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

SUMMARY

In 1992 Maine had a fall enrollment of 211,853 enrolled in 747 public schools (590 elementary, 113 secondary and 36 combined elementary and secondary). This count does not include vocational centers or regions, although some of the 211,853 students also attend vocational centers or regions. These students were taught by 14,574 teachers. A total of 13,175 students were enrolled in 95 private schools (55 elementary, 18 secondary and 22 combined elementary and secondary). These students were taught by 917 teachers.

Maine's 493 towns and cities are now divided into 73 school administrative districts with 275 towns, 42 cities and towns under individual supervision, 24 towns under district superintendents and agents of the commissioner, 13 community school districts with 39 towns, leaving 113 towns in 33 unions.

The cost of public education continues to rise. The cost per pupil, excluding transportation, apital outlay and debt service, was \$3,203 per elementary and \$4,612 per secondary.

Much has been done to encourage young people to complete their secondary education and advance, into post-secondary education. Of the 14,764 high school graduates, (13,088 public and 1,676 private) in 1992, 55.8% of the public high school graduates and 71.4% of the private high school graduates continued their education—a combined percentage of 57.6%. Approximately 57.1% of these are continuing their education in Maine institutions.

Of the public secondary schools reporting a total enrollment of 58,225, there were 1,693 dropouts which gave Maine a 2.91% dropout rate for the 1991-92 school year.

Included in this issue of "Maine Educational Facts" is a compilation of most of the reports printed by the Division of Management Information. The information is compiled from the following reports:

FALL SCHOOL STATISTICAL REPORT (EF-M-40)

This report collects total enrollment by school as of October 1. Also what type of school, such as elementary; secondary; senior high; or elementary-secondary combined, etc. In addition, last year's graduates and number of graduates who intend to or are enrolled full/part time in post-secondary education are collected.

RESIDENT ENROLLMENT REPORT (EF-M-11/13)

This report is submitted by each local educational unit as of October 1. The report includes all students educated within the school system.

REPORT OF PUBLIC/SELECTED PRIVATE SCHOOL SYSTEM (EF-M-35)

This report is as of the last day of school. It provides statistics for pupils attending schools operated by the administrative unit to include net registration, average daily attendance, aggregate attendance, aggregate membership, average daily membership, dropouts, expulsions, retentions and number of pupils conveyed at public expense. Also included is information on number of schools discontinued during or at the close of the school year.

YEAR-END REPORT OF PRIVATE SECONDARY SCHOOLS (EF-M-240)

This report provides statistical information from private secondary schools. These schools are required to report pupil registration and attendance data at the close of school each year. These reports are filled in by school administrators, public and private, and are audited and verified as much as possible. These figures are primarily statewide, with the exception of selected data which is provided on a county level or school administrative unit level detail.

CITIES OR TOWNS WITH INDIVIDUAL SUPERVISION (42 Systems with 42 Municipalities)

A city or town with individual school supervision is a single municipality. A school committee administers the education of all grades in the city or town through a superintendent of schools. The city or town charter usually determines the method of budget approvation many cities and towns, the City Council or Town Council has final budget approvations. Since it is a single municipality, cost sharing is not a factor.

SCHOOL ADMINISTRATIVE DISTRICTS (73 Systems with 275 Municipalities)

A school administrative district (S.A.D.) is a combination of two or more municipalities who pool all their educational resources to educate all students. One school committee (comprised of representatives from each of the municipalities) administers the education of grades K-12 through a superintendent of schools. Budget approval is by majority vote of those present and voting at a district budget meeting. The member municipalities share the S.A.D. costs based on a formula which includes state valuation and/or number of pupils.

COMMUNITY SCHOOL DISTRICTS (13 Systems with 39 member towns)

A community school district (C.S.D.) is a combination of two or more municipalities formed to build, maintain, and operate a school building or buildings to educate any or all grades. For example, a C.S.D. may be formed to build and operate a grade 7-12 school for all towns in the C.S.D. These same towns will maintain individual control (or belong to a union) for the education of their K-6 students. A community school district may also include education of all grades K-12.

The C.S.D. school committee is comprised of members of each town's local school committee if one exists. C.S.D. school committees are apportioned according to the one person-one vote principle. The member municipalities share the S.A.D. costs, based on a formula including number of pupils in each town and/or state valuation or any combination of each. Community School District budgets are approved by majority vote of voters present and voting at a district budget meeting.

UNIONS OF TOWNS (32 Systems with 127 Municipalities)

A Union is a combination of two or more school administrative units joined together for the purpose of sharing the costs of a superintendent and the superintendent's office. Each member school administrative unit maintains its own budget, has its own school board, and operated in every way as a separate unit except for the sharing of superintendent services.

In addition, a union school committee exists, comprised of representatives of each member unit school committee and conducts the business of the union. All votes of the union committee are cast on a weighted basis in proportion to the population of the towns involved.

MAINE INDIAN EDUCATION (1 System, 3 Reservations)

There are three reservations of Indian children in Maine. These three reservations are organized exactly as a union of towns described on the previous page.

EDUCATION IN UNORGANIZED TERRITORIES (7 Schools)

Education in unorganized territories (E.U.T.) in Maine is a responsibility of the State. The education of territory children is accomplished by the state operating schools which are in unorganized territories and by the assignment of agent superintendents to assure that each child in an unorganized territory receives education. These agents are assigned by the Commissioner of Education through the Division of School Operations.

UNITS UNDER DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS AND AGENTS OF THE COMMISSIONER (25 Systems, 25 Municipalities)

A unit assigned to a district superintendent or an agent of the commissioner, generally is a relatively small unit requiring less than full-time administration. Units under district superintendents procure services of superintendents on their own by negoiating with a nearby superintendent and school board. Agents are appointed by the commissioner on a temporary basis if the local unit is unable to local a superintendent on its own.

VOCATIONAL CENTER (19 Centers)

A vocational center is a facility or program providing vocational education to secondary students. A center is governed by a single school administrative unit. It may serve students from other affiliated school administrative units. It may include satellite center facilities and programs. A vocational satellite program is a facility or program providing vocational education to secondary students, which is administered by a school administrative unit affiliated with a vocational center.


VOCATIONAL REGION (8 Regions)

A vocational region is a quasi-municipal corporation established by the Legislature for the delivery of vocational programs which is comprised of all the school administrative units within the geographical boundaries set forth in 20-A MRSA, section 8451. A region is governed by a cooperative board formed and operating in accordance with 20-A MRSA, Chapter 313.

1992 -- UNITS THAT DO NOT OPERATE SCHOOLS

There are 54 school administrative units in Maine that do not operate schools, but tuition all students to surrounding school systems. These tuitioning school administrative units are described below.

All these units must have a school board and a superintendent. However, the superintendent is usually a school agent appointed by the commissioner, or the school unit is a member of a union.




