The bill would have required school administrative units to teach a course in "the free enterprise system of economics" in "at least one grade from grades 9 to 12."

SUMMARY:

This bill would have created a council to provide coordination between the university (UMO & USM) and the business community. The goal was to enhance academic and research programs at the unviersity and the economic development opportunities of the State's business and industry. An endowment fund consisting of legislative appropriations, gifts, etc., would have been created to be administered by the council.

SUMMARY:

The bill would have given parents the right to examine all materials "used in conjunction with any research or experimentation program or project." It would also have prevented a school unit, without first obtaining parental consent, from requiring a student to submit to psychological examination and tests which tried to collect information concerning the student's political affiliation, religious beliefs, sexual behavior, or a list of 5 other topics.
