2023 in Review

The Judicial Branch emerged from the pandemic with a resolve to build a stronger, more resilient court system for the 21st century. In 2023 we took the first bold steps toward that goal.

Completion and opening of the York Judicial Center

As 2023 began, construction was completed on the York Judicial Center (YJC), a modern, energy-efficient facility designed to consolidate four court locations for the residents of Maine's second most populous county. The YJC features state-of-the-art technology to meet the needs of a 21st century justice system for a safe, secure, connected, and fully accessible facility. The completion of this courthouse marks the latest achievement in a two-decades old strategic plan to update aging courthouse facilities to better serve the public.

Accelerating the transition to a modern case management and eFiling system (Maine eCourts)

As part of providing the necessary infrastructure for a 21st century court system, we continued to work on implementing a modern case management and electronic filing system. After a pause in the implementation of Maine eCourts, the Judicial Branch successfully rolled it out to Lewiston and Auburn (L/A) courts in October. Lessons learned from earlier implementations contributed to the success of the recent rollout. Since 2021 we have reengineered how staff interacts with the system to maximize efficiencies, reinvigorate training, and reorganize support to enhance success, and it worked! The smooth rollout in L/A has positioned us to accelerate implementation to more courts this year and beyond. We have an ambitious goal of transitioning all trial courts and case types statewide to Maine eCourts by 2027.

Year in Review — Continued

Moving closer to a right-sized Judicial Branch

In 2023 we made the case to Maine lawmakers — supported by data collected through a study conducted by the National Center for State Courts — that the Judicial Branch was at risk of falling short of its mission to provide timely access to justice because of long-standing under-resourcing. We are grateful that the legislative and executive branches supported the creation of additional judge and staff positions. Several of the positions are re-imagined or redesigned positions to better meet the demands of a 21st century court system, including:

- Court Technical Assistants
- Call Center Personnel
- Court Attendants
- Specialized Trainers
- eFiling Specialists
- Procurement Specialist

The return on investment is already evident in better response times to public inquiries, more efficient staffing of personnel to better serve the public, and enhanced capacity to move cases. We will continue to work with the Governor's Office and the Legislature to ensure we have the resources to meet the needs of the people of Maine into the future.

Enhancing legal information resources for self-represented litigants and the public

The Judicial Branch has also created and added to our website new video resources for self-represented litigants. These videos explain the court process for cases in which a high percentage of litigants are not represented by an attorney: divorce, parental rights, small claims, protection from abuse, and modifications to divorce or parental rights orders. The videos explain the court process in a way that litigants can understand what to expect when they fill out necessary forms and come for their day in court.

Fostering awareness of the role of the court system with schools and communities

In May 2023, the Judicial Branch expanded its program of community outreach to add a resource web page for teachers and civic organizations. The Law Court continues to hold oral arguments at high schools around the state each October, and we are encouraging school and civic groups to tour our courthouses and view public court proceedings. We have also invited local legislators to tour courthouses in their districts so that they can learn how the courts are serving the needs of their constituents.




