tudents enrolled in the JMG program face multiple barriers to education. Through our student-centered approach to teaching, each student is treated as an individual.

JMG's Middle School and High School programs are taught within our partnering schools by a JMG Specialist, who is trained and employed by JMG. JMG's College Success Program ensures students have the support they need to stay in school and attain a degree.


JMG's curriculum incorporates job skills, communication and team building skills, leadership, time management, financial literacy and more.



JMG is the only organization in Maine to offer a continuum of support; serving students from middle to high school and onto post-secondary education and careers.

JMG provides follow-up services, which allow us to observe and support students as they navigate through post-secondary education and training pathways. By partnering with public education and private businesses, JMG ensures these students become thriving members of Maine's workforce.

JMG students have been identified as being at risk of not succeeding in school because of the barriers they face. While there is no simple definition, JMG utilizes a set of well-researched risk factors encompassing 34 possible barriers. Students in the JMG program must face a minimum of four barriers. The most common include:



65% low household income

60% family and social issues

51% high absenteeism (10+)

46% academic under performance

44% living with one natural parent

Dear Friends of JMG,

It was my good fortune to join the JMG magic 15 years ago. A little more than a year after I was hired, Craig Larrabee stepped into the CEO & President role and he promoted me to Executive Vice President. Indicative of his inclusive approach, Craig said to me: "We are going to be co-leaders of JMG, we are going to lead this together."

I already knew I was a leader. But Craig's promise was a poignant moment for me. I understood the substantive value of being recognized and positioned as a co-leader. Yes, Craig is the CEO & President; and yes, that is the highest executive position. But Craig and the board of directors have made room for me to lead in big and important ways. And that was a really good decision, because it made the company stronger.

Given the significance of our current social consciousness with respect to gender equality, it is critical to understand leadership that elevates equity has to be modeled. It has to be modeled explicitly, acknowledged, and celebrated. JMG does this for our company and employees. There are eight people on JMG's executive team, four men and four women. JMG's regional management team is made up of four men and five women. We intentionally elevate big picture dialogue to focus on ownership, expectations, shared success, collaboration and transparency. We do this a lot.

A cornerstone of the JMG experience is teaching students how to be strong leaders. JMG students learn public speaking, problem solving, and decision-making skills. Because of this, JMG students learn what it means to be accountable; how to be inclusive; and, the power of promoting equity - purposefully - so that all of their peers will have the opportunity to reach their fullest potential.

As our programs expand, and more students are served, it is exciting to contemplate future JMG graduates as a groundswell of positive influencers. Our leadership team at JMG is driven and heartened by the responsibility and privilege of honing the skills and cultural awareness of the next generation of Maine's leaders.



CONTINUUM OF SUPPORT JMG CORE PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

JMG is the only nonprofit in Maine offering a continuum of support to help students transition from middle school through high school graduation, onto post-secondary education through degree attainment and connections to successful career pathways.



Middle School

JMG's middle school program helps students develop communication, teambuilding, leadership, and problem-solving skills through project work and adventure based activities. It includes a hands-on community service component, teaching students about the importance of giving back. There are four areas of concentration: leadership development; civic awareness; social awareness; and career exploration.

High School

The JMG high school core program is offered in partnership with public schools, and all programs are offered as a for-credit course. The primary objective is to keep students fully engaged in high school through graduation, leading to enrollment in post-secondary education, a continued education credential or training program, or a quality job with a career pathway. All students receive a minimum of 12 months of follow-up support.

College Success

JMG's College Success Program (CSP) is a comprehensive bridging and retention program that starts in high school and continues seamlessly through college. The goal of CSP is to help students with barriers to education obtain a post-secondary credential. In partnership with Maine colleges, CSP plays a critical role in students' success and can mean the difference between a student completing college or dropping out.

Career Coordinators partner with local businesses and connect with JMG Specialists to develop and deliver a career preparation curriculum that addresses the gap in soft career skills, including financial literacy, communication, and time management.

JMG's High School Completion Program is designed to serve youth ages 16-24 who have disengaged from the traditional school system and are interested in completing requirement for a high school diploma or equivalent.

Jumpstart Our Youth (JOY) is a collaboration with the Unity Foundation, the Maine Community Foundation, and the UniTel, Inc. to teach students about the value of hands-on community commitment and the principles of smart philanthropy.

Through the Learn, Earn, and Achieve Potential (LEAP) collaborative initiative, JMG provides both a competency-based high school education model, including alternative delivery options and support, and post-secondary support services for all eligible foster care youth.

JMG partners with LearningWorks, a nonprofit serving youth, immigrants, and low-income families, to offer the JMG Career Prepprogram as part of the Youth Building Alternatives (YBA) component of LearningWorks.

JMG and the MELMAC Foundation have collaborated to partner with six high schools to provide support to students on a school-wide basis to identify their aspirations for life after high school, and then connect those aspirations to a post-secondary plan.

The Opportunity Passport® program provides financial literacy skills and an opportunity for matched savings designed to help youth successfully transition to adulthood. Experienced staff at JMG provide ongoing support as youth develop savings goals and plan for asset purchases essential to independence.

As a results-driven organization, JMG vigilantly tracks and responds to the outcomes of our programs, always keeping students at the center of the educational process. JMG has a best-in-class outcome data information system. These outcomes allow us to evaluate the effectiveness of our programs.

Dear JMG Supporters,

For twenty-five years, JMG has helped youth of promise stay in school and enter the workforce with the skills and self-confidence that employers demand. JMG's authentic, cohort-based approach has given 50,000 youth a reason to stay connected at a critical time in their lives. Their model supports deep, competency-based skill building that is cost-effective today, and will pay enormous dividends tomorrow as we avoid the financial and opportunity costs that arise when youth disengage from school and work.


And it works: 92% of JMG seniors graduate from high school; 85% of JMG graduates experience positive outcomes one year after graduation in the form of school, employment, or the military; and six years later, JMG graduates are earning 14% more than their peers.

That JMG can so clearly point to positive outcomes demonstrates the deep commitment that JMG has to data and accountability. In the high-stakes of working with students of promise, anecdotes do not cut it. We must objectively evaluate what works and what doesn't. JMG's data-driven culture and their willingness to use data to make changes is a key component of their success in helping youth overcome significant obstacles.

What about the next twenty-five years? Now more than ever, JMG's role is critical, both in the hard work of preparing youth for life on their own, and in the broader effort of workforce development. To grow Maine's economy tomorrow, we need to ensure that today's young people enter the Maine workforce with relevant skills, talent, and motivation. Research tells us that trying to bring youth back into the fold after they have disengaged is expensive and fraught with failure. JMG is well-positioned to use their school-based intervention model to keep youth connected and to play an outsized role in addressing Maine's workforce challenges.

One of the primary ways JMG will help Maine address its future workforce needs is with their expansion to college campuses. JMG will now be confronting some of the most critical workforce development challenges of our time by working with college-going young people to ensure they earn credentials of value and do not drop out. JMG is the right organization at the right time to take on this problem, and I am proud to join you in celebrating JMG's success of the last twenty-five years and offer best wishes for the next twenty-five.

Dear JMG Investors,





The dedication each staff and board member brings to JMG, and most importantly to our students, is unmatched. They continuously commit their time, heart and soul to serve Maine's youth.







not be easy, you will never hear me use the word quit."


Mathison Deering DEXTER HIGH SCHOOL


