

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#### INTRODUCTION

This report, covering the biennium 1967 and 1968, is made in two parts. The first part satisfies the statutory directive to the Judicial Council to report to the Governor biennially on "the work of the courts". This part consists almost entirely of statistics which, better than any narrative report, describe the work that has been accomplished by our Superior and District Courts during the past two years. The second part of the report covers the work of the Judicial Council itself. This section of the report explains briefly the projects and studies undertaken by the Council, legislation introduced or supported, and other activities during the two year period.

The Judicial Council would welcome comments from any people interested in the work of the courts with regard either to the Court statistics herewith presented, or to the work of the Council itself.

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#### PART I

THE WORK OF THE COURTS FOR 1967 and 1968

#### SUPERIOR COURT

The next several pages of this report contain statistical material relating to the work of the Superior Court. The first presentation is the tabulation for the Superior Courts in the state as a whole for the year 1967, followed by the same tabulation for the year 1968. We then present the work of the courts in each county, county by county, for 1968 in the form of a summary tabulation. This summary tabulation does not include all of the items which are reported quarterly to the Chief Justice by the clerks of courts in the various counties but does provide information relative to the most important aspects of court work. While it is possible, of course, that there are minor errors in the tabulation, we believe that it presents fairly an overall picture of court work during 1968. Where our tabulations of statistics obtained from the various clerks of courts have indicated a figure other than that shown on the original clerks of courts forms, that figure is indicated in parentheses.

District Court statistics are presented in the same format as in the annual report of the Chief Judge of the District Court to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court of Maine. These are followed by reports of revenue and distribution for each year for the District Court. It will be noted that the District Court statistics are on a fiscal year basis, whereas the Superior Court statistics are on a calendar year basis. This means that we do not have available, and are not presenting with this report, statistics concerning the work of the District Court for the last six months of 1968 and that we are including statistics which actually cover the last six months of 1966.

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#### CONCLUSION

Unfortunately, printed statistics do not by any means tell the whole story. The number of cases entered in a particular county during a particular year do not reflect the continuing and growing complexity of the law and the ever increasing time which must be spent by judges and justices in preparing themselves for trials and in arriving at decisions which affect the lives and property of our citizens. Attorneys increasingly are specializing in the various branches and segments of the law which means that our justices and judges spend ever increasing time in research to keep themselves familiar with current legal decisions on a wide variety of topics. Whatever story the statistics may tell, it is clear to all those who are intimately involved with the work of the courts that the work load is increasing at a rapid pace and that, while we now pride ourselves on not having the tremendous backlogs and resulting injustices as do other more metropolitan states, that this will soon happen to our courts unless measures are immediately undertaken to make our judicial process increasingly efficient. This brings us to the work of the Judicial Council of Maine, as it is one of the primary functions of the Council to keep abreast of changing patterns of the judicial process and to assure that our court system operates in a fashion calculated to bring justice in as nearly a perfect form as possible to all citizens of Maine.

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#### THE WORK OF THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL 1967 - 1968

The Judicial Council met nine times during 1967 and 1968 and at each meeting discussions were conducted concerning various phases of the operation of the courts. Out of these discussions came the decision, late in 1967, to conduct a study of the operation of the Superior Courts. A committee was named by the Council Chairman, Chief Justice Williamson, consisting of Professor Eugene MaWhinney as chairman and Justice Donald W. Webber, Justice Charles A. Pomeroy, Attorney General James S. Erwin, George A. Cowan, George B. Barnes, Esq., and Miss Edith Hary. The process of making this study consumed most of the time of various members of the Council during the year 1968 and resulted in the introduction, support or endorsement of several items of legislation in the 104th Legislature.

One of these bills reflected the realization by the membership of the Council that a volunteer organization could not conduct as thorough and painstaking a study into many aspects of the operation of the Supreme Judicial and Superior Courts as was necessary. This was reflected in the Council's introduction and support of legislation which would call for an appropriation of \$40,000 to be used for the purpose of studying the operational aspects of the Supreme Judicial Court and the Superior Court in Maine. If this legislation is passed, it will be the Council's intention to hire a professional organization to conduct this study, and if this is done, it is to be assumed that the 105th Legislature will have several items of legislation before it as a result.

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The Council's study of the Superior Court resulted in support for a bill which would create the position of Administrative Assistant to the Chief Justice. Several times in this report we have mentioned the growing complexity of the judicial system and it appears that the time has come in Maine to have one person responsible, under the direction and supervision of the Chief Justice, for the administrative details of court operation to assure continuing efficiency.

The study also resulted in a bill which would eliminate the statutory term system and substitute therefor a system of administratively designated terms in order to provide what the Council felt was necessary flexibility in court operation. The study also resulted in the Council's recommendation of legislation which would increase the number of Superior Court justices as well as the number of court reporters.

In addition to the study of the Superior Courts, several other studies and projects were undertaken by the Council during the biennium. At the request of the 103rd Legislature, a committee of the Council studied the District Court with particular reference to the availability of service to people in rural counties and the possibility of changes in division and district lines to make it more convenient for people in certain communities to avail themselves of court services. This committee concluded, and the Council reported to the Legislature, that piecemeal legislation changing various boundary lines creating new districts, divisions, etc.,

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should be avoided and that while there were problems in some areas regarding access to the courts because of distance, these problems were not so severe as to require immediate changes. The opinion was expressed that if there are to be changes in the District Court system, they should only be made after a thoroughgoing study of court operation has been made to assure that the changes will be for the benefit of the entire system and not just for one tiny segment.

At the request of the Governor, a committee of the Council conducted research on pardon procedures and the minimum term to be served by people sentenced to serve life imprisonment. One of the results of thisstudy was the suggestion that the Board of Probation and Parole be given at least an advisory function in the pardon procedure, but that the actual authority for pardon remain with the Governor and Council. This suggestion is reflected in a bill to be presented to the 104th Legislative Session.

Another committee of the Council initiated a study of time utilization by Superior Court justices in an attempt to determine the specific areas of judicial function which require the most time and to determine what measures would be most helpful to the Superior Court justices in carrying out their various duties. It is assumed that this type of study would be conducted in a greatly expanded form if a professional study of the court system-does take place.

The Council became increasingly aware during this biennium that more effort of a public relations nature is needed in order

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to acquaint the members of the bar and the general public with the existence of the Council and its function. To this end, frequent reports were made by the Executive Secretary through the Journal of the Maine Bar Association. It is hoped that these reports, in addition to the increased legislative activity on the part of the Council, will be a step toward the fuller realization of Council aims and functions by all branches of the State government, bar membership and the general public. The Council will continue to welcome suggestions for studies and projects relating to the administration of justice in Maine.
