S-4 COMMITTEE

SUMMARY: The bill increases the limit on school bus purchases from \$5 million to \$7 million. The committee amendment adds an appropriations section.

LD AN ACT TO CHANGE THE PROCESS OF SELECTING THE ONTP 246 COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATIONAL AND CULTURAL SERVICES.

Sponsor: ESTES

Committee Report: ONTP

SUMMARY: This bill would have provided for appointment of the Commissioner of the Department of Educational and Cultural Services by the State Board of Education with input from the Governor. The commissioner would have served a 3-year term with annual performance reviews by the state board.

The new draft, LD 1649, represents the minority report of the committee. The new draft is similar to the original bill but provides for appointment of the commissioner by the Governor subject to approval by the state board.

LDAN ACT RELATING TO THE ORGANIZATION OF SCHOOL LVWD 280 ADMINISTRATIVE DISTRICTS.

Sponsor: ESTES, Matthews K, Soucy

Committee Report: LVWD

SUMMARY: This bill would have allowed individual municipalities to form a School Administrative District and to thereby-submit the school budget to the voters in a referendum election, rather than to the town council, for approval. Proponents argued that such an option would protect the education budget and provide for timely adoption which doesn't always occur when the council must approve the budget. Opponents argued that elected councillors are in the best position to balance the needs and resources of the whole community and that the proposal could result in delays if the voters defeat the proposed budget. In the end, the committee felt the proposal left too many questions unanswered.

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
