LD AN ACT RELATING TO USE OF 6-AXLE VEHICLES TO LVWD 237 HAUL COMMODITIES.

<u>SUMMARY:</u> This bill would have allowed special commodity permits for 6-axle combination vehicles, regardless of the commodity carried.

LD AN ACT AUTHORIZING A STUDY TO DETERMINE THE LVWD 267 FEASIBILITY OF SEAT BELTS IN SCHOOL BUSES.

Sponsor: REEVES, Cahill, Mills, Soucy Committee Report: LVWD

SUMMARY: This bill would have required the Department of Transportation to conduct a study on the feasibility and desirability of seat belt use in school buses.

VEHICLE LAWS.

LD AN ACT TO REDUCE THE INCIDENCE OF MOTOR VEHICLE ONTP
304 ACCIDENTS AMONG MAINE'S YOUNG DRIVERS.

Sponsor: REEVES, Rydell, Carroll Committee Report: ONTP OTP-A

SUMMARY: This bill would have required minors to hold a valid instructional permit for the operation of a motor vehicle for a period of at least one year prior to making

application for an operators license. It would have extended the validity of the permit from one year to 18 months. The bill would also have prohibited persons under the age of 17 from operating a motor vehicle on a public way between midnight and 6 a.m..

Committee amendment "A" (H-287), was presented as the minority report and changed the length of the permit period to not less than 3 months, which could have been waived by the Secretary of State if the applicant had proof that there was no other means of transportation to and from school or work.

LD AN ACT RELATING TO THE SUSPENSION OF MOTOR LVWD 312 VEHICLE LICENSES FOR REFUSAL OF CHEMICAL TESTS.

Sponsor: GAUVREAU, Marsano, Conley Committee Report: LVWD

SUMMARY: This bill would have eliminated the cumulative suspension feature of Maine's implied consent (to submit to a chemical test) law. It would have allowed the automatic suspension of a license resulting from a refusal to take the test to be deducted from the suspension resulting from a conviction on operating under the influence. At present, the two suspensions are additive.

LD AN ACT CONCERNING THE LIABILITY FOR DAMAGES OF ONTP
388 PERSONS OPERATING A TRUCK WITH AN UNCOVERED
LOAD.

Committee Report: ONTP

SUMMARY: This bill would have defined the registered owner of a vehicle of which any part of a load falls to the ground, as the operator of the vehicle for the purposes of responsibility for any damage caused by a falling load.
