicial Branch has faced significant challenges and has had to adapt to new ways of doing things. But the pandemic has also inspired creativity and innovation — maybe even experimentation. Through it all, we remain committed to our mission to provide access to justice to the people of Maine.





FY21 REVENUE






REVENUE DISTRIBUTED BY THE JUDICIAL BRANCH
