SUMMARY: LD 1275 provides additional funding of job training through the State's two Job Training Partnership Act service delivery areas via the private industry councils. The bill provides \$1,000,000 each year in the 1987-89 biennium to be used for job training. The following schematic describes how the process would work.

#### COMMISSIONER OF LABOR

 Approves plans of Private Industry Councils (PIC) for job training.
 Provides money to PICs.

#### PRIVATE INDUSTRY COUNCILS

- 1. Seek funding from other sources to be matched with State funds.
- 2. Publicize its annual plan.

### USE OF MONIES

- Retraining of Displaced Workers.
  - Training of workers ineligible for the programs.
- 3. Provide support services to people with barriers that restrict participation in training.
  - 4. Assist students about to enter the work force.
- 5. Develop training packages for economic development.
- 6. Encourage job creation.
- 7. Reimbursement of training costs.

### **OUALIFICATIONS OF PARTICIPANTS** TO BE SERVED

- 1. Unemployed workers.
- 2. Low income persons.
- 3. The working poor.
  4. Persons who find it difficult to find and keep work.
- 5. Persons with traditional barriers to employment.
- 6. Disabled workers or workers threatened with displacement.

### ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR EMPLOYERS

- Employers' skilled labor needs cannot be met with their own resources.
- 2. Employers' investments in expansion or location in Maine depends upon services available.

The bill was amended by Committee Amendment "A" (S-175), which:

- Restores legislative oversight over the United States Job Training Partnership Act program;
- Provides dependent care and transportation services to eligible participants who otherwise would be unable to participate in a training program;
- Focuses the Job Training Partnership Act program and the resources provided in the bill to the 95% of the population eligible to participate in the Job Training Partnership Act program, but who do not currently take part in the program;
- Allows persons with job training needs, but who have assets exceeding federal guidelines, to contribute personal resources toward job training;
- Requires the private industry councils to submit their annual plans to the Governor before funds may be approved; and
- Provides legislative review and oversight of the expanded job training program established in the bill.
