JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES JULY 1985

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees of the Maine Legislature, covering the First Regular Session of the 112th Legislature. The summaries are arranged by LD number and indexed separately by committee.

SUMMARY:

This bill authorizes the sale of frozen lobster tails. The committee discussed enforcement procedures and was presented statistical information relating tail length to the standard measure of lobster size (carapace length). Objections were raised on the grounds that this market would open an avenue for the sale of undersized lobsters. The majority of the committee approved the bill with an additional requirement (CA H-68) that the DMR report to the Marine Resources Committee by January 15, 1986 on the implementation of the new law. The committee amendment also provides that the authorization for the sale of frozen tails is repealed on May 1,1986. Further committee attention to this issue is expected in the 2nd Regular Session of the 112th Legislature.

SUMMARY:

This bill changes the certification renewal date for a shellfish sanitation certificate from December 31st to April 30th. This change will improve administration of a largely seasonal industry. The bill also authorizes the Commissioner (DMR) to adopt regulations governing departmental approval of municipal shellfish conservation ordinances.
