LD AN ACT CONCERNING HAND FISHING FOR SCALLOPS. 894

Sponsor: GREENLAW Committee Report: LVWD

SUMMARY: This bill sought to increase the scalloping season by six weeks. It also would have exempted noncommercial scallopers from emergency closures due to gear conflicts. The sponsor withdrew the bill before the public hearing.

LD AN ACT CONCERNING NONRESIDENT CLAM LICENSES. ONTP 921

Sponsor: VOSE, Look, Moholland, Randall Committee Report: ONTP

SUMMARY: This bill proposed to increase the ceiling for how much a town can charge for a nonresident shellfish license from \$150 to \$250. It also gave a municipality discretion over whether to make unsold resident licenses available to nonresidents after the period of issuance. There were no proponents testifying on behalf of the bill.

LD AN ACT CONCERNING RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS FOR ONTP 984 CLAM LICENSES.

Sponsor: VOSE, Moholland Committee Report: ONTP

SUMMARY: This bill sought to establish proof of residency for clammers to obtain a resident municipal shellfish license. Currently, these decisions are left to the town's discretion, without a consistent policy. DMR agreed to develop guidelines for towns to use in evaluating the policy.

LDAN ACT RELATING TO THE ENHANCEMENT ANDLVWD1205PRESERVATION OF MARINE RESOURCES.

Sponsor: SCARPINO Committee Report: LVWD

SUMMARY: This bill has three major components: a fisheries enhancement program, lobster license requirements, and the elimination of the class C designation for marine waters.

Fisheries Enhancement - The first portion of the bill outlined a proposed fisheries enhancement initiative composed of hatcheries, habitat protection and habitat development programs. Cooperative research for commercial fisheries would be strengthened through the Sea Grant Program and a proposed extension service in DMR. License fees would have been increased to help fund this work. Under the new scheme, \$25 of the license fee would be allocated to the General Fund and \$25 to DMR enforcement efforts, with the remaining portion going to the enhancement program.

2. Lobster licenses - The bill also outlines a system for controlled entry into the lobster fishery and lobster trap limits. Under this proposal six categories of licenses would be issued with the following allowable trap numbers and requirements:

Class A. 800 traps - must earn 50% of income from lobster fishing over the last 3 years B. 400 traps - must have 2 years of experience C. 400 traps - must be over 17 D. 25 traps - must apply during March E. 0 traps - only for sternman with class A fisherman

X. unlimited traps - offshore fishing - must be eligible for class A license.

If a lobsterman was using more than the allowable number of traps for his category, he would reduce that number by 10% per year until the specific number was reached. The Commissioner of DMR would be allowed to further reduce trap numbers for each class after the program has been in effect for five years.

A license application must be accompanied by a CPA report to verify income requirements, although previous license holders are grandfathered. There is an appeals process and a waiver for disabilities or illness. The proposal also includes a 2 year apprenticeship program to be designed by the commissioner and an advisory panel. There were miscellaneous provisions included to extend the prohibition on Sunday lobstering and ban on evening lobstering.

The proposal also allowed landing of oversized lobsters by offshore fishermen provided they were caught in lobster traps, were landed in sealed containers, and manifested.

The lobster management fund proposed in this bill was basically comparable to the current program except that it would include a tagging program and there was no provision for the Lobster Advisory Council.

Class C waters - The last sections of the bill repealed all the provisions for Maine's class C waters, to require that all marine waters meet the requirements of class A or B. Currently, discharges to class C areas are allowed to cause some changes to estuarine and marine life, as long as the ecosystem as a whole continues to function.

The sponsor trimmed down the bill in work session to include only a provision for developing a marine preserves program. However, a fiscal note of over \$40,000 was attached to the bill and the committee felt it would not pass through the appropriations committee. The sponsor withdrew the bill.

LDAN ACT CONCERNING MUSSEL HARVESTING.PL 19871326c. 328

Sponsor: COLES, Rice, Mitchell, Crowley Committee Report: OTP-A Amendments Adopted: H-187 COMMITTEE

SUMMARY: LD 1326 removes mussels from the general shellfish definition and provisions and establishes a separate subchapter to regulate their harvest. A hand-raking license and boat license are established. The bill also includes the general provisions for taking mussels from areas closed due to red tide. This action was recommended by a legislative study on blue mussel harvesting in 1986. No opponents testified against the legislation.

A committee amendment decreased the fees for these licenses to make them more consistent with other fishery licenses.
