In Senate March 24,

ORDERED, the House concurring, that there is created a Legislative Study

Committee to investigate the feasibility of consolidating the school districts

of the State into a lesser number of more efficient size school districts,

such study to emphasize the amount of savings, if any, by such consolidation.

The committee shall consist of 2 Senators to be appointed by the President of
the Senate and 3 Representatives to be appointed by the Speaker of the House.

The President of the Senate shall designate the chairman; and be it further

ORDERED, that the committee shall meet at the call of the chairman.

The members shall be paid necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties; and be it further

ORDERED, that the committee report the results of its study together with any recommended legislation to the 102nd Legislature or any special session prior to the 103rd Legislature but no later than the 103rd Legislature; and be it further

ORDERED, that there is appropriated from the Legislative Appropriation the sum of \$1,500 to carry out the purposes of this order. Said appropriation shall remain a continuing carrying account until the purposes of this order have been accomplished.

FROM: School Districts Consolidating Study Committee

Local superintendent groups have met in all areas of the state to consider groupings of towns to gain desirable educational units. The results of these meetings are enclosed with the following motion passed by the Executive Committee of the Maine School Superintendents Association:

"Voted that the suggested plan be forwarded to the Legislative Committee indicating that this represents the approximate preliminary thinking of the area superintendent groups and will be subject to revision at the time of public hearing. It is further understood that the Superintendents Association is not supporting the plan as a final recommendation and indeed in some areas concensus has not been reached."

As a master plan for school districting is considered, the following points should be kept in mind.

- 1. Any such plan must have a provision for individual towns to transfer from one district to another whenever local conditions indicate that this would be in the best interests of the residents of the towns.
- 2. Such a course of action cannot be adopted until a plan has been developed to alleviate the economic hardships that might result under the present method of sharing costs.
- 3. Any plan adopted should act as a guide and should not prohibit different groupings of towns when such groupings are obviously in the best interests of the citizens of the state.

Recommended: It was the recommendation of the committee that school units go in the direction recommended by the proposed plan. If sufficient progress has not been made in areas by 1972, then other steps should be taken. Every effort should be made by school units to go along with the master plan and every possible effort should be made to steer these towns in the direction that has been recommended and if no satisfactory progress has been made, then mandatory legislation should be enacted.

Recommended: A new method of sharing costs in school administrative districts.

- (a) Every unit should raise the number of mills toward school operation that is specified in section 3722 (currently 20 mills).
- (b) All remaining local appropriations that are required above the foundation program to operate and maintain the district shall be based upon the percentage of pupils in each member town of the district on the preceding April 1st school census.
- (c) The basic state aid per pupil before adding the 10% increase in the district shall not be reduced below the maximum potential average per pupil state aid that could have been received by the separate municipalities prior to district formation.
- (d) The maximum percentage increase in appropriations for any member town within a school administrative district shall not exceed the average percentage increase of the district as a whole by more than 5% in any one year. One of the most extreme cases would be a combination of East Millinocket, a high valuation paper mill town, with Medway, a relatively low valuation town. Under the above proposal the comparison would be as follows:

The increase in appropriations for the district would be approximately 7 1/2% above what the towns raised separately in 1966. Under (d) above no town could increase more than 12 1/2% which is 5% higher than the average increase. If one increases East Millinocket's appropriation by 12 1/2%, the remainder then must be borne by Medway. This would represent a total mill effort for East Millinocket of 14.6 mills in the first year of a district as compared with Medway's required effort of 82 mills. Under proposal 8 the difference in mill effort would gradually narrow.

Rangeley and Madrid are at present outside of a school administrative district in North Franklin County because of the high state valuation of these two towns in comparison with the other towns in the area. The above formula would make it feasible for Rangeley and Madrid to become part of the district.



Additional samples could be provided, but with provisions (c) and (d) which set limits on appropriation increases and a floor under per pupil aid, the formula will make it practical for any combination of towns to form a school administrative district. Districts which are already formed could use this method of sharing costs without disrupting present practices to any great degree.

(Note: The last recommendation comes from the Subcommittee on Public School Laws to the Legislative Research Committee of the 102nd Legislature.)


The following groupings of towns within counties are being suggested after discussion in local superintendents' groups. The aim was to come up with groupings that would provide programs that might be educationally desirable and geographically sensible. There was no attempt to consider the economic implications if districts were formed in accordance with these groupings. The pupil count used was April 1, 1965 resident pupils. It should be noted that an enrollment of 1,100 pupils will produce a high school of 300, and enrollment of 3,300 will produce a high school of 900.

The result of this joint effort shows that it is possible to operate school systems within the state in 81 multiple-unit districts, and that four cities would operate as single unit districts, and that there would still be eight isolated single units in the state, mostly islands.




