In addition, the Bureau of Parks and Recreation proposes to sell 5.6 acres of property initially acquired for a public boat access facility in Gardiner.

The bill, as amended by Committee Amendment "A" (S-4), requires the municipalities to retain, operate, and maintain the properties for public, outdoor recreational purposes, including public boat access sites. In the event that the property is not maintained or operated as required, the property reverts to the State.

In general, the Bureau of Parks and Recreation has been returning property to municipalities at no cost and to be maintained as public recreational sites in order to avoid expensive maintenance costs.

#### SUMMARY:

The original bill proposed to establish a 15 member Joint Select Committee on Economic Development. The Committee, composed of legislators, persons from the private sector, and two state government officials, was directed to prepare an economic development strategy for the State to provide a central direction to Maine's economic development and business assistance programs. The strategy would include goals and objectives, a structure by which economic development programs could be best implemented, and an evaluation of the effectiveness of small business assistance services. The Select Committee would be required to hold a minimum of 4 hearings throughout the State.

The bill as amended by Committee Amendment "A" (H-344) proposed that the legislative members of the Committee be selected from the Committee on State Government, and the chairpersons of the Select Committee would be the current chairpersons of the State Government Committee. In addition, the committee amendment broadened the scope of the Select Committee's activities to include the determination of the most effective role for state government in economic growth and development, the creation of priorities for state economic development efforts, the needs of small business in Maine, and the need for small business advocacy in Maine.
