Introduction

During 1988, the federal Department of Energy continued its effort to show that Yucca Mountain, Nevada, is a safe place to build the nation's first high-level nuclear waste repository. In Maine, the Maine Low-level Radioactive Waste Authority began taking steps toward building a state low-level radioactive waste disposal facility, if one is needed, while the Governor's office continued conversations aimed at disposing of Maine's low-level waste out of state.

The on-going DOE effort attracts little attention from the general public in Maine. The Authority's activities are watched by a handful of state activists, and get occasional media coverage. In general, in marked contrast to the period of intense ferment in early 1986, radioactive waste is not now a priority with most Maine people.

Two events have the potential to re-excite public interest. The first, which is probably several years in the future if it happens at all, would be the discovery that Yucca Mountain is not a suitable site for a high-level repository and that the national search must start anew. The second, scheduled for 1989, will be the announcement of areas in Maine potentially suitable for siting a state low-level waste disposal facility.

When one of these events occurs, state officials can expect a flood of demands for information and an outpouring of public reaction. The Advisory Commission has been monitoring developments concerning both high-level and low-level radioactive waste and will be prepared to share information and to help recommend appropriate courses of action.

A. High-level waste

Under the 1987 Nuclear Waste Policy Amendments Act, the U. S. Department of Energy has been working toward site characterization of Yucca Mountain, Nevada, as a national high-level radioactive waste repository. The State of Nevada does not support the choice, and has criticized almost every step DOE has taken.

At the present rate of progress, it is likely to be several years before a decision is reached either to start construction or to declare Yucca Mountain unsuitable. There seems to be no reasonable possibility that Maine will be considered again as a high-level repository site in the next few years.

B. Low-level waste

The <u>Maine Low-level Radioactive Waste Authority</u> has proceeded with its task of preparing to site a Maine low-level radioactive waste disposal facility, albeit less rapidly than members hoped when they approved a siting plan and schedule in December 1987. Major accomplishments during 1988 included:

- Setting up and staffing an office and developing the capability to organize public educational events and respond to information requests.
- Negotiating the contractual agreement with Maine Yankee required by state law as a prerequisite for expenditures on siting work.

The Authority issued an RFP for development of a site screening methodology and preliminary state-wide screening (based on existing data) and received and reviewed bids. As 1988 ended, negotiations with the low bidder continued. This contract was scheduled to be awarded in September 1988, so that preliminary site screening could begin in October, leading to selection of potential candidate sites in May 1989. Delay in awarding the contract may postpone site selection.

The <u>Maine Department of Environmental Protection</u> oversaw drafting and review of siting criteria for a low-level waste storage or disposal facility. These rules will be used by the Board of Environmental Protection to evaluate an application from the Authority for a disposal facility, or an application from anyone for a storage facility. The Board adopted the rules September 28, 1988.

The <u>Governor's Office</u>, represented by Public Advocate (and Advisory Commission member) Stephen Ward, continued conversations with officials in regional low-level waste disposal compacts and in states planning to build their own disposal facilities. The goal is an arrangement -- compact or contract -- for out-of-state disposal of Maine's waste. No agreements were reached in 1988.

Advisory Commission members and staff have monitored Authority and DEP activities during 1988. Staff have attended most Authority meetings, and Authority representatives have attended most Commission meetings; each body's meeting agendas usually include a report from the other. The Commission held two work sessions on DEP's draft regulations in May and submitted comments on the draft to the department. Advisory Commission staff member Robert Demkowicz has worked with Mr. Ward on contacts with other states and compacts.

The Advisory Commission met Jan. 13, Feb. 11, April 25, and Nov. 16, 1988. Two workshop sessions were held in May to prepare comments on the Department of Environmental Protection's draft low-level radioactive waste facility siting regulations.

As provided in the law setting up the Advisory Commission, it was reviewed by the legislature's Audit and Program Review Committee in 1988. At the end of an hour-long hearing on Sept. 15, the committee voted unanimously to recommend that the 114th legislature continue the Commission's life for another five years. If the recommendation is accepted, the next review will occur in 1992.

Seven issues of the Commission's Update newsletter were published in 1988 (January-February, March, April-May, June-July, August, September-October, November-December). The low-level waste Backgrounder, first published in the fall of 1987, was updated in the spring of 1988. Commission staff have taken several workshops and short courses on use of computers in publishing and hope to improve the appearance of the newsletter and other publications, subject to availability of time on DEP computers.

The Commission's videotapes on radioactive waste were dormant in 1988. Staff prepared drafts of suggested television Public Service Announcements for review at the Nov. 16 Commission meeting, and will work on revisions in 1989. The toll-free telephone line remained a useful channel of communication, bringing in almost daily requests for information.

The Commission staff during the first half of 1988 consisted of Robert Demkowicz, Environmental Specialist IV; Mary Grow, Public Information Specialist; and Bonnie Savage, Secretary. Mrs. Savage went on maternity leave on May 26, the day her son Eric was born, and later submitted her resignation. No replacement was hired in 1988; at the beginning of 1989, Mr. Demkowicz was ready to interview candidates for a half-time secretarial position with the Commission.

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Amendment for Fiscal Year 1990 Budget

The following are additional anticipated expenditures. A financial order, including these expenditures with appropriate justifications, will be submitted with the budget prior to July 1, 1989.

The commission has several new members that will attend and participate in educational conferences and meetings held out of state.

Travel - Out of State Account #4530.2 \$5,000

Staff will be involved in additional out of state training with federal regulatory agencies (NRC,EPA) and one member is involved with out of state compact/contract negotiations for the disposal of Maine's low-level radioactive waste.

Rent Account #4530.2 \$5,600
